What Will It Take?

The intersection of Collie Lake King Road (aka Stubbs Street) and Gorge Rock Lake Grace Road, commonly known as 'the crossroads' has been an issue of road safety for many years. Traffic travelling in a northerly or southerly direction is meant to stop and give way to those travelling along Stubbs Street; unfortunately, it is well known that many drivers don't even look like stopping.

There are many heart stopping moments for roadhouse proprietor Peter Stoffberg as he is witness to countless near misses as he goes through his working day. Local resident Kerrie Argent has been a victim of a number of near misses as she travels through the intersection regularly. Both agree that it is only a matter of time

before someone is killed or seriously injured.

Lake Grace Roadwise have been discussing this intersection for a number of years, half of the committee would have endured or been witness to a near miss themselves and therefore are heavily vested in seeing through a practical and safe outcome to the problem. As a committee we have tried to understand why road users aren't stopping. Is it driver distraction? Is the intersection oversigned? Is it driver arrogance?

Subsequent discussion and correspondence with Main Roads resulted in an audit being carried out on 11th July 2017; from this 11 recommendations were made. Three of those recommendations were carried out; clearing of vegetation to improve sight lines, new advance warning

Blokes and The Choice to Leave Home

All bloke's leave home at some stage whether to go to university, start a new job or just to get on with adult life. However, the act of leaving the protective shell of the family home can feel like a thing to be feared or regretted. We should not let these fears cloud our appreciation for what is a real opportunity to enjoy independence, freedom and responsibility unlike any we can have under the shelter of our family roof.

There is a growing trend in Australia and globally, for young people to stay home for longer and longer, even into their late twenties. While there are legitimate financial and family reasons that make up a portion of this trend there is also a resistance amongst young people, and even parents, to allow life to take its natural course and for young blokes to try and strike out on their own.

This has the dangerous potential of arresting the development of our young men and putting their lives on hold. How often have we heard the saying that the 30's are the new 20's. While young people these days have different sets of challenges to face than their parents, from exorbitant housing prices, longer periods at university and what can be a difficult job market. It is still important to continue our life's journey in an enthusiastic and optimistic fashion.

What young blokes need to do when thinking of moving out is realistically ask themselves some important questions:

- What mental, physical, social and financial advantages and disadvantages are there to moving out?
- Is this a move that will have a positive impact on my future?
- Will the place I move to be a safe and healthy environment?
- Am I being realistic about my expectations and what I can afford?
- Have I got my family's support?

If the answers to these questions are positive, it's time to start planning. Planning for the practical matters usually comes first, such as when and where to move, what appliances and furniture to get and who if anyone to live with. However, it's important to acknowledge that leaving home for the first time is not easy and there will likely be feelings of anxiety, homesickness and loneliness along the way and that needs to be planned for as well.

Ways to deal with this are to have the practical details planned well in advance to reduce stress, but also to plan for your emotional wellbeing. Try to resolve any arguments you may be having with your parents and be sure you aren't moving out prematurely simply to avoid conflict. Make sure to schedule time to visit home, or at least call often and keep involved. Importantly try to make the new home feel like a proper home to you, whether that be by bringing your own mementos from home, or by creating a similar routine.

The choice to leave home involves many uncertainties but can be rewarding because it exposes us to opportunities for personal growth. Take the time to enjoy this exciting new chapter in your life journey.

New Report Backs Royalties for Regions

Media Release

The Nationals WA have welcomed the release of the "Keep it in the regions" report, with many of the key recommendations forming part of the party's existing policy platform.

Leader Mia Davies said the report praised The Nationals WA's flagship Royalties for Regions program, even going as far as recommending other mining States introduce their own version of the scheme. "The report recognises RfR as the most significant program in Australia aimed at reinvesting mining royalties into regional areas," Ms Davies said.

"It's pleasing to know that a policy devised, created and delivered by a small, regionally-focused party such as The Nationals WA can leave such a lasting impression and gain national recognition." The report, compiled by the House of Representatives Standing Committee on Industry, Innovation, Science and Resources, addressed terms of payment offered by mining companies to their suppliers and contractors in regional areas.

"The length of payment terms is something The Nationals WA has historically gone into bat for regional businesses over," Ms Davies said. "In 2016 we led a campaign to make Rio Tinto accountable for increasing

payment deadlines from 45 to 90 days – taking our concerns to then-chief executive Sam Walsh and iron ore boss Andrew Harding.

"I am pleased that the committee has recommended significantly strengthening the Australian Supplier Payment Code, pending the result of a separate review."





New Report Backs Royalties for Regions (cont.)

Ms Davies said the report's first recommendation to compare data on the wealth extracted from regional areas with what resource companies return to those same communities reflected a long-held view by The Nationals WA that regional areas miss out.

"It is only fair that the communities which generate our State's vast wealth receive their fair share in return," she said. "We're not asking for a Fiona Stanley Hospital or stadium in every town, but we do expect regional West Australians to have access to quality infrastructure and services."

Ms Davies said The Nationals WA Senate candidate Nick Fardell had been instrumental in bringing the Standing Committee west and into the Goldfields.

"Nick Fardell, along with my State colleague and Deputy Leader Jacqui Boydell, wrote to the Committee in September making the case for them to visit Kalgoorlie," Ms Davies said. "Up until that point the Committee had only been scheduled to visit Port Hedland – something which was announced late and only confirmed after Nick put some pressure on through the media.

"Nick Fardell has again shown a remarkable ability to get things done and stand up for Western Australia."

Other recommendations welcomed by The Nationals WA include reviewing the provisions of the Fringe Benefits Tax, which incentivises mining companies to employ a FIFO workforce over residential, and inducement for mining companies to develop remote operating centres in regional towns rather than the metro area.

Hollows For The Homeless

On the 3rd and 4th of November this year the annual Darlington Arts Festival created a new art event. In the remnant bush near the festival, the committee hosted a sculpture exhibition and competition. Twenty eight entries were received from the local (Mundaring, Midland, Perth) area and one entry from as far away as Lake Grace.

Kerrie Argent entered a set of woven nests of generous proportions made from grape vine prunings, old fencing wire and recycled fashion waste. She entitled her work "Hollows for the Homeless". Kerrie said she was "continuing my exploration of alternative homes for the homeless, using recycled materials. Creating warm cosy shelters from found, salvaged or donated materials".

There were 6 separate hollows. They lay comfortably in the bush space under old palm trees looking very much at "home". The Judges Gemma Ben Ary, Kate Parker and Mark Alderson were delighted with Kerrie's work and suggested a Highly Commended award for "Hollows for the Homeless". They said that the sculpture was notable for its masterful use of materials, great use of scale and it's conceptual resolution.

The Sculptures on the Scarp team were delighted with Kerrie's art and are hopeful that she will make a return visit next year. They were also grateful for Kerrie's sense of community after she assisted with install and volunteered to engage with the public at the exhibition.

The exhibition was extremely well received by the public. Upwards of 5000 visitors each day wended their way down a wide pathway to look at the delightfully interesting works of art in the beautiful and peaceful setting of the Darlington Station Reserve.

Next year the exhibition will be on again on 2nd and 3rd November. We will be calling for entries sometime in February/March 2019. First prize in 2018 was \$2000 and People's Choice was \$600. Tarin Rock Book Update

Hello everybody living locally to Tarin Rock Nature Reserve. I hope that you have been able to visit the reserve this spring? Both September and October were excellent for viewing wildflowers and have kept me really busy with processing all my plant samples and photos.

I have lodged 78 plant species with the Western Australian herbarium to date and there are probably the same number to be lodged at a later date. That means that I am finding plants in the reserve that have not been recorded from there before. I am also making some exciting discoveries of plants that are classed as priority species. These are plants from which there are not many locations in Western Australia that they have been recorded from. It is my intention that I will provide photos of these priority species in the book.

So in October I recorded more than 100 flowering plant species in 5 days, and a frog. My last visit to the reserve was shorter as the spring flowering season is mostly over. There are still many flowering plants to be found especially within the groups of the eucalyptus, melaleucas, goodeniaceae and verticordias. The trigger plants were also flowering at this time and some are really tiny. They catapult pollen onto the back of any

visiting insect. The 'catapult' resets itself in order to repeat the action with the next visiting insect. This month I was also fortunate enough to get a close-up view of a young wedge-tailed eagle.

My next visit will be 15 to 18 December. If anybody wants to come along, let me know and we can meet up on site. You can reach me by email at tarinrockbook@gmail.com or by phone on 0439 978 550.





Get in to Your Garden

(http://www.sgaonline.org.au/choosing-mulch-for-your-garden/)

There are different reasons for using mulch in your garden, so it's important to choose the best mulch for your purposes. There are so many different mulches available with different appearances, prices and characteristics.

Why mulch?

Mulching performs a variety of functions in the garden:

- · Reduces moisture loss from the soil surface, thus aiding plant growth, and reducing the need to water. It also lessens the chance of the soil surface drying out and cracking.
- · If used correctly it suppresses weed growth, reducing competition for water and nutrients, and decreases the amount of 'weeding time' the gardener has to put into maintenance.
- · Many types of mulch add nutrients to the soil when broken down, and improve soil structure.
- · Mulching also reduces run-off and soil movement from garden beds.
- In winter it can help keep soil warmer so that plants grow a little more vigorously.

Wood Chips

It is best to obtain them graded in size from a garden centre. They break down slowly, but use nitrogen from the soil as they do so. This problem can be overcome by sprinkling some organic nitrogen-containing fertilizer

on the ground before spreading them. It can also be avoided by using it around native plants with low nutrient requirements.

Shredded Bark

This is also a byproduct of the timber industry – pine or hardwoods - and is supplied in different sizes. It is best used on general garden beds. Like wood chips, it also draws nitrogen from the soil as it breaks down.

Recycled Mulch

Obtained from kerbside recycling this mulch contains a mixture of sizes and also, occasionally, bits of glass or other materials. But, a cheap option for general use.

Straw

Straw from legumes like lucerne and peas are excellent because they are high in nitrogen, but they can be too expensive to use as a general mulch. They are best used on areas where the high nutrient content can be utilised best, such as the vegetable garden, and any remaining after the growth season can be dug in. A minor disadvantage is the presence of seeds which may grow – but at least they are easy to remove. Other types of straw are also available e.g. wheat, barley they are cheaper but do not have high nitrogen.

Hay is cut and dried grass or legumes. Therefore, it contains more nutrients than straw

AGRN: 743 Flood Event

Harvest Road Safety

Council has agreed to place a speed restriction on gravel roads again this harvest. The following notice will be distributed.

80km Restrictions - Gravel Roads

All vehicles greater than 4.5 tonnes are restricted to a maximum speed of 80 km/hr on all gravel roads within the Shire of Lake Grace from 1 November to 31 December 2018 inclusive.

This is to assist with road safety and road preservation over the harvest period. Please be alert and considerate of other roads users.

Harvest brings more grain trucks on our gravel roads, take care, be aware of other roads uses and road signs.

Don't drive in the dust from the vehicle in front, slow down, there is no way of knowing what else is in that dust cloud.

All road users be aware of Shire maintenance vehicles on roads in your area throughout harvest.



- Do not speed. Abide by traffic management signs where roadworks are taking place.
- Shire road works locations are subject to change for emergency repairs, be aware at all times.
- Don't drive in dust when travelling behind vehicles. Keep a safe distance and safe road position behind vehicle in front to ensure vehicles travelling in opposite direction can see you.
- Vehicles seen driving without caution will be reported.



Shire of Lake Grace Fire Zone Map





Total Fire Ban Changes to Assist Farmers

Changes to Total Fire Ban regulations mean you can now harvest or move vehicles across paddocks during a Total Fire Ban (TFB) as long as;

- a Harvest and Vehicle Movement Ban has not been put in place by the Shire of Lake Grace.
- you have a firefighting vehicle on site, with a minimum 400 litres of water.

Shire of Lake Grace will be responsible for placing Harvest and Vehicle Movement. This will happen when local weather conditions result in the Grassland Fire Danger Index (GFDI) reaching 32. Very high in the Grassland Fire Danger Rating.



Harvest Ban Zones

All fire zones in the Shire of Lake Grace will be on Channel 11 in an event of a fire.

- When a fire occurs on a property in a zone a Harvest and Vehicle Movement Ban will be imposed for the whole zone until the fire is deemed safe, and the Harvest and Vehicle Movement Ban is lifted.
- When a fire occurs on a property neighbouring a zone boundary both zones will have a Harvest and Vehicle Movement Ban imposed until the fire is deemed safe, and the Harvest and Vehicle Movement Ban is lifted.

Smoking Pot Not Equal to Medicinal Cannabis



There are significant differences between pharmaceutical products derived from cannabis and the consumption of marijuana for the purposes of getting high. There are over 100 cannabinoids in the cannabis plant, including THC, the cannabinoid associated with the psychoactive effect associated with smoking or ingesting marijuana recreationally. The use of crude cannabis remains illegal in parts of Australia, while the pharmaceutical products derived from the cannabis plant frequently involve isolating useful cannabinoids and refining their production to minimise harm. These pharmaceutical products may contain various levels of the cannabinoids dependent on which medical condition they are being used for. The search for medical uses of

cannabinoids can be compared to the way that the opium poppy plant was researched and trialed to develop pharmaceutical products, such as morphine. (https://www.health.qld.gov.au/news-alerts/news/medicinal-cannabis-what-is-it-and-is-it-different-to-marijuana)

There is a misconception that marijuana use is harmless, and this isn't always the case. Some people even believe that it's good for them, but there are risks associated with the use of marijuana that need to be understood. Marijuana contains psychoactive chemicals, and anytime something is affecting your brain, even in the short-term, it can have lasting effects on mental health. When someone uses cannabis, certain compounds bind to receptors in the brain. With marijuana, there's a lot of variation in the makeup and potency of the drug, and since it's illegal in most places, there's very little regulation. When someone smokes marijuana, it quickly enters their bloodstream and then crosses the blood-brain barrier, and the person feels high. The high from marijuana can range from feeling very relaxed to feeling panicked or highly anxious. At higher amounts, the risk of having a negative experience is even higher, and people can have symptoms like paranoia and hallucinations. There is an increasing amount of evidence showing there are some very real concerns to be aware of when looking at marijuana and mental health, particularly in younger people, long-term users and people who have a predisposition for mental health disorders. This doesn't necessarily mean that marijuana can cause mental health problems, but it does mean that it could heighten some symptoms of mental health disorders. If you're someone with a genetic predisposition for mental health disorders, in particular, the ones below, it's really important to be cautious with the use of marijuana.

Depression: Many people feel that marijuana and mental health conditions go hand-in-hand, particularly depression and this may be true for some people. While some people use marijuana as a way to self-medicate and eases symptoms of depression, it may actually make it worse. Also, young people who use marijuana during adolescence have been shown to be more likely to develop depression later in their life.

Bipolar Disorder and Schizophrenia: What we do know is that it can highlight symptoms of these existing disorders, and young people who use large amounts of it may be more at risk for developing these mental health problems later in their life because of the changes to their neural pathways. There's also the risk of an acute cannabis psychosis, which can include

delusions and hallucinations, although this usually goes away within a few hours.

Anxiety: So many people rely on marijuana as a way to help them cope with anxiety, but it can make the symptoms worse. This is true when you're using it, but also when you withdraw from it. (https://www.therecoveryvillage.com/marijuana-addiction/marijuana-mental-health-marijuana-affect-mental-health/#gref)

When adolescents use marijuana, for example, the white matter of their brains can undergo changes that are similar to the brains of individuals with schizophrenia. Perhaps it's not surprising, then, that marijuana smoking in adolescence significantly increases the risk for eventually becoming psychotic and/or developing schizophrenia. This risk is even greater for people who had psychiatric symptoms before their first experience with marijuana and those with schizophrenia in their families. And furthermore, more and more data is confirming the fact that marijuana users are also at increased risk for developing anxiety and depression later in their lives, as well as having memory deficits.

Suppose someone wants to comfort himself by saying that he only smokes once in a while - in what I might

call the "almost addicted" range—and that therefore he is not at any increased risk for developing psychiatric issues as a result of marijuana use? Data show that even using marijuana occasionally can carry with it an increased risk of psychiatric disorders. For example, a Swedish study found a 70-percent increased risk of becoming schizophrenic for those who'd used marijuana just five to 10 times over their lifetime. These same researchers found that those who'd used marijuana more than 50 times in their life had a more than 600-percent increased risk of schizophrenia. In the Australian adult population, persons who used cannabis were more likely to screen positively for psychosis. Around one in 143 persons who were non-users screened positively, with the prevalence increasing as involvement with cannabis increased, such that one in 15 persons who met criteria for cannabis dependence also screened positively for psychosis. After controlling for demographics, neuroticism and other drug use, the relationship between dependent cannabis use and screening positively for psychosis relationship was still significant.

In the general population, many of those with cannabis use disorders will have other mental health problems, which is important given the increase in the numbers presenting to treatment agencies for help with their dependent cannabis use. Data from the Australian National Survey of Mental Health and Well-Being showed it was possible to calculate that in those who met criteria for cannabis dependence, two thirds (64%) with an affective disorder sought help, compared to one fifth (21%) of those without an affective disorder. Similarly, of those who met criteria for cannabis dependence and who also met criteria for an anxiety disorder, 80% sought help, compared to 16% of those without an anxiety disorder. This means that people coming to the attention of treatment services will be much more likely to have multiple problems; these need to be addressed in treatment. Inspection Programme Uncovers Safety Concerns in Pubs

Media Release - Worksafe

A proactive inspection programme undertaken by WorkSafe to look at safety in WA's pubs, taverns and bars has uncovered concerns with hazardous substances, manual tasks and emergency precautions.

The programme involved Inspectors visiting pubs, taverns and bars in Perth and regional areas of the State over a two-year period from July 2016 to June 2018.

The programme was prompted by a significant number of lost-time injuries in the sector, in particular serious and severe injuries, and the young age of affected workers.

Over the two years of the programme, a total of 188 workplaces were visited, resulting in the issue of 1262 Improvement Notices and 11 Prohibition Notices.

The largest number of notices – more than a quarter of the total (368 notices) – related to hazardous substances. They included notices for a lack of training records, risk assessment records and registers of hazardous substances.

The next most numerous notices (197 notices) related to manual tasks – including a lack of information, instruction and training in avoiding injury, and notices regarding manually lifting beer kegs.

A total of 135 notices were for breaches related to emergency precautions – including failure to develop and/or clearly display evacuation procedures and not providing first aid training and/or facilities.

WorkSafe Director Sally North said today the results of the programme were quite disappointing considering the number of young and itinerant workers in the sector.

"Pubs, clubs and bars are largely characterised by the high number of young workers and a high turnover of staff," Ms North said.

"A large proportion of workers in the sector are students and young people on overseas working visas.

"These workers can be particularly vulnerable to injury, and it is crucial they are given sufficient and relevant training, instruction and supervision in all tasks they will be required to carry out."

As part of the programme, Inspectors looked at WorkSafe priority areas including forklift safety, electricity, falls from height, hazardous substances and machinery guarding.

They also focused on more specific areas such as slips, trips and falls from oil, water and food on floors, manual tasks such as handling kegs and heavy bags of food, cuts from knives, cutlery and glass and burns from oil, liquids and hot surfaces.

Other areas of focus included violence and aggression, beverage gas safety, safe use and movement of vehicles, exposure to communicable diseases for at-risk workers and first aid for burn injuries.

"WorkSafe's continuing series of proactive inspection programmes has the primary goal of letting employers know how they can comply with workplace safety and health laws," Ms North said.

"This programme has given us a valuable insight into the current safety issues in the sector, and we will continue to monitor it closely.

"We firmly believe that raising the safety awareness of everyone in the workplace is the best way in which to lessen the risk of work-related injury and illness."

so will enrich the soil. It is, however, likely to contain more seeds than straw.

Leaves

Deciduous trees provide an annual source of cheap mulch. Leaves should be shredded, especially the larger ones, since they can form a mat when wet and not let water through. They can be useful in winter to provide an insulating layer, but break down fairly quickly.

Grass Clippings

These break down fast and add nutrients to the soil. If fresh, grass clippings should be applied in thin layers because they can start to rot when wet. Alternatively, they can be applied more thickly if they are first dried. There is a risk, though that that seeds from the grass (or weeds in it) start to germinate.

Compost

A thick layer of compost can be used as mulch. It breaks down faster than the above products, so would need to be replaced regularly. Compost is best used as a soil conditioner and many gardeners apply a layer of one of the above products on top of it.

Rocks and gravel

They look attractive and help keep soil warm. But they may absorb too much heat and damage plants – they are more suitable for drought-resistant Australian natives plants or cacti. Scoria is a reddish volcanic rock full of holes that allows water to go right through. It is

much lighter than pebbles and easier to handle. Take care though – over time, dust accumulates in the crevices of all rocks and gravel and creates opportunities for weed seed germination. This type of mulch is very difficult to remove should you decide to remodel the garden.

Others

Plastic sheeting or landscape fabrics, while suppressing weeds, don't add nutrients to the soil. Moreover, they are manufactured so have required energy use in their production. Plastic sheeting has the added disadvantage of hindering passage of water and air to the soil – landscape fabric is more permeable.

How to Apply Mulch

To ensure success, take these few steps before laying mulch down:

- 1. Remove weeds
- 2. Moisten the soil thoroughly.
- 3. If water is running off the surface, fork through some compost to aid with the water retention.
- 4. If you are planting into the soil, add some compost into the planting hole.
- 5. Apply large particle-sized mulch thickly (6 8cm deep), keeping the area directly around plants clear.
 6. If you are using bark- or wood-based mulches, you might consider sprinkling some blood and bone over the soil. This extra nitrogen will compensate for any nitrogen being taken up by the gradual decomposition of the mulch.

signs and road markings (white hold line). Roadwise had made recommendations to Main Roads for either rumble strips, solar powered signage similar to the school zones or to have STOP painted on the roadway. None of these suggestions were taken on board.

After receiving CCTV footage of a B Double truck travelling through the intersection without any sign of slowing down Lake Grace Roadwise decided drastic action was needed and have developed a Facebook page. Within 24 hours of the page being live and the said footage being uploaded the page had already achieved over 50 followers. The page isn't about 'naming and shaming' but is about creating awareness. If this publicity persuades our locals to stop then that is an added bonus.

In her line of work as a registered nurse, Kerrie Argent is fully aware of the damage that would have been done to her if the near miss had been an impact; she is therefore quite passionate (and in her words grumpy) about driver behaviour and how it has the potential to impact on others.

Following an ABC Great Southern radio interview with Kerrie; Dean Roberts, Media Manager for Main Roads issued a statement regarding the crossroads. He stated that "although aware that some residents have raised concerns about drivers failing to stop this was a police enforcement issue. MRWA had undertaken a safety audit of the site and undertaken a number of

improvements". Two of the recommendations that were carried out were simple maintenance and should have been carried out on a regular basis.

A more drastic suggestion from the community has been a roundabout. Although far more expensive than other suggestions it would force traffic to slow. Mr Roberts also said that if a roundabout was installed it would need to be a significant size to accommodate RAV 7 movements and would have a significant impact on adjacent properties. Roadwise understands that Mr Roberts hasn't actually asked adjacent property owners their thoughts regarding impact to their business.

Main Roads feel that this intersection has low traffic volume, around half a million vehicles a year (according to stats supplied by MRDWA), and that no further road improvements are envisaged at this time.

As an organisation Roadwise will continue campaigning for improvements, we do ask for the assistance of our community by asking all drivers to adhere to the signage.

If you are so desperate to give away \$300 (the current fine for not stopping at a stop sign), then our organisation would be willing to accept your donation. If \$300 or 3 demerit points isn't a deterrent then at least consider how an accident can impact on the motorist and their passengers; the families of the victims and the emergency services who have to pick up the pieces.
