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Magpies Living in Large Groups are no Bird Brains

The University of Western Australia Media Release

A study by The University of Western Australia and the University of Exeter in England has found that wild magpies living in larger groups are smarter than magpies living in smaller groups. The study also found smarter female magpies had greater reproductive success. The research suggests that the demands of living in complex social groups may play a role in the evolution of intelligence.

UWA researchers examined the cognitive performance of 14 wild groups of Australian magpies (Western Australian subspecies *Cracticus tibicen dorsalis*) in Perth, ranging in size from three to 12 birds. The birds were tested away from other birds to prevent social factors influencing the results.

UWA lead researcher Dr Ben Ashton, with co-authors Dr Amanda Ridley and Dr Alex Thornton, tested the cognitive ability of each magpie with four cognitive tasks that tested inhibitory control, associative learning, reversal learning and spatial memory.

The tasks included a detour-reaching task, where the birds had to find food hidden in a transparent cylinder, two foraging tasks to test associative learning, where food was hidden in different coloured containers and a memory task where a food reward was hidden in the same place many times.

"The challenges of living in complex social groups have long been seen as drivers of cognitive evolution, however evidence to support this is contentious, and has recently been called into question," Dr Ashton said.

He said it was possible that differences in energy intake and task attention could also affect cognitive performance, and for this reason body weight, foraging efficiency and reluctance to engage in the task were also taken into account in the study.

"Our results suggest that the social environment plays a key role in the development of cognition," Dr Ashton said.

"They also suggest a positive relationship between female cognitive performance and reproductive success indicating there is the potential for natural selection to act on cognition.

"Together, these results support the idea that the social environment plays an important role in cognitive evolution."

This is one of the first studies to conduct large-scale cognitive tests on wild populations and find a strong link between cognition, group size and reproductive success.

Community Resource Centres are at the crossroads, they need community support to future proof their existence, and by community, I mean you. As our customers, partners and service providers what do we do for you and your family? Would you miss us if we were gone? Do you know what we do? If you don't then please drop in and have a conversation.

When CRCs were formerly known as Telecentres funding was minimal and the centre relied heavily on volunteers filling the many gaps; there were many opportunities for the centres to assist their community but this was always on the backburner as paying customers had to be put first in order for the centre to have any chance of survival. Many volunteers saw the Telecentre as an opportunity to upskill and then went on to gain employment through the skills that they had learned; it has been a fantastic stepping stone for many people over the years.

The inception of Royalties for Regions in 2010 brought about enormous change for the regions and this included increased funding for CRCs. More funding meant the opportunity to employ more staff, particularly trainees, this freed up time to do more in the way of community building, advocacy and plan out other opportunities.

The CRC has guaranteed funding through to end of March 2019; from there we have the possibility of a further 15 months funding that will take us through to the end of June 2020. When do we know what is happening post March 2019? Hopefully this year. How are they making their decision? We don't know, there may be some kind of review which we will hear about at some point. A review doesn't necessarily mean that they will come to Lake Grace and that is why it is so important that we have solid testimonials backing up why we are important to our community.

In 2010 we were one of five CRCs that put their hands up for traineeship funding when it was launched, we have had eight trainees in that time. Rosie Timperley who has just started her traineeship will be our ninth trainee and if the funding is cut, she will probably be our last.

Come July 2020 we may well be staring into the abyss. Less, or perhaps even no funding will mean we won't have the ability to provide free advocacy; we won't be able to offer the support to local clubs and organisations that we currently do and organising local initiatives will fall by the wayside. Cuts in opening hours and staff time would be a real possibility. In many CRCs staff have already taken up other opportunities rather than deal with the uncertainty.

I'm asking that as many people as possible come along to the CRC on Thursday 1st March and take part in an interactive stakeholder engagement that will be facilitated by Peter Kenyon. Peter has vast experience working with non-profit organisations. We want your feedback and answers, we also need a good cross section of the community. The evening starts at 6pm with a light meal provided. RSVPs would be appreciated for the setting up of room and catering purposes.

Phillip Joseph Franks 20/06/1935 - 26/01/2018

Phillip Joseph Franks was born on the 20th of June 1935 at the Inland Mission Hospital here in Lake Grace. The first born of twin boys to Gladys Mary Elizabeth (nee Claxton) and William Franks. Dad weighed just 3lb and nearly died, his brother Henry was lighter.

In 1908 Dad's Father William had come out from England along with his brother Jack, sister-in-law Annie and their son Sidney to a warmer climate, it took 4 weeks by boat. Jack was a farrier; they were in Bridgetown for a while but in 1911 obtained 160 acres of land in Lake Grace as part of the Government's land settlement programme. William and his brother lived in the horse stables while they cleared the land by hand.

William went back to Perth for a few years blacksmithing; he married Rose and they had three children; Edna, Walter and Dorothy who was only 12 months old when their mother died.

In 1932 Gladys came out from England, married William and they moved to Lake Grace. They lived in tents while the house was built by the older children using mudbrick.

John and Annie Franks were foundation members of the Methodist church here in Lake Grace which became the Uniting Church. Dad and Henry attended church where their mother played the organ, their father the cello and Bill Pixton (the Butcher) played the violin. The twins used to pump the organ for their mother while she played

Dad tried to learn the violin, but his mother said if you can't play better than that don't play at all, so he didn't. He didn't go to school until he was 8 years of age; riding his bike 7 miles to school rain hail or shine.

Dad was up early before school to feed the horses and then after school went to find the cows for milking, some were 2-3 miles away. He was taken out of school (he said he didn't learn much) at the age of 13 to run the family farm. Water was very scarce, travelling 7 miles by wagon which was drawn by 4 horses through bush to get water for the sheep; 400 gallons, 200 in each drum. The trip took 24 hours.

Through summer Dad was only allowed one drink of water a day, he used to suck on oranges to quench his thirst. Three and a half thousand gallons had to last through summer. Baths were scarce, maybe once a week. At the age of 12 Dad spent 3 months in hospital with rheumatic fever which he nearly died from, he remembered only having milk. Dad spent Christmas day laying on a stretcher, looking like a Mummy with his body wrapped in bandages. After lunch, he was put on the back of the ute and taken back to hospital. This left him with a heart murmur.

At the age of 15 Dad and Henry went shearing to earn money, he received a virgin block to farm but with no money had to return it to the land department. The clearing of land was done by plough scarifier and a ten-



disc plough that was drawn by eight draft horses, while a roller was used to knock down mallee bushes. They shot rabbits with a single shot 22 and swam in dams. Growing up Dad was good at sport, particularly running and high jump.

One-time Dad's brother Walter was driving the horse and cart with Dad and Henry on the back. Henry fell off and was lucky to have not been killed. Another time Dad and Henry had a fight; Henry cried and cried through tea. Dad got the strap for fighting so Dad gave Henry another one for dobbing on him.

One day Dad was bucketing water out of the old town dam and he fell in, he would have drowned if it wasn't for his brother Walter pulling him out. All work was done by horse and cart his father never bought or gave anything away, they had to make saddles out of hessian bags and straw as they couldn't afford to buy one.

Life was tough for Dad, he wasn't allowed to go to dances and the only party he went to was Uncle Syds and Aunty Dorries. Every Friday was town day, the town used to thrive; it still did up until the late 70's.

Dad and Mum were married on 21st April 1956 in the Methodist Church in Collie. Things became a little easier for him after he married.

Dad was told he couldn't father children after an injury he received with a horse. In 1959 Mum and Dad adopted Gordon at 6 weeks old, they travelled to the East Perth Receival Home to collect him. Gordon was born on the 30th June 1959.

In 1961 they travelled to Perth again to pick up another baby, a girl this time and were told that she was in Narrogin. Judith was adopted at 18 days old and was born on the 25th September 1961. Lo and behold 8 months later Mum gave birth to Maureen on the 25th May 1962.

Phillip Joseph Franks

Dad worked for Fred Slarke clearing land on a D4 tractor with a log behind. It took over 2 years to clear 1000 acres. He worked on the Roads Board for 8 years, camping out in tents 9 months of the year and cooking over open fires. He then worked for Ray Clarke for 20 years and the Water Authority for 25 years until he retired at 65.

Dad was an active member of the community Fire Brigade for 16 years, held position of Captain and Vice-Captain and received a Life Membership. He was also a volunteer for St John Ambulance for 18 years, many a trip by road with 2 drivers (Brian Warner, Bob Watson, Len Elliott to name a few) and a nurse in the back. It was nothing for Dad to be called out at 9-10 o'clock at night and getting home around five in the morning before heading off to work for 7-8 hours. It was a job he loved doing; it had good times and sad times. On one occasion they had to take a baby to PMH, he remembered going down all these corridors with the nurse holding the baby and when it came time for them to leave they couldn't remember where they left the ambulance.

Other groups and projects he was involved in included Speedway (driving number 19 Green Car), Busy Bees at the School, Races, Yearly Concerts in the Town Hall, helping build the Airstrip alongside Maurice Nolan, renovating the Inland Mission Hospital and playing lawn bowls (social and pennants) for 10-15 years.

Some highlights in Dad's life were seeing his children marry and the arrivals of his grandchildren and great grandchildren. In June 2015 we put on a surprise 80^{th} Birthday Party in the Village Hall, I can remember him saying that he had never seen so many friends in one place but that was only a few of them. He didn't think he had so many friends

In November 2015 he saw his grandson Michael marry in Mandurah. In April 2016 they celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary. On the 25th February 2017 Dad was able to attend the opening of the St John Ambulance, he was the longest surviving member. In April 2017 his great grandson Arlo was born which gave him so much joy. It brought a smile to his face every time he saw him

Dad kept pretty good health up until 2 years ago, spending the last 13 months at the Lake Grace Hospital in which he was cared for by loving and caring staff. His family are so grateful and thankful for this.

When I was writing Dad's life down a few years ago he said he didn't do much, but we all know it was the opposite.

Dad you have left a legacy your future generations can be proud of. You were the son of a Lake Grace pioneer, the last of your generation. You were a Husband, Father, Grandfather, Great Grandfather, Uncle, Brother, Cousin, Friend. So sorry you are not able to see another Great Grandchild due in June. Dad, PJ, Phil, Phillip, Sid, Uncle Phil, Pop, Great Pop and Old Pop

You are now at peace

Western Australian producers and other stakeholders in the dairy, beef, grain, seed, hay, sheep and/or goat industries and supply chains are invited to apply for positions on Industry Funding Scheme management committees.

<u>Industry Funding Schemes</u> enable agricultural industries to raise funds to address priority pests and diseases at a whole-of-industry level.

The schemes are industry-driven and overseen by a management committee made up of producers and other stakeholders with appropriate industry knowledge and expertise.

Members of the committees are appointed by the Minister for Agriculture and Food. Support is provided to the schemes and management committees by the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development.

From 1 July 2018, there will be one vacancy on each of the management committees:

- Cattle Industry Funding Scheme
- Grains, Seeds and Hay Industry Funding Scheme
- Sheep and Goat Industry Funding Scheme

Committees meet quarterly on dates agreed by members, and members are remunerated, including sitting fees and travel expenses.

The committee terms of reference, the selection criteria for members of the Industry Management Committees, and guidelines for committee member nominations are available on the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development website at agric.wa.gov.au. Search for 'Industry Management Committee terms'.

Expressions of Interest should consist of a two page letter addressing the <u>selection criteria</u> in addition to a current resume of a maximum of two pages.

My Time With Sid/Phil

Phil Clarke

My condolences go out to the Franks family on the sad loss of Phil.

For the people who don't know me I am Phil Clarke and Phil worked for my father Ray, back in the 60's. I left school in 1968 and came home to join the workforce with Dad and Phil.

As you can imagine, we had a bit of confusion with both of us having the same first name, sometimes it felt like I was talking to myself. So, after some time, I eventually said to Phil "I am going to call you Sid" to which he replied "Well if you are going to call me Sid, I am going to call you Jack". And so it was. From that point on, we called each other Sid and Jack.

The idea was, when I came home from school, that Sid would pass on his farming knowledge to me - having been working with Dad at home while I was at school. In those days, we had CP blocks that required certain conditions to be met. Fencing was one of those conditions, and was one of my first jobs with Sid and included making a box strainer.

Syd said "I will do the first one and you can do the next one..." He proceeded to put in the strut and ramming the strainers. Having got the first box strut finished and lined up, we proceeded to put the wire on and strain it up. But guess what? Sid had put the strut in the wrong way, causing the strainer to loosen. That box strut still stands today as testament to how not to do a box strainer, and continued to come up in conversation at every opportunity with Sid.

While we are talking fencing, - in another incident, Sid and I were rolling up an old fence on the boundary when we encountered a big dugite snake curled up in the grass. Sid having no fear of snakes, kicked it out of the road, while I jumped in the ute. The snake continued to make its way down the fence line hidden in the safety of the grass. Needless to say, I wasn't much help to Sid on that section of fence. Sid told me to get out of the ute and toughen up as the snake was more scared of me, than I was of it – but I doubt that!

And who could forget, the time we were digging strainer holes on Elis's, when out of no-where, a myriad of wires suddenly came to the surface. It didn't take long to realise that we had successfully cut our neighbours phone off! But as it turned out, it was nothing that a carton of beer couldn't fix.

Sid loved tomato sauce and he put copious amounts on everything. He did say he would even put it on his cereal, if Ann would let him.

Sid was also very involved with the ambulance and asked me one day if I would come with him as a relief driver to take a patient to Royal Perth Hospital. Having said ok, we set off and hit Perth, just on peak hour. After a brief discussion, we decided to turn the flashing lights on - and boy, what a difference that made. With all the lights flashing, cars clambered to get out of our way, and we had a dream run through to Royal Perth

Hospital. We were feeling quite proud of ourselves for using our initiative, but when we got home, we were summoned by the hierarchy the next day and told in no uncertain terms that we did not have the authority to turn on the lights. Someone had seen us in Perth and reported us to St John.

Another small incident we had with the Lake Grace ambulance was when we took a patient over to Narrogin. Sid drove over and coming home we had a strong headwind and the F100 used a lot more fuel than it did on the way over. We were at Tarin Rock and the fuel gauge was on empty, and had been for some time. We kept going and thankfully made it back to Lake Grace, not having to draw straws as to who was going to walk to the nearest farm house for fuel!

Sid was also a member of the Lake Grace Community Men's Shed. Sid and Milton Reyonolds (who worked with him at the water supply before retiring) would come along to our meetings and keep us all entertained with their banter.

As his health troubled him, he started missing Men's Shed meetings, saying it was too far for him to go. There was only one house between him and the Men's Shed.

As Sid's health started to deteriorate further, he often complained he couldn't hear, and that no one would talk to him. But, we usually found he was a lot better if he would turn his hearing aid on or up, or even put it in!


I have many fond memories of Sid/Phil – may he rest in peace.

Men's Shed Battery Drive


So with Karlgarin/Pingaring needing 119 to win we knew we had to be switched on from the first ball.

Codeine Becomes Prescription Medication

Shashi Holla (B.Pharm. MPH)

From 1 February 2018, all codeine products including previously over -the-counter (OTC) medications, will require prescriptions.

Reasons for this change are:

- There is no evidence to demonstrate the efficacy of codeine in OTC medications as a pain killer beyond placebo effects.
- Some people use excess codeine to get opioid effects which can result in serious organ damage (liver, stomach and kidney).

Managing Codeine Dependence:

Patient who reduce or stop their OTC Codeine may present with symptoms of opioid withdrawal such as insomnia, anxiety, diarrhoea, malaise and fatigue or be incidentally detected (e.g. abnormal Liver function tests). Others may present requesting codeine prescription to replace their current usage of codeine. This is an opportunity to assess for dependence and review treatment.

People with low level use of codeine may face short term withdrawal symptoms like brief sleeping difficulty or increased craving for codeine. No medical intervention required in such people and a combination of Paracetamol and Brufen can be used. Moderate and high-level users of codeine (16 tablets per day or more) may need medical intervention for their addiction removal.

The Alcohol and Drug Support Line (ADSL) offers a 24 hour helpline to patients who seek telephone counselling and advice in relation to alcohol and codeine issues.

CEO's Corner



Flooding Event

The contractors are still working on the bus routes and the worst areas within their sections.

As this work is being carried out, the Shire would like to remind road users to be courteous and slow down within the areas crews are working, this will allow them to do their job in a safe manner and complete it sooner.

Newdegate Skate Park

The construction stage will commence next month and target completion date the end of May 2018. The organisation building the Newdegate Skate Park and All Ages Playground is Nature Play Solutions in partnership with Skate Sculpture. Both are very successful companies in their field, and have won Awards. In addition, a Project Manager, Jeff Riley, has also been appointed.

Road Works

The construction crew is now completing the 4km section left on Holt Rock South Road. The first part of this will be completed by the middle part of February. Magenta Road is being started on Monday 12 February 2018 and sealing to be completed in the first few weeks of March.

The Shire's re-sealing program was expected to start early February to do works in the school zones, this has had to be put back a couple of weeks as we have had some problems getting the repairs completed. The sweeper has come in and completed the town streets of Lake Grace, Lake King and Varley in preparation for the roads being sealed. The sealing is expected to finish within the expected timeframe.

The Lake Grace Maintenance Grader operator is still carrying out works from the flood damaged areas that were not part of the contract, and has completed various roads not affected by the flooding. The operator has completed the school bus routes that have not been affected by the flood.

The Lake King grading contractor has not carried out any works for maintenance grading over the last fortnight. However, he will be doing the following roads in the near future; Old Newdegate Road, Magdahba Track, Milsteed Road and the bus route section on Hatters Hill Road.

The Newdegate grading contractor, over the past fortnight has worked on Mount Sheridan Road, Biddy Camm Road (between Holt Rock South Road and North Newdegate Road) and will be looking at grading Rodger Road and Lancing Road in the future.

Parks and Gardens

The town maintenance crew has carried out mowing of lawns, whipper snipping and weeding of the public and open space areas within the Lake Grace town site.

The crew has been helping out in all towns doing various jobs that have come in from customer requests.

Maintenance at the town oval is being carried out, and now having the retic fixed and some much needed rain, the two ovals have bounced back and are in a good condition.

The Shire will be doing some renovations to the ovals in the coming weeks in preparation for the footy and hockey season, with the main oval getting a de-thatch and the hockey oval getting a level and top dress. These works are expected to start the week after the 100th celebration of the cricket association, which will allow the grass to come back in time for the relevant seasons to start.

Recycling Services

Recycling bins are collected by Warren Blackwood Waste and transported to a recycling facility.

If items which are not recyclable are found the content can't be recycled and the load will be directed to landfill.

If an item is covered in food, it is not recyclable. Food is one of the worst contaminators in the recycling process. Please remember to rinse out cups, cans, jars etc. before throwing them in the bin.

By using the yellow top recycling bin correctly you are contributing, in a combined community effort, to reduce the amount of rubbish that is directed to landfill facilities each year.

Recycling at our Local Tip Sites

If you are located where the recycling service does not extend, e.g. on a farm, you are still able to help the environment and recycle.



Commemorating 100 Years of ANZAC

Each of the soldiers listed on the Lake Grace Honour Roll will be featured in the Lakes Link News, as close as possible to 100 years from their enlistment. It is now 100 years, 6 months and 19 days since Charles Griffin signed up.

GRIFFIN - CHARLES: Born at Clare in South Australia on 9 September, 1890, he joined the Australian Imperial Force at the age of 26 years 9 months, on the 27th of July 1917. He gave his father John Griffin of Seven Hill, (near Clare, South Australia), as next of kin. Charlie, as he was referred to, was a Lake Grace farmer, from near Neendaling Siding, his address being East Wagin, though it is chronicled that his enlistment was at Black Boy Hill, Perth. At a height of 5 feet 8½ inches, (174cms), he weighed 161lbs (73kgs), had a fresh complexion with blue eyes and dark brown hair, and was endowed with numerous scars. He was a later enlistment, in fact it appears that he was the last enlistment from the Lake Grace district, and his first rank was as Private Griffin. When accepted for training at Black Boy Hill he was found to be of sound health, and a single man, though requiring minor dental treatment.

During his training he had an instance of overstaying his leave by three days, attracting a fine of 10/-, ie. \$1, and 4 days detention. On 20 August, 1917, he was appointed Trooper Charles Griffin, in the 31st/10th Light Horse Brigade, and after a number of inoculations and vaccinations and being declared "dentally fit", some two or three months later, he was ready for embarkation on the HMAT Commonwealth from Fremantle, November 9, 1917. However, he failed to re-embark at 7pm, being absent until reporting at Perth at 9.30am the following morning. He had gone to an hotel with some mates after the original embarkation, so he missed his ship, for which he was fined 28 days pay. It seems as though he was then taken in with the 27/16 reinforcement in the interim. It was then on 24 November, 1917, he rejoined his unit and embarked the SS Canberra as Private Charles Griffin, and disembarked on 21st of December, where he went into Camp at Moascar.

In early January 1918, they marched out to the 4th Light Horse Training Regiment (of 10th Light Horse), where he was taken on strength for duty with the Australian Medical Corps, to a Military Cadre - (a group of selected trained people forming the core of a military unit). In early March, he was detached to the 2nd Australian Stationary Hospital for further instruction and training, until the 20th of April, when he was "taken on strength", (meaning he was engaged in the Field on active service), and promoted to Temp/Corporal. The story is told of heartbreak for Corporal Griffin while in the Field. While setting up camp at nightfall in Palestine one time, after putting his foot down on what he thought was a rock and hearing a whimper, he was to find it was a small hungry child curled up asleep that he had stepped on. It was something he spoke of with much sadness, many times. Later, in September, while still on active service in Palestine, in the Jordan Valley,



he was referred to the 1st Light Horse Field Ambulance with sickness, when his rank was reverted back to Trooper. He was out of action for almost two months, laid up with malaria, and on his return to the Field, was again promoted to Temp/Corporal serving with the 1st Light Horse Field Ambulance.

On 2 November, 1918 with the war coming to an end, Corporal Griffin was evacuated from the Field, however, it was not until 13 March, 1919, when he was able to embark HT Ulimaroa at Kantara, Egypt, for the return to Australia. On the voyage, Corporal Charles Griffin suffered a recurrence of malaria, and by 26 March, before reaching Colombo, it was recorded they had cases of smallpox on board, as well as Spanish flu. Corporal C Griffin of the 1st Light Horse Field Ambulance, was listed in advance as one of 23 troops of the Western Australian contingent coming home, and there was further notification that they would certainly be held in detention for seven days at Woodman's Point for quarantine. In another dispatch, it was also recorded that 2 of the troops had malaria, and we know from his records that one of them was Corporal Charles Griffin.

On 8 April, 1919, the *Ulimaroa* arrived at Woodman's Point, the place of disembarkation for 24 West

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Katherine Outback Experience in Newdegate

Tom Curtain

Tom Curtain from Katherine Outback Experience (Northern Territory) kindly agreed to perform his show in Newdegate on Friday 9th February. His team of horses and dogs (and working staff), arrived promptly – along with a new addition of an unbroken filly, picked up in Lake Grace.

The show starts with a demonstration of the patient working of the unbroken horse, making slow rhythmical moves, encouraging forward motion and trust. Tom sounded uncertain at first about whether he would actually get on this horse, but sure enough – after about 20 minutes, he mounted up and rode her around the yard several times. No sign of distress from the horse and no bucking (which I think a few people were hoping for).

Back on solid ground, Tom moved into his display of working dogs. Describing how his ideas of training dogs are similar to horse training, except you don't have to worry about getting bucked off. His dogs patiently wait on their assigned drum until he calls their name, they then trot over to the only empty drum and jump on it, waiting then for the command to return to their own drum again. The kids in the audience were asked to make sure the drums did not topple over, and to call and encourage each dog to return faster to their spot. A lot of noise was made, but the dogs calmly acted out their part.

Tom shows how a good working dog follows commands to cast (move away from the instructor/workman) in a particular direction (go by for an anticlockwise cast and go round for an clockwise cast for example). Dogs travelling separately in opposite directions, waiting for commands to stop, sit, wait. Impressive.

Next, a member of the audience became a 'cow', to show how a horse works to block, and follow a beast when working in a yard. There were a lot of cows in the audience, because Tom wanted everyone to see how – by reading a horses ears – he can tell if the horse is switched on to his job or not.

From working on its 'cow', the horse then stands patiently while Tom decides it looks like fun to stand up on the saddle and sing a song. Tom claims his balance is not what it used to be, so he sits back in the saddle normally. He realises his horse is a little tired from all



the effort, so it is asked to lay down from underneath him, and we hear a horse snoring.

Finally another horse is brought out to lead around, and the cheekiest of the dogs rides around on its back, having a great time.

If that is not enough, Tom performs many of his songs, telling stories of his life. He also writes songs based on other peoples stories, and some of them caused great entertainment for the audience – his son asked him to write a 'rap' song and perform it, so "Billy don't like no Hip Hop' came out of that request. Some of our young entertainers were able to sing along with Tom about this man that found a frog in his underwear.

Another song which engaged the audience was the "Drunk droving" song, where the drover goes to work with a packsaddle full of beer on ice and ends up

seeing twice as many sheep and twice as many dogs – Taj and Bryce Carruthers were obviously very good at drunken hiccupping.

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
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Why Did Pirates Wear Earrings?

From Blackbeard to Jack Sparrow, pirates and sailors of old are often depicted wearing earrings. But the gold hoops weren't just swashbuckling fashion statements they served several useful purposes.

Seamen proudly sported earrings as a mark of their travels and voyages. Earrings were given to young sailors to commemorate their first crossing of the equator, or when they rounded the treacherous waters of Cape Horn, the southernmost tip of South America.


Earrings were also worn for superstitious reasons. Some pirates were convinced that wearing an earring would improve or even cure bad eyesight, as they believed that the precious metals in an earring possessed magical healing powers. Another tale was that pierced ears would prevent seasickness. Others believed that a gold earring served as a protective talisman and that a man wearing an earring wouldn't drown.

This, of course, often proved to be false. But earrings made of silver or gold were worth enough to pay for a sailor's funeral if his body washed ashore. Some seamen even engraved the name of their home port on the inside of the earring so that their bodies could be

sent to their families for a proper burial. If a man died on a ship, the earrings helped to cover the cost of transporting his body home so that he wouldn't be buried at sea or on foreign soil.

But wearing hoop earrings did serve one truly beneficial purpose for living sailors. "Pirates, especially those who fired the ships' cannons during close combat with the enemy, dangled wads of wax from their earrings to use as earplugs," Doug Lennox writes in "Now You Know Big Book of Answers."

Wearing earrings didn't protect pirates from drowning, seasickness or bad eyesight, but at least it helped protect them against hearing loss.

It can be very daunting for people who unexpectedly find themselves responsible for a child's ongoing care. But support is available via the Department of Human Services' Grandparent Adviser network.

Jennifer, who is a Grandparent Adviser, not only works with grandparents, but with non-parent carers as well to help them understand the payments and services they might be eligible for, such as child care payments and Medicare services.

"Being a Grandparent Adviser gives me the opportunity to link people directly to financial support as well as other services," Jennifer said.

"We help make a positive difference in the lives of the young people they care for."

Jennifer knows that not everybody finds it easy to make that first call for help.

"Many people find it hard or embarrassing," she said.

"When they do call us, it is often during a traumatic time in their lives – there are many reasons why someone

becomes a long-term carer for a child who isn't their own

"By the time they reach out, they're often in financial hardship.

"We urge people to call us before visiting an office, because we can walk them through the process and let them know what to expect ahead of time.

"We help with tasks such as booking appointments with the department, and can step people through how to use our online services.

"In addition to helping people access services through the department, we can also link people to services in their local areas, such as support groups."

Grandparent Advisers are located all around Australia. If you need extra support, you can call them on Freecall™ 1800 245 965, and you'll be transferred to your nearest available Grandparent Adviser. If you need to leave a message, a Grandparent Adviser will get back to you within 48 hours.

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

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Key Tax Tips for Accommodation Sharing

The ATO is reminding taxpayers who rent out all or part of their home through accommodation sharing services to ensure they understand their tax obligations.

Declare income

The ATO's Deputy Commissioner for Small Business, Deborah Jenkins, said the most important thing to remember is that all income earned from renting out all or part of a property needs to be declared.

"It doesn't matter if it's only for one week of the year, or a few weeks here and there, every dollar needs to be declared," Ms Jenkins said.

"We know that most people try to do the right thing but we are concerned that some people don't understand their obligations. Unfortunately there are a few who know what their obligations are but seek to avoid them. As the community would expect, we have them in our sights."

The ATO collects information from a range of sources, including banks, other government agencies and suppliers and other third parties. We also get information about purchases of major items, such as cars and real property, and have the ability to compare this information against income and expenditure that

taxpayers report to us.

We are currently working with third parties in the accommodation sharing sector to provide greater visibility around these issues and to assist us in compliance activities.

Key Tax Tips for Accommodation Sharing (Cont.)

Be aware of the Capital Gains Tax implications

"Just like running a business from home, once income is earned from a primary place of residence there are Capital Gains Tax (CGT) implications. It is possible that if a property significantly increases in value, the amount of CGT owed may even be higher than the amount of income received," Ms Jenkins said.

The ATO encourages anyone considering renting out part or all of their primary residence to seek independent advice about the tax implications. Good record keeping will also assist in calculating the capital gain when the property is sold.

Only claim deductions you are entitled to

Deductions can be claimed against income earned through accommodation sharing, however it is essential that you keep good records and apportion expenses appropriately. You can only claim deductions that relate to the portion of the house which is rented out, and only for the length of time it is rented.

Incorrect rental property claims will not go unnoticed. We are using increasingly sophisticated data analytics and risk modelling to identify incorrect or suspicious claims.

If you think you have made a mistake

The ATO will always seek to assist taxpayers who may have made a mistake or unwittingly omitted income. Any taxpayer who thinks they might have made a mistake or needs assistance in understanding their obligations should contact the ATO or their agent.



Commemorating 100 Years of ANZAC (Cont.)

Australians, and several days later, a fresh mild case of one of the contagious diseases broke out, so the 24 contacts from the vessel had to recommence their detention in quarantine from that date. On arrival of the Ulimaroa at the quarantine station, for their welfare, the Red Cross dispatched a further 750 packets of cigarettes, and 78 cases of fruit. In addition, the Perth branch issued 24 suits of pyjamas, 3 cases of chocolates, 3 cases of lime juice, 12lbs malt extract, 1 dozen eau de Cologne and two dozen toothbrushes. It appears the men in quarantine were held on another ship and on 18 April, the troops ex the Ulimaroa were due for release, and brought back to disembark at Fremantle, however, Charlie Griffin may not have been among them. On 26 April, he was admitted to No. 26 Australian Auxiliary Hospital, especially established at Artillery Barracks and specialising in treatment of soldiers, mainly Light Horsemen, who had contracted malaria on service in the Middle East. It was controlled by the No. 8 Australian General Hospital. Family believe he was kept up to two months in quarantine, though it appears more like 18 days. Never-the-less, the lengthy detention did not "sit" very well with Charlie, and his remarks were documented in the book, "The Plague of the Spanish Lady".

Corporal Griffin was discharged from hospital, 1 July, and from the Army 24 July, 1919, three and a half months after arriving back in Australia. It was recorded his sickness was due to military service, however, it was expected there would be a complete recovery within six months. The only medal he is known to have received was the British War Medal. His regiment number was 3538, and he gave his religion as Roman Catholic.

Charlie Griffin returned to his farm at Neendaling, which the Lands Department allotted to him in March of 1911, having heeded the call, "Go on the land young man." It is believed he had squatted on the same land earlier, which is said to have been pegged by Ernie Dunham, but not taken up. He was possibly the second selector to begin land clearing in the area, and he would "come and go," seeking work in many places round the State to finance the development of his farm. As the Lake Grace community was developing, he joined in with the activities, and on an occasion in 1915 took part in an impromptu concert when he rendered several songs, "his rich baritone being heard to advantage". It was also recorded the same year that Charlie Griffin and his Stidworthy partners had a 300 acre crop of wheat sown. Though the seasons had been good, Charlie had become sick of the situation and enlisted for war service, leaving his Stidworthy partners to look after his farm. Two years after his return, he married the Stidworthy's sister Nelly, a very capable person who involved herself very much in the Community, and especially Country Women's affairs. Charlie was also a partaker, especially in farming affairs. He was a member of the Southern Wheat Growers Union, representing Neendaling, and had a moderating influence in their activities. He was also an advisory

member of the Junior Farmers, begun in 1938.

Charlie and Nelly had three sons, Charles, Tom and John. In 1957 Charlie's eldest son Charles found gold on his father's farm, "Yamboyna," having learned the technique of panning and detecting gold. In 1960 Charlie and Charles and another partner registered a gold mine under the name of "Griffin's Find". Since then mining developed in the area giving satisfactory commercial yields, and was carried out until 1989 by Otter Exploration, though the farm, which he had operated successfully over the years, is no longer owned by the Griffins.

Many local people may remember Mr Charles Griffin as one of our senior gentlemen, who would regularly sit with his peers on a bench seat at the post office and engage in conversation with each other, and always had a friendly word or greeting for those who passed by. "Good morning young man", were words often heard! Charlie Griffin died on 1 July, 1981, aged 90 years and was buried in the Lake Grace Cemetery next to his wife Nelly, also aged 90 years, who predeceased him by 2 years.
