





Lines From Lions



Lake Grace Lions meet every second and fourth Thursday of the month, and from now on we would like to tell the Community of the things we do, the things we want to do and the things we have done. We are very much a SERVICE club, and so the Community, and those in need, can benefit from our activities.

Our activities got off to a great start this year, when we catered for the Australia Day Breakfast at the swimming pool. About 170 people joined in the great social gathering, also witnessing the naturalisation of **our** newest Australians and the announcement of Citizenship Awards.

In February, 12 of our number joined with the Pingrup Lions at their meeting in the "Sailors Arms", when the District Governor, Dave Mulcher, made a visit. It was an excellent occasion, a great meal, and an inspiring address by the Governor; his emphasis being on the theme of a Passion to Excel. The passion to perform with professionalism meant to do your best and to do it with pride. We were also challenged to Serve – to grow, Serve - to lead and Serve - to perform.

Lions Children of Courage Award – Lions are on notice for nominations for this award, which recognises children between ages 5 -15 years who overcome a physical adversity, for acts of bravery, courage or sporting achievement.

Youth Exchange Programme - Lions are also interested to support a worthy ambassador from our area on a Youth Exchange Programme. Applicants, 16 – 22 years may be eligible for a 6 weeks exchange to a number of countries around the world, where they would in turn be cared for by Lions hosts.

The Lions Club is promoting the Leukaemia Foundation, **World's Greatest Shave to Care and Cure**. Members of the Community are invited to participate, with sponsors for hair shaving or colouring. The date is set for Friday 5th of May at the Sportsman's Club. More info to come about this project later!

At our last meeting Lion, Chris Jackson, wearing his "CEO hat", told us of the Shire plans for a **free Community concert** on Thursday 30th March, at the lawn of the Undercover area of the school, to say a thankyou for support at the time of the flood. The concert will feature Hirst and Greene and a song writing workshop is planned from 3.30 to 5.30 pm, for people who are interested to take part, **when a song is to be composed for the occasion, to be sung that night!** People are to bring their flood photos to show, write a story to tell and any video clips they have of the flood. It is hoped that this may be the first of an annual event for a Lake Grace day, and may

even lead to inviting the WASO, (WA Symphony Orchestra) one time! The Lions Club have embraced the event, and are willing to do the "sausage sizzle", starting 6 pm to 8 pm. Drinks are BYO and BYO seat.

Lion Chris also updated us on the "latest" about the flood recovery, and though not wanting to steal thunder from their news bulletins, some of us were very pleased to hear that draining of the Cemetery Lake is continuing, the drain being made deeper. The railways people require the water to be moved further from the track before trains operate again.

Lion Derek McArtney was warmly congratulated on his ordination into the Priesthood of the Anglican Church by Lion Alan Thiel, who concluded his remarks by saying "we are proud to have you on board"! Lion Alan's comments were endorsed by all present.

Lions Len Elliott and Alan Duckworth volunteered their services onto the **Graves Restoration Committee**, formed to deal with the damage to graves after the flood at the Cemetery.


Share your story of the Flood

TRAIL PLANNING WORKSHOPS

The Shire has received grant funding to prepare a Trails Master Plan, and has contracted experienced trail consultant Jesse Brampton to prepare the plan. Jesse was responsible for the upgrading and extension of the Bibbulmun Track in the 1990s, and has since been involved in almost 100 trail projects right across Australia.

This project will not only deliver an overall "Master Plan" for the Shire, but will also generate "development plans" for some of the priority trails already identified by the community. These include:

- Town circuits in Lake Grace & Newdegate
- Lake King Town Circuit - concept plans
- Rifle Range Wildflower Walk
- White Dam Reserve trail(s)
- Holland Track

While the major focus of the project will be on walk trails that will appeal to both visitors and local residents, consideration will also be given to the potential for drive trails – in particular, the Holland Track. It is now recognised that trails can be a significant component of a successful tourism development program, especially if they are well interpreted. It is also recognised that trails are an ideal foundation for enhancing physical activity among local people, particularly if they are close to or in town.

The Plan will identify priority trail projects for the next five years, and will provide sufficient detail to enable the Shire to proceed with a staged implementation program. It should be completed by June May – so if you want to have input to this exciting opportunity to shape some practical outcomes around your town come along to these workshops:

Ordination of Derek McArtney

About 220 people attended the Ordination service of Derek McArtney and Graeme Weaver to the order of Priests in the Anglican Church of Australia.

The service was held in the cathedral church of St. Boniface in Bunbury on the 24th of February. A number of visiting clergy from Perth joined Bishop David McCall, and the clergy of the Diocese, to celebrate this significant event in the lives of both Deacons and of the church.

The support and encouragement of the Parishes where Graeme and Derek have served was more than evident in the presence of parishioners from Pingelly, Wagin, Dumbleyung, Lake Grace, Mandurah and Coodanup who filled the cathedral. The singing was uplifting and the most profound moments in the service came with the laying on of hands by the Bishop for the empowering of the Holy Spirit in setting each candidate apart for the mission and ministry of a priest in the church and the world, the passing of the peace, and as the newly ordained priests served Communion. The spirit of unity and fellowship present was experienced by many and what a joy it was to pray for many friends after the service. A good spread and much needed refreshments followed in Walker Hall. It was heartening to see that most people stayed on after the service to


catch up with friends and make new acquaintances.

The service marked the end of one stage of ministry in Wagin and Lake Grace and the beginning of a new phase. 

ROAD UPDATE


Council Works staff are currently undertaking construction work and fixing flood damage on the following roads;

SCIENCE AND STUFF

MOVEMENT:

Relieved of the glacial weight from the last ice age, northeastern North America is slowly springing up and, researchers now find, moving south, by about a millimetre a year.

TEENAGE KING LIKED HIS WINE WHITE:

It seems that Tutankhamen, the teenage king of Egypt, went to what they thought was the afterlife with a good supply of fine white wine. It's a surprising discovery, considering there is no record of white wine in Egypt until the 3rd century CE, 300 years after the young pharaoh died. Liquid chromatography and mass spectrometry was used to analyse the residue from six of the jars in Tutankhamen's tomb. All contained tartaric acid, a chemical characteristic of grapes, but only one contained syringic acid, found in the skin of red grapes. It's this skin that gives red wine its colour. The absence of the chemical in the other five jars suggests the wine in them was white. Because it is unlikely Egyptian wine makers would have removed red grape skins to create white wines as modern wine makers do, white grapes probably did exist in Tutankhamen's time. In ancient Egypt, red wine was placed in tombs to accompany people into what they believed was the afterlife. Now it appears that white wine was on the menu too. (In forthcoming issue of the Journal of Archaeological Science).



SANDS OF TIME BLOWN BACK TO REVEAL ANCIENT SAHARA:

Sand dunes have been blowing across the Sahara on and off for at least 7 million years - a finding that dramatically increases the known age of the desert. Until now the earliest evidence of sand dunes has been from Tunisia, dating back only 86,000 years. Our understanding of the largest warm-climate arid zone on Earth, has been sketchy because the sandy deposits bloomed during a moist interval that began about 10,000 years ago and ended 5000 years later. Now it has been found that dunes found in the central Djurab region of Chad are older. The ancient dunes were covered by another deposit formed during a wet interval that is rich in fossils, including those of Sahelanthropus, the oldest known hominin. Because the fossils are from animals that lived 7 million years ago, the fossil dunes must be older (Science, vol 311, p 821). The new date for the Sahara suggests a possible connection between its formation and the change in climate that made the ice caps expand. The isthmus of Panama began to form at around that time, which over millions of years changed ocean circulation patterns and started the expansion of the ice caps.

DOWN THE FOOD CHAIN:

Fishermen are not waiting for their fisheries to collapse before targeting species further down the food chain. Biologists have been worried that as overfishing takes

its toll and top predators such as cod and tuna disappear, we will have to eat the more numerous beasts lower down the chain, such as jellyfish. Now they are surprised to find this is already happening. Seattle biologists found that in 30 of the 48 marine ecosystems they looked at round the world, fishing is indeed targeting species further down the food chain. In only nine was this because the top fish had disappeared. In most cases people are catching lower-level species even while there are still top fish around. Yet all of more than 200 recent scientific publications that were surveyed assumed that moving down the food chain happens only after the top fishery collapses. (National Academy of Sciences, DOI : 10.1073/pnas/0510964103).

FOUND - UNIVERSE'S MISSING METAL:

With the nature of dark matter still a mystery, it often seems we have misplaced most of the universe. At least the lesser-known problem of the universe's missing metal may soon be solved, now that large amounts of zinc have shown up in a distant galaxy. Nearby galaxies have less than 20 per cent of the zinc that theory predicts. Scientists have been studying metal missing from objects known as Lyman-alpha galaxies. Using the Very Large Telescope Interferometer on Mount Paranal in Chile to study a Lyman-alpha galaxy 6.3 billion light years away, their results suggest that the zinc content of these distant galaxies balances the "missing" metal nearer home.

SEASONAL SWINGS:

The Earth has two major wobbles which act over relatively short timescales. The Chandler wobble which moves the poles by 3 to 6 metres over a period of 14 months, was predicted in the 18th century, and discovered in the 1890's by American astronomer Seth Carlo Chandler. The Earth's rotation squashes the planet slightly making it into a flattened ellipsoid which bulges at the equator. As this spins, it will wobble with its own particular period. But this wobble will stop if it isn't given a regular nudge. So what is pushing the swing? Is it meteorological - something to do with the atmosphere and oceans and water on land? The second polar movement is the annual wobble, which causes a yearly gyration of about 3 metres. This is also caused by the weather. Each winter a high-pressure system settles over Siberia, this mass of air piled up on one side of the planet is enough to unbalance it and makes up most of the wobble. Other weather systems and shifts in ocean circulation make up the rest.

Financial Support

People living in the areas affected by Tropical Cyclone Clare and the subsequent floods may be eligible for State Government Assistance through the Natural Disaster Relief Arrangements.

The Recreational Skipper's Ticket

The RST is a certificate of competency, not a licence. It is purely about demonstrating the minimum knowledge and practical skills needed to operate a boat safely on the water. It is based on a set of marine safety competencies that have been agreed nationally. The assessment of these competencies will be in two sections: theory and practical. Depending on your prior qualification or existing experience you may be exempt from all or part of the assessment.

It is important to remember that only one person on board will need to hold the RST. In the same way that a captain is in charge of a ship, this doesn't mean that they must be at the wheel the whole time. It does mean they are responsible for what happens on the boat during the voyage.

Who has to have one?

By April 2008, every skipper of a registerable recreational vessel powered by a motor greater than 4.5kwp (6 hp) (RST vessel) will be required to hold a Recreational Skipper's Ticket.

A person aged between 14 and 16 cannot be in charge of an RST vessel unless they hold an RST. Age restrictions also apply to this age group – vessels may be operated only during daylight hours and at a maximum speed of 8 knots.

If you're between 14 and 25 you must obtain an RST before April 2007.

Over 25s will have until April 2008 before they are required to hold an RST.

To operate a vessel with a motor 4.5 kwp (6hp) or less, a Recreational Skipper's Ticket is not required.

How do I get one?

To obtain an RST you must have your skills assessed by an RST authorised assessor. Depending on your prior skill or qualifications you may need to demonstrate your competency in the theory and practical sections or just the theory section. Whether or not to attend a training course is your choice.

The Assessment

The assessments will test your skills and knowledge in the following areas:

Theoretical Section

The theory assessment will take about 60 minutes and consists of 30 multiple-choice questions. You will need

to get at least 24 correct before progressing to the practical assessment.

The multiple-choice paper will assess your knowledge and understanding of:

- rules and regulations;
- international collision rules;
- buoyage and other navigation aids;
- navigation lights;
- maintenance of vessel, motor and equipment;
- safety equipment required to be carried;
- trip planning, and responsibilities to passengers; and
- distress signals, and response to distress and other emergencies.

Practical Section

The assessment effectively requires you to demonstrate a well-conducted boating trip, including preparation and vessel maneuvering. Specific tasks you will be assessed on include:

- throughout the assessment, operating within the rules and regulations;
- checking the condition of a vessel's anchoring gear and berthing lines and hardware;
- conducting a safety briefing for all on board;
- starting the motor safely;
- logging a voyage plan;
- safely departing a berth;
- conducting a simulated man overboard operation;
- steering a steady course with the aid of a transit;
- performing a controlled stop;
- returning to a berth and securing the vessel; and logging off.

The practical assessment will take about 60 minutes and requires you to skipper a vessel through the above tasks.

The RST Workbook

Everything that you can be assessed on, theory and practical, is contained in the RST Workbook. You can pick up one of these workbooks (they are free) from any Department office, your authorised assessor and many other boating and fishing outlets.



Welcome to Night Watch for the fortnight, from midnight Friday 17th, to midnight Friday 31st March. Remember, Astronomy is looking up and do not look at the Sun without proper equipment as it can blind or damage your eyesight beyond repair.

On Tuesday 21st at 1:50am the Earth will be at its Autumnal equinox, when the Sun rises and sets due east and west and day and night are equal, which denotes the true end of summer.

On Sunday 26th at 10am, if you were on Jupiter with a good telescope, you could see Mercury transit the Sun. Our local star, the Sun, giving off visible light at magnitude -26.72, resides in the Constellation of Pisces this fortnight and on Tuesday 21st at 1:50am will be on the equator.

The Moon, on Tuesday 21st, will be 0.3° off the red star Alpha Scorpii (Antares), the heart of the scorpion. The last quarter Moon occurs at 3:01am on Thursday 23rd. On Tuesday 28th at 3pm, the Moon will be at Perigee (closest to Earth) at 356,884 kilometres distant. At 6:05am, the new Moon occurs on Wednesday 29th. This fortnight the Moon resides in Constellations of Virgo on 18th, Libra on 19th and 20th, Scorpius on 21st, Ophiuchus on 22nd, Sagittarius on 23rd, 24th and 25th, Capricorn on 26th, Aquarius on 27th and 28th, Pisces on 29th, 30th and 31st.

Rising in the morning twilight at 5:20am in Pisces, Mercury is too close to the Sun to be seen until Wednesday 22nd when it rises at 4:53am in Aquarius. On Friday 31st, Mercury rises at 4:19am at +0.7.

Venus, at magnitude -4.6 in Capricornus, rises at 3:34am on Saturday morning. On Saturday morning 25th, Venus will be at its greatest elongation west at 47° and will start to rise later each morning as it moves back towards the Sun. Venus will be 6° north of the Moon on Sunday 26th and on Monday 27th will be 1.9° (two fingers at arms length) north of the planet Neptune. Venus rises at 2:42am on Friday, 31st, at magnitude -4.5.

Mars, in Taurus at magnitude +1.0, sets at 10:14pm on Saturday and at 9:53pm on Friday 31st.

The giant gas planet, Jupiter, in Libra at magnitude -2.4, rises at 8:44pm on Saturday and is 5° north of the Moon on Sunday. On Friday 31st, Jupiter rises at 7:51pm.

The ringed planet, Saturn, in Cancer on Saturday sets at 2:06am and rises at 3:41pm at magnitude +0.3. On Friday 31st, Saturn sets at 2:49am, and rises again at 1:13pm at magnitude +0.3.

Uranus, in Aquarius at magnitude +5.9, rises at 4:56am Saturday. On Monday 27th, Uranus will be 1.4° (thumb at arms length) north of the Moon. Uranus rises at 4:09am on Friday 31st.

On Saturday, in Capricornus at magnitude +8.0, Neptune rises at 3:08am and will be 4° (two fingers at arms length) north of the Moon on Sunday 26th. On Friday 31st, Neptune rises at 2:19am.

Pluto, in the Constellation of Serpens Caput at magnitude +13.9, rises at 11:25pm on Saturday and at 11:34pm on Friday 31st. A large telescope and a dark position is needed and you could use a towel over your head to find this very dim planet.

With the Moon rising later in the night sky every night, viewing will be good from Monday night on.

The Great red spot on Jupiter can be seen with a telescope on Thursday from 10:06pm for an hour and on Tuesday 28th at 9:11pm and at 10:48pm on Thursday 30th.

Jupiter's moons are also now good for viewing, as they move into different positions, as they move in front and behind the planet, plus the different coloured storm clouds in belts.




Tingledale First Settlers Commemorated

The Tingledale Community was settled in 1924 and some of its first families may have connections with the Lake Grace area. Some of the older boys from these pioneering families disembarked in Albany and went directly to work on established farms. The families needed their support while establishing their own farms from virgin forest. Therefore they often returned and married into local farming communities.

For those of you who are not familiar with the south coast, Tingledale is a small farming community on the south coast, west of Denmark and approximately 15kms east of Walpole, bordering the Valley of Giants forest and close to the Valley of Giants Tree Top Walk. The Tingledale community has done much to preserve the history of the area including the old school built in 1926, which is now the local hall.

You are invited to celebrate and commemorate the first settler families who migrated to Tingledale Group 116 from 1924 to 1931. Celebrations will be held on Easter Sunday, April 16th 2006, 1:30pm at the Tingledale Hall.

If you are a past resident of Tingledale, a descendant of these first pioneering families or simply interested in local history, please come along to the unveiling of a plaque dedicated to the first settler families, whose names are listed. Any photos or memorabilia you can

bring to display would be greatly appreciated.

Banking Sector Urges Lake Grace Farmers Experiencing Difficulties to Contact Their Bank

The Australian Bankers' Association (ABA) is encouraging farmers worried about the impact of drought and other extreme weather conditions to seek Exceptional Circumstances assistance from the Federal Government and their bank.

Some farmers in the Lake Grace area of Western Australia have been adversely affected by frost, hail and flood with the result that two consecutive years income has been severely diminished, putting pressure on extended finances. The banking sector recognises the seriousness of these conditions in the Lake Grace area and will continue supporting viable farmers.

Banks have and will continue to work with the Federal Government which provides Exceptional Circumstances assistance to farmers and rural communities in the form of interest rate subsidies, fodder subsidies, fodder transport subsidies, livestock transport subsidies, crop planting grants, general grants, unemployment benefits and Austudy assistance.

David Bell, Chief Executive of the ABA, is urging

any bank customer, who is worrying about the impact of these extreme weather conditions on their financial position, to contact their bank if they have not already done so. "Banks manage the impact of extreme conditions on their customers on a case-by-case basis reflecting varying impacts and options available to individual customers. The financial position of individual customers varies and this determines the options that are available."

During these difficult times, banks, as a short-term measure, typically lend viable farmers carry-on finance to enable shortfalls in cash flow to be met. In some cases, to help reduce cash outgoings, individual banks may put in place the short-term measure of restructuring existing loans, so as to reduce annual debt repayments - this may involve extending the term of a loan or allowing interest only payments for a period of time.

For customers receiving Federal Government interest rate subsidies, it is the general practice of banks not to increase credit risk margins on loans, where customers comply with usual bank requirements.




