


The meal was catered for my Mrs G's Catering, well done Nat—by all accounts a beautiful Christmas meal enjoyed by all.



Hydroponic Gardening

Hydroponic gardening is gardening without soil. There are a number of different growing media's to use but I went with the expanded clay balls It's sole purpose is to support the plant.

You don't need to grow under lights or in a greenhouse, just a good sunny spot on your verandah or patio Anything you grow in a normal garden can be grown in one of the many methods, just wash any soil or potting mix from the seedlings and use bare rooted (to avoid blocking any pumps)

You can get good easy to use nutrient mixes from hydro suppliers that will tell you the amount to use keeping it simple. This is what I have found

Method 1 Deep Water Culture (DWC)

This method is growing your plants so the roots are in the water/nutrient. I am growing strawberries in a cheap 50litre storage tub with holes cut out in the lid The strawberry plants are in plastic cups with the clay balls supporting them in these

As the strawberries grow the roots will grow bigger and will drink the water, this can be topped up when needed. Results are promising and growth is very quick - Note always use a dark coloured tub that sunlight cannot get through as sunlight will allow algae to grow and rob all the nutrients. Add an aerator to help oxygenate the water (a cheap fish tank one is perfect)

Method 2 Bato bucket system

These are buckets with the clay balls to support your plants. They are fed by a dripper supply and drain back into the water supply below in an enclosed continuous loop system, very simple and effective.

This is best for longer term plants such as tomatoes with a bigger root system. This is the preferred commercial method for tomato's and cucumbers and is probably the most productive as its able to keep the same plants growing for the longest period.

Method 3 pipe system

It's a jigsaw of pipes connected with water being pumped to the top layer of pipes with holes cut in the top for the seedlings and draining back down through the next layers back to the reservoir at the bottom. This again is a closed continuous loop. This method is great for lettuce and all salad greens with brilliant results.

There are many other ways of growing without soil and I have only given the bare basic methods. You can make it a science or just a good fun way of gardening without the constant weeding, mulching or digging. My hydro garden takes up a corner of my back patio and I'm growing lettuce, silver beet, capsicum, green beans, snow peas, tomatoes, cucumbers, radishes and strawberries in a small amount of space and the minimum use of water.

Anyone with ideas or interested is welcome to check my garden out and any advice or help is welcome. For those who don't know I am currently confined to a

wheelchair and this is completely wheelchair friendly and gives me a great interest.


Getting Creative




Book Review: Ocean Prey by John Sandford

STATION NEWS

We've received news that Fiona's transfer has been delayed; again. She is now waiting to hear from the removalists to see when they can fit her in, early 2022. In the meantime, she has been seconded to Kalgoorlie to assist them for a few weeks leading up to Christmas.

In other news we have managed to find the password to the Lake Grace Police Twitter account. The account has been gathering dust for a few years but we have already started posting again. Social media is a valuable tool to keep people updated with our investigations and for the community to assist police where they are able to. Recent high-profile incidents have shown the two-way flow of information was integral in cracking the cases.

In addition to our twitter account we suggest following the Great Southern District WA Police Force Facebook account. This page shares information from across the region. With all social police media accounts, it's worth mentioning that you should contact police directly and not in the comments sections as these are not typically monitored.

LOCAL NEWS

We had a two-day COVID vaccination clinic come to town on the 6th and 7th of December. I attended several times and spoke with staff. They had a better than expected turnout over the two days which was a great result. If you missed out vaccinations are free and can be obtained from your GP.

Lake Grace Police Station has a close working relationship with the surrounding police stations. On the 2nd and 3rd December Lake Grace, Corrigin, Kulin, Wickepin, and Kondinin Police conducted an operation in Corrigin. The purpose was firstly to detect and disrupt the supply of illicit drugs into our region and secondly to target heavy vehicles including trucks and vehicles towing caravans and campers which were overloaded past their GVM and GTM, a danger to themselves and other road users.

The operation was very successful with police stopping 626 vehicles. The Department of Transports vehicle inspectors were also present and conducted inspections on the heavy vehicles, finding several to have defects and/or to be overloaded. Several drivers were also charged with drug driving and drug offences.

TRAFFIC

We've had a busy few weeks on the roads again preparing for the influx of holiday travellers through the area. In the last two weeks we have issued speeding infringements to four people on demerit point Good Behaviour Periods. The highest speed of these four was 44kph over the speed limit. One kph short of a Reckless Driving charge and a 28 day vehicle impound.

Most people aren't aware but if you accrue 12 or more demerit points within three years you receive the choice of a 3 to 5 month suspension on your license (dependent on how many points you've received) or a 12 month good behaviour period, also known as "Double Or Nothing". Should you go with option B you cannot incur more than one demerit point during this period or you lose your license for twice the original suspension period. These four people unfortunately didn't learn from their past mistakes and have lost their license's for the extended period.



Lastly, we caught a driver breaking a record for Lake Grace Police with the highest recorded speed we've come across, 62kph over the posted speed limit. There is no award only a vehicle impound and court summons for the offence of Reckless Driving.



News From the Op Shop

It is now more than six years since we thought it might be a good idea to start an Op Shop in Lake Grace. Our building, the former Methodist/Uniting church, was built in 1920. When the local congregation lapsed many years later, the Church loaned the site to Play Group and then decided to offer the block and the one next door to the Shire of Lake Grace. The idea for an Opportunity Shop was put forward at a community meeting and, in 2015, the CWA and Activ Industries joined us as sponsors.

In 2016, we started setting up the shop, taking donations and putting in place an agreement with the Shire. We opened in early May 2017.

We continue to provide a service to people in need, be it for clothing, household goods, craft materials or just a good book. We are recyclers and re-users, providing an alternative to landfill and, importantly, a use for a heritage building. The contribution by our volunteers is not only philanthropic but social with old and new friendships enjoyed. This year we had 15 volunteers on roster.

Our heartfelt thanks go to all our wonderful volunteers, donors and shoppers who keep us going. Thanks also

to Lake Grace CWA, Activ Industries and the Shire of Lake Grace for their ongoing support.

The Op Shop will be closed from 24th December for the summer break. We will reopen in February 2022.








From the CEO



This is the last Community news for the year. I wish you all a happy and safe Christmas and New Year. Next year will see another round of challenges arise with the opening of the state borders on 5th February. I would remind everybody to continue with the safe health practices as advised over the previous nearly two years, take stock of the options open to you and above all stay safe.

The Western Australian Planning Commission (WAPC) has released the draft Position Statement: Planning for Tourism and draft Planning for Tourism Guidelines for public comment. It is then proposed that:

- definitions for short term accommodation and hosted accommodation as described in the Position Statement be inserted into the deemed provisions (Schedule 2, cl. 1) of the Planning and Development (Local Planning Schemes) Regulations 2015 (Regulations);
- hosted accommodation which does not exceed a maximum of four adult persons (or one family) and a maximum of two guest bedrooms and unhosted accommodation where the dwelling is let for no more than 60 days per calendar year, will be exempt from the requirement for development approval (Schedule 2, cl. 61) of the Regulations; and
- other land use definitions will be inserted in the model provisions in Schedule 1 cl. 37 of the Regulations.



Many years after first being identified as a flood mitigation measure following the 2006 Lake Grace floods we now have completed construction of a "Flood Detention Basin" of around 13 megalitres. The dam is situated south east of the CBH bins.

Harvest Recipe - Flourless Harvest Loaf

3 cups Almond Meal

2 tsp Baking Powder

1 tsp Ground Cinnamon

1 tsp Ground Allspice

1/2 tsp Salt

2/3 cup Chopped Walnuts or Pecans

1/4 cup Butter, melted

1/4 cup Maple Syrup, or honey

3 large Eggs

1 tsp Vanilla

1 cup Grated Apple, not peeled

1 cup Grated Carrot, not peeled

1 cup Grated Zucchini, not peeled

- Preheat oven to 160C (fan forced).
- Grease and line the base and sides of a loaf tin with baking paper.
- 3. Mix the almond meal, baking powder, cinnamon, allspice, salt and nuts together in a large bowl until incorporated.
- 4. In another bowl stir all of the other ingredients together.
- Gently fold the wet mixture into the dry ingredients until just combined.
- 6. Bake in the oven for 1 hour or until a skewer comes out clean. Cover with baking paper during cooking if the top is browning too much.
- 7. Cool the loaf in the tin before slicing.

I have recently been witnessing in my own life how powerful an act of kindness can be and how much fun it can be. I take my garbage cans out to the curb every Sunday night because the trash collectors come early on Monday morning. For the past few months when I go out to the curb on Monday to put the cans back alongside my house, they are not there. Someone has mysteriously and very stealthily moved them back by the side of the house where they are stored. Now, I have heard about people in the drive-through line paying for someone else's coffee at Starbucks, or the fare at a toll booth, but never have I heard of acts of "trash can" kindness! I suspect it is one of my neighbors and I must admit it's really got my attention. What his or her motivation is I don't know, but I am interpreting it as a generous and selfless act of kindness. There is something very empowering about extending kindness to others, especially when it can be done anonymously.

This simple act of kindness has me thinking a lot lately

about how we as human beings coexist together, not just as neighbours, but as passengers on this evershrinking "spaceship earth" as referred to by Buckminster Fuller. Our differences are so vast in so many ways. Between cultural values and traditions, nationalities, religions, politics, and so on, we can feel very isolated at times. Kindness can be the bridge that connects us because it is something to which every human being on the planet can relate. An act of kindness is easily understood and can supersede any language, religious or cultural gap. In that regard, kindness can be thought of a universal language we all can speak--with our actions.

The ancient philosopher Philo of Alexandria (20 AD - 50 AD) said, "Be kind, for everyone you meet is fighting a hard battle." It seems some things in the human realm never change. 

Gift card laws

We're currently reminding business and consumers about Australia's gift card laws as it's been two years since they came into effect. With the exception of a few limited-use gift cards and vouchers, all gift cards or vouchers sold have a minimum three-year expiry period. The expiry date needs to be clearly marked on the card or voucher. Post purchase fees are also banned, except fees that are charged as part of a sale to cover the cost of processing a payment.

Tips For a Safe and Merry Christmas

Keeping yourself safe

- Set up a plan before leaving home, organise who will drink and who will drive
- Don't get in a car with a driver who is under the influence of alcohol and/or other drugs
- If someone around you is acting aggressively, remove yourself from the situation, if it is safe to do so
- Organise in advance a sleep over, if possible, to accommodate children
- Have spare money for a taxi in case the need arises
- Have a spare set of car keys, so you can leave when you want and drive yourself home (if you are not under the influence of alcohol and/or other drugs)
- Write down emergency numbers in case you need assistance (family, friends, refuge, crisis care) and have them in your pocket/bag or keyed into your mobile phone
- There is always a strong police presence this time of year targeting irresponsible drinking, drug use and illegal behaviour. You are responsible for all the decisions you make. Be aware of what you are doing.

- Remember you have the right to say no
- Trust your feelings if it doesn't feel right then it usually isn't
- Decide whether to go to functions or not. Put yourself first, trying to please others may not please you. It may be wise to arrive late and leave early. If you are not happy about attending a function because you know that there will an excessive use of alcohol or drugs, you have the right to choose whether to go or not, or when to leave.
- If you are at a function and you are not enjoying yourself, you can leave without having to justify yourself

Mixing alcohol and drugs is DEFINITELY not recommended

- Illicit substances tend to be around more in the festive season. If you do use, know what you are getting and whom you're getting it from. Whether it is drugs and/or alcohol if you know the people you are partying with look out for one another
- It is often easier to remove yourself from situations where others want to buy or get you a drink. Avoid drinking in rounds if possible as you can't set your own drinking pace
- Be prepared with ways to make excuses or avoid drinking or using. You may wish to try sayings "I'm right for now", "I'll get myself one in a minute", "Someone is already looking after me" or just simply "I'm driving". Think about what you might say ahead of time, so you don't feel put on the spot and not know how to say "no"
- You may also like to bring your own non-alcoholic drinks in case none are provided. Keep yourself hydrated by drinking water and be conscious of eating well, space your drinks out and alternate with non-alcoholic beverages. Mixing drinks is not recommended
- Most importantly give your body time to rest in between drinking

The Office Christmas Party

- Remember all the same work rules still apply, you need to treat people in a respectful way they need to treat you likewise
- Don't use alcohol as an excuse for bad behaviours and don't accept this from anyone else. Before you go think about safe levels of drinking, as well as enjoying yourself
- Be careful about downing a few drinks quickly to get in the party mood or feel relaxed
- Talk to one of your trusted colleagues before you go about how you're both getting home
- If you're responsible for the party know your responsibilities, provide water, soft drinks, food, low alcohol beverages, don't encourage heavy drinking, make sure everyone knows work rules still apply, talk with guests about how they are going to get home safely
- Office parties can be long and well-remembered for what should not have happened. Keep in mind your work reputation

Tips For a Safe and Merry Christmas (cont.)

Managing someone under the influence

- Don't try to reason with someone who is under the influence of alcohol and/or other drugs.
 Address the problem behaviour at the next opportune time closest to the event that occurred, like the next morning. Let the person know what the behaviour was and how it affected you
- Don't try to talk to someone when you are angry, it is best for you to walk away and come back to address the issue when you are feeling calmer
- Even if the drinker wants to sit around all day drinking, if you don't want to, organise something you will enjoy to break up the time
- Buy yourself some time if it becomes uncomfortable, excuse yourself to the bathroom.
 Being tactful and diplomatic will contain the situation and steer it away from arguments
- If you don't want to know the answer, don't ask the question. It is more important to focus on how the behaviour affects

The best tip of all is that the safest way to use is to not use at all!

If you find yourself concerned about your alcohol and/or

drug use, or if others have been noticing it lately, try talking to someone about it. You may find it helpful to seek professional help. Here are some numbers to call.



The Etiquette of Regifting

It's Christmas morning, and your mom eagerly hands over a gift she's excited for you to open. The anticipation is high, but when you unwrap it, you realise you don't love it. How do you react? Most people will put on a happy face and thank the gift-giver politely — which is the right thing to do. But what do you do with that unwanted gift in the days and months afterward?

According to an article published in a 2016 issue of Current Directions in Psychological Science, the average gift-giver doesn't think past the initial gift-giving event. In the above example, your mom probably imagined your reaction when she picked out what she considered the perfect sweater but didn't really consider whether and when you'd wear it. With that in mind, the idea of regifting becomes more palatable. If you know the giver was focused on the initial moment you received the gift, the future of the unwanted present becomes a little bit brighter.

Simple Rules for Regifting Unwanted Presents

While many people dislike the idea, regifting unwanted presents can actually work when you do it tactfully, carefully, and with the right amount of thought. Instead of passing an unwanted gift to the next victim, it's possible to recognise you can't use something and match it with the ideal recipient. In that case, regifting keeps your home clutter-free while saving you money on gifts and acknowledging the gift's value. If you have a gift you can't use, giving it a new home often makes the most sense — as long as you follow a few simple rules.

1. Never Regift Anything Meaningful or Handmade

There aren't gift receipts for handmade gifts. It might not be your usual style, but if you know someone took extra time to locate or make a gift for you, it's typically bad form to give it away. Handmade gifts often include an emotional component since the giver took extra time and care to create something for you rather than just ordering a gift on their Amazon Prime account for the free shipping.

The same goes for meaningful gifts: If the giver makes comments about taking the time to choose the perfect gift or seems really excited to give you something, acknowledge that effort and keep it. You might not really need that first-edition book, but you can appreciate the time and thought that went into finding and purchasing it. Put it on your shelf and use it as a reminder of how much the giver cares about you.

2. Regift Outside That Social Circle

If you decide to regift something, remember that no one wants to know about the swap — that includes the initial giver and the second receiver.

If you want to regift, make sure there's no way the original giver could discover the regifting. That way, there aren't any hurt feelings because the original gift-giver doesn't know their present has found a new home elsewhere. It's also ideal to leave some time

between receiving it and passing it onto another person. Tuck that unwanted gift away until you thoughtfully find a new recipient.

3. Only Regift Brand-New Items

Expert regifters know only to regift brand-new products in the original packaging. If you've opened the package or used the gift, it's best to keep, sell, or donate it. Regifting used items, whatever the condition, is bad etiquette.

While you can still give these items away, don't frame it as a gift. Instead, be honest with the person you're giving it to, and just offer to let them have it. Letting the recipient know you've used the item and offering them the option to pass allows you to give it away without looking thoughtless.

4. Regift Thoughtfully

The vast majority of gifts are given with good intentions, even if they aren't always well thought-out. Don't simply regift to get rid of something or because you can't think of a new gift idea for the person who has everything. Regift when you know it's the ideal present for someone you love.

5. Avoid Signs of a Regift

Even if something is still new and in its original box, you could inadvertently leave telltale signs you've regifted. And since feelings about receiving a regifted present can be complicated even if they really like the gift, it's crucial to remove all signs you were the original recipient.

6. Don't Wait for a Special Occasion

Regifting often seems like it's more acceptable when it's simply a spontaneous surprise. Regifting a vacuum as a wedding present can seem tacky because a marriage is a significant milestone in someone's life and you should celebrate it accordingly with a thoughtful, helpful, and generous gift. But even if the recipient finds out, regifting goes over a little better when it's simply spur of the moment.

7. When in Doubt, Regift to Charity

Stuck with something you don't love? Instead of trying to give it to a friend or family member, you can always regift to charity. Organizations like the Salvation Army, Goodwill, Habitat for Humanity, and Toys for Tots all accept new items. And don't forget to collect your donation receipt so you can receive a tax deduction for your charitable giving.

8. Never Regift Food

Regifting a bottle of wine is no big deal, but if someone gave you homemade or custom baked goods or treats, don't regift them. Without the preservatives of prepackaged store-bought food, the treats could spoil or decline in quality before they reach the final recipient.

If you receive a food gift you know you won't consume, share it ASAP rather than framing it as a gift for someone else. Bringing cupcakes to work can make you the office hero, and they won't sit on your

kitchen counter for days before going into the garbage.

If you received prepackaged goods you can't consume before they expire, like a tin of store-bought holiday cookies, donate them to your local food bank. Because food-based gifts are meant to be consumed, the original giver never has to know you didn't eat them.

9. Always Show Appreciation

The most significant element of being a savvy and compassionate regifter is by always showing appreciation for the gift. Even if it's not your style or preference, it's essential to acknowledge the age-old adage that it's the thought that counts.

Before you pass a gift onto a new recipient, send a thank-you note or verbally thank the person who gave it to you. Remember that the average gift-giver thinks mostly about the initial reaction and not how the recipient will use or enjoy the gift long term.

Choosing holiday gifts, birthday presents, and wedding gifts can be stressful for the original giver, and as the recipient, it's your job to show a positive and grateful reaction. Once you've shown your appreciation, it's OK to tastefully regift with a clear conscience.


Final Word


Regifting can be a win-win situation since you have something you can't use and know someone who can. But in your bid to save money during the holidays and get rid of unwanted clutter, don't forget to consider the feelings of both the giver and the recipient. Even if regifting isn't a big deal to you, the original giver took the time and effort to carefully select it for you, and your eventual regifting recipient probably expects you to do the same.

A note before you regift: If either the original giver or your recipient finds out you've regifted, your best bet is simply to come clean. Don't dig yourself into a hole by telling a lie. Instead, explain that you weren't able to use the present, but you thought of someone who could and gave accordingly. By taking care to regift in the most polite and ethical way possible, you'll avoid finding yourself in hot water.
