Walking Through a Colourful History

Two striking public artworks – a colourful Mosaic Garden Gallery and a pathway of text and images – will tell the fascinating stories of

a community hospital and enhance the Lake Grace hospital precinct.

West Australian Governor John Sanderson officially dedicated the Mosaic Garden Gallery and The Lake Grace AIM Hospital - the *People and its Story* project yesterday.

A pathway of coloured pavers by local artist Michelle Slarke will take visitors on a story trail through the bush into the Lake Grace Australian Inland Mission Hospital Museum. The trail, with new information panels and a colour brochure, tells of the rich social history of a West Australian farming community and the experiences of the hospital's staff and patients since 1926.

The Lake Grace AIM Hospital - the People and its Story project highlights the significance of Lake Grace Australian Inland Mission Hospital Museum building, one of the three remaining AIM hospitals in Australia and the only one in WA. Built in 1926 through the vision of Reverend John Flynn and the local community, the building was saved from demolition in 1983 and restored as a museum.

Nearby in the gardens of Lake Grace Medical Centre, a colourful gallery of mosaics reflects the talents and lives of people from the district.





Licensing - Where to go and what to do!

General Theory Test

Applicant completes a 30 multiplechoice Computerised Theory Test. Test takes 35 minutes or less with a pass mark of 24/30. Applicant must be 16 years or older.

This test is undertaken at the Lake Grace Telecentre. Applicant must bring one form each of Primary and Secondary ID. If you are under 18, you must also have a letter of consent signed by your parent or legal guardian.

Once test is completed, results are available at the Lake Grace Shire. If you have passed you then fill in an application form for a learner's permit (at Shire) - at this point you also need to present Primary and Secondary ID, and make a payment of \$51.20.



Practical Driving Test

This assessment is completed by the Lake Grace Police, applicant must be 16.5 years of age. Testing is done on WEDNESDAYS and takes approximately 30 minutes. Ring Tony or Dave on 9865 1007 for an appointment (no more than a week in advance).

Applicant must bring their learner's permit and have the use of a roadworthy vehicle.



Hazard Perception Test

Applicant must be 17 years or older, he/she takes completed Log Book (25 hours of supervised driving), learner's permit and Primary ID to Lake Grace Shire Office. Once payment is made, you will receive a HPT application form. Applicant can then proceed to Lake Grace Telecentre to undertake computerised HPT. Once test is completed results are obtained from the Shire office. Initial fee is \$24.20, every ensuing test costs \$14.90.

OBITUARY — Valda Noel de Vree (Val)

2nd December 1941 - 26th February 2004

Exercise Noonamah

Testing Our Response to an Emergency Animal Disease Outbreak

Around 40 local and national members of a rapid response team have gathered in Darwin to respond to a simulated emergency outbreak of Foot and Mouth Disease.

Primary Industry and Fisheries Minister, Kon Vatskalis, officially launched this exercise, saying if such an outbreak was ever to happen it could cost Australia over \$9 billion in lost export earnings, and between \$30 million and \$450 million to clean up and control.

"The Northern Territory's cattle industry alone is worth around \$190 million, so one could imagine how devastating an animal disease outbreak would be," said Mr Vatskalis.

"While Australia has been free of Foot and Mouth Disease since 1872, the Northern Territory is the frontline jurisdiction in terms of risks of outbreaks or introduction of exotic plant and animal pests and diseases, so it is important we test our preparedness should we ever have to deal with the real thing.

"Exercise Noonamah will provide a valuable lesson for our national rapid response team, not to mention local authorities here in the Territory."

The Minister said the desk top exercise will take place at the Chan Building until Friday, with no field component.

Participants involved in Exercise Noonamah include 36 members of a national response team, and over 40 staff from relevant NT Government departments, including the Department's of Business, Industry and Resource Development; Infrastructure Planning and Environment; Treasury; Police, Fire and Emergency Services; and Justice.

As well, there will be participants from the Commonwealth Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry, and Animal Health Australia.

Blind Cords Regulated

Curtain and blind cords that form a 'loop' are potential child killers. Since 1988 eleven toddlers and babies died from strangulation by blind cords in Australia whilst the USA recorded 133 child deaths between 1991 and 2001.

In response, the Department of Consumer and Employment Protection has moved to prohibit the sale of blinds that are not safe.

"Home designs have changed a lot in recent years which has led to curtain and blind cords of full length windows being close to the floor", Consumer Protection Commissioner Patrick Walker said.

"A Product Safety Order restricting the supply of goods known as 'curtain and blind cords' has been issued to manufacturers, installers, suppliers and retailers in WA", he said.

The Order requires that window coverings operated by exposed looped cords, bead chains and other flexible looped devices shall not have hazardous loops.

The Order also requires operating and warning information be included on labels and tags.

Existing blind and curtain cords already installed in homes that have loops can be made safe by a simple procedure using either a tie-down device or cutting the bottom of loops and tying the two new ends off with a knotted tassel or toggle.

"Parents are strongly advised to check the positioning of their children's furniture such as high chairs, playpens, beds and cots, to ensure they are not in the proximity of cords", Mr Walker said.

1080 BAITING - LAKE MAGENTA RESERVE

CALM has sent notification that as part of Western Shield it is continuing to bait Lake Magenta Reserve with dried meat baits



containing 1080 poison. The program is designed to reduce fox population to allow the reintroduction of locally extinct animals.

CALM maintains bait free buffer zones for all occupied houses within a 1 km radius of the reserve and 100m near all gates into the reserve from farmland.

Land holders are reminded that domestic and working dogs should not be allowed into the Lake Magenta Reserve and to consider the reserve dangerous to dogs at all times.

Welcome to Night Watch for the fortnight from midnight Friday 26th to midnight Friday 9th April.

On June 8th from around 1.00pm will be the transit of Venus across the face of the Sun. No one person living today has seen this happen as they happen in pairs 8 years apart. The next one is in 2012, then not until 2117 and 2125. The last was in 1874 and 1882. I will have the telescope at the lawns near the Plaza.

Stretched across the evening early night sky in a long line are the five brightest planets. Starting from the west is Mercury then Venus, Mars, Saturn with Jupiter last in line and the second brightest behind Venus.

Our local star the Sun, is in the constellation of Pisces for the fortnight, at -26.7 magnitude.

Mercury is in the constellation of Pisces until April 1 when it will have moved into Aries, at about 0.7 magnitude. On the 29th.Mercury will be at greatest elongation east at 19 degrees.

Venus, at magnitude -4.3 in Aries until Monday, when it will move into Taurus, where it will be at its greatest elongation east at 46 degrees.

The red planet, Mars, at magnitude 1.5 in Taurus, is 7 degrees north of the orange/red star Aldebaran, which means 'eye of the bull'.

The giant gas planet, Jupiter, at -2.5 is in Leo near the tail. On the 3rd Jupiter will be 3 degrees south of the Moon and Saturn at the feet of the Gemini twins at 0.8 magnitude.

On Monday Saturn will be 5 degrees south of the Moon and on the 2nd it will be at its extreme north declination of 22.49 degrees.

Uranus, in Aquarius at magnitude 5.9, rises around 3.45am. Neptune at 8.0 magnitude rises at 2.10am in Capricornus.

The small rocky distant planet, Pluto, at magnitude 13.8, rises at 10.30pm in the constellation of Serpens.

The Moon on Saturday is at apogee (furthest) at 404,521kms form the earth in the constellation of Taurus. The first quarter moon is on Monday 29th in Gemini at 7.48am at a distance of 400,900kms. On Monday, April 5th, the full Moon is at 6.53pm in Virgo at 368,500kms. On April 8th at 10.00am the Moon in Scorpius is at perigee (closest) at 364,547kms distant. The Moon is mostly in the early night sky.

A dust cloud around a young star 33 light years away promises astronomers a close-up view of planet formation. The cloud recently spotted Au Microscopium, appears hollow, suggesting that most of the interior dust has been swept up as planets have formed. Microscopium is very young for our region of the galaxy, at just 12 million years old, but even at this age planet formation is expected to be nearly finished. The dust cloud stretches out to about seven times Neptune's distance from the sun and, because it is cold, it is unlikely to come closer to the start than Uranus is to the sun. The area closer in is nearly empty, suggesting that this is where planets have formed. The dust disc is only the fourth to be seen directly by telescopes and is also the closest spotted.

Au Microscopium appears to be a sibling of Beta Pictoris, the first star to be discovered (in 1983) with a dust disc. The two are about the same age and are following parallel paths in space, although they are widely separated. They are also quite different kinds of star. Beta Pictoris is 2.5 times the mass of the sun and nine times as bright. Au Microscopium is only half the sun's mass and only a tenth of it brightness.



Malleefowl Preservation Group Meeting


On Friday 12th March, fifteen interested people gathered to hear Susanne Dennings of Malleefowl Preservation Group give an informative and inspiring presentation on the work of the Group and the life of the malleefowl. Based in Ongerup, the Malleefowl Preservation Group was formed in 1992 by local farmers and community members in recognition of the changes created by the wide scale clearing for agriculture and the resulting in loss of biodiversity, in particular the Malleefowl.

MPG aims to ensure the Malleefowl's survival through on-ground projects with farmers and pastoralists, community awareness and assisting rural community conservation programs.

In many areas Malleefowl have survived the major landscape changes since white settlement in Australia. The birds may be seen when occasionally leaving the protection of the bush to feed in paddocks or cross roadways. If you should see a Malleefowl, please take care. Malleefowl Preservation Group asks people to complete their sighting form (contact MPG or download from website www.malleefowl.com.au).


and those present at the meeting Ben Curwood over the last decade showing malleefowl in his area.



We discussed various sites where malleefowl are regularly seen and decided to form a malleefowl preservation interest group. The group will monitor a local malleefowl site over a period of years, and share data and information with the MPG, neighbouring interest groups (such as Narembeen and Kulin) and the National Malleefowl Recovery Plan. This plan will link the Lake Grace group with those across Australia, such as the Victorian communities which monitor 850 malleefowl mounds in their state.

The local monitoring process will include an annual survey of a selected malleefowl site within the Lake Grace district. We realise most people already have many committee and volunteer responsibilities, so will keep the group as uncomplicated as possible (no committee) with activities a few times a year. Farm Management Deposits Scheme Change

If you are a primary producer and have deposited money under the farm management deposits scheme, you should be aware of a small but important change.

The law now makes it clear that only authorised deposit-taking institutions (ADIs) and State or Territory guaranteed entities are eligible to accept farm management deposits.

If you made a farm management deposit with a non-complying entity, you need to transfer the deposit to an eligible institution before 1 July 2004 to keep the tax benefit. For some longer-term deposits, the deadline is 1 July 2007.

If you fail to transfer a non-complying deposit, it is deemed to be withdrawn immediately before the deadline and must be declared as income.

Most depositors are not affected - all banks, building societies and credit unions are authorised deposit-taking institutions. You can make sure your financial institution is an ADI by checking the list on the Australian Prudential Regulation Authority website www.apra.gov.au.

If you are a primary producer in an 'Exceptional circumstances' declared area you can, subject to

obtaining an Exceptional Circumstances certificate, withdraw a farm management deposit within 12 months without losing the tax benefit. This concession does not apply if the deposit was made when the area was already under the exceptional circumstances declaration.

The farm management deposit scheme assists primary producers to deal with income fluctuations. If you meet certain conditions, you can claim a farm management deposit as a tax deduction and declare it as income when you withdraw it. Deposits withdrawn within 12 months do not generally qualify for the deduction.

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SCIENCE AND STOFF

Ultimate Test

A single blood test could diagnose any disease a person might have via a unique protein 'fingerprint', according to a company in the UK. At the moment, doctors order specific tests or scans to confirm a diagnosis. But a biochemist with the company has a different vision. He thinks a single test that compares levels in the blood of around 300 different proteins, could diagnose any disease. In preliminary studies, they say that they have been able to spot diseases such as appendicitis and leukaemia. But thousands of people would have to be tested to create a database of protein fingerprints for all the diseases. They say it's almost to the scale of the genome project. From New Scientist 28th February.

Dive Record

A Leatherback turtle has recorded the deepest dive yet by a reptile. One leatherback has been recorded diving to 640 metres in the Atlantic Leatherbacks, which are critically Ocean. endangered, can grow to more than 2 metres long, and the biggest ever found weighed in at 916 kilograms. It was pointed out that dives of over 200 metres by leatherbacks are extraordinarily Turtles dive to follow their main prey of gelatinous zooplankton and jellyfish. But such creatures are 97 percent water and the turtles probably waste too much energy trying to catch such calorie-light delicacies at greater depths. Very deep dives may be in response to a large shark or a passing boat. From Animal Behaviour.

Koala Conundrum

The South Australian State Government faces an awkward dilemma. The 30,000 koalas on Kangaroo Island are in danger of eating themselves into extinction, having almost stripped the island's eucalyptus trees. The state's Nature Conservation Society favours culling, but there are fears that animal rights activists will object.

Grief on the Reef


Australia's Great Barrier Reef may be on the verge of a massive outbreak of coral bleaching caused by sea temperatures soaring for the third time in six years. The entire reef has been in a bleaching hotspot for the past month, and excessively hot water is still spreading and intensifying as the sea is currently up to 2 degrees warmer than normal. Bleaching occurs when hot water expels the algae that live in coral and give it its colour. Usually the algae will return but persistent bleaching can banish them forever, killing the coral. The University of Queensland's Centre for Marine

Studies warned that warmer oceans could kill the Great Barrier Reef within 50 years. The Great Barrier Reef Marine Park Authority has been accused in the past of playing down damage to the reefs to protect the tourist industry. Yet it has, on it's website, warned that the threat of coral bleaching in the region is currently rated as moderate to high. From New Scientist 6th March 2004.

Bizarre Dinos of the deep freeze

Two peculiar dinosaurs new to science have been unearthed in Antarctica. Palaeontologists have discovered the largest dinosaur yet found on the continent, a 2 metre long plant eating sauropod. Yet the beast is small compared with its giant relatives found elsewhere, which are more than 30 metres long. Also unearthed is a predatory dinosaur that appears to be a bizarre evolutionary throwback. A team discovered the long necked sauropod on the slopes of Mount Kirkpatrick, a 3900 metre mountain a few hundred kilometres from the South Pole. It lived around 190 million years ago, making it one of the earliest known of its kind. The fleet-footed predatory dinosaur lived much later, around 70 million years ago. Fragments of an upper jaw, teeth and bones from the animal's lower legs and feet suggest it was a primitive predator, yet it survived until shortly before the dinosaurs disappeared. Also around 2 metres tall the, as yet unnamed, dinosaur measures up oddly against its carnivorous cousins. Most were either wolf-sized predators like Velociraptor, or giants such as Tyrannosaurus Rex or Allosaurus. New Scientist 6th March 2004.

Ross River Virus on the Rise

There has been an increase in the number of notified cases of Ross River Virus within the Wheatbelt region. This is possibly due to a rise in the breeding of virus carrying mosquitoes over wide areas of the South-West Land Division, combined with the recent cyclonic rainfall (due to Cyclone Monty) and flooding in northern and inland regions. This has resulted in the expansion of the risk area for contracting Ross River Virus to several other regions of Western Australia.

Ross River virus causes a debilitating disease known as *epidemic polyarthritis* (EP). Although the disease is non-fatal, it causes severe arthritic pain and lethargy. Symptoms include sore muscles, skin rash, fever, headache, swollen lymph nodes and less frequently, sore eyes, sore throat, nausea, as well as tingling in the hands and feet. With the favourable conditions for mosquito breeding and survival, there is also a warning of the likelihood of activity for the potentially fatal Murray Valley encephalitis virus over the next few months.

It is not possible to eliminate all mosquitoes and there is no cure or vaccine for these debilitating diseases, so taking precautions/preventative measures to avoid being bitten is the best defence against the disease.

People in affected areas should:

- Avoid outdoor exposure in areas of high mosquito activity, especially around dawn and dusk.
- Ensure insect screens on houses are installed and completely mosquito-proof. If camping, use mosquito nets and mosquitoproof tents.
- Wear long, loose-fitting protective clothing

when outdoors in mosquito-prone areas.

Use personal repellents containing diethyl toluamide (DEET) or picaridin. The most effective and long-lasting formulations are lotions or gels. Most natural or organic repellents are not as effective as DEET or picaridin.

Ensure infants and children are adequately protected against mosquito bites, preferably with suitable clothing, bed nets or other forms of insect screening. Only infant-strength repellents should be used on children.

It is also important to prevent breeding in the first place by ensuring that there are no containers lying around with water in them, eg. old tyres with stagnant water in them, saucers under pot plants etc.

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BEWARE THE HAZARDS OF ATVs

WorkSafe is urging users of all-terrain vehicles (ATVs) and agbikes to be aware of the hazards associated with these vehicles.

Agbikes are any motorbikes with two, three or four wheels used for farm work. Three and four wheelers are commonly known as ATVs.

WorkSafe Acting Executive Director Nina Lyhne said today that ATVs and agbikes had their own unique set of hazards, especially where children and inexperienced riders were involved.

"Our observations indicate that young people aged between 10 and 24 have a much higher than average risk of injury because of a lack of experience or training, or simply because they lack the strength required to control the vehicles under challenging conditions," Ms Lyhne said.

"As well as their use in farming, children are using these vehicles for recreational pursuits, so I strongly urge those in control to ensure strict safety measures are taken to lessen the risks of injury to riders.

"But our concerns are not only with young people a man tragically lost his life at Bedfordale recently when the ATV he was operating rolled over.

"This incident once again highlights the risks involved with ATVs.

"Although our statistics do not specifically cover incidents involving these vehicles, we are aware of a large number of serious injuries over the years involving agbikes and ATVs."

Helmets are required as part of an employer's general duty of care.

Suppliers also have a duty of care to provide a safe product, and some suppliers are now providing operator training at the time of purchase, with some considering supplying helmets as part of the purchase price of an ATV.

Frequent causes of injury involving ATVs are:

- 1. Hitting objects such as logs, rocks, drains, potholes or animals;
- 2. The rider being struck by an object such as an overhanging branch;
- 3. The leg or trousers of a rider being caught in the rear tyre or chain;
- 4. An ATV hitting a bystander due to loss of control;
- 5. The carrying of passengers or animals, changing the centre of gravity;

"Our observations suggest that inexperience is a

common feature of incidents involving these vehicles, as they can easily get out of control while speeding or travelling on gravel, loose dirt, mud, a wet track or grass," Ms Lyhne said.

"According to WorkSafe inspectors, the majority of incidents involving ATVs and agbikes happen when the vehicle is being used as a means of transport in a recreational situation on the farm.

"It is crucial that the employer provides information, instruction, supervision and training to anyone likely to be operating ATVs and agbikes."

Wheatbelt South Action Plan

The Wheatbelt South Action Plan 2004 – 2009 has now been released, and follows on from the Central South Action Plan – An Issues Paper, finalised in July last year. You can collect your free copy of the Action Plan at the Wheatbelt Development Commission in Narrogin, or contact your local government shire office.

The Plan has already attracted funding through the Regional Development Scheme for seven priority projects for the Wheatbelt South, and working groups of government agencies have been formed to better coordinate planning and service delivery to the sub region.

An initiative of the Wheatbelt Development Commission in partnership with the 15 local government shires of the Wheatbelt South, both the Issues Paper and the Action Plan are the result of collaboration between community and government to address the many challenges facing the Sub Region.

The Wheatbelt South has traditionally featured low on the political radar, and as a result is under constant threat of losing services. Better transport, roads, and communication technology have also meant many agencies are now able to supply their products and services to rural areas without using locally based staff.

Additionally, the last twenty years of rural restructuring has increased production efficiencies, largely through improved technology, but has meant the number of jobs available in the agricultural industry in the Sub Region has dropped, with the flow-on effect of people leaving to find work elsewhere.

2001 Census figures show personal incomes for individuals in four shires of the Wheatbelt South as ranking among the 10 poorest in Australia.

On the positive side there is greater understanding of the need for all communities in Wheatbelt South and government agencies to be strategic and work

to achieve common goals which will sustain the Sub Region, one of the aims of the Action Plan.

Well done to all the girls for competing, especially Kristy Pinney in her first year of playing tennis.


