What A Difference 100 Years Makes

1914 was one of the driest years of growing season rainfall recorded over the past 100 years at Robert Carruthers' farm adjoining the lake Grace townsite. The Carruthers family has kept rainfall records since they arrived at Lake Grace in 1911.

Just 156 mm (625 points) was recorded from 1st April to October 31st but 38 mm of that fell in October and was probably too late to benefit crop yields.

History has recorded that there was hardly enough crop to cut for the horse chaff to get them through until the next year. Those pioneers must have wondered what they had let themselves in for.

But relief was at hand as

the 1915 season was a bumper season with 282 mm (1,128 points) falling between April and October and that followed 90 mm (360 points) recorded prior to April 1915.

After harvest 1915 there were some 30,000 bags (2,500 tons) of wheat grown by about ten farmers on partially cleared farms stacked at the White Dam and where the Lake Grace town is now (then part of the Carruthers farm) and with no rail line to collect it.

These old pioneers were clever fellows as they stacked wheat it the Lake Grace townsite to force the government to speed up the rail construction which was completed in June 1916.

Fast forward 100 years to 2014 and the aerial photo (courtesy of Steve Curtin) shows the Lake Grace CBH bin complex storing 200,000 tonnes of grain delivered from the 2014 crop worth about \$50m.

Leonard Harry Elliott

31/05/1923 - 4/2/2015

Someone said to me this week that its an honour to be loved and missed, today we honour Leonard Harry Elliott also known to many as Len, Dad, Pop, Old Pop, Uncle Len, Mr Elliott, Squatter and Emu Legs, a man we all loved and who will be greatly missed.

Pop was born on the 31st May 1923; he was the third child born to David and Helena Elliott with two older sisters Joan and Audrey and two younger siblings Daphne and George. He was born in Wagin and travelled home to Lake Grace by train with his Mum and picked up by his Dad at the local railway station before the trip home on horse and buggy to the family farm, *5* miles south of the town to the family property known as Beaumont. He was the brother his sisters Joan, Audrey and Daphne found they could talk to if they had a problem and he would always listen and come up with a solution. He also kept an eye on his younger brother George.

Pop went to school by horse and buggy and in the good days would give his best mate Rob Bishop and his brothers a ride on the springs. When the pony had a foal they ended up having to walk the five miles into school and back. Pop attended Lake Grace school from year one until year seven before travelling to Perth for boarding school at Aquinas from the age of 13. He was one of the first boarders at the new school in Manning which included laying many bricks of the new buildings, helping the other boys clear the oval in front of the school and walking to Clontarf where they chopped wood for the Christian brothers. Pop said all his grandchildren were lucky attending boarding school compared to his day because he only got home 3 times a year. Pop's Mum used to say before he left he would sit on the step cleaning his shoes with tears running down his face. Pop was actually not a practicing Catholic at a Catholic boarding school so his job was to peel potatoes rather then attend mass and I'm sure there were more then a few classmates who would have loved to swap places with him!

Pop came home to the farm. At 18 he joined the RAAF, served two and half years on duty overseas during World War 2 with eighteen months of service completed in Australia. He saw active service in Papua New Guinea and Borneo where he was part of a mobile squadron that built air strips. His best memories of these days were travelling in a cattle truck, landing on the Swan River in a Catalina and the train journey across Australia along with living at the MCG and Randwick racecourse where they slept in the grandstand and had to move all their belongings on race day. Pop still liked to keep an eye on the horses through the years although not putting any money on them as he could still remember all the betting slips left on the ground. Whilst overseas Pop had a bout of Dengue Fever and also had his appendix removed. He thought the doctor was a butcher going by the size of the scar. During the operation they had to revive him as he was found to be allergic to the chloroform.



1944 was a bad year on the farm with no rain therefore no water for the stock. Pop was given leave in January 1945 to help cart water however just before he returned it decided to rain and he ended up coming home for a holiday. Another of Pops great memories was being sent to guard some supplies on a train with another mate at the rail yards in Fremantle only to forgotten by his squad and left with no food and water.

On the 24th January, 1948 Pop married Shirley Brown (Nana) in Mitcham, Victoria. They had met while he was on service in Victoria and he always told us that Nana picked him up because she liked his blue uniform. Every time Pop would leave Nana his way of affection was always to tell her to behave herself. In the same year they married they purchased the property formerly owned by a Mr Manton at Beenong. The farm was named Vermont in a tribute to Nanas home, although it couldn't be more different to what she had known. He diversified his farm practice by cropping, running sheep, cattle and his beloved pigs and there are many stories to be told about his pigs. Pop and Nana had some great memories from the time living on the farm including travelling to local dances in the district and the variety of sports including cricket but most of all being surrounded by a great group of neighbours.

Pop's neighbours were always there to lend a hand although sometimes to also have a laugh. He was kicked in the knee by a sheep and needed the ambulance to take him to Dumbleyung hospital as we had no doctor at the time. Everyone from around the Beenong area came to help. His close neighbour Jim arrived, looked down at Pop in the muddy sheep yards and said "Gosh boss, if I'd known you were this bad I would have brought the gun!".

However Pop got him back. Jim was on a load of hay and fell from the top when Pop looked down at him on the ground he said "Sorry Jim I should have dropped

you on the other side you would've been in the shade."

Beenong cricket ground was the summer Sunday outings and football in the winter. Pop played both of these along with hockey which he enjoyed immensely travelling anywhere from Pingrup to Wagin. He always said he had bad ankles because he fell in the trenches not that he fell down a rabbit burrow whilst playing hockey in Pingrup. Accidents seem to follow Pop in his sporting endeavours, there was also the day playing cricket at Beenong when he hurt his finger whilst fielding and one of his mates said it was just dislocated and he would put it back in place for him, it turns out his finger was broken. Pop had fun but by his own omission he was not a sportsman, so I've always known where I got my lack of sporting ability from. In 1951 he was thrown from a horse and broke his arm, Nana sold the horse while he was away and from that day his arm was never straight again. Later in life with his cricket watching Pop felt he may have not used his crocked arm to its full capacity after watching Mutthiah Muralitharan become the leading wicket taker in cricket and all with a bent arm! Pop loved all sports and followed most becoming a Geelong supporter from the war. That arm was used for a few stories particularly that be used his arm to shield himself from the Japanese swords during the war!

Nana and Pop were the proud parents of four daughters, Lenore, Wendy, Glenda and Lois. Pop would often employ a workman on the farm and he also employed a young lady to help out Nana. That girl was to become daughter number five, Aunty Dawn and she stayed for seven years. Pop had Aunty Dawn on the hay rake one day but when he looked around again to check on her only to see she was at the other end of the paddock. There is also a tree out the front of the farm house that Pop always liked to call Dawn and point out as it wore the scar of Aunty Dawn running in to it.

The girls all attended Lake Grace school to which they would catch the bus everyday, Aunty Wendy wasn't a big fan of going to school. If Pop took the girls to the bus stop Aunty Wendy would sometimes return home with him however it was Nana who took the girls Wendy would not return. In 1966 Nana and Pop moved in to town to 3 Absolon Street, all the older sisters to this day say Pop came in to town because Lois didn't like to travel to school so they built opposite it.

Like all good farmers holiday time was spent on the coast, first at Turkey Point (Bunbury) with the Kellow's and for a few years the Bishop families, from 1961 they went to James Park (which became Vasse caravan park) until 1994 and as kids we were lucky enough to join Nana and Pop every summer for the annual Busselton trips which included calling in to all the relatives along the way and lunch at Aunty Joan's where we would pick up enough of Uncle Franks plums to last the holidays. They had a wonderful time with the Bishop, Foster and Partridge families along with many others. Mr Foster said Pop didn't wear a watch but you could ask the time he would look at the sun pluck a time out of the air and would almost be spot on each time. Pop



swam twice a day rain, hail or shine which really just included diving straight in kicking his legs as hard as he could followed by floating on his back and for many, many years Pop had us convinced that he had tricked a shark one day by floating on his back and pretending to be dead. And as kids we were always jealous because he never got stung by stingers. If the cricket was on he went at morning tea and afternoon break. and when he would sit at the breakfast table in the morning his regular sneeze would be so loud it would almost cause cyclists to run off into the sand dunes.

Once in town Pop travelled to the farm six days a week - never on a Sunday and I'm not sure if the pigs were happy about that, he always said you never start a job on a Friday and you never work on a Sunday. His neighbours were still there to lend a hand when required. One day he was catching a calf and left the ute on the dam bank with dog on the seat although he didn't put the handbrake on which is not uncommon and the ute rolled into the dam. He called Ed Duckworth and said "I'm bogged" this was in summer. Ed's reply "Where? it must be in the dam" and it was.

Aunty Biddy (we have seemed to add a lot of friends to our family over the years!) said he was so kind to her. Pop would pick her up after work in Lake Grace on a Saturday and take her home to Buniche and then pick her up on Sunday and bring her back into Lake Grace where she boarded. Pop sometimes had a heavy foot, his Mum wanted to go to a CWA meeting in Newdegate one day. Being the good son he took her in his ute which was thirty miles in thirty minutes on gravel road and potholes along the way. When he drove the family to town it was either a quick or slow trip as some days he needed to check out the countryside. After the years of driving out to the farm by the end he could do it with his eyes closed, and I don't think he ever stopped at the Beenong rail crossing. The best reaction to his driving however was when Lizzie the dog was on the back and Dad would drive back in from the farm; it would really unsettle the dog as Dad tended to use his clutch a bit more then Pop and she could never pick it. Pop also had the pleasure of teaching us to drive, and Lou had Pop



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Here we are in mid February already, only 8 more weeks until seeding starts for some! So it's probably timely that we inspect and review our machinery etc to avoid the rush.

- 1. Two Ways - check all two ways are operational, clear and have full range. If you need any new units especially VHF, order them now to allow for programming of requencies. We can SWR and power output sets on farm or in the shop.
- 2. **<u>Batteries</u>** - check batteries are charged and capable of starting machine easily. We recommend 'float' type battery chargers to keep batteries fully charged. If batteries are being drained we can track drains or fit isolation switches if required.
- 3. Electrical Systems - does it start OK? Is the alternator charging OK? Do all the gauges work accurately? We can supply and fit auxillary gauges and engine protection alarms. Low water alarms have saved many an engine that has blown a radiator hose.
- **Monitors** are the air seeder monitors working OK? Are all the clutches, sensors, 4. switches and connectors clean and serviceable? Inspect the wiring wiring harnesses, don't find out in April that the cockies have chewed through the wiring.

Most Other Road Users Are A Threat

Media Release

Most Western Australian drivers believe they are safe and self-assured behind the wheel, but say the majority of other road users could be risky and dangerous, according to recent research conducted by Slater and Gordon.

Motor vehicle accident lawyer, Craig Lynch said three-quarters of West Australians believed they drive confidently and safely, but less than onethird said other drivers were the same.

"We surveyed nearly 2,000 Australian drivers and asked them to describe their own driving performance and the general standard of other drivers on the road," Mr Lynch said.

"The results showed 77 per cent of WA drivers say they are confident and safe, but the tables were turned when just 30 per cent said that other drivers were careful and courteous.

"The remaining respondents (70 per cent) said other drivers were risky and dangerous either all of the time, or at least some of the time while driving."

Mr Lynch said this showed a significant difference between the way Western Australian drivers viewed their own driving style and the way they viewed the driving of others.

"There is a tendency to only credit negative actions to other drivers on the road, but the figures show that this is unlikely to be the reality," he said.

"We can't possibly be perfect drivers all the time, and it would be very concerning if we didn't know our own potential threats and instead just focused on the actions of others.



"We have to remember that we can't control how other drivers behave, we can only control our own decisions, attitudes and reactions on the road.

"That's why it is so important for drivers to concentrate on doing the best possible job while behind the wheel, and if they do that more often, then it is likely to result in a reduction in the number of crashes.

"A little bit of patience and tolerance goes a long way, especially to avoid road rage or traffic accidents."

More Care Closer To Home For Pregnant Women

Media Release

In a first for the Wheatbelt, pregnant women and their babies will soon have access to specialised antenatal and postnatal care closer to the home.

WA Country Health Service, Wheatbelt Regional Director, Caroline Langston said the Southern Inland Health Initiative's (SIHI) Maternal Health Project would further enhance maternity services in the Wheatbelt.

Four new community midwives to be based in Merredin, Moora, Narrogin and Northam would deliver the new service, supported by existing child health nursing and maternity staff.

"Many local women give birth in metropolitan hospitals, due to choice, their care needs or because there is no local birthing service. This means they may miss important antenatal and postnatal checks due to the time and expense of travelling to appointments outside of the region," said Caroline.

"The new midwives and new services we are introducing will mean women can receive care locally, both pre- and post-birth. The community midwives will provide local clinics and home-visits to women in the Wheatbelt, focusing on women with high-risk or complex pregnancies. "This means earlier detection and treatment of possible issues during pregnancy. Another major benefit is that we will be able to better respond to signs of Post-Natal Depression earlier and help women to access the care and support they need.

"Newborn checks and testing, such as newborn bloodspot screening, will also be available at local hospitals, nursing posts and child health centres, with the introduction of training for staff who administer these tests."

Two project officers working on the Maternal Health Project are initiating a number of tools to enhance pregnancy knowledge and education, including a new "Having a Baby in the Wheatbelt" guide to outline how women can access appropriate services.

The community midwives will work alongside GPs, child health nurses and registered nurses, and will collaborate closely with Boodjarri Yorga, which provides care to pregnant Aboriginal women. The \$565 million Southern Inland Health Initiative is funded by the State Government's Royalties for Regions program.

REFUELLING STATIC MOTORS AT INCIDENTS





Since March 2006, DFES has received numerous reports of petrol erupting from jerry cans when firefighters have opened them. Three of these events resulted in line ignition of the released fuel, with one occurrence causing significant burns to a firefighter's hands and another resulting in a light tanker being destroyed by fire. Two other events resulted in fuel spraying into firefighter's eyes.

Due to the recurrence and potential severity of the outcomes, a procedure has been developed for refuelling static motors, such as pump motors on fire tankers or generators, at incidents involving fire.

Static motors that require refuelling at incidents must ONLY be refuelled at water points or staging areas and NOT on the fireground.

When the vehicle travels to the water point or staging area for replenishment, a vehicle check is to be conducted including;

- vehicle fuel levels
- vehicle damage
- · Leaf/debris build-up
- · Refuelling of static motors as necessary

The opening procedure for jerry cans is:

- The fuel container should be removed from the vehicle and placed on the ground prior to opening (venting) the fuel container.
- Only refuel engines in a well-ventilated area with the engine stopped and if possible allow the engine to cool first.
- Fully withdraw the retaining pin.
- Prior to commencement of pouring fuel from the fuel container to the engine ensure that your feet are on the ground, you have earthed yourself on the appliance and the pouring funnels is in contact with the fuel tank. This will reduce the potential for ignition due to static.

Lift cap handle **slowly** to allow pressure build up to vent, with any venting away from the body. Control opening with hand pressure as required. Lift cap handle completely and pour using attached funnel.

This procedure is to be followed for refuelling of all static motors on all vehicles where jerry cans are utilised as the refuelling method.



raising his voice for the first time ever, but in his defence Lou was driving directly into the fence and she wouldn't turn the wheel. The scratches can still be seen on the bonnet today.

Pop came from a very upstanding and community minded family and continued in his parents footsteps. He was a founding member of St John Ambulance in 1946 and was made a Life Member. A member of Lions since 1972 and still attending up until last year. He was also a large contributor to the fine jar mainly because Mr Thiel always called him Money Bags. He enjoyed driving up to the footy oval to watch the game and then wander back at halftime for afternoon tea.

During cricket season Lois would get the brownie points as she would do the scoring and angle it so Pop could see it with his binoculars. His biggest achievement was as a Shire Councillor in which he served for 29 years and Shire President for five of those years, Pop was made an honorary Freeman of the Shire and was the second person to be honoured, the first being his father in 1972. He loved his North Lake Grace Cricket Club and was so pleased to be asked to cut the cake recently at the schools 100 year reunion. He was always honoured to participate in the ANZAC service every year. Until recently he would attend the Men's Shed on a Tuesday, coming down from the hospital on his gopher, it was his favourite day of the week and also the senior citizens lunch once a month.

Pop's family always came first, followed very closely by the community. He was always interested in what was happening and the morning ritual since retirement from the farm involved getting the morning paper and waiting to give and receive some cheek and footy talk with Murray George at the plaza. And when Pop read the paper he read it all. He always knew what was going on even in the entertainment world, the paper would be pulled apart, flipped and folded to the perfect shape so he could close one eye and have Nana yell at him to open both eyes! The radio was on all day, and would follow his steps everywhere he went even when it came to TV he still had the radio on in case he missed something, which was quite handy for him as he would never miss a wicket or goal while he was reading because by the time he heard it and looked up he would see it. When the paper wasn't in his hands it would be replaced with the Elders Weekly which kept him in the loop with all the farming news and livestock reports. He was always chuffed when he would see Braden getting his photo in it. Also his fortnightly letter from niece Lynette on the goings on at her farm. On a Sunday he would let Nana go to church so he could look after the house but would always tell us he felt blessed after he watched Songs of Praise while he waited for Nana to return to serve up the Sunday roast.

Pop became very ill at the end of June and was flown

to Perth. We all thought we had lost him then even to the point that the doctor walked in the next morning and said 'Well this is a surprise!' Being in Perth for nine weeks, anyone that knows Pop would know that its 9 weeks too long. However he still managed to get his footy tips in each week. The night before he was set to go home he was like a kid before Christmas, and the community he had always loved was there to take him home in the ambulance that must have been far different from the one he used to drive. Two months ago he became a permanent up at the hospital at his wish, I think it helped that the best cook in town was up there. Pops last outings were Australia Day breakfast on 26th January and his favourite Men's Shed on the 27th.

The last joke Pop played on two of his great grandsons when they came to stay two week ago was telling them not to run in his house as he had set a rabbit trap in the passage. Mum and Meredith were so sad he wasn't home to see the two of them creeping up the passage looking behind doors and carpet joiners for the trap. And he loved taking all six grandchildren for a ride on his gopher, with some now enjoying taking themselves.

Pop never drank, smoked or swore but loved a laugh. He is survived by his sister Joan (96), four daughters, seven grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

The family would particularly like to thank Dr Jacobs and the wonderful staff of our local hospital for the great care you gave our Dad and Pop. He loved your company and finding out all about your holidays, crops, stock, sport and life in general and loved telling everyone how busy it is in our hospital.

Its hard to try and sum up Pops 91 plus years, however from a personal perspective I was extremely fortunate to grow up and be taught so much by him. For those who know him well will understand his fantastic sense of humour, and there are so many stories that I can tell that Pop has talked about over the years but the real reason those stories are so good is because he was telling them. Last Monday I was preparing a presentation for work in which I was to present what has inspired my design and I was flicking through images of my days on the farm and driving out on the weekends when I got the message from Mum. It was a little different at work when I started talking about shaving pigs in 44 gallon drums and trying to track a pig and its litter up in the back bush and connecting it back to the design world; but I managed to do it.

A couple of my great memories with Pop involved jumping, the first was the sheep we coined 'Jumping Jack'. This particular sheep would jump any fence in its vicinity once we got it in the yards. The day came when Pop decided to sell some shippers, we got the sheep in the yards and once again 'Jumping Jack' was up to his usual tricks. Once we finally got them on

the truck Pop turned to me and said 'I tell you what, I hope Jack ends up on the top deck of that boat because he is going to be in for the fright of his life when he hits the water!"

The second time involved a pig. It was school holidays and we had travelled to Narrogin to sell some pigs. In one of the pens was one of the meanest pigs you would ever see, it looked like someone had pulled it out of the bush that morning and that pig did not want to be polony! About half a dozen men were all standing in the aisle laughing at this pig that was frothing at the mouth. And right before our eyes this pig leaped out of the pen ready to get the nearest bloke it could find, you have never seen men jump in the air so high.

Pop taught me two great lessons in life; the first one was to reply with a quick answer, if you don't hesitate they wont know any different because the person doesn't know the answer that's why they ask. I take that rule in to everyday of my life.

The second was the artful act of fishing and I don't mean with a rod and reel we are both terrible at that, I mean the act of fishing to get a reaction and with two sisters I have perfected the art after years of watching Pop stir Nana at any chance he got. And finally I ask you all to continue to share all Pop's wonderful stories with each other today and for years to come.

'See ya after harvest Pop.'

The program is an industry stewardship initiative implemented by Croplife Australia, the National Farmers Federation, Animal Medicines Australia, The Veterinary Manufacturers Distributors Association and the Australian Local Government Association.

The program has been operating since 1999 and is designed to provide Australian agricultural and

veterinary chemical users with a recycling pathway for eligible agvet chemical containers.

If you have delivered drums and lost your receipt, send your delivery details to WA Regional Consultant Graeme Passmore (jaderan@bigpond.net.au) and *drumMUSTER* will endeavour to confirm your delivery and reissue a receipt via email.

If you haven't delivered your drums, now is a great time to do so. *drumMUSTER* collection sites operate all year round and accept drums on an ongoing basis, by request or on specific days during March or September.

To find your nearest collection site, simply enter your postcode and state under 'Collection locations' on the *drumMUSTER* website (www.drummuster.com.au). A map will appear with the closest site in your area marked.

Even if you have taken full advantage of the returnable packaging arrangements for 110 litre (enviros) and 1,000 litre (IBCs) and only have a few drums per year, it is still important from an environmental and audit point of view to deliver these drums and keep your receipt as proof of delivery.

Tenancy Tip – Avoid Rental Scams

When looking for a rental property there are often time pressures that mean you need to find a new home quickly. It can be quite competitive if it's a really nice option for the price, which adds to the sense of urgency.

Scammers are all too aware of these factors at play and target tenants through online classified advertisements featuring properties that don't exist or are owned by someone else.

Consumer Protection has heard from real estate agents who have had prospective tenants turn up to home open viewings because of scammers stealing the photos and advertising the property as a rental, when in reality it is for sale.

In 2014, around 30 accommodation scam victims contacted WA ScamNet and between them the total monetary loss was almost \$43,000 - an average loss per victim of nearly \$1,500.


Lake Grace P&C President Vynka Lay said "It was great to get information on the roles of each office

To tell us about your overseas travel, log on to **myGov** and select your **Centrelink account**, select **Personal Details** from the side menu and then select **Travelling Outside of Australia**. You can then input your travel plans.

After answering a few simple questions, you will see information tailored to your circumstances about how your payment will be affected, and any recommended action you should take before you depart.

Once you have advised us of your travel details you will be provided with a receipt number to confirm your details have been updated.

If your circumstances are more complex, you will be advised to phone or visit us so we can discuss your plans in more detail. You can also now use your Centrelink online account to:

- view your current and future overseas travel details we already know about
- add new details for future overseas travel for your partner's or dependants' details if they are travelling with you
- update or remove future overseas travel details

• update certain travel details while you are overseas It is important your details are up to date before you travel. You can now update more of these details online, including overseas phone details, interpreter spoken language details and edit future contact details.

This is in addition to what you could already update including your email address and phone and internet subscriber details.

We Are Not The Same! Is It Embedded In Our Masculinity?

Owen Catto - The Regional Men's Health Initiative

Quite often as blokes we have been told to get in touch with our feminine side. What an affront and insult to our intelligence, over time this has been part of the language barrier that has put blokes positive approaches to wellbeing issues in reverse.

There are three parts to our health; physical, mental and social/spiritual wellbeing. The latter is where we find our identity, our individuality, our own sense of self, our sense of belonging, our passions and interests and our emotional context (not a feminine side!)

We are the same species but putting it simply men have evolved differently than women. Our DNA is 99.6% similar but it is that 0.4% difference that we need to talk about and address, because it helps explain why blokes have a warrior attitude to life and that we seek help differently than the ladies.

There are three main areas of difference that we talk about in the work we do:

Communication

o On average blokes will talk one third less than ladies per day (7000 words to 21,000 words) this

starts from a young age from boys through to men. Anyone with a wife, mother, and mother in law, daughter, and partner will know this. But this is a good thing for the ladies as it helps them talk about a whole lot of issues that blokes don't.

o It is perfectly normal for blokes to talk in dot points and even just grunt!

Risk-taking

- Blokes are hard wired to take risks from an early age. Some of this is linked to our brain development. The brain development stage for a lady is roughly finished between the age of 18 to 20, whereas for a bloke it is between the age of 25 to 28 (some may say 45 to 50!)
- o As we get older we get wiser but are still hard wired to take risks

Winning (A really important part of the warrior culture)

 The majority (90%) of Aussie men think winning is important (a trait that can be traced back to our true warrior days for survival)

\$45million For Regional Mobile Phone Towers

Media Release

Regional WA's mobile phone and internet coverage has been given another significant boost with Royalties for Regions funding a further 85 telecommunications towers, kicking off with 22 initial sites.

The \$45million Regional Telecommunications Project (RTP) will provide greater connectivity for regional communities, including a number of them in the Wagin electorate, and improve safety and emergency services capabilities.

Member for Wagin Terry Waldron MLA said people working, studying and running businesses in rural WA would be some of those to benefit from this excellent program.

"This investment will greatly assist in terms of social and economic development in regional communities and will further breakdown the digital divide between the city and the country," Mr Waldron said.

He said the 22 initial sites would be delivered in partnership with Telstra.

The first 22 towers are – Wongan Hills town, Nyabing, Gracetown, Arrino, Ongerup North, Boorabbin,

ALKERS HILL

Tammin, Nilemah RT, Albany West, Bolgart, Cranbrook West, Wickepin, Peaceful Bay, Molloy Island, Salmon Gums, Grass Patch, Nyamup, Wilyabrup, Westonia, Muntadgin, Highbury and Yerecoin.

It will take four years to implement all 85 sites. This new project starts this year and will be completed by 2018.

According to Mr Waldron, the RTP builds on the "success of the \$40million Regional Mobile Communications Project (RMCP)".

"The RMCP, which was a joint project between the State Government and Telstra, was completed in September last year after 113 new and upgraded telecommunications towers were installed across regional and remote parts of WA," Mr Waldron said.

"The new RTP telecommunications initiative is another big step in the right direction."

- An alarming stat is that 50% of blokes think winning is all that matters. So quite often blokes don't take a backward step when it comes to finances, relationships and/or business matters.
- Due to the importance blokes place on winning, explains why a loss event and/or a sense of loss becomes problematic and can be really hard to deal with.
- Combine this with the lack of understanding about our emotional context and we can have a ticking time bomb.

As blokes we need to be more aware of our emotional context and that it is alright to show it. That is we all experience emotional times, so we can show it (maybe a hug or a cry) and/or to use language that is foreign to us to express our emotional context i.e. I am sad and/or I am struggling here.

Talk to a Mate!! It is beneficial and you will realise that you're not alone, it's not just you and there's a lot of other blokes feeling the same way.



WEEK-END PENNANTS


