MIGHT





Welcome to Night Watch for the fortnight from midnight Friday 9th to midnight Friday 23rd April. This fortnight there are four planets in the early night sky. From the west to the east is, Venus at —4.4, Mars at 1.5, Saturn at 0.1 and Jupiter at —2.4. Our local star, the Sun, resides in the constellation of Pisces until Sunday 18th, when it will have moved into Aries.

On Monday 12th, the Moon will be at its last quarter phase at 11.46am in the constellation of Capricornus at 374,200kms from earth at -6.0 mag. The new Moon is at 9.11pm on Monday 19th in the constellation of Aries at a distance of 397.900kms.

Mercury in Aries, moving from the evening sky to the morning twilight on Sunday 18th, rises eight minutes earlier each morning.

Venus, at a very bright -4.4 magnitude, sets around 8pm, is in the constellation of Taurus. On the 16th, Venus will be ten degrees north of the bright orange/red star Aldebaran, the eye of the bull.

On Friday 23rd, Venus will be 1.5 degrees north of the Moon. The red planet, Mars, at 1.5 magnitude, sets around 8.36pm in Taurus. Mars and Venus will be close together on 23rd and 24th April.

The giant gas planet, Jupiter at a bright -2.4 magnitude is in Leo and sets around 3.30am.

Saturn the ringed planet, is in the constellation of Gemini at 0.1 mag. The blue/green planet, Uranus, rises around 2.54am in Aquarius, and will be 4 degrees north of the Moon on the 15th, and at 5.9 magnitude. Neptune at 7.9 magnitude is in Capricornus, rising around 1.15am, and will be 5 degrees north of the Moon on Wednesday 14th.

The distant small planet, Pluto, rises around 9.35pm, in the constellation of Serpens at 13.8 magnitude.

If you look from the Cross and follow the dark gas and dust lanes to the east, you should be able to make out the head and neck, then the body and legs of the Emu, and if you look hard enough you can see the star that is the eye. The Emu goes from the Southern Cross to Sagittarius and is fairly large and easy to make out.

There should be a few meteors in the night sky this fortnight.

Sunrise times are: Sat 10th—6.24am; Sun 11th and Mon 12th—6.25am; Tues 13th—6.26am; 14th and 15th—6.27am; Fri 16th—6.28am; 17th and 18th—6.29am; Mon 19th—6.30am; 20th and 21st—6.31am; Thurs 22nd—6.32am; Fri 23rd—6.33am. Sunset times are: Sat 10th—5.51pm; 11th—5.50pm; 12th—5.49pm; 13th—5.48pm; 14th—5.47pm; 15th—5.45pm; 16th—5.44pm; Sat 17th—5.43pm; 18th—5.42pm; 19th—5.41pm; 20th—5.40pm; 21st—5.30pm; 22nd—5.38pm and Fri 23rd at 5.37pm.

With the Moon rising after 9.30pm on Saturday it is a good time to look through the telescope, as the planets, Saturn and Jupiter with their moons, rings, the great red spot on Jupiter and also the moons and shadows in transit across the face. There are also plenty of galaxies, star clusters, planetary nebulas, the Emu and other types of nebulas to see. Now in the morning sky in the north-east is Comet C/linear (2002) in the constellation on Pisces at magnitude 2.4, you should be able to see it by eye and easily with binoculars.

On May 5th, there will be a total eclipse of the moon starting at 1.51am and going through to 7.10am, with the middle of the eclipse being at 4.30am.

Remember all visitors are welcome at any time even to have a close look at the moon or a safe look at the sun, or have the constellations pointed out.

Home Buyers Assistance Fund

Many people would be aware of the Federal First Home Buyers Grant of \$7,000 which has been so eagerly sort by many first home buyers in recent years.

However, there is an additional grant available to first home buyers from the WA Department of Consumer and Employment protection which is not so widely known about.

The Home Buyers Assistance Fund, (administered by this department) provides a grant of up to \$2,000 for the incidental expenses of first home buyers.

This grant of \$2,000 can be sort *in addition* to the \$7,000 previously mentioned.

The Home Buyers Assistance Fund is funded from the interest paid on real estate agents trust accounts in Western Australia and can be used for costs like stamp duty, conveyancing fees, valuation fees and a range of other costs associated with the purchase.

There are some basic guidelines which determine whether an application for this \$2,000 grant is successful and these include:

 The purchase must be of an established or partially built home.

- The purchase must be made through a licensed real estate agent.
- The applicant (including the spouse or partner) must not have previously owned any property in the State of Western Australia
- The loan must be sourced through an authorised lending institution.

The value of the purchase cannot exceed \$125,000 in city & country areas; \$170,000 in remote areas; or \$190,000 in the Kimberley.

Licensing - Where to go and what to do!

General Theory Test

START Applicant completes a 30 multiplechoice Computerised Theory Test. Test takes 35 minutes or less with a pass mark of 24/30. Applicant must be 16 years or older.

This test is undertaken at the Lake Grace Telecentre. Applicant must bring one form each of Primary and Secondary ID. If you are under 18, you must also have a letter of consent signed by your parent or legal guardian.

Once test is completed, results are available at the Lake Grace Shire. If you have passed you then fill in an application form for a learner's permit (at Shire) - at this point you also need to present Primary and Secondary ID, and make a payment of \$51.20.



Practical Driving Test

This assessment is completed by the Lake Grace Police, applicant must be 16.5 years of age. Testing is done on WEDNESDAYS and takes approximately 30 minutes. Ring Tony or Dave on 9865 1007 for an appointment (no more than a week in advance).

Applicant must bring their learner's permit and have the use of a roadworthy vehicle.



Hazard Perception Test

Applicant must be 17 years or older, he/she takes completed Log Book (25 hours of supervised driving), learner's permit and Primary ID to Lake Grace Shire Office. Once payment is made, you will receive a HPT application form. Applicant can then proceed to Lake Grace Telecentre to undertake computerised HPT. Once test is completed results are obtained from the Shire office. Initial fee is \$24.20, every ensuing test costs \$14.90.

HEALTH SERVICE

Ageing in Place Survey Results

Thank you to all who took the time to reply to this survey, with a total of 198 people sending in their opinions on aged care accommodation in the Lake Grace district.

The results confirm that a large portion of the community (96% of responses) support the concept of improved choices of aged care accommodation being available.

There was a lot of interest in the possibility of renting or purchasing a lifestyle unit in the future:

- 86 people expressed an interest in retiring locally
- 47 people indicated that they would be requiring accommodation in 5—10 yrs
- 29 people are interested in purchasing a lifestyle unit
- Within the next 10 years, 26 people will be requiring accommodation
- 55% of total respondents believe there should be a choice of local hostel accommodation.

The public meeting held on the 9th March was very well attended and a lot of valid points were raised.

The Cost of Falls In Older Adults in WA

The Department of Health statistics reveal that by the year 2021 it is forecast falls will cost the WA health system \$174 million. In the year 2001/2002 falls cost the health system \$83 million.



By 2021, the number of people presenting at emergency departments as a result of falls will be more than double the current number of 18,706.

Seniors falls prevention is a state health priority and falls prevention programs play an important role to reduce the incidence and severity of fall-related injuries.

If you are over 50 years, you are welcome to join the Stay On Your Feet Program (SOYF). Alternatively we conduct the Chair Aerobics exercise group. Both are held weekly on Tuesdays. These programs are designed assist in falls prevention for older adults. For more information contact the Hospital on 98651206.





Initiated by the Lake Grace Shire, the AIM project was dually funded by the Shire and Lotterywest.

The Mosaic project which was co-ordinated by Kerrie Argent, was created and completed by volunteers.

Two hundred and sixty mosaics were created signifying family, friends, community groups and businesses. Phyllis Dunham was tireless in her efforts, creating many on behalf of others.

If a paver took 8 hours to create (erring on the side

of caution), then 2,080 hours were given up by volunteers. This does not take into account the days spent grouting and installing. If a basic rate of \$15 was paid for the hours put in, the bill would come in at around \$35,000. This doesn't include the donations of tiles, slabs and limestone blocks.

Report as read by Daniel Trevenen (above), LGDHS President of the Student Council

The report describes the town of Lake Grace as it was back in 1926.

"The town of Lake Grace is not at all pretty – scarcely any paling (that means picket) fences, mostly broken wire.

Cows and horses wander about on the streets which are quite unformed.

Most of the houses are unpainted jarrah weather board".

The report then goes on to list the shops in the town:

One Barber's, Men's Clothing and Billiard Saloon

combined

One large General and Draper store run by a cooperative

The WA Bank - a tiny wooden structure which does immense business

One "Sunshine" Machinery Agency

One General Store run by a Wagin firm

One bootmaker

Two butchers

Two refreshment rooms (one combined with a green grocer)

One newsagency and green grocer

One motor garage

One land and estate agent and many agencies combined

Two general boarding houses

Two wood depots with general carrying depot attached to each

One very nice Post Office just recently completed – we have a new telephone number (number 11) and a letter box (PO Box 33)

One Police Station

One School with two young lady teachers – 30 to 40 children attend

One Town Hall – Church of England and Roman Catholic church services are held here once a month – The Church of England Bush Brother always comes to the hospital. He is known as "Harold Lloyd", wears similar glasses and looks very much like the movie star.

One Methodist Church – small

This report was written August 6, 1926 and sent to the Australian Inland Mission Board in Sydney by Sister Helen Cousin, one of the original nurses-incharge of the Lake Grace AIM Hospital. You will see this report displayed on one of the new information panels inside the hospital museum.

Avoiding the Hard Sell

Have you ever wondered why it is so hard to get away from a high pressure sales pitch? How is it that you find it difficult to get away from sales staff without being rude?

An article published by Queensland Fair Trading recently, shows the sales techniques employed in high pressure sales to capture or trap unsuspecting consumers.

Next time you are approached, it might be fun to see how many of the strategies you can identify as they try to manipulate you into buying what they are selling.

Here are some of the techniques:

- 1. **RECIPROCATION**. Making you feel obligated after you have accepted a "free" gift or offering you a "special" deal.
- 2. **COMMITMENT**. Getting you to commit to something early in the conversation ("Yes, I can't argue with that....") and then later in the conversation, recalling that earlier agreement to force you into agreeing to more! Don't let yourself be bullied.
- 3. **SOCIAL PROOF**. Everyone is buying one, so it must be a great deal and you need one too! Are they really? Just because the salesperson


something, does that make it true?

- 4. **LIKING**. Using their good looks, charm, flattery, sob stories or humour to earn your trust. They're so nice, you really should help them out, or should you?
- 5. AUTHORITY. Authority in or out of uniform causes an automatic response in most people and is often used to gain agreement. Is this "authority" relevant to the sale? Verify the authority if you can.
- 6. SCARCITY. This is the last chance! Stocks are limited! Are they really? This technique attempts to rush you and prevent you from thinking things through or shopping around.

SCIENCE AND STUFF

THAT'S LIFE: Ornithologist Graham Appletton said, "It was terrible, the bird did not live to enjoy its moment of fame," about an American Robin that had made its way to the UK, only to be caught by a sparrow hawk as birdwatchers gathered to see it.

(The London Times—9th March)

WORLD'S **OLDEST FRESH** WATER:

Groundwater under the Egyptian Sahara is up to a million years old—the oldest fresh water so far discovered. While the Sahara is bone dry today, it covers one of the world's largest freshwater aguifers, a relic of its rainier past. The aguifer flows into the dry Gattarah Depression, where it evaporates and is wasted. It could supply 2 billion cubic metres a year to northern Egypt. (Geophysical Research)

NOT STUPID: "They didn't want landing flags or rusting vehicles dumped on their land." - Torsten-Eric Sender, editor of the Saverland Kurier in Germany, on why people who had bought plots on the moon were complaining to his paper about NASA's plans to send astronauts back there. (afp News)

DIAMONDS FLOWED ON EARLY EARTH: Can diamonds exist in liquid form? Only if you put carbon under massive pressure and heat it to the temperature at the surface of the sun. Diamonds may have formed this way early on in earth's history when the planet was a hotter and more violent place. Simulations in Amsterdam suggest that squeezing hot fluid carbon forces groups of atoms to link up with their neighbours to save space. These small groups form the tetrahedral shapes found in solid diamonds but they are constantly breaking apart and reforming, so the material stays liquid rather than forming a crystal. The conditions at which diamonds are liquid are too extreme to create in a lab today-the temperature must exceed 6000 degrees Kelvin, while the pressure must be a million times greater than the earth's atmosphere exerts. But these conditions could have existed on our planet when it was young. Any process that cooled the liquid quickly would have created solid diamonds. (New Scientist Magazine—20th March)

BIRD PROOF POISONS: Killing predatory pests like rats and possums with poisoned bait helps protect rare bird species. But if the birds eat the bait they die too. So a company has been experimenting with additives that deter many birds from eating poison, a small dose of a chemical called pulegone makes the bait smell of mint and deters casual pecking. A little anthraguinone makes the bird feel ill after a small peck, and a bright blue dye helps the bird to remember what makes it ill. After four days robins were pecking blue bait 10 times less often than ordinary bait. Fortunately, rats and possums never learn.

DID YOU KNOW?:



The Kelvin scale is a temperature scale used by scientists. It begins at absolute zero (- 273.16° C) and increases by the same degree intervals as the Celsius scale; that is 0° C is the same as 273 k and 100° C is 373 k.

Between 2900 and 2800 BC, the Great Pyramid of Giza is built as a tomb for Egyptian



Pharaoh Cheops (Khu-fu). The base is almost a perfect square, with the greatest deviation from a right angle only 0.05 percent; the orientation of its sides is exactly north-south and east-west.



The first version of Stonehenge is constructed on the Salisbury Plain. It consists of an earthen

bank and a ditch, along with 56 pits known as Aubrey Holes, after John Aubrey, who discovered them.

Also, Sumerian writing progresses from simple pictographs to symbols that can represent syllables. This



greatly extends the scope of written language, a key element in the transition of the representation of proper names with symbols that stand for the

parts of the name.

Between 3000 and 2901 BC, donkeys and mules are domesticated in what is now Israel: camels in what is now Iran

and Arabia; and elephants in India. Cotton is cultivated in India and the Babylonians predict eclipses.

Between 2600 and 2501 BC the Chinese use a vertical pole to project the sun's shadow to estimate time.

Australia Day Awards

Active Citizenship Award

The Committee of the Lake Grace Development Association have much pleasure in nominating Mrs Mary Naisbitt for the Premier's Australia Day Active Citizenship Awards for Lake Grace. The following items are just some of the many things that Mary has been involved in over many years that make her a worthy nominee for this position.

In the past, Lake Grace Cemetery was in much need of beautification. Mary belongs to the 'Friends of the Cemetery' and was instrumental in achieving what we see today. This included a plaque and garden dedicated to the neo-natal and stillborn babies in unmarked graves, the garden plants on the driveway, plinth wall, gazebo, water tank and the organizing of the annual busy bees. She is currently liaising with the Shire for plaques for unlisted graves of people that do not have a family connection in Lake Grace.

Mary was one of the early members of the Aged Care Committee formed in 1993 which resulted in the existing Lakes Village complex. This involved lobbying the Shire for the retention and restoration of the Masonic Lodge which had been vested in the Shire for use for the aged. It also involved fundraising for the seven units and negotiating with Homeswest and the State Housing Authority. Mary later became President of this committee and is still one of the main contacts on the unit allocation committee.

In Lake Grace we are lucky to have had our Railway Station restored. Mary was also on the committee that took on this very difficult venture. The Station is a great asset and is currently being use by the youth of our town.

The Australian Inland Mission Hospital was another building in town that was in danger of demolition in 1985, when only one vote separated it from being lost to future generations, forever. This historic building was restored, with the help of community volunteers and has been retained for our

community. Mary is still on the committee responsible for the maintenance and promotion of the building.

Mary is the Central South Tourism delegate for the Lake Grace Shire, a position that she took on while a Councillor. She travels many kilometres to attend the meetings and workshops necessary to remain informed and to promote our area. She had also been the President of the Lake Grace Tourism Promotions Committee for many years, a position she still hold in a caretaker capacity. Mary regularly attends meetings of the Lake Grace Development Association, keeping us all informed of the happenings of the group.

Mary is also very dedicated to land care and was involved in the tree planting within the Lake Grace town site. She is also a CALM representative for this area, and very much involved in the Rare Flora Group working with Anne Rick from Newdegate to establish a herbarium in Lake Grace.

Mary became a Shire Councillor in 1993. While on the Shire she was very active on many of the committees as well as taking on the positions of Council Delegate for other organizations. In 2003 Mary did not seek reelection to the Lake Grace Shire – she had given ten years of dedicated service to the Shire.

Last year, Lake Grace Telecentre was in need of committee members and Mary again volunteered her time to assist them.

Mary is one of the 48 women depicted on the Lake Grace mural for her contribution to the community, and her story is therefore recorded in the book Far Site—Women of the Salt Lake Country.

We are sure that you will agree with us the Mary is a very worthy nominee for the position of Premier's Australia Day Active Citizenship Awards for Lake Grace.

- Narelle coordinated the 2002 Year 10 graduation dinner. Never far from the action, she helped students with preparation over a three month period and also spent many hours working with the P & C in the kitchen when catering was required.
- Narelle volunteered as a supervisor of the

Machine Guarding Essential



WorkSafe inspectors are conducting an inspection program this month to make sure machinery in workplaces is adequately guarded.

WorkSafe Acting Executive Director Nina Lyhne said today that inspectors were still finding examples of inadequate or no guarding of machinery on a regular basis.

"The number of recent court cases involving inadequate guarding is an indication that the message on guarding is still not getting through," Ms Lyhne said.

"It is absolutely crucial that the moving parts of machinery are adequately guarded, and WorkSafe inspectors will be coming down hard on employers who do not provide a safe workplace by ensuring that this is done.

"Many serious workplace incidents can be completely avoided if safety is built into the initial design of machinery.

"If machinery is built considering all the risks and with appropriate guarding, the chance of human error causing an injury is significantly reduced."

Manufacturers of machinery are legally required to make sure dangerous parts are safely guarded so operators are protected from injury, and operators are under an obligation to leave guards in place when machinery is being operated.

"Guarding is the oldest and most easily understood method for minimising the risk of injury to machine operators, and it has been required by occupational safety and health legislation for a long time," Ms Lyhne said.

"Despite this, inspectors still regularly find that guards have never been provided or have been removed and not replaced after maintenance or repairs.

"The consequences can be absolutely tragic, and we have recently instigated a number of prosecutions against companies whose failure to guard machines have resulted in employees suffering the amputation of fingers or even entire limbs.



Country Women's Association Lake Grace Branch

The Country Women's Association began in WA in 1924. The aim of the Association was, and still is, to improve the welfare and conditions of life of people everywhere, especially those living in the country. CWA also aims to foster friendship, understanding and to encourage co-operation and community effort.

Isolation was one of the problems to be overcome. Although CWA was formed to meet the needs of the time, changes continue in the organization to meet today's needs. Even with modern methods of communication, people can still be isolated. Friendships made through CWA's supportive network can help to improve this

Membership is open to all women over sixteen years of age. They can find friendship, fellowship and fun.

There are 189 branches in metropolitan and country WA. Each member pays an annual subscription to the branch of her choice.

Branches meet monthly for business and social activities. Each branch belongs to a Division which comprises a group of neighbouring branches. The presidents of each of the 15 Divisions, with the 5 elected State Officers, form the CWA State Council. A State Conference is held annually and each branch has a vote.

CWA House is situated in West Perth and has motel type accommodation for members and the public. One floor is occupied by the Association's Head Office and boardroom, while 3 floors are rented out as office space. There are rooms for choir, drama and handicraft groups to meet. The CWA shop is also in the building. It is open on weekdays and has a stock of items made by members available for sale. CWA House is on the red CAT bus service on Hay Street

Rural Information Service provides much needed information about services available in such areas as health, education and welfare.

D'Orsogna's Short Weight Meets Prosecution

Company and Director Fined For Misleading Consumers

Meat and small goods giant **D'Orsogna** has been fined more than \$18,000 plus costs of \$1,484 and its Managing Director **Bradley Thomas Thomason** fined \$2,600, for offences under the Fair Trading and Weights and Measures Acts.

Following a complaint from a consumer that she had received underweight pre-packaged meat, an investigation by Consumer Protection officers revealed that 22 out of 126 D'Orsogna products tested were underweight by more than 5%.

D'Orsogna asserted that this had occurred because the company's slicing machine was faulty.

"Operations like D'Orsogna have a responsibility to the public to ensure that their equipment is always kept in good order if it is used to produce goods which are to be sold by weight", Consumer Protection Commissioner Patrick Walker said.

"Consumers must be able to trust what they read on food labels and this was not the case here.

"The Department had previously communicated some concerns to the company about underweight

articles that had been detected, which apparently were not heeded.

"The fines handed down show that the Courts also take weights and measures issues very seriously", Mr Walker said.

Consumer Protection prosecuted D'Orsogna under the Fair Trading Act in addition to the Weights and Measures Act to exemplify the seriousness of making false representations to members of the public.

SPECIFIED AREA RATE POLICY AMENDMENT

Following last year's Specified Area Rate (SAR) Policy survey, Council agreed to review the voting requirements of its SAR policy to encourage greater voter participation with a view to obtaining more certainty in regard to the community's needs.





Previous surveys have shown positive support for projects but were lost on the grounds that the non-returned votes, often as high as 40%, are counted as a **NO** vote.

Council, and many in the community, are concerned that the current arrangements may result in important infrastructure upgrades being deferred or not undertaken, to the detriment of the community's capacity to attract and retain business and people.

Accordingly, Council at its 24 March 2004 Ordinary meeting, agreed to amend Policy 3.3 Specified Area Rate as follows:

" ... for a project to proceed, a "yes" result requires **more** than 50% of returned votes being in favour of the proposal."

Projects will still require endorsement by the community and must be considered by Council as worthy of support.

"Who is this man?"

Capt. Derek McArtney (C.A.) Anglican Parish - Lk. Grace & Wagin



Even before it opened in Australia on the 25th of February, the film "The Passion of the Christ" had been in the news for months. Now that it has been showing for over a month, the interest and comment it continues to generate across every spectrum of society is quite phenomenal. But what is it about "The Passion of the Christ" that touches something in human beings across the world and across the boundaries of culture and religion, including the religions of materialism and secularism? Because, as far as the violent nature of death by crucifixion goes, Jesus' death was not as violent as other recorded events in Jewish or world history - before or since - nor was He crucified alone. Two other men died alongside Him. What about them? We do not even know their names, yet their ordeal on their crosses lasted longer than Jesus' did.

This tells us then that the central feature of Jesus' death is not so much the physical suffering. Rather, it is who He claims to be that is central to the last hours of the life of this one man who changed the world forever. Therefore, as the Christ, it was His spiritual suffering, culminating in His separation from God that is central to all that we see in the movie and read in the Gospels. For;

"God made Him who knew no sin to be sin on our behalf, so that we might become the righteousness of God in Him." (2Cor.5:21)

Therefore, the basic question, which the four Gospels asks of us, is; "Who is this man?" and this is indeed, the major question on the minds of the many hundreds of thousands of people all around the world who have seen the movie. In other words, the story confronts us through the manner and suffering of His death with the recognition that there is something more going on here than just another story of cruel torture and injustice. There is something deeper to this story that is disturbing because it touches upon things extremely personal and very human. Issues that we cannot put our finger on unless we can answer the question; "Who is this man?" but, the answer itself - Easter - also confronts us, because it is the day on which Jesus;

". . . through the Spirit of holiness was declared with power to be the Son of God by his resurrection from the dead. . ." (Rom.1:4)

The risen Christ, Jesus of Nazareth, answered the very same question for His disciples. Consequently, what confronts us today as we read the Gospels or watch "The Passion of the Christ" is the same thing that confronted His disciples when He was among them. "Who is this man?" But, is their answer - "JESUS LIVES!" - our answer? Because the Easter message is, "JESUS LIVES!" and it is, was and always will be the testimony and confession of every Christian in every age; many of whom were once Atheists, Communists, Pagans or Muslims, Hindus, Buddhists or New-Agers, men and women of great wealth and power as well as those who have or had nothing, as well as those who were like me; who never really cared very much to stop and think about it.
