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# What Is The Six Supportive Steps Campaign?

Injury Matters, through Road Trauma Support WA, has launched a new six-week online campaign to help people who have lost loved ones support themselves or others during the holiday season.

Using actionable tips and strategies, the 'Six Supportive Steps' campaign will run from World Day of Remembrance for Road Traffic Victims on the third Sunday in November through until the end of December, with each week focusing on one of six supportive steps:

- Remember Remembering is an important step when supporting yourself or a loved one with grief.
- Acknowledge Acknowledge your feelings and emotions when you're grieving.
- Plan Plan for events or occasions that could be difficult for you or your loved ones.
- Take time Take time for yourself during the holiday season, especially if you're grieving a loved one.
- Support Support yourself and others through grief by sharing feelings, memories, rituals, and traditions.

• Act - Take action to find the balance between celebrating and quiet time.

While it's important to talk about road safety and driving safely in the lead up to the holidays, supporting those who have been impacted by road trauma is sometimes overlooked.

The 'Six Supportive Steps' campaign aims to help people prepare for and cope with the holiday season and make sure Western Australians know Road Trauma Support WA is here year-round with free, noreferral road trauma information, support and counselling.

### Stan Perron in His Own Words—Part Three

Moreen was the postmistress at the Nungarin Post Office and I became quite friendly with her and her family. When she became sick with TB and went to Wooroloo Sanatorium for some time, I came to live in Perth.

With the money I had in the bank I was influenced into buying a taxi from Harry Moran, it was a Hudson car. The number was 777, I remember that. I paid £900 for this taxi and plates. I don't know why taxis; it was just an opportunity to make money. Two years later I owned four.

The passengers in 1945 were mostly US army because it was too expensive for civilians to use taxis at two shillings a mile. The basic wage at the time was only about £4 a week. There was quite good money to be earned and quite enjoyed being the relief driver when the driver wanted a night off.

In Perth got to know a bookmaker by the name of Abe Rubins. Abe was a little Jewish chap who had had polio in his younger days He was very gentle chap and appreciated money. Abe and I worked out a deal together where I put in £500 which was the bank, and we would go to the trots at Gloucester Park every Saturday night.

For ten years I was the silver clerk, the person who holds the money and pays the winning bets and hands out the change. It would be a big night for us to win £200 or £300 pounds. With Abe we always made some money.

### Peter Rundle MLA Member for Roe

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When Moreen and I were married I had two taxis and because accomodation was hard to come by we lived in the United Service Hotel in the centre of Perth. We had a double room overlooking the Terrace on the first floor.

Then I went into milk bars with my brother who came down from Darwin. They were the in thing and there was one at Scarborough that had closed down during the war that we leased and did up. It had about a 60foot frontage, part of it was milk bar and we had the hamburger set up. Bernie's Hamburgers were in a big way in Perth and they shared their recipe with us as we were not competition. My brother was always fond of cooking, and at first he cooked the hamburgers. I used to serve behind the milk bar. We would sell milkshakes for fourpence and cool drinks and ice creams for three pence.

Following on from that we bought a corner store at Mandurah. On the weekend one of us would go to Mandurah and one to Scarborough with a car load of Iollies and poultry, because on Sundays we would put on roast chicken. I would buy Iollies from Sweetapples over near Plaistowes in West Perth.

When the Amercians went home after the war, the taxi business was on the wane and we just sold them for the value of the car towards the end. We had the two milk bars, but there was no fortune in them.

My brother Keith and I wanted to do bigger things and started a grand scheme to build an ice rink and iceworks. Somehow or other we reckoned it was the thing of the future.

We formed this company, Metro Ice and Glacierium, sold the milk bars and bought a block in West Perth opposite Parliament House to build on.

As there was a shortage of bricks because all bricks were required for building War Service Housing, we leased the disused brickworks at Kenwick and got it operational. After some months, we produced 200,000 bricks and this gave us ammunition to get the permit to build our ice works.

But the Glacierium never eventuated. Parliament decided to withdraw the permit for our building and more or less commandeered our bricks for housing. In those days they had the power to do these things because it was straight after the war. Everything was a wartime effort.

It was a major setback and after that we didn't have any money really. We had the proceeds of the brickyards, one taxi, and bookmaking, which was not a very profitable operation.

Desperate to make a living and do something substantial, we got involved in clearing and earth moving. Bulldozers were new to Western Australia and we bought one from Wesfarmers - the third large bulldozer in the State - it was an ex-army piece. The returns were enormous because there was no opposition and we could more or less charge what we thought was within reason.

We won the contract to clear a power line from Collie to Picton Junction and after that my brother and I dissolved our partnership. Keith was living in a caravan

with his wife and wanted to move up to in Perth to buy a small paving operation in Victoria Park. So we worked out that Keith would have a one-third interest in Perron Brothers and I would have two-thirds. At this stage, we had three bulldozers and the business was being run from my house at 6 Hovea Terrace, South Perth.

We rented a cow shed in Shenton Park to store equipment and when we grew out of it we bought land along Great Eastern Highway between Maple Street and Orrong Road. They were cheap blocks because the land was low-lying, but we built a couple up and built a workshop. I had a dozen people working for me then.

Suburbs we helped clear were Doubleview, Innaloo and Killarney (Karrinyup), Willagee, and Hilton Park. Then further down we did Kwinana and Medina. To this day it still gives me a great feeling of satisfaction to think it used to be all bush before I came along and cleared it.

We were the principal earthmoving contractors and Bell Brothers were transport people. Any major jobs that were around, we had 90 percent of them. Whether it was the Water Supply or the Forestry Department. Main Roads would often design their work around the equipment we had available.

On the Brand Highway and the coastal road from Geraldton, our Euclid Scrapers did most of the work. We had scrapers and graders and bulldozers, all that type of equipment. Our bulldozers were engaged on the Narrows Bridge. The Empire Games was another project and the earthworks for Perry Lakes Stadium.

Roy as a little boy, loved riding around in trucks with me. He was born in 1947 and I had the earth moving from 1948 through 1961. So in his growing-up period he would get lots of driving around with me. Getting up and riding on a bulldozer and trucks and watching the trucks being loaded. It got into his blood.

Note - Sadly Moreen died of breast cancer when Roy was just fourteen years old. Stan re-married widowed nurse Jean in 1963. Jean already had a son and the pair had a daughter together.

Then we got started working in mining. We were always very innovative. We had good people. Len Brennan always had lots of ideas and he was a good reader and could read up on these things. Between us, we were a great team.

I'd often have lunch at King's Park with Peter Wright and Lang Hancock who was at the time just a battler, a prospector who had an aircraft who I'd lost a bit of money to. At one lunch in 1959 amidst rumours that iron ore would soon be released for export in Western Australia, Lang suggested we each put in £1,000 to fill the Auster aircraft and let him go and peg some iron ore leases. I said okay.

That was on Friday and on Saturday morning Lang came out to pick up the cheque. I said, "I've got cold feet, I think I've lost enough money with you and your great ideas, I'll give you £500 for an interest in any iron mining lease that you peg for the next ten years providing I don't put in any more money. Instead of taking a third interest, I'll have a 15 percent interest," and I gave him £500. He was okay with that, he wanted money wherever he could get it.

I was very well rewarded with royalties over the years.

Stan went on to build a business empire from a string of investments spanning office blocks, shopping centres, car distribution and iron ore royalties. He told John Bannister in 2001 that he couldn't have done it without the good and loyal people around him. His only regret that he retired from mining before it really started in Western Australia.

When I look back, I've done a lot of things, and I've enjoyed doing them. What I have doesn't feel like a large business to me because I've grown up with it but of course from an outsider's point of view, it seems massive.

This year I turn 80. I should give it away but I don't think I will, it's a hobby and I'd be lost without it. I think it keeps my mind active and I'd like to continue as long as I can although I don't want to be a nuisance. If I get old and silly, well it's time to give it away.

Stan was appointed a Member of the Order of Australia "for service to business and commerce and to the community."

When Stan died aged 96 years in 2018 in Perth, according to America's Forbes Group he was the second-oldest billionaire in the world working five days a week. An exceptional Western Australian and philanthropist, Stan was and still is an inspiration.


What drove a good man to cross the line? Or have times changed, and the rules with them?

#### STATION NEWS

As 2022 comes to an end we look back at the year. Senior Constable Fiona MAIN left Lake Grace for Carnamah Police Station early in the year and was replaced by Constable Wade HUMPHREY. We've been kept busy with our day to day business and traffic patrols as well as investigating 35 criminal complaints. Of these, 67% resulted in an offender being charged. Speaking of charges, we sent 57 people to court for offences ranging from traffic breaches to weapons, firearms and stealing offences.

We have stopped close to 2500 vehicles, issued 380 infringements, 80 cautions, and impounded 6 vehicles.

All of this means we have been busy boys, but it has been a pleasure serving the community and keeping the roads as safe as we can.

#### CRIME NEWS

We've had little reported crime the last few weeks. We have been advised that WA Police Force is urging the



public to be wary of phone messages from a family member or friend claiming they need help, following a significant rise in "Hi Mum" scams in recent months.

More than 1,150 Australians fell victim to the so-called "Hi Mum" scam in the first seven months of this year, with total reported losses of \$2.6 million. Known as "Hi Mum" or "family impersonation" scams, victims are contacted - most often through WhatsApp - by a scammer posing as a family member or friend.

The scammer will claim they have lost or damaged their phone and are making contact from a new number. Then, once they have developed a rapport with their target, the scammer will ask for personal information such as photos for their social media profile or money to help urgently pay a bill, contractor or replace the phone.

These requests continue the ruse of a lost or broken phone with the justification that the funds are needed because they can't access their online banking temporarily.

Some messages will simply say "it's me," while in other cases the scammers appear to have contact information and use the name of the person they are impersonating.

We are warning Australians to be very wary of messages from unknown numbers claiming to be from their children, parents, relatives or friends. Scammers will stop at nothing to get your personal details or money and this particular scam is designed to pull your heartstrings. It's important to stop and think if you get a message, especially on WhatsApp, because chances are it's not your family member or friend – it's a scammer.

If you receive suspicious messages from a number you don't recognise, independently verify the contact. If you're contacted by someone claiming to be your son, daughter, relative or friend, start by calling them on the number already stored in your phone to confirm if it's no longer in use. If they pick up – you know it's a scam.

If you're unable to make contact, you should try a secondary contact method to verify who you're speaking to. If you still can't contact your family member or friend, consider asking a personal question a scammer couldn't know the answer to, so you know the person you are speaking to is who they say they are. Above all, never send money without being absolutely sure who you are sending it to.

Over two-thirds of family impersonation scams have been reported by women over 55 years of age, accounting for more than \$1.4 million in losses.

Unfortunately, these unscrupulous scammers are targeting women and older Australians, with 82 per cent of family impersonation scams reported by people over

the age of 55, accounting for 95 per cent of all reported losses.

If you have reason to believe you have been scammed, contact your bank as soon as possible as they may be able to find where the money went, block scam accounts and help others to avoid sending money to scammers.

#### TRAFFIC NEWS

During the Christmas holidays the movement of holiday makers travelling to and from regional areas increases the number of motorists using the road network and therefore increases the potential for fatal and serious injuries resulting from traffic crashes.

In Western Australia, double demerit points for prescribed offences will be applicable between 0001 hours on Friday 23 December 2022 and 2359 hours on Sunday 8 January 2023.

The prescribed offences throughout this period are as follows:

- Speeding;
- Seatbelt offences pertaining to drivers;
- The illegal use of mobile phones;

- Driving with a BAC (Blood Alcohol Content) of or above 0.05;
- Presence of prescribed illicit drugs or fail to supply oral or blood sample;
- Contravene a red traffic control signal/arrow;
- Drive a motor vehicle fitted with a device designed to evade detection by a speed camera (14 points during double demerits period); and
- Drive a motor vehicle in a manner to evade detection by a speed camera (14 points during double demerits period).

"They have a lot of potential, but losing like this could take the heart right out of them." Mike loved kids - all kids. He so enjoyed coaching little league football, baseball and lacrosse. That's when the idea for his present came.

That afternoon, I went to a local sporting goods store and bought an assortment of wrestling headgear and shores, sent them anonymously to the inner-city church. On Christmas Eve, I placed a small, white envelope on the tree, the note inside telling Mike what I had done, and that this was his gift from me.

Mike's smile was the brightest thing about Christmas that year. And that same bright smile lit up succeeding years. For each Christmas, I followed tradition - one year sending a group of mentally handicapped youngsters to a hockey game, another year a cheque to a pair of elderly brothers whose home had burned to the ground the week before Christmas, and on and on.

# Be Skin Aware This Summer

Cancer Council WA is encouraging adults in the Wheatbelt region to familiarise themselves with the common symptoms of skin cancer, with the majority (55-70%) of melanomas detected by themselves or their partners.

It is important to know your skin and what is normal for you, particularly if you are over 40 years of age. Skin cancers (including melanoma) accounts for the largest number of cancers diagnosed in Australia each year. Our latest data reveals that in 2019, 1587 people in WA were diagnosed with melanoma and sadly 145 people died from it. In the Wheatbelt region in 2019, 58 people were diagnosed with melanoma and 5 died from it.

We know people living in regional Australia have lower rates of five-year survival, compared with people living in cities, so we urge anyone in the Wheatbelt experiencing a skin cancer symptom to visit their doctor, clinic nurse or Aboriginal health worker.

Common symptoms of skin cancer include:

- A new spot or mole on your skin
- A spot that is different from other spots on your skin
- Any crusty or non-healing sores
- Any spots, freckles or any moles changing in size (width), thickness (height), colour, or shape over a period of weeks to months.

It doesn't mean you've got skin cancer – often it turns out to be something less serious. But it is important to get checked. Getting our symptoms checked out and treated early means we can get back to the people we love and the things we love doing.







# Stay Safe Around Water this Summer

With the warmer summer months upon us, many families will spend more time outdoors and around water, so it is important to be aware of the risks to keep safe while having fun in the sun.

Sadly 339 people have lost their lives to drowning in Australia this year, according to figures from Royal Life Saving Australia. Rivers and creeks accounted for 34 per cent of all drowning deaths, followed by beaches at 21 per cent.

Drowning deaths can happen to children and adults of any age. Of the 39 people who lost their lives to drowning in Western Australia this year, 79 per cent were adults over 25 years, while eight per cent were children aged 5-9 years – up from zero last year.

Water safety around rivers, creeks and in pools is everyone's business but there are some risk factors that increase the likelihood of drowning in both adults and children.

Consuming alcohol and drugs around water can affect a person's balance, coordination and judgement, increasing the risk not only to your own safety but also to children requiring responsible adult supervision, who may need your help in an emergency.

Swimming pools and portable pools are a popular option for families to escape the summer heat, but

without constant adult supervision, children of all ages can drown very quickly.

In Western Australia, it is a legal requirement to have a gate that is self-closing and locks properly around any pool with more than 30 centimetres of water.

Families should also be mindful not to prop open pool gates or leave large items such as furniture near pool fences, providing easy access for children to climb over.

Flotation and aquatic toys may seem like a great option to keep children safe while swimming, but they are not safety devices. Adults should continue keeping a watchful eye on children while using them.

### **CBH Harvest Report**

The Western Australian grain harvest continues to exceed expectations with growers delivering 3.2 million tonnes last week, bringing the total to more than 16.7 million tonnes.

The past week has seen inclement cold and rain conditions in the central and southern parts of the state, and hot conditions and high winds with harvest bans and fires through the central and northern parts of the state.

Chief Operations Officer Mick Daw said that while many growers are now finishing harvest for the season, there is still a lot more grain to be delivered.

"Unfortunately, due to the frustrating weather over the past few weeks, a lot of growers throughout the south of the state are still finishing canola deliveries but will start to move over to wheat and barley."

"Meanwhile, many growers in the Geraldton zone are finishing up just in time for Christmas," Mr Daw said.

Despite the frustrating weather conditions, we have seen 18 sites break receival records over the past week.

Mr Daw said that in addition to the site records, the rail performance had also consistently improved over the past few months.

"It is really pleasing to see records broken on all fronts from site and zone receival records to road, rail and shipping."

"In particular, I'd like to call out the improved rail performance which has seen our rail provider, Aurizon, continue to break monthly records consecutively from July to November."

"The largest rail tonnage record of 8.5 million tonnes for

#### Albany Zone


