Liberals Meet in Lake Grace

Lake Grace residents raised a number of important issues with senior rural Liberal MPs including Federal Member for O'Connor Rick Wilson during a visit to the town on Saturday 14th March.

Senator Chris Back, Brian Ellis MLC for the Agricultural Region and Jim Chown MLC for the Agricultural Region joined Rick Wilson and Steve Martin President of the Liberal Party O'Connor division on a fact finding visit to Lake Grace.

Local members of the Liberal Party and Lake Grace residents met with the MPs to take them on a tour of the town involving the school, the Dept of Food and Agriculture building and the current St John Ambulance building.

The MPs also have an update on local concerns which included;

- Hospital refurbishment to commence soon
- Roads, it can take up to two years to receive environmental approval due to trees
- Superannuation and what it can be used for
- · Port Access for exporting grain
- · Free trade agreements
- Federal Government Debt, currently spending \$100 million more per day than what is earned. Interest is \$30 million per day (approximately 2 schools per day or one hospital every 8 weeks)
- The Intergenerational Report
- · Tony Abbott's recent visit to regional WA
- Drought Loans are now Debt Restructure Loans
- The ministers attendance at the Newdegate Field Day

Issues discussed by those attending the meeting included:

- the long awaited Chester Pass Road upgrade
- State Government stranded assets
- WA Country Health Service and paper linen
- School buses and 4 day hostel
- Gypsum mine
- the amount of red tape especially for building
- cost transfer from State Government to Local Government and volunteers.

This was a great opportunity to speak to the Politicians both State and Federal with members of the community joining the meeting at various times as their commitments allowed, unfortunately most of the community did not take advantage of this. However if you missed the chance to talk to them there is always the Newdegate Field Day and their offices can be contacted by phone or email.

From the Archives... March

2000 - Fifteen years ago...

Building a Medical Centre

Construction of the Joint Venture medical Centre commenced this month with the pouring of the concrete slab. Builder Trevor Parsons is aiming at a completion date of June 30th with the complex becoming operational a few months later.

The Centre will house the doctors surgery, dental clinic, child and community health and allied health services (physiotherapy, occupational therapy, podiatry, speech pathology and mental health) within one facility.

Other services will include telehealth conferencing facilities and the University Rural Surgical Services with regular monthly visiting specialists. The hospital's nurse practitioners and GP will coordinate various health clinics from the Centre.

Covering approximately 400 square metres, the building will incorporate a single reception/ administration area to service all health providers within the complex. The existing entrance road to the hospital will be widened to enable dual access to the hospital and the Medical Centre.

Travellers Ignore all the Rules

Lake Grace Police were recently called to search for a family who were travelling from Boyup Brook to Norseman and were reported overdue by relatives.

Police located the family station wagon bogged 140 kilometres east of Lake King.

The family had left the car and walked toward Norseman, a further 100 kilometres away. The family were found safely after an extensive search, coordinated by Norseman Police.

Luckily when they did not arrive, the alarm was raised by relatives.

However the family failed to obey some basic safety advice. They ignored local advice not to drive on the Norseman track. They then ignored 'road closed' signs. And when the car was bogged they ignored a basic survival tip - stay with your vehicle!

The family in this instance felt that they were in no danger, however it is common to underestimate the situation when you have travelled the area before.

GRDC Recommended to Move to an Industry Owned Corporation

There have been significant changes to the Primary Industries and Resources Development Act (PIRD) and the Commonwealth Authorities and Companies Act (CAC), which govern the Grains Research Development Corporation (GRDC). These changes will reduce the GRDC's ability to deliver the best research and development for its levy payers. This is because of increased governmental compliance, reduced flexibility to partner with national and international research partners, and a fundamental inability to appoint research staff and conduct research in its own right. GRDC can only fund research; it cannot conduct research as it currently operates as a Statutory Authority.

GRDC receives 0.99% of the farm gate value of grain sold. This levy applies to 24 grains across Australia.

In the last annual report of 2013/14, GRDC received \$120 million from farmers, \$21 million from other income, and the government contribution was \$68 million (32%).

GRDC funds over 900 projects that are conducted by state based Departments of Agriculture, Universities, farmer groups, consultants and the CSIRO.

The GRDC has over \$200 million in reserve. These reserves are difficult to access as they form part of the Federal Government's budget surplus/deficit, and both the Federal Minister for Agriculture and the Federal Minister for Finance and the Federal Treasurer must approve a GRDC deficit budget. Not something that is particularly palatable in the current economic climate.

A steering committee was formed in July 2013, consisting of representatives from Agforce Queensland, Grain Growers Limited, Grain Producers Australia, Grain Producers South Australia, NSW Farmers, Tasmanian Farmers and Graziers, Victorian Farmers Federation, WA Farmers Federation and the WA Grains Group. The steering committee engaged independent consultants, Marsden Jacobs, to identify the best structure for the GRDC to deliver research and development to increase profitability to the Australian grain industry.

Submissions were called for on two occasions, and meetings were held around Australia. Marsden Jacobs found that the current structure wouldn't be the best option for GRDC's future. The Marsden Jacobs report recommended that the GRDC moves to an Industry Owned Corporation (IOC). The benefits stated in the report were that an IOC would move the GRDC away from government, allow the GRDC to be less bureaucratic, allow the GRDC to improve outcomes for growers and make the GRDC more accountable to levy payers.

Under an IOC structure the GRDC would be better able to increase partnership with the private sector. This is particularly important as state based Department of Agriculture pull out of research and development, as evidenced by what has happened in WA.

An IOC will give the levy payers (the growers) the ability to vote for the directors and the levy rate as is the case in other IOC's like Australian Wool Innovation, and Meat and Livestock Australia. The WA Grains Group (WAGG) and the WA Farmers Federation (along with every state based farmer organisation bar the PGA) both support the GRDC to become an IOC.

The Pastoral and Graziers Association (PGA) hasn't joined the steering group, (despite multiple invitations to join/attend) saying that the PGA wants a forensic audit into the GRDC and saying that the GRDC isn't delivering productivity growth in the grains sector.

Who on Earth is Ken Rogers?

Well I had to ask myself that question so since Google is on my list of friends it was time to turn to the world wide web. Now we're not talking about the 'know when to hold 'em and know when to fold 'em' Ken(ny) Rogers but rather the West Australian educated life coach who wants to help individuals and organisations adjust to change.

The Wheatbelt Business Network (see opposite page) is bringing Ken to Lake Grace. This is an opportunity for all of us to gain skills in not just adjusting to change but actively moving with it.

Ken combines substantial relevant experience with contemporary qualifications as a coach. He has over 30 years' experience working with leaders and managers across Australia as a manager, coach, facilitator, organisational development consultant, change manager and strategic planner.

He specialises in working with leaders and middle managers and has a fundamental and comprehensive understanding of the challenges of being a leader.

Mr Rogers holds a number of tertiary qualifications that

relate to management and coaching process and is accredited in the OPIC Coach@work program, which identified specific critical capabilities needed for high performance. He also has Myers Briggs Type Indicator (MBTI) accreditation. Ken uses these tools in coaching as needed.

ABC Radio - Drink Driving Chatter

I've been contacted this week by several people about recent ABC radio talk on drink driving that apparently attracted a couple of people **purporting** to be from the Lake Grace area who contacted the radio station to say that they have to drink and drive in order to have a social life.

The people that contacted me were pretty disappointed that these Neanderthal comments painted all of us in the Lake Grace Town and Shire in a bad light. I've made a few enquiries and don't believe the two male persons involved were in fact from Lake Grace.

In any event I'm very aware that it isn't the thinking or the actions of the vast majority of people in the Lake Grace / Newdegate Police Sub District despite the fact a few locals who made mistakes in this area of late were caught and charged by my officers.

Scams, Scammers, Identity Theft & Cybercrime

Just a word of warning in this area as a result of a couple of fraud offences against local people in circumstances that had me shaking my head. I won't go into exactly how the fraud / scam works but suffice to say that an offender who simply has a few details about you, e.g. your full name, date of birth, address and mobile telephone number can cause havoc in fraudulent ways that even surprised and concerned me personally. So much so that in order to protect myself I have set up a password with my mobile telephone service provider so that they will not act on any requests unless my secret password is given.

Just a reminder about a few other related matters:

Another person recently contacted me about the motor vehicle for sale scam i.e. a bogus buyer trying to get the seller to send money (pickup expenses) for the vehicle to be collected for transportation to the eastern states, saying that the full sale price and transportation will be deposited in a PayPal account for the seller.

It sounded so believable to the seller because the person gave a full name, Victorian address, Victorian Motor Driver's License Number, Email address and mobile telephone number. All false. Please remember these points:

- 1) If you're selling something don't send the so-called buyer money for any purpose;
- 2) If you've really won a legitimate lottery or a grant you won't be required to send money to someone in order to receive your prize or grant:
- 3) Don't give personal information to anyone over the telephone or on line even if they say they are from your internet provider or your bank, especially not PIN Numbers or Account numbers.
- 4) Don't send money to anyone you meet online regardless of how desperate their story sounds.

The fact is that these scammers are very confident at convincing people who prey on the emotions and/or hope of people to get you to part with your money. Sometimes they will start with a small amount in order to get a larger amount later. Very loud alarm bells must ring the moment any request is made for you to part with your money to unknown persons over the telephone or internet. Remember they scam thousands so they know what they're doing.

I also urge everyone to make themselves familiar with ACORN – Australian Cybercrime Online Reporting Network – please visit the very informative website at www.acorn.gov.au so you know what it's all about and how it works if you need it.

Bits & Pieces

Let's continue our holiday tour of New Zealand, you may have read in the last edition of the Link our fascination with scenery with the mountains and rivers being nothing short of amazing.

But it was not all nature's work that provided the highlights of 'things to see in NZ', man made attractions also gave way to things to see and do such as viewing the turbo powered electricity system and riding the gondoliers, luge and jet boats to name a few.

One attraction which was high on the list was a visit to a privately owned castle, known as Larnach Castle. This was situated just outside Dunedin on the Otago Peninsula, set in the magnificent garden surrounds over looking the water back to Dunedin.

The castle is now owned by the Barker family who have spent many years restoring the castle and surrounding garden back to something of its former glory. Their intentions are that it should always remain open for the people of NZ and overseas visitors to visit and admire.

Throughout the two hour tour of the castle the guide told of the, sometimes tragic story of Larnach Castle and its history, here is an excerpt from the pamphlet.

In 1870 William Larnach, whilst walking upon Otago Peninsula chose the site to build this splendid mansion. He was an Australian banker who came to Dunedin lured by the tide of wealth which followed the gold rush. Larnach lived in the castle with three successive wives until 1898 when he took his own life in the New Zealand Parliament. Larnach's children sold the property which changed hands several times and was twice abandoned. The ground and the castle had dwindled into disrepair when the Barker family discovered the property with its 14 hectares of surrounding wilderness

in 1976. In a leap of faith they purchased this historic property. It became their home and its restoration and development became a life's work for the family. Clearing the tangled growth and restoring the castle revealed lost features and amazing vistas.

What you see today is a wonderful historic castle. Restored in all its grandeur for people of all nations to enjoy. A must if you visit New Zealand.

And talking of Dunedin, 'What did we do on our last night in Dunedin?'. With Dunedin being the Edinburgh of the south and still with a strong Scottish heritage we celebrated 'Addressing the Haggis'.

After a lively happy hour (which they always turned out to be with 47 happy seniors) the bagpipes echoed in the gardens of the motel for one and all to assemble and march to the entertainment hall for the celebration. The haggis ceremony is a lively traditional Scottish form of entertainment honouring the immortal poet Robbie Burns and his address to the haggis in 1786.

The following is a dedication to not only Dunedin's Scottish heritage but also Robbie Burns and the haggis.

Robbie Burns, the famous Scottish poet and songwriter, observed his fellow countrymen and women turning away from their own culture to embrace that of the English and the continent, so in 1786 he took their traditional Scottish dish, the haggis, and wrote a poem addressing his concerns. The address has been likened to a highland procession with the haggis taking the role of the chieftain himself. Burns reminds his fellow Scotsmen not to turn away from their culture, this message is still just as relevant today as it was over 225 years ago.

Protect your culture, for in losing it, you lose your identity.

The arrival of the first Scottish settlers in 1848 marked the establishment of Dunedin. Originally named New Edinburgh, the name was changed to Dunedin, the old Celtic name for Edinburgh. Many of the streets and suburbs are named after those in Edinburgh. Most of our schoolgirls still wear kilts as part of their uniform. We have a Scottish shop, annual Scottish festival, active Scottish clubs, highland dance groups and numerous pipe bands. Sitting in pride of place in the Octagon, the heart of the city, is the fine statue of Robbie Burns, the uncle of one of the Founders, the Reverend Thomas Burns.

Road Accident Statistics for the Wheatbelt

Taken from the Office of Road Safety website

The statistics on this page relate to the 10-year period of 2004-2013 and are restricted to KSI or serious crashes unless otherwise specified.

*restricted to KSI or serious crashes that are attended by the WA Police

Snapshot of Wheatbelt region statistics (KSI = killed or seriously injured)

- Number of people killed or seriously injured (KSI): 180 in 2013; 2,155 from 2004-2013
- Most common crash type: Single vehicle hitting an object (53%)
- Most common crash site speed zone: 110 km/h (61%)
- ♦ Seat belts not worn: 10% of KSI*
- Speed was a contributing factor in the crash: 18% of KSI*
- Serious crashes where the highest driver/rider
 BAC in the crash was 0.05 g/100ml or over: 12%
- Males: 55% of KSI
- ♦ 17-24 year olds: 23% of KSI

Overview of Statistics

- 180 people were killed or seriously injured in the Wheatbelt region in 2013.
- 2,155 people have been killed or seriously injured in the last 10 years (2004-2013) in the Wheatbelt region. Taking into account the population, this equates to a KSI rate of 297.4 per 100,000 populations. This is the highest rate in Western Australia.
- ♦ These KSI were a result of 1,311 single vehicle crashes and 310 multiple vehicle crashes.

Crash Types

- It is not widely known that most of the fatal and serious crashes that occur in the regional areas of Western Australia involve only one vehicle which has either run off the road and/or collided with an object or rolled over.
- ♦ 53% of fatal and serious crashes involved a single vehicle hitting an object (excludes animals).
- 23% was due to non-collision single vehicle rollover or run-off-road.
- ♦ 61% of fatal and serious crashes occurred on 110 km/h speed zones.
- 5% occurred on roads with speed zones of 50 km/h
- 4% occurred on roads with speed zones of 90 km/h

(Note that 22% of crash reports did not provide the speed zone.)

Behaviours

- Seat belts were not worn by 10% of vehicle occupants killed or seriously injured*.
- Speed was a factor in the crashes of 18% of people killed or seriously injured*.
- At least one driver/rider with a blood alcohol concentration (BAC) of 0.05 or higher was recorded in 12% of fatal and serious crashes*. At least one driver/rider with a BAC of 0.08 or higher was recorded in 11% of fatal and serious crashes*
- Fatigue could be responsible for up to 30% of deaths and a bigger percentage of serious injury crashes.
 - Because fatigue is difficult to measure, it is under represented in police crash data; however research indicates that up to 30% of crashes involve fatigue.

ILLEGAL DUMPING OF RUBBISH

The Shire would like to remind people to ensure they have a secure load when taking rubbish to the tip. Rubbish is being found along the road, possibly flying off trailers and utes or from illegal dumping. Illegally dumped rubbish is not only ugly but can also leak contaminants into our soils,

Littering is an offence and can result in a hefty fine.

Below is an extract from the Littering Act 1979

23. Littering, offence

waterways and natural habitats.

Any person who deposits litter, or causes litter to be deposited, on any land or on or into any waters commits an offence unless the litter is deposited —

- (a) on private land by consent; or
- (b) in an appointed area; or
- (c) in a place or receptacle set aside or provided for that purpose; or
- (d) on land adjacent to private land by arrangement with, or at the invitation of, a public authority with a view to the litter being collected and removed by the public authority.

Penalty:

- (a) for an individual, a fine of \$5 000;
- (b) for a body corporate, a fine of \$10 000.

The Shire recommends that all loads are covered with netting or appropriate covering to prevent rubbish from flying or falling off.

SOIL HEALTH

Let's focus on the underground! Catherine Kelly, Hollands Track Farm Newdegate W.A

Introduction

When mallee was chained and cleared at Hollands Track Farm in the 1960s, a bag to the acre of super/ copper/zinc/molybdenum was applied to the soil in the first year of cropping. Farmer, Malcolm Kelly observed that even though after the first year of cropping,60 lb of urea was applied per acre, crop yield was reduced from the first year. What Western Australian new-land farmers did not know, was that the symbiosis between bacteria and mycorrhizal fungi and the pre-existing bush, sustained the life of plants. The clearing and burning which took place had already begun to destroy this relationship and new relationships which were needed between cereal crops and the soil were inhibited by the application of fertilizers.

Reduction of artificial fertilizers, herbicides and pesticides will aid the implementation of sustainable farming practices, to grow more nutritious food.

Conclusion

Eliminating synthetic fertilizers, herbicides and pesticides greatly reduces the cost of inputs. Ian and Di Haggerty of Dowerin have reduced the cost of their inputs to \$57 a hectare, and grow crops to equal or better their neighbours.

Farming in the Western Australian wheat belt becomes environmentally and economically sustainable.

National Soil Conference 2014

The National Soil Science Conference at the MCG in Melbourne last November was a great gig for Malcolm and me, despite the cost! I was aware that we were the only farmers there and we were given an enthusiastic welcome. The patron, Penny Welmsley, ex-governor of Queensland, honoured us for attending in her opening speech.

We went because a paper I submitted on soil biology and farming practices was accepted to the conference as a static poster (see left), provided I attended. Always keen to get the word out about restoring soil health, we enjoyed re-establishing links with icons of soil biology like Professor Lyn Abbott from UWA and meeting both incoming and outgoing presidents.

It soon became clear that food security is a big concern for these scientists, but the time honoured biological solutions are only on the fringe of understanding for most - unlike Mike Wong from the CSIRO who acknowledged what he is learning from Western Australian farmers! A lot of the work being done by PhD students is familiar to farmers, who read the results in their journals.

Much closer to home, on Tuesday, 24th March, Dr Christine Jones, internationally renowned ground cover and soil ecologist, is speaking about restoring soil health at Kojonup. Nick Kelly is a supporting speaker, talking about the application of principles to broadacre farming, thereby lowering wheatbelt debt and addressing a multitude of other environmental concerns.

Protecting Australians' Savings Accounts

Media Release

The Coalition Government is delivering on its commitment to protect the savings of Australians through improvements to the way that unclaimed money in savings accounts and life insurance policies is managed.

Federal Member for O'Connor Rick Wilson said the Coalition Government is restoring the time bank accounts and life insurance policies can be inactive before they are transferred to the government from three years to seven years.

"This change reverses the changes made by the previous Labor Government in 2012. When Bill Shorten was the Minister for Financial Services he saw that hundreds of millions of dollars in thousands of accounts were transferred to the government," Mr Wilson said.

In 2012/13, 156,000 accounts worth around \$550 million were transferred to ASIC as a result of the change made by Labor.

"Mr Shorten's overnight cash grab caused distress and confusion for account owners, and in some cases real financial hardship when people found they could not access their accounts due to the sudden change in policy."

Under the changes announced by the Government, childrens bank accounts will also be exempted from the unclaimed money arrangements to ensure funds put into these accounts will never be transferred to the Government. This recognises that many people choose to put money aside for their children's future.

The Government is also making changes to protect the privacy of individuals that do have genuinely inactive accounts that are transferred to ASIC to address concerns around identity theft and to stop unscrupulous people from preying on vulnerable Australians.

There is currently around \$700 million in lost bank accounts and life insurance policies.

Australians can access information about unclaimed accounts, free of charge, through the ASIC MoneySmart website at www.moneysmart.gov.au

The changes to unclaimed money arrangements will provide greater certainty and fairness, as well as cut red tape, saving business and individuals \$36 million per year in compliance costs.

The changes will apply to the next unclaimed money deeming date of 31 December 2015.

The New Flu Vaccination and Some Interesting Facts About It

Flu vaccine stocks for the public immunisation program in Australia have been delayed for more than a month as manufacturers scramble to replace two of the strains contained in the 2014 vaccine.

People usually have two or three months to get round to getting their shot because we usually don't see bad flu until June/July. But the message this year will be: don't hang around- book an appointment with your GP as soon after 20 April as possible - check with them for a suitable date when they will have the vaccines in.

This year's trivalent seasonal vaccine, to be available from after 20 April, will contain two influenza A strains. H1N1 and H3N2-like virus, as well as the B/ Phuket/3073/2013-like virus.

Professor Van Buynder, a health spokesman for Influenza Specialist Group, said H3N2 was the culprit in the bad US winter.

We think that the delay in getting the vaccine here, due to us changing its content, means that we're going to have a vaccine that is very well matched to the virus strains that are going to arrive here. Meanwhile the TGA announced last week that for the first time three new vaccines will be available on the private market: Fluarix Tetra (GSK), Fluquadri and Fluquadri Junior (Sanofi Pasteur). Professor Van Buynder cautioned that these three types only give you a second strain of B virus and they are not helping against H3N2 or H1N1. It will be wise to wait for the vaccines that are being prepared to protect us against all the strains as mentioned above.





How to see the Easter Eclipse

This Easter there's a total eclipse of the Moon and you won't need a telescope to view it.

Unlike solar eclipses, lunar eclipses are perfectly safe to watch with the naked eye.

A total lunar eclipse occurs when the Sun, Earth and Moon are all in a straight line in space with Earth in the middle.

Earth blocks out the light coming from the Sun and what we see is Earth's shadow move across the face of the Moon.

On Easter Saturday, 4 April the total lunar eclipse begins at 7.54pm and ends at 8.06pm (Western Australian time). The direction to look is east.

There's a special Easter Eclipse event on at Old Perth Observatory on Saturday, 4 April 2015. A great fun family evening out under the stars.

Do you know why the date for Easter changes every year?

Easter Sunday is always the first Sunday after the full

Moon, following the March equinox. It's a bit of a calculation and here it is explained further.

An equinox is when Earth's axis isn't tilted toward the Sun one way or the other and the hours of night and day are almost equal in length. March's equinox is on or around 22 March every year.

This year, the March equinox is on the 21st. The full Moon after this date is on Saturday, 4 April and therefore Easter Sunday is the following Sunday which is 5 April 2015.

Jupiter, the Moon and giant red star Betelgeuse will stretch out in a line and make an impressive sight at this year's Astrofest.

The popular annual event coincides with Earth Hour and includes a variety of activities including telescope viewing, guest presenters, space domes, exhibitors and much more.

Along with their strong religious beliefs, the Scottish settlers brought their passion for education. The first university in New Zealand, the University of Otago, being opened in 1869. Just as important to the Founders was their heritage, this being graphically demonstrated with the traditional Haggis Ceremony. Dunedin has evolved its own lively, ritualistic and colourful Dunedin Haggis Ceremony performed by Piping Hot Haggis.

After a lively thought provoking and entertaining ceremony we were each presented with the traditional bottle of scotch whiskey and certificate to show our involvement with the tradition. Then to the dining room to not only taste the haggis but enjoy a hearty meal before calling it a day so we could prepare for the next day of our tour.

Farewelling Dunedin we travelled through the spectacular Balclutha and Gore areas to Te anua Gateway to the Fiordland and Milford Sound. The 121 kilometres stretching from Te anua to Milford Sound has earned World Heritage Highway status for its overwhelming beauty and scenic vistas. This included lush lakeside forests, rugged mountains, cascading

rivers and waterfalls. One mountain was too tall to go over so a 1.5km tunnel has been excavated to allow passage to Milford Sound where we boarded the tour boat for a cruise on this magnificent fiord.

The fiord is 16km in length; it's famous for Mitre Peak, a pyramid shaped mountain rising 1692 metres straight from

the deep fiord. Although scenic flights are available the grandeur of Milford Sound can best be appreciated by boat. Trips pass unusual geological features such as Lion Mountain, the Elephant and Copper Point plus many towering water falls. The Bowen fall drops 160 metres to water, the Stirling Falls 146 metres. Fur seals, dolphins and the occasional fiordland crested penguin can be seen along the way. A truly memorable cruise on a fantastic lake.

Leaving the fiordland we travelled onward to Queenstown for a two night stay. Back to the man made excitement with included thrills that only a jet boat ride can give.

The 90 minute ride fills you with unforgettable thrills of speed, spins and exhilaration as you speed across three waterways in one of the worlds most stunning locations. Firstly the twin engine jet boat roars across the crystal clear lake Wakatipu at breathtaking speed, surrounded by majestic mountains and mesmerising scenery, zooms under the Kawarau Dam onto the deep green waters of the Kawarau River, with loads of thrilling 360° spins. Then the thrill really upgrades as the boat navigates the fast moving current of the narrow Shotover River. Racing up the narrow, shallow channels at speeds of up to 85kph in water that's less than 5cm deep in places. Finally you return to the pier in Queenstown, disembarking to not only see if our landlegs work but if our heart rate had returned to normal.

You'd think that would be enough excitement for one day, but it's not if you're in Queenstown on NZ's South Island. I will continue next fortnight.




Cosy night in: Rain kept club members packed inside on the night of the wind up.

Holland Track - Across Our Farm

Allan Zweck

When we took up our new land location in 1965, one of the first things to come to my notice, was that the historic Holland Track to the Goldfields went right across the property. I knew little of this track, though I found it was the 25th April 1893, when they crossed our farm, and it is said to have carried some thousands of people, and many horse teams and camel teams of provisions to the goldfields. It was a real blessing, as it gave us access through the bush, to our "new land" farm, and enabled us to drive across it to view the whole farm. Furthermore, the track gave us access to the country east of our property, in particular, to Holland Rocks tank. Development in this area was still in its very raw stages, and an alternate route to the Tank would have been more than twice the distance.

On the western side of our property, is a twenty chain wide "Road reserve" to negotiate before arriving on the farm, and the Holland Track, gave us a roadway through the reserve to our "square of bush". A few chains before this road, Holland Track took quite a sharp turn to the south eastward, and I was to learn, in time, that the reason for this was that John Holland had been searching in front of his team many miles distant for water, and though he was unsuccessful in finding any on the line of travel he wished to follow - he had found a spot where he thought, by digging, they would find water, further south from his intended course.

Holland and his team had successfully negotiated a route from Broomehill to Kuringup, via the Holland's Tank, east of Nyabing, and Nampup Spring, and other

places between. This particular "Holland Tank", was so named because John Holland himself sunk it three years earlier, in a water course, while collecting sandalwood from the area. In time it was boarded up, and over the years it was of service to many as a water supply to those who ventured that way. Their last water before venturing in to the "unknown desert", was at Kuringup Soak, a reliable source, so up until this point he was still in very familiar territory. From thereon, they had to negotiate their way through 30 miles of bush and scrubby saltbush, taking them through the Kuringup lakes district, then into "the desert". These lakes

were a sprinkling of smaller lakes that fell into line from the end of Lake Grace South to the top end of Lake Pingrup. Holland recorded that this area was the most difficult part of their whole travel, as the ground around the lakes was soft and boggy.

They had progressed past the lakes to a position we would identify as "over the Lake Grace - Pingrup road", 150 metres south of the Lake Grace boundary, and into the farm of Maroni's, when they were faced with the lack of water. Holland had to send their wagon back to Kuringup Soak to replenish their supply – to refill the 100 gallon water tank they carried, while he continued his search in the forward position for water. This exercise delayed them five days, until they were able to proceed another 14 miles, veering south eastward, (across our farm), to where Holland expected by digging, they would find water. After excavating to a depth of nine feet, they were still in dry sand, but the next day several hundred yards further on, at nine feet, they did find water in abundant supply, "in a low sandy creek between two small sand plains". Further on, they arrived at Holland Rocks, where water could also be found in carefully covered and preserved gnamma holes. Captain John Septimus Roe discovered this spot forty five years earlier on his 1848 exploration, and he called it Gnamma Holes. Holland named it Krakouer Rock, in compliment of the two brothers in his team. Years later the name was changed to Holland Rocks. The water-less soak has been "preserved" in a 105 acre reserve and is still visible, but partially filled in, with

flourishing ti-tree growing in it. The position of the viable soak is quite unknown, though thought to be in the vicinity where the track crosses Holland Tank Road.

At the time I took up my property it was still possible to go from my place to Holland Rocks on the track, in fact for a year or two, we went down that track for a water supply, which we could draw from the tank there, built in 1929 for the settlers around Lake Bryde. We needed the water for concreting to build our first shed, then home, and also for domestic use. Our first years in the district were quite wet years, and I recollect driving through a lot of water when we passed where the soak is. The Steele brothers, Laurence and Graeme, would have been some of the first of the later settlers to come across the dry soak. The "Hollands Soak Reserve" juts into one of their properties, and they recollect finding the thick rims of tinned foods and camp pie around the soak, which they believed may have been from when Holland and his team camped at the site on their earlier venture. Where the track went through a salmon patch on their land, they preserved a section of it.

The road west of our block was formed up as far as Holland Track, to service the properties adjacent, so it

was very convenient for us to gain access to our property, via the track. On my first inspection of our block, driving up the track, a Mallee Fowl was spotted, and with my camera at the ready, I captured a photo, though it is perhaps more memorable as my first venture on Holland Track. We later found a Mallee Fowl nest in the bush there. After twenty chains through the road reserve, we found the survey line which had been trimmed through the bush, marking the boundary of our property. By coincidence, where the Holland Track entered our property, it was halfway along the boundary. This fell in nicely with our plan to locate our homestead some distance further onto the farm from there. Holland Track was then the entrance to our farm for the next 36 years, until a loaded fuel truck got bogged near the Mallee Fowl nest. It was very difficult to pull the truck from the bog, so that entrance was then closed to all traffic. It was just inside the boundary at this point too, where I cleared a few acres of bush with our bulldozer. In the beginning, for eighteen months we lived at a farmhouse 20 miles away, so this spot, by "Hollands track" was our depot, where our machinery was parked up. After we had put up our burn, and had ploughed 500 acres for our first crop, a ramp was made up at the depot with railway sleepers, to stack our trace element super on - 42 tons of it, which was delivered by Southern Transport in the early dark hours of a morning. This was the normal means of fertiliser delivery since the closing of the railway at Pingrup, and the road trains were co-ordinated to back load with grain from any of a number of grain bins back to Albany.

Previous to all this, in the October of 1965, the Riches Brothers chained 1300 acres of bush, as the first part of our clearing operations. Using a very long anchor chain, and travelling very slowly, they pulled the bush down in two days, doing five laps around the area. In the summer of 1966, we put up our first burn. The burn did not go well though. Quite a few neighbours gathered to assist, and after doing a good back burn, a cold change came in from the south, and short of snuffing the fire out, it only burnt with intensity in the thicker patches. Some heavier timber did not catch fire readily, so I stayed at the scene and was able to drag branches into position where they lit up from coals, and fanned by the sea breeze, (the Albany Doctor), most of the unburnt timber was consumed. In the days following, the unburnt patches were effectively burnt.

I had made a very wide fire break, so there was never much worry about the fire getting away, although,



during the burn, a willy-willy swept up a roaring swirling fire-ball-twister heavenward. It hovered around for some time, right on the edge of the burn, twisting "fire flame" hundreds of feet high. I watched with some horror at this phenomenon, and had contemplated driving the fire truck to the scene in readiness to attempt to prevent it hovering into the bush. Before I could react, I was told of a similar incident, where the roaring whirl wind had picked up a loaded water truck, and dumped it, and a man on board had also been sucked up, and met his death in the roaring inferno. It was obvious then, that we should stay put, and we watched until it ceased.

After the burn, ploughing began, and we found the ground to be very hard, and crossing over Holland Track with our working, we found the ground to be harder still, and barely scratched it. Even the sand plain was so hard, that the new discs on the plough soon showed much wear. After ploughing, we dragged a long root chain between two tractors over the ground to smooth it and pull stumps and trash to the top, for ease of raking, and with a Root Rake, were then able to advance with the next stage of our clearing, putting the roots and trash into rows. We borrowed a "Bull-rake" to fit our dozer, which enabled us to push up huge heaps of trash, and with a fire lighter, pumped flames of burning diesel into the heaps to light them up.

With a Culti-trash seeder, and after our fertiliser had been delivered, we commenced seeding. During seeding we had light showers of rain, which gave adequate moisture to bring the crop up. Five hundred acres of crop was sown, and it covered one half of the Holland Track that crossed the farm. It was a favourable season, but difficult harvest. There were patches of good crop, but we were plagued with staked tyres and the eucalyptus mallee leaves in the sample, and overall the yield was disappointing. Though it was negligible, the portion of crop across the track was very stunted and it took a few years of workings before the track was no longer visible. On the far side of the property Holland Track skirted around a breakaway, so a small area was fenced off for its preservation, though it is now quite overgrown. Within three years, dams were sunk, fences put up and sheep were de-pastured. And so it was, in like manner, that Holland Track was cut off, and erased from the landscape on the land taken up by settlers, except for remnants across roads and reserves.
