



Community help needed to find European Wasps

The State Government is calling on community support to help combat the threat posed by unusually high numbers of European Wasps.

Agriculture Minister Kim Chance visited Kewdale to view the destruction of the 28th nest found so far this Summer. On average, 10 to 15 nests are discovered each year.

Mr Chance said establishment of European wasps in WA would adversely affect our way of life due to their impact on outdoor entertainment and the risk to children and pets.

European wasps also have an impact on agricultural production of soft fruit and grapes. The Department of Agriculture is undertaking a community awareness campaign and has put on extra surveillance teams in an attempt to locate all wasp nests.

"So far this summer the Department has treated and removed 28 nests," Mr Chance said. "The challenge is to find any remaining nests by May when large numbers of queens are released from the nests. "These queen wasps go into hibernation over winter, only to emerge in the spring to establish more nests."

The worst year on record since the wasps became established in the Eastern States over 25 years ago was in 1989 when 116 nests were found and destroyed in WA.

"Here in Western Australia the Department and the reporting public have had a very successful relationship and every year we have managed to prevent this pest from establishing."

Mr Chance also presented a certificate of appreciation to Jeff Kostera, a staff member at the Woolworth's Distribution Centre in Kewdale, for reporting European wasp activity in the area. Mr Kostera noticed the unusual occurrence of yellow and black wasps attracted to a chicken sandwich of a staff member and alerted the Department of Agriculture.

European wasps are stout-bodied and bee-shaped with black, club-like feelers. They have yellow markings and yellow legs which they tuck up whilst flying. They move quickly and generally do not hover.

They are unusual in that they feed on meat products. People may see wasps feeding on raw meat and bones fed to pets, or wasps attracted to meat and fish on barbecues.

People and pets can be stung in the mouth when eating meat which has attracted the wasps. The wasps sting repeatedly and there have been fatalities overseas when patients have an allergic reaction or there are multiple wasp attacks because a nest was disturbed.

Nest treatment and removal should only be attempted by trained professionals. Anyone who suspects they have seen a European wasp should contact the Department's Pest and Disease Information Service on 9368 3666.

Florence Eugene Naisbitt was born in Shotley, England, on the first of November, 1918. Her father was Albert Hipperson, an able seaman on the HMS "Ganges", and later a house decorator/painter. Her mother was May Eugene Hipperson, nee Moore, a busy mother of six children, Jock and Ray, then Florence, followed by Phyllis, Gerald and Jack.

Early in 1919, Albert and May, with the children, including Florence who was just a tiny baby, migrated to Geraldton, Western Australia. Some years later, the family moved back to England where Florence attended school for two more years. Geraldton must have been an attraction, because when the children completed their schooling, the family came back to Geraldton.

Later they moved to Fremantle.

When Florence was eighteen, she took a job as the cook's assistant at the Inland Mission Hospital at Lake Grace. As cupid had planned, along came the tall, slender, handsome young farmer called Charles Francis Naisbitt to check out the talent. Charles was the elder son of James and Eleanor Naisbitt (nee Cornin) who came from England to eventually settle on a farm called "Strathmore" in the Tarin Rock District, on a road which now proudly bears the Naisbitt name. Charles and Florence courted, fell in love, and on the 20th April, 1940, Charles and Florence were married in St Patrick's Catholic Church in Fremantle.

This was the beginning of a loving and loyal relationship, which was to last for sixty one years.

Peter was the first-born, followed by Michael and Anthony. Then the three girls Jenny, Helen and Barbara. After a recovery period of three years, along came little Richard. Seven children in ten years. St Valentine certainly played his part in their lives.

Uncle Barney lived with them too, so perhaps that

made eight children and one husband Florence had to look after.

Life on the farm was not easy in the forties or even the fifties, as many of you know. There was no running water - rain had to be relied upon to fill rainwater tanks for the kitchen, bathing and washing. When the rainwater ran out, water was carted from the soak. Garden water came from the dam. There was no electricity - tilly lamps and hurricane lanterns gave light until generators were available. A heavy metal iron which was heated on the stove, ironed out the creases. A wood stove which later became a combustion stove, was essential for continuous cooking to feed not only the ever-growing family, but also anyone who might just drop in. The day's work included milking the cow, skimming the cream, making butter, and collecting eggs from free range chickens, not from cartons. Florence was gifted with outstanding, creative, practical skills and she was renowned for winning prizes at the local shows for her cakes, (sponges were her speciality), preserves, her bottled fruit and vegetables, as well as her needlework, knitting, crocheting and her beautiful clothing, especially the Christening Gowns for which she received orders. Florence began using her treadle sewing machine for making clothes for herself, her boys and girls, as well as the numerous curtains and household soft furnishings needed to make the farmhouse a home.

Florence loved gardening. She had green fingers. Florence's rose garden in the front of their farmhouse was her pride and joy and even in times of drought, the roses had water from somewhere. The greenhouse was beautiful, full of interesting plants many of which other people had difficulty growing. The vegetable patch flourished with seasonal vegetables, fertilised by organic manure, fruit trees grew bearing delicious fruit and Florence became a great fruit and vegetable bottler. In fact she preserved anything worth

bottling, including pickling her farm eggs for which she was renowned. Her pantry was always full, and the family was always well fed by Florence's excellent culinary skills, which were well known throughout the district. Florence, and later with the help of her girls, catered for parties, a couple of weddings and numerous other occasions.

The twenty first birthday parties were favourites. I recall Michael's twenty first on the farm. His mates, some of whom I can see here today, started on Friday night before Michael had even arrived from Wongan Hills, and continued till Sunday evening, long after Michael had left to go back. But Florence was a gracious hostess.

Charles was a hard worker and generous provider. Florence loved shopping and although a long way from the city, she enjoyed shopping from the catalogues, and it wasn't just Bairds and Boans of Perth - England was not that remote, as some of her patterns which she used to make her beautiful clothes, were imported through the magazine "English Woman". Florence was a well-dressed farmer's wife with her hat and bag, and Charles a smartly dressed, proud farmer when they made their weekly trip to town. The local shopkeepers rubbed their hands with glee whenever the Naisbitt's ventured into their shop, because here was a generous consumer, a gracious lady, and a gentleman. Charles enjoyed a drink at the pub, and when the movies were on in the local hall, the whole family would enjoy watching.

As the children grew up and started leaving home, Florence found a little free time on her hands so took up golf, which she enjoyed immensely, demonstrating great skill even though she took it up later in life.

The farm was sold in 1966 resulting in a move to Lake Grace and a total change in lifestyle. They purchased the Lake Grace Café, renamed Naisbitt"s Café (now CCL Hardware), where Florence continued demonstrating her cooking skills, with the help of the girls. I recall Florence telling me about some of the distinguished guests Big Bad Malcolm Brown, and on another occasion, Premier David Brand and his entourage on a trip to Esperance. Charles, with Peter, ran the petrol station across the road (now Neu-Tech Auto Electrics) until Charles joined the Water Supply where he worked with his brother Barney until he retired. They sold the café in early 1969 allowing Florence to try to retire. The Naisbitt home was always open to everyone, old friends and new.

Charles enjoyed living in walking distance to the pub – just across the back lane, and Florence always knew where to find him.

As Florence and Charles felt the winter cold in Lake Grace, it wasn't unusual to find them trekking to the northern part of the state to follow the sunshine, and for a number of years more recently at their on-site caravan at Busselton, where they enjoyed the therapeutic coastal climate, entertaining everyone in the caravan park with their old time country and western music.

Florence and Charles' family kept ever increasing. The seven children produced 18 grandchildren, the delight of their lives, and twenty-four great grandchildren.

Peter and Glenys have four children - Vanessa, Kim, Darren and Rebecca, as well as ten of their own grandchildren, Zane, Dakota, Tyler, Patrick, Shannon, Daniel, Brett, Georgia, Mitchell and Reece.

Michael and Alex have two daughters - Nicole and Yvette as well as two grandchildren, Tahlia and Austin.

Anthony has three children - Daniel, Samantha and Casey as well as three grandchildren, Oliver, Isis and Sabastian.

Jenny and Brian have three children - Kevin, Tracey and Shayne as well as three grandchildren Chelsea, Taya and Olivia.

Helen has one son— Wayne as well as two grandchildren Bronson and Neeson.

Barbara and Tony have three children - Andrew, Sascha and Cassandra as well as four grandchildren Zac, Shayla, Aesha and Xavoir.

Richard and Corrine have two daughters – Katherine and Hayley.

Florence and her loving Charles, left a wonderful legacy of forty nine offspring as well as the many in-laws who make up the families.

I asked each of the children what their Mother meant to them. The replies were:

Peter; Thousands of things – there wasn't just one.

Michael; Everything a Mother could be for me.

Anthony; Whenever I got dressed up, Mum said that I looked handsome and distinguished in my good clothes.

Jennifer; Mum was a good Mum who taught me by

Helen; A love of gardening and a lifelong hobby of dressmaking.

Barbaba; Everything. Mum encouraged you to reach your goals in life.







BUCKLE-UP ON FARM VEHICLE SEATBELTS

Following a prosecution in NSW recently of a farmer whose employee died in a vehicle rollover, Farmsafe WA Alliance warns farmers that they need to be more aware of their legal responsibilities.

The common practice of farmers and their employees not wearing seatbelts is illegal under the State Occupational Health and Safety Acts, and farmers need to understand that they have a responsibility to their employees and themselves to ensure that they wear seatbelts whilst driving around their farm.

A NSW court recently heard evidence that it was common practice for farm workers not to wear seat belts - because their work required them to repeatedly jump in and out of vehicles.

Farmsafe WA Alliance chairman, Tony Hiscock said gone were the days when farmers would do such things as get their young child to steer while they dish out hay standing on the back of the 'ute'.

"There is not much point in lamenting the change - we as farmers just need to accept our responsibilities as employees, parents and basically community minded citizens and get on with it," Mr Hiscock said.

During the court case, it was noted by the Justice that employers who operated rural properties seemed to think OHS should be viewed differently from employers in other industries. This was because those employers had worked on the property for many years, learned to drive farm equipment as children and knew the risks and how to avoid them.

But the Justice stressed the OHS Act NSW made no distinction between industries, and all employers carried the same obligations to provide safe systems of work - the respective employers in the partnership were found guilty - sentencing at a future date.



Malleefowl, once common in this area, have seriously declined over the last 100 years and the birds are now classified as 'fauna that is rare or likely to become extinct'.

The Malleefowl Preservation Group works with farmers and pastoralists to address the decline of the Malleefowl and associated habitat. MPG has established 5 monitoring sites in the Gnowangerup and Jerramungup Shires to record annual changes in Malleefowl breeding activity, measure breeding densities, conduct associated habitat surveys, and feral animal controls.

Welcome to Night Watch for the fortnight from midnight Friday 12th to midnight Friday 26th March.

Equinox occurs at 2.39pm on Saturday 29th, and marks the true end of summer.

Our local star, the Sun, resides in the constellation of Pisces for the fortnight, at -26.7 magnitude.

On Sunday 14th, the Moon will be in the last quarter phase at 4.51am in Sagittarius at magnitude -6.0.

On Sunday 21st at 6.31am, the New Moon occurs in Pisces. During this fortnight there will be five planets visible to the naked eye in the early night sky, these being, Mercury, Venus, Mars, Jupiter and Saturn.

Mercury, in Pisces, sets on Saturday at 6.51pm, 6.54pm on the 22nd and 6.51pm on the 26th. On the 22nd, Mercury will be 4 degrees north of the Moon.

Venus, at a very bright -4.3 in Aries, sets at 8.24pm, setting 1 minute earlier each night and sets at 8.12pm on the 26th. On the 25th Venus will be 2 degrees north of the Moon.

Mars, at magnitude 1.5, is in the constellation of Taurus and sets at 9.21pm on Saturday 13th and at 8.59pm on the 26th. Mars will be 0.8 degrees south of the Moon on the 26th.

The giant gas planet, Jupiter, will be in the night sky all night in the constellation of Leo at magnitude -2.5.

The ringed planet, Saturn, in Gemini sets around midnight at 0.4 magnitude whilst the blue/green gas planet, Uranus, rises around 4.30am in Aquarius at magnitude 5.9 and is the last planet you can see with the naked eye. Uranus will be 4 degrees north of the Moon on the 19th.

The grey/green gas planet, Neptune, rises around 3.00am in Capricornus and is at 8.0 magnitude. Neptune will be 5 degrees north of the Moon on Wednesday the 17th.

Pluto, in the constellation of Serpens, rises around 11.00pm at 13.8 magnitude. On the 24th there should be a few meteors flying around in Virgo.

Comet 2001 q4 C/Neat is in the constellation of Tucana at 5.9 magnitude near the small Magellanic galaxy cloud.

With the Moon not rising till 10.45pm in the constellation of Ophiuchus on Saturday, it is a

good time for studying the night sky. Use the darkest site you can find as white light destroys your night vision, which starts to take place about four minutes after being out of the light.

The Southern Cross rotates in a circle around the South Celestial Pole which is four and a half times the length of the long axis away from the triple blue star Acrux. In this way the cross can be used as a compass or clock, although the cross disappears in the far south. If anyone would like to know how this works I will show you how and the times for Lake Grace.

In the constellation of Pegasus around a star numbered hd209458, which is 150 light years away, there is a Jupiter-like gas planet. This planet has been nicknamed Osiris after the Egyptian god of the Underworld, and it orbits the star very closely and at 3.5 magnitude each day. Carbon and oxygen have been found streaming away from the planet. Osiris is one of only two extra-solar planets known to pass across the face of its star, as seen from earth. The spectral signature is of sodium as well as carbon, oxygen, hydrogen in the planet's upper atmosphere, which the star heats up to 10,000 degrees C.

Patron's' Message to CWA of WA 2004

The past 80 years have been momentous for our State and for the CWA of Western Australia. From it's beginnings in WA in 1924, with a handful of country women who saw the need for lonely and isolated women to have a voice and support group, the CWA has become known throughout Australia. It is a household name.

That early group saw that the problems of the day would not be improved without the education of women. The need to break down class barriers, foster understanding, provide companionship and unselfish service were then concerns and continue to be a hallmark of the CWA today.

From it's inception the Governor's wife has been Patron of the CWA of Western Australia, the first being Lady Campion who later, on her return to England, continued her association with the CWA as a representative of the associated Country Women of the World.

The first WA conference was held on 10 March, 1925 with 60 members present. It is interesting to note that the agenda included motions still relevant to us all—the rights of women in relation to their children, their property rights and of illegitimate children. Another agenda item indicated the "wanton waste of timber" calling on those in charge of forests and agricultural departments to take

drastic action.

The first official publication of "Countrywomen of WA" was printed in June, 1934. The second edition in September sold for threepence a copy and there were 534 subscribers.

I feel privileged that I will be Patron of CWA in your 80th year and look forward to an interesting and exciting year. This year will also celebrate the 175th anniversary of the settlement of the Swan River Colony. It is a blessing that 2003 has been a good year with record harvests predicted (at the time of writing). Let's hope the momentum continues in 2004.

CWA continues to be relevant and now has its focus on a broad front of contempory issues such as unemployment, youth suicide, education and the drain of young people to cities. The need to support lonely and isolated women and their families has not diminished. In this 80th year, members can be proud of the fine tradition of the CWA.

There will be an opportunity this year to acknowledge those who have gone before and all who have kept the CWA dream alive. I congratulate CWA of Western Australia (Inc) on its achievements and look forward to sharing the celebration with members.



A jar of M & M chocolate treats turns out to have a peculiar mathematical property. The ellipsoid-shaped sweets pack far more densely into the jar than spherical objects like marbles. It has long been known to the mathematicians, that you put marbles into a jar and gently shake them to pack in as many as possible, the marbles will occupy no more than about 64 per cent of the jar's volume. This is called random close packing. M & M's approach a packing density of nearly 71 per cent. Using computer simulations, it's found that by tweaking the dimensions of the ellipsoid, the packing density can be increased to nearly 74 per cent. Science magazine.

Ancient Plague

Researchers have argued that Bubonic Plague emerged among Asian Gerbils in the 6th century AD, but evidence to support the idea has been scarce. Now other researchers believe the plague appeared much earlier in ancient Egypt. They believe the disease was originally carried by Nile rats, and infected black rats introduced through trade with India. Black rats live in closer contact with humans, so this allowed the plague to jump to people when cities appeared, in around 3500BC. Nile rats and black rats have been found together in digs with human fleas in a settlement at Amarna, Egypt, from the 14th century BC. (from the journal of Biography, vol. 31, p. 269).

Squid Hunters

Sperm whales are not the only denizens of the deep that dine on giant squid. The stomach contents of 36 sleeper sharks caught in Antarctic waters around Kergurlen archipelago all contained remains of squid, including beaks of the giant squid architeuthis dux and its even larger cousin, the colossal squid mesonychoteuthis hamilton. This makes sleeper sharks the first fish known to eat such large squid – a food source previously thought to be reserved for sperm whales. Judging from measurements of the beaks, the largest colossal squid eaten by one of the sleeper sharks would have been around 12 metres long. (from New Scientist 14th February).

Did You Know?

Ancient Hearths found in the Escale cave near Marseilles, France, indicate that homo erectus, the immediate predecessor of modern human beings, used fire in 750,000 BC.

The earliest known ornament, a decorative amulet was made form a piece of mammoth's tooth by a Neanderthal, 100,000 BC. It was found in Hungary.

Between 8000 to 7001 BC potatoes are domesticated in Peru; pumpkins in middle America; beans are cultivated in Peru and rice in Indochina; Floodwater agriculture was used in the Nile valley and in southwest Asia.

People in Mesopotamia used clay tokens to record numbers of animals and measures of grain; this practice gradually developed over the next 5000 years into the first system of numeration and the first writing.


Between 3500 and 3001 BC the Egyptians developed their number system to the point where they could record numbers as large as necessary, although they still had to introduce new symbols as the numbers grew larger.

The potter's wheel was introduced in Mesopotamia and wheeled vehicles were used in Sumeria.

The Egyptians used papyrus to write on; mined and processed iron, using it mostly for utensils. Sailing ships were in use in Egypt, also metal mirrors. Candles were also in use.

The Egyptians and Babylonians made use of bronze which would be the dominant metal until about 1400 BC when the Hittites began large scale use of iron.

Wagin Farmhand clinches WA Young Farmer title

Graeme Murray of Wagin has been named WA's Top Young Farmer after the state wide competition was run on the weekend. Mr Murray, 25, was announced the winner after the day long competition held at the Wagin Woolorama.

"I only decided to go in the competition the day before," Mr Murray said, "and it was a complete surprise when I was announced the winner." Mr Murray, a farm worker in the Wagin area did not grow up on a farm but chose to work in agriculture after completing TAFE studies in the area.

He believes Agriculture offers such a wide variety of activities and operations he could never see himself getting bored. He has been working for the same employer, Graham Riseborough, for 6 years and he has always been involved in the decision making on the farm. "We always discuss what is going on, I help with ram selections and speak with the agronomist when they come out and consequently I get to see the results of our decisions," Mr Murray said.

The WA Young Farmer Competition was run by the WA Federation of Rural Youth and is only the third of it's kind to run in WA. The competition consisted of 10 modules ranging from Workshop Skills to Wool and Livestock. Event chairperson, Emma Field, said the Young Farmer Competition is a concept being adapted by all affiliated states in the National Rural Youth body. 'We are aspiring not only to reward the young farmer who wins but to promote agriculture as an exciting and viable career option to all those talented young people from rural areas', Ms Field added.

Runner-up in the contest was Tim McDougall, 27, of Narrogin, who topped the group in the Domestic Module and Ambassadorship module which involved speaking about involving young farmers in industry decision making.

Module Judge, Rodney Field, said all participants are a credit to their industry and were excellent examples of young people in agriculture, a sentiment echoed by the various sponsors that were present at the event. Mike Marsh, Executive Director of Corporate Services at the Department of Agriculture, also paid tribute to the WA Federation of Rural Youth for holding such an event as it was good for the rural community and great for agriculture.

Four Narrogin Agriculture School students entered the competition – which is the first time school age candidates have been involved. Teacher, Graham Borthwick, encouraged the students to enter and set the example by entering himself and taking out two of the modules. "This is a different competition and I wanted the students to take up the challenge and give it a go". WA Rural Youth are considering holding a Junior Young Farmer Competition next year to cater specifically for agricultural school students. Competition format will also be changed with regional competitions set to be run, the first of which will be held in Moora by Moora Rural Youth. Mr Murray and Mr McDougall now have the chance to compete for the National Young Farmer title later this year in Dalby, Queensland. Both are keen to make the trip over east and compete with their eastern states counterparts. The last time WA sent an entrant to the National Competition, Shayne Smith, of Dumbleyung, came home with the national title.

On the Sheep's Back

Meet the first of a merino flock to walk and graze the main street of Lake Grace. The cement sculpture, now on display at Lake Grace Plaza, is the forerunner to the *On the Sheep's Back* Project, a Lake Grace Development Association initiative.

Artist Rhys Tonkin first sculpted the sheep in polystyrene which proved an ideal material to demonstrate the texture of wool. She then made a fibreglass and latex mould of the polystyrene and cast the sculpture in cement. The cement sculpture was lightly back-sprayed with colour to accentuate the wool and the form of the sheep.

Ms Tonkin will now sculpt and make moulds of six more originals. The moulds will be brought to Lake Grace later this year where the artist will run community workshops to cast approximately 70 more sheep. LGDA intends to place the sheep in groups along the main street.

- Unlocking individual capacities
- Creating a community capacity inventory

From this point the community task force will then evaluate the information and discuss options and planning to move forward. We are very appreciate of Murray Lake and the Rural and Remote Education Council for their invaluable support and direction. It is a privilege that our community had been awarded this unique opportunity to participate in the trial project from communities across state.






