Flowers and Fashion for Fundraising

Everybody loves a good cause and the revamping of the hospital gardens into something that will be quite special for the permanent care residents, patients, families and staff to enjoy has ticked all the boxes.

Landscape architect Eoin Gladish from Seedesign has brought together a garden plan that is designed to meet the needs of the hospital community. Having grown up in Lake Grace Eoin has an intrinsic understanding of the needs of the hospital; that it's patients range from babies to elderly and that it caters to a large catchment area with a wide variety of needs..

With guidance from hospital staff Eoin's garden proposal is designed to be accessible with raised garden beds; that it will be sensory with patients able to see the change of the plants in accordance with the seasons, be able to touch and also smell the flowers and foliage.

Furnished with plenty of benches the garden will be a link to the outdoors, with anyone utilising able to view the natural lake system in one direction and the sporting precinct in the other. The plan incorporates space and lends itself to outdoor activities; providing an opportunity for patients to be able to get out of the ward and into the fresh air.

Gardens and their infrastructure don't come cheap and the garden had a target budget of \$16,000. Hospital



staff and other supporting businesses, organisations and individuals have been fundraising throughout 2019, accruing at this stage well over \$11,000.

Sand 'N' Salt have been a generous partner, holding two fashion parades with raffles to boost the coffers and refreshments to attract the punters. These two parades have accrued over \$1,500.

Aside from modelling in the fashion parades, hospital staff with plenty of encouragement from project facilitator Kerrie Argent, have been spending plenty of time in their kitchens catering for a variety of functions to bring more money in.

Last week Anna and Kingsley Strevett hosted a garden tour; they were blown away by the incredible response with over 60 people attending. More than \$900 was raised from this event.

Kerrie has said they won't be backing off from the fundraising just yet as they still have a way to go. Although the target is \$16,000 she knows that if they get more it will give them the opportunity to purchase more advanced trees, which will give the garden a more mature look.

 - Allan Marshall, Ollie Farrelly, Mary Naisbitt, Yvette Downey (committee people).


It's always good to get some fresh faces because with that comes fresh ideas and perspective. A big thank you to Danielle and Joely for their many years of service.

Allan Holmes

19/11/1935 - 8/10/2019

Memories from Pingaring days - read by John O'Neill

To Kay and Family I thank you for the honour of being a part of the celebration of Allan's life here today.

Allan was known as Hogget in Pingaring, I will talk more about the Hogget a bit later .

He was Pop to his grandchildren and Pop Star to probably his best mate, grandson Luke and that's how Luke addressed him till the day he passed.

Allan's passions in life were his family, fishing, farming, his community and his sheep. He lived for and adored his grandchildren, he was so proud of them and their achievements. Allan and Kay would travel miles to see their grandies sport.

Allan was born on the 19/11/1935 in Pingelly, the first of three children to Geoff and Marjorie Holmes. Richard and Brian followed. He attended a little school at Erican then finished up at Shackleton Primary school.

Geoff and Marjorie farmed near Erican and ran the small Erican Post Office. Allan left school quite early as all he wanted was to go farming. Once leaving school, he started shearing and working on local farms.

Kay told me it was a New Year's eve Party when Allan first laid eyes on her. Her family, the Starcevich's from Muntagin had been doing the rounds in the district looking for a good New Year's Eve party. They came upon a great crowd at Doodlakine and decided to stay. A young Allan was there, slightly intoxicated and he picked out Kay straight away and gained her attention and hung around like a bad smell. It must have been love at first sight as they were married on the 25th May 1963 in Merredin.

Allan and Kay started a family with the arrival of Karen in 1964, Michelle in 1966, Geoffrey in 1969 and Cheryl completed their family in 1972.

In 1966, Allan and Kay and the family moved from Quairading to Hyden where they were working on his father's CP allocation. After being allocated their own CP block, Roe Loc 2686 in August 1965, they arrived to commence clearing their own block, with very little money, not much in the way of machinery and a teary wife. As Kay stood in the corner of the bush block, the first thing she said was "where is the school bus and where is the nearest phone". There was also no road as they could only access their place through Bill Crooks and Michael Lloyds from the south east through their paddocks.

With the family living in Hyden, Allan would head off in the morning early with Karen to go to school in Pingaring. He would drop Karen off at the Garards with Tracey and she would go to school in Pingaring while Allan went off to work at the block. By the time the others started school, the bus run was nearly at the gate.

Their first 250 acres of clearing was done with a

Fordson Half track and a TD9 Crawler with a log in between.

Thereafter, the rest of their clearing was done with two

dozers and an anchor chain, in six different attempts; I think that all but one of their clearing fires got away.

In 1969, with the help of some their friends S Garard, R Murray, Ken and Noel Fisher and R Evans, they erected a double garage with cladding on all sides, windows, doors etc. which became their home for the next three years. While the building was being finished Ken Fisher kindly lent them his caravan so they could all live there without travelling from Hyden each day.

This was their introduction to the Pingaring community, which was very much appreciated by the family and will never be forgotten.

In 1969 they were allocated Roe Loc 961 under a farm build up scheme and progressively the two blocks have been made into the farm that it is today.

After the 1972-73 season, which was a good one for them, they purchased a three bedroom transportable house that they could pay for completely and lived in until the farm was sold 2003.

The early years of the development of the farm were very hard and Allan had to go shearing for about twelve years off the farm to bring in some cash to supplement the development of these blocks. Allan would race home in the evenings to be able to see his children before they went to bed, often leaving before they were up in the morning. He was a dedicated and loving father.

The last year before bulk handling, one thousand eight hundred bags of seed and fertilizer had to be lumped from the truck to the combine on Allan's back. It was tough physical work but Allan never shirked from hard work which all was to benefit his family.

One year the Inter A554 tractor clocked just short of 2000 hours because it ploughed, pinwheel raked, seeded, fallowed new land and pulled a PTO header at harvest as this was their only tractor. That tractor actually wore out three sets of barrels and pistons.

The phone line was extended to their farm from the Evans farm in 1970, the power came through in 1982, upgrading from the 32-volt lighting plant that started on petrol, ran on power kerosene, (with all the dead cell car batteries) gave way to the SEC, which was a real pleasure for Kay and the kids.

Some of the highlights for Allan were the twelve years he served as a councillor on the Lake Grace Shire from 1977-1989, five years were as Deputy President. He held the positions of President of the P&C and National Party (Allan Marshall will talk more about the National

Party), and was the Inaugural President of the Pingaring Shop Committee. Another most rewarding involvement for Allan was being a parent member on the Narrogin Hostels Management Board for approximately seven years.

Other things that come to mind are when Syd Garard's lake flooded (Kent road) in 1974 when Syd had to ferry Allan across the lake on his W7 carry all to shear their sheep with Mr Fred Quinn. Allan shore a lot of sheep with Fred Quinn and Les Fisher. I mentioned the nick name Hogget, well that came about while shearing 1200 extra large hoggets at Ross and Lorna Murray's. Shearing these hoggets lasted for 3 days and every morning Allan would look over the pen and say "bloody hoggets again, when are these going to run out Murray" and just talked about bloody hoggets so we decided to call him Hogget and it stuck. even on the cricket field. I think that's where it really took off as all 6 sides in the competition caught on. Allan played a fair bit of cricket for Pingaring and was always willing to go on the committee.

Allan and Kay continued to farm until the sale of the farm in 2003, together working side by side, they had cleared bush blocks into a successful and profitable farm. Allan and Kay then retired to Lake Grace, and they did some travelling and spent time with the family and grandchildren.

Allan's health declined in 2014 and he moved into the care of the Lake Grace Hospital. Kay and the family would like to extend their heartfelt thanks for the exceptional care and support they provided Allan and his family until his passing.

The family have passed on some memories that they still laugh about today:

- Allan leaving the farm heading to Gardiner River to shear - Leaving his family behind with no electricity, no phones and for them to have to go next door to Michael Lloyds to get him to come and crank the engine for the generator just to cook dinner. He didn't want to leave them but money and work was necessary for farming survival.
- Pingaring floods Allan and their Uncle Syd have to ferry the kids across the floods to the school bus with the front end loader.
- Allan scaling the house wall without a ladder to put a fire out in the ceiling of the house, his family still don't know how he got up there.
- On numerous occasions Allan would get home from cricket training late and be whinging why his food wasn't hot. This happened on several times until getting home to find Kay had put his salad in the oven and her saying to him "well you asked it to be hot."
- Painting the tank at the cricket shed Swan Districts colours BLACK and WHITE with Neil Argent and Kim Ward .

- *One time, Allan came home from a cricket meeting at Karlgarin with Ross Murray and Ken Fisher and as usual, they had drunk their fair share of king browns on the way. Allan came into the house and said to Kay " there were camels in the bush and a bloody elephant on the road" of course Kay said to him, "have a shower and go to bed, you've had too much to drink" only for them to find out the circus was in town and of all places, it had decided to stop in Pingaring on the way to Esperance.
- *The Pingaring cabaret days, would see Allan on the booze all night until the sun came up and all four of the kids had been locked in the back seat of a Ford Fairlane, too scared to show their faces as they were told over and over again it's not a place for children. Which was pretty norm for all of the children of the Pingaring crew.

His family heeded much of his advice given to them as young people and are now telling their children just the same, sometimes using "This is what Pop would have said" and they see many of the mannerisms and characteristics in their own children and grandchildren of Allan and they are extremely proud and thankful for such a lovely and caring father and Pop.

Talking to the girls last week, the love and respect (which I could see coming from the heart and sure Geoff felt the same) that they had for their father and mother was testament to their upbringing and the beautiful people that they are today.

In closing Allan you will remembered as a hard working, honest, sincere man who never shirked any issue just joined in helping by either becoming president or whatever needed to be done to support or fix the project.

REST IN PEACE OLD TIMER

EARLY DAYS

Allan was always a passionate supporter of the Country Party/National Party with his local branch at Pingaring. He was President of the Pingaring Branch for over ten years. He would always boast that he could get over 90% of the votes in that booth.

He became more involved during the mid 1990's when he started attending the Roe District Council meetings

This last fortnight was relatively quiet for the Lake Grace sub-district. I don't like using that word because Police are very superstitious when mentioning the "Q" word. However we have been busy assisting in the surrounding sub-districts of our cell.

A joint traffic operation was held last week in Corrigin between Police from Kondinin, Kulin, Corrigin and Lake Grace. We were joined by a drug detection dog and staff from Main Roads Heavy Vehicle Compliance (Scalies).

It started off well until we had a flurry of drivers turning up with outstanding arrest warrants. As a result we lost half our staff to prisoner escorts to the Perth Watch House. Those officers who remained continued to breath and drug test drivers, and ensured driver and vehicle licences were current.

Whilst the drug dog was in the northern sector, staff from all four Police stations executed a Misuse of Drugs Warrant seizing several items from a residence including a quantity of cannabis, measuring scales and deal bags.

Last Thursday Lake Grace Police attended a truck crash. A prime mover towing a float had tipped over on the Hyden–Lake King Road blocking both lanes. The truck's load included the Esperance aircraft refuelling vehicle, complete with eight tons of aviation fuel and numerous 44 gallon drums full of aviation fuel. The driver had drifted off the road onto the steep and wet verge, finding it very difficult to return back onto the road. When the driver did get the truck back onto the road he immediately over corrected, suddenly tipping the vehicle and load over on its side, crushing the truck cab and causing the load to break free, splitting the aviation fuel cell on the truck.

Miraculously the driver escaped death and was treated by local St John ambulance staff who conveyed him to hospital for further assessment.

Local Fire and Rescue set up a 400 metre exclusion zone due to fuel leaking heavily onto the road. The aviation fuel caused the road significant damage.

The crash site was then managed by Main Roads until the hazmat and clean up teams arrived the following morning. All emergency services in attendance did an amazing job keeping everybody safe and preventing any further danger to motorists in the area.

REMINDERS

Insecure Loads: I have recently noticed dogs travelling in utes or in trailers not being tied up to an anchor point to prevent them falling from the vehicle, accidently or otherwise. Any animal being conveyed in



the open load space of a vehicle is considered, under the Road Traffic Code, as a "load". All loads are required to be secured so that the load cannot fall from the open load space.

Road Traffic Code 2012 Section 257. Securing of loads

Sub Section (2) A person shall not drive a vehicle that is carrying a load, unless the load is restrained on the vehicle so that the load, or any portion of it, is unlikely —

- (a) to fall from the vehicle; or
- (b) to become dislodged from the place on the vehicle where it is restrained.

Penalty: \$150 and no points.

I am well aware that dogs, and in particular working dogs, are pretty stable on their paws even on a moving vehicle. However, on two recent occasions, I have seen incidents where this was not the case, with neither dog surviving the fall. Please tie them up for the trip.

Mobile Phone Use: I am seeing an increased use of mobile phones whilst driving, many times when I am walking around off duty. Main offenders are usually people driving through town, although I am starting to see locals use them too. The penalty is high and so are the points. Here are the rules:

Road Traffic Code 2012 Section 265. Use of mobile phones

Subsection (1) In this regulation — **body**, in relation to a mobile phone, means the part of the phone that contains the majority of the phone's mechanisms;

Held includes held by, or resting on, any part of the driver's body, but does not include held in a pocket of the driver's clothing or in a pouch worn by the driver;

Mobile phone does not include a CB radio or any other two-way radio;

Use, in relation to a mobile phone, includes any

of the following actions by the driver of a vehicle —

- (a) hold the phone;
- (b) enter or place anything into the phone, or send or look at anything that is in the phone;
- (c) turn the phone on or off;
- (d) operate any other function of the phone.

Subsection (2) A driver of a vehicle must not use a mobile phone while the vehicle is moving, or is stationary but not parked, unless —

- (a) the phone is being used to make or receive a phone call, other than a text message, video message, email or similar communication, and the body of the phone —
- (i) is secured in a mounting affixed to the vehicle while being so used; or
- (ii) is not secured in a mounting affixed to the vehicle and is not being held by the driver, and the use of the phone does not require the driver, at any time while using it, to press any thing on the body of the phone or otherwise to manipulate any part of the body of the phone; or
- (b) the visual display of the phone is being used as a driver's aid in accordance with regulation 264 and the use of the phone does not require the driver, at any time while using it, to press anything on the body of the phone or otherwise to manipulate any part of the body of the phone.

Subsection (3) For the purposes of this regulation, a driver does not use a

mobile phone if -

- (a) a text message, video message, email or similar communication is received automatically by the phone; and
- (b) on and after the receipt, the communication itself, rather than any indication that the communication has been received, does not become automatically visible on the screen of the phone.

Penalty: \$400 and 3 points, unless on a long weekend where it is \$400 and 6 points!

You can't accidently use a mobile phone, you have to make a conscious decision to use it. Everyone knows you shouldn't use it when driving, so don't.



Apologies when caught won't be accepted for this reason. If you really need to take a call, just find a safe place to park and answer the call - it will be heaps safer for everyone and heaps cheaper for you.

Parking On or Obstructing Footpaths: This is not a huge problem, however please try to avoid parking on or over footpaths and leaving your vehicle blocking access to pedestrians and/or reducing visibility for other drivers when trying to exit their driveways.



Road Traffic Code 2012 Section 165 Stopping on path, dividing strip, nature strip or painted island

The driver of a vehicle (other than a bicycle, an EPT or an animal) shall not stop so that any portion of the vehicle is on a path, dividing strip, painted island, or a nature strip adjacent to a length of carriageway in a built-up area, unless —

- (a) the driver stops in an area, to which a parking control sign applies and the driver is permitted to stop at that place under these regulations; or
- (b) the driver is permitted to do so under a local law.

Penalty: \$50 and no points

Tele-health Makes a Difference

Media Release

Childbirth and parenting classes delivered by telehealth are empowering country women, providing them with knowledge and the chance to discuss their parenting queries.

This week is Telehealth Awareness Week (25 – 31 October 2019), shining the spotlight on how digital technology is helping country people access specialist and multi-disciplinary care closer to home. The Wheatbelt Midwifery Group Practice has been using telehealth technology to deliver childbirth and parenting classes right across Western Australia.

Clinical Midwife, Holly Jones has been delivering the four-part series of classes to expectant parents with the next series commencing Friday 1 November.

"This service isn't just for parents in the Wheatbelt, telehealth allows us to provide education and support to mums everywhere, all they need is a phone, tablet or computer," Ms Jones said.

"I've had participants dial in from all over WA, particularly in remote locations like Derby, Halls Creek and Newman and in some instances, where internet connection is a challenge, they've dialled into the sessions from their nearest health service.

"The sessions are open to anyone who's expecting a

baby and interested in learning more - mums, dads, partners and any support people are welcome, we often have both parents sit in on a session.

"We cover all the topics you'd expect from classes at a large metro hospital but also have the flexibility to tailor it to those in attendance who often ask specific questions related to their unique situation," she said.

"I get lots of positive feedback from the pregnant women who often express how empowered they feel by attending the classes, having the opportunity to ask questions and being prepared with the information they need to make decisions," Ms Jones added.

WA Country Health Service Executive Director Robyn Sermon said telehealth benefits tens of thousands of patients across country WA every year and is making a real difference to regional people.

"Telehealth enables access to a wide range of health services that are readily available in the city, to people living in rural and remote WA," Ms Sermon said.

"WA Country Health Service is a global leader in the provision of digitally enabled health services and the use of telehealth continues to benefit regional residents by reducing the need for travel, saving valuable time away from family and giving access to some of the best specialists in the state."

In Western Australia, telehealth technology delivers a range of services including specialist emergency support to staff in country hospitals treating acute emergency patients, including those presenting with mental health concerns; inpatient consults through a virtual ward round; outpatient consults with specialists, as well as training and education for health staff and consumers



Summer Gardening Tips

Good preparation is critical for your garden to survive the wilting effects of the Aussie summer. Summer means different things to different gardeners. While many southern and central regions bake dry, for instance, the steamy Top End is rejuvenated by drenching storms. But for all of us, summer brings common challenges, such as dividing time and effort between keeping our gardens in good shape, and enjoying them during the summer holidays.

- Take care of budding plants Does your camellia drop its buds and flowers? As camellias initiate budding in summertime, sudden loss of buds and flowers is often a consequence of the plants drying out, particularly when they are growing in containers. Mulch and water deeply once or twice weekly during hot, dry weather to limit this common and irritating problem.
- 2. Help pots to stay cool Potted plants, especially those in terracotta pots, are vulnerable to overheating. Lightly mulch and, where possible, position them out of hot western sunshine. Remember that standing potted plants in saucers of water encourages root rot and mosquito breeding. Instead, stand them in saucers filled with sand, and keep the sand moist. This ensures roots stay cool and plants remain healthy. If potted plants dry out to the point where re-wetting is hard, soak them in a bucket of water for half an hour, then drain.
- 3. Water early to avert mildew Water in the cool of the day. The best time to water your garden is morning but, if you water in the afternoon, allow enough time for foliage to dry out before sunset. This reduces the risk of mildew and other fungi attacking leaves, and there's less chance you'll get caught by the evening shift of mosquitoes or sandflies. Mildew frequently attacks roses, pumpkin, melon, zucchini and cucumber. Spray plants weekly with a solution made from one part cow's milk to 10 parts water. Repeat after heavy rain or irrigation. This remedy won't reverse mildew damage, but it's an effective preventative.

- 4. Add nutrients to the water If you can only water occasionally, try to water plants deeply and use that opportunity to simultaneously feed and correct mineral deficiencies. Apply a soluble fertiliser with added seaweed. Water in potash around the base of fruit trees, especially citrus, banana and lychee, to improve fruit flavour and juiciness. The potassium in potash is also important for controlling anthracnose disease of avocado and mango, and it generally helps to improve plant vigour and resistance to foliar fungi.
- 5. Protect new plantings Freshly planted vegetable and flower seedlings are likely to need a bit of sun hardening. Shelter them with 50 per cent shade cloth, old net curtains, dead palm fronds, or leafy branches for a week or two. This helps them establish without harm

Our Wellbeing During Adolescent Transition

Transition periods are a normal part of life, they are ongoing through our many different ages and stages and are often associated with varying aspects of change or *moving out of our comfort zone*. Most young people, regardless of attending agricultural college or mainstream high school, growing up on a farm or in the city (both male & female) will have experienced some form of change in recent years. Whether developmentally (puberty), moving away from home, creating new friendships or the expectations placed on you around attitude, behaviour and study requirements, change is inevitable.

At this time of the year many young people (and their parents) are taking important steps to prepare for the final stages of their high school journey and transition into the beginning of their working lives. If you are one of these young people and reading this article it shows at least two things: 1. You have already survived and thrived through one very significant time of change and transition; 2. You are taking positive steps and preparing yourself for the next exciting transition of becoming a young adult and entering the world of employment or further study.

Periods of transition come with a new set of challenges that may put us under pressure. Moving out of our comfort zone means exposing ourselves to new and unfamiliar situations and can often lead to:

- uncertainty and discomfort;
- having to create new routines and habits (sleep can be affected);
- feelings of fear, worry or anxiety (this is normal, but if it's ongoing and intense seek help);
- Increase in stress levels (some stress helps us operate during difficult times, but we need to manage and keep an eye on our stress levels).

This all sounds a bit negative I know but the good news is that if we talk about these things, normalise our reactions and push through these times the boundaries of our comfort zone will grow and expand. We can gain satisfaction and meaning from getting through such times. There will always be some hold-ups, knockbacks, days when we question our decisions and things just won't go our way. Transition is a process, so you need to allow some time to settle in and adjust before you can survive and thrive.

Here are a few tips to help with the next stages of your life journey:

- Accept change as a part of life "stop wishing for what was and enjoy what is";
- Talk to your parents, peers and mentors about how you're feeling;
- · Make time for your passions and interests;

- Exercise and take time to relax. No one can work or study 24/7, time out is an important part of your wellbeing and stress management;
- Stay socially connected and take time to laugh with others (not just on social media, get out and create opportunities to form new friendships and surround yourself with real people);
- Avoid drugs and alcohol use. If you do choose to drink (when you're 18) moderation and knowing your limits are vital;
- Use help or support services, they are there for a reason.

All the best for your next stage of life and remember ... before it all gets too much... Talk to a Mate!!

Allan was then elected as a delegate to represent Roe District at State Council in the year 1999 and became involved in fundraising and membership activities with myself. We became notoriously known as the two Allans for our prolific activity in raising funds and signing up new members. I will always have fond memories of that time and I am sure that Kay thought that we were up to no good.

STATE EXECUTIVE

Allan continued his involvement at State Council level when he was elected to State Executive of the WA Nationals in about 2002, serving for over five years.

STATE DEPUTY PRESIDENT

Then in 2004 when Wendy Duncan was urged by Eric Charlton to nominate for the position of State President she would only do so if she had someone as her deputy who was well respected and had history within the party as Wendy needed someone she could work with to support her. Allan's name was put forward and she was delighted to accept the position with Allan as her deputy as she had known him from the Roe District Electorate days. The partnership proved to be very productive, transforming the party into the modern age with the

installation of many younger members into our parliamentary team.

Wendy said she found Allan dedicated, fiercely loyal and a deep thinker. Of note was that at the 2006 State Conference at Denmark Allan backed a motion from the Young Nationals that 'Civil Unions be legally recognised'. That motion was passed with Allan's persuasion of the more conservative older members.

Allan remained as Wendy's deputy for three years until 2007. During that time the Nationals 'Royalties for the Regions' policy was researched and adopted and following the 2008 State election was negotiated with the Liberal Party as a legislated return of 25 percent mining royalties to the regional areas of Western Australia. Allan took great pride in his involvement in that injection of funds into the much neglected infrastructure of regional WA.

Allan postponed a much anticipated trip around Australia with Kay in his new caravan to help with that 2008 election such was his dedication. Allan and Kay never took that trip as Allan's health deteriorated following that period.

DISTINGUISHED SERVICE MEDAL - Wendy Duncan

At the 2010 annual conference held at Albany Allan was awarded a 'Distinguished Service Medal' for his unselfish dedication to the party. They don't give them out lightly.

May I pass on a message from Brenden Grylls, former member for the Legislative Assembly for the Merredin Electorate and leader of the Parliamentary National Party of WA and is now living in Karratha.

"Allan Holmes, in Partnership with Allan Marshall introduced me as an aspiring politician to what it took to be a true Nat. Tough, uncompromising, determined and always with that glint in the eye that we are 'going to win this bloody issue....come hell or high water'. It was a privilege to have them as mentors!

Without knowing me, once the preselectors had made me the candidate they jumped into action, cold calling fundraising and support, devising strategy and sorting out the polling booths in the electorate of Merredin that we needed to cover. History records that another successful campaign was won.

The word legend is used loosely these days when you are a champion after one good game.

Well Allan Holmes in my opinion is a legend of the WA Nats, a true believer whom I held in the utmost highest regard, whose passion and commitment formed the basis of our teams' willingness to hold our nerve to create Royalties for the Regions and a man who is a great loss to politics and community in Western Australia.

Rest in peace Allan Holmes, I'll bet he is in Heavens' town hall now along with the late Sue Muntz, planning how to terrorise the other parties' polling booth workers at the local heaven elections!!"

Wheatbelt Integrity Group Field Day

The four speakers on a panel at Hollands Track Farm held the audience of 60 in wrapt attention as they described their experience of transitioning from chemical farming to regenerative agriculture. Regenerative agriculture is a relatively new term, coined to describe the process that links soil health with human health and seeks to bring nutrition back to plants so that it is available to the people and animals that eat them. It is set to be at least as revolutionary a development in agriculture as no-till has been.

It is a cheap and efficient method of restoring soil so that it retains moisture by sequestering carbon and forming soil aggregates. Keeping live roots in the soil for as much of the year as possible is the most efficient way to achieve healthy soil, allowing photosynthesis to do its work.



Held on the 16th October, there was a good turnout for the Wheatbelt Integrity Group's Field Day.

John Royce who farms 880 acres in the Chapman Valley is excited to see his bottom line improve after just a couple of years of pulling synthetic fertilizers and the 'cides' out of his system. Mike van de Griend, American vet who's now farming a small property at Bridgetown, is glad to leave industrial farming in lowa and California behind, and grow healthy pork and organic eggs, which his customers tell him have healing benefits. Ian and Di Haggerty, who farm 50 000 acres in the northern and eastern wheatbelt, are happy to graze their sheep on some crops and still harvest them at a profit.

Nick Kelly, who chaired the panel, showed the group the multi-species grain crop he was about to harvest and spoke about the demand for such produce, even among organic growers. We climbed a hill to see Tom Golding's grass fed cows waiting to be let through the gate into the holistically grazed paddock where they benefit from more multi-species crops, diversity providing soil, animal and human health in a system where disease and insect pests cease to be a concern.

Newdegate CWA catered for the occasion, and provided food which led to enthusiastic thanks being expressed by the guests. WIG acknowledges the support of Regen WA (an NRM initiative) to host the day and pay travelling and accommodation for the speakers, who donated their time.


