90 Years Young

Fair weather and good company fuelled a successful 90th anniversary celebration for the Lake Grace District High School with a turnout of at least 300 ex and current students, teachers and residents of Lake Grace.

Displays of handiwork by children that are currently enrolled at the school along with needlecraft from primary school children in 1946 proved a big hit. Photographs dating back to October 1914 when the original school was in place through to more recent times brought back memories of people and times that for some were long forgotten. Outlying schools such as Beenong, North Lake Grace, the Little Red School, Tarin Rock and Pingaring, that upon their closure had fed into the Lake Grace School, also had displays of photographs.

The Morrison, Lake Grace school's annual publication, had ex students in fits of laughter as they recited their literary compositions. Games from yesteryear kept the children amused while their parents and grandparents caught up with people, some that they had not seen for many years.

By 2pm, the formal celebrations got underway with the unveiling of the plaque by District Director Jan Workman and the planting of nine olive trees by one student from each class, kindergarten through to year 7. Every decade another tree will be planted. Jan Workman and Principal Grant Draper provided a brief outline of the schools beginnings and subsequent improvements. Dr Murray Lake, Chairperson of the Rural and Remote Education Advisory Council emphasised the benefits of being part of a District High School.

At this point the time capsule from the 80th celebrations were opened, all children enrolled in Lake Grace in 2004 will have an item of their work deposited in the capsule for the reopening at the

centenary in 2014.

Held in conjunction with the schools 90th anniversary was Lake Grace's CWA branch celebrating 60 years of activity in Lake Grace. State President, Margaret Sullivan, presented the local branch with a plaque commemorating their achievement. Mrs Shirley Duckworth, who has been a member for 58 years, accepted the plaque on behalf of the Lake Grace CWA.

Mrs Sullivan also presented recipe books to the high school students who entered the cake decorating competition.

The bike decorating competition prizes went to Ryan Carruthers for the 'flashest primary bike'; Harley Pittard for the 'most feral primary bike'; 'flashest secondary bike' went to both Trent and Rebecca Roper. (more pics page 29)

Awards Night Highlights Excellence

One hundred and fifty people attended the 18th annual Narrogin Education District Awards Night held at the Senior Citizens Centre Narrogin on Friday evening, 29th October 2004. MC Jackie Bowles, Principal of East Narrogin Primary School welcomed students, community members and staff from schools representing the Upper and Central Great Southern Regions of the state.

The Awards night ended a very successful **Education Week 2004.** The evening was a most appropriate way to acknowledge the Education Week theme of "Celebrating Excellence". Workman, District Director, Narrogin Education District, said, "Awards Night highlighted three important aspects that contribute to the excellence of education in this district. They are the quality of our students, the strong community support we receive and the dedication of our staff." The evening also provided an opportunity to celebrate excellence in the standard of musical talent of students attending schools in the Narrogin The trio "Sollae" and soloist, Andrew Ballantyne, performed some vocal items, and pianist Diana Myres performed two items.

The evening began with the presentation of the Vi Barham Award for Excellence; a scholarship to the value of \$1,500 presented to a Year 7 student, qualities of demonstrating the academic excellence, community involvement and sporting achievement. Twenty-three schools nominated fifty-two Year 7 students, who subsequently underwent a rigorous testing program. A panel nominated by the Vi Barham Committee then interviewed the top ten achievers. The winner was the young person with the highest aggregate score over both the test and interview.

Mr Joseph Leong, Chairperson of the Vi Barham Trust, and Mrs Janette Liddelow, Vi Barham Board member, read citations and presented certificates and book awards to the ten finalists.



On the Sheep's Back - A Community Update

Mary had a little lamb, little lamb, little lamb, It followed her to school one day, school one day!

Well maybe she's not a lamb but "Clementine" (the cement sheep's nickname) went to the school reunion to catch up on the gossip last weekend. She enjoyed getting out and about amongst the people, and greeting former school students and staff. She relished a wild ride on the forklift to get there, no sheep trucks for this ewe! "Clementine " enjoyed a great pen to stand in and admire the enticing green oval, if only she could open it! Thanks to Murray Stanton, Clem Bennett, Greg Argent and Darren Spencer for their help in getting her there.

The project is progressing well and Rhys has now created five sheep sculptures and is working on the sixth, which is almost ready for the latex application and the fibreglass mother mould. During December Rhys is hoping to come to Lake Grace to ready the Multi-purpose Artspace (read: 4 Square) for production and conduct a number of workshops. Stay tuned for further announcements, through the school newsletter and Lakes Link.

At this stage it looks like we will be casting the 70 sheep early next year. Rhys will need volunteers to help with this part of the project. There is no art experience needed, just strong arms and an interest in the project, as she will teach you everything you need to know. The skills to be learned are practical and Rhys will endeavour to impart a variety of techniques and knowledge from her considerable talent base. This will be a very exciting process to see concrete used as an artwork and not a silo or

shed pad. Everybody is most welcome to help, or just stick your nose in the door and see what's going on. Rhys will be here for approximately 3 months and during this time will complete the seventh sheep from start to finish. This involves sculpting the original in foam with a hotwire and knife, 20 layers of latex applied to it forming the inner mould, and then a 16 part fibreglass outer mould is made. You will be able to pop into the building and see Rhys at work.

Thank you to every one who has sent in their donations and orders for sheep, we have been bowled over by the response, it is wonderful to hear from so many positive people. Do you want your business, farm, or your own name, on a sheep? The ear tag will have your name imprinted and there will be signage, acknowledging contributors. We also hope to produce a map for visitors identifying each sheep and the donor. If you didn't get a form in the mail or want another- perhaps for a former resident or someone not on the Lake Grace mail runs, please ring Tania Spencer 9865 1339 or Michelle Slarke 9865 1878 and we will send you one. We will be taking orders until just after Christmas – do they call that "after harvest terms"? Forms will also be available at Sand 'n' Salt, the Post Office and on the notice board at the Plaza.

Early Days at Lake Grace by H Bishop

We continue on with the sixth instalment.....

Cricket clubs were formed in every direction - Beenong, Lake Biddy, South and North Lake Grace, and Lake Grace itself. The pitches were mainly a reasonably firm level stretch of ground with matting, and the outfields were by no means fast or true. There were no Trevor Baileys or Bobby Simpsons among the cricketers and it was not unusual for four innings to be played between 2 and 6pm on a Sunday afternoon. The South Lake Grace a home ground was in a Griffiths and Green paddock and a nephew, Harold Brooks, was easily the best fast bowler in the district. Cyril Huggins showed how he had spent his leisure before taking up farming, and was revealed as quite an elegant batsman.

During the five years or so following the end of World War I the seasons were reasonably good and farming settled down on a even keel in a way that had not been previously possible. Sheep and motorcars appeared in considerable numbers. Among the latter names that have not been heard for 30 years at least, to quote two, John Franks' "Crossley" and Bill Betham's "Hupmobile", but for a few years the T-Ford predominated, with some Chevrolet 4's and Rugbys. It is quite true that most owners talked to their cars and a loud "Whoa" usually accompanied pressure on the One driver drove for a considerable distance one night, peering with difficulty through the windscreen, until at the suggestion of his passenger he switched on the lights.

One prominent farmer was said to have turned n to his gateway, yelled a loud 'Whoa!", pulled the steering wheel completely adrift, and stopped halfway through his Cyclone gate. I never did quite accept this, but the gate certainly was bent.

Compared with present day cars, the cars of those days were hardly believable, but this did not lessen the pride of ownership one bit. Several popular makes were fitted with 30" x 3½" bead-edged tyres (like a bicycle tyre) the recommended pressures being 50lbs front and 55 rear. You will, I hope, be able to guess how these pressures were obtained. Tyres were of very poor quality and had anyone travelled 200 miles without at least one puncture he would have boasted about it to and sundry and would have been believed by none. Roads were, in the winter, very bad indeed and one of the worst features of them was that after a motorist had been stuck in a mud patch he always left he

branches and loges he had used to extricate his own car to make an even worse hazard for those who followed. Petrol was obtained from the general store in cases containing two 4-gallon tins, and the purchaser who received two full tins was very lucky.

One man who brought a second hand car was very disgusted when he removed the rear hub caps from it and declared that the previous owner should be ashamed of himself. He was willing to swear that the rear wheels had not been greased since the car was made. Remember this had been cart and wagon country for a long time.

During 1920 the first church – Methodist – was built; an unlined weatherboard structure, at a cost of £300. One of the early ministers was 'Billy' Hughes, who was very young and very earnest. In the course of his first wedding he became a little tongue-tied and referred to 'the holy mistake of matrimony' instead of the more usual term. The organ in the church was purchased for £13 and Mrs Lange was the first organist.

The Lake Grace Co-op was formed about this time and functioned for a few years in a very small building which also contained living quarters for the manager. Charlie Lucas was the first Secretary-Manager, followed by Bill Faram, who remained for many years and by the time he left the Co-op had become the largest general store and agency business in the town, which it continues to be until this day (remember this was written in the early 1970's). The Co-op had a very hard struggle during the depression years and it was only after a very rigid restricted credit system was enforced in the early 1930's that real headway was made.

The first Agricultural Show was held on October 1st, 1920, in Mr Carruthers' paddock, an important feature being the first horse race. This Lake Grace Cup was won by Mr Carruthers' "Bullaroo", ridden by Dick Carruthers.

The Road Board was formed in 1923 and the first Chairman was Mr Robert Carruthers. Previously the area had been administered by the Dumbleyung Road Board, but perhaps it would be more accurate to say that rates had been paid to it, as very little had been done to improve roads. The formation of the Board immediately sparked off a minor controversy, as a proposal to build a hall

met with opposition from some ratepayers who considered that all available funds should be spent on roads. However, the difficulty was resolved by a referendum, the majority voting in favour of the hall, and this was built and opened in 1924. From that time on dances were held regularly, the music usually provided by Alice Lucas and Bert Harvey. Alice was a very accomplished pianist, playing both classical and popular music with equal facility, and Bert Harvey, while not knowing a note of music, had natural ability and played most excellent dance time. Bert was the eldest son of Mr and Mrs George Harvey who had in the meantime opened a butcher's shop and boarding house respectively. Mrs Harvey was the first to provide casual meals in the town.

A petrol lighting system was installed in the hall, this consisting on mantle lights supplied from a central pressure tank. This was never very satisfactory and often during a function the experts of whom there were always far too many – would be called in, and in the meantime a couple of hurricane lanterns or a few candles would suffice. On one occasions when a number of VIP's, including the Governor of WA, Sir William Campion, were present, the tank was filled with kerosene by mistake, and light was supplied by several spot lights from motor cars, trained through windows. Even in these more civilised days there was rarely a dull moment, and this was the first time electricity was used in a public building.

A larger hall of brick, with Road Board office, was completed and occupied in 1930.

In 1923, on May 31st, the whole district was stunned by the accidental death of Mrs Robert Carruthers. This was the first death within the district of a resident, and everyone suffered a personal grief as a result of this tragedy. Mrs Carruthers had always been held in the highest regard, a practical and cheerful personality, who could ill be spared by her family or the district.

While the great Depression in a world-wide sense commenced in 1927, the full impact was not felt by farmers in Lake Grace until a couple of years later, when the price of wheat fell from 6/6½ per bushel to 1/8 per bushel in the course of only a few days. It was, and had been for some years, the practice of many farmers to take an advance from wheat buyers on their crops as soon as an estimate of the quantity that would be available could be made. The crop would be sold later in the season when the price was considered satisfactory and in

the meantime the wheat would be delivered to the railway siding. In normal years this was a gamble, but only a modest one, as during the selling season the price rarely varied more than a few pence either way. Those who held their wheat and secured a higher price boasted of it and those who eventually accepted a lower return maintained a discreet silence.

In 1929 many farmers took an advance of about 4/6 per bushel early in the season, this being about 75% of the current price a the time, but when the price dropped so sensationally the nett result was catastrophic, as demands came from the wheat merchants for a return of the advances of approximately 5/- per bushel to bring the amount of the advance below the current value. If the farmer decided to sell his wheat at that stage to avoid a further drop he still owed the merchant the same amount and was no better off.

This state of affairs was of course common to all wheat growing districts all over Australia, to a greater or lesser degree.

A more militant organisation of farmer than had ever existed up to this period was formed in WA at this time and one of the leaders of this movement was E. (Ned) Dolan of Beenong. This was the "Wheatgrowers' Union", called facetiously the "Wheat Owers's Union" by some, and during the following years many protest meetings were held and drastic decisions of all kinds were made, such as the boycott of forced sales and refusal to deliver wheat at all. The last was rather pointless as nobody wanted the wheat, there being a world and Australian surplus, but it is rather amusing that at one stage my brother-in-law was appointed by the Union to picket Mablac Siding, to which point I delivered wheat. However, the picketing idea fell through and fratricide did not ensue.

In many ways farmers were better off during the depression years than other sections of the community. At least they had their homes, evictions were few if any, and while allowances from financial institutions, who held the mortgages and bills of sale, were not the least bit lavish, farmers did not starve or lack shelter as so many others did in those grim days. Wool has not been mentioned in connection with the depression, it remained reasonably stable at about 10 pence per pound for the whole clip, but wheat had been the product on which farmers had principally relied as a source of income.

On The Bench!

Following an approach by local constabulary, Amanda Milton and Geoff Sabourne took on the onerous course to become Justices of the Peace.

Both heavily involved within the local community on a personal and professional basis, Geoff and Amanda feel that this is something else that they

can do for their community.

Eighteen months after their initial application, with six months of study under their belts Amanda and Geoff are now ready for bench duty. For 22 weeks they both completed 12 hours of study per week, getting together once a week to compare notes and help each other along. Both Geoff and Amanda felt that without the support of each other they would have found the course very difficult to complete.

Prior to Amanda and Geoff being gazetted, the Lake Grace policing district of nine thousand square kilometres had only three active JP's within a 25km radius of Lake Grace who were eligible to sit on the bench. JP's who are over 70, or have an honorary title, are not able to perform bench duty.

Both Tony Ward and Dave Sinclair welcome the addition of Amanda and Geoff to the ranks. Senior

Constable Sinclair said "It spreads the workload and gives us more chance of having two JP's available on court day".

Where becoming a Justice of the Peace was once a matter of being nominated, it is now a 22 week course via Murdoch University.

Both Geoff and Amanda are also able to sit on the bench of children's court, something we hope not to see too much of.

MEETING PLACE

Part conference, part festival, all art, *Meeting Place* – the Regional Arts Australia national conference has become the largest arts conference in Australia. Lake Grace Artists' Group delegates Kerrie Argent, Annie Slarke and Tania Spencer were among 600 people from all around Australia and New Zealand who came to Horsham, Victoria to attend Meeting Place. The Artists' Group received funding from Country Arts WA towards the delegates' airfares and conference fees.

Horsham lies 330 kilometres northwest of Melbourne in the beautiful scenic Wimmera district. The conference was held at the Horsham Showgrounds on the banks of the Wimmera River, land traditionally owned by the Wotjobaluk and Wergaia people.

Michelle Slarke, one of eight Meeting Place artists selected Australia wide, was contracted to show her artwork 'Skirting'. Skirting is a wool bale installation – a wordscape – that reconciles a country childhood with an urban adulthood. The artwork was previously exhibited at the Art Gallery of Western Australia for the 2002 Country Arts WA Boundless exhibition.

Michelle and Annie Slarke travelled to Victoria a week before the conference to press the bales provided from a local wool buyer and install the work. The wool bales were. Michelle and Annie stencilled the bales, and the floor and walls of the gallery with Michelle's personal narrative exploring the urban/rural divide and the connections between spatial inheritance and place. The text flowed across the gallery floor, over wool bales and up the walls of the gallery. The nine bales included one transparent polyurethane wool pack and a 'skinned' free-standing bale that retained its compressed shape.

One of the aims of Meeting Place was to make use of the town's venues and so *Skirting* was shown in a typical agricultural

show hall. The support of the organisers and TAFE students to set up was wonderful and, when the conference was over, local townspeople helped demount the work and wash the paint off the walls and floor.

The conference opened to the sounds of didjeridu music played by an indigenous musician in a cherry picker, 20 metres above ground. Following a performance by the Wallup Mara dancers, everyone gathered around a stone fire pit created by Geelong artist Glenn Romanis from 4 types of stone. Michelle Slarke, representing West, with three other artists/arts workers from the north, south and east of the country walked through the crowd with a blazing firestick to light the fire. The fire would burn for the time of the conference and the site became a gathering place for all. The torchbearers and dancers then led the crowd down river past a huge cane and bamboo eel trap to the next presentation, Fire Dog - Smoke Lizard, a spectacular fireworks and light and sound installation by Catherine Larkins.

The evening ended with a performance from the Happy Sideshow - sword swallowing, contortion and stockwhips acts. This excruciating, funny, look-away entertainment, where dingo traps, angle grinders as well as the performers' body piercings were used as props, redefined the traditional circus sideshow.

And so began Meeting Place. The three-day conference gave delegates an extensive choice of forums, exhibitions, gallery visits, workshops and debates. The Lake Grace delegates attended as many and varied sessions as possible.

With two other artists/speakers, Michelle gave a 'Showdown' presentation on 'Cultural Identity and Place' in the venue featuring her artwork.

SCIENCE AND 等字的字字

CRASH PROBE: NASA by now should know up from down, but apparently not by the placement of switches for the parachute to open on the Genesis space capsule when re-entering Earth's atmosphere.



Four small cylindrical switches were designed to sense re-entry and trigger the parachute, but as they were drawn upside down in the technical drawings, they were installed upside down.

Similar devices were installed on another Sun sample-collecting mission called Stardust and they believe the switches are the right way up. (New Scientist October 23rd).



Why is PHYSICS so difficult?: IF YOU struggled with physics as a teenager, it might be because your brain was clinging to misconceptions about science. Kevin Dunbar, a cognitive scientist at Dartmouth University

in Hanover, New Hampshire, and his colleagues scanned the brains of students while they watched a video demonstrating either classical Newtonian physics, in which a large and a small ball fall to the ground at the same speed, or the naïve scenario, in which the larger ball drops faster. Those who had never studied physics showed activity in a part of the brain associated with error processing when they watched the Newtonian model, implying they thought there was something wrong with what they were watching. But the naïve model sparked activity in the medial prefrontal cortex, normally active when someone thinks about a theory accepted as correct. Students of physics showed the opposite patterns, though even they had some prefrontal activity when watching the naïve model, indicating they were still attached to this false but intuitive notion. This could have some interesting implications, such as should physics be taught earlier, or should educators figure out ways to inhibit or unlearn the old theories. (Mind, Brain and Education Conference at Harvard University).

Drift Net Danger: FISHING boats using illegal drift nets are threatening the survival of dolphins, sharks and loggerhead turtles in the

Mediterranean Sea. Most of the boats sail from Morocco and fish, mainly for swordfish, around the Alboran Sea and Strait of Gibraltar. But each year their nets also catch

between 15,000 and 19,000 dolphins, and between 82,000 and 107,000 sharks, according to the first field survey of the fishery. Part of the fleet also snared 46 loggerhead turtles in nine months. Thresher, blue and short-fin make were the shark species with short-beaked dolphin. (Biological Conservation, vol 121, p 65).

HUBBLE DISPOSAL: NASA's decision this August to send up a robotic vehicle to steer the Hubble Space Telescope back to Earth is looking like a bright idea. The space agency's calculations now show that uncontrolled re-entry would carry a 1 in 250 risk of death or serious injury to people on the ground, far greater than the 1 in 10,000 risk that NASA deems acceptable. Without repairs, Hubble's batteries and gyroscopes are expected to fail by 2007. NASA's computer model predicts that about one-fifth of the 10.7 tonne Hubble will reach the ground, strewing debris along a 1,220km path. Most pieces would be heavy enough to cause casualties if they hit anyone. (The Orbital Debris Quarterly News, vol 8, p3).



Tibetan Lake was no Legend: The biggest flood in recent times occurred in Tibet around AD 760, suggests a new study of the Tsango river gorge. The finding validates a

local legend that a vanished lake gave peasants their farmland. The Tsanopo river flows east along the southern edge of the Tibetan plateau before slicing south through a gorge in the Himalayas. dropping nearly 2400 metres over the course of 200 kilometres. Geologists found a series of natural terraces on the gorge's walls - telltale signs of lakes that filled the region at a time when the Tsangpo was dammed by glaciers. Carbon dating of organic material on the terraces showed that an ice-dam broke some 1300 years ago, causing a lake about 240 metres deep to disgorge nearly 80 cubic kilometres of water down the steep slopes at an astounding rate of up to a million cubic metres per second. The team also found evidence of a 10,000-year-old lake 680 metres deep and 830 cubic kilometres in volume. Floods from this lake would have been even more catastrophic. "Geologically, all hell broke loose," said the geologist. (Quaternary Research vol, 62, p 201).

This week make the fruit mince pies and freeze ready for when needed.




Don't forget some of the recipes already published this year. Both the Lemon Cake and Hazelnut Chocolate Slice freeze well.

FRUIT MINCE PIES

Pastry:

2 tablespoons sugar
1½ cups self raising flour
1 egg
125 g butter
Pinch salt
A few drops of water or milk





Fruit Mince:

1kg packet mixed fruit
1 x 125g packet blanched almonds
2 cups brown sugar
juice and rind of 1 lemon
juice and rind of 1 orange
2 teaspoons mixed spice
½ teaspoon grated nutmeg
125g butter, melted
1 cup brandy

Place almonds in a food processor and process until finely chopped. Remove and place in a bowl. Place fruit in food processor and process until roughly chopped. Add to almonds

Stir in brown sugar, lemon and orange rind and juice, spices, butter and brandy. Mix well and place in a large sterilised jar. Cover and chill. Stir every day for a week. This will keep for months in an airtight container in the refrigerator.

To make pies: cut out pastry with fluted cutter and place in small pie trays. Fill with mixture then decorate top with extra pastry. Brush with milk and bake at 180°C for 15 minutes or until light brown. Sprinkle with icing sugar to serve.

THESE FREEZE WELL

TASH'S TEXAN DIP

This dip needs to be made just ahead of serving but I have included it in this edition because if you are like us then the social calendar is already getting busy. I recommend you try this one as it is soooooo...... easy yet yummy.

jalapeño dip or re-fried beans (1 tin)

salsa (1 jar)

3 avocado

1 lemon

1 tub of sour cream

1/2 packet of taco seasoning

Topping: grated cheese, spring onions (sliced) and tomatoes (finely diced)

Layer bean dip. Layer salsa. Layer avocado (which has been mashed with a squirt of lemon). Layer sour cream (which has been mixed thoroughly with the taco seasoning). Sprinkle with cheese, onion and tomato.

Serve with corn chips.

APRICOT BALLS

This is a great Christmas recipe and keeps well in the refrigerator.

250g dried apricots, finely chopped

1 cup sweetened flaked coconuts

1/4 cup sweetened condensed milk

additional coconut for rolling

Process chopped apricots and coconut in a food processor until thoroughly combined. Add sweetened condensed milk; process until combined. Pour mixture into a dish; refrigerate until firm, about 30 to 45 minutes. Place waxed paper on a baking sheet; set aside. Place additional coconut or finely chopped pecans in a shallow bowl. Shape apricot mixture into balls about 2.5cm in diameter. Roll in coconut; place on waxed paper. Refrigerate until firm. Store in an airtight container in the refrigerator. Makes about 24 balls.

GRANDMA'S WHITE CHRISTMAS

This is Joyce Lannin's White Christmas Recipe.
3 cups rice bubbles
1 cup mixed fruit (Grandma always included cherries)
1 cup desiccated coconut
1 cup dry powdered milk
3/4 cup of sifted icing sugar
225 grams copha
drop of vanilla essence

Put 3 cups of rice bubbles, 1 cup of mixed fruit, essence, desiccated coconut, dry powdered milk and 3/4 sifted icing sugar in a bowl. Melt 225 grams copha in saucepan. Add copha to dry ingredients in bowl and mix well. Press mixture firmly into a biscuit tray. Set in a refrigerator. Cut into squares.

Locust Situation - Lake Grace Shire

South-eastern areas of the shire have experienced some locust activity. Mt Madden and areas adjoining the southern portions of Dunn Rock Nature Reserve have recorded four hatchings.

The hatchings have been small in terms of insect numbers and area i.e. <5/m² and < 1 hectare. Many areas surveyed to date have shown no activity at all while others have had insects that over wintered and although in quite reasonable condition, they are at best infrequent in number and pose no threat.

Conditions have not been conducive to locust development or survival. Of particular interest is the lack of consistency in growth stages, which would indicate a high mortality rate.

In terms of state activity, the department program is reduced in estimation to 25-30 thousand hectares from approximately 70 thousand hectares. Spraying has commenced at Salmon Gums and Mukinbudin.

Surveying will continue in the areas around Mt Madden, Dunn Rock and Lake King for probably another week or two, as we need to be mindful of

the potential for late hatchings. So if you see a lone figure wandering around your pasture paddocks, brushing flies away with a few mallee leaves, it's probably me.

If landholders come across insects in numbers you feel may be excessive, please call the Lake Grace office and I'll happy to take a look with you.

Griffin's Find

The Helicopter seen on Sunday at the Lake Grace airport was conducting geophysical surveys for Hampton Hill Mining over the old Griffin's Find gold mine area. The "Hills Hoist" trailing below was measuring changes in an electrical conductivity of rocks beneath the surface. Gold bearing samples taken from the Griffin's mine were shown in laboratory testing to be more electrically conductive than the surrounding rocks and so it was hoped that the survey would locate areas where gold mineralisation does not reach the surface.

The other instruments towed by the helicopter were measuring the magnetic and radiometric properties of the rocks to assist in picking drill targets. Hampton Hill plans to drill test any targets generated by these surveys in January next




YOUTH ADVISORY COUNCIL





Skeleton Weed Season - Again!



Yes, it's here again; already I hear some of you groan. I do concede there is some work to be done for a few e.g. those with new infestations from last season, but the good news is, many of you have already done the hard yards and will now be seeing some reward for your efforts.

For those of you without skeleton weed, rest assured those with it have been working very hard. That doesn't mean you can sit back and relax, the weed has a habit of appearing when you least expect it.

Once again this season, those with skeleton weed will be spending time in paddocks looking for the plant. Across the state it actually represents hundreds of thousands of hectares, we know this because as part of the program developed by the State Skeleton Weed Committee and the Department of Agriculture, we keep track of what's happening. The department also conducts surveillance and auditing which also runs into the hundreds of thousands of hectares.

In fact, last season in excess of **500 thousand hectares** was covered just looking for skeleton weed. There's a lot happening from November/December to April/May in terms of skeleton weed!

So keep an eye out once again this season, and please don't be afraid to report plants you find. We're here to

help you, not bite you and it could save you and your neighbours some anguish later down the track.

Trade Directories Warning

Consumer Protection was contacted recently by a Local Member of Parliament's office after they had received queries about advertising notices that began arriving on fax machines in and around the Mukinbudin district. It seems that a number of community groups, farmers and businesses had all received the same sort of approach.

Faxed advertising notices like this have come in waves over the years and the WA Department of Consumer and Employment Protection has issued repeated cautionary warnings. At a national level, Section 64 of The Federal Trade Practices Act specifically prohibits corporations from "asserting a right to payment" for the "making of an entry into a directory" when no such service was authorised.

Some commonly used tactics that small business operators need to keep an eye out for are:

INTERSTATE ORIGIN: these approaches almost always come from outside WA, as this will hinder any action launched by state government agencies due to jurisdictional limitations.

LOOKS OFFICIAL: the document itself will carry a degree of seeming authority and look official. They are often formatted to look like a standard invoice or statement

IT'S GOT MY NAME: credibility is added when some details of the target business are included. (Even though this information can easily be copied from a phone book.)

RUSH! RUSH!: a short response time is calculated to place the recipient under pressure to make a rushed decision.

WARNING! WARNING!! Any unsolicited approach of this nature, particularly from an unknown source originating from outside of WA, should always be treated with suspicion.



Safety Advisory Service

Farmers at Brookton and Boyup Brook and Williams have opened their gates to others in their district while they participate in a safety audit, as part of a new fully subsidised advisory service.

Co-ordinated through the Farmsafe WA Alliance, the new service offers farmers a non-threatening forum to discuss their legal requirements for occupational health and safety with an independent qualified safety consultant.

Each of the days will generally run from 8.30am to 12noon (or as arranged with individual groups.) The fully accredited advisor will conduct risk assessments and prepare safety and health action plans on the host farms.

Nearby farmers will be able to participate in the assessment and they will be provided with the knowledge to then go back and complete a safety audit on their property.

The strategy, which is funded through Worksafe, aims to increase the number of Western Australian agriculture enterprises with safety and health

action plans in place.

It will run for the 2004-2005 financial year and targets the following groups in the agriculture industry:

Grain growing;

Grain-sheep and grain-beef cattle farming; Sheep-beef cattle farming (beef sector); Beef cattle farming; and Dairy cattle farming.

The Alliance will administer and deliver the strategy in collaboration with WA Farmers and agriculture industry associations.

What's The Problem?

Most parents share a concern about road safety and their children. Rural parents, including farm parents, have special cause for concern. Compared with urban areas:

- almost three times as many young children are killed as passengers in vehicles in rural areas of Australia
- twice as many young children in rural areas are killed as pedestrians in low speed impacts with vehicles.

Yet only **one third of** children live in regional and remote areas - outside of major cities.

Farms are a special, smaller subset of rural Australia and have their own special risks.

Children on farms:

- are often driven round farms where roads/ tracks may be of poor quality
- regularly use motorbikes for transport or leisure
- are often near tractors, trucks and other mobile farm machinery.

Farm Kids are at a greater risk!

On average **one child is killed every month** on Australian farms in incidents involving trucks, utilities, cars, trailers, motorbikes, tractors and other mobile farm machinery.

Toddlers are most at risk around vehicles and farm machinery. Motorbikes (four and two

wheel) are a key risk for older children.

Vehicles and motorbike injuries are also common. They account for around **one third of child hospital admissions** due to an onfarm incident.

The full Moon is at 3.57 am on Saturday 27th. On Tuesday 30th, the Moon at 7 pm will be at Apogee (furthest) at 405,953 kms. The Moon is in Aquarius on 20th, Pisces on 21st, 22nd, and 23rd. Aries on 24th and 25th. Taurus on 26th, 27th and 28th. Gemini on 28th, 29th and 30th. Cancer on December 1st and 2nd. Leo on the 3rd.

Mercury in the evening sky sets on Saturday at 8.38 pm in Ophiuchus, then on Saturday 27th it will have moved into Sagittarius then back into Ophiuchus on December 1st and sets at 8.06 pm on the 3rd.

Venus, on Saturday morning rises at 3.27 am in Virgo at -4.2. On Saturday 27th Venus will have moved into Libra, and rises at 3.23 am on December 3rd.

Mars, in Virgo on Saturday morning rises at 3.49 am at +1.6 magnitude, and will be in Libra on Tuesday 23rd. Mars rises at 3.24 am on December 3rd.

Jupiter, in Virgo, rises at 2.42 am on Saturday and at 1.57 am on December 3rd at -1.5 magnitude.

Saturn, now in the late evening sky rises at 10.55 pm in Gemini at +0.2 magnitude, and will be 5° south of the Moon on the 1st of December. On December 3rd will rise at 10.02 pm.

Uranus, in Aquarius, sets on Saturday at 1.02 am and on December 3rd sets at 12.03 am at +5.7.

Neptune, in Capricorn, sets at 11.59 pm on Saturday and at 11.04 pm on the 3rd at +7.8 magnitude.

Pluto, in Serpens, sets at 8.12 pm on Saturday and during sunset on the 3rd.

Meteors can be seen around the saucepan on the 27th and on the 1st December.

Comet, c/Linear at +5.2 magnitude in Hydra and Centaurus and be seen with binoculars. On Saturday night the Southern Cross (Crux), at 8.30 pm will be at furthest position south and at 8 pm on the 27th. The Andromeda galaxy M31 will be direct north at 8.15 pm on the 29th and can be seen as a smudge in the sky and easily with binoculars as can M33 in Triangulum just to the east but is very hard to pick out with a telescope as it is face on. High in the south sky is the bright blue star Achenar which is the brightest star in the Constellation of Eridanus the river, which meanders through the sky to the saucepan (Orion).

Credit Rating

Ever wondered if you have a credit report? wondered what is on your credit report? People who have applied for, or who have used credit in the past 7 years will have a credit report.

Your credit report is a record containing some information about your dealings with credit providers. The report is held by a credit reporting agency.

Credit reports were established as a way of warning credit providers about borrowers who had not paid their debts in the past.

At the moment there is only "negative credit reporting". That is, listings about:

- Any credit applications you have made (each application for credit is recorded on your file, whether or not the application is granted)
- If you have been bankrupt
- Court processes such as summonses, judgments.
- Identifying details such as your name, address, sex, date of birth, place of occupation etc are also listed.
- Any payment defaults where the account is more than 60 days overdue and you have been notified of the default.

Even when the overdue account has been paid in full it will remain a record once it has been listed. It does not list payments where a debt has been paid with no problems.

The most common types of credit providers who use a

persons credit report are banks, building societies and credit unions.

However businesses that issue store credit cards and those who provide a service and allow payments to be deferred such as telephone, gas, electricity businesses can also list outstanding debts.

The Privacy Act restricts the release of information and businesses can access the information on your report only with your authorisation. This is normally in a standard format included in a credit application. Credit applications, default listings, overdue accounts (those that are more than 60 days overdue) and court judgments stay on your file for 5 years. Bankruptcies are on your file for 7 years.

Many people have no idea what information their credit report contains. You can check your credit report for free by writing to: Baycorp Advantage Public Enquiries, P O Box 964, North Sydney, NSW 2059. Baycorp's website www.mycreditfile.com.au states what is required for an application and also provides answers to "frequently asked questions."


