Santa made his entrance this year into the Christmas Festival with an escort from the local police.


The bouncy castle and the Thomas the Tank Engine kept the younger children entertained.

Editorial

Well another year is over, who'd have thought it would rush by so quickly. Thank you to the many people who are involved in ensuring the success of the Lakes Link News; the contributors, those who place advertising and of course the readers. It can be quite high pressured once getting to the pointy end of producing a Lakes Link; therefore having a steady band of helpers sending material in on time is a great help. Having volunteers willing to contribute write-ups and take photographs on our behalf also takes pressure off staff as it can be quite easy to have not just work time but also out of hours time taken up. So a huge thank you to you all; the success of the paper belongs to you.

- © Volunteers are the lifeblood of any community organisation and their assistance in whatever capacity is invaluable. To our steady band of helpers, thank you. In 2016 we have had 706.50 volunteer hours contributed to the CRC and other organisations that they're involved with. Our proofreaders have given 267.5 hours to assist with grammatical, spelling and typo errors in the paper. Don't get too excited if you think you've outwitted the proof-reader, it is rare that I'm that organised that they get to see the whole paper. Then there's our litter-pickers; they have contributed 253.5 hours to collecting up rubbish from within our town and alongside the entry roads. They have collected 600-700 bags of rubbish; disgusting isn't it. The committee have given 67.75 hours in assisting with the management of the CRC while staff have contributed 77.5 hours with extra admin work, cleaning and collecting material for the Lakes Link News. 40.25 hours have been contributed to other activities such as LCDC and Driver Reviver. This wouldn't even be the full picture. With volunteers hours valued at \$35 that's an investment of \$24,727.50 in our little organisation.
- ☼ Thank you to those who have volunteered for the Driver Reviver for the Christmas break. Thank you also to those who have entered the Roadwise quiz in the last Lakes Link. - Thank you to those who participated in the 2016 Christmas Festival (aka Late Night Shopping). It was a wonderful night with a slight cool breeze as the evening settled in but there were still lots of people getting around.
- The subscriptions for the 2017 Lakes Link News have been coming in hard and fast, thank you. We would appreciate it if everyone could get their subscriptions in prior to New Year. If we don't hear

- from you we will assume that you are not continuing with your subscription. As our first Links for 2017 comes out on Thursday 19th January we need those couple of weeks prior to organise address labels and our subscription list. Late subscriptions do make the whole process difficult for us so if you could make the cut-off date of 31st December I would be very grateful.
- © For any club curious about the changes that have come into effect for all **incorporated organisations** please keep in mind that the CRC will be hosting workshops covering, roles of the committee and constitutions. Workshops in Lake Grace will be held Monday 20th February for the roles of the committee and Monday 27th February for Newdegate.
- We have a **forklift workshop** already booked for February 2017, the dates are the 9th and 10th. If you have staff that are needing to be accredited then please keep us in mind.
- We also have **budgeting workshops** coming up on the 13th (evening) and 14th (morning) of February. These workshops are suitable for homes budgets, small business and organisations.

Media Release. Shire of Lake Grace

As of Friday 16 December First Health will no longer be providing Practice Management or a General Practice Business Support Service to the Shire of Lake Grace.

The Shire will be responsible for managing the Medical Centre Practice until suitable arrangements can be put in place with a suitably qualified doctor, to provide GP and Practice Management services, on a more permanent basis.

The Shire has formed a working group consisting of Cr De Landgrafft, Cr Marshall and Cr Armstrong along with the Chief Executive Officer to pursue all available options for the placement of a suitably

qualified permanent doctor. Rural Health West will be assisting the Shire through this process.

The locum services of Doctor Peter Lacey have been engaged for the period Thursday 5 January 2017 to Friday 27 January 2017. During this period Dr Lacey will also be on call at the hospital.

Our commitment is to engage a suitably qualified doctor for our community as soon as practicable.

George Arnold Byass

04/04/1923 - 07/11/2016

93.5 years on this earth and a lifetime of farming. I am not about to even give the suggestion that I can stand here and give a definition of the man that was Arnold Byass. In fact I don't think you can define this truly unique human being. I am sure those that knew Arnold well, would agree.

Farming ran through Arnold's veins. He was born on the land, he worked the land, and then it was his connection with this land that kept his mind alive and active right till the end.

In the days that followed Arnolds departure we reflected on the memories that defined the essence of Arnold Byass. A man so proud and stubborn that until just this year he refused to use a WALKER simply because they were for old people.

He was a man whose whole existence was driven by ritual and habit. Apparently this was even true when it came to how he got out of bed each morning. At the age of about 4 Chelsea was having a playdate with Nanna and gave her a complete point by point description of what Grandad did every morning as he was getting out of bed: from the way he sat up, how he swung his legs over the side of the bed and how he always scratched his head. Ida was gobsmacked. And after sleeping in the same bed with Arnold for 34 years had not noticed this. The following morning she made it her mission to investigate. To her amazement Chelsea had explained the morning ritual in precise detail.

And then there is the Benadryl (for those of you who may not know, Benadryl is a cough syrup).

We wonder if this was a habit, an addiction or an elixir of youth. Arnold had a swig of Benadryl every day of the year, year after year for what seems like forever. So much so, that Ida kept a supply in the cupboard always. Then just recently when Ida went to her local pharmacy to buy the usual supply, the pharmacist said "I really can't sell you more Benadryl Mrs Byass. I suggest that if Mr Byass is still unwell that he really should be seeing the Doctor". On reporting this unfortunate turn of events to Arnold, he was not fazed because he had a very unique way of solving that problem. With 7 pharmacies in the area Ida would just need to go to each one in turn so as not to create suspicion.

Arnold was his own Doctor. He adjusted his own medications. He decided what was right for him and he also decided what was to be ignored — which most of the time this meant that you ignored the Dr. So just as Benadryl was one of the staples in his diet so were the sleeping tablets. Probably that doesn't seem that unusual. But by pure accident one Christmas eve, we discovered the secret elixir that Arnold prescribed for himself. When everyone had gone to bed I surprised Arnold in the kitchen. Sitting in the semi darkness I found him slipping into a glass of wine. He looked up a bit shocked and explained quickly "I can't sleep and if I have my sleeping tablets with a glass of wine I



definitely sleep better".

But he wasn't just a Dr of Medicine. His expertise extended to the field of dentistry. About 16 years ago (and the last time he went to the Dentist I might add) he had a tooth that had broken off. The Dentist described how he needed to remove and replace this tooth before it fell apart. Arnold had his own ideas and suggested that as it was his tooth and he was not experiencing any pain then the Dentist should just leave it there. File it down and put a cap on it. This was not conventional practice but there was no point in arguing. And needless to say the tooth is still like that today.

Just as Ida loves to socialise, Arnold did NOT. I reckon that is definitely no startling revelation to any one of you. What can I say?? Probably many of you sitting here now would have got the message quite unapologetically at one time or other that Arnold would prefer you were not there. Or if you were a welcome visitor you were definitely aware of when it was time to leave. But know right now that he really didn't dislike any one of you. He just liked his own personal space and he had very strong views on what shared this space.

Firstly

People....only when he was in the mood and so long as there were not too many at one time.

Secondly

Flowers....definitely none of them! And

Thirdly

Music.... None of that. No way. Unless of course it was the introduction to the ABC news.

Arnold was a down to earth, dinky di, true blue man from the bush. Nothing too fancy, nothing too sophisticated and nothing too complicated. This was reflected in his approach to his work on the farm. Wire and binder twine was the solution to almost anything. It would fix anything, hold anything together and could be a substitute for countless other things. We had water pipes, hoses, truck bonnets, grills – you name it. All fixed very unconventionally.

This amazing creative side to Arnold was evident in a variety of ways. Small pieces of rag scrunched into a

ball were always the best ear plugs and a drawer full of pieces of flannel ripped from old shirts constituted his hanky collection. And when Ida was sick of stuff falling down the gap between her bathroom sink and the shower screen there was no need to go to Bunnings. No, not when a cardboard box can get shoved in the gap and hang suspended down the side of the cupboard. Well that was a few years ago and the box may be a bit faded but it's still doing the job today.

Perhaps this was just the old fashioned way and the way he was....so used to things being less complicated. It must be hard to go from the horse and cart days and then step into the New Age of farming. Like when we introduced 2-ways to the farm. We wondered why we could never get hold of Dad. It was so puzzling. He seemed to be there and calling us whenever he wanted something. Why was it that we could never get him. We asked him whether he had the 2-way turned down too far. "No! Was his indignant reply. It's turned off". He couldn't see why he should have it on as it wasn't necessary until he needed us. Well it took a few years but eventually he mellowed. He began to understand the point of having it on. At long last we could all communicate with each other. But "OH" how we did not see the next problem mounting. Our wonderfully quiet, relatively anti-social Dad was being exposed to the social banter of the airways one hot summer afternoon. Amidst the chatter, John called him up to see how things were going, to which he replied " It would be a lot bloody better if the people on this two way would shut up!" The currently noisy 2-way

Consequently, that evening, John made a very apologetic phonecall to our 2-way buddies and I am happy to say that they still laugh about this incident today.

And while we are on the new age stuff. He didn't much approve of some Tupperwares creations. One item that springs to mind is the beetroot container. He just couldn't get his head around the idea that once you took the lid off, the handle that you could see was actually part of the crate inside, that held the beetroot. This container was never appreciated and there were numerous slipups. But one day when a guest passed the open container across the middle of the table and of course Dad seeing the handle grabbed it and lifted... well...beetroot covered everything in sight and needless to say this container was never seen again! In fact Ida received a sympathy card from this special guest just last night. The words written were, that forever more, two words will go together – "Arnold" and "Beetroot".

Change was not his forte and when you always get your own way and when you are always right you were never going to admit when you changed your opinion on something you had been so firm about. Somehow you just let it happen and didn't draw attention to the change. This was what it was like when we first got married. John taught me how to drive the header. Aghast Arnold looked straight at John and said "Well she's not driving my Header!" But a week later I

became his chief partner in crime. Driving headers in partnership that year and for many years to come.

That was the start of an amazing relationship and understanding that was forged between the 2 Byass couples as we worked together in the future – along with the 8 children John and I were blessed with over the years.

No he didn't care much for change but it must be noted at this time that the one modern day invention that Dad did take to like a duck to water was AIRCONDITIONING.

In the ute, in the header, in the tractor and in the car. He loved it. But for once this was something Ida found hard to adapt to. Icicles hung from Idas ears and nose every time she stepped out of the car. And when it made it's way in to the house Arnold had a permanent mattress in the dining room under the airconditioner, How amusing was it to turn up at Nannas house in the middle of a summer day. Grandad in his singlet reading the paper with the airconditioner on full bore and Nanna in her overcoat and uggies!

Dad loved growing crops. So much so, that in 2009 at the age of 86 he hopped off his header after the first day of harvest and announced "I haven't felt this happy since last year when I was on the header!"

But sheep were another story. He disliked them with a passion. If we were drafting sheep there was definitely nothing exciting about Grandad rocking up. In fact there was usually a noticeable groan. The dog was asked to leave, the kids were all told they were in the wrong place and the sheep were usually running too fast or maybe too slow. Oh we really wished Grandad would have stayed in front of the air conditioner reading his paper! The 20 min job was now sure to be a 40 min job.

His reputation with sheep was widespread. Years ago the shearers would arrive with a newspaper. As Ida thanked them for their thoughtfulness and consideration, they announced "Nah not really, it's just the best way to keep Arnold out of the shed!

Then there was the Crutchers a few months later. Ida asked them if there was anything they needed and the response was "Yep it would be great if you could keep Arnold occupied for as long as possible!"

Arnold lived a life blessed with very little illness. So it seems remarkable that in the end it was not old age but rather a burst appendix that was to cause his demise. In his final days' he was quite indignant to have to spend time in hospital and Ida felt sure that the nurses were asking to be put with other patients on their next shift. In fact John said to one nurse at one stage "So would you call Mr Byass a model patient?" She very politely said "No not really!" Well that was an understatement.

He was Arnold through and through until his dying day. Literally the man was out to prove that he always got what he wanted.



Eastern Wheatbelt Biosecuity Group

The Eastern Wheatbelt Biosecurity Group (EWBG) would like to advise the community that from the 30th September 2016 to 30th September 2017 an aerial and ground baiting program (using 1080 meat baits) will be in place to control wild dogs. This program will be carried out by Pest Management Technicians (Doggers) across the Eastern Wheatbelt regions.

In addition to 1080 baiting programs Licensed Pest Technicians will be using Foothold traps treated with Strychnine to remove Wild Dogs that could impact on the Livestock industry in the Eastern Wheatbelt region.

Additional intermittent ground baiting of pastoral leases, DPaW Reserves, unallocated Crown Lands and freehold farms in these areas may also be carried out at any time.

The poison baits will remain toxic for a number months or until substantial rainfall is received. People are advised to take care when working within or visiting these areas.

Warning signs have been placed where applicable on pastoral, DPaW, unallocated Crown Land and main access roads in agricultural areas.

Please consult with individual pastoralists, DPaW and/

or farmers prior to entering their lands. Picnic sites and recreational reserves are not included within the baiting program, however, baiting may take place adjacent to such areas and domestic pets should be kept close and under control at all times.

1080 baiting is an integral part of the wild dog pest management program. Pastoralists, DPaW and farmers undertake these poisoning programs to protect livestock from death and injury caused by wild dogs.

If poisoning occurs, contact a doctor or Poisons Information Centre (phone 13 11 26).

For further details please contact the local Department of Agriculture and Food or Department of Parks and Wildlife or the Eastern Wheatbelt Biosecurity Group.

Ambulance Building...Practical Completion, Building Surveyor Approval, Eaves Lined....but still no TELSTRA!

Day 236 of the construction of the new St John Ambulance - Lake Grace Sub Centre and practical completion (PC) of the building has been achieved. AK Homes Construction Ltd have been working at obtaining the Certificate of Construction Completion (BA17) which required our Building Surveyor, Mr Darryle Baxter, to attend the site and inspect the works. Good news.... the building achieved sign-off last Friday the 16th December, just inside our 2 year planning application permit time.....phew!

Two more steps to go. AK Homes now use a BA9 to request the Certificate of Occupancy from the Shire of Lake Grace. Once Josiah Farrell (Shire Building Surveyor) returns from leave in mid January it is hopefully a formality to get the BA10......Confused yet? There are 21 forms that are required to get a building this far, all requiring several steps... Just two to go!

The building is still on budget, but as you would appreciate as we near the end of construction and fit out, the GST returns are all important. All grants are awarded GST exclusive, so we have to fund the GST and claim it back. As St John Ambulance WA Ltd submit their monthly GST returns as one entity (all 130 sub centres), it takes about 3 months for the funds to trickle back to our account from head office. Hence we have had to fund nearly \$85K of GST up front, which is a little challenging but we are tracking well. AK Homes have been paid their final payment after we checked with each contractor that they had been paid.

In the last fortnight, AK Homes completed their works to achieve practical completion. TigerSpark completed some minor works in the garage (with the help of a telehandler), wired in the stove and installed the audible/visual warning light to the septic tanks. Trevenen Building and Glass have attended site to install the verandah eave lining with the help of Stubby's Electrical who re-positioned the verandah lighting. Lewis Building and Maintenance also made a cameo appearance this last fortnight finishing some gap filling between the tiles and the doorframes.

Ross Chappell has been busy and has constructed the gas bottle cage so that it looks just like the building with Colourbond and cladding. Volunteer Keith Higgs also got busy last week and put together the 18 lockers for the locker room and installed them - the room looks great.

The filing cabinets for the offices have arrived and more office and training room furniture is due this week along with the external signage. All of our deliveries are coming via Lake Grace Transport. Over the Christmas/ New Year period you should see the external signage fitted, which will help the building look more polished.

Lois Dickins and Amanda Milton made a flying visit to Albany after the rain last week to source furniture for the debrief space. With a range of options, the committee have endorsed the purchase of the sofas from Comfort Style in Albany.

Instant Racking from Albany has attended site this week to look at the best way of outfitting the ambulance store room. There is a new generation of storage systems that Instant Racking will let us try in our testing period. This "try before you buy" will allow us to find the best fit for our needs.



Lined verandahs

Carpark line marking is set to occur in early January in conjunction with Shire works. We have also got on with ordering internal signage, safety signage, sanitary items and cleaning items.

The major frustration continues to be Telstra.....essentially we are ready to move into the new building under a "testing period" until the Certificate of Occupancy is formally issued, however without Telstra we cannot move. No amount of phone calls or emails seems to be helping. Sorry Lake Grace Community Men's Shed - we will move as soon as we possibly can.

We have moved in one item to the new facility. The Mass Casualty Kit (MCK) has relocated from the cleaning store at the rear of the Shire offices to its new purpose built room on the front verandah of the new building. After 7 years of the MCK having a nomadic lifestyle, it now has a permanent home. Our thanks to the Lake Grace Police and the Shire of Lake Grace for hosting the kit over all those years.

In the last fortnight we have had a visit from the York Sub Centre who are in a rebuilding/ redevelopment phase of their works after a fire claimed their sub centre. The Boddington sub centre also made a visit to view the new facility.

The grand opening plans are coming together steadily. Some other Sub Centre's are planning to attend and stay overnight. We hope you all feel very connected to the project and plan to celebrate the opening with us.

One in Five Young Aussies have Trouble with Anger

One in five young people across Australia have trouble controlling their anger, according to headspace, the National Youth Mental Health Foundation.

headspace clinicians believe the signs and symptoms of anger may be drastically impacting the day-to-day lives of many 12 to 25 year olds.

headspace Youth Advocate, Taz Clay, 23, said anger took a severe toll on his life when he was kicked out of home, and escalated after he lost his mum in a car accident. "That was a whole new level of anger, I've never experienced anything like it. The intense feeling of wanting to hurt the driver who took her," Taz said. "My anger made people not want to hang around me, I was always talking about this hate towards this person or that person. There are a lot of other things that go on with anger – but once you start ironing those things out, other things will iron out with it. Finding strategies around anger as early as possible is a good thing," he said. Vikki Ryall, headspace Head of Clinical Practice, said anger can become a problem for the young person when it occurs frequently, is at high intensity and leads to outbursts or violent behaviour.

"It's important that people listen to their anger and think about what to do before acting," Ms Ryall said. "Working out what anger means is a much better solution than acting without thinking."

However Ms Ryall reiterated that the expression and experience of anger is a normal emotional function.

"Learning to be aware of emotions and to express them appropriately is a part of good mental health," she said.

headspace clinicians have also stressed the importance between anger and aggression; where anger is a feeling, while aggression and violence are actions.

Ms Ryall said one does not necessarily lead to the other.

"Anger can sometimes be intense and overwhelming, but it doesn't mean that you will become violent or aggressive," she said.

Anger in itself is not a problem and can be a common sign of distress, which may be masking sadness or depression. If you feel angry a lot or have trouble controlling your anger it may be helpful to seek support.

Put Yourself First These Holidays

The best present you can give yourself is time *now* to look after yourself. Many people put off seeking help about their health in the lead up to the holiday period.

Taking time in the lead up to the holidays to see your Doctor about possible signs/symptoms of cancer is an important message of the Cancer Council WA's Find Cancer Early project

"The lead up to holidays gets pretty hectic and it's easy to forget about looking after yourself. If you know something isn't right we encourage you to see your Doctor well before - it's the best present you can give yourself", said Karen Hansen, Cancer Council WA, Regional Education Officer for the Wheatbelt.

Evidence shows that delaying seeing the doctor for just 5 weeks can have a big impact on patient outcomes. "Recognising symptoms early is important, so we want to encourage people to put themselves first" said Karen Hansen,

If you are over 40 and have coughed up blood or had blood in your pee once off or have new spots on your skin or changes to a freckle or mole tell your Doctor. You should also tell your Doctor if you have had any of these symptoms for more than 4 weeks: blood in your poo; problems peeing; looser poo (diarrhoea); unex-

plained weight loss; an unusual pain, lump or swelling anywhere in your body;, becoming more short of breath; or a persistent cough.

Having these symptoms doesn't mean you have cancer – often they turn out to be something less serious, but it's important to tell your Doctor. More information is available at: www.findcancerearly.com.au.

Which leads me to saying farewell to that third officer – Constable Jacqui Gobby. Jacqui departs for Bunbury Police Station in January and her departure will leave a big gap in the community and the station. She has been a dedicated and thoughtful officer and added some colour and vibrancy to the community in her time here - we wish her well in her future career.

As some of you may be aware we have had a series of burglaries at the Sports Clubs in Lake Grace and Newdegate over the course of a weekend recently. At this time we don't have many leads and we are working with the clubs themselves and the Shire on how best to prevent it happening again. We don't have a burglar "on the loose" living in town and the pattern suggests that it is someone travelling through with a knowledge of the area. It's particularly frustrating given that the drinks and food taken goes to funding the clubs for the year ahead, not to mention the damage to the buildings. If anyone knows anything please call the station on 9890 2000 or call Crime Stoppers anonymously on 1800 333 000.

We had some success with another burglary out at a rural property a couple of weeks ago. Fast response by the victim in contacting Police and we were able to get some early leads. We caught the baddies in Narembeen and the property (motorbikes, compressors and a trailer) were restored to the owner. The baddies were also supplying drugs, so had those seized too and are looking at a lengthy and fully catered vacation at a resort down south known as 'Albany Regional Prison' Making contact with us at the earliest opportunity is crucial, and it means we can get ahead of the criminals and use our intelligence resources to locate them.

I know this gives the impression of a crime wave, but it has been par for the course this year and we still live in a safe and hospitable community. However, we can make it a bit harder for Billy Burglar (I wonder if there really is a bloke called that?!) by doing some of the

following easy things.

- Don't leave car keys in the ignition cars are much easier to steal this way!
- When going to a public place like the pool or the pub keep your wallets and phones in a bag or place where you can see them – do not leave them unattended and then expect to find them again.
- If you are going to Bremer Bay or anywhere else for a weekend or longer please let your neighbours know and get them to keep an eye on things. Better yet let us know too and we can start a register of vacant houses to patrol when we are out and about.

We enter the Christmas period with the usual double demerits weekends etc. Please don't be that person that ends up as a tweet or Facebook post on the WA Police webpage for stupid driving speeds. We are out on patrol pretty regularly and encounter very few people speeding, but if you see a flash of the headlights from us it means you could probably do with dropping 5 km/h or so!

It has been very noticeable of late the number of cyclists not wearing helmets. It incurs a fine and we've been pretty lenient in not enforcing this particularly rigorously. That said, it has been seemingly fashionable for people to ride around without a helmet and it is only a matter of time before someone stacks it, or, worse yet, gets knocked down and end up in the hospital with a serious head injury. I expect to see youngsters wearing them at all times, and probably best to have one scootering or roller blading too.

As previously mentioned we take a pretty dim view of drink driving in town and I am hearing that a few plonkers have decided to drink and drive home from the pub, but also to use the back lanes to evade being stopped for a breath test by us!! So, armed with that information we will be stepping up patrols and using unmarked cars to put a stop to this. I gather fences have been damaged by some of these people and it is only a matter of time before someone gets run over. It saddens me that people could be so reckless and stupid, but I am hoping for a safe Christmas and New Year for everyone in town, and we wish everyone all the best for the season.

Frost and Heavy Rains on Crops Demonstrate need for MPCI

Following a season during which many farmers across the state suffered from frost damage and heavy rains, WAFarmers urges producers to consider options such as Multi Peril Crop Insurance (MPCI).

"The frost events experienced throughout the Wheatbelt, South West and Great Southern regions in August, September and early October have caused varying degrees of damage, with some farmers having had minimal frost damage, while others have suffered extensively," he said.

"As harvest progresses across the state the true cost of the damage from weather events such as frost and recent heavy rains is now being realised."

Mr Brown said WAFarmers was a strong advocate for the introduction of MPCI into the Australian agricultural sector

"Western Australian weather can be incredibly varied and severe, so the importance of having insurance against weather events such as frosts and floods, or general income protection, cannot be overstated," he said.

"Over the last three years, WAFarmers has invested considerable time and money attending and hosting industry events on MPCI as we believe this product, when fully matured and developed, has the potential to be the next big thing in agriculture, de-risking the operations of many farmers including grain growers and farmers in the fruit and vegetable industries.

"Variation in seasonal conditions gives many farmers a sense of riding the roller coaster, and are increasingly feeling the need for a de-risk strategy.

"Further, with wheat prices around \$240 per tonne and barley prices even lower, the margins in farming are very tight, and weather events such as frost and rain have a significant impact on profitability.

"As business operators, farmers are aware of the risks in their business, and while WAFarmers acknowledges that MPCI is not for everyone, we believe that MPCI is a risk-minimisation tool that farmers and their advisors should explore."



Harvest Ban ABC Announcements

The ABC has made some changes to the program timing of harvest ban's announcements.

There will be designated tune-in times for listeners to hear harvest bans.

Weekdays: times will be 10.05am, 12.35pm and 2.05pm (and 1.05pm in the Perth metro area).

Weekends: times will be 12:35pm and 2:05pm.

Fire Zones within the Shire of Lake Grace

All zones go to channel 11 in an event of a fire.

- When a fire occurs on a property in a zone a
 Harvest and Vehicle Movement Ban will be imposed
 for the whole zone until the fire is deemed safe, and
 the Harvest and Vehicle Movement Ban is lifted.
- When a fire occurs on a property neighbouring a zone boundary both zones will have a *Harvest and* Vehicle Movement Ban imposed until the fire is deemed safe, and the *Harvest and Vehicle* Movement Ban is lifted.

Water Supply During Bushfires

During a bushfire do not rely on Scheme water supplies.

Residents living in or near bushland are reminded not to rely on public water supplies if they plan to stay and defend their homes during a bushfire.

If you plan to defend your home, scheme water may not be available due to damaged infrastructure, extreme demand, depleted supply and pressure, or a cut to power which is used to pump water.

Residents need to have an independent water supply, such as a concrete or steel tank with a minimum 20,000 litre capacity.

You will also need to have a generator available with pipes and fittings at the correct length, and hoses to protect your home.

The Council of the Shire of Lake Grace resolved on 28 September 2016 to adopt the following local laws:

- Animals, Environment and Nuisance Local Law 2016;
- Cemeteries Amendment Local Law 2016; and
- Health Local Law 2016.

•

The purpose and effect of the local laws is as follows: Animals, Environment and Nuisance Local Law 2016

Purpose:

To provide for the regulation, control and management of animals and the prevention of environmental damage and nuisances within the District.

Effect:

To establish the requirements with which any person keeping animals, or undertaking activities that have the potential to impact the environment or create nuisance must comply.

Cemeteries Amendment Local Law 2016 Purpose:

To amend the Shire of Lake Grace Local Laws Relating to the Lake Grace, Newdegate, Lake King and Varley Public Cemeteries to correct errors in the adoption of the Shire of Lake Grace Cemeteries Amendment Local Law 2015.

Effect:

To delete clause 1.2(3) and amend clause 6.1(1) of the Shire of Lake Grace Local Laws Relating to the Lake Grace, Newdegate, Lake King and Varley Public Cemeteries to ensure an appropriate interpretation of the local law.

Health Local Law 2016

Purpose:

To provide a statutory means to effectively control issues that have the ability to adversely impact on the health and well being of the community.

Effect:

To allow health related issues to be sufficiently controlled so as to provide an acceptable standard for the maintenance of public health in the community.

A copy of the proposed local laws may be inspected at or obtained from the Shire of Lake Grace, 1 Bishop Street, Lake Grace 6353 during business hours 8.30am to 4.00pm or via the website www.lakegrace.wa.gov.au.

The local laws were gazetted in the *Government Gazette* on 20 December 2016. The Health Local Law 2016 will come into effect on the 20 December 2016 being the date of gazettal. The other local laws will come into effect on the 3 January 2017.

One in Five Young Aussies have Trouble with Anger (cont.)

Tips for helping with anger:

- For young people, a good starting point can be talking with parents, teachers or friends about how the anger can be managed. If the anger is a result of bullying or harassment, counsellors or welfare officers can help to manage the situation.
- It's important for parents, teachers and friends to talk to young people about their anger. Opening up the lines of communication can lead to ideas about how the anger can be better managed or treated.

Anger facts:

- Anger is a normal, healthy emotion.
- Problematic anger is not a mental health diagnosis. Individuals who experience chronic or intense anger or have problems expressing anger experience significant psychological distress.

Taz Clay: My Story headspace Youth Advocate Age 23 It started off when I was first kicked out of home, obviously, it made me pretty angry. I built up this intense hate towards these people that I had been living with, for kicking me out and coming to terms with what happened – I copped the whole spectrum from them and I didn't know how to cope.

And then my mum died. That was a whole new level of anger, I've never experienced anything like it. I was so hurt, I never understood how someone could be so reckless to let two people die. I went through the grieving process of losing mum, as well as my nephew when he passed away from suicide. I always wondered why he would do that when he had people around him, but I think that's a natural reaction with suicide. When dealing with anything like that it's a healing process and

also about learning to let go of it - that's a big thing.

My anger made people not want to hang around me, I was always talking about this hate towards this person or that person. I had a youth worker once tell me that I needed to focus on my anger, because every time I used to walk into 'Open Doors' in Brisbane, I'd always be talking about how angry I was feeling. When I get really angry my ears get really hot, my vision goes a bit blurry and I would start becoming disassociated. This is when I would be absolutely fuming and could punch something, but never actually did. I wasn't ever physically violent towards anyone, I would just say things but not actually do anything.

For me, drugs and alcohol definitely aggravated my anger. I remember one time I had a psychotic break when drinking one night, I had been going through so much and I can't even remember what happened. It might seem like you've got a cool head, but drugs and alcohol definitely make it worse.

I never sought help for my anger, it is just something I learnt through self-control. I learnt about other coping strategies which has evened everything out at the same time. There are a lot of other things that go on with anger – but once you start ironing those things out, other things will iron out with it. To help with my anger I did Muay Thai boxing, and you can't not get your frustration out while kicking the living daylights out of a boxing bag! I haven't carried on with that, but now I go and listen to some music or do some drawing and artwork. Finding strategies around anger as early as possible is a good thing.

Eucalyptus Leaf Veins Adapting to a Dry Climate

Media Release. Erik Veneklaas, Associate Professor, Plant Physiological Ecology, from The University of Western Australian School of Plant Biology.

Aridity of Australian environments has led to the evolution of unique adaptations in many species of *Eucalyptus*. Plant ecologists and physiologists of The University of Western Australia and Utrecht University have discovered an unexpectedly dense network of veins, which plays an important role in providing water to the leaf. Such a high density of veins is usually observed in fast-growing plants with thin leaves. In contrast, the arid eucalypts are slow-growing and have thick leaves, which protects them against dehydration and herbivory. The research was recently published online in the prestigious journal *Plant Physiology*.

UWA researchers Paul Drake and Erik Veneklaas and colleagues examined hundreds of leaves of 68 eucalypt species collected from the wet south-west of Western Australia to the arid centre of the continent. Their conclusions are based on microscopic measurements of veins, stomata and leaf thickness, chemical analyses and mathematical modelling.

The findings of their study help us understand how plants have adapted to a changing climate. Paul Drake summarises: "About 30 million years ago Australia had

a relatively wet climate with vegetation similar to what we encounter in tropical rainforests. As the climate became drier, plants needed to adapt. Compared to the leaves of species in the wetter south-west corner of Western Australia, the species from the arid centre are a lot thicker and tolerant to drought, but also have more veins which allows them to transpire at a high rate. These apparently contradictory traits must therefore have an advantage in environments with long dry spells broken by rare rainfall events. Modelling of water flow through and out of leaves revealed that the high density of veins is required to keep stomata open longer to allow the uptake of CO2 during those short spells that water is available. The study used the unique opportunity offered by the extreme biodiversity and wide range of climates to add new insights to our knowledge of climate effects on plants."


