Lake Grace Cricket Club have been working toward replacing their cricket nets for some time and are now enjoying this fantastic facility at their Thursday trainings.

The previous nets were constructed as a joint project in 1980 by the Lake Grace and North Lake Grace Cricket Clubs; their Presidents at the time were Michael Gray and Arthur Slarke. Although these nets have stood the test of time over 40 years of being hammered by cricket balls, it was definitely time for an upgrade.

Club President Kael Gray has been busy (and successful) with grant applications for the \$65k project.

Australian Cricket Infrastructure Fund put \$25k toward the project, the Shire of Lake Grace contributed \$10k, Community Cropping \$5k and the cricket club and local business contributed to the remainder. The Lake Grace Cricket Club would like to thank McKenzie Concreting for donating the concrete, Ed and Theresa Naisbitt for donating the sand, Ken Gray and Co for donating gravel and the mesh for the pad and Trevenen Earthmoving for constructing the sand pad and ripping down the old nets.

Undoubtedly the new nets are flash, but safety issues have also been addressed with the Club getting Astro turf over the whole surface rather than just a strip down the middle; much better and safer for the bowlers as there's none of the slip risk that can happen on

New Regulations to Make Funeral Costs Clearer

Funeral companies operating in Western Australia will be legally required to publicly display prices, enabling funeral organisers to access information upfront, compare costs and avoid the need to meet with a representative of the funeral company to obtain this information.

The Funeral Pricing Code of Practice brings to an end unscrupulous sales practices relating to 'bundled packages'.

The pricing and contracts in these packages often resulted in funeral organisers not understanding the total costs involved, with some optional items misrepresented as mandatory. In many previous cases, the final cost of the funeral was unknown until after it was held, leading family and friends of the deceased to believe they were overcharged.

More information on the Funeral Pricing Code of Practice is on the Consumer Protection website. A sixmonth period will be allowed for companies to put measures in place to comply with the new code, but they are encouraged to comply as soon as possible.

The Code will become mandatory from 1 May 2023.

Consumer confusion over pricing led to the McGowan Government initiating funeral industry reforms and building upon the introduction of a mandatory Prepaid

Funerals Code of Practice, which came into effect in WA on 1 March 2021.

This code provides for greater clarity and certainty surrounding prepaid funeral contracts and requires all goods and services to be detailed, prices to be fixed at the time of signing the contract and a 30-day cooling off period.

Payments to prepaid funeral funds need to be managed within secure investments under the name of the client until they are required.



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Making Australia Home

Alex Jesaulenko was born in a refugee camp near Salzburg, Austria in August 1945. Later, his family was selected for migration to Australia under the International Refugee Organisation (IRO) resettlement scheme. In the process, the family's surname picked up a 'J', becoming 'Jesaulenko' instead of the original 'Esaulenko'.

On 30 July 1949, 4-year-old Alex, his parents Wasyl and Wira (Vera) and younger brother Viktor arrived in Melbourne onboard the Skaugum. The family was initially sent to the Bonegilla Migrant Reception Centre near Wodonga in northern Victoria. From there, they settled in Canberra. Alex was naturalised in 1962.

It was in Canberra that Alex's talent for Aussie Rules football was first noticed. Alex was recruited by major Melbourne team Carlton and debuted in the Victorian Football League (VFL) in 1967. His coach at Carlton was football legend Ron Barassi.

Alex went on to play 256 games for Carlton, kicking 424 goals. He was part of 4 Carlton premiership-winning teams, including as captain-coach in 1979. Alex is particularly remembered for his athleticism. Famously, during the 1970 VFL Grand Final, he took the 'mark of the century'. Alex spectacularly leapt over the back of a 6-foot-4 (193 cm) Collingwood player to grab the ball in


mid-air. 'Ohhh Jesaulenko, you beauty!' exclaimed commentator Mike Williamson. Alex was transformed into a household name.

In 1979, Alex was awarded a 'gong' by the Queen for services to Australian Rules football. He was inducted into the Australian Football Hall of Fame in 1996 and officially declared a legend of the game in 2008.

Approximately 5,000 Ukrainian 'displaced persons' found refuge in Australia between 1948 and 1954. Their homeland had been devastated by years of war and totalitarian domination. During the 'Holodomor' ('terrorfamine') of 1932/33, millions of Ukrainians starved to death while the Soviets exported grain from the country. Millions more perished during the War as the Nazis, Soviets and their local allies fought for control over the resource-rich country.

By 1945, some 2 million Ukrainians were 'displaced persons', mainly in Germany. Many had been forcibly deported there by the Nazis as slave labour. Others had fled westward as the Soviet Red Army reconquered Ukraine.

Stan Perron in His Own Words—Part One

State Library of Western Australia

This story is based on the oral history of Stan Perron AC.

My full name is Lloyd, L L 0 Y D, Stanley Perron. I was born in King Edward Hospital, Subiaco in November 1922.

My father's name was Anthony of unknown descent. He said his mother came from Budapest and he was born at sea. He wasn't very well educated. He could read all right but he had a shaky hand and couldn't write. He was generally a semi-labouring type. He wasn't a professional by any means.

My mother Edith was of Italian descent and her parents ran a boarding house in Fremantle. She was fairly well educated, or so she told me. In her early days, she was a waitress at the Palace Hotel in Perth and waited on people like Harry Boan, Sir James Mitchell, Tommy Chandler, and Claude de Bernales. She said it was not unusual after serving a table, to have half a sovereign left under the plate which was rather a generous tip in those days.

I don't remember much about the early days of my life living in Carlisle. We lived on the corner of Weston and Archer Streets on an acre. The streets were made of two rows of sleepers with a gap in the middle for a car to drive down. The Kersleys used to drive their trotters up and down our street for training, as it was all sand except for the sleepers.

Our home had several fruit trees, a vegetable garden, and a windmill in the yard so we always had plenty of water. I don't remember much of family life there, only that it was generally a fairly happy one. My parents would argue a fair amount but they lived together and I suppose it was the normal squabbles that went on.

I can't remember my father playing with me to any degree. At the start of the Depression he went prospecting to Kalgoorlie around Bardoc and Kookynie. So he was away from home quite a lot and I spent a lot of time with my mother. We got along fairly well and she always encouraged me to get out and do things. I'm still that way today, I always like to be busy.

My brother and some of his friends made a tin canoe, and we would carry it from Carlisle across to the Sandringham Hotel. There was a little place called The Springs to launch our canoe and sometimes we would go across to Maylands aerodrome. I can remember the old Vickers Aircraft there. It looked as though it was sheeted with small corrugated ripple iron and it was the mail plane in those early days.

Well I know things were pretty tough during the Depression. People would come and knock at the door and want to chop wood for a shilling. But as a boy I was fed and clothed all right and my mother was very economical. She was a very capable housekeeper. I don't know where the money came from but she must have had savings which we lived on. From what I remember she allowed herself 25 shillings a week.

I first started school at Carlisle Infants School when I

was five years old. I had a teacher Miss Richards and she had a single-seater Baby Austin car. I remember the best pupil in the class for the day she'd take them home in her Baby Austin car. Evidently I was one of the best pupils because I quite often rode home in Miss Richards car.

I was in first standard at school when we moved out to Statham Siding in the Helena Valley.

Helena Valley was a pleasant little valley near Helena River. We would go swimming in the river, and when we come out we always had to pull the leeches off. My brother could swim and all the other kids could, but I for some reason I never got the hang of it. Although I had a boat after that for 40 odd years, I couldn't ever swim any more than about 20 or 30 yards.

There were about twenty-odd students at school, and our room ran from infants through to sixth standard. Our teacher Miss Pollard taught us very well. We had a sunrise garden outside where each pupil had a garden to look after. It was like a ray of sunshine in the shape of an arc

Going into Perth was always quite an event and we would park at Scotts Garage to go to the pictures. We would also sometimes picnic in Government or Queen's Gardens. The Causeway in those days was quite different, it had a big hump in the middle. The Rivervale railway crossing had lights on it and there were always accidents. The old Red Castle Brewery was just nearby.

At about fourth standard I returned to Carlisle School and then went to Perth Boys School for a few months before we moved to Beria outside of Laverton where my father got a job at Lancefield Gold Mine. I was eleven years old.

My mother had been in other mining towns before, but that was my first experience and it was tough. We had a house of sorts. Just a kitchen with a bedroom, bathroom and verandah. There were no floors, only earth covered with filter press which came from the mine. It was like a thick canvas.

Eventually my brother Keith joined us in Beria to work underground in the mine. He left to go prospecting after a fatal accident in which a couple of his mates were killed. Energetic and able to do most things like me, Keith eventually went to Darwin where he became a master plumber.

There was a hotel and a store in Laverton and they would bring our supplies out to Beria, once a week. I remember in those days you could collect Bushells tea labels and earn a tea towel. And for so many Nestles milk labels you'd get something else. I would go through the rubbish heaps and pick up all the labels, cans and bottles. Bottles were always very valuable in those days, a halfpenny each.

I worked for a greengrocer in Laverton. The same greengrocers where I would go to get thistles for my pet rabbit. I suppose that's how I got the relationship. I would ride around on the greengrocer's cart, helping him

sell his vegetables. But life was really pretty dull really, there was no picture theatre or anything to go to, and there were no radios.

Living in Beria was a turning point in my life and made me realise how tough things could be. At aged twelve I was beginning to take notice of what went on, and beginning to think that life must be better than this, that there could be a better life. I decided that I should try and do better.

I'd learnt fretwork at Carlisle School (decorative woodwork) and used to make handkerchief boxes, letter racks and things. My prime customers were the chaps who lived in these camps. It was no big business, but I probably made five shillings a week out of it. I always keen to make money or save money. Anything to get a few extra shillings. There was not much pocket money around at home.

My fretwork business ended when I went to Boulder School for seventh standard. I boarded with Mrs Monagham a friend of my mother's until my family moved there, and was quite commonly known as the little boy from Woop Woop.

My teacher's name was Mr Wauchaup. I was pretty bright because I'd been to Perth Boys School for a few months, so halfway through seventh standard they put me into eighth standard. I topped Boulder School in 1936.

I was always keen on arithmetic and I think everybody should know their tables. I've insisted on my three children as they've been growing up to learn their tables and sometimes used them as a penalty for doing something wrong.

Still interested in earning a quid, my odd jobs in Boulder included delivering cans of cream (up to 30 cans) in a square baker's basket on a bike. You'd prop the bike up against the fence when you went in to deliver the cream and collect the money. Occasionally the bike would fall over and if you lost a can of cream well, you'd have to open all the other cans and take a little out of each to make up for the lost one. We would get five shillings for the morning's work, which being a school boy was quite good money.

My mother wanted me to do high school but I don't think

it did me any harm leaving school at fourteen, but I must say I'm a little bit different to most people. I've always believed that a person should be employed on their ability to do things and use common sense, not just on education.

On leaving school my prime objective was to get a job and earn some money. I got a job initially as an office boy with J & W Bateman. They were wholesale grocery merchants in Kalgoorlie, and I was getting 15 shillings a week.

Then I saw this other job advertised at produce merchants Allen and Brimage, and I went and had an interview with the manager Mr. Devine. He said he wanted a junior clerk and that I should go to night school and learn book-keeping, which I did for six months. He offered me a job at 25 shillings a week and a rise of five shillings a week every six months. When I left I was getting about £3.10 a week, which was reasonably good money.

Christmas – New Year 2022-2023 public holiday information

Wageline has published comprehensive information on public holiday pay and arrangements for state system employers and employees for the public holidays over the Christmas New Year period.

This season's public holidays are:

- Christmas Day, Sunday 25 December 2022 and Monday 26 December 2022

Industrial inspectors are now issuing compliance notices

In June 2022, new compliance and enforcement provisions were introduced that provided enhanced powers and a new range of compliance tools that can be used by industrial inspectors.

These new tools include the ability for industrial inspectors to issue compliance notices, infringement notices, and to enter into enforceable undertakings. Recently, industrial inspectors have commenced issuing compliance notices.

Compliance notices are only issued where an industrial inspector has a reasonable belief that an employer has failed to meet all or part of its employer obligations (such as failing to pay the minimum wage). A

compliance notice requires an employer to take specific action to rectify contraventions (such as rectifying identified underpayments) within a specified timeframe. If you receive a compliance notice, it is important that you take action. Failure to comply with a compliance notice can lead to penalties of up to \$6,000 for an individual and \$30,000 for a body corporate, in addition to any underpayment of wages that may need to be rectified.

Underpayments recovered for WA employees in 2021-22

In the 2021/22 financial year, Private Sector Labour Relations industrial inspectors recovered \$797,977 in unpaid wages and leave entitlements for employees covered by state employment laws.

A total of 216 complaints lodged with Private Sector Labour Relations resulted in \$514,693 being recovered for employees, with a further \$197,367 recovered through ongoing proactive compliance campaigns in the café and restaurant sector, the horticulture industry and the hairdressing industry.

Four enforcement proceedings in the Industrial Magistrates Court were finalised during the financial year, resulting in civil penalties of \$25,500 and \$1,167 in disbursement costs.








The Stitched and Bound exhibition opened on Sunday 13th November and there has been plenty of oohing and aahing since.

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
Book Review: The Bellbird River Country Choir by Sophie Green

STATION NEWS

WA Police's Special Crime Division (SCD) has put out the call for old telephone books and street directories, which can help police investigating the State's oldest unsolved crimes. Leading a project to expand the Division's intelligence reference library is Detective Senior Constable George Kopsen who said the books are redundant to most people within 12 months, but they provide a valuable research tool for detectives and intel analysts working on historical cases, including homicides and sex assaults. "They provide us with a snapshot in time and can assist in the identification, location, and association (ILA) of suspects, victims, witnesses, organisations, and places," he said.

SCD has recently acquired more than 80 telephone directories dating back to 1971, including some editions not held by the State Library of Western Australia. A collection of old street directories has also been commenced, with digitization of some resources underway. "We would really appreciate donations of any telephone directories or maps issued prior to 2016, particularly Telecom/Telstra White pages, Yellow pages, Phone discs, or UBDs, whether they are from Perth metro, Regional WA, or even interstate," Det. SC Kopsen added.

If you have any of these items laying around your home we'd be happy to take them off your hands and will forward them along to SCD.

CRIME NEWS

There has been little in the way of reported crime these last few weeks. The only one of note is a burglary at the Kondinin IGA. The suspect forced entry into the store and stole cash and cigarettes.

Scott attended the scene and a number of items of forensic value were tested. We're currently waiting to hear back on the results.

TRAFFIC NEWS

Lake Grace Police in conjunction with Corrigin, Kondinin, and Wickepin Police conducted a heavy vehicle operation in Corrigin last week. Also present were vehicle inspectors from Main Roads and the Department of Transport. The Main Roads and the Department of Transport inspectors had a busy day and inspected close to 30 trucks and their trailers. They issued several infringements and cautions for various offences. The main issues were from trucks with roadworthiness defects that should have been rectified prior to them being used on the road.

Throughout the day we conducted 250 breath tests and several roadside drug tests. Only one driver was found to be driving under the influence of drugs and a search of their vehicle resulted in a drug seizure. The driver had their licence suspended on the spot and they will be summonsed to court.

Whilst on patrol near Katanning recently we came across a driver whose licence was suspended. They had a medical condition that required them to complete an annual medical test and forward the results to the Department of Transport. The driver had not done this prior to the required date so the Department of Transport sent them a letter giving them a short period of time to complete the assessment or their licence would be suspended. As you can guess, this wasn't done and they continued to drive. We charged the driver with No Authority To Drive and their vehicle was impounded for 28 days.

On our return trip that same day we encountered a driver leaving Lake Grace heading towards Dumbleyung. He was travelling at 134kph in the 110kph zone. After stopping him we found he had been drinking and he returned a breath alcohol result of 0.91%. His licence was suspended on the spot and he was summonsed to court for drink driving and speeding.


