A huge congratulations has to go to Mark Pinney on being awarded Life Membership of the Lake Grace Cricket Club.

Mark first started his cricket career for LGCC in 1987-88, playing a couple of games in that premiership year when he was home from school.

Over time, he amassed 150 games for the club, this could have been closer to 200 if it was not for work commitments. During this time, he hit 3,539 runs at a very impressive average of 29.99, including 16 50's and three centuries from 136 innings. He hit 300 runs in a season on four occasions.

His highest score of 149 not out would come against Hyden, the highest score ever against Hyden. This is also the club's highest score by a No 5 batsman (against any team). He took the batting aggregate with 661 runs in 2000-01 and the batting average on three occasions, with averages of 44, 55 and 48. He hit 25 sixes in a season in 2000-01. This is the 8^{th} most in a season, but the second most by an individual. The top 7 seasons for the most sixes hit is held by Rod Walker.

His bowling was not great. He took a total of 14 wickets, and nobody can work out how! He was perhaps our most gifted wicket keeper, taking 114 catches and claiming 10 stumpings. Some of those catches were as good as you would ever see.

He captained the team in 1991-92. He was President on four occasions, starting 98/99, 99/00, 2001/02, then over a decade later in 2013/14. Mark also played in the 2012/13 premiership against Kukerin.

Nellie Lay

24-06-1934 to 18-02-2021

Nellie was born Nellie Muriel Mason in the Lake Grace Hospital on the 24th June 1934, the second daughter of Wally and Ruby Mason. Her elder sister Jean had been born in 1932, and her brothers came along after her – (Kevin) Mick in 1935 and (Laurie) Sam in 1938. Wally gave them all nicknames, and Nellie's was "Nellie Bly".

The family lived on a farm 24 miles north of Lake Grace. They would go to Doornock siding with Ruby's sisters in the horse and sulky to take the milk and cream to go on the train to Perth, and to pick up fruit and vegies and whatever there was for the farm. When they went to shop or visit friends in Lake Grace it would be by horse and cart. Nellie told stories of that time, such as the kids pinching cow's milk to make mud pies, and when bringing the cows in for milking, holding the cow's tails and getting dragged along the sandy creek! The kids went with their Dad to make charcoal, putting mallee roots in a big pit, covering it with iron and sand, and then burning it slowly. They then bagged up the charcoal and sold it.

In 1941 at the age of seven, Nellie boarded in town to go to school. She boarded with Mr and Mrs Knott, and their son Stan, who she remembered as lovely, kind people. Many years later Stan told Nellie that he remembered her as a little girl who was always happy and always sweeping! Nellie carried that habit of sweeping through her life, apparently her sons used to complain when they were teenagers and had a big night out, that early next morning all they could hear outside their windows was swish, swish, swish. She must've worn out a heck of a lot of brooms over the years!

In 1942 the whole family moved into Lake Grace so that the kids could go to school (there were no school buses then). They brought a few cows into town with them and the kids would have to go and find them wherever they were grazing. They would be tied up to a big tree in the back yard to be milked. They sold milk and cream around town.

During her later years at school, Nellie would do baby sitting and house work after school . She left school at 14 and worked for Mrs Colquhaun doing housework. After that she worked for George Lannin in the Greengrocer shop. On Tuesdays she rode around town taking orders for fruit and vegies, then went back to the shop and put the orders together for George to deliver. When she was about 18 she worked for Barge Watkins at the shop where Rosie's Café is now. The shop sold everything from paper and magazines to lace, crockery and gifts.

Nellie enjoyed playing hockey and tennis. Footballers and hockey players travelled in the back of Reg Bethams' covered in truck, to play in Kukerin, Moulyinning and Dumbleyung. Nellie played hockey while still at school – she and her sister Jean would get dressed in their hockey clothes in the hope that someone wouldn't turn up, and they often got a game



that way. She went to Country Week hockey two or three times, which she really enjoyed. Nellie also taught Sunday School on Sunday mornings with Jean and a couple of other girls.

Nellie fell in love with John Lay when she was 18. They were engaged on 15th March 1952 while in Perth for Flo and David Robinson's wedding. They were married in the Methodist Church in Narrogin on the 1st May 1954 and had their reception in a second story room above Parry's in Narrogin.

Their first child Maurice John was born in 1956, Ronald Wayne arrived in 1958, then Bevan Charles came along in 1966. They lived in a two room precut house for a start, which they added on to over time. Life on the farm was busy. Nellie helped out with tractor driving - the usual ripping up, working back, seeding and cleaning dams. She did plenty of mallee root picking, and sheep work. She loaded the truck at seeding time till midnight as John didn't get in till late. When she was first married they cut hay and Nellie helped to stook it and cart it in to put in the hay stack. Another job was to sew the bags of wheat and oats they kept for seed. Shearing was an extra busy time, cooking enough to feed everyone and

helping to bring sheep in and put them out. She also milked a cow morning and night.

At times early on she would drive the truck in to town to pick up things for the farm. Nellie drove the ute into town when she went to get her driver's license. The policeman, Mr Fletcher filled in the paperwork and off she went – no driver's test then! In the early days they used the farm ute to go shopping as they didn't have a vehicle of their own. Being a farm ute it was always messy as it was used for feeding out hay to the cows and grain to the sheep and everything else, so it had to be cleaned before going to town.

On Sundays the family sometimes played tennis at the Little Red School or down at Ray and Blanche Connolly's with some of the neighbors. They sometimes went to the pictures on Saturday night in the hall. When there were dances on Saturday nights, Nellie and John loved to dance while the boys would sleep on the floor at the back of the hall, or when they got a bit older, in the car.

At home on the farm Nellie would buy a hundred dayold chickens at a time and raise them till they were six weeks old, when she would sell off the hens and dress the roosters for sale. She sold eggs, milked the cow, made butter, separated the milk for cream and sold some cream. The money she made bought clothes and many things they wouldn't have had otherwise. Nellie made most of the boys clothes out of clothes other people didn't want anymore. The sheets had patch upon patch, but she could make undies out of the sides that were still good!

As the boys got older and worked on the farm Nellie was always cooking, and often delivering meals to them in the paddocks at night. She remembered that it could be tricky getting back out of the paddock at night - it wasn't so hard when it wasn't ripped up – you just kept going till you ran out of ploughed ground. Sometimes she wasn't quite sure where her boys were as there were so many lights it was hard to tell if the lights were in their paddocks or someone else's.

Nellie did a mountain of cooking in her lifetime – she was legendary for her cakes, biscuits and slices, and delicious family meals. When making biscuits when her boys were younger, she said the ones she was putting on trays to go in the oven would keep disappearing off the tray. It took time to get the tray full to put in the oven. When her Grandkids came along she knew what biscuits each Grandie liked best and made those especially for them.

Nellie and John moved into Lake Grace in late 2000. John still went to work at the farm everyday until about 2007 when Alzheimer's meant he had to give up farming. Nellie cared for him at home till 2009. After John passed away in 2012, Nellie lived alone until September 2019. She enjoyed living in town, looking after her house and working in her garden, constantly planting, pruning, designing a new part or sweeping and raking! She enjoyed having visitors for a cuppa and a chat, and loved it when family and her grandies called

Some Of Our Memories Of Nellie

- She was a girly girl. She loved pretty things flowery things, lacy things and colorful things. She sewed her own curtains and cushions in florals and lace, and decorated her home with pretty things.
- Maurice remembers that Nellie sold his 1954 BSA Motorbike while he was overseas to someone who came around, for \$150, as she reckoned he hardly ever used it!
- Over the many years on the farm, she often had people staying for extended lengths of time. These included Tara as a baby, who became the daughter she never had – they always shared a special bond.
- She was a homebody she loved her home and her own company. All her life she kept an immaculate house and in the last couple of years would be very annoyed at the dust under the bed, windows not sparkling etc
- Her quick wit when bantering with her family was very entertaining – the retorts she came out with could curl your hair!
- Her absolutely legendary cooking. You could turn up any time and she'd have some of her biscuits, cake or slice to give you. Her stews and soups were the best. She always called food "tucker." Her daughters-in-law knew they'd had a win when the boys gave the verdict of "Nearly as good as Nellie's" for something they'd cooked.
- Nothing was ever really worn out until Mum/Nanna couldn't mend it anymore. Her patience when patching and re-patching work clothes was incredible. There was also many a time when a teddy needed repair work, and Nanna could sew a new eye or a new tail, no worries at all.
- She could've been a pin-up girl for "Reduce, Reuse, Recycle." Although she grew up through the war and depression, we never heard her complain about today's generation being wasteful. It was simply second nature to Nell to make the most of absolutely everything.
- Nellie had a real sweet tooth. Both for cakes, slice, biscuits etc, but also for dessert. No matter how full she was, she always had some room for sweets.
- She was very generous.
- Her quick sense of humor which stayed with her almost to the end even the hospital staff loved her for the laughs she gave them.
- When she arrived at Maurie and Jodie's for a stay, the first thing she did was sweep inside the house. The second thing she did was sweep outside the house. And she then did both every day she stayed. They used to joke with her about putting a broom in her grave!

- She was kind to everyone except pests in the garden - when it came to snails, slugs and ants she was a cold hearted killer.
- Maurie remembers when he and Ron were small, being tied with rope onto the tractor seat while Nellie drove the tractor. He remembers her amazing capacity for work and how much she did around the farm especially when he was very young.
- We are not sure if it was from choice or necessity, but years ago Nellie seemed to use a lot of Mission-Brown paint. We heard a story once about a young couple who were halfway through painting their Mission-Brown skirting boards a nice clean, crisp White when they left for their honeymoon. Nellie very kindly decided to finish the job for them while they were away. Unfortunately, Nellie painted over the white they had done, to return it all to Mission Brown! Apparently they didn't have the heart to tell her or change it and so it stayed mission brown!
- She was always a lady. When she came into town on Fridays (her shopping day), she always dressed immaculately, with hair, makeup, jewelry and handbag.
- When Clancy, Maisey and Charlie were younger, Nellie came to every one of their birthday parties, and enjoyed helping, watching the kids have fun and sharing in the party food. And she wouldn't go home until the last of the dishes were done.
- She was never interested in travelling she always said she'd be too bored on holidays. She always said "I'm just happy to potter around in my garden."
- The things she sewed for us with such a lot of love

 embroidered cushions, quilts, baby clothes. Her needlework is beautiful and she invested countless hours in these heirlooms over the years.
- She still made us birthday cakes, even when we were adults.
- In the last couple of years she loved her bed. When she stayed with Maurie and Jodie they would try to encourage her to stay up and awake, but they'd turn their backs and she'd be back in bed like a flash.
- She loved her talcum powder. While she was in hospital one day she forgot what it was for, and asked Lisa "Where do I put this?" To which Lisa replied "Wherever you want to put it." So Nellie proceeded to squirt it all over the front of Lisa's uniform!
- When they were younger her grandkids loved going to Nanna's and playing in the awesome cubby in her garden, which even had a fireman's pole.
- Her daughters-in-law really won the Mother-In-Law jackpot. She thought the sun shone out of her sons, but she loved Jodie, Bambi and Vynka just as much, and was so grateful for everything the girls did for her over the years.

- When Vynka first met Bevan and she went out to the farm with him, she could not believe that Nellie kept meat in the cupboard! Bevan would go to the cupboard and pull out a cooked roast on an enamel plate inside a pillowcase, and carve off some meat to eat. Vynka was amazed no one ever got food poisoning. Vynka would also say to him "Don't eat all of your Mum's food," to which Bevan would reply "She loves cooking for us." Which it turned out was true.
- Bevan remembers that Nellie even used to rake the leaves up in the bush around the farm house, as the bush was too untidy for her liking.
- As she was so tiny, the grandkids were always comparing their height with Nanna to see if they had grown taller than her yet.
- Living in town, Nellie was very lucky to have such wonderful neighbors on every side. We are very grateful to Joan & John, Margaret, Dot, Kim & Steve and Sandra, for all the friendship and support they gave Nellie, especially in her last couple of years at home.

Nellie will never be forgotten for so many reasons. Her needs and wants were simple, she loved her family deeply, allowed us to live our lives as we chose, and helped us whenever she could. We were blessed to have her, and we will always love her.



Do you like going on holidays? Not really, I have to travel so much with my job I like to stay home the rest of the year.


Who would portray you in a movie? Bugs though I think he's gone into hiding due to the PC crowd getting a bit worked up about what's going on between him and Elmer Fudd.

Life isn't a game where we have to work it out for ourselves as its our job. Our job is to deal with the information presented to us, if we don't have the information, we can't deal with the crime.

We are more than happy to take anonymous information, however just to tell us Joe Bloggs is a drug dealer, won't cut it, we'll take it on board, but ultimately you need to let us know as much information as you have. Some considerations to tell us are where Joe Bloggs keeps it, where he deals from, does he deal from the house or car, or some other location, maybe he meets people in a park or at a specific location? What does he deal in, cannabis, meth?, where does he get it from, where does he store it in the house or car so that we know where to look if we get a warrant, does he get a delivery or deal in drugs at a specific time? Basically tell us as much as you can, and we will get the warrant and find the drug dealers, and kindly ask them to leave town.

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Great Pacific Garbage Patch

The Great Pacific Garbage Patch (GPGP) is a collection of marine debris in the North Pacific Ocean. Also known as the Pacific trash vortex, the garbage patch is actually two distinct collections of debris bounded by the massive North Pacific Subtropical Gyre.

The GPGP sits near the surface of the ocean. Dense debris can sink centimetres or even several metres beneath the surface, making the vortex's area nearly impossible to measure. The surface area of the patch is approximately 1.6 million square kilometres.

Most debris in the GPGP is plastic. Plastic is not biodegradable, meaning it does not disintegrate—it simply breaks into tinier and tinier pieces, known as microplastics. Mixed in with microplastics are larger pieces of refuse from land activities in North American and Asia. Some plastics are dumped from oceangoing vessels.

Marine debris can prevent algae and plankton, the photosynthetic producers in the marine food web, from receiving enough sunlight to create nutrients. When these tiny organisms are threatened, the entire food web is put at risk—first-order consumers that eat the plankton, such as jellies; second-order consumers that eat the jellies, such as turtles; and apex predators such as sharks.

The marine debris of the GPGP can devastate marine life in the North Pacific Subtropical Gyre. The stomach contents of many dead marine birds include plastic marine debris fed to the chick by its parents. Turtles can easily be entangled in discarded fishing nets or mistake the gelatinous texture of plastic for a jelly, their favorite food.

Perhaps one of the starkest impacts on marine life is the phenomenon of "ghost fishing." Most large debris in

Ghost fishing happens when these discarded nets continue to "catch" marine life—suffocating marine mammals.

Garbage patches are found in the calm, stable centers of many of the world's ocean gyres. Even smaller bodies of water, such as the Mediterranean and North Seas, are developing their own garbage patches along heavily trafficked shipping lanes.

The best way to reduce debris in the Great Pacific Garbage Patch is to reduce, recycle, reuse—and clean up local beaches.

Many of our holiday destinations on the south coast hold regular clean up days. The International Coastal Cleanup Day is on September 18th, but don't wait until then to do your bit.

The Western Australian Government has reached an agreement with the Federal Government to provide funding to farmers who applied under the National On-Farm Emergency Water Infrastructure Rebate Scheme. Due to significant demand the scheme was oversubscribed, and the previous funding was fully allocated. The additional funding provided through this agreement will see a further 511 farmers with applications already submitted receive a rebate for water infrastructure installed on their farm.

The Department of Water and Environmental Regulation is working with the Federal Government on the formal funding agreement, and when in place, the department will contact the affected farmers directly to provide further information on the assessment and payment of grants.

Community Water Supply program 2020/21 Round -In Progress

The Shire of Merredin	\$75,120	Improve their extensive stormwater reuse network to provide water for irrigation of public open spaces. The non-potable piping system will be extended to the town cemetery site and a new 362 kilolitre capacity storage tank will be installed. Extending the non-potable supply network will replace scheme water to irrigate the gardens. Annual scheme cost savings will result in approximately \$8000.
The Shire of Mukinbudin	\$100,000	Lay 15 kilometres of pipe from the 200,000 kilolitre capacity Barbalin Dam to the town of Mukinbudin. The dam, fed by a large rock catchment has been recently handed over from Water Corporation and will reliably provide an additional 90,000 kilolitres to irrigate the sporting facilities and public open spaces.
The Shire of Wyalkatchem	\$100,000	This project component aims to address poor drainage issues associated with the 693,603 square metre eastern catchment that flows to the town's non-portable community dam that is in poor condition with ineffective channel gradients. Works will include channel reconstruction and realignment to optimise runoff into the dam.
The Shire of Wyalkatchem	\$79,759	This project component aims to also address poor catchment drainage issues including flooding in sections of the 112,840 square metre Flint Road and Gamble Street catchment channels to the town's non-potable community dam. The catchment channels will be upgraded and realigned to optimise runoff into the town dam.
The Shire of Chapman Valley	\$100,000	Upgrade the 30 year old pump and pipe infrastructure from the Rockwell bore to improve supply of non-potable water to the Yuna townsite. Twelve kilometres of new pipework will be installed from the bore to Yuna and fitted with a new submersible pump system. Additional solar panels will be installed to increase the capacity of the network to deliver more water to Yuna. A new 132 kilolitre capacity tank will be installed at the sporting facilities.
The Shire of Toodyay	\$79,818	 This project builds on the Shire's previous works undertaken to enhance storage and access to emergency firefighting water across the Shire. The project will focus on four fire brigade sites and boost the stormwater harvesting systems. Storage capacity will be enhanced at each site where combined storage capacity will increase by 775 kilolitres. The additional water storage and pump system upgrades will secure an emergency non-potable source for firefighting and reduce the reliance on the Shire's limited scheme water supplies.
The Shire of Jerramungup	\$87,174	Project will boost the non-potable emergency water supplies in the Boxwood Hill area of the Shire which in recent years has experienced well below average rainfall. a new 15,000 kilolitre capacity dam on the dd rock quarry site at Boxwood Hill. The supply will provide an important non-potable water supply to supplement the existing irrigation dam that is becoming increasingly unreliable due to salt seepage. The source will also boost the emergency water supply network in the Gairdner area that has experienced water deficiencies and provide a back-up emergency livestock drinking water.
The Shire of Plantagenet	\$94,031	Project will further boost their non-potable supplies in Mount Barker to irrigate the expansive Sounness Park Recreation Precinct and Frost Park Oval. A new 35,000 kilolitre capacity dam with be constructed at the turf club training track. The dam will be linked to the existing 30,000 kilolitre capacity dam through a new pump and pipe system.
The Shire of Gnowangerup	\$100,000	Project will build a 12,000 kilolitre capacity dam at the Gnowangerup airstrip. There is an existing 10,000 kilolitre dam that captures water off the runway and surrounding reserve however this is inaccessible and regularly overflows. Connection between the two dams will increase total capacity to 22,000 kilolitres. A solar pump system will be installed to transfer water between dams and a generator will serve as a backup power system. Two 250 kilolitre capacity tanks will be installed and an road created for farmers and the fire brigade to access the tanks.
The Shire of Lake Grace	\$100,000	Project will upgrade two Agricultural Area dams north of Newdegate town. Recently handed over to the Shire from the Water Corporation, the Lake Biddy dams will be desilted, the dam batters and inlets will be upgraded and stabilised with rock pitching. Half of the large 44 hectare catchment will be upgraded to optimise runoff to both dams and the system will be equipped with a 250 Kilolitre capacity tank and solar pump system.

COVID-19 Vaccinations for Emergency Services Volunteers

The WA Department of Health (WA) has advised fire and emergency services volunteers, including Bush Fire Brigades, can register online to receive their COVID-19 vaccination from Monday 8 March 2021. DFES has been advised the AstraZeneca vaccine is being offered through this rollout. Further information about the vaccines can be found on the Healthy WA website.

Volunteers will be required to register online and provide their personal details and select a date and time to be vaccinated.

Once the volunteer has registered to receive their vaccine, they will be sent a Pre Vaccination Factsheet from WA Health with instructions about attending the clinic and information about what happens after they have received their first vaccination. They will need to bring the following to their appointment:

- Personal ID that shows their date of birth (i.e. driver's license or passport);
- Medicare card; and
- Proof of their role in the fire and emergency services.



I had to hold back tears as he left, I had goose bumps on my arm, and thought "that is the kind of love I want in my life."



I hope you share this with someone you care about. I just did.



National COVID-19 vaccine rollout

The commencement of Phase 1b of the National COVID-19 vaccine roll out is due to commence from the week of 22 March 2021 in selected locations.

Members of the community can check their eligibility, or that of a loved one, online via the Eligibility Checker available at <u>https://covid-vaccine.healthdirect.gov.au/</u><u>eligibility</u>

If eligible, they will be able to view vaccination clinics and book an appointment online or via phone.

There is currently a low risk of contracting COVID-19 in Western Australia and indeed in Australia, so it's important to take the time to check eligibility in this round before making an appointment or calling a doctor.

The Australian Government Department of Health website contains further information and resources to support the rollout including a downloadable fact sheet listing the General Practices, Aboriginal Controlled Community Health Services, and GP-led respiratory clinics as well as official communication guidance which will be updates as the roll out progresses. If the online method is not the preferred option, the National Coronavirus and COVID-19 Vaccination Helpline is available on 1800 020 080. Details of State based clinics (Co-ordinated by WA Country Health Service) are in the last stages of finalisation and aim to 'fill service gaps' where vaccination is not locally available.

Some, but not all general practices have opted in to deliver COVID-19 vaccines for the next stage of the vaccine rollout, Phase 1b.

Phase 1b is for the over 70's, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders over 55, adults with a specified medical condition, healthcare workers and critical high-risk workers.

We've already seen a high demand for the COVID-19 vaccine, not just from people who are eligible for Phase 1b but in general.

There are things can be done while people wait for their vaccination appointment. They can make sure Medicare details are correct, continue to practise good hygiene, physical distancing and adhere to local restrictions and understand how to isolate if needed. If feeling unwell, don't go to work or to activities in big groups and get tested.

People are asked to please be patient - the vaccination rollout will go slowly at first with more vaccination sites coming online over the next few weeks.

All eligible Australians will have the opportunity to have the vaccination in the coming months.

The vaccine will be available at the Lake Grace Medical Centre in the near future - please give them a ring for more information - 9865 1208.

Easter Myth: The Easter Bunny

The Easter bunny is often considered a part of Easter because of the notable ability of bunnies to proliferate. However, there are roots back to the actual name of Easter. A goddess of fertility, Eostre (who may have been one of the inspirations for the name Easter), is said to have been accompanied by a hare, although many sources debate this connection. The tradition of the bunny was brought to the U.S. by German settlers to Pennsylvania.

Easter Myth: The Name "Easter"


Some Easter traditions connect this name with Ishtar, the Babylonian and Assyrian goddess of love and fertility, or Eostre, an Anglo-Saxon goddess of spring. Doubtless, the Christian holiday was modelled after pagan celebrations of spring and fertility. However, its traditions also closely mimic Passover, and the last supper is believed by some to be a Passover Seder. European names still use this root for what they call Easter; in Spanish it is Pasqua, the French call it Paques, and the Italian name is Pasqua.

Easter Myth: It's important, but not as important as Christmas

In terms of preparation, marketing, and pop culture, it's undeniable that Christmas is a way bigger deal than Easter. This might lead you to think that Christmas is far and away the most important Christian holiday. But despite Christmas's overwhelming domination of the holiday market, Easter is actually far more important in terms of its spiritual meaning. While the birth of Christ is obviously very important, it's his eventual resurrection on Easter Sunday that provides the basis of the Christian faith.

Easter Tradition: Breads

Hot cross buns and other breads marked with an X to symbolize the cross are a tradition on many Easter tables. Different sweet breads are also used all over the world. Try these: Choreg (Armenia), Paska (Ukraine), Babka (Poland), Tsoureki (Greece). Also, try a traditional Italian Easter Bread (shown above) with eggs baked right in. These are conspicuously risen breads, which may also show a desire for Easter traditions to be different from Passover, which includes unleavened breads.



Easter Tradition: Eggs

The star of Easter—painted, dyed, gilded in silver and gold, blown empty and hung on trees—is the egg. Legends abound about this symbol of life. Around the world, they are brought to church, given as gifts and hidden for the benefit of children.

Easter Tradition: When It Falls

Easter is a movable feast, meaning it changes depending on a few things. The council of Nicea 325 determined that it would occur after the full moon following the vernal equinox on the next occurring Sunday, unless this happened to interfere with Passover, in which case it should be the Sunday after that. Got it?! It can occur anytime between March 22 and April 25.

Easter Tradition: Baskets

One of the most popular Easter traditions, the Easter basket was originally more of an Easter nest. Like the bunny itself, the gifts he brings come from a German tradition as well. The Easter baskets were inspired by the concepts of fertility and springtime, just like many other Easter traditions. Children would make "nests," filled with grass, in hopes that Peter Cottontail would fill the nest with eggs. The nests gradually evolved into baskets.

Break up your clumping perennials, keeping the outermost bits for replanting or gifting.


Let some of your plants set seed. Roses especially benefit from leaving a few hips to set.


On the night he celebrates a big win, defense attorney Micky Haller is pulled over by police, who find the body of a former client in the trunk of his Lincoln. Haller is immediately charged with murder, and he can't post the exorbitant \$5 million bail slapped on him by a vindictive judge.

Mickey elects to represent himself and is forced to mount his defense from his jail cell in the Twin Towers Correctional Facility in downtown Los Angeles. Proposed Federal Electoral Divisions for WA Released

Media Release

The Redistribution Committee for Western Australia today published its report proposing names and boundaries for the state's federal electoral divisions.

The Chair of the Committee and Electoral Commissioner, Tom Rogers, said the WA redistribution was required to enable a decrease from 16 to 15 federal electoral divisions.

"Under the proposal some significant changes would occur, with the boundaries of WA divisions being amended to accommodate the decrease," Mr Rogers said.

"Fifteen of the existing 16 division names would be retained.

"The Division of Stirling would be abolished and the basis for naming the Division of Canning would be expanded to acknowledge Sadie Miriam Canning – in recognition of her work to improve Indigenous and rural healthcare in Western Australia."

Proposed boundaries

Mr Rogers said the Committee had been faced with a situation where a WA division had to be abolished and, as a consequence, 11 of the existing 16 divisions were outside the permissible numerical requirements.

The proposal would see:

- the adjustment of the regional Divisions of Durack and O'Connor, both of which need to gain electors
- the transfer of electors in 15 Wheatbelt shires from Durack to O'Connor, and the transfer of six Wheatbelt shires from the existing Division of Pearce to the Divisions of Durack and O'Connor, resulting in all WA Wheatbelt shires being included in two divisions (not three as currently)
- the abolition of the Division of Stirling and transfer of electors to the surrounding Divisions of Cowan, Curtin, Moore and Perth
- the uniting of the northern Perth suburbs of Girrawheen, Koondoola, Balga and Mirrabooka in the proposed Division of Cowan.

Sadie Miriam Canning

Sadie Canning was Western Australia's, and possibly Australia's, first Indigenous nurse and matron. As Indigenous women were barred from nurse training in WA, at the age of 19 she travelled to Melbourne to undertake training before returning to work in her home state. Following appointment to the position of Sister at the Leonora District Hospital in 1956, Sadie Canning

was subsequently promoted to the position of Matron in 1958. By the end of her first year as Matron, full integration of patients had been achieved.

In her retirement, Sadie Canning served as a member of the Council for Aboriginal Reconciliation and the WA State Reconciliation Committee, and on the board of the Australian Children's Trust. She was also a patron of the Congress of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Nurses and a consultant to the Aboriginal Affairs Department in WA.

Objections

The consultative nature of the redistribution process continues, with individuals and organisations now able to lodge objections to the Committee's proposed divisions.

Written objections must be lodged no later than 6pm (AWST) on Friday 16 April 2021. The best way to lodge an objection is online. Objections can also be submitted via:

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Don't Complain, Lodge a Complaint

Media Release

If you have a bad experience with a business, sharing your story on social media and elsewhere online might seem like a good way to warn others to steer clear, but it may not be the most effective way to have your voice heard.

Consumer laws in WA give us the authority to receive and investigate complaints against traders, before taking the appropriate action – such as an attempt at conciliation, a public naming or even potentially a prosecution in court.

It's important to remember that defamation laws extend online, meaning that anyone using social media should be careful about what they post. A split-second decision to write or share information online could become a costly move if legal action is pursued by the aggrieved party.

Our work relies on the WA community communicating with us so we can ensure traders are doing the right thing. During a recent investigation of one business, it was discovered more than 100 consumers had complained on a social media group, however only a relatively small number of complaints had been lodged with Consumer Protection.

By lodging a complaint you can help us to better target

non-compliant traders through trader engagement and proactive campaigns to prevent ongoing noncompliance. If you have been unable to resolve an issue with a trader, lodging a formal complaint will allow us to attempt to conciliate the matter for you.

This means we will talk to the trader on your behalf to find an outcome that is acceptable to all parties. This is a free service and conciliation is often the most efficient and effective way to handle complaints.

Should a mutual agreement not be possible, then other options may be presented, such as recommending an application be made to the Magistrate's Court, the State Administrative Tribunal, or seeking independent legal advice. Enforcement action may be considered by Consumer Protection where non-compliance is identified.
