

Electric Cars Power Up In Lake Grace

The electric Tesla cars made by Tesla in America are just like any other car, only more energy efficient.

There is a screen in the centre of the car which connects to music by Spotify, phones, thumb drives or the radio, it also brings up maps and travel statistics. There is the option to connect your phone to the car by an app that can control the car the same way you would if you were inside it, you can honk the horn from hundreds of kilometres away. The car has its own wifi, which it needs to be connected to, to be able to use the app. You can also track the car through your phone, which is great if it is stolen.

This car is a Model S and it has a 110km range per hour meaning it can fill up 110kms worth of fuel in an hour. The car can travel over 450km in one charge.

There are Supercharger Stations in the Eastern states that are free charging stations, they can charge Model S and X in a matter of minutes instead of hours. The stations are located near restaurants, shopping centres and Wi-Fi hotspots and there are multiple Superchargers at stations. If you enter your destination into the trip planner, it will route you through convenient Supercharger Stations along the way. There are 1043 Supercharger Stations in the world with 7496 Superchargers. The first Supercharger Station in WA was set up in Bunbury, this is still the only Supercharger Station in WA. Tesla hopes that more independent businesses will follow in Bunbury's footsteps and set up Supercharger Stations.

There are 7100 batteries in the pack of one car, which is 65mm tall and covers the bottom of the car from front

to back tyres. The batteries are in packs of 12 so if one battery dies then only those 12 in the pack are ruined, so only 12 are replaced not all 7100 of them.

South Australia is the most dependent wind-power state in the country, this is a problem because wind fluctuations cause fluctuations in power. South Australia experienced widespread load shedding (cutting off people's power as demand becomes greater than supply) last summer and also suffered a statewide blackout in September, this caused the Government to announce a \$550 million intervention into the energy market, including building a battery to supply more energy. Tesla won the tender from 91 expressions of interest from across the world to build the battery. It will be capable of an output of 129 megawatts of power at a time. This battery will hopefully reduce power outages and widespread load shedding during summer.

Tesla is now building trucks which can travel 800km in one charge, these are still being refined so are not out on the market yet.

Rob and Robin Dean would like to thank Peter Stoffberg at the Lake Grace Roadhouse for organising the installation of the chargers. It gives electric car owners more travel and destination options and will help bring more tourists through the town.

Keeping Safe - Everyone's Responsibility

At this time of the year we are all busy, often feeling tired, our nerves can be a bit raw and sometimes we are just "over it". Everyone gets a bit tired and rundown, from kids at school to mums and dads at home or at work.

We all know there's lots of work to get done to get us through to the end of the year. This may include finishing the harvest, various stock work, that last FIFO swing before holidays, getting that last job finished and having kids end of year school events to attend. This can lead to us working beyond our limit.

We all have a varying capacity to both absorb those extra things thrown at us and our ability to get the job done, this can differ depending on an individual's work ethic. We should never assume "what I can do is the norm", then place that expectation on family members, employees or work colleagues.

Occupational Health & Safety (OHS) gives us a legislative framework to guide us, but it doesn't allow for the cultural context in which we blokes sometimes operate. These behaviours can cloud our judgement around keeping safe both in the workplace and in our personal life. We need to be aware and manage our behaviour otherwise we will invariably fail in our responsibility to stay safe.

Keeping safe needs to start somewhere, it is no different to our individual health. I always say that my health is my responsibility, it is not my Doctors, my workplace or my wife's. However, my wife is very good at giving me a good kick up the backside to get me to the Doctor to do my annual service visit, my dentist appointment or my skin check.

So, when it comes to keeping safe it is everyone's responsibility. It is up to all of us whether we are in the workplace, belong to a community group, or within our family setting to be vigilant about keeping safe.

Tips to keeping safe:

- Constantly remind ourselves about work protocols;
- As employers, have realistic expectations of our employees;
- Look out for work colleagues, be aware and respond to behaviour changes. Talk to them about it!
- Try and maintain a balanced life, we can only do so much before fatigue becomes an issue;
- · Outside busy times, take time out;
- Enjoy what we do.

As another year winds down let's keep safe by staying focused on the job at hand, so we all can get to enjoy the upcoming holiday break.

Return of Royal Visitors

The many eucalyptus trees flowering around Lake Grace have brought back some 'royal' visitors. The Purple-crowned Lorikeet have been visiting our town regularly taking advantage of our gardens and loudly announcing their arrival each time.

The Purple-crowned Lorikeet is a small pretty parrot around 17 centimetres long. It has bright-green upperparts with pale blue below. The 'crown' is a patch of purple on top of the head, set off by a red patch in front of the eye, a yellow patch above the beak and a yellow-orange cheek patch. Red can also be seen under the wings, while the under-tail is yellow.

Through brightly coloured, the birds are still difficult to see in the tree canopies. You will often hear them first, as they make a screeching call, when flying swiftly overhead or foraging high in a gum tree. They are very vocal, making a high-pitched zit-zit or tsit sound continuously when they fly, as well as twittering while they eat.

The birds are omnivores with a diet of pollen, nectar, blossoms and fruits as well as insects. When the eucalypts are in flower, Purple-crowned Lorikeets can be seen clambering noisily amongst the foliage, feeding on nectar from the flowers. They often feed in the

company of other nectar-feeding birds, such as honeyeaters like the Wattle Bird.

Purple-crowned Lorikeets breed from August to December in tree hollows, laying between 2 and 6 white eggs. This nomadic bird occurs only in parts of southern Australia, including southern Western Australia, ranging widely through inland mallee when in bloom. The birds prefer dry eucalypt forests, woodlands and shrublands, however they can also be seen in parks and gardens of towns and suburbs. Last summer flocks were often noticed near the west end of Lake Grace townsite, in the coral gums and other eucalyptus of the sportsground and nearby streets.

Lake Grace Cricket Club - 100 Years On

As the Lake Grace Cricket Club celebrates its Centenary this season, some snapshots of days gone by will feature over the summer. The first reported match played by Lake Grace was on 24 February 1918, when they invited the newly re-formed Kukerin Club to a match which Lake Grace won by 15 runs. In the return match, Kukerin defeated Lake Grace by 70 runs at Kukerin.

TIMELINE OF EVENTS

1917 – 18 First recorded match played against Kukerin opposite Railway Station at Lake Grace

The Kukerin Cricket Club, which visited Lake Grace recently, has brought back glowing accounts of the hospitality accorded them, and also the splendid time they had. On Sunday they engaged the Lake people at cricket, and lost by 15 runs. Lake Grace Club is coming to Kukerin shortly to try conclusions with the locals on their native heath. Personally, I think the Kukerin Club ought to try and arrange a match with some school team, just to break the monotony of the last matches.

- 1967 68 Lake Grace dismissed for 37 including 7 ducks in Grand Final v North Lake Grace. They recover to win the match by 2 runs.
- 1981 82 S. Reynolds returns Lake Grace's best individual bowling analysis 9/13 v Newdegate.
- 1986 87 R. Walker scores a record 206 v Newdegate, the highest score by a Lake Grace batsman.
- 1988 89 First match on newly grassed surface of Lake Grace oval v Nyabing.
- 1990 91 C. Reynolds batting aggregate of 852, a record for the club.
- 1992 93 Celebrate 75 years of cricket in Lake Grace
- 2004 05 D.M Pelham claims 5/0 in six balls v Kukerin



Lake Grace CRC Annual Report 2016 / 2017

This was the third year of the new funding model and all CRC's were faced with business as usual while having to prepare a tender for a slightly revamped model by mid-February of 2017. Training provided by Department of Regional Development prior to this and the relatively quiet period of January enabled Lake Grace to get their tender response in with a week to spare. It was pleasing that the tender, which came into effect on 1st October 2017, needed very few adjustments,

Lake Grace CRC had no trouble in meeting the requirements of their contract throughout the 2016/17 financial year and as per previous years went with the flow as new and unexpected opportunities arose which pushed planned ideas to the back burner. We juggled as we went and managed to meet all of our expectations.

Income was up from the previous year, partially due to the access of grant funding for furniture, IT equipment, staff training and stakeholder engagement. In line with customer needs income has fallen in some areas but increased in others; however, the CRC remains financially strong with a profit of \$27,896. Improvements to equipment and premises include a new colour photocopier, new carpet in work areas, new furniture in the main office, repairs to a storage cupboard and the addition of some extra power points.

The Lakes Link News faced the challenge of having to limit its pages to fit with weight restrictions and an increased cost in postage; this saw some of our subscribers unable to continue their relationship with us. Aside from this, the bottom line wasn't greatly affected and the Lakes Link News continues to be an important conduit of information for our community. The paper generated over \$26,000 in income through sales, subscriptions and advertising through the financial year. This income stream allows us to support our community by providing discounted rates of advertising for our non-profit groups. The printer has given us a few hiccups and in line with our asset management plan will be replaced in January. Volunteers continue to be involved as proof-readers and we are well supported by the local community providing information and articles to heighten the interest of the community newspaper.

The demise in 2015 of our regional newspaper, the Wagin Argus, has reinforced the importance of the Lakes Link News and the role that the Community Resource Centre plays in drawing together a balanced collection of news, information and entertainment that will appeal to their audience while also informing them. Content includes local editorial, relevant media releases, information from our police, hospital and school, funding opportunities and advertising. The Lakes Link News is relevant to all ages, all occupations and all genders, for some this is the only print media that they access. Our readers rely on the paper as their connection to the community, for one reader it was a lifesaver.

"My husband read an article on prostate cancer within the Links and upon going through the list of symptoms realised he had all but one. He promptly visited his GP and four days later was having surgery. If he hadn't extracted that nugget of information from the Lakes Link when he did there would in all likelihood have been a different outcome." Community Resource Centres are about connectivity, for Lake Grace the Lakes Link plays a major role in drawing our community together.

The Lake Grace CRC is staffed by Manager Suzanne Reeves, Book Keeper Rosie Timperley and trainee Chloe Robertson. All staff bring a range of assets to the workplace and are unfailing in their enthusiasm and commitment toward providing quality service whilst addressing the needs of the community. The CRC currently has nine committee members; Paula Carruthers (Chair), Danielle Robertson (VC), Tara Spencer (Sec.), Kelly Hawtin (Treas.), Ollie Farrelly, Mary Naisbitt, Allan Marshall, David Fyfe and Joely Slinn. We also have a Structured Workplace Learning student from Lake Grace District High School. This student was with us for 11 weeks and contributed to our community newspaper as well as handling day-to-day activities

Our Governance and Support grant was finalised with workshops in budgeting, roles of the committee and constitutions. Some funds were diverted from social media workshops to drug education. A full suite of JDF's for committee roles, sample policies and procedures as well as useful links has been included on the Lake Grace CRC website.

A representative from the 'Wheelchairs for Kids' Foundation came to Lake Grace in November to collect blankets that were created by CWA members, keen knitters and crocheters from within the community as well as the CRC Friday morning craft group. The CRC was able to hand over 20 blankets in yarn and fabric which were made by their group. This group started up again in April and have a good production line of blankets with some of those attending coming for the social opportunity while working on their own projects.

- Small group and one-on-one training for Social Media, Word, Excel and downloading of photos from devices. This style of workshop is ideal because most clients are at different stages of knowledge and have quite different needs.
- · Healthy Soils with Beyond Gardens
- ANZAC Day Service
- Suicide Awareness/Prevention with Wheatbelt Men's Health

Discussions have been held with both WAPHA and Holyoake regarding more training for our community on mental health and suicide awareness and prevention. As we move forward we are looking at accessing funding to provide introductory and first responder training.

Lake Grace CRC continues to fulfil the role of Secretary / Treasurer for the Shire of Lake Grace Roadwise group as well as for the Lake Grace Land Conservation District Committee. The Jam Patch project, an initiative run under the umbrella of the LCDC has finished but the group will continue to value add to the site. Meanwhile Roadwise and its many volunteers continue to operate the Driver Reviver van over pertinent public holidays while looking at other localised issues such as parking, pedestrian safety and speeding

within the town site.

The CRC hosted a Drug Awareness workshop in conjunction with Holyoake that was attended by over 70 people. From this, we have begun a Local Drug Action Group (LDAG), which is targeting awareness and support for the community via drug education and the promotion of what support facilities are available. This has been well received and we have a good range of members involved; Holyoake and the Mental Health Commission have been very supportive. As a group we are working toward providing a range of educational workshops for sporting groups, farming bodies and emergency services.

The Community Resource Centre endeavours to remain a pivotal part of Lake Grace and as we embrace new ideas and initiatives we will further cement our position within the community. The funding we receive continues to give the CRC opportunities to assist the community with tasks that are not always income generating but provide a real service to those who most need it.

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Renewed Warning After Property Sale Scam

Media Release

Another loss from a cyber-attack that intercepted a property sale transaction has triggered Consumer Protection to issue a renewed warning to buyers, sellers, tenants and agents in WA to be extra vigilant.

In the latest case, the buyer of a Karrinyup property lost \$20,000 after cyber criminals sent an email purporting to be from his real estate agent requesting the deposit be paid into a bank account that was controlled by the scammers.

This latest alert follows a warning issued in September 2017 after three cyber-attacks resulted in almost \$590,000 being stolen in property-related scams. In one case, an 83 year old property buyer in Perth's western suburbs lost \$557,000 after the fraudsters intercepted email communications between her son, who was acting on her behalf, and their settlement agent.

Commissioner for Consumer Protection David Hillyard fears more money will be lost unless everyone involved in property transactions double checks information before sending money.

"Email accounts are frequently being hacked by scammers and messages are being sent that can look almost identical to the email address of a real estate or settlement agent," Mr Hillyard said. "So we recommend that, before sending money, buyers or tenants should check the bank account details by calling the agency to verify they are correct. Do not use contact details contained in emails that ask for money to be deposited into a particular account as the calls could be diverted to the scammers.

"Agents should also inform their clients, including potential buyers or tenants, to phone them if they get an email requesting money be sent to a particular account in order to verify its authenticity.

"As the amount of money being transferred in property transactions can be substantial, the risks are also substantial, so a few minutes checking the validity of emails and bank account details, or reverting to arranging to make the payment through a bank cheque or arranging for the bank to make the payment, is a quick and simple way to ensuring the funds are going to the intended recipient rather than reward cyber criminals for their illegal activities."

CEO's Corner

Flooding Event – February 2017

Over the past week the majority of contractors have had their final briefing and safety induction. Priority works have been identified through small community groups within most of the sectors. The initial works will be looking at significant routes for grain carting and school bus routes. Works will continue until the Christmas break being last day of work Friday 22 December and first day back Monday 8 January.

As this work is being carried out the Shire would like to remind road users to be courteous and slow down within the area crews are working. This will allow them to do their job in a safe manner and complete it sooner.

For current road closures please refer to the Shire's website www.lakegrace.wa.gov.au or Facebook page for a list of roads that are closed within the Shire.

80km Road Restrictions

With harvest in full swing we would like to remind all road users to exercise extreme caution on our road network. Many useable roads are still subject to damage including shoulder scouring, soft edges with single lane use only.

All vehicles greater than 4.5 tonnes are restricted to a maximum speed of 80 km/hr on all gravel roads within the Shire from 1 November to 31 December 2017 inclusive.

Road Works

During the past fortnight the construction crew have been on White Dam Road carrying out the final works with extension of culverts and the installation of headwalls. They have put in place the final gravel required to sheet the section of road being upgraded. The crew has now finished installing signs and guide post and general cleanups throughout the construction area.

The construction crew will be starting the drainage works on Magenta Road ready for next year's construction works to seal a further 3km from the existing seal which is expected to start mid to late January.

The Lake Grace Maintenance Grader operator has been working with the Construction team over the past weeks and has now returned to maintenance grading as required. The operator has carried out several customer requests, doing signage and the like. In the short time he has completed Holmes and Wallace Roads, and then will be moving to areas not affected by the February 2017 flood event.

The Lake King grading contractor has carried out works

on Pickernell Road, Kathleen Road, Broombush Flat Road between straight line kilometres (SLK) 0-10, Paulsen Road, Days Road, Ace Road, Finlay Road between SLK 0–6. They will be looking at doing the following roads in the future; far end of Biddy Camm Road from Brookton Highway to Fence Road, Hogan Road and Ladyman Road.

The Newdegate grading contractor, over the past fortnight has worked on Ardler Road with these roads being looked at in the coming weeks; north end of Old Ravensthorpe Road, Aylmore Road, Tuck Road, Breed Road with various backslopes and spurs.

Parks and Gardens

The town maintenance crew has carried out mowing of lawns, whipper snipping and weeding of the public and open space areas within the Lake Grace townsite. The crew has been to the cemetery, Apex Park and entry statements to carry out general garden maintenance. Maintenance at the town oval and medical centre has been carried out. The team has travelled out to Lake King and carried out mowing, weeding and spraying of public spaces, the Lake King Sports Pavilion and general maintenance at the Lake King cemetery.

They have also been helping out in Newdegate doing various jobs that have come in from customer requests.

Building and Maintenance Team



Disposing of Caltrop Plants

To dispose of any removed caltrop plants please:

- place them into a marked and sealed plastic bag and keep them until winter when they can be safely burnt or
- take them to the Shire Depot, at Absolon Street Lake Grace, where there is a specially marked caltrop wheelie bin facility located just outside the main depot gate.

Power Outages

Spike In Domestic Violence During Festive Season

Media Release

The State Government is urging people to seek assistance ahead of the upcoming Christmas and New Year period which is tragically characterised by a rise in family violence incidents.

Western Australia Police Force figures show a sharp rise in reported family violence incidents during the 2016-17 Christmas holiday period, when compared to the daily average. The figures show:

Last financial year, there were 65,134 family violence related tasks logged for police attendance. Each day, there was an average of 178 family violence related tasks. During the Christmas-New Year period, the daily average number of tasks increased by 26.8 per cent to 226:

Last financial year, there were 51,445 reported family violence incidents investigated by police. Each day, there was an average of 141 reported family violence related incidents. During the Christmas-New Year period, the daily average increased by 24.2 per cent to 175:

Last financial year, there were 22,604 police orders issued to protect victims. Each day, there was an average of 61 police orders issued. During the Christmas-New Year period, the daily average number issued increased by 35.6 per cent to 84;

Last financial year, there were almost 24,000 incidents recorded in which children were exposed to family violence. Each day, there was an average of 66 family violence incidents in which children were present. During the Christmas-New Year period, the daily average number of incidents increased by 22.7 per cent to 81.

The statistics have been released as part of the 16 Days in WA to Stop Violence Against Women campaign which aims to raise awareness about the issue. The campaign is the McGowan Government's contribution to the United Nations' annual '16 Days of Activism against Gender-Based Violence' campaign. It marks the 16 days between the International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women (also White Ribbon Day) on November 25 and Human Rights Day on December 10.

Comments attributed to Prevention of Family and Domestic Violence Minister Simone McGurk:

"It's tragic to learn the extent of family and domestic violence in our State. While we know reporting of incidents of family and domestic violence has increased in almost every jurisdiction in Australia - we also know that under 20 per cent of women who experience violence from an intimate partner don't report it to police.

"We hope by raising awareness of this issue through the 16 Days in WA campaign that we'll see police reporting numbers go up. We need to redouble our efforts to provide good services to make sure people come forward. "We need to change the conversation in our homes, communities and workplaces to end violence against women - 16 Days in WA to Stop Violence Against Women gives us the opportunity to do just that. Everyone has the right to live free from this violence."

Comments attributed to Police Minister Michelle Roberts:

"Christmas should be a time of love and not fear. It's a sad fact that police respond to a significant increase in the number of family and domestic violence incidents at this time of year. I urge people to be sensible with their alcohol intake and be mindful of those things that make Christmas - peace, goodwill and giving joy to those we love. The McGowan Government is committed to reducing the scourge of domestic violence, keeping victims safe and holding violent perpetrators accountable."



Other incidents to come up were motorists parking the wrong way and also parking on footpaths; please keep



2018 Dates Red Card Community Fox Shoots

Media Release

Red Card for Rabbits and Foxes is a popular community program conducted throughout the South West of WA, from north of Geraldton to Esperance. It is a community driven feral animal management program. It operates through a co-ordinated approach with a view to maximising effort during set punctuated timeframes, where feral animals are targeted simultaneously across the State with shooting and baiting.

The dates for the SSAA WA Autumn Community Fox Shoots are:

19 - 21 January 2018

16 - 18 February 2018

16 - 18 March 2018

13 - 15 April 2018

Five dollars for every fox and feral cat culled will be donated by the SSAA WA to The Regional Men's Health Initiative, up to \$20,000 annually. Next year we are gauging people's interest by holding two extra shoots - one in January and one in April. If there is a good response, we hope to continue with these dates forwarded into subsequent years.


The Hotbaiting period, which specifically targets

rabbits and foxes, has been set for the period, 1 February to 30 April 2018. Landholders are starting to report an increase in rabbit numbers, so this autumn will be a crucial time in their control to capitalise on the boost from the March 2017 calici virus release.

Now is the time to start organising your baiting accreditation and permits so that you are ready to go in Autumn. To get your 1080 accreditation, go to http://dafwa.moodle.com.au and follow their instructions, either as a new user, or log on using previous credentials. Once you have completed your accreditation, you need to fill in a permit application form, which is available at www.agric.wa.gov.au

Once you have your permit, you need to notify your neighbours that you are going to be using 1080. Templates for these letters can be found in the 1080 manual www.agric.wa.gov.au/ published by Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development.

Growing Up In Lake Grace Part X

John Dyke

A former resident of Lake Grace, John Dyke was born in King Edward Memorial Hospital in Subiaco, on 24 April 1935, to Noel Frederick Dyke and May Dyke. Dad had gone ahead to Lake Grace as Secretary to the Road Board. They had come to West Australia from Wales, UK, in 1926, paid their own way, and were sent to the South West, south of Bridgetown, to one of the Group Settlements, No's 126 and 127. The whole thing was a complete con between the British and Australian Governments, promising the new settlers a house, good land to cultivate, and the promise that within a few short years, working hard, they would be wealthy enough to return to the UK and have a good holiday. John and his wife Cheryl currently live in Albany. The following is the tenth part in a series detailing some of John's earlier adventures.

1601 and North Rankin

In 1983, after leaving Rottnest Island in 78, I got employment with SHRM a French catering company who were contracted to Woodside offshore Petroleum laying the pipeline from Dampier, 135 km offshore in a north west direction to where the North Rankin Platform was to be built. We were on-board the 1601 Pipe Laying Barge, a huge ship several hundred feet long. Each pipe about a metre wide, when welded would be slid over the rear of the barge down into the water. We had been welding four or five pipes a day, two of which would be rejected by the X ray machine and have to be re-welded by these so-called expert welders. We had only been operating for a few weeks when they all went on strike, wanting more pay. Woodside were in a bind as they had a deadline to meet, so they decided to put every man on a bonus for each pipe that went into the water and stayed there. Supervisor, \$22 per pipe, Welder \$18 and the lowest paid worker \$11 per pipe; at one stage we hit 40 pipes a day and this is on top of a very large salary as well, with the lowest paid on \$55,000 a year, and divers about \$95,000; remember this was 1983.

We were working two weeks on and two off but we still got paid whilst we were at home, without the bonus, what you might call a good job. After we had completed laying the pipes the next section of the job was to bury them in a deep trench all the way back to Dampier, this was to ensure that no ship's anchor would be caught on a pipe and destroy the delivery of gas from the platform to the Burrup Peninsular. At Burrup the gas was taken down to minus 60 degrees C and stored in massive tanks waiting to go on to a LNG tanker bound for Japan. Upon arrival in Japan it would be returned to room temperature. The process allows the gas to expand to triple its capacity, a very good system for both Woodside and Japan, cost wise. We were burying the pipes at about 60 or 80 a day, so once again those lucky enough to be on board were still getting the bonus for each pipe buried. There was still plenty of gas pumped south to Perth for domestic use. Then Woodside built Goodwin, another gas platform about 20 or 30 km west of Rankin, that gas came through Rankin into the Rankin Dampier pipeline.

On board we had a very large gym, very well fitted out. I was having a workout one day when this big guy about 6 feet two inches, bull neck and heavy shoulders comes into the gym and starts working out. He had a bit of a gut on him but it looked solid, he wasn't lifting very heavy stuff, about 200 pounds bench press but was going from one exercise to another with no rest time between. After an hour or so, he goes to the large punching bag, puts the gloves on and starts hitting with lefts and rights that would have taken your head off let alone a broken jaw. Another chap comes up to me and says, John do you know who that guy is and I reply no. He said that's Bob Dunlop the ex- Heavyweight Champion of Australia in 1969, Commonwealth games Heavyweight Champion in 1968 and if that's not enough the Empire Games Heavyweight Champion in 1969. Bob won 39 fights and lost six. His weight went from 167 lbs at the beginning of his career to 196lbs and a lot heavier when I met him. I was impressed and over the next few months Bob and I became good friends.

Talking to Bob about his career I asked him if he had ever thought of turning professional. Bob said he had 8 pro fight's, won all of them, and made a bucket of money and then thought it was time to give the game away, before I meet someone better than me. The only time Bob had second thoughts about winning was when he fought this huge guy, 6 feet 6 inches weighing about 330 pounds, he beat him and that was his last fight. Bob retired and took a job with the seamen working on the tugs. His old man was on the tugs and you can only get a job on the tugs if your Dad or another family member gets you a job, Bob declared he was there until he retired. Bob had two boys in their teens who he wouldn't let get into boxing, a mugs game he thought. Bob said they were both bright boys and would be off to University in a few years. One of the crew on Bob's tug that Bob used to train by hanging a large punching bag on a rope across the rear of the tug. One particular day he hit the bag so hard the rope snapped and the bag went over the side. Bob was born in 1945 and died in 2000 at the age of 54, still only a young man. According to the experts Bob was probably the fittest boxer in the game.

At a later date on the Rankin Platform I met another big guy whilst having lunch, he ducks through the open doorway (a standard doorway is 6ft 8 inches) and he sits down opposite me. We get talking and he tells me he is 7 feet tall, weighs 340 pounds and from the USA. An ex Gridiron player he was here for a few weeks doing a special wireline job for his company. That night I was having a workout upstairs next to the heli-deck where we had an excellent amount of equipment, this guy comes up and starts working out, then says to me is this all the weight you have for the bench press? I have a look and see he has 400 pounds loaded onto the bar, which has a big bend in it, the bar from memory weighed 25 pounds. I said yes, sorry about that, hardly anybody here can lift that amount. He went off on his break a few days later and the next I hear he is pulled over near the Raffles hotel for drunk driving by two

police officers. He flattens both of them and takes off, within a short time he is on the next plane out back to the USA never to be heard of again. Another guy I met from the USA was Roger Moore's brother, I can't remember his name. He lived in Seattle Washington, we used to meet about 5am each morning for breakfast. He was telling me he had been in the Royal Navy for many years, retired as a captain, but upon retirement from the Royal Navy they bump you up another rank which gave him a much higher superannuation in retirement.

Eric and I were in the planning office one morning when the radio room gives us a ring to say there is an F111 flying over in the next couple of minutes, if you want to see it you had better hurry to the Heli-deck. We rush up just in time to see the plane do a couple of barrel rolls as it goes over, within a matter of seconds it has disappeared over the horizon. So we stand there waiting and within a few seconds a speck appears from the east but he is down very low near the water and we are standing 150 feet up from the water on the helideck. Eric and I are both thinking the same thing, that he is going to lift up when he gets closer to the Platform and go straight over the top of us. At the last moment we realize he is going to pass us on the south side, so we run to the edge of the Heli-deck just in time and he passes the platform missing one of our four legs by not more than 30 feet. We could see the pilot sitting there clearly as he goes by 100 feet below, probably doing 700 or so k's per hour with a tug anchored about 100 yards south of us. We both figured he must have been on autopilot to have been able to do what he did. Had he hit the south leg of the platform we would have been blown to pieces as apart from the huge amount of gas on board being pumped to the mainland we would have had something like 30,000 barrels of condensate, a light oil which is sold off- shore, the cream on top of the cake.

When in Honolulu a couple of years back Cheryl and I did a tour over the Mighty Mo, the battleship that Japan surrendered on-board in 1945. They also have an aircraft museum with many ex-war planes, one of them being an F111, and for my own interest I stepped it out from end to end and came up with the remarkable

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figure of 70 yards or metres, which is a staggering length of roughly 200 plus odd feet. My research told me that over the years, the F111 came out in many variations, shorter versions for aircraft carriers, and they carried a huge amount of bombs, were able to hit targets at night with precision using a Radar Bombing system. A speed of Mach 2.2, 1450 to 2,300 km/h at speed hugging terrain they would do Mach 1.2 which the one that went past the platform would have been doing and Mach 2.2 at high altitude. Gave 37 years of service, retired in 2010 and replaced by the FA18F Super Hornet.

During my 12 years off-shore we worked 2 weeks on and 2 weeks off, and if a cyclone came we would be all flown ashore as Lloyds of London would not insure the platform as the experts who did the testing of the seabed miscalculated the density of the seabed. When the piles were driven in to the seabed for the Platform to be supported they went deeper than expected, and the platform when built was sinking by a small amount, enough for Lloyds to say we won't insure you until you stabilise it to prevent any further sinking. So we would all go by helicopter to the Burrup Peninsula where there was a very large camp that had been used during the building of the onshore work required to support the future of the gas supply for Perth. We would sit out the cyclone and then fly back to the platform, a very expensive operation.

A large ship with several hundred men on board was sent out to the platform, it was attached to the platform for around one year. The purpose of it was to dig out a very large area at the bottom of each of the 4 legs of the platform and then to fill the hole with a special concrete called Epo-sand, very expensive. The water there is 350 feet deep, the cost to Woodside about 100 million. The job was completed in the year and Lloyds then insured the platform. We were then able to stay on-board for the next cyclone, and that turned out to be a monster. The winds were so strong that our weather gauge was destroyed at about 290 Ks per hour, the scaffolding at our 12 metre level from the seawater was completely torn apart, we had damage to our survival craft that hung 65 feet above the seawater by the giant waves. If you stepped outside of the internal accommodation area you would never be seen again, but inside those closed doors you would not know there was a storm going on outside, there was no indication at all internally that outside those doors was a raging cyclone, unless you looked out through a window of a door. The wind was so strong the tops of the waves were just blown away in a big mist, nothing would have survived that storm. The tugs that were normally with us delivering stores etc were long gone south to safer waters, the funny thing about it we all felt safe and just went about our normal duties. The most dangerous part of being offshore was the helicopter rides from Karratha to the platform.

Three helicopters went down during my time there, two men drowned when one went down and landed on Its

side. They could not escape, possibly by inflating their life jackets much too early. In their panic to escape, the inflated lifejackets would have prevented them from being able to swim down from the roof of the helicopter to access the open doorway. A lot of guys used to panic during our fire-fighting exercises when turned upside down in a simulated helicopter which would be lowered into a huge water tank 20 feet deep and then turned upside down. As an ex police diver I never had a problem with that as you only had to hold your breath for 45 seconds till the rest of them, usually 15 or 16 guys got out. Some of them were dangerous; they would kick and wrestle to get out the open door. I would stay strapped in until the last one was out then go quietly and hit the surface a few seconds later. The same thing would apply in a smoke filled room where you can't see anything and the smoke is very hot and burning your lungs, they panic. Not good people to be with in a bad situation.

Two other choppers went down, one sat on it's inflated pontoons until rescued; the other travelled many kilometres just above the water, it's main rotor blade was shaking. To get back to land on the ship alongside the platform they had to come up 200 feet from sea level to then come down again to land on the helideck. As they did so the helicopter began to shake violently and almost crashed which could have killed many on board, so the order went out from then on that if a

helicopter got into trouble it was to land immediately and sit on its pontoons until rescued.

A number of us were trained in Fire Fighting in case of a fire on the platform and also in survival. We were sent to Woodman's point south of Fremantle where they had good facilities and then at a later date we went to Sale in Victoria where a few kilometres south there were better facilities. The men working on the gas and oilrigs in Bass-Strait, train there, and it is a take-off and landing area for those same personnel going to and from work. A little later on we were sent to Montrose in Scotland where all of the oil companies had chipped in a few million each to build a magnificent facility for training purposes. The weather for the two weeks that we were there was perfect, fine and sunny each day with warm nights. Many restaurants and hotels and the steaks were just magnificent the best I have ever tasted, didn't matter where you ate they were all the same, Angus beef. They have a lovely golf course on the foreshore to the ocean. Montrose is a place you don't want to miss if you go holidaying in Scotland. A couple of hours by car south of Aberdeen, where they make the whisky.

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Stroke Care Divide Costing Lives

Media Release

Inequalities in acute stroke care and services are costing lives and leaving thousands of Australians with unnecessary disability, according to a new Stroke Foundation Report released today.

Regional Australians are among those most impacted, the report revealed.

The 2017 Acute Stroke Audit, launched at Liverpool Hospital, revealed despite significant advancements in the treatment and care for stroke, patients are still being denied best practice care in Australia.

Stroke Foundation Chief Executive Officer Sharon McGowan said the Audit showed targeted investment and coordination of services was resulting in pockets of improved outcomes, however other services, many of them located in regional areas, are being left behind.

"There is significant opportunity for improvements across the country," Ms McGowan said. "We know what best practice care looks like with the release of updated Clinical Guidelines for Stroke Management 2017 best practice stroke treatment and care in September, we must now ensure all Australian patients with stroke have access to it.

"The current divide between the haves and have nots in metropolitan and regional areas is extremely concerning, particularly when we know regional Australians are 19 percent more likely to suffer a stroke than their city counterparts.

"Stroke strikes in an instant, attacking the brain – the human control centre. Stroke is a serious medical emergency which requires urgent attention, but with the right treatment at the right time many people are able to recover," she said.

Stroke Foundation Research Advisory Committee Member and leading stroke expert Professor Richard Lindley said the increase in comprehensive stroke centres from one in 2015 to six this year demonstrates what can be achieved.

"Liverpool Hospital demonstrates what can be achieved with a focus on quality stroke services, investment in planning and delivery, as well as patient outcomes," Prof Lindley said. As a comprehensive stroke centre the hospital is delivering best practice clot busting treatment (thrombolysis), clot removal treatment (endovascular thrombectomy) and care on a stroke unit 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

"These services save lives and ensure a better quality of life for stroke survivors.

"The travesty is that time-critical stroke treatment and high quality care are not available to all patients.

Surviving and living well after a stroke should not be determined by your post code. Australia has one of the most advanced trauma systems in the world, we need to apply the same thinking to emergency stroke treatment to ensure people living in regional and rural Australia have the best chance of making a meaningful recovery after a stroke," he said.

Work Christmas Parties and Gifts

We don't mean to sound like the Grinch, but when it comes to planning the work Christmas party, there's more to think about than finding out who's been naughty or nice.

You may want to consider if you'll need to pay fringe benefits tax (FBT) when rewarding your employees with gifts or parties this Christmas.

For your work Christmas party you'll need to consider:

- how much it costs
- where and when it is held a party at work on a normal work day is treated differently to an event outside of work
- who is invited is it just employees or are partners, clients or suppliers also invited?

When it comes to Christmas gifts, you'll need to consider:

- the amount you spend
- the type of gift gifts such as wine or hampers are treated differently to gifts like tickets to a movie or

sporting event

 who you are giving the gift to – there are different rules for employees and clients/suppliers.

Fringe benefits tax and Christmas parties

Christmas parties

There is no separate fringe benefits tax (FBT) category for Christmas parties and you may encounter many different circumstances when providing these events to your staff. Fringe benefits provided by you, an associate, or under an arrangement with a third party to any current employees, past and future employees and their associates (spouses and children), may attract FBT.

Implications for taxpaying body

If you are not a tax-exempt organisation and do not use the 50-50 split method for meal entertainment, the following explanations may help you determine whether there are FBT implications arising from a Christmas party.

Exempt property benefits

The costs (such as food and drink) associated with

Work Christmas Parties and Gifts (cont.)

Christmas parties are exempt from FBT if they are provided on a working day on your business premises and consumed by current employees. The property benefit exemption is only available for employees, not associates.

Exempt benefits - minor benefits

The provision of a Christmas party to an employee may be a minor benefit and exempt if the cost of the party is less than \$300 per employee and certain conditions are met. The benefit provided to an associate of the employee may also be a minor benefit and exempt if the cost of the party for each associate of an employee is less than \$300. The threshold of less than \$300 applies to each benefit provided, not to the total value of all associated benefits.

Gifts provided to employees at a Christmas party

The provision of a gift to an employee at Christmas time may be a minor benefit that is an exempt benefit where the value of the gift is less than \$300.

Where a Christmas gift is provided to an employee at a Christmas party that is also provided by the employer, the benefits are associated benefits, but each benefit needs to be considered separately to determine if they are less than \$300 in value. If both the Christmas party

and the gift are less than \$300 in value and the other conditions of a minor benefit are met, they will both be exempt benefits.

Tax deductibility of a Christmas party

The cost of providing a Christmas party is income tax deductible only to the extent that it is subject to FBT. Therefore, any costs that are exempt from FBT (that is, exempt minor benefits and exempt property benefits) cannot be claimed as an income tax deduction.

The costs of entertaining clients are not subject to FBT and are not income tax deductible.

Christmas party held on the business premises

A Christmas party provided to current employees on your business premises or worksite on a working day may be an exempt benefit. The cost of associates attending the Christmas party is not exempt, unless it is a minor benefit.
