



Tough Love Leads to Success

The name Peter Lyndon James has become synonymous with the strictest and most successful men's drug rehabilitation centre in Australia - Shalom House, in which he is the founder and CEO. Situated in the Swan Valley in Perth, Shalom House is home to hundreds of men who have hit rock bottom with their drug addiction and have come to the point of wanting to turn their life around. These are men who, through the use of drugs, may have lost their job, their home, their friends, their family and quite simply, their reason for being.

Methamphetamine use, out of all drugs in particular, can lead to horrific outcomes. Paranoia, loss of

memory, false memories, hallucinations, violent anger outbursts and insomnia are just a small number of side effects attributed to the use of this drug. Families are torn apart, friendships destroyed, lives shattered. If there ever was a drug invented designed to cause widespread devastation, methamphetamine is doing a good job of that. Dealing with a friend or family member addicted to ice, or any drug for that matter, is heart-breaking. You are no longer helping the person he/she used to be - you are dealing with the drug. And this is a drug that has no apologies for the misery it leaves in its wake. No matter how much you may beg, cry and scream for the person you are trying to get off drugs, this rarely helps. But maybe a bit of tough love can do

Alice Grace Thornton

12/12/1942 - 29/1/2019

Alice Grace Thornton was adored by the Bunbury Community for her beautiful soul, kind words, and services to sport in the region. Known to everyone as "Grace", she passed away on Tuesday, January 29, aged 76.

Grace was born in Lake Grace's Inland Mission Hospital on December 12, 1942. She was the third daughter of Jim and Anna Thornton, and was raised on the family farm alongside her nine siblings. Grace enjoyed playing tennis and hockey at Lake Grace Primary School. While boarding at Northam High School, she developed an adoration for all things sport.

Grace proudly represented the school in softball, hockey and athletics. Following her return to Lake Grace, she was employed for six years as a telephonist at the Lake Post Office. She welcomed her son, Gavin, into the world in 1963, before moving with her mum and dad to Bunbury one year later.

Her love of sport truly blossomed in Bunbury. Grace played for Carey Park Women's Hockey Club and represented the Bunbury Women's Hockey Association at Country Week. She also earned her Western Australia A and All Australia AA badges for umpiring.

But she didn't stop there - going on to participate in badminton, softball, and darts. Grace also coached

teams in hockey and softball, whilst helping young hockey umpires to attain their badges. She first played darts in 1971 at the Rose Hotel. Keen to succeed, Grace eventually went on to serve as president of the Bunbury Ladies Darts Association.

Recognised for her commitment to sport in Bunbury, she was awarded five life memberships - Carey Park Women's Hockey Club in 1979, Bunbury Women's Hockey Association (1982), Bunbury City Softball Association (1992), Bunbury Ladies Darts Association (1996), and Tigers Softball Club (1997).

Gavin played for South Bunbury Junior Football Club in 1972, before working his way up to the League squad in 1980. His mother was on the sidelines for every League game and helped out in the kitchen on Friday nights.

Grace's dedication extended to many aspects of life, including gardening, dancing, bingo, and family. She will be remembered for her generosity, determination, and ambition - helping to put Bunbury's sporting culture on the map.

Grace is survived by her son Gavin, daughter-in-law Susan, grandchildren Ashley, Bryce, Kristin, Pieta, Amelia, and Rosie, and great grandchildren Oliver, Savanna and Evie.

ASIST - An Opportunity to Save a Life

ASIST is a suicide intervention training workshop, giving the participant important skills that may assist them in saving someone's life. The two day workshop is used by professionals and the general public and was hosted by the Lake Grace Community Resource Centre last week.

Created by LIvingWorks the workshop helps caregivers recognise when someone may be at risk of suicide. It then explores how to connect with them in ways that understand and clarify that risk, increase their immediate safety and link them with further help. Over 80,000 people in Australia have attended ASIST which is available in all states and territories.

With over 30 years as the world leader in suicide intervention training, LivingWorks Education has a long and storied history. Our history began in Canada in 1983 and has featured prominently in Australia since 1995.


With more nations and organizations becoming aware of the importance of suicide prevention efforts, LivingWorks' Suicide Intervention Workshop (SIW) continued to expand around the world. In 1995, Lifeline Australia received Commonwealth funding for a threeyear field trial, and the program was subsequently

adopted nationwide under the auspices of Lifeline. Livingworks programs have subsequently featured in a range of national, state and territory initiatives throughout Australia and been adopted by many community organisations. A national network of over 250 trainers has continued to ensure a strong nationwide presence for LivingWorks programs in Australia.

In 1995, military services in Canada, Australia, and the United Kingdom also began to adopt the workshop. Other workshops that LivingWorks have developed include suicideTALK, safeTALK (has been held in Lake Grace and Varley) and suicide to Hope, esuicideTALK is available as online training. Lake Grace CRC had also hosted Rural Minds and Gatekeeper.

Due to accessing funding from the Mental Health Commission the CRC was able to offer all of this training free of charge; an opportunity that wasn't missed by the 71 who opted to get on board. A huge thank you to those who took part, who knows what a difference you may make down the track.




1. Name: Nicola Kuchling



The Only Hospital For Miles

Lake Grace Regional Artspace's opening of The Alternative Archive - The Only Hospital for Miles exhibition was a fitting testament to the conceptual rigour and aesthetic finesse of artists working within their region.

Eleven artists from Lake Grace, Dumbleyung and South Craignish contributed works to the show, curated by Tania Spencer, Michelle Slarke and Kerrie Argent.

Visitors to the opening traveled from afar, including co-curators of the John Curtin Gallery survey exhibition to follow next year (Anna Louise Richardson and Chris Malcolm) and arts-lovers from Newdegate, Denmark, Narrogin, Northcliffe, Manjimup and Perth.



what emotions can't.

Peter Lyndon James knows this story all too well. Spending 26 years in drug addiction, or, as he likes to describe it, prison, he says, "Even when I was not in prison, I was in prison. I have a saying, "You can take the prisoner out of prison, but then you have to get the prison out of the prisoner."

Lake Grace was graced with Peter's presence on 27th March, when he spoke at the sports pavilion. Previously featured on television news program, 'Australian Story', Peter's cheeky smile which shone through was a contrast to his hard hitting and confronting life story which led him down the road to drugs. This was a talk that benefits everyone, even if one does not have any close ones addicted to drugs. It's an inspiring story as you hear how Peter turned his life around from criminal activity to guiding others towards a life free of addiction.

Peter's past has seen him lead a life of criminal activity and hard drug addiction. A troubled upbringing led to time spent in juvenile detention centres in his younger years. A life of crime soon followed along with the addiction and selling drugs and guns. The audience was captivated by Peter's down-to-earth and honest approach and were given some straight-to-the-point answers when asked his thoughts about drugs, living the life of the addicted and seeking help for addiction.

The title of Peter's talk, 'Tough Love' accurately describes his approach to helping men restore their life from drug addiction. All residents must give up cigarettes if they smoke, their phone, their car keys and they have to pay their own way - Shalom House is not funded by tax payers. A working rehabilitation centre, residents must agree to work from Monday through to Friday. Available jobs can vary from plumbing to gardening to painting along with many more options. As well as teaching job skills, Shalom House also teaches decision-making skills, problem-solving, communication and anger management.

A stand out difference between Shalom House and other rehabilitation centers lies in the fact that the person needing the help must contact Shalom House themselves if they wish to become a resident - referrals will not be accepted. This ensures that help is truly wanted by the person seeking it. Each resident agrees to a minimum of a 12 month stay as they work through the five stages of the program which begins with detoxing from the drugs cold-turkey style, then moving on to mapping out a plan for their future and beginning paid work with an employer who is aligned with Shalom House's beliefs and values. As quoted on https:// www.abc.net.au/news/, Peter says: "I mean you have to be strict. I'm dealing with heroin, speed, benzos, anxiety, depression, alcohol. I'm dealing with liars and manipulators, I'm dealing with thieves.'

Peter was not afraid in informing the audience that many loved ones may actually be enabling the drug addicted. This can be either through providing money, or housing them or even something as simple as buying groceries. Most drug addicted people will not change until they hit rock bottom and realise they have no one but themselves to make the choice to change and heal their lives.

'Tough Love' is also the title of Peter's book which arms family and friends with ways in which to handle somebody on drugs. The following is an excerpt from the https://toughlovebook.com.au/ website;

"In our community and nation we have an epidemic on our hands. There's a unique drug on the street now that's destroying families at a rate like no other drug has ever done before. Meth (ice) not only binds a person up in addiction, but it changes them. The way they speak, the way they act and the way they treat those around them. Peter Lyndon-James helps people break free from life controlling issues, such as meth and other drugs, bringing them to the point where they want to change and make the decision to turn their life around so badly, that they will finally stop taking drugs."

My word, it has been a busy fortnight and the following one does not appear to be slowing down.

It all started with a visit from the **Coffin Cheaters Outlaw Motorcycle Gang** earlier the previous week. No matter what your personal opinion of these groups may be, Police policy is to ensure that trouble doesn't follow wherever they go. As a police officer I fully agree with this policy, especially when they travel and interact en mass – there's a good reason why they're called outlaw motorcycle gangs.

In this instance, a group of approximately 35 members of the gang descended on Newdegate and while there weren't any problems initially, their behaviour deteriorated later that evening resulting in Police being called to sort out several issues. The gang members moved on the following day to complete a week-long tour of the south-west but did so in the company of Police.

Operation Bluesun - which is the firearms check for those over the age of 60 - continues to be undertaken. Just when I think we are done, some of the outstations send me another 20 to check. We will also be visiting the folks at Pingrup (not our district) to assist Police from Katanning with these checks.

However, I must say that as a result of these checks I have enjoyed meeting many people from around the district and in town when I have called to visit. I've never drunk so much tea or eaten so much cake. The hospitality is wonderful.

I completed my **roadside drug twin wipe course** last week and should soon be receiving my first batch of twin wipes for use within our sub-district. Police will now be able to roadside test drivers for cannabis and methamphetamine (and derivatives) use. The law is pretty clear on drug driving and does not distinguish the different levels of impairment like drink driving (eg, excess 0.02 0.05, 0.08 and DUI) Therefore you only have to have traces of a drug in your system and it's all downhill from there.

Also just a quick reminder about **drink driving**: the allowable level for any person operating a heavy vehicle, a bus, taxi, Uber, is an L, E or P plater is ZERO.

Funny story for you - I recently assisted Kondinin Police with their Kondinin Kruisers event last week. At noon we had set up an RBT station just outside town where we stopped a woman from the Eastern States in a hire car. Gave her an RBT and her result was off the chart. She was flabbergasted and explained she did

have a few drinks but stopped at midnight the night before. As a result she was taken for an evidentiary breath test at the station which resulted in a totally zero reading from the "big" machine (that's the one that counts). After much confusion it was discovered that she was a compulsive user of a skin moisturiser that was basically made up of pure wood alcohol mixed with smellies. It was a pump pack spray and it completely interfered with the roadside test making it read positive. It was her first time in a police car and going through the back entrance of the police station (usually never a good thing) but she was most relieved that her trip back to her car was a bit better than her trip to the station. She now has several photos of the experience including the printout of the test to show her mates back East.

Fuel stealing from a business premises in Newdegate - A business premises in Newdegate was entered on Thursday 4 April around 10pm until 10.45pm. Approximately 2,000 litres of diesel fuel was stolen from a trailer tank. If anybody saw something suspicious that night around that time can you please call Lake Grace Police. CCTV vision was obtained and we're looking for a vehicle that is capable of making off with that amount of fuel.

Events coming up:

- I recently received a copy of the football fixtures for 2019 and have tried to where I can to have staff rostered on to make an appearance at the games and mingle. We encourage everyone in attendance to have a good time and look after each other if a few drinks are to be had.
- from every station will be rostered on conducting visible traffic patrols everywhere at all times. Please take your time when travelling, have plenty of stops or swap drivers. We have only had one fatal crash (last week) in the entire Great Southern District so far for the April period. The Superintendent wants to keep it this way. So do I one death is too many. And I hate doing death notifications. So keep a lid on the following:
 - ⇒ Wear your belt I have seen people use their face to remove the front windscreen while the cold beers in the esky were strapped in the back seat.
 - ⇒ **Don't drive if you've had a few** or even better bring your swag just in case.

Bush Schools are Increasing in Australia

Each week, students at a small regional school on the New South Wales mid-north coast spend a day in the bush, exploring, experimenting, creating and getting dirty

Among those who get to create games around the gum trees is nine-year-old student Chelsey. "I like that we don't have to do work on a piece of paper and we can just explore nature," she said.

The students are part of a new bush school program at the Manning Adventist School, outside Taree, one of the latest Australian schools to embrace outdoor learning. The concept has its origins in Europe where 'forest schools' have been popular for decades.

Manning Adventist School teacher Dianne Hillsdon has obtained a UK Forest School teaching accreditation and leads the program as an accredited Forest School Leader level 3 teacher.

Each Tuesday after their morning lessons, the students leave the classroom and head outdoors to learn and play on the school's large bush block.

"Because children these days are stuck inside a classroom for a long time they are fairly inactive," Ms Hillsdon said.

"They get to exercise choice, they get to exercise freedom. A lot of them play in the mud which they've never done before. We have a group of boys interested in geology at the moment so they are finding rocks to dig around in, so it's very child-directed."

Eleven-year-old student Tasman said he loved bush school. "I love that everyone gets to be free about what they choose — whether it's mud kitchen, base camp, going on bush walks or walking on a tight rope," he said.

Ms Hillsdon said even just one day a week in the bush was resulting in positive changes in the students. Before relocating to the Manning, Ms Hillsdon successfully implemented a bush school program at a Melbourne school. "It's about looking after the whole child."

Ms Hillsdon said there had also been a noticeable drop in children's anxiety. "Children these days tend to have a higher level of anxiety than probably they've ever had before, so getting children out of the classroom situation is important," she said. "So obviously the anxiety of being in the classroom vanishes when they come into the outdoors."

Calls for Funding for Local Digital Support Services

Media Release

Linkwest, the peak body for community-led Neighbourhood and Community Resource Centres in Western Australia, is calling for the elected Federal Government to allocate funding for local digital support services in WA.

Linkwest CEO, Jane Chilcott, said with the default to digital services and the associated reduction in federal agency staff, Linkwest member Centres are spending increasingly more time helping people access federal services such as MyGov, MyAgedCare, MyHealthRecord, Childcare Rebate, the ATO and Medicare.

"Many of our most vulnerable members of the community are relying on our Centre staff for support to access these Federal Government services.

"This situation is further exacerbated in rural and regional WA where there is poor internet access, no public transport and the nearest agency office can be a four hours' drive," she said.

Ms Chilcott said the current Federal Government's budget handed down last week had not considered the needs of Western Australians experiencing 'digital stress'.

"We know from recent research that one in four of the

poorest households in WA do not have access to the internet. Many Australians, including the elderly, single parents, and the CaLD community face challenges in accessing Federal Government digital services for many reasons including low digital literacy and literacy and numeracy skills."

"This is an equity of access issue, with vulnerable and rural people being excluded from online services. We need Federal Government to invest in local community organisations that can provide a dignified face-to-face support service to those who need it, with the dual benefit of providing local jobs in regional areas," she said.

Currently Linkwest Centres across Western Australia receive funding from the State Government to provide support to access State Government online services and Ms Chilcott would like to see the Federal Government follow their lead by investing \$10 million per annum across the network.

"The ability to provide support to help people access federal online services is already available through the Linkwest network.

"Our Centres are well placed to provide this support in 150 local communities and respectfully request the elected Federal Government match this support."





Protecting Australian Farmers' Privacy

Media Release

The Coalition Government will bring the Aussie Farms website under the Privacy Act, exposing it to potential penalties of more than \$400,000 if it breaches the Act. Attorney-General, Christian Porter, said the activities of Aussie Farms Incorporated created an unacceptable risk to hardworking farming communities and producers.

"The company publishes information about Australian farmers and agricultural producers including their names and addresses, exposing them to potential trespass, biosecurity hazards, and reputational damage," the Attorney-General said.

"Listing this activist group as an organisation under the Privacy Act, now means that the company will have to abide by the provisions of the Act."


Minister for Agriculture, David Littleproud, said he had repeatedly asked Aussie Farms to take the website down before someone was hurt or worse, but the group behind the website flatly refused.

"The farming families who grow our food deserve to be able to do so without fear of invasion on their property and harm to their children," Minister Littleproud said.

"The Aussie Farms website is intended to be an attack

map for activists and it is already working as one. The fact Aussie Farms refused to take the website down when invasions began happening on farms displayed on their map shows they intend for it to be used as an attack map for activists.

"Aussie Farms will now be required to comply with the Privacy Act, which includes laws against the misuse of personal information. I note the maximum penalty for an offence under the Privacy Act is \$420,000."

Flu Vaccine Program Brought Forward as Cases Surge

An unexpected surge in flu cases across the nation has prompted health authorities in South Australia to begin early distribution of free vaccines in an effort to curb the spread. There have been more than 26,000 confirmed influenza cases since the start of 2019, which is significantly higher than previous years.

New South Wales and Queensland have each had more than 7,000 since the beginning of January. But South Australia is leading the per capita trend, with almost 4,485 cases compared to 1,139 at the same time last year.

"Normally it's relatively quiet at this time of year for influenza, so this is a somewhat exceptional year," World Health Organisation flu specialist Professor Ian Barr said.

Distribution of the free vaccine for people aged 65 years and older has already started in South Australia, while distribution for children under five and all other eligible groups started on Monday.

"The winter demand management strategy — I've never heard of it being released before Easter," SA Health Minister Stephen Wade said. "About 90,000 South Australian children will have access to a free flu vaccination through the state program."

More than 1,000 influenza cases have been reported in South Australia in the past week alone.

"While it's not possible to predict the severity of a flu season, it's important the community remains vigilant," SA Health disease control expert Dr Louise Flood said.

Aged care outbreaks and deaths linked to flu

For many sufferers, the flu causes moderate symptoms that ease after a few days, but for others it can lead to severe illness and sometimes even be fatal. A young child died in Victoria last month due to what health authorities have labelled one of the biggest summer outbreaks of flu the state had seen.

During January and February there were also seven deaths reported to NSW Health — all associated with influenza outbreaks at aged care facilities.

"We've had one death so far this year ... and we've had 12 outbreaks in aged care facilities," Dr Flood said about the situation in South Australia.

"I would urge everyone to contact their GP or immunisation provider to get a flu shot, especially those in high-risk groups such as young children, people aged over 65 and pregnant women, who can get vaccinated for free."

Dr Flood said people with existing medical conditions and Indigenous Australians are also considered at higher risk.

The federal Health Department said vaccines would be made available through the National Immunisation Program from mid-April, "subject to local distribution arrangements".

Researcher 'shocked' by summer start to season Immunisation Coalition chairman Professor Robert Booy, who is a researcher at the University of Sydney, said several states had begun rolling out their own vaccination programs.

"New South Wales has also been releasing free vaccination in recent weeks, so they too are doing it early," he said. "It is a shock, it definitely is a real surprise. We weren't expecting it."

Distribution of free vaccines to GPs and others providers is also currently underway in Victoria, while authorities in Queensland have also begun urging locals to get vaccinated.

Professor Booy said the early surge in cases began in the tropics at the start of summer, and may be being driven by global trends and tourism.

"It's gone all the way down the east coast of Australia and the numbers have continued to increase for the past three months," he said.

"We can only conclude that we're getting a lot of infection back from overseas.

"We had such a quiet flu season last year that we didn't build up much immunity to the new strains, so immunity to previous strains has waned."
