Drought Project Funding Flows

Another busy Tuesday at the Men's Shed for Alan Stubberfield, Ayden Jackson, Wally Perry, Allan Zweck, Doug Clarke, John de Vree and Graham Nolan.

Members have been busy at the Men's Shed as they work on projects that they will be selling at the Harvest Festival next week. They have had extra reason to celebrate as the good news came to light that they were successful in gaining a \$60,000 grant from FRRR for an extension to their current shed.

Thanks to FRRR's Tackling Tough Times Together (TTTT) program, 38 community initiatives in remote,

rural and regional communities across Australia will share in \$1,316,217. These projects will help local communities tackle the ongoing impacts of drought.

The TTTT program supports drought-affected regions of Australia by giving community groups and local nfp organisations access to the resources they need to respond to, and recover from, long-term rainfall deficiencies. This program has granted over \$18 million

- You will have seen from the cover that there's been some excitement in the last week or so since we found out that Lake Grace had been so successful in garnering a good portion of FRRR's Tackling Tough Times funding—of five successful grants for WA, three came to Lake Grace. Follow the story for more information.
- Thank you to everyone who has been so swift in getting back to us with their subscriptions - trust me it does make our life easier.
- It's starting to get quite technical for the Mandatory COVID Vaccinations and the added pressure that employers and non profits have to face regarding screening their employees and volunteers. The CRC does fall under the Group 2 category, our staff and regular volunteers have to be vaccinated; first jab by the end of the year and second jab by 31st January 2022. If you're not feeling happy about the situation please remember this is a Public Health Order and there is \$20k fines (larger in some instances) in the mix; try not to shoot the messenger. If you have volunteers or staff that don't have a myGov account and can't access their certificate online don't panic, they can call the Australian Immunisation Register on 1800 653 809; alternatively they can pop into the CRC and we can help them set up a myGov account so that they can access their certificate. If you would like to do this then please give us a call so that we can let you know what you need to bring with you.

What We Do At The Community Resource Centre

Centrelink: The CRC is an access point for Centrelink, which means we can photocopy and verify your original documents; fax 'stuff' for you or help you access forms whether it be from the supply we have on hand or through the internet. We also have a phone that customers can use to call the Call Centre and we have a computer, scanner and printer solely for Centrelink use.

ATO: We are no longer an access point for the Australian Taxation Office but we still keep a supply of their forms on hand (or can download them).

Government Computer: As part of its contract the CRC has a computer available, free of charge, for anyone needing to access state (WA) government websites.

Computer Training: We have in house training for Beginners, Excel, Word (Beginners & Intermediate), Publisher, Outlook, Internet, Social Media and Digital Photos. If the interest is there we can also source trainers to provide other IT training. We also provide one on one training at the CRC.

Other Training: The CRC also sources training workshops for Auschem, Forklift, Chainsaw & Truck Driving training and Assessment. These courses are reliant on the needs and wishes of the local community.

Desktop Publishing: CRC staff can create pretty much anything you want in the way of posters, leaflets, booklets and banners. Whether it's the fun stuff of a birthday invite, birth announcement, thank you card or a calendar we are able to create it for you. Likewise we can help you out in the business with job/work cards, carbonless workbooks, flyers, invoice books or business cards.

Secretarial Services: Want a letter or some minutes typed up? The CRC can do that, they will even attend meetings and take minutes if needed.

Containers for Change: Wanting to cash in your cans and bottles? The CRC has the bags for you to use to tap into the All Good Refund Depot in Wagin. Drop in if you need more information.

Photo Printing: Photos of 4"x6" (standard), 6"x8", 8"x10", 8"x12" as well as a number of panoramic sizes are able to be printed on the photo booth. They come in glossy and matte finishes.

Scanning: The CRC has an excellent scanner that can scan negatives, slides, photographs and documents. These can then be burned to a CD or DVD and/or printed. We can also scan a multipage document into a single pdf document.

Photocopying: We can photocopy anything up to A3 (twice the size of this page) in both black and white and colour. Items can be increased in size or decreased (very handy for the crafty people).

Printing: The CRC has a wide format printer that can print up to A0 (841mm x 1189mm) as well as banners on a variety of mediums. Can also print on canvas.

ID Photos: The CRC is able to take and process your ID photos, in both printed and electronic format.

Dubbing & Converting: We can convert your videos to DVD.

Digital Photos: If you need some photos taken (within Lake Grace boundary) we can take them and either burn to CD/DVD, print or email. If you are a keen photographer but don't have your own computer we can download the images for you and put them onto a DVD for you.

Card / Paper etc: We have a selection of coloured paper and card (of varying thicknesses) in both A4 and A3 available, plus a variety of labels (we can also print your labels for you).

Equipment Hire: We have an amplifier, digital projector, screen and whiteboard available for hire.

Venue Hire: The fully ac/heated seminar room, with interactive whiteboard, widescreen TV, DVD & video players and wireless internet is available for hire.

Computer Use: The CRC has three computers available for public use; they are all installed with Windows 10 and Office 2016 (soon to be upgraded to 365). Computers can be hired individually or the computer area can be hired in it's entirety for an hour or a day by any organisation.

Faxing: We are able to fax any documents, locally and internationally.

Email: Need an email sent but don't have a computer or email account, we can do that for you.

Memberships: Are a very economical way to have unlimited access to the internet. Members also receive reduced rates for photocopying, printing, desktop publishing, hire of equipment plus more.

Community Newspaper: Most importantly the CRC edits, prints and collates the Lakes Link News; a vital source of information for the community of Lake Grace.

Videoconferencing: The CRC has videoconferencing available.

TAFE: A variety of TAFE brochures are available at the CRC for a wide variety of studies that are available; from nursing and office studies through to horticulture and agriculture.

Lake Grace Calendars: Toward the end of each year the CRC creates calendars using local photographs. Ideal as Christmas gifts. We also put together personalised calendars.

Two More Defibrillators for Lake Grace

Through the generosity of CBH and the WA Mining Club there are a growing number of defibrillators in WA regional areas, Lake Grace now has 11 available for public access.

Lake Grace St John Ambulance Sub Centre have taken on the task of maintaining the defibs, ensuring that batteries and pads are at optimum performance. Ambulance Officer, Ross Chappell has been busy researching options for where the defibs could go, ensuring that there's a good coverage of the community. The latest two to be installed (funded by the WA Mining Club) are at AFGRI and the CRC/Library - giving coverage to the industrial and school areas.

Defibrillation is the only therapy to treat someone in cardiac arrest. Every minute that a person in Sudden Cardiac Arrest does not receive defibrillation, their chances of survival drop by 7-10%, making rapid defibrillation imperative for survival and one of the key steps in saving a life from Sudden Cardiac Arrest.

According to statistics, around 20,000 Australians suffer a cardiac arrest outside hospital every year and of those people, only 10% will survive. One of the most important pieces of medical technology around the world, a defibrillator is a device that gives a high energy electric shock to the heart of someone who is in cardiac arrest and is essential part in trying to save lives.

Book Review: Jailhouse Lawyer by James Patterson

I must confess I have found James Patterson books to be a little formula written, although they're not a bad read you tend to feel that you may well be reading the same books with a few name changes.

However this book is a good one; there's two novels included and there's a shift in the writing style.

The first novel gave me a Stepford Wives moment – all looking good until you dig a little under the surface.


A young lawyer, Martha Foster, sees an opportunity too good to be true, the position of district public defender in Douglas County, Alabama. Good wages, good medical cover – just what she needs having a son with a heart condition.

In picture-perfect Erva, Alabama, the most serious crimes are misdemeanours. Speeding, shoplifting, contempt of court. Why then is the jail so crowded? And why are so few prisoners released? There's only one place to learn the truth.

Martha takes on the judge who is destroying the town and ends up behind bars. Sometimes the best education a lawyer can get is a short stretch of hard time.

The second novel is about a high-flying litigation lawyer whose success is starting to raise questions within her own head as to the moral compass that she is following, a far cry from the defender of the underdog that her father was.

A desperate text message from her mother sees her return to the home town that she has put behind her, where she discovers that her fathers declining health has seen his law practice turn to chaos.



There is a dark undercurrent within the town with Leah not knowing who to trust as she tries to sort through her fathers files while helping his young client who has become the main suspect in a double homicide.

Bill mentioned the charity had been donated a large sum in 2021 to go toward the purchase of a new shed for production of the wheelchairs.

Over the last 23 years there have been 50,000 wheel chairs for kids made. These were accompanied by 100,000 beautifully coloured blankets and soft toys donated by hundreds of generous and skillful crocheters, knitters and sewers.. These have come a long way from when the first was made. With nine different models the latest is the very best design for maximum comfort and durability on rough terrain.

The wheelchairs are all made by volunteers with over 200 volunteers doing shifts throughout the week. We were told that Wednesdays are the best days as the ladies put on a great morning tea.

Wheelchairs are purchased by different companies around the world for children in need. They are then packed and sent via sea container. A sea container can fit 340 flat packed wheelchairs. Once it reaches its

destination it is then put together by volunteers and fitted to that child by an Occupational Therapist.

News From Associations

Review of the Act

The Associations Incorporation Act 2015 commenced over five years ago and Consumer Protection is reviewing the Act to ensure it remains effective and relevant.

The Review is unlikely to make significant changes to the Act and the impact on associations will be minor. As part of the Review, associations and their members will be able to contribute to the consultation when a discussion paper and survey is available from Consumer Protection's website in early 2022.

Improving the reporting requirements

If your association currently reports to the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC) you are not required to lodge an information statement with Consumer Protection each year. An agreement with the ACNC has reduced the reporting burden for associations in Western Australia.

You still need to lodge an information statement with Consumer Protection if you are not registered with the ACNC or have any overdue statements.

Finding the right person for your management committee

We commonly hear of the difficulty associations have in finding suitable people to fill positions on management

PL 10312 GF19054 committees. Consumer Protection suggests you start the task of identifying potential committee members as soon as possible and not to leave it to the last minute.

Sub-committees spread the workload and assists the management committee by providing information and recommendations. They are also a good way of identifying and training persons who may be suitable to fill a current or future vacancy on the management committee.

Keeping up-to-date information about the role of committee members can assist to identify the skills and experience required for a position. It will also allow anyone thinking of nominating for a position to assess whether they have what it takes.

New committee members

The outgoing and incoming management committee members can all help make a smooth transition by:

- 1. Ensuring any records held by an outgoing committee member are handed to the new management committee as soon as possible;
- 2. Updating bank accounts to reflect the new signatories and remove any committee members that have left:
- 3. AssociationsOnline users that are linked to the association's records held by Consumer Protection are updated by retiring any outgoing users and adding new primary users. Help Guides and videos are available to help you complete
- 4. The new committee meets with the outgoing members to ensure urgent matters receive attention and there is continuity regarding the association's policies, procedures and important contacts (i.e. accountants, auditors, peak body representatives etc.).


TRAFFIC

Primary Care is about developing a culture of caring for each other. It's not about being an expert but being able to listen and express some empathy when someone is dealing with a difficult life issue. By de-medicalising the effect that "situational distress" can have on our mental health, it gives permission and empowers ordinary people to act and value the care they can give alongside specialised mental health services and support options.

Research shows that around 90% of suffering through traumatic experiences in our lives can be resolved by having a cuppa, a hug and a talk to a caring friend or other ordinary human being, who knows how to listen. It is worth remembering "a problem shared is a problem halved." Is this something all of us can do?

The rural climate always provides ongoing and varying challenges for farmers, agribusiness and agri-link industries, which in turn can create pressure in other areas of our personal, professional and community life.

We think the most effective care always starts from the "bottom up". Around regional WA there are numerous community champions from individuals to shires, CRCs and community groups that arrange breakfasts, sundowners and BBQ's that provide a "safe place" for people to meet, catch up and talk over life on the land.

There are many other grass-roots events that we attend which are a great basis for primary care. These gatherings can occur when people are at a crossroad in their life. People in the bush have always faced tough times, and now is no different.

The benefits of an event at the grass-roots level are many, some of which are:

- a sense of mateship and to remind you that you are not out there on your own;
- maintains important social contact to keep the body, mind and spirit in good health;
- it's blokes talking about bloke's stuff.

Summer Water-Saving Hacks for Busy Families

Most of us spend more time at home with our families over the summer holidays, and this usually means your home water use will go up.

As the weather heats up, water plays a bigger role in summer activities, like spending time in the swimming pool, running through sprinklers, using evaporative airconditioning for indoor activities and longer or more frequent showers.

To help you put things into perspective, last summer the average household used 1,062 litres of water per day, which is a 175% increase from spring and 293% more than winter. In bucket terms, the average person uses 51 buckets in summer compared to 27 in spring!

Easy ways your family can save water

Family shower time

Did you know showers contribute to almost 25% of household water use? A good way to save water is by sharing baths. If that's not your thing, try our other favourite trick: keep showers under 4 minutes and play your kids' favourite song. To save you some time, we've created Spotify playlists featuring the greatest 4 minute hits.

You could also make shower time more fun by getting your kids to see how much water they can catch into a

bucket to then use the garden, and you'll be on track for a gold star from us!

Spot check clothes

Encourage your kids to spot check their clothes before tossing them in the laundry basket. If their clothes aren't that dirty, place them back in their drawers ready for another day. While we're on the topic of laundry, waiting until you have a full load to run is another simple way to save water!

Switch it up

Task your school-aged kids with learning your allocated watering days, then input these days into your irrigation system. If you're hand waterers, they can note in the family calendar and have the responsibility to water the garden on the allocated watering days!

Get an extra pair of hands in the kitchen

Involve your kids in dinner preparations by letting them make some menu choices. Once they've chosen, there are waterwise ways they can prep. Use a plug in the sink or a bowl to wash veggies - (turn it off during teeth brushing too!). Another simple hack is to keep bottles or jugs of tap water in the fridge, so you don't need to run the tap until it gets cold enough to drink.

Harvest Recipes

Quick turmeric chicken and mango curry

Ingredients

3 Method Steps

700g chicken thigh fillets, trimmed, quartered

3 tsp ground turmeric

1 tbsp olive or vegetable oil

1 brown onion, cut into thin wedges

2-3 tbsp gluten-free yellow curry paste, to taste

1 zucchini, halved lengthways, thickly sliced crossways

400ml can coconut milk

1 mango, sliced

2 tsp caster sugar

1 tbsp fresh lime juice

Fresh Thai basil sprigs, to serve



Method

Step 1

Combine chicken and turmeric in a shallow dish.

Season.

Step 2

Heat oil in a large deep frying pan over high heat. Cook the onion, tossing, for 2-3 minutes or until soft. Stir in curry paste for 30 seconds or until aromatic. Add the chicken and cook, stirring occasionally, for 3 minutes or until golden. Add zucchini, coconut milk and 250ml (1 cup) water. Bring to the boil. Reduce heat to medium. Simmer, stirring occasionally, for 10 minutes or until slightly reduced.

Step 3

Stir in mango, sugar and lime juice. Top with basil to serve.

Drought Project Funding Flows (cont.)

(through rounds 1-22) to initiatives that are helping communities to tackle the tough times that come with drought.

The program is possible thanks to the support of several donors, including the Australian Government, which committed \$15M to be distributed from 2019-2021.

Natalie Egleton, FRRR's Chief Executive Officer, said these grants will utilise the last tranche of Australian government funding.

"FRRR was grateful to have the support of the Government alongside 15 other donors, as that enabled this program to expand nationally, just at a time when the drought was spreading across the entire country.

"While there have been good rains in places, there are many places that continue to experience severe drought, or are just coming out of drought. Enduring such prolonged dryness is really tough on these communities and their local industries. The pandemic has also meant that many of the fundraising initiatives and events that would normally have brought the community together and injected vital funds into the local economy haven't happened now for 18 months. As a result, some people are more socially-isolated than ever.

"That's why we're so pleased to be able to support these projects at a time when they need it the most. Each of these remote, regional and rural communities has their own complex and individual needs, which is why it's crucial that their support and recovery efforts are community-led.

"The projects being funded in this round range from investing in infrastructure and building organisational capacity, to providing services and developing skills, which really highlights the diverse range of needs in these communities," Ms Egleton said.

Among the groups being funded is **Parachilna Community Association** who are refurbishing a school building, so that it can be used as caretaker residence at the community caravan park. This upgrade to local facilities will help Parachilna to attract tourists, which in turn will help to financially support the community. The \$44,643 grant means they can install and renovate a bathroom, kitchen and living room.

Another organisation receiving funding is **Pikedale Community Inc** for their Drawing Through Drought initiative. This will fund a series of art classes in the rural grazing community of Pikedale, west of Stanthorpe, which will allow the local community to meet, connect, refresh and ease the stress and mental fatigue caused by the hardship of prolonged drought.

Among the other projects funded this round include:

- Country Women's Association of NSW, Walgett NSW – Tranquillity – \$13,860 – To provide a green space of tranquillity that is accessible by wheelchair. Funds will be used for concreting the disability access and installing a rainwater tank and irrigation system for the garden.
- Cunnamulla & District Show Society
 Incorporated, QLD Cunnamulla Show Society
 Multi-Purpose Function Centre, Stage 2 –
 \$145,000 The grant will be used to undertake
 stage 2 of the construction of the new, large multi purpose function centre at the Showgrounds.
- Friends of Yantanabie Incorporated, SA –
 Yantanabie Hall Roof Restoration \$17,050 The
 project aims to restore the roof of the Yantanabie
 Hall. A master builder has assessed that these
 repairs will ensure the structure remains safe for
 future generations and community use.
- Rupanyup & District Consultative Committee,
 VIC Landscaping Rupanyup Community Space
 \$60,000 To create a new community space in
 Rupanyup where community members can gather and relax. Funding will be used to clear the site,
 prepare garden beds, install access and paths, plant trees and shrubs, install an irrigation system, build seating and pergolas.
- Lake Grace Community Men's Shed, WA We Need a Bigger Shed – \$60,000 – This will double the members' workspace by adding another shed to the current one. The increased space will give them separate working areas and the option of including a mezzanine floor and a hoist in the future.



Water Safety on Holiday

Australians love spending time by the water during our holidays, whether it's a summer spent at the beach, an autumn spent fishing or canoeing on the river, or a winter escape to an overseas poolside resort. So how can we stay safe in all of these environments? Read our tips below and enjoy your holidays!

Why is water safety on holidays important?

While holidaying, you may experience aquatic environments you are unfamiliar with or that have changed since your last visit. To enjoy these locations safely, it is important to know the different safety aspects that apply to different aquatic environments. Many aquatic locations away from home, such as rivers, lakes and dams, or pools in holiday or caravan parks do not have lifeguards on duty.

What should I do if I'm holidaying in an unfamiliar aquatic location?

Conditions can change all the time, and a spot that was safe to swim in the morning, may have developed a strong current in the afternoon. Before you enter any water, spend time observing it, looking for any rips or currents. Ask a local about the waterway. Never dive in, and always enter the water slowly, feet first. Never swim alone and ensure children are actively supervised – Keep Watch and be within arms reach.

What steps can I take to keep my family safe when holidaying near the water?

Discuss with your children that they are not to enter the water without a parent present. Explain that even though they may be competent swimmers at home, the conditions can change dramatically in other environments and they need to be aware of this. Be aware of objects in the water, from rocks to water craft. Obey any signs to stay in a designated area. Make sure you do the right thing as children will model their behaviour on you.

What about if I'm visiting a water park?

In exactly the same way as a public pool, lifeguards at

water parks are on hand to ensure that all patrons can enjoy their time at the facility, however this does not mean they are responsible for babysitting young children. Parents must continue to actively supervise children at these venues - this means being within arms reach at all times.

What dangers exist at inland waterways?

Many families enjoy holidays at locations near rivers, lakes and dams. It is important to remember that at these locations the water conditions can change hourly. Areas which did not have a current in the morning may have one in the afternoon. These locations can also present dangers with crumbling or slippery banks, shifting floors, submerged objects, water craft and cold water

What about using equipment such as canoes, kayaks and jet skis on holiday?

If you are going to use equipment such as these items, it is important to have instruction in their use before you enter the water. Check that your craft is well maintained and that you are wearing a lifejacket. Check weather conditions before heading out.

Are You a Cricket Tragic?

West Australian amateur historian Les Everett is on a mission to document the relics of Australia's cricketing past, no matter how many kilometres he has to cover.

He was in Lake Grace this week to discover our hidden gems - luckily for him fellow cricket tragic Andrew Walker has developed an excellent history of old cricket pitches in the Lake Grace area. Always keen for a walk down memory lane, Allan Marshall and Ross Murray did a field trip with Les showing him many old cricket pitches.

So far, he has travelled thousands of kilometres and spent hundreds of hours poring over maps and newspaper archives to locate WA's "lost" cricket pitches. At this stage he has located over 300 old pitches, predominantly in the wheatbelt.

Mr Everett, 65, says each one has a unique story to tell.

Many of those he's found are now overgrown or surrounded by fields of crops that have sprouted in the decades since they last heard the echo of willow striking leather.

"These cricket pitches are a bit like Roman ruins — they're not going to disappear quickly," he said.

"I see it as a celebration of life — even though some places and some towns have totally disappeared and all that's left is a cricket pitch."

The Kalgoorlie-Boulder-born former primary school teacher's quest to document lost pitches began in 2019 after a visit to a ground in Corrigin, in WA's Wheatbelt region, where he played cricket in the 1970s.

Mr Everett hopes to share his journey in a book that will celebrate Australia's forgotten cricket pitches, and hopefully recount stories of the country towns they were once central to.

But first, he still has places to search in the nation's west: the Pilbara, Goldfields and the Great Southern regions are next on his list.

Les is keen to hear any anecdotal stories from our local cricket pitches, perhaps you have a memory from Grandad's playing days. If you have any information then Les would love to hear from you, he can be contacted on 0439 923 304.
