## A Century of Not Forgetting

The centenary of Armistice Day was always going to be an emotional occasion; with an incomprehensible 15 to 19 million combatant and civilian lives lost during the four years and four months that World War I lasted.

The assassination of an Austrian prince and his wife would be the precursor to a war involving nations from across the globe. The bloom of youth were to fight a kind of warfare that had never been experienced before, loss of life was coupled with over 20 million wounded. Many servicemen were left with catastrophic physical and mental injuries.

World War I was the motivator behind the early beginnings of plastic surgery due to horrendous shrapnel and burn injuries. It also brought about social change and the definition of gender roles was turned on its head.

With Lake Grace having twenty eight men on their World War I honour roll a joint project between the Shire of Lake Grace, Lake Grace District High School, Lake Grace Men's Shed and the Lake Grace Artist's Group was initiated.

Funding was received via an Armistice Centenary Grant from the Department of Veteran's Affairs. This funding was put toward visual displays including displays featuring individual World War I and World War II veterans. These displays were created by school students, printed and then framed

Silhouettes were also created; these are a representation of the branches of the armed services; encompassing all of those who have served.

Armistice Day fell on a Sunday with the service in Lake Grace well attended. Ross Chappell welcomed everyone before introducing cadet Jessica Chircop to recite the prayer. Further recitals were conducted by fellow cadets Cade Moore and Leila Lemin with the commemorative address being given by Suzanne Reeves (p.32 & 33). This was followed by the laying of wreaths and the recital of the Ode by Phyllis Dunham.

The flag was raised and with the ceremony having finished ahead of time the Last Post was played during the shared lunch at the Art Space.

# The Gift of Giving

Christmas came early for the volunteers who create blankets and soft toys for the Wheelchairs for Kids charity; it may seem like we are doing the giving but like most charitable ventures the reward for the volunteers is so great it's hard to measure. Twenty came along for the presentation by Bill Culbertson, a long term volunteer for Wheelchairs for Kids; everyone got to enjoy a fabulous morning tea put on by the CWA ladies.

Bill brings along a wheelchair, displays and copies of 'The Drill', the Wheelchairs for Kids' official magazine, for everyone to look at. The magazine includes stories about some of the children who have received the wheelchairs, demonstrating how a \$200 wheelchair has changed their lives and opened up a realm of possibilities for them and their families.

In 20 years over 42,000 chairs, accompanied by blankets and cuddle toys have been shipped around the world to 80 countries, Vietnam is by far the biggest recipient.

The wheelchairs are adjustable, all-terrain, fully cushioned with postural support devices. Occupational Therapists are there for the handover of the wheelchair to ensure that it is fitted correctly to the recipient.

Wheelchairs for Kids will be sending us a pattern and fabric for the backrest for the chairs, for those who aren't into the knitting or crochet then sewing might be more your thing. If you would like to be involved by all means contact the CRC.

Seventy four blankets were produced locally along with 20 cuddle toys, this was a phenomenal effort from our local ladies. Thank you to those who have donated yarn to be used for the blankets, some of the funding for this years blankets came from the CRC while the remainder came from a Bankwest grant so thank you Bankwest!

We are always looking for sponsors so if you would like to donate some money then we are only too happy to take it off your hands. Along with our donations of yarn we also received donations of wool; this wool will be turned into a blanket which will be raffled to raise more funds. Thank you also to Alison Culbertson who donated a large bag of yarn that will kick start 2019's production line.

The group will take a hiatus over the warmer months (though I'm sure the needles and hooks are still hard at work) but will come back together in April of next year. If you would like to be involved we would love to hear from you.

# “Come Fly a Kite” a Successful Day

It's not often that windy days bring a smile to so many faces but that's exactly what happened on Saturday at the Lake Grace Pavilion where children were flying kites they made themselves for the 'Come Fly a Kite' day. The breezy day resulted in perfect conditions for the kites to fly high above the excited crowd of happy faces.

The Shire of Lake Grace received funding for the event from the Department of Communities Youth Engagement Grants Program. These are provided for local governments and community service organisations to implement projects that engage young people in creative ways and help achieve positive outcomes for local people.

The Shire applied for the grant in May 2018 and in October received the funding to hold two kite creating and flying kites

events. The Lake Grace one was held Saturday 17 November and Newdegate on Sunday 18 November. Catering for a sausage sizzle was organised by the Lake Grace Canberra Camp Fundraising Committee and in Newdegate, it was put together by the P&C.

Michael and Jan Alvares from Kite Kinetics in Leederville conducted the workshop, helping the children to create colourful and eye-catching displays. You can view their website at <http://www.kitekinetics.com.au/>

Kites have a very old history. Originating from China, they were invented in the 5th Century by BC Chinese philosophers Mozi and Lu Ban. Consisting of silk for the sailing material as well as a fine, high-tensile-strength silk for the flying line, bamboo made up the strong yet lightweight framework. Whilst modern times see kites as a recreational hobby, they have had varied roles in the past. Using them as a signaling mechanism in battles, helping meteorologists take aerial photographs, and even proving that lightning was electricity by the aid of a kite by Benjamin Franklin in 1752, they have certainly come in handy in the past. Nowadays they are not only a child's toy, but many adults enjoy flying them as well.

Who would have thought that an invention from many centuries ago would still be in use today as a plaything? If the 'Come Fly a Kite' day is anything to go by, kites will remain popular with young and old in to the foreseeable future.

## News From CWA

Another year is coming to a close for CWA and it has been a busy one. The blankets for Wheelchairs for Kids have been handed over and the members are mustering for a stall this week. Funds raised from the stall will go toward value adding to the playground behind the CWA.

CWA has owned the full quarter acre block that their building and the playground are situated on since the 1950s. Recognising that the town needed a playground for its children and that their building only took a portion of the block the Lake Grace branch formed a gentleman's agreement with the Shire.

Mr Colquhoun, who was the Shire Clerk at the time, engineered that the Shire would take responsibility for the playground and in return for the use of the land would reimburse the CWA for any water costs and land rates.

Although this arrangement would have been minuted at the time there has not been a formal MOU during that 60 years. Over the years the Shire has managed the playground, replacing equipment as needed. However times have changed and with a need for more checks and balances in place the Shire can't have a playground on land that doesn't come under their jurisdiction. On the flipside, CWA of WA don't feel that management of a playground is CWA core business.

With the playground being so central and so popular

the ideal solution is that the Shire and CWA work out a lease agreement for the area in question.

Lake Grace branch is always looking for projects so have elected to do some fundraising to value add to the playground in question. With much of the branch's fundraising efforts and projects being directed to other regions or countries it is nice to do something that will benefit the locals.

CWA are looking for input as to what needs doing in the playground, if you would like to be involved we would love to hear from you.

Other news is that the Senior Citizens luncheons will be going back to being a monthly event in 2019; a big thank you to Danielle Robertson, Fiona Chatfield and Annie Argent who have put their hands up. They will do this under the umbrella of one of the many groups they are involved in; if there's another group out there who would also like to be involved then please don't hesitate to contact us.

In 2019 Lake Grace branch will be trialling a free 'membership' for new members. There will be no membership as such but you will get to see what makes the branch tick, come to meetings and decide if you would like to remain involved. We will hold alternate meetings at 5pm to make the branch more accessible to everyone.

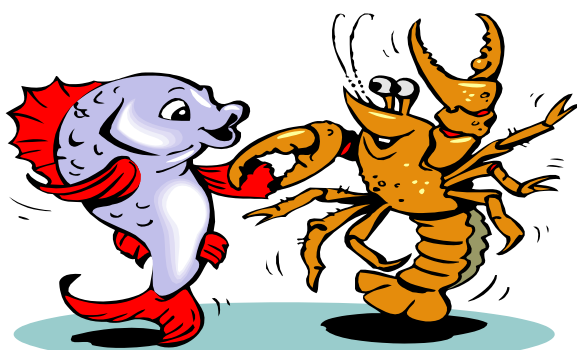

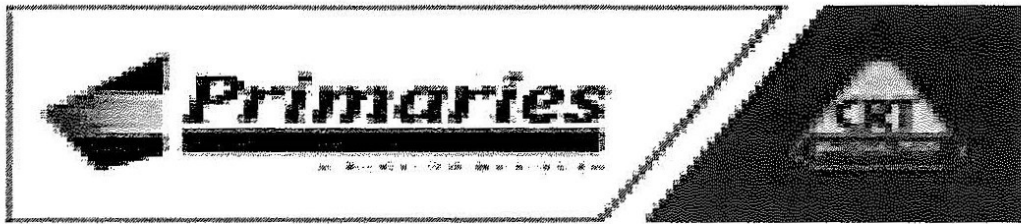

# Treating Snake Bite

That bite of summer has well and truly come this year and with that heat, comes snakes. Many sightings have been reported.

- 3000 bites are reported annually
- 300-500 hospitalisations
- 2-3 deaths annually.

Average time to death is 12 hours. The urban myth that you are bitten in the yard and die before you can walk from your chook pen back to the house is a load of rubbish.

While not new, the management of snake bite (like a flood/fire evacuation plan or CPR) should be refreshed each season.

Let's start with a Basic overview.

There are five genus of snakes that will harm us (seriously). Browns, Blacks, Adders, Tigers and Taipans.

All snake venom is made up of huge proteins (like egg white). When bitten, a snake injects some venom into the meat of your limb (NOT into your blood).

This venom can not be absorbed into the blood stream from the bite site. It travels in a fluid transport system in



your body called the lymphatic system (not the blood stream).

Now this fluid (lymph) is moved differently to blood. Your heart pumps blood around, so even when you are lying dead still, your blood still circulates around the body. Lymph fluid is different. It moves around with physical muscle movement like bending your arm, bending knees, wriggling fingers and toes, walking/exercise etc.

Now here is the thing. Lymph fluid becomes blood after these lymph vessels converge to form one of two large vessels (lymphatic trunks) which are connected to veins at the base of the neck.

Back to the snake bite site. When bitten, the venom has been injected into this lymph fluid (which makes up the bulk of the water in your tissues).

The only way that the venom can get into your blood stream is to be moved from the bite site in the lymphatic vessels. The only way to do this is to physically move the limbs that were bitten.

Stay still!!!! Venom can't move if the victim doesn't move. Stay still!!! Remember people are not bitten into their blood stream.

In the 1980s a technique called Pressure immobilisation bandaging was developed to further retard venom movement. It completely stops venom /lymph transport toward the blood stream.

A firm roll bandage is applied directly over the bite site (don't wash the area).

## Technique:

Three steps: keep them still

**Step 1:** Apply a bandage over the bite site, to an area about 10cm above and below the bite.

**Step 2:** Then using another elastic roller bandage, apply a firm wrap from Fingers/toes all the way to the armpit/groin.

The bandage needs to be firm, but not so tight that it causes fingers or toes to turn purple or white. About the tension of a sprain bandage.

**Step 3:** Splint the limb so the patient can't walk or

bend the limb.

### Do nots:

- Do not cut, incise or suck the venom.
- Do not EVER use a tourniquet
- Don't remove the shirt or pants - just bandage over the top of clothing. Remember movement (like wriggling out of a shirt or pants) causes venom movement.
- DO NOT try to catch, kill or identify the snake!!! This is important.

In hospital we NO LONGER NEED to know the type of snake; it doesn't change treatment.

Five years ago we would do a test on the bite, blood or urine to identify the snake so the correct anti venom can be used.

BUT NOW...we don't do this. Our new Antivenom neutralises the venoms of all the five listed snake genus, so it doesn't matter what snake bit the patient.

Read that again- one injection for all snakes! Polyvalent is our one shot wonder, stocked in all hospitals, so most hospitals no longer stock specific

Antivenins.

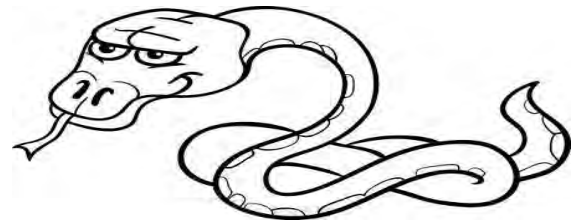
Australian snakes tend to have three main effects in differing degrees.

- Bleeding - internally and bruising.
- Muscles paralysed causing difficulty talking, moving & breathing.
- Pain. With some snake bites there will be severe muscle pain in the limb, and days later the bite site can break down forming a nasty wound.

Allergy to snakes is rarer than winning lotto twice.

Final tips: not all bitten people are envenomated and only those starting to show symptoms above are given antivenom.

Did I mention to stay still?

# Men and Cancer

*Regional Men's Health - Brenden and the Team*



Men in Australia are much more likely to be diagnosed with and die from cancer than women. In fact, according to the Cancer Council of WA the lifetime cancer risk is 1 in 2 for men and 1 in 3 for women. Men are over represented in all gender shared cancers including the most common - lung, bowel and skin. The experience of cancer in one form or another is never good, but it does beg the question, why the gender disparity? There is no simple answer, but we do know that men in general are less likely to visit their GP to report or act on any unusual symptoms or changes.

Cancer is a disease driven by changes in our DNA/ genes which causes a group of abnormal cells to divide and grow out of control. It usually occurs in a specific spot but can spread to other parts of the body. We are still some ways from finding a cure, but we do know that finding cancer early improves our chances of successful treatment and long-term survival. For the average bloke general things that warrant a chat with a GP could include:

- unusual lumps or a sore that isn't healing properly;
- unusual changes in our testicles – changes in shape, consistency or a lump;
- A persistent cough or hoarseness, coughing up blood;
- unexplained weight loss;

- moles that have changed shape, size or colour, or bleed, or an inflamed skin sore that hasn't healed;
- blood in a bowel motion;
- persistent changes in toilet habits or urinary problems or changes.

It is important to note that these symptoms are likely to be related to more common, less serious health problems. However, we still need to discuss them to ease our concerns or pick up something early rather than later.

Unfortunately, it is often only when blokes find they are progressed with cancer that they actually start to think about modifying their behaviour and making healthy changes. So, what can men do to prevent or lessen our chances of developing cancer?

- Stop smoking – lung cancer is the leading cause of cancer death in Australian men;
- Be SunSmart – protect ourselves in the sun and take care not to burn;
- Stay in shape – aim for a healthy body weight, watch our waistline;
- Move more – be physically active for at least 30 minutes on most or all days;
- Eat for health – A varied diet with lots of fruit/ vegetables and limit red meat;
- Limit alcohol – no more than two standard drinks a day and try to have one or two alcohol-free days a week;
- Have a chat with our GP about our prostate especially if we are over 45 years;
- Use the Bowel Screen Kit when it arrives in the mail;
- Get to know our family history of cancer.

Remember it's our health, if we have any concerns or questions, we need to go and chat with a GP, don't wait and leave it till it's too late.

## CEO's Corner

### Flooding Event

The contractors are nearing completion of outstanding works, it is anticipated that we will have the works, with the exception of culvert cleaning finished prior to December. The work outstanding is as follows;

## Harvest Road Safety

## 80km Restrictions - Gravel Roads

- Vehicles seen driving without caution will be reported.

Always be aware of what is behind you and ensure that any traffic will not collide with you if you slow down in a dust cloud.

# Bushfire Season Approaching

## Media Statement

Emergency Services Minister Francis Logan is warning Western Australians to take immediate action to prepare themselves, their family and their property for bushfires this summer.

The warning comes as wildfires in California, USA, have taken the lives of at least 50 people, with many more still missing and more than 9,200 homes and buildings destroyed.

Touring Perth's fire-prone eastern suburbs today, Mr Logan stressed to residents that preparation was the best line of defence against the inevitability of fire.

Last year 5,000 fires raged across Western Australia, burning a total of 4.5 million hectares of bush. This is equal to seven times the Perth metropolitan area.

The Minister joined local Bushfire Ready groups to inspect a well-prepared property in Bullsbrook.

To prepare your property start by trimming trees, cutting long grass, clearing gutters and removing any debris or rubbish from around your home. Put together an emergency kit ready to go in case you are evacuated or cut off during a bushfire including essential supplies such as an AM radio, spare batteries, torch, first-aid kit, woollen blanket, water and non-perishable food.

Regardless of whether you are staying or leaving, preparing an emergency kit can save precious time during an emergency as well as having a five-minute 'Fire Chat' with your family.

"Western Australians know all too well the devastating and potentially deadly impact fires can have.

"No one can afford to be complacent.

"Volunteer and career firefighters do an amazing job trying to protect communities during a bushfire but there will never be enough of them to knock on every door and save every home.

"People need to take action now to prepare themselves, their family and their property by having a five-minute Fire Chat and creating a plan using the Bushfire Preparation Toolkit.

"Take 30 minutes right now to plan what you will do during a bushfire because leaving it to the last minute could be deadly."

# Lions Information Bay Revamp

As was pointed out in the previous edition of the LLNs in the Shire Council notes, the Information Bay at Lions Park has had a facelift.

No new information or maintenance has been carried out, or had necessarily been required in the near 30 years since Lions established the I Bay (Information Bay). However, the time had come for renewal, so Lions applied to the Lake Grace Shire for Community grant funding for the 2017 application period, this being Lions Clubs International Centennial year.

Being successful with the grant, Lions engaged local artist Michelle Slarke to freshly design and seek out current information for inclusion on both the Lake Grace townsite and the whole of Shire boards. For the latter, the Shire boundary has been adjusted in the intervening period.

The manufacturing of the signage was carried out by Jason Signmakers in Welshpool using digital printing and vinyl covering methods.

The main structural maintenance was contracted to Lawrie Dickins. This entailed removing the roof, stripping the sheeting, sandblasting and repainting the frame. Due to rusting on the overlap, the old tin sheets



were replaced with new full length sheets.

A good turnout of Lions members was present when it came time to prepare the upright structure for fresh paint. Finally the new information boards were stuck to frames for display on Saturday 27-10-2018. Well done lads!

A footnote:

Lions are looking for suggestions as to what could be displayed on the vacant rear side of the display boards.



This feature idea wasn't a part of the original project; however interest in the I Bay could be enhanced by utilising the extra space. Lions could fit up the original boards exposing the blank side where paintings, photographs or other items of interest could be displayed most likely on a temporary rotating basis. 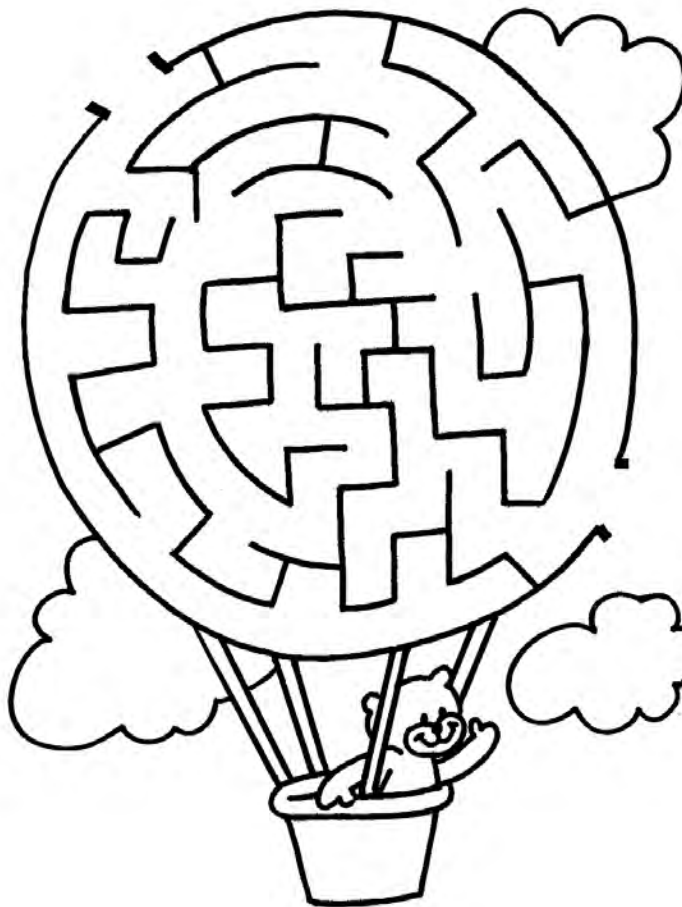

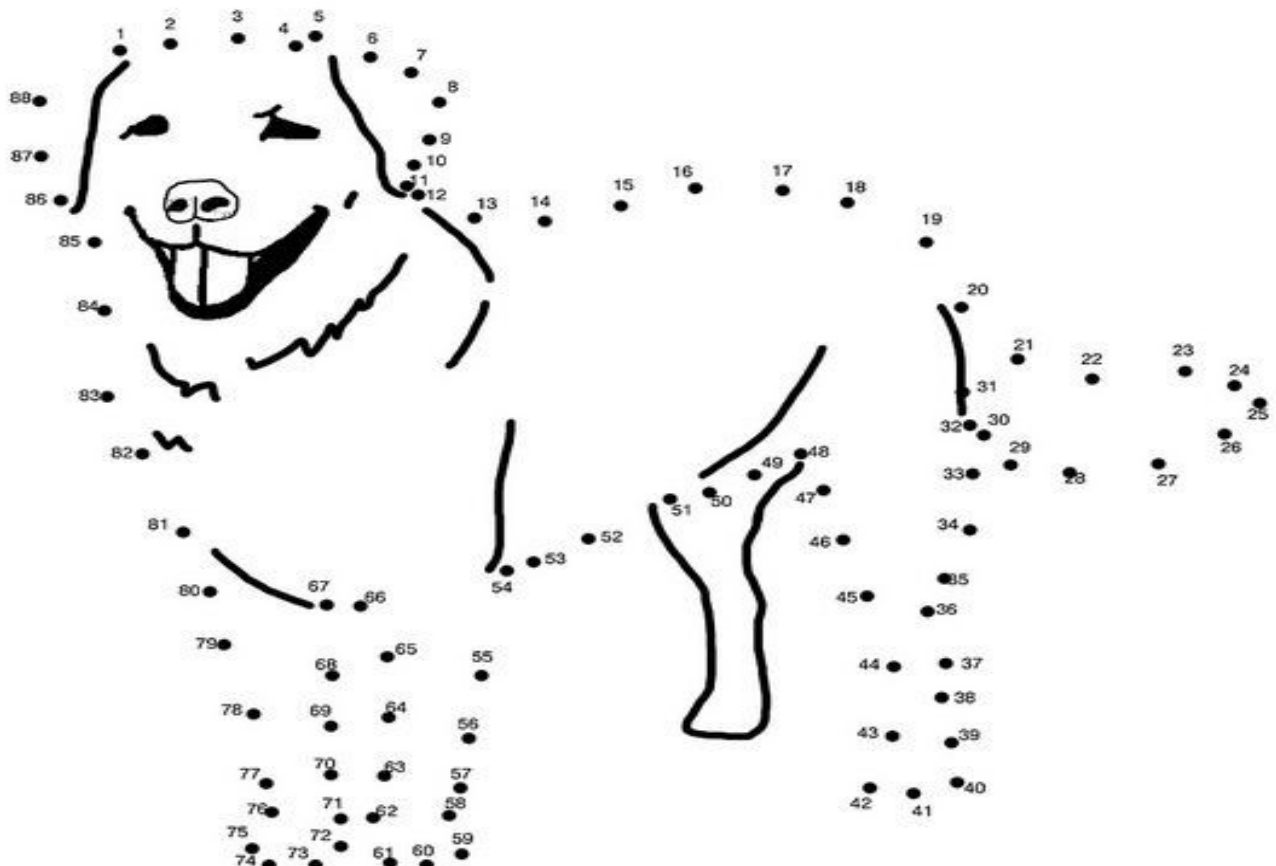

# Commemorative Address

Suzanne Reeves

I would like to thank you for the privilege of being able to speak at this event marking 100 years of the end of what was supposed to be the war to end all wars. Every war has its terrors of what humanity can do to itself but I understand that this war left indelible scars that crossed generations.

For Australia, the First World War remains the costliest conflict in terms of deaths and casualties. From a population of fewer than five million, 416,809 men enlisted, of whom more than 60,000 were killed and 156,000 wounded, gassed, or taken prisoner.

This war entered every town and every household in Australia and unfortunately it never ended for some. I always wondered how those left at home managed with the uncertainty of knowing whether their loved ones were safe.

My great grandparents William (snr) and Martha Oliver and family moved from Wickopin to Lake Grace in 1914, in August of that year war broke out between Germany and England with Australia pledging their support for Mother England. Within six weeks William (snr) and Martha's second born son, Norman Leslie had enlisted; he was part of the doomed Gallipoli campaign. When Les, as he was more commonly known, was invalided back to Australia for medical treatment in late 1915 I'm sure the family breathed a sigh of relief.

That relief would have been short-lived though as he was considered well enough in early 1916 to be sent to the European battlefields. In May 1916 oldest son Alf also enlisted with third son William, my grandfather, following suit in December of that same year.

By mid 1917 all three of the Oliver brothers were a part of the European campaign; like an intricate chess game they always seemed to be moving in a different direction. The time lag in communications meant that both Alf and William were unaware their brother Les had been badly wounded in September and shipped back to England. Around this time William was shipped from England to France to take up duties as a stretcher bearer. Within a week Alf had been shot and was in an American hospital on the sea shores of France recovering. In a letter to his mother he talks about 'how nice it is to walk down to the beach and watch the ships come in'.

The content of correspondence was quite ordinary, talking about the food, the weather and wondering how the crops were going. Alf sent humorous postcards to younger brother Tommy, telling him to work hard at school and asking after his puppies.

When I look at the studio photographs of the brothers taken before their European adventure, I see handsome healthy young men; bright eyed and looking forward to the promise of what life would bring. I doubt that farm life in Wickopin and Lake Grace prepared them for trench warfare and the unspeakable sights that I'm sure they never forgot.

War by nature is a despicable thing but it brought out incredible acts of bravery. There is the bravery of Les whose actions on the 26th September 1917 earned him the Military Medal but eventually cost him his life, perhaps that wounded comrade he brought back to safety survived and went on to lead a full life. There is the bravery of Alf who although he had a little stutter and went AWOL for an extra days leave returned to the front until the end of the war. There was the bravery of my grandfather who as a stretcher-bearer was unarmed but responsible for the lives of so many. When the Germans unleashed mustard gas, William put his gas mask on a patient, who had lost his mask rather than keep it for himself. Although this permanently damaged William's lungs, when the future isn't guaranteed the here and now would have been what was important.

There was also the bravery of the families back home, William and Martha had seven other children and a farm to run. It would have been difficult knowing that two of your sons had been wounded, but were on the other side of the world. The family received a telegram on 29th October stating that Les was dangerously ill and had been transferred to King George Military Hospital on the 15th. When Les succumbed to his injuries in early November it was devastating, shiny medals and accolades were of little comfort. With the lag in information he would have been buried before they knew he had died.

Did William snr and Martha take solace from the empathy displayed by fellow farmer Paddy McMahon when he planted three gum trees at Neendaling siding to represent the three Oliver brothers who had enlisted?

Of the three brothers Les was the only one to nominate his mother as next of kin. When she made enquiries to the Australian Imperial Force about his effects she was asked in return mail that although she was listed as next of kin for Les, they desired to know whether he had any closer blood relatives than herself, for instance was his father still alive? Martha dutifully returned William's information, knowing full well this was the only way she would get what she wanted.

Although the war ended in 1918 it was 1919 before William and Alf returned to Australia. Les of course never returned, buried in Brookwood Cemetery in Surrey England. He has plenty of company as Brookwood is a 202ha cemetery, the largest in England and is the final resting place for many Australian, Canadian and American soldiers. The military part of the cemetery is beautifully maintained, this I believe is

done by the American's who have an office and staff on site.

Alf brought home a Welsh bride whom he met while undertaking farm work in Wales following the end of the war. He returned to farming in Wickopin with his bride Olive, they never went on to have children. Alf passed away in 1954 and is buried in Karrakatta.

William came home sooner than Alf, possibly because of ill health. While serving in Europe he had met my Grandmother, a Welsh lass called Annie Cottle who was serving in Belgium as a cook for the officers. My understanding is that they met in Paris while on leave. After further courtship via correspondence and a quite unromantic proposal Annie sailed for Fremantle and she and William married in 1921.

In later photographs there was a hollowness in my grandfather's eyes, I'm sure he had good times but I don't believe the war ever left. My grandmother spoke quite graphically of the duties of a stretcher-bearer; I don't know how you mentally go from cropping and fencing to picking up pieces of a person out of the mud.

Farming in Tarin Rock William and Annie went on to have seven children, the farm is still owned by the family. William passed away in 1945 at the age of 53 from pneumonia and is buried in Lake Grace.

Listening to family anecdotes Martha Oliver never quite

got over the war and became quite reclusive. It was probably for the best that she passed away in 1938 and didn't have to live through World War II and the fact that her younger three sons enlisted and went off to do their bit.

In 2009 our family was contacted by a cousin in Canberra who was in possession of Alf and Les's service medals, these had been given to him by his grandmother; Alf and Les's younger sister Lucy Francis. His feeling was that with no descendants of his own the medals should be taken out of the drawer and returned to Lake Grace; they are now framed and hanging along with their brother William's in the Lake Grace RSL.

There was an enormous loss of potential with World War I with many of the Returned Servicemen having no time of financial and emotional stability. World War I was followed closely by the flu pandemic, the depression and then World War II. Of course the loss wasn't one sided; all combatants had families.

With the Oliver farm on the railway line my grandmother spoke of men walking from the railway line to the homestead desperate for shelter and food in return for work. They would do anything just to know that they could have a meal before moving on. These men were never turned away.

## AFLW: Football-obsessed Smith Relishing Move to Dogs

IT'S A BIG decision to make for a season that runs only two months, but Belinda Smith is crossing the country to continue her AFL Women's footy career.

Smith was delisted by Fremantle after two seasons but didn't have to wait long before the Western Bulldogs pounced. She signed as a free agent less than a week later.

"I got a call out of the blue," Smith told AFL.com.au.

"I had received a message from my club coach [at East Fremantle] earlier in the day, just asking if it was okay to give my number out, and I was like, 'Oh yeah, sure, whatever', not expecting anything."

But Smith had been on the Bulldogs' radar for some time. The 23-year-old had been one of Fremantle's best when the two clubs played in round one in 2017, with 17 disposals running off half-back.

"When we saw that Belinda was available, I was constantly drawn back to that performance against us in our first ever game as an indication of her talent," Dogs coach Paul Groves said.

"She has excellent speed and clean hands and can be very damaging around goal."

Smith is the second-oldest in her family, growing up with three brothers in the tiny farming town of Pingrup, four-and-a-half hours south-east of Perth.

"I started playing footy when I was eight or nine and Dad was the coach at the time," Smith said.

"I was pretty obsessed from a young age. My brothers and I were always playing.

"The four of us were born within five years, so we were able to split the teams up pretty evenly. We're all very competitive."

Smith moved to Perth when she was in year eight to board at St Mary's Anglican Girls' School, where she was thrilled to find a football team.

Smith has been spending time up forward this season for East Fremantle in the WAWFL, finishing third in the league's goalkicking with 27. Her ex-Dockers teammate Kira Phillips will win the award, having booted a whopping 78 goals in 17 matches for the Peel Thunderbirds.

East Fremantle has qualified for the Grand Final and could meet Peel next week.

Smith loved her time at Fremantle, playing 12 of 14 matches in the first two seasons of the competition, averaging nine disposals and two rebound-50s a game.

"Being at Fremantle allowed me to become even more obsessed with football than I already was. Being surrounded by everyone with the same passion, all wanting to work hard and take in the little details was exciting.

"It was a higher standard than club football. You didn't have to do as much yourself," she said.

"Having the ability to watch the games back and having the coaches on hand allowed me to give football the time and effort I've always wanted to.

"I watch a lot of football – I need another hobby, to be honest.

"Whenever I have time on the weekends, I love watching a good game. I'm not as obsessed with the AFL as I was, I just love watching the girls play.

"I read a lot of articles about it and keep up to date."

Unfortunately, Smith's West Coast-loving family weren't quite as enthralled with her playing for the rival Dockers.

"Mum would give me little jabs, saying 'I don't like purple', or 'I don't look good in purple', just funny little things like that," she said with a laugh.

Smith is in the final year of a physiotherapy degree, working full-time hours on a work placement.

"At the moment, I'm at a hospital, but I'm also looking at

getting a private practice placement, to see what that's like," she said.

"It's a lot better than studying, I much prefer to be working, I'm just not earning any money. I generally rely on AFLW over the summer."

She's in the process of working out how to finish her degree across two states.

"Because I'm on placement now, the decision I had to make before signing with the Bulldogs was, 'Do I say no, stay in Perth and potentially not get picked up again, or do I do my placement over a year and a half and finish the degree a bit later?'."

"If I keep working hard and improving, I've got five to 10 years to play football competitively at this high level," Smith said.

"I've got the rest of my life to work full-time and save money and all those boring things."

"The opportunity to go to a different club, especially one that went from sixth to premier, was too good to pass up."

"They obviously have a good program in place, really good people involved, and chatting to [Paul], I've got an opportunity to play forward as well."

Having had a small taste, Smith's looking forward to finding out what living in Melbourne is like on a full-time basis.

"I came over about a month ago for a visit and trained with the Bulldogs' VFLW side. I met seven or eight of the AFLW girls then, as well as (the Dogs' AFLW operations manager) Debbie Lee, which was great," she said.

"They sound like they hang out a lot. 'KB' (captain Katie Brennan) said they go to brunch heaps, which suits me as well. I love a good brunch."
