The Albany Porridge Bikers have once again completed the 350km bicycle ride to raise money for charities.

Twenty six riders and eight support people left the Albany prison on Thursday morning and headed off for Jerramungup, 186 kms away, spending the night there. Former Lake Grace resident Ross Young being part of the team.

They continued on to Lake Grace on Friday afternoon, arriving around 4pm with a police escort into town. The Porridge Bikers were delighted to be welcomed by several excited children waiting to ride the final stage with them to the pavilion.

Once recovered slightly and catching their breath, they presented the Lake Grace Development

The word had spread that there was a cooked breakfast at the Lake Grace Tourist Information Bay and the take-up was fantastic; the Lions members probably didn't realise how popular they were. As the cars kept pulling in the Lions had to go on the prowl for more bacon and were resorting to squeezing the chickens a little harder to get more eggs.

Once appetites were sated Lion's President Nick Maalouf welcomed everyone to the formal side of the proceedings, the unveiling of the Bennett wagon. He handed the microphone over to the main man, Arthur Slarke, who had rallied the troops to bring this project to fruition.

Arthur welcomed the Bennett Family, Lions District Governor Stephen Berry and Kathryn, Lake Grace Shire Council representatives, the local constabulary – whose presence would have kept the breakfast queue calm - and other guests who attended to show their support.

It was a perfect morning weatherwise and the site was looking splendid as the Shire staff had been through and done a good tizzy up of the surroundings.

The project started in 2018 when Helen Bennett, President of the Development Association at the time,

mentioned the wagon and that she didn't know what the future held for it, it had been held in storage for many years on the farm. From the meeting word spread to the Lions and the question was raised, would they be interested in taking it on as a project?

Lions agreed it was a good project for them to take on, writing to Helen to say that "the future of the Bennett Family's historic wagon is a matter of interest to the Lake Grace Lions Club". Helen gave her consent and the Lions set to work; discussing a proposed location before sending a proposal to the shire.

Over the next 18 months the location was settled on, the design was agreed upon and the Shire Council came through with all the approvals. Funding for the project was supplied by the Lions and the Shire.

Some refurbishment had to be carried out on the wagon; the flooring was replaced while it was still on the farm; it was then transported to the Men's Shed. Work at the shed consisted of cleaning and oiling the wagon, with only minor repairs needed.

With the wagon shelter built and ready for use and the wagon raring to find a home, it was on 20th October 2020 that the wagon was transported from the Men's

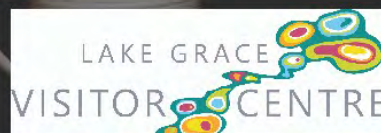

Lake Grace CRC – Annual Report

It has been an interesting year; we staggered our way through COVID which had a stop-start effect on workshops and activities for the duration of the year. Although it was nothing we couldn't handle it did make it difficult to plan, however the centre was more important than ever for the dissemination of information and the need to be constantly looking to the future.

At times we get asked, what is it that we do? It's a difficult question to answer as there is so much that we cover and it can be difficult to put into words. In a snapshot the Lake Grace CRC had over 7,000 incoming contacts throughout the 2020/21 financial year; this only covers face-to-face, email and phone contacts. It does not cover the text, WhatsApp or messenger contacts and it definitely doesn't take into consideration the times we bump into each other in the street and there is a transaction of information or a job order! We provided government and community information to 364 people, we delivered 52 workshops, we provide over 20 services to the community, we received 7 grants, we employed 5 local people, we engaged the services of 20 volunteers, we held 5 community events, had 30 'hot office' bookings, collaborated with 7 other community groups, and provided 13 one-on-one IT training sessions.

We were finally able to put to bed three grant funded activities; Mental Health, Youth Engagement and Road Safety. These three grants funded more than a dozen workshops that had been held over the last two and a half years.

On behalf of the Lake Grace LCDC we were successful in obtaining over \$35,000 funding for remnant bush preservation in the boundaries of the Lake Grace townsite; this is a project that will run for two years. We will be working hand in hand with the Shire of Lake Grace, local contractors and the local District High School. Education, revegetation and preservation is a focus of the grant.

We provided support material to the Shire of Lake Grace through our Driver Reviver activities to enable them to be successful in obtaining a \$138,000 grant to upgrade our Driver Reviver facilities. This gives us a permanent site that will be aligned with the All Abilities Playground with grant funding put toward toilet facilities, shade shelters and benches.

The CRC took on the Secretary/Treasurer role for the Seniors group, this isn't a paid position but will enable us to assist them with governance and support. The Shire will continue helping them with organizing activities. It dovetails nicely with arranging for guest speakers to attend the CWA's monthly senior citizens lunches.

We have completed 12 months in the role of Secretary/Treasurer for the Men's Shed and in that time have put their finances onto MYOB. The membership is stable and we now have the capacity to email most of the

members to keep them updated with what is happening. Through FRRR we were able to access \$2,750 in grant funding that was put toward a bandsaw and some smaller equipment.

With grant funding we were able to replace our wide format printer which has the added ability of being able to scan up to A0 – a facility previously unavailable within 150km of Lake Grace.

The Harvest Festival was a great success again last year, we are in the process of putting together this year's event.

The Lakes Link continues to be the focus of local news and information, after looking at other local papers this year the Lakes Link stands out as a great mix of news, events and important information for the local community. We are always open to new ideas and content so please send your reports in.

There have been some changes in both staff and committee; Yvette Downey took on the role of Chairperson and Kelly Hawtin resigned from her position as Treasurer. Rosie Timperley resigned and Kylie Read has joined the team. Everyone who has been a part of the CRC brings something to the organization; ideas, enthusiasm and diligence is key to our future.

Although having given us a few challenges it has been a successful year and we continue to look forward to building on our previous successes.

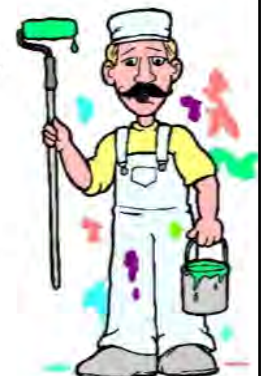

Having Independent Design When Building

Generally, the first step in the process of building a house, shed, commercial premises or specialised accommodation pod is to complete a little research to see what's out there and to assist with formulating your ideas about exactly what it is you want. There is a plethora of websites from which to choose.

One tends to gravitate towards building company websites given they usually have examples of their standard floorplans available to view. If you find a builder with a plan which suits your needs – perfect – get in contact, and if you are getting appropriate value for money, then embark on the next step – confirm whether they will build in your area, roughly when they can start and whether they have can complete the project in a timeframe which works for you.

However, what if your requirements are not met through pre-designed plans? If you have already engaged with builders, most will inform you that they can create a design which matches you needs. This scenario is easily solved by using an independent designer. Put simply, an Independent Designer works for your best outcomes, whereas a Builder works for their best outcomes.

The eagle has landed!



I'd like to take the opportunity to introduce myself as the new Officer In Charge of Lake Grace Police Station. I've only been here for a week, but can see that you've been in safe hands with Fiona and Scott. I intend to continue their good work and stay focused on making our community safe.

A little bit about myself: I have transferred from Kondinin Police Station where I was stationed for a few months, having arrived in April from South Hedland Police Station. I have been a police officer for over 16 years, serving operationally in both remote and metropolitan locations, and was a Bobby in Sussex Police in England prior to joining WAPOL. I have broad policing experience which I hope will serve you well.

My wife, Aimee, and I are both from New Zealand (and will forever support the All Blacks) and have two daughters, Clare and Elena. The girls have started to settle into our new home and I'm happy to report their first day nerves about school were quickly replaced with excitement. They now look forward to school and seeing their new friends.

Whilst only recently arriving at Lake Grace Police Station, I have done significant research prior to my arrival and identified the following priorities which we'll focus on:

- **Community Engagement.** In a small community such as this I believe that it is important for police to be actively involved in the community and with community groups. I am making a concerted effort to get out and meet everyone and will continue to

do so in my time here. It's important to have a two-way flow of information and I encourage everyone who may be passing the station to pop in for a chat or say hello when I'm out and about.

- **Family Violence** is a significant issue for all communities. I am committed to increasing the number of reports of family violence to police, as I believe only a small percentage of the total number of incidents are being reported. Increasing the reporting rates enables us to identify the most vulnerable in the community and put strategies in place to protect victims and families
- **Traffic enforcement and Road Safety.** Both of these go hand in hand. Unsafe road user behaviour is a problem across the state, including our community. Alcohol and drug impaired driving causes significant harm and we will continue to focus our efforts on these serious offences. I have secured a stockpile of roadside drug oral fluid test kits to ensure people who put others at risk will find themselves walking if they continue.
- I'm extremely mindful of the impact illicit drug use, particularly methamphetamine, can have in a community. All of us here at the station are highly vigilant to its presence, and will pursue those who choose to supply these drugs. As good as we are at our job, we rely heavily upon the information we receive from you to be able to target these people. All information is strictly confidential. If you wish to provide the information in a more anonymous way, Crime Stoppers will take a report over the phone on 1800 333 000.

LOCAL NEWS

Harvest time is fast approaching. We know everyone will be in a hurry but safety is our priority. We will be spending extra time on the roads these coming months ensuring everyone is doing their bit to keep our roads safe. Our main focus will be speed, mobile phone use and driver fatigue. Please obey all the traffic signs and we ask other road users to exercise patience and show courtesy to the heavy vehicles on our roads.

CRIME

As mentioned in the last article, a few of you have raised concerns about phishing scams, fraudulent activity, and other suspicious activity, mainly through computers or phones. With advancing technology, and increasing ways to communicate electronically, it leaves us vulnerable if we do not take precautionary measures to protect our accounts and identity.

POLICE NEWS *(cont.)*

Cybercrime is becoming more prevalent within Australia as more devices and better infrastructure are made available to the population. Even in remote areas of the country members of the public are vulnerable to online criminals.

Here are a few pointers to stay safe online:

- Keep your computers and mobile devices updated with the latest software and operating system updates.
- Police and other government agencies will not call or email to advise you have an arrest warrant, your identity has been stolen and that you need to immediately pay a fine to make the problem go away.
- Police and other government agencies will not ask you to pay fines in gift cards or to transfer money to another person's account for safe keeping or to 'assist' with an investigation.
- Do not click links in unsolicited texts or emails, often purporting to be from banks, online stores, social media sites or delivery companies – just delete these messages.
- If you click the link, criminals may steal your information (such as user names and passwords) or infect your device with malicious software.
- If you are concerned about a text message, phone call or email – contact the organisation (by looking up their correct contact details from their website or visit them in person) and explain your concerns.
- Criminals often alter banking details on invoices sent by email so you pay them instead - do not pay invoices you receive without first verifying the banking details are correct. Call your contact via details you already have on file.
- To avoid identify theft do not share your personal information or identity documents with people online unless there is a legitimate need.
- Be aware of the risks of sharing intimate images online – the other person or a third party might post or share these images without your consent or use them to extort money from you.

There are numerous fraudulent investment websites online – conduct due diligence before investing, seek independent advice and review the information at www.scamwatch.gov.au and www.asic.gov.au

- If purchasing goods online – use well known and established websites and follow ScamWatch or the eSafe Commissioner's recommendations.

Do not allow other people to access your online bank accounts. If you meet someone on social media and they want help transferring money between bank accounts – Don't! You could end up committing a

criminal offence – go to www.scamwatch.gov.au/types-of-scams/dating-romance for more details.

The eSafety Commissioner website at www.esafety.gov.au contains a wealth of useful information. Cybercrime can be reported at www.cyber.gov.au If you are concerned for your safety contact your local police.



TRAFFIC

We've gone through an entire infringement book just this past week alone, finding most drivers aren't slowing down to enjoy the beautiful views we have to offer. I'm happy to say that most of the drivers are not from Lake Grace, and the speeding drivers were sent on their way, minus demerit points, some hard-earned cash, but hopefully a new appreciation for the road laws.

Of note was the driver caught doing 85kph down the main street of Lake Grace. It was found he had just finished his liquid lunch and was charged with speeding and drink driving offences at 1:30pm!

Lastly, we have had reports of an off-road motorcycle driving around town. The rider has allegedly been practicing for the X Games, driving recklessly, and endangering themselves and other members of the public. We are very keen to speak with this person so if anyone has any information, dash camera footage or anything that could assist us we'd like to hear from you.

Riding an Unlicensed Motor Cycle on a road is an offence under Section 80O of the Road Traffic Act 1974 and gives police the power to seize the vehicle. Unlike other vehicle seizures, this one is permanent. I have the paperwork ready to go should we cross paths with our rider.

Slowing Down to Create

The time of the Covid 19 pandemic has caused many of us to reflect on the fast pace of our lives and how we spend our time. For Lake Grace artist Michelle Slarke, this has been a time to slow down and look closely at the complex and fascinating cycles of a local salt lake as subject matter for a major group exhibition.

We Must Get Together Some Time is a major body of new works showing in Mandurah (CASM and ManPAC) as part of the Indian Ocean Craft Triennial (IOTA21). The eleven regional and metropolitan WA artists have been working together for 18 months. They are connected by their practices of collecting and working with objects, materials and—for the writers—the words, that they find whilst walking and being in nature. This is about slowing down and noticing nature, particularly the places for which we care and return to, and from this taking new insights to creative works.

For Michelle Slarke, this meant visiting a salt lake on the family farm each week for over a year. “It is a lake I know from childhood – but I didn’t know the science”. Michelle’s art work is informed by her careful observations and research, and uses the found insects, botanical fragments and other detritus she collected on her slow walks around the lake. ‘*Salt/age*’, comprises an installation of small sculptures made from lake salt, charcoal, soil and algae, a core sample from the centre of the lake and projected images of microscopic water samples. These are accompanied by ‘*Lake-walking*’, a series of prints showing the colours of algae and the changing salt surface of the lake.

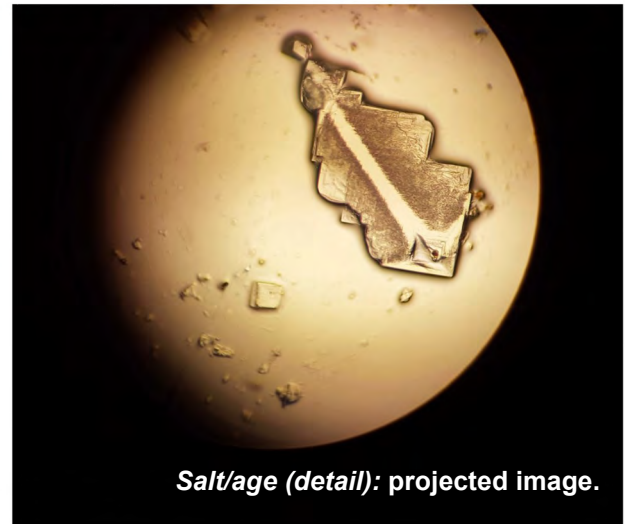
“Slow is a way of thinking and becoming” says curator and fellow artist Annette Nykiel. “It is not necessarily the speed at which a process is practiced”.

The artists – Nandi Chinna, Helen Coleman, Jane Donlin, Sharyn Egan, George Karpathakis, Todd Israel, Annette Nykiel, Perdita Phillips, Nien Schwarz, Michelle Slarke and Dianne Strahan – are diverse in disciplines, use of materials and processes, they are separated by geography, living in country towns, the inner city, hills of Perth and remote Western Australia, however a determined effort to get together—in person and virtually—has allowed the artists to share their ideas and knowledge, and to collaborate.

Artworks, stories of their making, and community workshops will open conversations with audiences and invite responses to questions and concerns about the Australian bush, rural communities and the natural and cultural materiality of place in these precarious times.

Coping with Change

Regional Men's Health

As individuals we all have a different capacity to handle life events and stress. This capacity and our own innate level of resilience is tested when challenged by change either on a personal front or in the workplace. Our life's journey will have many unknowns and the only guarantee in that journey is that there will be *change*.

Dealing with change will often throw up a number of variables. Some people are more at risk than others of becoming dysfunctional during the change process. From studies undertaken those who may struggle with change can be identified as follows:

- individuals who get meaning from a single purpose, like work. This is usually us blokes as we are primarily defined by our role and function e.g. our job. The social/spiritual dimension of most blokes often goes unexplored, and as blokes we just don't talk about issues close to our heart;
- individuals whose role is threatened;
- individuals who are passionate about their role;
- individuals whose security is threatened.

Research tells us that half the population will take change in their stride having little or no effect on their wellbeing. The other half of the population will be affected, and the percentage affected can be broken down into the following categories:

- 20% showing stress signs for up to six weeks (is this normal?)
- 20% showing stress signs for up to 12 months;
- 10% showing profound affects (chronic trauma – distress unresolved).

If we fit into one of the 20% or 10% categories, we need to seek support and have a chat to someone about our distress. It may be through our EAP (Employment Assistance Program), doctor or private counsellor and/or involve talking to a mate (close friend or a family member).

Vocational wellbeing is extremely important because we spend a majority of our time at work. Some points we may want to consider before making decisions on

the work we do, or making a change are:

- be happy and enjoy what we are doing;
- be passionate about what we are doing;
- keep the work life balance right;
- keep growing our experience, it's never complete.

Coping with change in our life is a daily event, sometimes not all the changes are good, especially around bureaucracy. To thrive we must work at it and even though it is challenging at times, the process of change often gives us new skills, increases our capacity and flexibility in life and quite often sends us off in a direction that we would never have allowed ourselves to go.

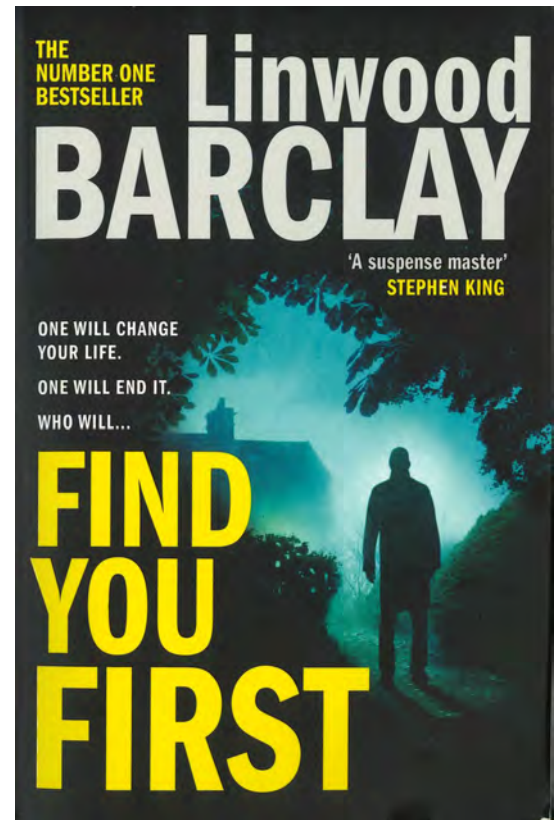
Well this was an interesting one...

Lake Grace Community Men's Shed

At the AGM held on Tuesday 19th October Men's Shed President Walter Perry welcomed everyone before presenting his report:

Firstly I would like to thank the committee and members for their support over the last twelve months.

It has been a successful year with many projects completed, such as the gate closers, Christmas Trees, Pingrup Race sign, Skeleton Weed signs and numerous other smaller projects.

Members operated the sausage sizzle at the Harvest Festival which raised over \$450 for the Shed.

We have all worked together, socially and individually; thanks go to Chris for keeping the shed clean.

Our membership has remained static over the last twelve months, hopefully we can maintain this in the future.

A successful grant of \$2,750 was lodged with FRRR, this enabled us to purchase a new HAFCO 20" bandsaw, compound vice that is set up with the bench top drill, a 200mm benchtop grinder and a HAFCO scroll saw.

With most of the shed set up for wood working projects and space becoming limited members elected to plan for an extension to the current Shed. A grant has been put in with FRRR for \$60,000 to go toward this project.

Financially the Men's Shed continue to hold their own, recording a small loss that could be accounted for if the memberships had been invoiced in the correct financial year (the 2020/21 memberships were inputted at the end of the previous year and the date wasn't changed) - a learning curve for this year.

Cost of membership has been increased from \$10 to \$11. The Men's Shed have just under 100 financial members.

How to Handle a Consumer Complaint Yourself

When a service you've received isn't up to scratch, or a product you've bought doesn't work as it should, you may wish to seek a remedy from the business that supplied it.

Before contacting Consumer Protection for help, it is always important to try to resolve the matter yourself. This is because in most cases an issue with a business or trader can be resolved pretty quickly just by explaining the situation and offering a mutually acceptable solution.

You should start by talking it over with the appropriate person in the organisation, such as the owner, salesperson or a manager. Remember that sometimes the person you're talking to may not be in a position to give you what you want straightaway, so it's important to stay polite and if necessary ask to discuss the matter with the person in charge.

Explain what the problem is and what you want them to do about it, such as a repair, refund or replacement and state when you want it done by.

If the phone call or visit to the business doesn't resolve your issue, then the next step is to follow-up with an email that provides details about the issues and your attempts to resolve it.

Consumer Protection has produced some sample letters on its website that may assist you, in which you should:

- Quote your reference, agreement or account number if you have one;
- Enclose a copy of any receipt, proof of purchase or any other relevant documents; and
- Request a response within a reasonable timeframe (set a deadline).

Failing this, the next step is to find out if there is an organisation responsible for the industry or practice you are having problems with and contact them. Often an industry has its own internal complaint resolution body, which can help to resolve complaints or provide advice to consumers.

If you are not sure who to contact for your particular issue, contact Consumer Protection on 1300 30 40 54 or email consumer@dmirs.wa.gov.au. If you still can't reach an acceptable solution, you can make a formal complaint to Consumer Protection.

Bennett Wagon Unveiling (cont.)

Shed to where it stands today. A fence was needed to prevent people from climbing onto the wagon. Fortunately the shire had matching material in their yard so Walter Perry and Chris Harvey took on the task of installing this fence. Information and images donated by the Bennett family were used by Connelly Images to create signage for the site.

Next came the all-important information gathering. Faye Mansfield, granddaughter of Ernie Bennett had great memories of the wagon, not as a working object but the Bennett kids would play on it or go for a ride in it if there was a special occasion. It was used for community celebrations and no doubt appears in countless family albums.

This Wagon we see here today is symbolic of the equipment all farmers would have needed on their own farms before motor trucks came on the scene. We are very fortunate that this wagon, the wagon of one of Lake Grace's first farmers has been preserved to the condition it is in today. With continued care and protection, the wagon will survive for many decades to come.

Originally there was a family of five Bennett brothers farming in Dumbleyung; two of them, Jim and Ernie made the decision to settle in Lake Grace in 1911. Ernie settled at Rhynie, while his brother Jim and his

wife May settled at Coleraine. Ernie married Catherine in 1912 and brought his bride back to Rhynie. The wagon would have been used for personal transport and also to transport furniture and goods to Lake Grace and to also take saleable produce to the nearest rail head.

Jim and May never had any children, this is how Coleraine eventually came under the ownership of Ernie's descendants; Clem and Helen Bennett were the last Bennett's to farm this property. Ernie and Catherine had six children: Ethel, Rita, Ralph, Lila, Joy and John.


Jeanette Bennett, daughter in law of John Snr, recounted how interesting she found it that the 'Bennett' homesteads, two in Lake Grace and two in Dumbleyung are all of very similar building design.

Ernie Bennett also had a farm called Springdale on the Jerdicutup River but didn't farm it himself; Ernie's daughter Rita married Tommy Daw of Ravensthorpe who farmed the property, hence the connection.

White ants had always been an enemy of the wagon; Clem and Helen's son Regan recounted how they had to be on high alert to prevent them from damaging the wooden structure of the wagon.

The wagon was stored in an enclosed shed until it was needed for something else. "Me and the old man (Clem) shifted the wagon to a narrow lean-to at front of the shearing shed. Being a dirt floor the wheels needed to be raised above ground level. At first we used plough discs. It wasn't long before sand blew over the top of the discs and white ants started to attack a wheel." Pesticide was used to clear them out but Clem and Regan realised they needed to do something better. They made the decision to sit the 4 wagon wheels on top of old tyres. This method proved to be successful in keeping white ants away.

- 400 g carrot, sweet potato or pumpkin, peeled and grated
- 1 1/2 cups canned corn kernels or frozen peas, drained
- 1 medium brown onion, peeled and diced
- 2 tsp dried mixed herbs
- 3/4 cup wholemeal self-raising flour
- 1 cup reduced-fat cheddar cheese, grated
- olive or canola oil spray
- 3 large tomatoes, sliced, optional green side salad, to serve

Method

1. Preheat oven to 200°C (180°C fan forced).
2. Whisk eggs in a medium jug, season with black pepper and set aside.
3. Squeeze grated vegetables to remove some of the excess moisture.

4. In a large bowl combine all ingredients except tomato. Add eggs and stir mixture until well combined.
5. Spray a large baking dish with oil. Pour in zucchini mix and flatten with a spoon. Cover with tomato slices arranged in a single layer.
6. Bake for 40-45 minutes or until firm and golden brown.

Rest in the pan for 10 minutes before dividing into 6 pieces and cutting into slices. Serve with a green side salad.

HEALTHY BLUEBERRY BANANA BREAD

Ingredients

- olive or canola oil spray
- 4 ripe bananas, peeled
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup reduced-fat milk
- 2 eggs
- 1 cup self-raising flour
- 1 cup wholemeal self-raising flour
- 1 tsp ground cinnamon
- 1 cup frozen blueberries

**Method**

1. Preheat oven to 220°C (200°C fan forced). Spray a 20 x 10cm loaf tin with oil; line base and sides with non-stick baking paper.
2. Reserve one whole banana for presentation and mash remaining 3 bananas in a large bowl (1½ cups mashed).
3. Add sugar, milk and eggs and mix with a fork until well combined.
4. Sift flours and cinnamon on top of banana mixture, returning husks from the sieve to the bowl. Mix ingredients together until just combined, taking care not to over-mix, then gently fold through blueberries.
5. Spoon mixture into prepared loaf tin and smooth the surface. Slice remaining banana thinly and overlap slices through the centre of the loaf.
6. Bake for 35-40 minutes then cover with foil and bake for a further 20 minutes. Centre of loaf will remain moist but not wet when tested with a skewer. Allow to cool in tin for 5 minutes then turn onto a wire rack.
7. Cut into 1 cm slices and toast before serving, if desired.

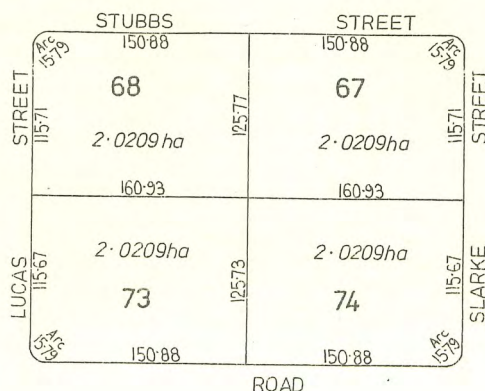

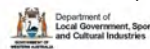
