Lake Grace Family Swims to Rotto

The Curtin family is once again braving the waters to take part in the annual Swim to Rotto race, which will be held on Saturday 16th February. Its three years since they last took part, though there has been a change within the team. In 2005 it was Steve (Dad), Genni (Mum), Addie and Paul. With Sam now old enough to compete, Genni has been only too happy to step aside and give up her swimming position for Sam.

The Curtin's swim the event in memory of their nephew and cousin, Zak Trevenen, who would have turned 15 on the 29th January. Consequently their team has taken on the moniker of 'Zak Attack'.

All keen swimmers, the family has been taking part in 'Swim to Rotto' each year at the Lake Grace Swimming Pool, before deciding to take part in the real thing. No one younger than 14 years of age is allowed to take part, so Steve and Genni had to wait for the older two of their six children to reach the magical milestone.

Taking part is still down to chance though, as due to the number of entries there is a ballot on who gets to take part. In 2005 the four took part, swimming the distance in seven hours and seven minutes. Genni is sure that their time for 2008 will be faster as she says (with much amusement) she won't be slowing them down. A recent trial run in the Lake Grace swimming pool had their time down

to six hours and six minutes; they've also had some ocean practice, swimming from Cottesloe to Swanbourne.

In their favour, 'Zak Attack' is going to be in the first group of team swimmers to take off as opposed to being in the last group as they were in 2005, the earlier start means a potentially calmer ocean. Initially each swimmer will swim for around ten minutes, with this time paring down to five minutes or less over the course.

Shorter time slots allow each swimmer to swim faster, but also give them less time to rest in the boat. Steve has passed the baton of being first

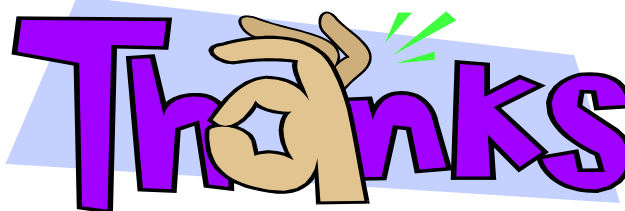

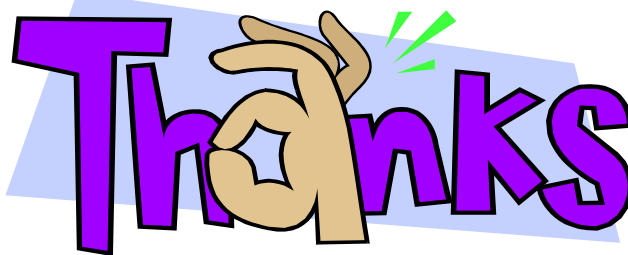

LAKE GRACE ART NOTES



Would you like to be involved in our next activity?

This is a fun project that is open to anyone and will end up in a large group exhibition at the Artspace at the end of February, early March. The participants have set some guidelines to go by and help get you started.

The artwork should be sized 45cm square; green in colour, with a red line on it that is ½ a cm wide at its entry and exit points, which have to be on the vertical sides

The subject matter is left entirely up to you, abstract, realistic, pattern, design or texture work is suitable, whatever interests you at the moment.

So basically that means it's a green square with a red line running through it somewhere, starting on one side and ending on the other. The line can be wiggly or straight or thick or thin, many or a singular line but it has to start ½ a cm wide and end ½ a cm wide where it runs off each side of the canvas. You can incorporate the line into your design, disguise it or lay it on top, in fact any way you can think of.

The green can be any colour green on the background or a range of greens and add black or white to it as well for tonal values, but the red we would like you to use is warm red – have a look at the chromacryl paints at the Plaza. You are not limited to just painting on it, some

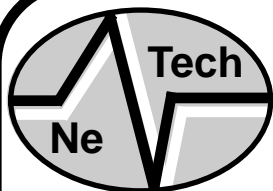

Snake Alert

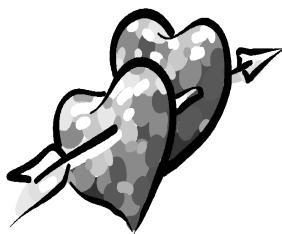

WHILE STOCKS LAST

Gregory Hugh O'Neill

24th July 1919—25th January 2008



Hughie; Dad, Grandad and Great Grandad was born on July 24th 1919 at Brockhurst, Katanning. Gregory Hugh, his full name, was the fifth of eight children to Michael and Alice O'Neill. The family left Tambellup to take up land at Tarin Rock in 1923.

Hughie suffered rickets as a child and had to be sent to Perth for treatment and so started his school days at Kalamunda, being taught by the nuns. The rest of his school days were spent at Tarin Rock. No school buses in those days, so they had to go by horse and sulky. One day, on the way home from school, they went through a hail storm and the horse bolted. The sulky came off, tipped over and broke into pieces. They had to shelter under a tree from the huge hail stones and walk home when it stopped. Naturally, the horse beat them home!!

His mother died in 1932 when he was just 13 years of age. After completing his few years of schooling he went to work for two years with his Uncle, Joe Hodgson, who was farming at Koorda. He earned ten shillings a week. This was followed by two years at Borthwicks Abattoirs in Albany where he worked on the killing chain. The skills he learned here were invaluable throughout the years to come, as he could kill and dress a sheep in about five minutes.

He teamed up with Neville Dunham and went shearing and crutching around Lake Grace and up north. Many a shearing shed dance was brought to life by Hughie on the accordion and Neville on the piano.

When Herbie Hills died in 1942, his wife Dora was left with the farm which was still owned by the bank. Three years later Hughie and Frank Pinchin leased this property from the bank and cropped it.

When the lease expired, Hughie bought the farm, eleven hundred acres, at eight shillings per acre. After paying the deposit he had ten pounds left in the bank. On the property was a corrugated iron house with two rooms and a verandah. Part of the verandah was sectioned off for the kitchen and became his bachelor pad for the next seven years. The house has been modified many times since and is still lived in and owned by Joe and Wendy O'Neill.

To bring in much needed cash, he would sell kangaroo skins to help to pay the bills. Roos were either shot, snared or caught by his roo dogs. At this time, the organisation PETA didn't exist!!! There were also huge problems with emus and a bounty was paid for each beak delivered to the shire office. The story goes that Hughie turned up at the shire one day with a heap of half decayed emu heads. The shire staff, were not impressed, he was only supposed to bring in the beaks!!!

He had traps in the corner of the paddock to catch

kangaroos in which he once caught an emu. Somehow he managed to get it out, dress it up with a waistcoat and trousers, tie a bell to its neck and then let it go. The theory behind this was that it would see the other emus, race after them and frighten the living daylight out of them, hence solving the emu problem. It did work for a while but inevitably they returned.

Hughie married Dorothy Naisbitt in Wagin in 1952, they honeymooned in Bunbury. This was to be a marriage which would last one day short of 56 years. In this time Hughie and Dorothy worked very hard on the land and turned the small corrugated dwelling into a home. They were blessed with 8 children; four boys and four girls.

Sporting wise he was a strong tennis player and one of the pioneers of the Tarin Rock Tennis Club. Teamed up with his older brother, Jim, they were a deadly doubles combination and with Irene Willock, as one of his many, mixed doubles partners, he never lost a match. It was far better to be his partner than his opponent as he had excellent eye/ball skills, was very accurate and put so much slice on the ball that it hit the tennis court and slid sideways, barely clearing the ground. Any opposition would need a shovel to pick it up. He held the Lake Grace Tennis Club's Men's Singles championship for eight consecutive years; before, during and after the war. Hughie distinguished himself by being one of the first players to wear shorts for which he copped a lot of flack. This was like water off a ducks back, as Hughie being Hughie, refused to change and wear the accepted tennis attire of the time, white flannel trousers!! He was ahead of his time as Wimbledon followed suit!!

His life was dedicated to the land, clearing 5,000 acres where he grew cereal crops, ran 2,500 sheep and up to 300 pigs. He built all his own sheds, bar one, and once let slip to some shearers that he accidentally built the truck into the shearing shed as he was using it as scaffolding and forgot to remove the truck until it was too late! Whenever he bought another machine, whether new or used, he liked to alter it, just a bit, to make it work just that bit better. Hughie was renowned for going to clearing sales in the truck and coming home fully loaded with parts for machinery modifications. He was an auctioneer's delight. Hence his trip to New Zealand for Mike's wedding, which included a tour of the North Island, couldn't squeeze in travel to the South Island, as they had to be home in time for Jim Stedman's clearing sale!!

Herbie Naisbitt worked for him in the early years and later on, Hughie's four sons had this privilege. They all tell the same story- "whenever they had a late night out, rising time the next day was always brought forward by at least an hour".

Hughie usually referred to Dorothy as "Mum". Common phrases around the home were, "Is the kettle boiling

Mum?"; and "Is dinner ready Mum?"

Hughie and Dorothy retired to Rockingham in 1993, where Hughie spent time enjoying fishing, garage sales and growing tomatoes; he still managed to modify his fishing dinky and later his gopher when he surrendered his licence at age 80.

Hughie was always a good family man, being close to the land and nature. He loved animals and had countless pets. He is the only man I know to have successfully resuscitated a sheep dog, by applying mouth to mouth, following an accidental fall from the ute!!

His life was all about his farm and his family, he was one of the True Australian Bushmen of our time.

Hughie passed away peacefully at the Shoalwater Nursing Home on Friday January 25th where he spent the last nine weeks of his life. He is survived by eight children, 27 grandchildren and nine great grandchildren.

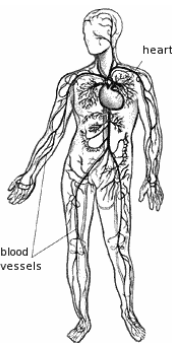
SCIENCE AND STUFF

WORLD'S FUNNIEST JOKE:

According to 55% of 350,000 people from 70 countries who participated online in Richard Wiseman's Laugh Lab experiment, this is the World's funniest joke. He gasps, "My friend is dead! What can I do?" The operator says, "Calm down. I can help. First, let's make sure he's dead." There is a silence, then a shot is heard. Back on the phone, the guy says, "Okay, now what?"



ARE WE MADE OF STARDUST? Here are the chemical elements in a typical human. If you went to a supplier, a body's worth of chemicals would cost little more than about three dollars. This is what chemicals with their symbol and mass percentage: Oxygen (O) 65%, Carbon (C) 18.5%, Hydrogen (H) 9.5%, Nitrogen (N) 3.2%, Calcium (Ca) 1.5%, Phosphorus (P) 1.0%, Potassium (K) 0.4%, Sulphur (S) 0.3%, Sodium (Na), Chlorine (Cl) 0.2%, Magnesium (Mg) 0.1%, Iodine (I) 0.1%, Iron (Fe) 0.1% with 0.1% of trace elements such as aluminium, cobalt, copper, manganese, silicon, tin and zinc. Human beings and stardust have a great deal in common. This was the amazing discovery made in the nineteenth century by astronomer William Huggins. He split starlight into its different colours and investigated the dark absorption lines produced in the light by different chemical elements. To his amazement, he realised that the chemical elements in the stars were exactly the same as the ones in his laboratory.



The Earth, you and me, and the stars are all made of the same stuff. We know now that everything in the Universe is made of mixtures of the same elements. Hydrogen and oxygen for instance make up water, calcium we find in bones, and so on. When we look at the body's elements in terms of mass we find these are the top three. As our bodies are 65% water it is not surprising to see hydrogen and oxygen so high on the list. All the elements that make up humans and planets have been formed by nuclear reactions in the hot dense centres of stars. They have been either blown out of their upper atmospheres by stellar winds or violently ejected into space when a star blows up and becomes a supernova. Hydrogen is converted to helium inside a star's core. Stars more massive than the sun have hotter central regions and can manufacture more elements. Helium nuclei can be combined to form carbon and oxygen. Carbon nuclei can fuse to form neon and magnesium. Combine two oxygen nuclei and one of the end products is silicon. Combine two silicon nuclei and you produce iron. The chemical history of the Universe, as stars live and die, has been a steady reduction of the amount of hydrogen and a slow increase in the amounts of helium and 'metals'.

Most cosmologists now think the Universe is around 13.7 billion years old. During that time the amount of hydrogen has dropped from 76% to 71% by mass, the amount of helium has gone up to 27.1%; and the 'metals' have increased to make up the remaining 1.9%. When it comes to our Sun, the six most common 'metals' by mass are, oxygen (0.97%), carbon (0.40%), silicon (0.099%), nitrogen (0.096%), magnesium (0.076%), and neon (0.058%). All the rest is hydrogen and helium. These abundances are not easy to measure.

The Sun is a long way off, and extremely hot. The values obtained rely somewhat on the details of physical models that show how absorption lines in the stars light are formed in the outer atmosphere. Another problem is that we can only see into about the top 500 kms of the solar gas, leaving a huge amount of material that we have to assume has a similar composition. We learn more about the Sun's elements by studying meteorites that also formed out of a gas and dust cloud of well-mixed material that the Solar System formed out of about four and a half billion years ago. Meteorites are fallen remnants of asteroids that survived a fiery passage through Earth's atmosphere. The most primitive of these are known as carbonaceous chondrites. These contain water of crystallization and organic compounds, both of which indicate that they have not been heated since formation. These have not been 'cooked' like Earth. They have not differentiated into metal cores and light rock mantles. Carbonaceous chondrites tell us what the metallic content of stars is really like. Stars like the Sun contain lots of oxygen, carbon, hydrogen, nitrogen and calcium – just the elements we need to make humans. It has taken a long time for us to evolve, but the answer to the question in the title is yes. We are really made of star dust. More to explore: To find out more about stardust in meteorites go to

The Supreme Court rejected a joint appeal on 14th January. It was argued that dying patients had a constitutional right to such drugs. (New Scientist Magazine).

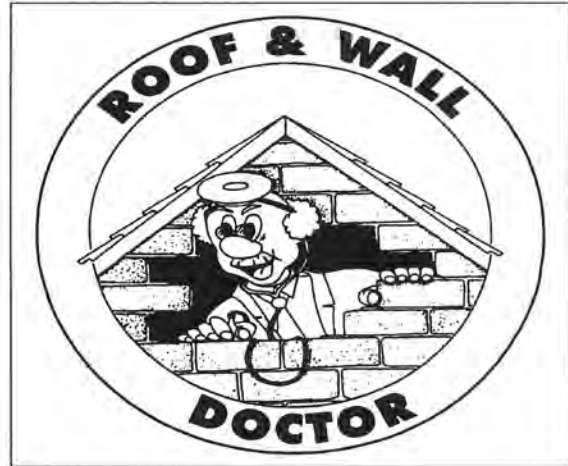

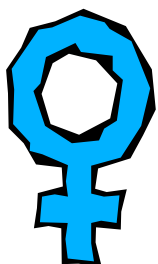

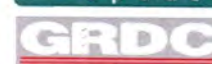

Welcome to Night Watch for the fortnight, from midnight Friday 15th February to midnight Friday 29th February. Astronomy is looking up. Never look at the Sun without the proper solar filters and preferably one that fits over the skyward end as your eyes can be easily and quickly damaged beyond repair. All times daylight saving.

The Sun remains in the constellation of Capricornus until Monday 18th when it will rise in Aquarius for the rest of the fortnight. The sun shines at magnitude -26.72 and the light takes 8.5 minutes to travel to the Earth, so it has risen and set 8.5 minutes before you observe it happening. Morning twilight begins Saturday at 5:17am and at 5:31am on Friday morning 29th. Evening twilight ends at 9:24pm Saturday evening and at 9:07pm on Friday evening 29th.

The **MOON**: The full Moon will occur at 1:20pm on Thursday 21st shining at magnitude -12 in Leo, 0.7° (close), south of the bright blue star Regulus. On Thursday 28th at 9:50am in Libra the Moon will be at Apogee (furthest) at 404,443 kilometres from Earth. The last quarter Moon will occur at 11:08am at magnitude -6 on Friday 29th in Scorpius at 0.6° north of the bright red supergiant star Antares, which denotes the heart of the scorpion that stung Orion the hunter (the saucepan), on the heel.

The moon with constellations and percentage: Taurus on Saturday at 67%, Auriga at 77% on 17th, Gemini on 18th at 86%, Cancer on 19th at 93% and 20th at 98%, Leo on 21st at 100% also 22nd at 100% and 23rd at 98%, Virgo on 24th at 93% also 25th at 88% and 26th at 80%, Libra on 27th at 72% and 28th at 64%, 29th in Scorpius at 54%.

MERCURY at magnitude +1.0 in the constellation of Libra rises in the morning twilight on Saturday at 5:26am. On Wednesday 27th Mercury rises at 4:50am 1.3 degrees (close) north of the very bright Venus. Mercury on Friday 29th rises at 4:49am at magnitude +0.2.

VENUS at magnitude -3.8 in the constellation of Sagittarius on Saturday morning rises at 4:28am. On Tuesday 19th Venus rises in the constellation of Capricornus at 4:33am, Venus on Wednesday morning 27th rises at 4:49am at 1.3° (close) south of Mercury. On

Friday 29th Venus rises at 4:53am in the morning twilight as it moves back towards the Sun.

The red coloured planet **MARS** at a bright magnitude of -0.4 in the constellation of Taurus on Saturday evening at 1.6° (close) south of the Moon, sets on Sunday morning at 1:54am. Mars remains in the evening all this fortnight and sets after midnight.

JUPITER the giant gas planet at magnitude -2.0 in the constellation of Sagittarius rises at 3:19am Saturday morning and at 2:39am on Friday 29th.

SATURN the ringed gas planet at magnitude +0.3 in the constellation of Leo rises at 8:22pm on Saturday. On Thursday 21st Saturn rises at 8:01pm at 3° (thumb at arms length) north of the Moon. Saturn rises at 7:28pm on Friday 29th, **URANUS** in Aquarius and **NEPTUNE** in Capricornus are too close to the Sun to view.

The very small distant now Minor Planet **PLUTO** at magnitude +14 resides in the constellation of Sagittarius near the star cluster NGC 6507 and a 20 centimetre telescope is needed for viewing.

There are three **COMETS** in the night sky with 8P/Tuttle in the constellation of Horologium the clock at magnitude +8.9, 46P/Wirtanen in Aries at magnitude +9.3 and Q1/Mcnaught in Vela at 12.1 mag.

Last year in April the Comet Encke had its tail cut in half by a Coronal Mass Ejection of magnetised gas from the Sun which was captured by NASA. CME's can have masses of several billion tonnes and travel at up to 3,000km/s (6.7 million mph). NASA's STEREO (Solar Terrestrial Relations Observatory). The images can be found at www.nasa.gov/sterio.

For any further information on the sun, stars, moon, planets, comets, star clusters and nebula; or if there is something you view and do not understand what it is, please ring. If still in view we can take the phones outside and look.

THE STORYTRAIL



I am collecting stories about individual locations and businesses for a main street history trail in Lake Grace. The themes are the connection we have with the land and the common stories we share about the main street. I will include the history of different buildings in each issue of the *Lakes Link News*.

Thank you to Jeanette Bennett and the Bennett family for some historic photographs of Stubbs Street buildings, including a very early image of Lake Grace Hotel (right). I estimate the photograph was taken in late 1924. A clue to the date is the absence of the current Westpac Bank building, built in 1929, and the veranda post seen at the left of the photograph. This is probably the West Australian Bank, the first bank in Lake Grace. The original WA Bank building was transferred to Lot 15 Stubbs Street in 1924 and eventually became home to the Meston family. Tunney's Emporium (see History at a Glance), built on the west side of the hotel prior to 1926, is not evident.

Jeanette also found a 1922 issue of *The Primary Producer* featuring Lake Grace and Newdegate. The broadsheet contains invaluable photographs of Lake Grace including the first Co-op building and Morrisey's Boarding House which was located at Lot 14 Stubbs Street (now a vacant block). I was able to find little history about this site (more about that in later issues)

so this photograph and accompanying article fills some big gaps in the story.

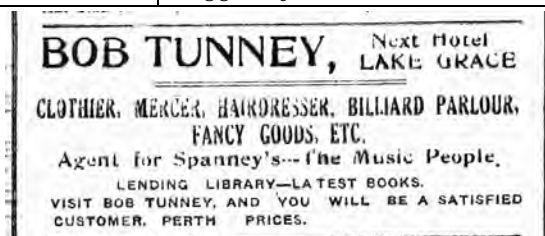

the symbol and incentive for all this activity... those axes, whilst they are plebeian, would not be out of place on his [Premier James Mitchell] coat of arms, for when in the Baronial days, the axe was the destroyer of human life, today it is sign of hope, progress and future prosperity.

As Dumbleyung is left behind, the landscape from the railway grows uninviting and is typical of the poorer stretches to be found elsewhere. Badly cultivated areas of mallee are to be seen and you realise that mallee country is somewhat of a problem.

I was informed there are a number of selections that have been abandoned; that in attempts to make them productive they are now over-capitalised and that the only remedy for the Agricultural Bank is to write off amounts that will tempt others who now understand the nature of the proposition to take a risk. Would lupins, subterranean clover or Soudan grass solve the problem?

As Lake Grace neared, the scene changes, and although the geography is anything but attractive the brown colour of the soil shouts fertility and bumper harvests. What cared those pioneers, though leagues separated them from the then [railway] terminus – Dumbleyung, 60 miles away? They knew (if they could see it out) that if they “produced the goods” the railway would come. They are of the same breed as the early pioneers of the West in America who circled their wagons to

stave off Indian raids.

The train arrived a Lake Grace at dusk, and there was a spontaneous rush to the two dining rooms (also limited accommodation). The scene was such as seen at an embryo mining camp. What if the “main” street was sloppy and the night bitter I was in the mood for “copy” and considered myself privileged in meeting several of the pioneers of Lake Grace, amongst whom were Messrs R. Carruthers, C.L. Slarke, and the Mesdames Franks and Slarke. Though it was growing late I secured a few notes.

[Mr R. Carruthers] “We got here (Lake Grace) in September 1911. There was no road for the last 15 miles, and we had to go around the lake. We had to cart everything from Dumbleyung, 60 miles away. None of us had seen forest country in our lives. Although we had not been used to farming under such conditions, we got an axe and ‘waded’ into it; we had trees three feet six across. At that time I had a son of 16 to help. We cut the scrub and left the trees, and by the time we got 40 acres ‘crosscutted’ we had got more accustomed to the axe. From September to the seeding season we had 110 acres ready. Seeding was finished on June 28, but not knowing the proper varieties for that locality we kept on sowing late wheats such as World’s Champion and Yandilla King, which at maturity were disappointing. We scattered the seed, used no super and just ploughed it in. Had we sown early varieties we should have had a nice crop. What grain we had we sold for seed. By this time, with the clearing done and camp erected, I brought the family from Perth, as also did others. (Just here both Mr Carruthers and Mr [P] McMahon paid a warm tribute to the pioneer women, one of whom considered it a joke after coming from England).

What of Newdegate?

Mr Carruthers says: “Whilst the construction of a railway to Lake Grace was a difficult proposition there is not much doubt about Newdegate. Although our land is not to be despised, we have seen blocks at Newdegate that surpasses anything at Lake Grace, and the area is much greater.”

Twenty Year Reunion

They may have been older, greyer and not moving quite as fast as they used to but cricket was fresh in the minds of those attending the twentieth anniversary celebrations of Lake Grace defeating Kukerin in the 1987/88 cricket Grand Final.

The idea for a reunion arose after a couple of the players thought it would be nice to be able to get the team together and catch up on past glories. Six months ago, Andrew Walker, Captain of the Premiership side and unofficial 'keeper of the history' began putting the wheels in motion.

It was a wonderful turnout with ten of the eleven players attending; Wesley Mason, who died in 1991, was the only player absent but his widow, Annie Stevens, attended in his place. Twelfth man, Darren Cream, was also absent. Like all sporting teams there are the 'behind the scenes' crew; with many of these people present. Premiership Coach Milton Reynolds; Steve Hunt, who was President at the time and long term supporters and sponsors of the Club, Allan and Faye McWhirter were also in attendance.

The reunion was organized for an at home fixture of Lake Grace playing Kukerin, giving former players and supporters the opportunity to soak up the cricket

atmosphere. The extra support must have kicked Lake Grace's current cricket team into top gear as they put on a show for their spectators. Lake Grace were chasing Kukerin's 149, achieving the runs required with four wickets in hand. Peter Burbridge showing some scintillating form with 59 not out, putting Lake Grace across the line with a six on the last ball.

Andrew Walker was pleased with the positive turnout, with ex-players travelling from Albany, Bunbury, Perth and beyond. Of the former Premiership side only three are still playing; Evan Sewell, Geoff Miller and Greg Pinney. Greg has proved himself still handy around the pitch, playing a few games for Lake Grace this season.

Following the cricket game and refreshments everyone went their separate ways before reconvening at the Lake Grace Sportsman's Club for a meal, presentations and more refreshments. Each of the players, the Coach, President and Sponsors were given a memorabilia package which included a DVD containing an hour's footage of the 1988 match plus a scrapbook which contained copies of results, Wagin Argus newspaper clipping and copies of the scorebook. They also received, through the generosity of Allan and Faye McWhirter, a commemorative (numbered) Lake Grace Cricket Club (Premiers 1987/88) cap to mark the

The significance of the reunion can't be underestimated

as it was Lake Grace's first Premiership win in 18 years. In the ensuing twenty years Lake Grace has not been able to repeat their 1987/88 success, although they have played in five Grand Finals against Kukerin since that season, losing them all.

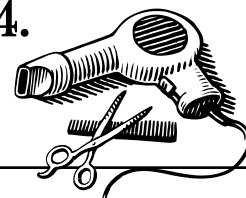

Do Double Demerits Work?

Background

In 2002 the State Government introduced legislation to double the demerit points issued for offences relating to speeding, drink driving and non-use of restraints during holiday periods until the Christmas 2007-2008 period.

The Road Safety Council has recommended double demerits continue over long weekends and other holidays for at least the next three years.

Double demerits are effective

A new report produced by market research company Synovate for the Road Safety Council shows that the double demerits initiative has been effective in achieving its core objective. That is, to reduce the number of crashes on West Australian roads during Double Demerit periods.

The evaluation shows that generally speaking, the community is supportive of the double demerits initiative.

Statistics included in the evaluation report demonstrate that the initiative has been effective in reducing crashes.

Facts and figures

The following results are based on available enforcement activity, infringement/crash data, community awareness of double demerits and attitudes towards their effectiveness:

Double demerits equals less crashes

The daily number of any reported crashes during double demerit periods decreased by 7% between 2001-2006. This compares to a 9% increase in reported crashes during non double demerit periods over the same period.

Between 2001 and 2006, the number of average daily reported crashes resulting in injury decreased by 24% during double demerit periods. This compares with an 11% decrease outside of these periods.

Double demerits equals less deaths

For fatal crashes, the decrease during double demerit periods was 24%, compared to an increase of 32% during non double demerit periods.

There have also been decreases in the number of fatal crashes during double demerit periods where speeding, alcohol or the non-use of seatbelts were identified a contributing factor.

Double demerits is combined with more policing

There is normally an increase in police enforcement during holiday periods and the average daily number of total infringements increased during double demerit periods between 2001 and 2006.

An increase in the average daily number of infringements was also reflected in the number of infringements specifically issued for speeding and restraints related offences.

The rate of infringements issued per hour is lower during double demerits periods, perhaps suggesting that drivers do behave more responsibly at these times.

What can you do?

Community understanding about the importance and value of double demerits is important.

You can help increase awareness about the effectiveness of double demerits by providing copies of this fact sheet to colleagues, clients or stakeholders. You can also talk about double demerits with family and friends, particularly in the lead up to holiday periods when double demerits is the focus of much attention.
