Finally Getting Rewarded

At a recent Elders Corrigin/Wickepin sheep sale on Tuesday 9th October sheep producers were rewarded with record high prices. At Wickepin, nearly 8,000 ewes were yarded and sold with an average of \$170, with just over 5,000 coming from Elders Lake Grace area. It was pleasing to see that 80% of the sheep are remaining in WA, 3,000 of these coming back to clients in the Lake Grace area. It has been a very trying year with the amount of feed that was fed out early in the season, but with buoyant wool prices and meat prices, growers are finally getting repaid for their efforts in the sheep industry.

The top price for the day was local producers, AT & D Morgan at 252, 1.5 yo September shorn East Mundalla blood ewes at \$220 per head. It was a very good yarding of well-bred ewes, given the season we have recently been through. Bigger lines of ewes sold well and return buyers were back sourcing the same bloodlines.

Special thanks to the vendors for the presentation of the sheep and the opportunity to sell them and to staff and trucking companies for their efforts.

It's been 12 years since we had a sale in Lake Grace but if sheep numbers are similar, we will look to hold a sheep sale here next year.



Future of the Lakes Link News

Since May 1995 the Lakes Link News has been Lake Grace's community newspaper; in the last 23 years methods of communication have changed dramatically. Print media had been King for one hundred plus years; now it is feeling the effects of reduced circulation as online news and social media grab the readers attention.

The Lakes Link News has not been immune to this phenomenon; although online news isn't affecting the circulation of the paper, social media certainly is. Future historians will curse social media as it doesn't have the same journalistic integrity or archival qualities as paper media.

Every edition of our community paper is stored in paper format at the CRC and also the Battye Library. Digital copies have also been saved since 2003, prior to that we didn't have the capacity. As of this year, the Link has been uploaded to the Battye Library in digital form. This year we also completed our digital back up of all editions of the Links and we have been uploading onto our website. This is a useful tool for anyone looking for historical information.

After much thought and discussion we will be offering the Lakes Link in digital format in 2019; an annual

subscription will be \$25, significantly cheaper than the print subscription. Advertising costs for the Links have remained the same but we will be increasing the cost of the Links from \$1.20 to \$1.50.

Although the Links does bring in around \$26,000 revenue per annum in advertising and sales, this does not cover the cost of production, particularly the editorial hours that are put into it.

We will always be offering the print copy, this will continue to be sold through the Lake Grace Plaza. With many of us looking at a screen for a large portion of the day, reading print in the paper format is a welcome relief.

Subscription forms will be coming out in the November 22nd edition of the Lakes Link News. We do appreciate these being submitted prior to the New Year as it helps us get our mailing lists organised. Please note that email subscriptions will only be available to individuals (not business/organisations) at this stage.

The CRC thanks you for your continued support of the paper; we think it will continue for many years to come.

Life Membership for Nationals Stalwart Wendy Duncan

Members and supporters of The Nationals WA gathered in Manjimup over the weekend to convene their annual State Conference.

Joined by Deputy Prime Minister Michael McCormack and Senators Bridget McKenzie and Matt Canavan, the Party faithful spent the weekend debating motions put forward by Branch representatives, and enjoying the hospitality of the Manjimup community.

A highlight of the weekend was the presentation of Life Membership to Party stalwart Wendy Duncan.

Party President James Hayward said Life Membership was the highest honour that could be bestowed on a member for service to the Party and Wendy was a most worthy recipient.

"Wendy served as the Party's first ever female President before taking a seat in the State Parliament," he said.

"She served nine years in the Parliament, starting as Member for the Agricultural Region before successfully contesting the Mining and Pastoral Region and the Legislative Assembly electorate of Kalgoorlie.

"She was elevated to the role of Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Regional Development; Lands, and became the Deputy Speaker of the Legislative Assembly before stepping down at the 2017 State election."

Tony Crook, who presented Wendy with the award on Saturday night with Life Member Murray Criddle, said Wendy was well known for her hard work and determination in representing her constituents.

"Wendy was integral in the formation and delivery of Royalties for Regions and a fierce advocate for regional Western Australia," he said.

"She also found time to capture our history as part of The Nationals WA centenary celebrations in 2013, taking a lead role in the creation of the book *Blood Nose Politics*.

"We thank Wendy for her service to the Party and commitment to the people of regional Western Australia."

Mr Hayward will serve his fourth term as President, while Mr Joe Lundy has stepped into the role of Vice President.

"I would like to congratulate Joe on his well-deserved election as Vice President and thank him for his service as our Policy Director over a number of years," Mr Hayward said. "My sincere thanks to outgoing Deputy

WA Children to Pilot World-First Autism Therapy

A team of Western Australian child health researchers is about to pilot a world-first group intervention for young children showing early risk signs for autism. It is hoped the pilot project will improve children's social and communicative development, and could ultimately mean more WA children at risk of autism are given timely and effective help.

The randomised controlled trial involves videoing interactions between parents and their children. Parents are then offered feedback on how to enhance communications with their children.

Autism is a lifelong developmental disability characterised by impaired social and communicative skills. While it is rarely diagnosed before three or four years of age, risk factors for it, including non-verbal cues, can be identified much earlier.

The therapy is modelled on an existing UK program that was found to be effective in providing sustained results in children known to have been at significant risk of autism. This program was home-based and delivered one-on-one, making it labour intensive and costly.

The WA team has taken key elements of the program to develop a group-based intervention which, apart from an initial home-based session, will be delivered in clinics to groups of up to six parents. The modifications

will enable it to be delivered to more children and at approximately a third of the cost of the UK program.

The WA research is led by Child Development Service Paediatrician Associate Professor John Wray. Eighty children, aged from nine to 14 months, will be recruited for the trial following referrals from child health nurses and general practitioners.

The trial is among 13 research projects that will share in more than \$3.5 million in the sixth round of the Telethon Perth Children's Hospital Research Fund (TPCHRF). The TPCHRF is a collaboration between the Department of Health and Channel 7 Telethon Trust that provides funding for WA research activities which focus on the health and wellbeing of children and adolescents.

Comments attributed to Health Minister Roger Cook:

"This world-first project will provide new hope for families with a child displaying early signs of autism. In Western Australia around 400 to 500 new cases of autism are diagnosed in children under six years of age every year, equivalent to one or two cases a day.

"We know that the right help, given in the crucial early stages of a child's development, can significantly change the trajectory of that child's life."

Who Let the Dogs Out?

The Eastern Wheatbelt Biosecurity Group is one of 14 Recognised Biosecurity Groups (RGBs) within Western Australia. The Eastern Wheatbelt Biosecurity Group (EWBG) is one of the larger agricultural RBG's with a prescribed area of over 80,000km2 and encompasses a total of 11 Shires. These Shires border the eastern edge of the Wheatbelt Agricultural area and interact with the State Barrier Fence. The Shire of Lake Grace is at the southernmost point of the EWBG.

Funding for the group is received from multiple sources, including compulsory landholder contributions (Declared Pest Rates) - that are matched by State Government funding, Western Areas LTD (WSA), the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD), Australian Wool Innovation (AWI), Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions (DBCA), the State Governments' Royalties for Regions program, the National Wild Dog Strategy, and the eleven member Shires (Kondinin, Kulin, Lake Grace, Merredin, Mount Marshall, Mukinbudin, Nungarin, Narembeen, Trayning, Westonia and Yilgarn). The funds are used to cover the cost of a part time Executive Officer, two full time Licenced Pest Management Technicians (LMPT's), Wild Dog control activities and equipment, an aerial baiting program, EWBG ran workshops and support for landholders to control declared pests on their property, covering the cost of all landholders (within the EWBG area) Restricted Chemical Product Permits and the administration of the group.

Ideally EWBG's primary focus is to reduce Wild Dogs from coming in any further than the State Barrier Fence. As soon as there are reported Wild Dog occurrences to the Executive Officer, the LPMT's works with the local landholder whose responsibility remains to control them. The group has been in operation for over 15 years and in that time Wild Dogs have not come any further west in the area and stock attacks have been reduced significantly.

In 2000-2001 sheep losses were in excess of 2000 head, by 2008 sheep losses had been halved and in 2016 reported losses were 50 head. The EWBG is certainly controlling Wild Dogs within their area. In the June quarter of 2018 six dogs, eight foxes and three cats had been caught, reported stock losses were 44 head and 1700 baits had been laid. Regular and targeted aerial baiting is also coordinated and this year included working with the new Central Wheatbelt Biosecurity Association alongside EWBG.

An RBG provides a platform for landholders and land managers to work together in a coordinated manner to manage and control declared pests on their land. RBGs are DPIRD's preferred partnership arrangement for the management of widespread and established



declared pests. The work that RBGs do complements and adds value to pest control undertaken by individual landholders and does not replace individual landholder responsibilities.

RBGs allow shared responsibility and opportunity for partnering between the community, industry, local government (shires) and State Government agencies to control established declared pests. In addition the groups can foster efficiency through community awareness of pests and making the best use of skills, funds, capability and capacity. The EWBG would appreciate any feedback from landholders and welcome concerns of any other declared pests within the area.

Ready For Anything

Mike Barnes, the Community Emergency Services Manager for the Shires of Lake Grace and Kent, recently facilitated a Hazard/Risk Assessment Workshop in Lake Grace for the State Risk Project, involving members of the Local Emergency Management Committee (LEMC). LEMC is made up of representatives from the emergency services (police, ambulance, fire and bush fire brigades), the Shire, schools Department of Fire and Emergency Services and other stakeholders including CBH, Western Power, Department of Primary Industries, Department of Communities and Department of Health etc.

The aim of workshops such as these is to have people on the ground ready and able to respond in an appropriate manner if an incident emerges. Although emergency situations don't often arise, it is easier on the responders if everyone understands their role within the community, responding as per the protocols put in place by each stakeholder. The Shire has a plan in place called the Local Emergency Management Arrangements. All 138 Local Governments in WA have to take part in these planning workshops.

Throughout the workshop participants got to dissect seven scenarios through risk statements on; a major bushfire, a rail crash, road crash, Hazardous Materials (HAZMAT) incident, a storm, a flood and animal disease. None of these scenarios are far-fetched with a number of them having happened within the local shire.

When an emergency happens there are many consequences that aren't thought of in the short term, however some of these side effects can have long term consequences on the economy, environment, social fabric and mental wellbeing of the community affected. While news stations may be interested in a catastrophic event for a couple of days, the long term effects can result in loss of assets, productivity, native flora and fauna and in worst case scenario loss of human life. Once the community has lost the attention of the media, they are left to rebuild, something that can take many years.

Managing an emergency situation can take its toll on local infrastructure as it's generally the local shire that houses the response effort; managing the human, financial and physical resources needed to control the incident. While this is happening, their normal business is impacted as staff are directing their focus toward the catastrophe at hand; the same can be said of local business as they also down tools to put on their volunteer hats.

Workshops such as these determine the likelihood and consequences of various scenarios; from these, communities can better prepare their properties and

prevent some of the damage/destruction that can occur as well as plan the responsive action that they need to take in order to minimise the recovery back to a functioning community.





Unsupervised Bath Time Puts Baby at Risk

Media Release

Baby bath aids such as plastic recliners, cradles or seats, have become increasingly popular with parents as they provide support for babies and young children in the bath.

But it is important to remember that they are not safety devices or a substitute for adult supervision and support. Children have drowned while using a bath aid as they can easily slip off and become submerged under water, tip over when the suction cups come loose or climb out.

According to the Royal Life Saving Society Western Australia, parents mistakenly believe they will hear their child drowning. Drowning is swift and silent and is not accompanied by children crying out or splashing.

With this in mind a new safety standard, which requires clearly visible and appropriate warning labels on baby bath aids to ensure adults are warned about the risks, was introduced on 26 October 2017. The purpose is to reduce the incidence of babies drowning or being injured while in one of these devices.

All baby bath aids sold in Australia must comply with the updated Safety Standard from 27 October following a 12 month transitional period.

An adult must supervise the baby or toddler closely at all times when around water. The majority of bathtub drowning deaths occur when there is an interruption to bathing routine; for example, the doorbell rings while a parent is bathing the children. In over 80 per cent of bathtub drowning deaths, children were already bathing when they drowned.

If you need to leave the room for any reason – take your child with you. Make sure you do not rely on children to supervise each other while in the bath. They may think the baby or toddler is playing, or they might not raise an alarm in time. Children often do not know what to do if something happens, or think they might get into trouble.

When selecting a baby bath aid for your child check that the safety warning statement is clearly displayed

on the product, that it is easy to read and that it is able to withstand the warm soapy water of bath times for the life of the product. Check that there are no sharp edges or points on the bath aid, that your child fits properly into the device and that any toys attached to the bath are not small enough to fit in a baby or toddler's mouth.

As another precaution, always keep at least one hand on the baby when around water to prevent them from slipping face first into or under water. Infants may not have the neck strength to move their head or face away from the water.

If your child is being bathed by another family member or carer ensure they are made aware of safe procedures for bathing your child.

Knowing how to perform resuscitation techniques could also save your child's life.

The Real Dangers of Ecstasy Abuse

Some drug dealers suggest that ecstasy is the perfect drug – creating a huge and overwhelming change in sensation, while doing no real long-term harm. They tell customers that the little pills they sell will elevate an everyday experience from boring to brilliant, and that the drug will wear right off in time for school or work the next day. With a pitch like that, any consumer would be tempted to buy the drug.

In reality, ecstasy is not a benign drug. In fact, it is a very strong and very persistent drug that has been associated with all sorts of negative side effects. During the last stage - coming down - people may feel exhausted, irritable, paranoid, and tense. They may find it hard to relax, and they may also find that it's impossible to sleep.

The first two stages of drug use may be complete in as little as eight hours, but the coming down stage can stretch on for quite some time. Some people who take ecstasy simply do not feel as though they have returned to normal until a great deal of time has passed.

The Center for Substance Abuse Research suggests that some people feel ill or upset for up to two days after the episode is over. That illness is due to the deep toll the drug use can have on the body of a person taking ecstasy.

How Ecstasy Causes Harm

When the drug enters a user's body, it moves up to the brain and triggers a series of chemical reactions. Most of those reactions impact the way the brain releases and processes a key chemical called serotonin.

Serotonin is typically involved in helping the body to regulate temperature, heart rate, and sweat rate, but it also has an impact on mood and sensory processing. As a result, when serotonin levels are different, people experience the world in a slightly different way. But all the time, those other changes are happening deep within the body too, and they can be catastrophic.

Some people experience deep heart palpitations while they are under the influence of ecstasy. They feel as though their hearts are racing, and they cannot gain control of the sensation. Others feel as though their hearts are beating out of rhythm, and without attention, that problem could lead to a heart attack.

The changes in temperature people feel while under the influence could also be life-threatening. The body only works within a narrow range of temperatures. If the body grows too warm, the blood can clot within the blood vessels, and that could lead to a heart attack or stroke. The too-warm blood could also do deep damage to vital organs, including the kidneys. Some people end up dying while high due to the heat their bodies put off.

In an overview printed in The Telegraph, researchers say that more than 200 deaths in England alone have been associated with ecstasy. Many of them could have happened in the midst of a drug-taking episode. But the drug can also do a different form of damage that could be deeply costly but that might not show up on any formal report.

Ecstasy and the Mind

The big boost of serotonin caused by a dose of ecstasy could help to make people feel happy and emotionally available, but that same chemical could damage the mind. Brain receptors for serotonin are very sensitive, and they tend to self-regulate in the face of something deemed dangerous. That means these receptors can

turn inward or turn off when faced with too much serotonin on a regular basis.

As the organization DanceSafe points out, that deregulation can lead to depression. Some people who use the drug are doing so because they have an underlying and undiagnosed case of depression. Their drug use could make those issues much worse.

Purity Concerns

While ecstasy use clearly comes with some serious risks, the drug also brings about the very real risk of poisoning. It is hard for anyone to know how pure the drug is before it is taken, and laboratory studies suggest that many pills sold on the street and at parties are not really ecstasy at all.

In Vice, researchers examined more than 25,000 samples of pills gathered over a 10-year period. In samples from the United States, just 34.7 percent of those pills actually contained ecstasy. The researchers said that the drug amphetamine was the most common substituted drug. Many pills contained this very different drug, and many users had no idea that the substances they were taking were not related to ecstasy at all.

Pills are made in clandestine labs scattered all around the country, often by amateur chemists who really have no idea about what they are doing. These people are not interested in delivering a good product or producing a pure high. These are people who want to make money and do so quickly. They will load a pill with anything or sell any substitute they might see fit, and they may not feel guilty about that choice at all. The people who buy these drugs are relying on honesty and pride that may be, quite simply, a myth.

Also, when people buy drugs from dealers, they may be getting pills that are much too strong. MixMag reports on two men who bought pills that typically contain 25-50 mg of active ingredients. These men got pills with 173 mg of active ingredients. These men died.

CEO's Corner

Flooding Event

The contractors are nearing completion of outstanding works, it is anticipated that we will have all works finished prior to December. The work outstanding is as follows:

Western Sector - headwalls on Biddy Camm, Duckworth, Fourteen Mile and Mallee Hill Roads. South Sector - Newdegate-Pingrup, Dawson & Beynon. Remedial works on Lockhart, Dyke and the Northern end of Old Ravensthorpe Road. Culverts Magenta, Nield and Old Ravensthorpe Road.

All Sectors – Culvert cleaning is to commence next week, this is additional work that has been authorised by Main Roads WA.

Audits are currently being undertaken on the completed works to ensure all work has been completed as required.

As this work is being carried out, the Shire would like to remind road users to be courteous and slow down within the areas that crews are working, this will allow them to do their job in a safe manner and complete it sooner. Unfortunately we continue to have had a number of reports of vehicles speeding through the road works.

Driving and Parking Vehicles on Footpaths and Verges

It has been brought to my attention that there are a number of vehicles driving and or parking on footpaths and verges. These areas are not designed for traffic movement. Kerbing and footpaths are being damaged as a result of these vehicle movements. This damage then costs both time and money at the expense of the ratepayer. This matter will be monitored over the coming months.

Water Corporation Fixed Standpipe Review

The Water Corporation commenced a review in early 2017 to collate corporate knowledge of fixed standpipes and critically analyse all aspects of the management process including receipt and processing applications, application of land use ratings, infrastructure installed at the point of distribution, pricing and the policy governing the use of fixed standpipes.

The issues identified were:

Some commercial customers access community purpose standpipes and pay concessionary rates; this creates inequity and results in the community and state government subsidising the activities of private enterprises on an unequal basis;

Scheme pressure and supply issues caused by standpipes being used for undesignated purpose (i.e. commercial user accessing community purpose standpipes);

Lack of publically available information about standpipes, how they work, where they are located, the permitted scope of use for a given standpipe, and what pricing applies.

Local Governments are entitled to access concessional pricing for water used for our own purposes. This will not change, however high flow rate Local Government owned fixed standpipes that are publicly accessible will no longer be charged concessional rates and commercial rates will apply.

All Local Government standpipes with a meter size of 20mm or 25mm will receive concessional rates and are to be used by the Local Government or for community purposes only (such as drought assistance for farmers or households not connected to scheme water when a drought condition is announced by the Government). All standpipes with a meter size above 25mm will be charged at a commercial rate, but an exemption to consumption charges does apply for water used for fire-fighting purposes.

Although the Shire has invested money to install electronic card readers to access water, there is a significant difference in the quantity of water billed by Water Corporation against our billings for water accessed from standpipes. Based on these differences in the 16/17 billing period, if the new commercial charges were in operation, the Shire would have had an expense of \$37,000 in water not billed.

It has been resolved that the standpipes will be nominated as Community Use Standpipes, which would allow the Shire to have access to the concessional rates

The objective is for Western Australia to have a new, modern Act that empowers local governments to better deliver for the community.

The next stage will result in a new Local Government Act and focuses on delivering for the community based on the themes Agile, Smart and Inclusive. Local governments and community members are currently invited to have a say on some or all of the reform areas.

This review is open to everyone and if you think we should have different ways of doing business, this is your time to make comment. Tarin Rock Book Update - October

September was a big success on the flora walk as there were around 20 people that turned up. We didn't get very far in the reserve in the 2 hours as there was so much to see and talk about, just along Hills Road. Next year we will probably organise another event. Thanks to Claudia Hadlow from Dumbleyung Landcare for doing an excellent job in organising this.

I have just returned from my visit in October and the bush is even more colourful than last month. There are currently various Verticordias in flower (meaning 'The turner of Hearts' or commonly known as feather flowers – look up-close to see the feathery flower parts). Cyanostegia lanceolata is also putting on a grand display in purple, and there are so many Melaleucas out that the bush turns blue/pink over a long distance.


One of my favourite tracks this month was Hills Road. I recommend to go and have a look for yourself! The orange shrubs currently flowering are *Eremaea pauciflora*, a myrtle that is endemic to the south-west of WA. The compass bush (*Allocasuarina pinaster*), which has separate male and female plants, and is widespread in the reserve, is in full flower. It has a restricted distribution in the southern Wheatbelt. The female plants bear the big fruit cones and tiny red flowers, the males bear the pollen, which are spread by

the wind to the tiny female flowers. You need to look up close to find the female flowers.

My next visit will be 16 to 19 November. If anybody wants to come along, let me know and we can meet up on site. You can reach me by email at tarinrockbook@gmail.com or by phone on 0439978550.

Keeping Snakes Away

For many, the sight of a snake in or around the house is the stuff of nightmares. The likelihood of a snake showing up on your doorstep depends on several factors including: your location, surrounding landscape, presence of a water source and your lawn and garden design and maintenance schedule. If you are finding snakes in or around your home, keep calm and follow the tips below:

Do...

- Mow grass often and keep it short. Snakes are less likely to hang out and move through short grass because it increases their exposure to predators (e.g. hawks).
- Keep trees and shrubs trimmed. Trim trees and shrubs away from your home and garage, and keep branches away from the ground. Creating a 24-36" space under trees and shrubs will reduce snake use and will make snakes easier to spot if present.
- Move the bird feeder. Birds are messy eaters and often leave seed scattered below their feeder. Seed on the ground attracts rodents which may attract snakes seeking a meal. Store bird seed in a metal can with a tight fitting lid.
- Install a perch pole. Hawks and owls are natural

- snake predators that can be attracted to an area with the aid of a well placed perch pole. Poles should be placed in open areas so the hawk or owl has a good view of the yard and surrounding area.
- Feed pets inside. Feeding pets outside can attract insects and rodents which attracts snakes. If feeding outside is necessary, be sure to cleanup uneaten food right away. Store pet food in a metal can with a tight fitting lid.
- Move your woodpile. Store firewood, excess lumber, and other types of debris away from your home.
 Stacks of lumber and firewood debris are perfect places for snakes to hide.
- Think before you landscape. Avoid using mulch and large rock in your landscaping. These materials attract snakes and their prey, and can create breeding and overwintering habitat. Instead, use smaller tight-fitting rock such as gravel or river rock. Avoid water gardens and Koi ponds as these water features attract snakes.
- Seal the cracks. Seal cracks and crevices on the house, pavements and foundations to prevent snakes from using these areas.
- · Fencing. There are no sure-fire ways to keep snakes

away, but when all else fails fencing may be worth consideration. Fencing should be buried a few inches into the ground, be constructed using 1/4" or smaller rigid mesh or solid sheeting, and include a bend at the top to prevent snakes from climbing up and over.

Do not...

- Do not use mothballs. The active ingredient in mothballs is naphthalene or paradichlorobenzene. These chemicals are toxic to insects and mammals, but are not effective against snakes (San Julian, 1985). Naphthalene may cause illness in humans, and has been linked to death in children. Using mothballs outside your home violates product labels, and puts your family and pets at risk.
- Do not use sulfur. Many snake-away products claim that sulfur in their products will keep snakes away. Unfortunately sulfur is not effective at deterring snakes and is a waste of money (San Julian, 1985.) Here's a short video showing ineffectiveness of snake deterring chemicals.
- Do not use ceramic eggs or golf balls. If having issues with snakes in your chicken coop, using golf balls, or ceramic, glass or wooden eggs is not the

answer. Snakes that eat these artifical eggs die a slow and painful death over many weeks, and new snakes will just show up to take that snake's place. Instead, focus on improving your coop to prevent snakes from entering and follow the deterrents recommended above. If using ceramic or other artificial eggs to encourage a brooding hen to lay, be sure to glue the eggs down to prevent snakes from eating them. Note: The loss of few chicken eggs here and there is a small price to pay for natural rodent control. Snakes eat lots of rodents, and rodents pose a significant risk to human and livestock health.

- Do not relocate problem snakes. Snake relocation might seem like a good way to reduce human-wildlife conflict, but most research on the topic has found that the snakes die more often than not when relocated.
- Do not use sticky traps outside. Traps placed outside capture all sorts of non-target animals and result in a slow agonizing death.







Expanding Mobile Coverage in O'Connor

Media Release - Rick Wilson

The fourth round of submissions for the Mobile Blackspot Program closed a few weeks ago, and I hope people who have blackspots in their area nominated that location for funding consideration. There are still areas of real concern throughout the electorate, and there are certainly some sites that I will be pushing for, but we are making progress.

Since the Liberal Government was elected in 2013, a priority has been to get comprehensive mobile phone coverage throughout the regions. It's important for so many reasons -- fast and reliable connection is vital for businesses and our agricultural, mining and tourism industries. People in the regions need to be able to maintain social contact in this digital age. And it's important to be able to communicate swiftly and reliably in times of emergency.

I can sympathise with people who have inadequate or non-existent mobile coverage. At my farmhouse just 8km from Katanning, getting mobile coverage means going out into the paddock, or climbing a tree along the driveway! But I'm better off than many who still have no coverage at all.

We're getting there, though. In O'Connor, 73 towers have been completed, and another 13 are under construction. They are slated for completion by June 30 next year. So by the middle of next year, 86 towers will have been built under the federal Black Spot Program

throughout O'Connor since 2013. I'm working hard to ensure we are favourably treated when the decisions are made following this last round.

Given the previous Labor Government didn't invest one cent in mobile phone towers, that's a pretty good outcome. When the 86th tower goes on line, we will have good coverage across the electorate.

I've spoken with Communications Minister Mitch Fifield about our needs, and he has visited O'Connor on several occasions and witnessed first-hand how important reliable communications is. As usual, though, we are competing for funds with other regional electorates in other States.

It's not all about physical mobile phone towers. As technology improves, so do our communication options. I'm hopeful we can fill in a few more holes in this fourth round of funding.

For myself, there are certainly some locations where coverage is needed to improve people's safety. There are also areas that are strategically important for our economic advancement, education, health care and other community services. I've worked hard since my election in 2013 to ensure people in the bush have access to reliable communication services. This is my commitment to the people of O'Connor and this is what I will continue to deliver.


And to finish off...

Common Sayings With Historical Origins

Turn a blind eye

The phrase "turn a blind eye"—often used to refer to a wilful refusal to acknowledge a particular reality—dates back to a legendary chapter in the career of the British naval hero Horatio Nelson. During 1801's Battle of Copenhagen, Nelson's ships were pitted against a large Danish-Norwegian fleet. When his more conservative superior officer flagged for him to withdraw, the one-eyed Nelson supposedly brought his telescope to his bad eye and blithely proclaimed, "I really do not see the signal." He went on to score a decisive victory. Some historians have since dismissed Nelson's famous quip as merely a battlefield myth, but the phrase "turn a blind eye" persists to this day.


White elephant

White elephants were once considered highly sacred creatures in Thailand—the animal even graced the national flag until 1917—but they were also wielded as a subtle form of punishment. According to legend, if an underling or rival angered a Siamese king, the royal might present the unfortunate man with the gift of a white elephant. While ostensibly a reward, the creatures were tremendously expensive to feed and house, and

caring for one often drove the recipient into financial ruin. Whether any specific rulers actually bestowed such a passive-aggressive gift is uncertain, but the term has since come to refer to any burdensome possession—pachyderm or otherwise.

Crocodile tears

Modern English speakers use the phrase "crocodile tears" to describe a display of superficial or false sorrow, but the saying actually derives from a medieval belief that crocodiles shed tears of sadness while they killed and consumed their prey. The myth dates back as far as the 14th century and comes from a book called "The Travels of Sir John Mandeville." Wildly popular upon its release, the tome recounts a brave knight's adventures during his supposed travels through Asia. Among its many fabrications, the book includes a description of crocodiles that notes, "These serpents slay men, and eat them weeping, and they have no tongue." While factually inaccurate, Mandeville's account of weeping reptiles later found its way into the works of Shakespeare, and "crocodile tears" became an idiom as early as the 16th century.
