Remembrance Day 2015

Every year on the eleventh day of the eleventh month at 11am Lake Grace District High School students commemorate Remembrance Day.

This year returned servicemen and women, community members and school students gathered at the RSL Hall in Stubbs Street. The service started with the School Cadets marching into position in front of the hall.

Year 10 students Emily Younger, Brad Clunie and Clayton Clunie conducted the service with confidence and precision, speaking about relationships with the allies during the war.

They remembered those Australian men and women who fought to set others free and those

who stood with courage to keep our families free during World War II.

Year 3/4 students quietly came forward and with help from the Lake Grace Regional Artspace, they respectfully attached poppies to the Remembrance Wreath. The Last Post was sounded followed by a minute of silence. Once Reveille had begun, School Cadet Charlee Earnshaw raised the Australian flag.

The FESA Cadets marched to the back of the hall in readiness to serve the returned servicemen and women morning tea which was supplied by Youthcare. Many people stayed to enjoy the company of others and to remember family and friends.



Community Crop Is In The Bin

It was a happy group of community croppers that waved the last semi-trailer of grain off to the bin last week as the 119ha of canola was harvested.

The community cropping group were rapt with the fantastic support shown to them by Gary Frost and Farmers Centre Lake Grace who supplied the header to take the crop off and also the support shown by David Fyfe from Fyfe Transport who carted the two semi loads of grain into the bin.

Yielding around 800-900 kg/ha the group are happy

with the result with funds generated providing another loan payment for the land, covering the cost of inputs for the 2016 crop while also giving surplus for depositing in the bank.

Like many of the canola crops in the district there was some uneven germination and more rain in September would have been handy. Aside from the efforts of the Farmers Centre team who were in the field for the duration of the rain-delayed harvest, other entities that contributed were the Marshall family who supplied field bins while Greg Carruthers and family supplied the tractor for moving the bins.

Community Cropping spokesman, John O'Neill said '2015 has been another successful year for the group and they look forward to when they will be able to inject funds raised from the cropping programme into community projects'.

Lake Grace Police are still here and still doing what we do best...keeping our community safe.

As you may be aware, last Friday there was an incident involving two of our young local lads on their way to school. As unfortunate as it was to happen in our safe community, Constable Ben Wilson and I would like to thank the young lads who did the right thing by not confronting the threat and then notifying their parents and school principal quickly.

So you all know, the other young boys were passing through Lake Grace and like all young boys, got bored and decided to entertain themselves while waiting for their relatives. The choice of their entertainment was not the brightest of ideas I'm sure they could have had but...

It is unfortunate that these young boys have been raised in a very different and difficult society than what we are used to, yet we know it is still no excuse. What seemed normal behaviour for our visitors was, of course, not seen in the same way by our two school boys and the rest of the town.

I am pleased to say that the relatives of these three visitors were very upset with their behaviour, particularly as within minutes of them being in town they managed to bring the Police to the doorstep of their aunty. Not only were they dealt with and officially processed by Lake Grace Police by being issued with a written Juvenile Caution, they were sorely dealt with by their mother, aunty and sister.

As Police, we are used to knowing that this behaviour is not acceptable but not uncommon in bigger outlying areas and in the city. I would ask that the community please not judge the relative whose home they were visiting, it was not in their power or knowledge that they could have anticipated the choice these young boys made. I appreciate the quick response by our local community and it is this community spirit that keeps us safe and informed.

"SIGH"

...and alas I do continue with more adverse news, again pointed towards our younger generation. Nevertheless it is not only subject to them alone.

Lake Grace Police have been advised that young persons have been caught red-handed issuing their own

IGA discount on store items. The good old "5 finger" discount is a very serious offence and in fact carries a higher penalty than that of the three boys wielding a knife—yes, it is true!

STEALING carries a higher penalty than that of Carrying a knife in Public to Cause Fear.Stealing also has no statute of limitation.

This means if a person is caught stealing and the victim chose not to proceed with Police action, if said person was caught again, the original charge could be reinstated and thus will be charged with two counts of stealing.

Keep your integrity and live life to the fullest by being honest.



The stainless steel plaques are still in excellent condition and bear their names however; it was the wooden post they were fastened to that had rotted away. Volunteers from the Men's Shed have now repaired them. The story of the Coronation Garden is worthy of telling.

The shops and buildings of Lake Grace were gay with flags and bunting in a very festive appearance. About 600 people assembled in front of the station for the dedication of the Coronation Gardens and then a procession of RSL members, children and decorated cars took them back to the Show Grounds where

festivities continued and carried on in the town well into the night.

Local girl, Doris Betham wrote this beautiful story about the event in a letter to Aunt Mary, a Western Mail children's club.

Dear Aunt Mary – I am going to tell you how Lake Grace celebrated the Coronation on May 12th. The festivities started at 11.30am with children's sports, tug-of-war, running, skipping and many other items, the results of which ended in many close finishes. At 12.30pm there was a picnic lunch on the Show Ground. Immediately after lunch all the children of the district formed up in fours' and marched through the town to the Railway Station. Here everyone was gathered to hear the Coronation Gardens dedicated and to listen to addresses by prominent citizens on the meaning of Coronation and the Crown and the Empire. The gardens will be two plots of lawn centred by palms and edged by shrubs. When completed they will be a great

Slithering Snakes

Now that the warm weather is upon us this brings the snakes and other reptiles out and about, foraging for food. Generally the snakes are just as scared of us as we are of them. Snakes are very mobile at the moment and generally will not stay in one location for too long.

The following steps can be taken to avoid and reduce the impact of snakes around where we live and work:

- Ensuring that your bird and chicken enclosures are regularly cleaned
- Controlling of any mice or rat problems
- Be aware and take care in bush land and grassy areas
- Walk and /or cycle on cleared areas only
- When out bushwalking, wear long trousers and boots or other enclosed footwear that preferably covers the ankles to reduce the risk of being bitten
- Keep a watchful eye on the ground about a metre ahead of where you are walking and avoid entering areas of long grass, rushes and undergrowth
- Spring clean around the house, property and or work place by keeping your yard clean of long grass (lawns mowed low) and items that provide cover such as stacks of timber, rocks, corrugated iron, compost heaps or discarded household items
- Dog owners are urged to take extra care when walking their beloved pets as dogs rarely survive a venomous snake bite unless veterinary treatment is given as soon as possible, not a luxury we have in our
- Ensure that there is little opportunity for snakes to enter your home by keeping doors shut, fitting weather seals to doors and blocking any gaps or cracks

Jerry Cans During Bushfires

DFES has received numerous reports of petrol erupting from jerry cans when firefighters have opened them.

Three of these events resulted in the ignition of the released fuel, with one occurrence causing significant burns to a firefighter's hands and another resulting in a light tanker being destroyed by fire. Two other events resulted in fuel spraying into firefighter's eyes.

Due to the recurrence and potential severity of the outcomes, a procedure has been developed for refuelling static motors, such as the pump motors on fire tankers or generators, at incidents involving fire.

Refueling static motors at incidents operational personnel are directed to remove Jerry Cans from ALL Career and Volunteer Light Tankers on arrival at an Incident and place the Jerry Can at either;

A control point;

- With your additional appliance responding to the incident (other than a Light Tanker); or
- In a shaded area that will not be impacted by fire;

Static motors are not to be refilled under any circumstances from a Jerry Can that has come off the rear of a light tanker once the petrol powered pumpset/ static motor has been running for any period of time.

If the Jerry Can has been left on the appliance during operations, the Jerry Can must be allowed to cool for a minimum of 4 hours prior to opening.

It may be necessary to attend a garage to refuel the petrol powered pumpset should the 4 hour cooling period not have expired. Oncoming crews must be advised of the number of hours before the crew can use the Jerry Can from the appliance.

Whilst operating at an incident you are directed to return to either the control point, your appliance, or another fuel location to refuel the petrol powered pump set.

Incident Management teams are to ensure that jerry cans are removed at the control point and this information disseminated to crews during briefings.

This is an interim measure to ensure the safety of crews. Other short term engineering controls are currently being considered for trial and an operational circular will be released in the near future to provide an update on these.

Local Community Representatives Tour Lake Grace Health Service

Media Release

Local community representatives have been given a sneak peak of the soon-to-be completed refurbishments taking place at Lake Grace Health Service.

Community representatives Debby Clarke, Mary Naisbitt, Ross Chappell and Amanda Milton were joined by members of the project team responsible for the upgrades and had a chance to see what work has been completed so far.

WA Country Health Service's Senior Project Manager Infrastructure & Planning (Wheatbelt), Graeme Leverington, said the building upgrades at Lake Grace Health Service were progressing according to plan and were due to be finished by mid-December.

"Already completed at the site is the new waiting area, new office, storage areas for medical records and pharmacy and the kitchen upgrade," Mr Leverington said.

"The old kitchen has been refurbished and includes brand new equipment including a combination thermal induction oven, gas hot plates, stainless steel work benches, commercial refrigerator and a new dishwasher."

Still to be completed is the refurbished emergency department, new reception, a short-term body holding facility, new toilets near reception and an ensuite in one of the wards.

Ms Clarke, who has long been an advocate of improving healthcare in Lake Grace, said it was good to have the opportunity to see the latest developments and the changes that have occurred since their original round-table discussion with the project team.

"It's great to see a significant investment being made into our health services in Lake Grace and it's heartening to be able to see that refurbishment plans are taking shape," Ms Clarke said.

The Lake Grace Health Service redevelopment is funded by the State Government's Royalties for Regions as part of the half a billion dollar Southern Inland Health Initiative being delivered by the WA Country Health Service.

The Southern Inland Health Initiative capital works program is more extensive and complex than any project previously undertaken by the WA Country Health Service, with new builds and upgrades to 37 hospitals and health services in the Wheatbelt, South West, Great Southern and Midwest.

In the Wheatbelt, Merredin, Northam and Narrogin hospitals are being redeveloped as well as upgrades to 23 small hospitals and health centres across the region, including the Lake Grace Health Service.

Emergency Services Volunteer Fuel Card

The Royalties for Regions Emergency Service Volunteer Fuel Card (ESVFC) will be rolled out in February next year, after a recent announcement of the application process timeline.

The Fuel Card, a Nationals WA election commitment, was announced earlier this year and will provide eligible brigades, groups and units (BGUs) with a \$2000 fuel card each year to support their services and volunteers.

Applications open on **Monday November 23** and will need to be submitted by **Sunday January 10**, with the first fuel cards to be sent out in February next year.

Nationals Members for the Agricultural Region, Hon Martin Aldridge MLC said the announcement came just in time for BGUs and residents preparing for the rapidly approaching fire season.

"The ESVFC is about providing emergency service volunteers, who often dip into their own pockets to help others, with a bit of support," Mr Aldridge said.

"This announcement is timely given summer is a particularly busy period for many of our regional volunteers."

Mr Aldridge, who has a wealth of experience in the emergency services sector, drove the ESVFC policy heading into the last election and has advocated for its swift introduction since his election in 2013.

He said the parameters around provision of the card would ensure the benefits ended up with volunteers.

"Responsibility for distributing the ESVFC amongst active, registered volunteers of the BGU will fall with the officer-in-charge," Mr Aldridge said.

"This ensures the fuel card will be fairly distributed to contributing volunteers."

The ESVFC is restricted to private or recreational fuel purchases only and must not be used to purchase fuel for an operational vehicle or vessel.

Allan also presented three of our members with service medals for years of service to the Lions Club of Lake Grace.


Chris Harvey received his service medal for 25 years, Maurice Nolan for 40 years & John deVree for 45 years.

'The Day I Meet You in the Emergency Department Will Probably be one of the Worst of your Life'

Ashleigh Witt

Ashleigh Witt is a doctor training to be a geriatrician at Western Health in Melbourne. This is her view on why everybody should know the dying wishes of their loved ones.

The day you meet me in the Emergency Department with your sick parent is likely to be one of the worst days of your life.

"My name is Ash and I'm the medical registrar on duty. I'll be your mum's doctor tonight. Mum is very sick. Please sit down so we can talk about what's happening."

This is usually how I meet people. It's 9pm in our chaotic Emergency Department and you've brought your mum in after she had a turn. The Emergency Department doctor has done some tests and has called me to admit her to the medical ward. Your mum is 89 and getting progressively frail. She has her share of medical conditions and a long list of tablets. Her memory is starting to fail. She might live alone, or with you, or in a nursing facility. Those details don't matter as much. She's your mum and she looks so sick. You're terrified you're about to lose her.

You tell me the story and I add those pieces of the puzzle to the Emergency Department doctor's handover and the blood results I've reviewed. I've also read about her previous admissions, outpatient clinic letters and correspondence from her GP.

I'll tell you she has pneumonia. The chest X-ray and the story of this worsening cough tell us that. From what we can see the infection has probably spread to her blood. This is called sepsis, but some people call it blood poisoning. Because of this sepsis, her kidneys are starting to fail and she's needing a lot of oxygen. She's becoming delirious. She is very sick. The next part of our discussion is about how aggressively we treat her.

If you and I are lucky, she is still conscious despite her illness and can tell us what she wants. If we are extremely lucky, you've talked about this before and have an Advanced Care Plan which you hand to me. This is my best scenario as it tells us exactly what she wants and takes away your anguish. Unfortunately though, the most common scenario is that she's too unwell to talk and you've never thought about it. She's been well enough and talking about death

"I know that it's a hard discussion to have but it's best we do it now, rather than on the phone at 3am when she deteriorates." You see, as doctors, we have the ability to keep a person alive indefinitely. If your lungs fail, we can put a tube down your throat and have a machine breathe for you. If your kidneys fail, we can attach you to a machine that filters the toxins from your blood. We can even mimic the function of the heart. We can fill your veins with tubes and lines and attach you to life support.

If the patient in front of me is 21, we usually do all of those things. If the patient in front of me is 101, I probably would do none of those things and focus on their comfort. Every other patient falls somewhere along that spectrum, and tonight, I need you to tell me about your mum so we can work out where she fits.

If a person's heart stops, we can perform CPR. CPR requires me to put my weight onto your mum's sternum and push. To do this effectively, I will inevitably break some of her ribs. This sounds horrible but if we don't do that the heart doesn't pump blood to the body and without blood, we die.

A young heart might be likely to restart, whereas

is so morbid.

statistically, mum's 89-year-old heart won't and we would perform traumatic CPR until we made the call to stop.

When I am the medical registrar at a code blue that involves doing CPR on an elderly person, I usually go home after work and cry. We're causing so much trauma to a frail person's chest, when realistically every doctor in the room knows the outcome will be death - regardless of whether we do CPR for 10 minutes, 1 hour or 3 hours. The patient's ribs are cracked and their final moments are traumatic. They are surrounded by doctors, not their children. That's not a "good" or dignified death.

Why do we do it then? Because if you insist you want "everything" done, that's what doing everything means. If you don't write an advanced care plan telling us what matters to you, we do the default option. If we don't fill in this resuscitation form on admission (because it's a hard conversation, you can't decide now, mum gets too distressed by it) and your mum has a cardiac arrest, the default is to do CPR. (In Victoria, we can make a patient "not for CPR" for medical reasons but doing this when you insist you want CPR is pretty horrible too).

"So for us to decide, I need you to paint me a picture

of mum. Tell me what she is like on a good day. How far can she walk? Has she lost her memory? How is her quality of life? Does she hate hospitals? Has she ever spoken about death or dying?"

Some people want everything done and want tubes and life support and an admission to ICU. In my experience, when people understand what "everything" means, they don't want that at all.

"Your mum is receiving strong antibiotics through the drip and the intravenous fluids will help her kidneys."

We give everyone (including the 101-year-old from the nursing home) the same treatment in this regard (some people have heard a horrible myth that if you say no CPR, we don't do anything). In 24 hours time, many people will have improved significantly, however given your mum's other medical conditions there is a chance she doesn't get better, and a very real chance she will get worse.

"I need you to tell me what you'd like me to do." Our choices are to do the invasive things above and send

her to ICU, or to acknowledge that 89 is a remarkable age, and that if the antibiotics have not helped, it's time for us to let her go.

This second option is called comfort care or palliation. It means no more painful blood tests, no more invasive tests, no more discomfort. It means giving her pain relief and symptom control and her favourite foods.

It means not worrying about her cholesterol tablet or her vitamin D capsule. It means making sure everyone she would want present, visits. It means calling the priest if that's important to her. It means everyone getting a chance to say goodbye.

Palliation is hard for many doctors because we like to fix things. We like cures. We're excellent at saving lives, but struggle to accept we can't save everyone.

But death is natural. Death in old, frail people is very natural. We aren't supposed to live forever and having a peaceful death with family present is a wonderful thing. A good death is as important as a successful resuscitation.

"I'll leave you to talk to your siblings while I fill out mum's admission paperwork and when you make a decision we can fill out the 'Goals of Care or Resuscitation' forms."

"If your mum does survive this pneumonia, I need you more than ever to talk about what her choices are. Please fill out an advanced care plan and give copies to your GP, specialists, family and the hospital."

The day I meet you in ED will probably be one of the worst days of your life but if you've had this discussion, the knowledge that you're respecting mum's wishes will make your pain easier to bear, I promise. Please have this talk this week, regardless of whether your parents are 60 or 100. Your future self will thank you for it.



Artists Needed for Public Art Projects at Narrogin Health Service

Media Release

As part of the refurbishment of the Narrogin Health Service, expressions of interest are being sought from artists experienced in public art projects for two separate commissions.

The two artworks are commissioned under the State Government's Percent for Art Scheme which employs Western Australian artists to deliver exciting artwork for major new public buildings such as schools, police stations, and health services throughout Western Australia.

Art Coordinator Maggie Baxter a consultant to Building Management and Works at the Department of Finance said the two commissions could be awarded to the same artist or team of artists, or awarded separately.

"There are two opportunities, the first commission is for a sculpture marking the entrance to the hospital and the second for seating and functional art," Ms Baxter said.

"The entry sculpture should complement the new architecture of the building and act as a clear statement that Narrogin is a progressive town looking to a bright and expansive future."

"The seating and functional art will be both at the entrance of the hospital and connect through to a breakout courtyard near the new oncology centre."

Ms Baxter said there was no set theme for the commissions but the art should make a connection to the Town of Narrogin, surrounds and Noongar culture.

"Any interpretation is expected to be innovative, contemporary, and not overly representational," she said.
