

Doug Clarke Takes the WAFarmers Grains Section Reins

Doug Clarke was elected to the position of Grains President today at the WAFarmers Annual Grains Conference.

Mr Clarke has been a long serving member of WAFarmers and is keen to begin working on increasing the profitability and sustainability of the grains industry for farmers and farming families as well as implementing his "Line in the Sand" concept.

"If we continue along the current path the future of farming in WA is fairly bleak, as farmers continue with increasing costs and decreasing income. A situation is occurring where people are leaving the land not out of choice but more out of necessity," Mr Clarke said.

Mr Clarke is a third generation family farmer in Lake Grace. Together with his wife Debby, they crop grains on their 3125 hectare property.

Mr Clarke brings his experience from being on the Executive Committee of the Wheat Growers Association as well as being a long time member of the WAFarmers Lake Grace / Corrigin Zone to the new position as Grains Section President and is keen to see more farmers get involved in agripolitical issues.

"We need to show that farmers' voices are being heard and explore innovative ways for their feedback and contributions to be incorporated without compromising their commitment to their farm," he said.

"Streamlining the feedback mechanisms for farmers will mean embracing new technologies such as online forums and internet tools so that less time is wasted travelling to regional meetings.

"By taking up these initiatives, the farmers have a

better forum to get their views heard and there will be less chance for the tail to wag the dog.

WAFarmers congratulates Mr Clarke on his new position as Grains Section President as well as acknowledging the retirement of Peter Wahlsten who has contributed greatly to the industry in his term as Grains Section President.







Tourism Marketing Workshop in Narrogin

Australia's Golden Outback is hosting a regional tourism marketing workshop in Narrogin on Monday 11 April 2005.

The workshop is designed to provide tourism operators with advice on a number of tourism marketing issues including how to develop a successful brochure, how to evaluate marketing activities and how to work in the international market. Representatives from Tourism Export Council will present the workshop.

Australia's Golden Outback Chairman, Jon Jessop said that similar workshops are frequently held in Perth and that metropolitan tourism operators reap the benefits of attending such educational events.

Mr Jessop said, "Marketing is an important part of every business plan, but it is also an expensive component. For a small tourism business it is crucial to make sure you invest in marketing activities that will generate the greatest return for your budget.

"The workshop will help Wheatbelt operators' gain a better understanding of what are the 'must do' tourism marketing activities. For those operators keen on breaking into the east cost and international markets, the workshop will also identify how to go about doing this.

The free-of-charge workshop is being held at the John Higgins Community Complex, Clayton Road, Narrogin on Monday 11 April 10am - 4pm. A networking lunch

session is included to provide operators with opportunity to meet and share ideas with other tourism stakeholders.







Why are we doing The LG 'Living Great' Shire Challenge?

Overweight and obesity are major health problems in Australia. At present 60% of Australians aged over 25 are overweight or obese. This is over 7 million people! Being overweight is a major health problem and is linked to many serious health problems such as heart disease, diabetes and some cancers. It also makes most people feel unhappy with how they look.

The LG Shire Challenge is a weight loss program. This project may not help you lose all the weight you want but it will provide you with the support and advice to help you in getting started and to reach your goal. It is designed for you to have fun and be a part of a community challenge. There is also a chance to win some great prizes!

Aim of The LG 'Living Great' Shire Challenge

For the people of the Shire of Lake Grace to lose an accumulated 1000 kilograms in 16 weeks.

What does The LG 'Living Great' Shire Challenge involve?

The LG Shire Challenge is a 16 week program that involves practical and educational sessions on physical activity, food and nutrition, motivation and other topics. Attendance to sessions is voluntary but is highly recommended. Along with these sessions will be the opportunity to weigh-in weekly to monitor and support you in how you are going. There will be a celebration for participants at the end of the program for all participants.

Who can participate in The LG 'Living Great' Shire Challenge?

To be eligible to participate in the project you must:

- Have a Body Mass Index (BMI) greater than 25. A BMI compares your weight to your height and with an ideal score of between 20 and 25. Your BMI will be calculated on the initial registration day
- Be over 18 years
- Not be pregnant
- Not taking any medications to help with weight loss unless approved by your Doctor
- Live in the Shire of Lake Grace Local Government Area

Recording Information

You will be encouraged to weigh in weekly to record your measurements All weigh-ins will be coordinated by Elizabeth Trevenen at the Child Health Centre. You will be issued a unique number so you can weigh-in at any time at the child health end of the Lake Grace Medical Centre or at the Newdegate Telecentre, and leave your information in a sealed box.

To help us reach our goal it is important that you attend at least the FIRST and the FINAL sessions of this program (ie 26th April and 9th August).

Confidentiality

All weighing will be conducted privately to assist with keeping your results confidential. Information collected from questionnaires will be analysed for future reports. All results will be accumulated to reach our targets so you cannot be identified. You can access your results on request. On completion of The LG Shire Challenge, your results will be stored at the Lake Grace & Districts Health Service for a period of 7 years before they are destroyed.

It is hoped that The LG Shire Challenge will generate a lot of interest in the community and some media coverage and that we will publish the results in health publications after its completion. Photos may be taken during The LG Shire Challenge, so if you have a strong objection to photos of you being taken please inform us at the start of the program.

ATTENTION: STANDPIPE USERS

HONOUR BOOK SYSTEM

A reminder to standpipe users that volumes of water taken must be entered into the honour book so appropriate charges can be levied.

If users do not follow the honour system all ratepayers are affected as Council incurs charges from the Water Corporation for water taken from standpipes - subsequently the general rate is increased.



Council will be monitoring standpipe use with assistance from the community to ensure users are not taking advantage of this essential service.

Swimming Pool Report - 2004/05 Season

The old proverb of "what's good for some is not always good for others" proved true for the final week of the Lake Grace Pool for the 04/05 season. The rain and wintry conditions were good for the farmers but shot to pieces the idea of having a day at the pool. The temperature of the water dropped from a comfortable temperature of around 23°-24° to a chilly 18°-19°. But that is the nature of outdoor swimming pools.

On reflection, the rest of the pool season was very good in all aspects, with the weather and pool temperatures giving us the fabulous attendance figure of 12,006. This does not include the water aerobics attendance of 1,000. In general the pool is being well patronised.

The programmes which were run at the pool, ie Australia Day Brekky, Water Awareness classes etc were well attended but I would like to point out the very good performances of those participating in the "Swim to Rotto and Beyond" programme.



NIGHT





Welcome to Night Watch for the fortnight from midnight Friday 8th April to midnight Friday 22nd April. Astronomy is looking up.

Our local star, the Sun, resides in Pisces until the 20th when it will have moved into Aries, and shines at magnitude -26.72.

On Saturday at 4:22am the new Moon will occur in Pisces. The 1st quarter Moon will be at 10:27pm on Saturday 16th in Gemini. On Sunday 17th at 2:50am, the Moon will be at Apogee (furthest) at 404,304kms from Earth. The Moon sets later in the evening sky each night.

Mercury rises in the morning twilight on Saturday at 5:06am and at 4:27am on Friday 22nd at magnitude - 0.6.

Venus, now in the evening sky, is too close to the Sun to view.

The red planet, Mars, in Capricornus at magnitude +0.7, rises on Saturday morning at 1:15am and rises on Friday 22nd at 1:09am.

Jupiter, the giant gas planet in Virgo, shining at a bright -2.6 magnitude is in the sky all night.

The ringed planet, Saturn, at magnitude 0.0 in Gemini, sets at 11:29pm Saturday and at 10:41pm on Friday 22nd. Saturn will be 5° south of the Moon on the 16th evening sky.

The blue/green coloured planet, Uranus, at magnitude +5.8, rises in Aquarius at 3:13am on Saturday and 2:28am on Friday 22nd.

The grey/green planet, Neptune, rises in Capricornus on Saturday at 1:33am and at 12:43am on Friday 22nd and shines at magnitude +7.9. Binoculars or a telescope is needed.

The very small distant planet, Pluto, at magnitude +13.8, rises in Serpens Caput at 9>51pm on Saturday and at 8:59pm on Friday 22nd A telescope of around 60 centimetres is needed with a 9.5mm eyepiece.

Comet 9p Tempel is in Virgo at magnitude +10.4 and Comet C2003 T4 Linear is in Aquarius at magnitude +6.3. Only a pair of binoculars is needed for Linear but a telescope for Tempel.

The Moon resides in Pisces on 9th, Aries on 10th and 11th, Taurus on 12th, 13th, and 14th. Auriga on 15th, Gemini on 16th and 17th, Cancer on 18th, Leo on 19th, 20th and 21st, Virgo on 22nd.

With the Moon in the night sky and before the full Moon is a good time to study the craters, mountains and ridges with their shadows. Each night the view is different and if you have a map of the Moon with everything shown and named, you can work them out. In some places there are some small craters in a row and also large craters with small craters on the inside of them. Next fortnight after this there is a Penumbral Eclipse of the Moon on Sunday evening the 24th starting around 4pm.

Barna Mia is a sanctuary, in the Dryandra Woodlands between Narrogin and Wandering, where rare and endangered marsupials can be seen.

On a drizzly Saturday afternoon, with the whole family and the camp oven we set off for Dryandra. On arrival we went for one of the many walks through the mallet, wandoo and marri forrest getting back to the cottage just in time for a tasty stew cooked in the camp oven.

By 6.30pm it was time to think about starting the short drive to Barna Mia. On arrival, we were surprised to see a very impressive building built to look like a burrow, with colourful stained glass windows depicting the little animals. The tour guide gave us a general talk on Dryandra and told us about the marsupials we would see, it was then time to see our little furry friends.

Armed with a red light torch the guide took us to a little shelter, built like a mia mia. With the help of children in the group, some kibbles and fresh fruit were put out for the animals. In no time at all little creatures, some with big ears, some with long tails, some that looked a little bit like rats were scurrying out to eat the food. They sat eating,

washing their faces and sometimes fighting, quite unperturbed by the human presence.

In all, we visited six shelters in a distance of about three hundred metres and saw just about all the species of marsupials in Dryandra. A very successful night.

We then returned to the charming cottages, managed by the Lions, where we were to spend the night. The children loved the visit and I would recommend it to anyone for a night, or even for a few days as an escape from reality.





World's Greatest April Fools Pranks

The Swiss Spaghetti Harvest

In 1957 the respected BBC news show Panorama announced that thanks to a very mild winter and the virtual elimination of the dreaded spaghetti weevil, Swiss farmers were enjoying a bumper spaghetti crop. The BBC accompanied this announcement with footage of Swiss peasants pulling strands of spaghetti down from trees. Huge numbers of viewers were taken in, and many called up wanting to know how they could grow their own spaghetti trees. To this question, the BBC diplomatically replied that they should "place a sprig of spaghetti in a tin of tomato sauce and hope for the best."

The Case of the Interfering Brassieres

In 1982 the Daily Mail reported that a local manufacturer had sold 10,000 "rogue bras" that were causing a unique and unprecedented problem, not to the wearers but to the public at large. Apparently the support wire in these bras had been made out of a kind of copper originally designed for use in fire alarms. When this copper came into contact with nylon and body heat, it produced static electricity which, in turn, was interfering with local television and broadcasts. The chief engineer of British Telecom, upon reading the article, immediately ordered that all his female laboratory employees disclose what type of bra they were wearing.

Operation Parallax

In 1979 London's Capital Radio announced that Operation Parallax would soon go into effect. This was a government plan to resynchronize the British calendar with the rest of the world. It was explained that ever since 1945 Britain had gradually become 48 hours ahead of all other countries because of the constant switching back and forth from British Summer Time. To remedy this situation, the British government had decided to cancel April 5 and 12 that year. Capital Radio received numerous calls as a result of this announcement. One employer wanted to know if she had to pay her employees for the missing days. Another woman was curious about what would happen to her birthday, which fell on one of the cancelled days.

Big Ben Goes Digital

In 1980 the BBC reported that Big Ben, in order to keep up with the times, was going to be given a digital readout. It received a huge response from

listeners protesting the change. The BBC Japanese service also announced that the clock hands would be sold to the first four listeners to contact them, and one Japanese seaman in the mid-Atlantic immediately radioed in a bid.

The Euro Anthem

In 1999 the Today program on BBC Radio 4 announced that the British National anthem ("God Save the Queen") was to be replaced by a Euro Anthem sung in German. The new anthem, which Today played for their listeners, used extracts from Beethoven's music and was sung by pupils of a German school in London. Reportedly, Prince Charles' office telephoned Radio 4 to ask them for a copy of the new anthem. St. James Palace later insisted that it had been playing along with the prank and had never been taken in by it.

Hong Kong Powdered Water

In 1982 the South China Morning Post announced that a solution to Hong Kong's water shortage was at hand. Scientists, it said, had found a way to drain the clouds surrounding the island's peak of their water by electrifying them via antennae. The paper warned that this might have a negative impact on surrounding property values, but the government had approved the project nevertheless. Furthermore, more clouds could be attracted to the region by means of a weather satellite positioned over India. And finally, as a back-up, packets of powdered water imported from China would be distributed to all the residents of Hong Kong. A single pint of water added to this powdered water would magically transform into ten pints of drinkable water. Hong Kong's radio shows were flooded with calls all day from people eager to discuss these solutions to the water shortage. Many of the calls were very supportive of the plans, but one woman pointed out that the pumps needed to supply powdered water would be too complicated and expensive.

Chewy Vodka Bars

In 1994 Itar-Tass reported that an alcoholic beverage company had invented a new kind of candy sure to be a favorite with the Russian people: chewy Vodka Bars. These bars, designed to compete with Mars and Snickers bars, would come in three flavors, lemon, coconut, and salted cucumber. The same company was also said to be perfecting another new product: instant vodka in tea bags.

Basketball Hoops Warning

Product Safety Inspectors have been checking WA retailers of basketball rings and backboards following the serious injury of a ten-year-old boy who swung from a wall mounted hoop whilst slamdunking a ball. The ring on its backboard, along with bricks and guttering fell onto the boy severing both his hands and one foot.

Basketball rings, which are fitted to garage walls and fences, usually cannot take the full weight of a person. Inspectors have been checking the labelling about installation, usage and safety on these products in Western Australia.

"The Consumer Products Advisory Committee has been asked to consider all aspects of the supply and sale of basketball rings and backboards, and to provide recommendations about mandatory labelling or any other initiatives they feel are necessary to safeguard consumers", Consumer Protection Commissioner Patrick Walker said.

"Basketball rings in themselves are not dangerous if used correctly. However, when they are purchased for use at home, installation and usage instructions should always be followed and any warnings taken seriously."

"An important message for basketball players is 'don't slam dunk or swing on the ring'. Even at professional basketball stadiums, where elite trained players compete, there are warnings that this type of behaviour is dangerous", he said.

Deaths relating to falling rings have occurred in Victoria. These have prompted **Basket Ball WA** to advise that a ring and backboard in a typical suburban backyard, ideally should be fixed to a hot dip galvanised steel post, 90 mm x 90 mm with a 5 mm wall thickness.

The post should be set at least 800 mm into a mass concrete footing 500 mm x 500 mm (or 500 mm diameter) by 1 metre deep. Alternative systems can be provided by a structural engineer or by the equipment manufacturer.

Consumers should always follow the manufacturer's instructions when attaching the basketball ring to the backboard, and the backboard to the post.

The stability of the post, brick wall or any other supporting structure should be checked on a regular basis, as it can deteriorate over time. If there is any doubt about the safety or stability of an installation, a structural engineer should be consulted.

Buyers of homes that have a ring already attached to a wall or fence should not assume that it is structurally sound. It would be wise to have the basketball hoop checked and relocated if required by an experienced installer.

"Our inspections of traders last week indicated that most basketball rings are labelled with installation, usage and safety information, which is gratifying to see". Mr Walker said.



Australia's Alien Weed Attack

According to Australia's chief weed scientist, over 27,000 alien plant species have been introduced to Australia since European settlement. The CSIRO reports that 10 per cent have gone feral, threatening over 50 native plants with extinction. Many plants that pose an even greater risk are

sold in Australia's garden centres.
According to scientists, many more
"weeds" are in gardens waiting to jump
the fence and take off, and at least 80
imported plants should be banned.

Blindness Risk is in Your Genes

People with a particular variant of an immunesystem gene have a much higher risk of suffering from age-related macular degeneration (AWD), the main cause of blindness in the elderly. The mutant gene might be responsible for up to half of the many millions of cases worldwide. Published online, AMD was linked with a single gene for complement factor H, a protein involved in immune responses. People with one copy of the mutant gene are three times as likely to develop AMD and those with two copies are seven times as likely. Understanding the role of the variant might reveal ways to slow or halt the progress of the disease.

Tropical Cyclone Warnings

Worried local officials in the north of Australia say that Tropical Australia needs better preparation for severe cyclones. That was the lesson learned from the region's



recent lucky escape from Cyclone Ingrid. The Category 5 storm just missed Cairns, Port Douglas and Darwin, which was flattened by a category 4 storm 30 years ago. The responsible approach would be to design and build emergency shelters.

Constantly Commended

Mathematicians on Monday 14th March, celebrate Pi – not the pastry-topped kind but Pi the irrational number that relates a circle's circumference to its diameter. A Pi-fest is held each year on 3/14 to match the first digits of the never ending number, which begins 3.14159. As 2005 is Einstein year, they were able to celebrate the 126th anniversary of Einstein's birth on the same day.

Migraine Herb's Cancer Promise


Better treatments for leukaemia could be on the horizon thanks to feverfew, a daisy-like plant traditionally used to treat migraines and arthritis. The plant yields a substance that kills the rogue stem cells. Because these stem cells divide slowly,

they often survive conventional treatments, but parthenolide, the substance found in feverfew (tanacetum parthenium), targets the leukaemia stem cells while leaving normal blood stem cells unharmed. Human trials might begin within a year.

Arctic Ozone

Gigantic solar storms destroyed nearly 60 per cent

of the ozone above the Arctic during the spring in 2004. The ozone, which shield us from harmful ultraviolet radiation, lies mostly in the lower and mid-stratosphere. Data collected from seven satellites



Be Last and Win

If you want to finish first, go last. That's the advice of researchers who have shown that judges give better marks to contestants who perform at the end of a competition. The finding could also apply to decision-making



exercises such as house-hunting, marking exams and job interviews. Researchers studied scores awarded to skaters in the World and European figure skating championships and to singers in the Eurovision Song contest. They found a small increase in scores for contestants who performed later in the competitions. Performing last in the Eurovision Song Contest, for example, doubles a contestant's chance of success compared with being first on stage. The bias occurred regardless of whether the judges awarded scores after each individual performance or chose the winner at the end. Other research suggests that judges may tend to notice the ways in which later contestants are better, but not how they are worse than earlier contestants. (Acta Psychologica, vol 118, p 245).

Waterwise Guide to Gardens

Overall Design

In the Perth area approximately 60 percent of all scheme water used goes on watering the lawn and garden. Being waterwise begins with designing your garden to be water efficient, not only in layout and use of materials but also in terms of allowing for efficient delivery of irrigation water to exactly where it is needed, in exactly the right quantities and at the right intervals. Though lawn areas are the major users of garden water, considerable savings can be made in the other areas of the garden.

A Waterwise garden design will

- Minimise the extent of water consuming planting.
- Maximise the use of water conserving elements and techniques.
- Apply the basic principle of hydrozoning to planting design (grouping plants on the basis of having similar water requirements).

Planning

Before planting you will need to investigate and analyse

- Orientation, sun and shade, the prevailing winds.
- Topography, water run off.
- Soil types, water holding capacity compaction, water repellence, fertility levels.
- Availability of accessible ground water.
- Views both inwards and outwards.
- Overall area available for the garden.

And consider your other needs for

- Utility spaces (clothes drying, compost and storage areas).
- Outdoor living spaces (barbecues, seating areas).
- Special needs (vegetable garden, swimming pool; etc.).
- Functional and aesthetic requirements.
- Plant preference and design styles (native / exotic, formal / informal etc.).
- Maintenance expectations.
- Budget available.

General design principles:

- Do not plant areas unless it is necessary for functional or aesthetic reasons.
- Maximise the use of non-planting treatments such as paving and mulches.
- At the same time, beware of excessive unshaded paving which can be hot and glaring. Vary materials and arrange planting to frame and shade paved areas.
- Make use of windbreaks, pergolas, screen, lattice, shadecloth and vines to shelter the house, outdoor living areas and plants.
- Keep planted areas dense and consolidated. Sparse scattered plants are more difficult to water efficiently than ones that are in defined areas.

- Keep lawn to the minimum consistent with functional and aesthetic requirements. Avoid planting lawn on slopes or in narrow necks or paths which are difficult to water efficiently and maintain.
- Garden design blueprints in a variety of themes are available from leading nurseries.

Hydrozoning

Apply the principles of hydrozoning to plant selection and arrangement:

- A broad selection of plants may be used, but keep high water-demand plants to a minimum.
- Arrange plants having similar water requirements together (hydrozoning) and take this into account when deciding soil improvement and mulching, and when managing irrigation.

Some leading nurseries label their plants with drop icons signifying the appropriate hydrozone, described in three categories:

- Primary (3 drops) high water use plants.
- Secondary (2 drops); moderate water use plants.
- Elemental (1 drop); low water use plants.

Garden Practices

Soil improvement in the garden Adding organic matter to the soil improves both its moisture and nutrient holding capacity thus saving on water and fertiliser. It is particularly important to improve the top 15-20 cm of soil where the feeder roots of plants will develop. Old animal manures, compost and proprietary products are ideal soil improvers. Mix them in equal parts with the soil prior to planting out.

Use these points as a guide:

- Shrubs, groundcovers and climbers 30 cm in depth and up to half a metre across.
- Trees 40 cm deep and 1 metre across and bedding plants 25 cm deep for the whole bed.
- Garden soils are just as prone to becoming nonwettable as are lawn areas.
- A regular application of a soil wetting agent in spring is recommended.

Soils for containers (including hanging baskets)

- Choose the best quality potting mix you can afford, preferably one approved by the Australian Standards Association.
- The water and nutrient holding capacity of potting mixes can be further enhanced by the use of water absorbent polymers. Some potting mixes already contain them.
- Most plants are now grown in soil-less mixes which become non-wettable if allowed to dry out. Soil wetting agents are also very useful, and may need to be applied more than once a year.
- A regular application of a soil wetting agent in spring is recommended.




