Bush Basket Making Workshop

There's always some thing new to learn, and when we stop learning there is a problem.

So never missing a chance to learn something new, we quickly organised a fabulous bush basket making workshop with Glenda Blyth at the Lake Grace Regional Art Space.

Glenda who comes from Geraldton, was down to visit her daughter in Pingrup, she offered to run a one day bush basket making workshop for us.

How marvellous, we have wanted to organise a workshop in basket making using native grasses, for a few years and here was a lovely lady offering to run one for us. So with very short notice and word of mouth and an ad on Facebook we manage to get 9 people to attend and another 9 disappointed they couldn't come due to other commitments... But the good news is Glenda hopes to come back in February and we'll have another day.

Glenda went over types of grasses and garden materials to harvest and have ready to use, the best time to harvest and whether to use green or dry, how to treat the material when wanting to use it, what threads to use and how to make a basic basket.

With many of Glenda's baskets as samples of styles and different materials used we were ready to get stuck into the process and, create our own masterpiece.

It was one of the quietest workshops I have ever been to, every one was so focused on their baskets they nearly forgot to have lunch. Luckily Val Whiting had us and lunch organised, thanks Val, and everyone who bought lunch to share, yummy as usual.

Bush basket making is something you can create for very little cost except your time, tapestry needle and a ball of thread, cotton, wool or string. And a bundle of grasses or stubble you have harvested out of the paddock, and you are only limited by your imagination, and time. It is a very relaxing process and can be taught to most people.

MORE INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT THE SUN

- The Sun is almost a perfect sphere. Considering the sheer size of the Sun, there is only a 10 km difference in its polar and equatorial diameters this makes it the closest thing to a perfect sphere observed in nature.
- The Sun is travelling at 220 km per second. It is around 24,000-26,000 light-years from the galactic centre and it takes the Sun approximately 225-250 million years to complete one orbit of the centre of the Milky Way.
- The Sun will eventually be about the size of Earth. Once the Sun has completed its red giant phase, it will collapse. It's huge mass will be retained, but it will have a volume similar to that of Earth. When that happens, it will be known as a white dwarf.
- It takes eight minutes for light to reach the Earth from the Sun. The average distance from the Sun to the Earth is about 150 million km. Light travels at 300,000 km per second so dividing one by the other gives you 500 seconds eight minutes and twenty seconds. This energy can reach Earth in mere minutes, but it takes millions of years to travel from the Sun's core to its surface.

Keep Australia Beautiful says thanks to the thousands of Western Australians who have volunteered this year to keep Western Australia beautiful. We appreciate your time, energy, passion and the difference you make.

While careless littering can be disheartening, it's good to know that so many people care about protecting and enhancing our natural environment and creating litter-free communities.

Here's a snapshot of how Keep Australia Beautiful volunteers have made a difference in 2016.

Clean Up Events. Clean up events for Clean up Australia Day, World Environment Day, Keep Australia Beautiful Week, Freeway clean ups and the WA Beach Clean up attracted dozens of volunteers to clean up beach fronts, riversides and freeways. Helpful volunteers like the team from Notre Dame University removed dozens of bags of litter from the environment, met likeminded people and enjoyed morning tea and coffee on us! Volunteers from the Armadale 4WD Club, Toyota Landcruiser Club and Mitsubishi 4WD Owner Club also helped out on roadside litter audits.

Litter Reporters. This calendar year to the end of November we have received 2749 reports of littering from vehicles and issued 2505 Litter Infringement Notices,

which is a conversion rate of 91%!

With almost 12,000 Litter Reporters on WA roads, this story is a good reminder that Litter Reporters are everywhere! A Perth taxi driver got a good lesson on littering when he threw an item from his vehicle while on a trip. Unbeknown to the driver, he had two Litter Reporters in his vehicle that witnessed the offence and reported it to KAB WA. The taxi driver received a Litter Infringement Notice as a result and subsequently paid the \$200 penalty.

Outback Packs. Happy campers have been on the receiving end of more than 3,325 free Outback Packs distributed via Community Resource Centres, Visitors Centres and Department of Parks and Wildlife rangers. They can keep sites tidy as they travel. Thanks to the help of volunteer packers at Duncraig of SHS Ed Support; Lumen Christie College; Emmanuel Catholic College; Hale Middle School; Swan Christian College; Mater Dei College Katanning SHS and to the Community Service crews at the Department of Corrections.

Community Events. All across the state, community groups are out there spreading the anti-litter message at local fetes, fairs and fiestas. This year we had 15 groups helping to Continued on page 18

Ambulance Building...Waiting for the World to Change!

Day 222 of the construction of the New St John Ambulance - Lake Grace Sub Centre and practical completion (PC) of the building is still pending. AK Homes Construction Ltd have completed the building clean. We have a final list of items that need completion prior to handover, and while AK Homes are within the contracted time to complete the works, they are now 14 weeks outside of their own build schedule.

The building is still on budget, but we are now 4 weeks behind our proposed move date. Initially we are planning on a "soft move". This is where we move in and test the building and make any changes by working from within the building. To do this we require handover of the

building from AK Homes, Telstra installation, and the Certificate of Occupancy.

Other outstanding items to complete the building include; signage delivery and installation, carpark line marking, plant quote still yet to be received, carpark wheel stops yet to be received, and TigerSpark to hardwire the stove and install the septic tank warning alarm.

In the last fortnight we have let the contract for carpark line marking (Peel Linemarking who were less than half price of A Class Linemarking), we have purchased the office and training room furniture (Buy Direct Online), and we have purchased the 18 emergency services lockers (Excel Lockers). Delivery on all these products/ services is due prior to Christmas.

SuperSigns have given their assurances that we should receive signage completion by next week. It is frustrating that larger contracts seem to "over-ride" existing works, in the order of completion with many companies. The end result is that extra time is required to keep chasing the companies for delivery, while the excuse is that a big order was received with a tight deadline......apparently planning means nothing anymore!

Trevenen Building and Glass are yet to install the front and rear verandah roof lining that was scheduled for late November. Once harvest is over then this roof lining and the front and rear veranda posts will be painted.

The major frustration this fortnight is Telstra. Surprise....surprise....surprise. Even with photographic evidence of items being installed (i.e. the size of the conduit that the cable to the building lies within), it appears that even though the cable to the building, and the cable into which the line needs to be connected are in the same Telstra junction box, we still need some "design team" to design the connection. We only need

one line. Did you know that banging your head on a wall is more satisfying than trying to deal with Telstra! (And we had to pay them over \$2K for the privilege of wasting our time). We are working with Steve Hunt from Lake Grace Communications to try and progress the issue. Failing that it might be time to contact the politicians....again!

Commemorating 100 Years of ANZAC



Each of the soldiers listed on the Lake Grace Honour Roll will be featured in the Lakes Link News, as close as possible to 100 years from their enlistment. It is now 99 years and 364 days since William Oliver signed up.

OLIVER - WILLIAM GEORGE RALPH; Born at Brim, Victoria, he enlisted in the Australian Imperial Force on the 9th of December, 1916, at the age of 24 years. A farmer, from Lyndhurst Farm, Lake Grace, he was 5 feet 9½ inches tall, (176.5cms.) and weighed 140 lbs, (63.6Kgs.) and had a fresh complexion with blue eyes and fair hair. (He had been rejected with an earlier application due to fitness as he had been operated on for a hernia). His training was at Blackboy Hill, and Private Oliver was assigned to the 19th Reinforcement of the 28th Battalion on the 23rd of January 1917. He embarked *Miltiades* at Fremantle on 29th of January, 1917 and disembarked at Devonport, England on the 27th of March, and marched in to the 7th Training Battalion, Roleystone the following day.

After a period of sickness during training Private Oliver proceeded overseas from Southampton arriving at Le Havre, and proceeded to join his unit of the 28th Battalion. He was taken on strength on the 3rd of October 1917, then took up duties in the Field two days later where he performed as a stretcher bearer.

After a long period of service in the Field of some 8 months, on May 6th he was taken sick, being admitted to hospital in France. For a period of almost seven weeks Private Oliver was confined to medical attention, and on proceeding to rejoin his 28th Battalion on the 29th of June 1918, sickness overtook Private Oliver in the Field again. And once again he was admitted through a series of "medical stations", before finally being



On the 30th of November Private Oliver marched out from the Australian Infantry Base Depot for the return to England from France. Almost five weeks later he boarded the Morvada for the return to Australia disembarking at Fremantle. His discharge came on 28/3/1919, and a bracketed note, "Effort Syndrome", possibly relates to his debility. Private Oliver received the British War Medal and the Victory Medal. He gave his religion as Church of England, and his service number was 6628.

Will Oliver, as he was known, was about 21 years old when the family came to the Lake Grace District. He engaged in work such as mallet bark stripping, cutting down, (land clearing), and also worked on laying the railway line between Kukerin and Lake Grace. After the War, Will returned to Lyndhurst Farm, Jarring, to help his parents for a while before taking up land himself at Tarin Rock. Ever since the War ended he had been corresponding with a little Welsh girl he had met in France during his convalescence. Her name was Annie Cottle, and she was a member of the Queen Mary's Army Auxiliary Corp and was one of fourteen women that served overseas. One of her duties was cooking for the officers.

Annie arrived at Fremantle on the last day of March 1921. She travelled to Wagin by train and worked as a maid at the Federal Hotel until their marriage. They were married in St Georges Anglican Church Wagin, in July 1921. After their marriage they lived at Jarring for three months while their house was being built on their Tarin Rock farm.

Life was very hard with very little money and a lot of work. As Will and his father had the same names, he had spent his Army entitlements on his father's family farm before branching out on their own property, however, they were later left in some financial difficulty with no help forth coming in that respect. Like so many others at that time, the banks foreclosed on him, but they were offered the lease of another farm by the bank, and later purchased it. They moved to Bathurst Farm in May 1935, and it is still in the family.

Will never recovered from the effects of the War and was in poor health for a long time. He died in the Royal Perth Hospital on 23rd November 1945, aged 53 years, leaving Annie with their seven children. Will was buried in the Lake Grace Cemetery, and his epitaph reads: "Courageously he did his duty, with fortitude he bore his suffering." After her death on 3/10/1981 at the age of almost 82 years, Annie was buried close to him, with other Oliver family.

After the three Oliver brothers went away to the war, a local farmer Paddy McMahon, in a patriotic gesture planted three trees at the Jarring railway siding, (now Neendalling), west of Lake Grace in memory of them. It may be symbolic of their destiny, that one tree died, as did one brother, one tree grew to a huge size, perhaps representing the brother who has many descendants, and the third tree thrived, though well outgrown by the other, perhaps relates to the brother who had no family.

An anecdote from William's army days comes courtesy of grandson Garry Oliver:

William George Ralph told a very interesting story when he returned from the Western Front, of a man by the name of **Peter Lawson** (to all the readers remember the names).

As we know William had the worst job of anyone involved in a war; he was a stretcher bearer or what we call today First Aid responder, unarmed and a wide open target.

On one particular day he came across a man lying on his back with his entrails lying in the mud alongside him. Finding out the soldier was still alive and entrails intact, he proceeded to wash the man's entrails with water from his supply and put them back into his body. After doing this he stitched his stomach back and strapped him to the stretcher. This is because of the difficulty of getting him to a First Aid post without dropping him and his entrails back into the mud.

The First Aid person would always put particulars on a form with their name and other details and pin this to his uniform.

Let's fast forward the clock by 35 years and **Ronald Ralph Oliver** after serving in the Korean War had done a butchering course through the army and was looking for a job.

He had applied for a job as a boner at the Midland Abattoir, a very hard physical job to say the least and at speed. At his initial interview the gentlemen could see his name was Ronald Ralph Oliver and asked was he related to a William George Ralph Oliver. Ronald informed him that was his father; the gentlemen said he would like catch up with William. Ronald told him that he had died in 1945 from complications of mustard gas poisoning, but on this occasion the person interviewing him stood up and pulled his shirt up, saying "your father did this to me", scarring on the stomach was in Ronald's words hideous, it looked like he had been stabbed with a beer bottle several times.

And you guessed it his name was **Peter Lawson** and Ronald got the job. It proves a point if you are helpful and do a great job the favour maybe returned, but it could be the next generation who benefits from that act of kindness.

Thanks communities in the regions. to volunteers at Mayanup, Hedland, Exmouth, Greenbushes, Dalwallinu, Wongan Hills, Cue, Quairading, Wanneroo and Walpole who helped get the message out. Volunteers have also joined the KAB team at outdoor events across the year, including the Australia Day Skyworks and the Royal Agricultural Show and the Wanneroo Show.

Tougher Action Planned for Lodging Tenancy Bonds Late

Media Release

Consumer Protection is planning to take tougher action against real estate agents and private landlords with an increasing number of tenancy bonds being lodged late.

Under the Residential Tenancies Act, bonds must be lodged with the Bond Administrator as soon as practicable or within 14 days after the funds are received.

However, in the three months prior to 31 October 2016 there were as many as 945 bonds lodged by real estate agents and a further 758 bonds lodged by private landlords that were received after the 14 day cut-off.

Acting Commissioner for Consumer Protection David Hillyard said the extremely high and growing number of late lodgements is unacceptable.

"There were a significant percentage of these late bonds which took more than three months to lodge. The worst case took more than six months, which is alarming," Mr Hillyard said.

"Overall the number of late lodgements have more than doubled in the past three years and this is despite a ten per cent decrease in the overall number of bonds being collected. This trend cannot continue and Consumer Protection will be taking decisive action to target offenders and improve compliance with the law.

"In the first instance, Consumer Protection will be sending educational letters and formal warnings to offenders. However, those who ignore these warnings and continue to lodge bonds late may be issued with an infringement notice amounting to a \$2,000 penalty. In more serious cases people could face prosecution or disciplinary action where they may have to pay a fine of up to \$20,000.

"Licensed real estate agents could also be putting their licence, and ultimately their livelihood, in jeopardy if there are serious and continuing violations of this important aspect of tenancy law.

"Bond money is held securely in trust by the Bond Administrator and any delay in depositing these funds may put them at risk. There is absolutely no reason why bond money cannot be lodged within the 14 day period or sooner, especially since the new Bonds Online eTransactions system has become available to all agents.

"I urge real estate agents to review their current procedures to ensure their bond processing practices are in line with their legal obligations. I also caution private landlords that they too need to be aware of the requirements, otherwise they may suffer serious consequences."

The State of Men's Wellbeing – What's it Mean For You?

The month of November held a significant awareness campaign for blokes. Blokes gave it their best shot at growing a "mo" for Movember and the theme this year was "Stop men dying too young."

Three main areas of focus and awareness of the Movember campaign are:

- Prostate Cancer kills approximately 3000
 Aussie men each year. In addition to this
 2.4 million men are living with a prostate
 problem, the most common BPH (prostate
 enlargement).
- Testicular Cancer The second most common cancer for men between the ages 18 – 39, but with an almost 95% cure rate if picked up early, our message of "check ya balls, and get to your doctor if you notice a change" is a simple one.
- Mental Health and Suicide Prevention A very complex area, but our key messages are talking about, addressing and dealing with difficult and/ or distressing times in our life (situational distress). Seeking help early and getting the right help pertaining to our situation makes a big difference.

So what about you? What are the other issues that are important for blokes in Regional WA, especially at this time of the year?

In all the work we do our key message is looking after yourself first and foremost. No matter if we are a farmer, contractor, working in agribusiness, or a community member we can sometimes forget the little things, the basics, during these busy times leading up to Christmas.

Understandably at this time of the year people go hard and work long hours. Even during harvest no one can work 24/7. Here are a few simple tips:

Fatigue is one of biggest causes of accidents/ injuries/deaths (know your limits). Sleep are we getting enough (we need 8 hours)? Limit nicotine, caffeine, alcohol and big heavy meals late at night. Give yourself a chance to relax before bed (avoid bright screens electronic devises).

Fuelling your body – breakfast is still the most important meal of the day. Eat a good source of fibre ie whole grains, tomatoes, and fruits such as apples, berries, citrus fruits and pears. Fibre stays in the stomach longer than other foods = feeling full for longer, slow release = more sustained energy.

Balanced diet is important - eat red meat, chicken and fish with some greens. Your snacks can be healthy like apples, bananas, fruit/nut mix and remember to stay hydrated - drink lots of water!

Road Safety. Whether visiting from the city or just not used to country roads, remember truckies are trying to make a living, we know roads are a public space but respect goes both ways. Extra trucks are going to be in and out of receival points, farm gates and at crossroads. Give appropriate space and don't push your overtaking, be patient.

Smart Plants Can Learn New Habits

Media Release

A new study led by The University of Western Australia has demonstrated for the first time that plants can learn about their environment by making links between events, an ability thought to be exclusive to animals.

The international research team, led by Research Associate Professor Monica Gagliano from UWA's Centre for Evolutionary Biology, in collaboration with researchers from the Universities of Oxford and Zurich, set out to prove plants were capable of associative learning.

The study, published in the online journal <u>Scientific Reports</u>, was inspired by Pavlov's experiments with dogs, one of the most revealing studies in the history of behavioural research, which demonstrated that behaviour could be changed using conditioning.

Through a range of behavioural experiments, the team was able to provide convincing evidence that plants were capable of learning a particular association between the occurrence of one event and the anticipation of another.

Professor Gagliano experimented with pea seedlings, placing them in a Y-shaped maze to see how they responded after initially being exposed to light from a particular direction.

The results showed the seedlings were able to learn and choose the best growth direction for survival by correctly predicting the occurrence of light once it was removed.

Professor Gagliano said the ability of plants to employ a wide range of adaptations had made them a predominant form of life on Earth. Yet the possibility that plants were capable of forming associations between environmental cues to enhance their ability to 'forage' for light had never been explored.

"Because our findings are unexpected, we anticipate that this study will stir a lively and exciting debate on the origin and properties of memory, learning and ultimately intelligent behaviour in biological systems," Professor Gagliano said.

"By challenging the way we currently view the agency of plants and their behaviours, which have enabled them to flourish, the research opens up new and bigger ecological questions of how modifications to our environment will shape future plant communities."

"Beyond plants, these findings compel us to review our thinking about the essential mechanisms underlying information processing throughout living systems."

Progress on Lake Grace Units

The building team have installed the door frames, sliding doors and ceiling insulation for Unit 1. They have also straightened and stabilised the walls for Unit 1 ready for Gyprock. The truss roof timber work has been completed on Unit 3 and roof battens are 50% completed for Unit 3.

Some of the topics of discussion at this meeting were:

- Rural Education Issues this matter was raised by the Shire of Quairading. We had distributed these concerns to our local P&C Associations and the input from Lake Grace and Newdegate was considered at the meeting. A working group is to investigate these matters further.
- State Bushfire Level 3 Pre-Formed (Incident Management) Teams – various issues were discussed as to the level of involvement from neighbouring local governments during these These teams are a result of the Euan incidents. Ferguson report into the Waroona Fire. DFES as the Hazard Management Agency for Fire are responsible for coordinating this initiative and are working with the Department of Parks & Wildlife and the various volunteer associations to bring this to fruition. Critical to the success of these preformed teams is the inclusion of local knowledge provided through the inclusion of competent local government officers and emergency services volunteers from the area where the emergency is occurring.
- Emergency Services Levy (ESL) Review This was another result of the Euan Ferguson Report into the Waroona Fire. Much discussion occurred in relation to DFES and the control they have, and the need for funds to be distributed independently from DFES. Also as to what the ESL funds can be spent on. This is always a topic of much debate, in relation to a local

government responsibility and an emergency service responsibility. An example is; SMS to FCO's and Brigades to attend a fire - ESL pays. SMS to advise a harvest ban due to the same fire - Local Government pays, even though the harvest ban is to assist in eliminating further risk and placing a greater burden on our volunteer fire fighters.

This means putting a large amount of chlorine in the pool while the pool is closed to assist with maintaining the required chlorine levels in the pool during high use and warm weather. The superdosing is mostly done in the evening to allow the chlorine to settle overnight. So if you are tempted to jump the fence for a night swim (or early morning), please, please remember you could be jumping into a very highly chlorinated pool which could result in burns to the skin, eyes and other places on your body, causing you a lot of discomfort and embarrassment.

He set up a great selection of plants from his nursery with all the proceeds raised coming directly to the CCWA.

Then there was a small village, literally of helpers from the front of house to raffles - Cara who welcomed people with her charm and keen sense of community knowledge, quietly and kindly wouldn't let anyone pass her without purchasing a few raffle tickets. She could sell ice (in the form of the frozen water) to an eskimo. We had numerous raffles throughout the day. WA Drivers Ending the Work Week with a Bang as Collision Rates Rise

Media Release

SGIO is urging drivers to stay alert at the wheel as they head into the weekend, with new research revealing motorists are more likely to have a collision towards the end of the week.

The insurer's data* showed that Thursday or Friday are the most common days of the week for drivers in Western Australia to have a motor vehicle collision, with collisions more likely to occur around 8am and between 3pm and 5pm.

SGIO Head of Research, Robert McDonald, said the research is a timely reminder of the importance of paying attention behind the wheel and obeying the road rules.

"As we head into the weekend, drivers may be rushing home from work, hurrying to collect their kids from school or heading away for the weekend and not taking the usual care while driving," said Mr McDonald.

"Our advice to drivers would be to be patient, allow extra time to travel during peak hours and to adapt to the driving conditions to help ensure a safer journey."

SGIO found that Sunday is the least common day for driving accidents, with collisions dropping 4 per cent below the weekly average as the week winds down.

In the event of an unexpected collision, SGIO recommends drivers:

- ☐ Stop if safe to do so and give assistance to anyone who is injured;
- ☐ Call an ambulance if required;
- ☐ Call the police if a person has been killed or injured, the other party fails to stop and/or supply details, or the driver appears to be under the influence of drugs or alcohol;
- ☐ Exchange details with the other driver including date, time and location;
- $\ \square$ If safe to do so, take photographs of the damage to the vehicles;
- $\hfill \square$ Collect the details of any witnesses; and
- ☐ Contact your insurer.

\$20 million Mobile Black Spot Funding to Benefit Wagin Electorate

Media Release

Mobile phone coverage in the Wagin electorate will be improved, thanks to a further \$20 million investment over two years made possible by Royalties for Regions.

Member for Wagin Terry Waldron MLA said the funding would support the site lists released on Thursday by the Commonwealth Government, which outlined 78 new mobile base stations and small cell satellite installations to be constructed by Telstra and Optus across WA.

While Telstra is providing wide area coverage, Optus' small cell satellite solution is an innovative means of providing mobile phone coverage up to a three kilometre radius for communities and tourist hotspots in remote parts of the State, where wide area coverage is unaffordable.

"The new sites will be delivered under Round 2 of the Commonwealth's Mobile Black Spot Program further improving mobile phone coverage in regional WA," Mr Waldron said.

"The Wagin electorate will benefit from 11 of the 78 announced on Thursday, which will provide development opportunities for small businesses in remote areas and support other Royalties for Regions initiatives in the areas of tourism, transport and agriculture."

- Cheviot Hills Road (Shire of Katanning)
- Martinup Road (Shire of Broomehill-Tambellup)
- Needilup (Shire of Jerramungup)

- West Tambellup (Shire of Broomehill-Tambellup)
- Yeriminup Road (Shire of Cranbrook)
- Holt Rock (Shire of Kulin)
- Piesseville (Shire of Wagin)
- Tincurrin (Shire of Wickepin)

Mr Waldron said: "The State Government has invested more than \$105 million in regional telecommunications since 2012, driving the construction of 344 new or upgraded mobile phone

towers and small cell satellite installations in regional WA."

"This project is a result of successful collaboration with the Commonwealth and industry, which will support other Royalties for Regions initiatives and narrow the digital divide by eliminating mobile black spots at prioritised locations, including those in the Wagin electorate."

Nationals WA Candidate for Roe Peter Rundle said RTP was an important project that would ensure people living, working and travelling in regional areas of the state have access to key services.

"Royalties for Regions is helping transform the Wagin electorate and I look forward to seeing this investment bring greater social and economic benefits to the area," Mr Rundle said.
