Gloves on to Tackle Invasive Pest

Regular summer rainfall has seen a great proliferation of caltrop within the Lake Grace town site. As can be seen from the map sent out by the Shire last week the railway reserve and waterways are quite badly infested.

In order to try and combat the problem we have formed a 'green army' of volunteers. Flags are being put out (as pictured right with Andrew) marking where infestations are, this is to raise an awareness for individuals to not walk in the area (unless you have bare feet) and for the Shire to not run the mowers over the area. Please do NOT remove the flags.

By reducing the traffic of the seeds we hope to limit the spread. We are also asking that everyone checks their yard thoroughly for the plant. If you find any please dig them up, collect as many seeds as possible (a paint roller or thongs of a decent thickness are a good method). Place the plant and the seeds in a sealable plastic bag and place in the marked wheelie bin at the Shire depot.

Game on! Builder Appointed for New St John Ambulance Sub Centre

One of the most eagerly awaited appointments of the year was announced on the 1st March 2016.

AK Homes Construction Pty Ltd of Bunbury has been appointed by St John Ambulance WA Ltd as the builder of the new Lake Grace Sub Centre at Lot 501 Stubbs Street in Lake Grace.

Nine builders were invited to tender for the project, two withdrew during the process and three tenders were received. The Tender Assessment Panel of Debrah Clarke, Ross Chappell, Ray Gosling and Amanda Milton with assistance from Clayton McCarthy of St John Head Office had the task of assessing the tenders.

In the case of AK Homes, the panel undertook site visits to Mary's Cottages at Kukerin, the home of Jo and Leon Morgan at Griffin Reward, and the home of Dawn and Alex Van Vliet in Lake Grace, to assess the quality of the AK Homes work and to talk frankly with the owners of the projects.

The next stage was to invite Terry Martin (co-owner of AK Homes) and Jayson Gerde (General Manager), to visit Lake Grace and to meet with the panel and Clayton McCarthy of St John Property Services. The panel asked many strong questions of AK Homes in the meeting, setting down key ground rules for the project delivery. The panel also went through the construction room by room to ensure that the tender included/excluded all elements of the project.

The final stage was negotiating a price that was within the scope of the project. In identifying savings, the

project has moved from steel to timber framed walls, and the sub centre will be responsible for the cabinetry, tiling and painting of the project. In taking on more sub contracts for the project, this also allows the sub centre more control over which contractors are employed on the project, with a preference for local trades.

All of the outside works i.e. earthworks, paving, kerbing, asphalt/bitumen etc will be the responsibility of the sub centre through direct contracts with the trades.

With Terry Martin being the son in law of Neville and Maureen Moulden of Lake Grace, the pressure is not only on AK Homes to deliver this project on time, on budget ,to specification, but Neville has been tasked to keep a keen eye on the project as well. Nothing like a bit of good old family pressure!

AK Homes is acutely aware of how important this project is to the community, and how many community funds, both local and regionally have been committed to the project.

AK Homes see this project as an opportunity to deliver a commercial project in a regional location to extend their reach as a company. AK homes already build homes from Port Hedland to Bremer Bay. To view their work jump online and have a look at www.akhomes.com.au.

With nearly a million vehicle movements a year estimated to go past the new sub centre site, the site will be highly visible to locals and visitors alike.

AK Homes is required to provide certificates of currency for Public Liability with a minimum of \$20M, Workers Compensation to \$50M, and Contract Insurance specific to this project with St John Ambulance WA Ltd as the named insured.

Petition for Mobile Black Spot Funding

Media Release

A Kojonup veterinarian is calling on Lake Grace residents to join her fight for increased funding to improve mobile phone black spots after her partner was tragically killed.

Katharine Marsh is spearheading a petition aimed at the Federal government to increase mobile phone black spot funding and commit to a deadline to rectify currently identified locations.

"I am campaigning for this issue after my partner, Mick, tragically passed away following a motorbike accident which occurred in a mobile phone black spot, delaying emergency assistance for 20 – 30 minutes," Miss Marsh said.

"My experience is not an isolated incident - others have been affected in a similar way. Recent bushfires in late 2015 - early 2016 have also highlighted the problems of mobile phone black spots delaying access to emergency services."

There are more than 6000 nominated mobile phone black spots throughout Australia, including near capital cities, along major highways and transport routes and in whole towns and villages. WA has 570 black spots registered. Miss Marsh said where there is a black spot, there is no mobile network coverage and emergency services like '000' and alternative numbers such as '112' will not work.

"If you are faced with a life-threatening emergency and are in a mobile phone black spot area you will not be able to obtain emergency assistance. This could be the difference between life and death," Miss Marsh said.

"The technology exists to eradicate mobile phone black spots – it is simply a matter of further funding." The Federal Government has committed \$160 million, with the Round 2 locations expected to be announced at the end of this year.

"After this current round, there are no further plans for funding for mobile phone black spots, yet current funding is likely to leave at least 1000 black spots still unaddressed," Miss Marsh said.

"If mobile phone black spots in your area miss out this time there is no guarantee as to when they will be resolved."

Miss Marsh is aiming to collect 100,000 signatures by April 30 to send to the Standing Committee on Petitions for presentation to the Australian Parliament.

Anzac

Parents and the general community are very welcome at the school service, which will be held from 9:45-10:15am that day, in the school undercover area. Morning tea will follow for parents and community in the staff room. Your presence helps communicate to our students the importance of this day to Australians. School Promotion

The secondary school here in Lake Grace is a good choice for secondary education. We run a solid academic program with specialist teachers, and the feedback we get from students who go elsewhere in Year Ten and Eleven is that they are usually in front of their classmates because of the excellent standard here. Even so, the secondary school numbers have dropped over the last few years.

It's important that this decrease in numbers is stopped, for a number of reasons. The most important reason is that our ability to provide such a high standard is eroded if numbers get too small. Some District High Schools are down to ten secondary students. In many cases they have great teachers who are working hard, but they just do not have the resources to maintain student performance where it needs to be.

Another reason is about this community. More secondary students here means more people in sporting clubs, supporting local businesses, and providing all the energy you get from having a balance in age groups across the community. Lake Grace is a great place - because of the people here. We face a challenge as our main industry supports less people over time. One way to address this is to keep our teenagers here.

I understand people make this decision (about secondary schooling for their kids) for a variety of reasons, and it's important to acknowledge this is a personal (and sometimes difficult) decision. My focus, and the focus of the School Promotion Committee (a group of mostly young parents who are looking into how to do this) is to keep an excellent secondary school in Lake Grace so everyone has that choice in the future.

Volunteering and Why We Do It!

Gilda Davies from Volunteering WA provided some insightful workshops related to volunteers and volunteer management in Lake Grace last week. Some of the data presented was quite unexpected, however some of this would be more relevant to the metropolitan area rather than our community due to the different dynamic of population.

Volunteering can sometimes feel like an onerous task, with many of us seeing it as the 'right thing to do'. It was pointed out to participants that EVERYONE gets something out of volunteering. The organisation gets work done while the volunteer feels a sense of value, learns new skills, enjoys the social aspect or gains direct benefit (ie by volunteering for the netball club you get to play the sport you enjoy).

Although WA boasts more than 600,000 volunteers, it is one of the lowest rates per capita in Australia. In 2015, the socio-economic and cultural contribution volunteering makes to the State is conservatively estimated to be worth \$39 billion. This figure is much higher than previous estimates, which were based on economic impact alone.

Let's face it, life isn't just about money. A volunteer can get a great deal of companionship and enjoyment from volunteering with others for an organisation; this volunteering has direct health benefits for the volunteer in that they are more physically and mentally active and aren't as impacted by loneliness and depression. Direct health benefits = less spent on the public health system.

Volunteering WA took a recent survey of a broad cross section of the community. This survey produced much of the data that Gilda was able to present during the workshops. Currently for every dollar invested in volunteering there is a \$4.50 return.

For the Tuesday evening workshop which covered 'Attracting and Retaining Younger Volunteers' and 'Volunteer Rights & Responsibilities' we were thrilled to have 21 attend. Participants were from a range of different groups; as is typical for most country towns many of them wearing more than one hat.

Gilda talked about making your voluntary positions attractive and finding positions that suit an individuals lifestyle and personality type. Our seniors are more likely to be compliant, however our more youthful volunteers aren't interested in the long haul (remember these are generalisations and don't apply to everyone).

When it comes to recruiting a volunteer nothing beats the personal approach. All volunteers are keen to know what is expected of them so if you are recruiting you need to have a clear idea of what you are going to ask of them. For more fixed positions a Job Description Forms can be handy.

Wednesday morning was more about Key Issues of Volunteer Management with a solid attendance of 11. This 3.5 hour workshop covered what motivates people to stay or leave your organisation, recruitment and developing a message that attracts the right volunteer for your organisation.

As organisations how often do we sit and chat with our volunteers? Do we ask them for ideas or suggestions as to how the organisations is going; as volunteers they're the best ones to tell us what inspires them to come along.

Problems within organisations need to be addressed swiftly, this includes volunteers who are on a mission to disrupt, control and generally cause disharmony in the ranks. If the problems aren't addressed they simply fester and the organisation ends up losing the volunteers they want to keep.

We need to look after our volunteers; volunteers should be aware of what is going on in the organisation (nobody likes to be kept in the dark) and should be offered training. Organisations should also take the opportunity to recognise and thank their volunteers; this can be public recognition, a personal show of gratitude, a certificate or a social get together in the form of a BBQ or afternoon tea.

Political Correctness – is it a strain on our wellbeing?

Warriors Wellbeing

Political correctness is a doctrine "which holds forth the proposition that it is entirely possible to pick up a bit of shit by the clean end". In my opinion, political correctness is a major inhibiting factor when interpreting and applying bureaucracy and common sense (often the ingredient missing of lots of decision making) into our daily life. This ultimately can affect our wellbeing.

Bureaucracy on its own does have its place, however at times it can limit how we do things because of the many layers of rigid rules that may complicate getting the job done on the ground. This occurs in everyday life whether completing tedious processes, filling out pages of paperwork, or dealing with a system that appears to be more focused on processes rather than helping achieve an outcome.

When a disaster strikes (catastrophic fires late 2015 and early 2016) and other personal health and safety issues arise in our life, layers of bureaucracy are not always helpful, they can exacerbate an already tense environment. We have spoken to many blokes who feel both frustrated and restricted in their reactions to these disasters because of the many layers of procedures that had to be adhered to. Common sense was taking second place!

The point about the effects of this political correctness doctrine, is that it enshrines both bureaucracy and common sense and quite often masks/dilutes what should be done and said and can also inhibit robust discussions.

Blokes, by our own nature are hard wired to be action orientated, i.e. we want to solve problems, and we want to do stuff now. Once this is stifled by political correctness, a few things can start to happen:

- normal stress can become distress;
- short cuts can be taken (with increased risk);
- we inhibit our natural problem solving process;
- blokes shut down and stop seeking help (we go into our cave and don't come out).
- It creates an "us versus them" mentality.

So where have we gone wrong and how can we make changes?

- Don't allow political correctness to mask what should be done and said. Sometimes we have to be critical and blunt about our processes to keep them relevant and up to date.
- Bureaucracy should facilitate what we do, not dictate how we do it (not create barriers and thus frustrate people who are trying to deal with a challenging situation at the coal face).

- The common sense rule should be applied to everything we do. I repeat, apply it to everything we do.
- People/communities have the innate ability to band together and deal with stressful situations. This should be fostered thus empowering individuals and communities rather than disempowering through micro-management and removing them from vital decisions regarding their own lives and local community.
- "Language" is always important. Appropriate language that can be understood needs to be used. A robust discussion is vital to air all points of view and to prevent the same mistakes being made again.

Remember at the end of the day we are responsible for our own wellbeing. Hopefully these suggestions, encourages communities to claim back some responsibility and ownership. This would bring about positive change not only in blokes lives but the whole of the community.

Landholders Asked to Check Twice on Wheatbelt Woodlands

Wheatbelt landholders should think twice before clearing vegetation on their property, despite having State government approval.

This follows last December's listing of the WA Wheatbelt woodlands as critically endangered under the Australian Government's national environment law, the Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999 (EPBC Act).

The Wheatbelt Woodlands occur between the Darling Range and the western edge of the Goldfields, where more than 85 per cent of this vegetation has already been cleared.

The listing refers to approximately 30 species of eucalypt, which may be found in woodlands including salmon and york gums, gimlet, mallets, morel and wandoo trees.

This week, officers from the Federal Environment Department have been visiting Wheatbelt towns and meeting with landholders to discuss the listing.

The Compliance Section director Matt Dutkiewicz said the listing referred to patches of two hectares and greater of the woodland.

Road verges where good quality vegetation was more than five metres wide were also included.

This EPBC Act listing was separate to the WA Environmental Protection Act 1986, which gives landholders permission to legally clear up to five hectares of remnant vegetation.

"This listing doesn't include the isolated paddock trees or the small or narrow remnants of trees but it does include re-growth," Matt Dutkiewicz said.

"However, landholders should be aware of the potential importance of these for other protected matters such as black cockatoos.

"It is also important that landholders are aware the EPBC Act does not impact on long established farming practices — the intent is to protect the remaining

"We're urging any landholder considering clearing vegetation to check with their local natural resource management officer to find out whether the EPBC Act could apply to their clearing proposal."

Landholders can also contact the Department of the Environment directly if they have any concerns.

The EPBC Act provides for substantial penalties for unauthorised clearing having a significant impact on a nationally protected matter.

The Wheatbelt Natural Resource Management group's CEO Natarsha Woods said the decision could affect landholders wanting to clear land to build roads or new fences or introduce cropping to uncleared areas.

"These are examples of farm activity, which could have a significant impact on the newly listed ecological community," Natarsha Woods said.

"While the listing will help protect the last few stands of woodland left, we're also hoping it will give groups like ours access to funding to carry out more environmental work with communities."

Washing Machine Recall Apathy Putting Lives at Risk

Media Release

Consumer Protection is concerned that apathy over the recall of Samsung top loader washing machines is putting the lives of Western Australians at risk.

Samsung has released figures showing that only half of WA owners of the affected machines have responded to the recall, leaving more than 6,500 dangerous units remaining in WA homes and continuing to pose a serious fire hazard.

The recall response rate for WA is only 54 per cent and the worst in the country, with most other states recording a response rate of 64 to 70 per cent. The defective machines have caused more than 200 house fires throughout Australia.

The models subjected to the recall were manufactured between 2010 and 2013 and include model numbers: SW75V9WIP; SW65V9WIP; SW70SPWIP; SW80SPWIP; WA85GWGIP and WA85FWWIP. A total of 14,483 of these models were sold in WA. The affected units have an internal fault where condensation can penetrate an electrical connector causing deterioration which may in turn cause a fire.

Acting Commissioner for Consumer Protection David Hillyard urges WA consumers to check the model of

their washing machine immediately and take urgent action if it is on the recall list.

"This is not a matter that should be left to luck or chance, as it involves the safety of you, your family and other occupants of your house or housing complex," Mr Hillyard said.

"Don't gamble with your life and the lives of others by ignoring this recall. If you have a Samsung top loader washing machine with a model number subject to the recall, take urgent action now as your safety is at risk!

"Affected WA consumers should discontinue use immediately, unplug it from the socket and organise to obtain a refund and the removal of the washing machine from their home as soon as possible. Samsung are footing the costs of this program so consumers will not be out of pocket.

"The machines should not be re-sold or placed on the verge for bulk rubbish collection, as we want to remove any possibility that they are purchased or picked up by people who may not realise the danger.

"I urge consumers to treat this issue with the highest priority.

"Owners of all washing machines should ensure they follow the manufacturer's instructions, especially during installation. Unstable machines that vibrate during use could cause mechanical failure which may also pose a fire risk to the home."

Customers with affected models should contact Samsung on 1800 239 655 between 8am and 8pm AEST on any day or email

Commemorating 100 Years of ANZAC

Each of the soldiers listed on the Lake Grace Honour Roll will be featured in the Lakes Link News, as close as possible to 100 years from their enlistment. It is now 100 years and 8 days since Herbert John (Johnny) Horner signed up.

Born at Riverton, South Australia Johnny Horner enlisted in the Australian Imperial Force on the 24th of February 1916, at the age of 41 years and 5 months. He was a farmer, at a height of 5 feet 4 ½ inches (164cms), and weighing 110 lbs (50kgs), he was of ruddy complexion, and had blue eyes and brown hair.

Johnny's training was at Blackboy Hill, and he was eventually appointed to the 3rd/4th Machine Gun Company. As his parents were deceased, he gave his brother Gilbert of Kooringa, South Australia as next of kin. He had previously served in the Military for five years in South Australia.

After his initial training he embarked the Seang Bee at Fremantle on the 18th of July 1916 for England and in October proceeded overseas to France with 4th Machine Gun Company disembarking at El Pesso. Two months later they marched into Machine Gun Base at Sauville, where he was taken on strength with the 3rd Machine Gun Company on 18/12/1916. On the 15th of April 1917, he was reported "Missing in Action", and his brother Gilbert, was duly informed.

In July he was reported as a Prisoner of War, in Germany, however it was December 19th before the Australian Red Cross were able to confirm his capture at Lagincourt, and he was interned to Limbury. In the mean time, his effects were returned to his brother. During his internment he was successful in effecting an escape which was attributed to his ability to tell the time and read his positions by the stars, however, he eventually turned himself in.

It was the 30th of December 1918, before Private Horner was repatriated to England from Ripon, Germany, where he was granted leave for one month, with an extension of a month's leave without pay. Several months elapsed before his eventual return to Australia, when he embarked the Marathon, and he disembarked at Fremantle on the 31st of May, his discharge becoming effective on 16/7/1919, reportedly with no injuries and in first class condition. His service number was 245, and he was awarded the 1914/15 Star, British War Medal and the Victory medal. On enlistment he gave his religion as Salvation Army.

On Private Horner's return home, he brought items of memorabilia from the Gustrow Prison Camp. These items, now in the National War Museum, were a large wash basin and two identity discs worn by allied prisoners on their cap. Private Horner also wrote a small 100 page booklet titled "REASON or

REVOLUTION", said to detail his experiences as a prisoner of war, a copy of which can be read at the Battye Library. A German soldier's helmet was also left after he died.

Before the war Johnny farmed a property at Lake Grace. He had a connection to the Bennett family who had come from Rhynie in South Australia, and this connection may well have come from as far back as his life in Riverton, a small town only a few miles from Rhynie.

He was a carpenter by trade, and Ernie Bennett had him build a small dwelling on his new Lake Grace farm, about 1909, possibly the first in the Lake Grace district, and to this date is still standing. In 1911/12, he assisted in the erection of the first 'modern home' in the district, of which he proudly said, "It would have graced a city." The newly arriving settlers were "flabbergasted" when they saw it and may have drawn encouragement for this Lake Grace country, from Ernie Bennett's faith in the untried Lake Grace land.

From Horner's experience of those days, he has left us much information of the times, and as a lover of the Australian bush, he said that the birds and animals of the area were not frightened of humans until guns were used.

Johnny Horner had taken up land at "The Cliffs" and when the War came he answered the call. Just before Johnny Horner went into camp in 1916, he made a visit

Recently appointed Officer in Charge of the Lake Grace Police Station, David Ellis, also attended the afternoon tea to introduce himself to the Councillors.

It was Councillor Roz Lloyd's first meeting since being sworn into office in early in February and former councillor Mrs Mary Naisbitt came along to the meeting to sit in and listen to the afternoon's proceedings.

Early in the meeting the Shire President, Cr Andrew Walker advised Council that, regrettably, due to family reasons he will be stepping down from his position as President. This will take effect from the afternoon of 23 March 2016, being the afternoon of the next Council Meeting. At this time a new Shire President will be voted in by Councillors. Cr Walker will remain on Council as a councillor.

During the afternoon the following items of business were discussed and decisions made regarding:

- Finalisation of Amendment No 4 to the Shire's Local Planning Scheme No.4, relating to the reclassification of the 50-52 Stubbs St Lake Grace from Scheme Reserve 'Public Purpose – Agriculture WA' to 'Commercial Zone'.
- Uniting Church Lake Grace change of use from 'place of worship' to 'community purposes'. This will facilitate use of the land for the proposed Thrift Shop by Activ Industries in conjunction with the Lake Grace CWA.
- Finance options for the Newdegate Independent Living Units and Lesser Hall Project, with the projected shortfall of funds to be transferred from the Newdegate Hall Reserve, the Works and Services Reserve and the Housing Reserve. Of the 4 ILU's at Newdegate, Units 1 & 2 are now completed and Units 3 & 4 almost completed. The whole project is scheduled to be completed by the end of March 2016.
- The Licence Agreements for the Lake Grace Loading Ramp with the Public Transport Authority, and with the Education Department for the Lake Grace Library and CRC.
- A Youth Friendly Communities Project involving a wall mural for the Lake Grace Swimming Pool and a mural for Newdegate with the location yet to be determined.
- A budget for the new ILU's (Independent Living Units) to be located at Lot 107 Bennett St Lake Grace. Site works for this project will be commencing in March 2016.
- An update to the Great Southern Community
 Housing Association Management Agreement which
 adds the new Lake Grace ILU's and the property at
 19 Maley St Newdegate to the Management
 Agreement.
- Endorsement of the Shire's Local Emergency Management Arrangements and Recovery Plan. As per the requirements of the *Emergency Management Act 2005*, these will now be endorsed at a regional level followed by final endorsement at a state level.

Reform Safeguards WA's TAFE Sector

Media Release

Reforms to the State's public vocational education and training sector will improve training options for students and reduce administrative duplication.

Deputy Premier and Training and Workforce Development Minister Liza Harvey said the Training Sector Reform Project, which started last year, recommended two key changes to the function and structure of the publicly funded training system.

"Currently we have 70 campuses administered by 11 TAFE colleges. Under the changes these 70 campuses will be administered by five TAFE colleges," Mrs Harvey said.

"New arrangements will also be introduced for greater collaboration among the network of colleges, allowing resources and expertise to be shared across WA. This will give students, particularly those in regional areas, access to more diverse training programs."

The Minister said there would be no impact on students enrolled in courses this year. The reforms will also see the reinstatement of the TAFE brand, in recognition of the strong historical association and awareness by local communities.

The five new TAFE colleges will be named North Metropolitan TAFE, South Metropolitan TAFE, North Regional TAFE, Central Regional TAFE and South Regional TAFE.

"Students currently enrolled will still have access to their training as the current campuses and courses offered remain unchanged," Mrs Harvey said.

"Under the changes there will be greater local community and industry collaboration to ensure students are being trained to meet local industry needs." The new structure will start operation on April 11, 2016. Acting Managing Directors for each college will be appointed and new governing councils will be formed.

"The reform project found that WA had six of the eight smallest colleges in the country. This reform will ensure our training system remains robust, sustainable and one of the best in Australia," the Minister said.

"TAFE colleges are a significant cornerstone of WA's vocational education and training system and these changes will ensure that this position continues while also ensuring colleges are sustainable into the future."

Census - Be a Part of History

Community-minded people are being called on urgently in the Lake Grace - Goldfields area to help make history and join the 2016 Census team.

More than fifteen (15) Area Supervisors jobs are being offered by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) in the Gold fields area, specifically **Lake Grace**, Bodallin, Shackleton, Kalgoorlie, Lamington, Mullingar, Laverton, Wiluna, Menzies, Southern Cross, Wallaroo, Meekatharra, Leonora, Chandler, West Fitzgerald and Merredin.

Up to 253 Area Supervisor positions are currently open across Western Australia for the 2016 Census of Housing and Population - Australia's biggest peace time operation - on **Tuesday 9 August.**

Western Australian Census Director, David Waymouth said there was a great opportunity for people across the state to work on the frontlines, compiling information that is vital to the future of the nation.

"We are particularly interested in applicants from the Lake Grace region to help bolster recruitment numbers across a vast area covering 557,624 square-kilometres," he said. to the Acting Government Astronomer, where he acquainted him with his invention of an ingenious device for finding the principal stars and constellations. His long time observance of them enabled him to make beneficial calculations of positions and directions, and although the idea was not new, it was the only instrument of its kind in the State at the time. Mr Horner was congratulated on his ingenuity, and he demonstrated its use at the James Street School, where the Headmaster was so impressed he invited him back whenever possible to further demonstrate for the benefit of the children.

After his return from the War, he continued his trade between farm and work, and as well as other buildings, in 1925, with assistance from parents, he built the South Lake Grace School, ever after called "The Red School".

In 1928 he sold his farm and years later we find he was established in isolation between Ravensthorpe and Hopetown, where a road named after him now leads to the area. Here he cut a 10 mile road through bush, built a small home, cleared land, sank a dam, erected fences and planted an orchard, where he confined his activities to his garden property on the river flats and

bee keeping. He led a life as a hermit. He allegedly wore no clothes on his lonely estate, except when he had visitors and then he wore shorts, boots and an old hat.

He lived on wild life and what he could grow on his land, his principle diet being bread he made from dried and ground broad beans and honey. With no money, he would trade honey and oranges etc for a few tins of corned beef, which came from the town store. Largely self sufficient he confined himself to his property.

By chance, a bee keeper found him very undernourished, unwell and confined to his bed. After admittance to the Lake Grace hospital, the Doctor insisted 'he shall not go back to that style of living'. So, on recovery he spent the rest of his life with the Bennett's on Rhynie farm.

Johnny Horner died on 26th of January, 1961 at Lake Grace, and is buried in the Lake Grace Cemetery, though his grave does not appear to be marked. On his death it was written: Mr Horner was a man of independent mind and a great lover of the West Australian bush and he was noted for his ability to make his way to any place by the stars.

Gloves on to Tackle Invasive Pest (cont.)

Spraying is an effective way of killing off the small green plants prior to seed formation; however the best way is complete removal of the plant. Make sure you are wearing a good set of gloves!

Caltrop has seeds that remain dormant in the soil for four to five years (DAFWA). They germinate after summer rain. Plants grow rapidly, flowering and forming new burrs within three to five weeks.

The trailing stems of caltrop are long and wiry. They are covered with fine hairs. The stems lie prostrate on the ground, radiating from a central taproot. The leaves consist of several leaflets arranged opposite each other on the stems. The leaves are fern-like and greyish-green.

The flowers are small, less than 1cm in diameter, and yellow with five petals. Wedge-shaped burrs are formed in clusters of five, each with four or more long sharp spines.

A heavy infestation after summer rain can produce an abundance of spiny burrs, which make it very uncomfortable for people and animals alike. It's these burrs that have put the plant at the top of the hit list.

Aside from volunteers marking where the germinations

are occurring, we have people actively digging the plants up and collecting the burrs. We would love to have more help, particularly from the younger and fitter section of the community. It is vital to keep this weed in check as it will ruin our recreation areas (ovals/ playgrounds), nature reserves and even take over our backyards. If you would like to put yourself forward to take control of an area of infestation in Lake Grace we would love to hear from you.

If you are the last to leave the pavilion please check ALL doors are locked including the meeting room, side doors and outside change room doors, and then exit and lock the front door. (this is the only door with a key lock).

FAQ 1: Do I need to book the Pavilion or Meeting room? How do I book?

The Lake Grace Pavilion Advisory Committee (old rec. council) has recently restructured, Due to difficulties the pavilion and grounds and all bookings will continue to be managed by the Lake Grace Shire, with priority given to all fixtured home games and training, with all fixtured games booked into the system.

Please forward training days and times to me so I can collate and forward to the Shire. This will ensure the facility isn't double booked and that appropriate cleaning can take place.

FAQ 2: Why does it cost so much to hire the pavilion? How come local community groups can't hire it for less? Why is it not hired at the same rate as the hall?

Sporting groups affiliated with the Shire pay an annual user fee. These sporting groups can utilise the pavilion and grounds as needed because these clubs have paid an 'upfront user fee' (for use of a better phrase).

All other community groups and private users pay the \$500 bond and \$300 hire fee as outlined in the Shire of Lake Grace Fees and Charges schedule

The Advisory Committee is unable to set or change the fees and charges. If these fees and charges are to be modified the groups and individuals should lobby council requesting that the fees and charges for the pavilions be reviewed and, if appropriate, revised.

FAQ 3: Is there a cleaner?

The Shire has a cleaner employed to clean many of its facilities, this includes the pavilion. The cleaner is allocated a set number of hours per fortnight. In order for maintenance cleaning to be done during these set hours, users (including each time the kitchen is used), all sporting groups and private hirers need to undertake the general cleaning tasks as outlined in the Lake Grace Shire Hire Agreement.

This includes:

Packing away all tables and chairs into the storeroom, including those used inside and outside.

Pavilion Update (cont.)

	General clean-up of function area and ALL change rooms including removing food scraps and rubbish.
	Remove any visible marks off walls and doors.
	Emptying ALL bins including those in the kitchen, change rooms and baby change room.
	Placing all green bins out alongside the wall of the Football Shed ready for collection.
	Sweeping and mopping all floors (using the automatic mop) including the main function area, kitchen and hall entry.
Kitche Agree	en area – as per the Shire of Lake Grace Hire ement
	Empty ALL food and drink from fridges
	Sweep and mop floor
	Wipe and disinfect all bench surfaces (cleaning equipment is located under the sink)
	Wash and put away all glasses, utensils, pots etc.
	Clean and wipe down oven, pie warmers and microwave after any use.

FAQ 4: Why hasn't the kitchen been completed yet?

When we first obtained funding for the pavilion project the funding agreement between Dept of Sport and Rec and the Shire clearly stated that DSR would not fund kitchen upgrades, landscaping or verandahs.

Although it was made clear through community consultation that the kitchen upgrade was a priority 1 project, due to forces beyond the committee's control, the kitchen upgrade became part of stage two and this was budgeted for accordingly. It was always the case that separate funding would need to be sought for the kitchen upgrade, and the Pavilion Upgrade Committee has put aside in excess of \$60,000 for this project. Unfortunately it has taken longer than anticipated to obtain the additional funds required to complete the project. Again, the committee can strongly advise on, provide additional information and review applications for funding, but as it is a Shire owned building the larger funding applications can only be submitted by the Shire, and Shire management continues to work on these.

FAQ 5: Will designated parking spaces be created? When will the driveway be blocked off?

The committee met with the Shire last November and discussed both parking and erecting bollards to restrict

drive-though access to the front of the pavilion. Disabled parking bays and emergency services bays were to be designated along with creating easily recognisable parking space (making people park all the same way so it's easy to drive and reverse out and makes it safer for kids) This was meant to happen over the summer break. The committee will continue to follow this up.

FAQ 6: What's the go with tables and chairs?

Pavilion users have access to new tables and chairs, purchased with funds from the old Rec Council and a community grant from the Lake Grace Shire Council. The Pavilion can now seat 15 round tables of 8 plus existing long tables. The long white trestle tables are for indoor use only and cannot be removed from the pavilion, while the old brown tables can be used outside but must be returned to the storage room. All tables and chairs must be returned to the storage room inside the pavilion after each use. Any queries about the tables and chairs can be directed to either myself or Royce Taylor.

FAQ 7: How is the playground progressing?

Plans to re assemble the old playground are under way. The committee is in the process of applying for funding for some new playground equipment and have sourced funding for outdoor seating, grass and shade. We have called a busy bee on the 12/13th March to get this started.

FAQ 8: What about weeds and cleanliness of the outside areas?

The Advisory Committee liaises with PK and the Shire about the oval maintenance. Individual sporting groups are responsible for the general cleanliness and upkeep of their playing surrounds — this is the trade-off for not having to hire the facilities and pay a hire fee each week. As always please advise a Pavilion Advisory committee member of any issues so we can take them to the meeting for a timely outcome.

FAQ 9: When will the fence around the netball courts be fixed and when will the pavers/ hot mix be laid around the edge of the courts?

Unfortunately the answer to this is – We don't know.

This has been brought to the attention of the appropriate staff at a number of meetings and as yet, no time frame has been set. Unfortunately an application for funding to complete this was not obtained.

The Advisory Committee meet with the Shire regularly. Any clubs concerns, issues or suggestions need to be communicated to the committee so we can address them at each meeting. The Advisory Committee will advise clubs of the outcome of their concerns.

This is the best way to ensure your club's issues are discussed, noted and prioritised in relation to other clubs needs, budget constraints and the forward planning needs of the facility.

To provide the Western Australian community with an additional secure form of photographic identification, a new photo card is now available (takes the place of the Proof of ID card).

The new photo card will have the same level of integrity as a driver's licence and will be recognised by the Department of Transport as a form of primary identification. It's a voluntary card that will assist people who do not hold a driver's licence or passport to conveniently prove their identity.

The photo card will be available to people aged 16 years and older and be valid for five years. Card-holders will have the option of including their address on the card, and can choose to have two cards – one showing their address and one without it.
