Colour, humour and creative energy were all on show on Saturday night as Lake Grace was treated to the inaugural *Art 2 Wear* event. Local performers paraded more than fifty spectacular wearable art garments to an enthusiastic audience as the finale to National Youth Week 2005.

Lake Grace students and adults have been creating costumes since December last year and fashioned the garments to the themes of Kaleidoscope, Myths and Dreams, Warrior and 100% Recycled. The costumes – beautiful, dramatic and imaginative – showed new and unlikely uses for flywire, can tops and packing straps. Hand-made armour, supermarket special tickets and sheep tags reflected the occupation and wit of the makers.

Art 2 Wear is part of Lake Grace Artists' Group's annual program which aims to bring a diverse range of cultural experiences to their community. The Art 2 Wear exhibition, showcasing costumes from the performance, will run from 15th – 30th April at Lake Grace Multi-Arts Centre. continued pg 6



Tenterden Fire DVD Launched at Bushfire Forum

Five powerful stories of survival from the fatal 2003 Tenterden Bushfire were launched today on DVD by Emergency Services Minister Michelle Roberts.

Speaking at the Fire and Emergency Services (FESA) annual Bushfire Forum, Mrs Roberts said the DVD would be used as an education and training tool for regional and semi-rural residents throughout the State.

"Each of these rural women were at different levels of preparedness and their experiences with the fire vary markedly," Mrs Roberts said.

"Their recollections are gripping and poignant. The fact that they all made different decisions about how to survive the worst bushfire seen in that district in a quarter of a century, makes for compelling viewing."

Two of the women, Andrea Mengler and Anne Parsons, who featured in the DVD also attended the Forum.

"Perhaps the most important message to come out of the DVD is to have a plan in place in case this happens to you," Mrs Mengler said.

The forum drew together more than 200 personnel involved in bushfire management round the State to focus on how the WA firefighting community can continue to perform at the highest standard and identify areas for improvement.

A keynote address by Mr Andrew Lawson, Assistant Chief Officer of the South Australian Country Fire Service, focused on lessons learnt from the fatal Wangary bushfire that cost the lives of nine people on the Eyre Peninsula earlier this year.

Mrs Roberts said that the Forum theme, "Striving for Improvement Together", carried extra resonance in light of the demanding bushfire season experienced in Western Australia this past summer.

"The Pickering Brook bushfire was a remarkable achievement of co-operation and skill by everyone involved, particularly considering that despite burning some 27,000 hectares of bushland, nobody was seriously injured and no homes were lost," Mrs Roberts said.

"In terms of fire service commitment, more than 1,400 staff and volunteers from FESA, Local Government and the Department of Conservation and Land Management (CALM) were involved in the huge response effort."

The Minister also highlighted the importance of WA's aerial firefighting support capability.

"Countless times throughout the summer Helitac water bombing aircraft helped to knock bushfires down early, minimizing risk to life and limiting or preventing property damage," she said.

"In fact, the four Helitacs contracted to the metropolitan area saved more than \$25 million worth of property around Perth this past bushfire season. This is a remarkable achievement for both the Helitacs and the fixed wing water bomber's.



OBITUARY

Leonard Russell Eggers 15/04/1916 - 8/04/2005

Russell Eggers: Husband and Dad, Grandpa to 11 and great grandpa to 11. Born in Wagin on 15th April 1916. Russell's family moved to Lake Grace when he was a young boy.

As young men Dad and his younger brother Owen went to Mandurah on holidays, where he met this lovely young woman on the tennis court. It became a love match that lasted nearly 63 years. On the way home from Mandurah he ate some tomato sandwiches which he blamed for making him sick, but the story went that he was lovesick.

When war (WWII) broke out Dad joined the army, got engaged to Mum and three days later was shipped out to Palestine in the Middle-East for 18 months. As kids he would tell us many funny stories about his time there but would never mention the bad things. When he returned home he married Mum on the 12th May, 1942 at St Barnabas Anglican Church in Carlisle. He had to be back at camp by noon the next day. Three days later he was shipped out to a place called Roma Falls, which a few years ago I had the privilege of visiting and was able to see what was left of his old barracks. He spent 19 months in New Guinea. While there he was thrown off the back of a truck, badly injuring his back. In later years another accident on the farm resulted in Dad having a major operation, the doctors told him he would be in a wheel chair by the time he was 50-55. He was 80 before he needed the wheel chair, just goes to show his fighting spirit.

After the war, Mum and Dad tried a few different things and places, eventually settling back on the farm at North Lake Grace where they had four children. As kids growing up we have lots of happy memories of Dad, he was a kind, gentle and loving father and husband. Mind you, the sheep yards weren't our favourite place to be with him as his patience with sheep was very low. If he came in from the paddock and us kids had upset Mum we would also be in trouble.

Dad loved sport and always made sure we could get to tennis, he got the tennis club going out at the Jam Patch. Another great love was dancing, so we always went to the balls around the district. Us girls always felt proud to dance with him. Another big event was when Slim Dusty came to town, we always went. If there was a circus in town you could be sure we'd be there as Dad loved circuses. We had lots of holidays in Albany, Busselton and Bunbury, usually with some of the cousins.

Dad was never a man to stress over things. His motto was sort things out and move on with life. He used to say if you're down, pick yourself up, dust yourself off and move on. He never held a grudge or carried ill feelings. He was known to like a good argument, if there wasn't one, he would make one.

In 1978 Dad and Mum sold the farm and retired. They spent many wonderful years travelling around Australia with the caravan. Every May they would set off and head north to Exmouth playing bowls along the way. They would spend many hours with their friends walking along the beach collecting shells and fishing. Dad has a room full of shells and rocks at home to prove it. Around September to October they would pack up and head home with a couple of freezers full of fish and lots of stories to tell about the great times they had, always looking forward to next years trip.

They also had a few trips overseas and caught up with long lost relatives in the United Kingdom.

When Dad reached around 78 they decided not to go on long trips anymore as Dad's legs weren't the best, so they settled for a few weeks at Mandurah in their holiday house. Dad bought himself a gofa so he could still get around to the shops which he enjoyed. We all loved to shop with him as he would wait at the dress shop, if you couldn't decide on something he would just say get them both. Mum and I sometimes had a hard job keeping up with him.

Eventually he needed another operation on his back so was flown to Royal Perth Hospital. He spent the next six weeks there and was then sent to Bentley Rehab for a couple of months. From here he went into Lake Grace Hospital where he spent the last seven years of his life with Mum by his side everyday.

The Lake Grace hospital staff did a magnificent job caring for him and he always gave them cheek and a laugh every day.

We as a family would like to thank them very much.

We are all going to miss you Dad and your cheeky little grin.

NO SPLASH

Here's a Zen-like question. If a drop of liquid falls on a flat surface and there is no air around it, does it make a splash? The answer, which may or may not help you reach nirvana, is no. Physicists in Chicago, said this was a surprising result to an experiment. This means you could not make a splash on the Moon. The physicists were trying to measure the energy of liquid droplets flying away from splashing drops of alcohol. To eliminate any effects of air, they carried out the experiment in a vacuum chamber, where they could reduce the air pressure within the chamber from the standard atmospheric pressure of about 1 bar down to 10 millibars. They found that the lower the air pressure, the less the liquid splattered. The splash disappeared when the air pressure reached about 0.2 bar.

MORE QUAKES TO COME

For the people of earthquake-ravaged Sumatra and much of south-east Asia, the worst may be yet to come. That's the message from seismologists who say that the 8.7 quake could be the first in a series triggered by the earthquake in December which had increased the risk of another large earthquake along the Sunda fault off the coast of Sumatra, where the India tectonic plate is subducted beneath the Burma plate. A geophysicist likened the Sunda fault to a zipper that is gradually coming undone as each earthquake transfers stress along its length. Not every underwater quake generates a tsunami. A tsunami is generated by a sudden change in the seafloor, if an earthquake doesn't break the surface it won't generate a tsunami as seen with the last guake when there was only a small wave. (Nature, vol 434, p 291).

MASTER OF DISGUISE

IF YOU are using your arms to disguise yourself as a coconut, how do you flee without being detected? The answer, when you have eight arms, is use six for camouflage and two to walk across on the sea floor. Two species of octopuses have been spotted defying the notion that you need muscles attached to a rigid skeleton for bipedal motion. The octopuses walked across the seabed using the strong, flexible muscles in their back arms when pursued by camera-wielding biologists. "Kinks" move down the arms involved in walking as the animals move, and an analysis of their gait shows it qualifies as true walking. The two species have slightly different strategies. Octopus marginatus from Indonesia wraps itself into a ball while walking, perhaps to imitate a coconut rolling with the current. Tiny octopus aculeatus from Australia holds up six of its arms to disguise itself as

seaweed, while walking at up to 14 centimetres per second-faster than it can manage with several arms. (Science, vol 307, p 1927).

ILLEGAL LOGGING

The US spends \$3.8 billion a year on imports of illegally logged timber according to the Environmental



Investigation Agency, making it the world's biggest consumer of plundered wood. Efforts by countries such as Indonesia to curb illegal logging have so far been scuppered by corruption and organised crime. Despite imposing a ban on timber exports, 79 per cent of Indonesia's logs still go abroad.

KING OF THE SKIES

The bar-tailed godwit wading bird is now the record holder for the longest non-stop flight at an epic 11,000 kilometres from Alaska to Australia or New Zealand. They have staging posts at Japan and China but fly 8000 kilometres, making this a new record. The Arctic tern makes a 40,000 kilometre round trip from pole to pole but can rest on water. The godwit is a land wader and doesn't have this option.

CHALK, NOT MICE

The vast sums governments spend buying computers for schools might be better spent on hiring more teachers and more books. That's the conclusion of a team in Munich, Germany, who looked at the academic results of 100,000 15-year-olds in 32 countries. Frequent use of computers makes no discernable difference to students' academic performance. The team suggests that



computers may be displacing more effective chalk-and-talk teaching methods, and using up cash better spent on books or teacher training. (Report at the Royal Economic Society in Nottingham, UK).

SETBACK FOR ALASKA

RESERVE

A long-running campaign to allow oil exploration in Alaska's Arctic National Wildlife Refuge scored a victory on 16th March, when the US Senate reversed its position on the plan and voted in favour. Supporters argue that the estimated 6 billion barrels of oil in the reserve is needed to boost the economy and cut the US's reliance on imports. (New Scientist 26th March)

O'Connor Seniors Urged to Start Surfing the Seniors Portal

The Hon Wilson Tuckey MP today urged O'Connor seniors to make the most of the Internet with the launch of the new, revamped Australian Government Seniors Portal – www.seniors.gov.au – the one-stop Internet site for older Australians.

"This site, dedicated to the needs and interests of people aged 50 plus in our local community, is an excellent reason for local seniors to log on to find out more about government and non-government services and benefits," Mr Tuckey said.

The new Seniors Portal, launched recently by the Federal Minister for Ageing, Julie Bishop, includes concise, user-friendly information for older Australians from over 290 government and nongovernment agencies, relating to health, finance, aged care, rights and specific programs for seniors.

New interactive features include:

A Living History segment which enables site users to submit their own recollections of an event that shaped our nation – the first event featured is the 1964 Beatles tour of Australia;

An *Events Calendar*, which provides information on local community events of interest to seniors;

The *Meeting Place*, a discussion board for hobbies and other leisure interests; and

The Q&A Forum which enables older Australians to

discuss online a wide variety of topics with experts.

Wilson Tuckey said many older people had missed out on workplace training in information technology, and may find it a bit intimidating. But he said those who made the effort were finding it had great benefits.

"The Seniors Portal for example can save you endless hours of walking or phone calls to different offices, to get the information and advice you need," Mr Tuckey said.

A survey by the Australian Bureau of Statistics found that in 2002 only about 20 per cent of people aged 65 years or over were using computers - less than half the number of 20 to 54 year olds. However, the proportion of over 65 year olds using computers had doubled between 1998 and 2002, and older people were spending more than other age groups on goods and services purchased on the Internet. But only a small proportion of seniors access government services via the web.

"I encourage older residents in O'Connor to take the plunge, click onto the Seniors Portal, and tell their stories of the times which have helped shape our nation through the Living History segment."

Australian Parents Struggling with the Reading Test

A Newspoll survey of Australian parents has found that almost half do not read to their children on a daily basis. The Newspoll survey commissioned by the Dymocks Foundation, a not for profit organization targeting children's literacy. The Foundation is launching "Read to Your Child' which is aiming to significantly increase the numbers of parents who read aloud to their children.

This campaign could not be more timely given the results of the Newspoll study. The survey found that almost two thirds of Australian parents said the main reason preventing them from reading more to their child is that they didn't have enough time. It also revealed that one in three parents of children aged between 1 and 4, read for an average of 10 minutes or less per day.

Dymocks Literacy Foundation Advisory Group Member, and renowned children's author and literacy expert Mem Fox, described the results as disturbing. "Australian parents have admitted that they would like to spend more time reading to their children and they are worried about it" she said.

A body of international research now tells us that reading aloud to your child is the most important thing you can do for their reading success. All children aged between 0 and 5 must be read to a minimum of 10 minutes a day, yet nearly one in three are saying they read less than this.

"Given that the ABS reports Australians on average watch 2 hours of television a day, spending less than this across an entire week reading to your child will be an investment in their future," said Mem Fox. "This is a critical age group where we either instill a love of reading or face a generation suffering the effects of poor literacy skills including lower chance of success at school, and higher rates of unemployment and welfare dependence. The clear message from this survey is that parents believe they simply don't have enough time to devote to reading aloud to their children."

Half of the parents who responded to the survey said they wanted to spend more time reading to their children. With literacy emerging as a key issue facing educators and parents, pressure is coming from the children themselves with almost two thirds believing their children would like them to read even more to them.


"The fast paced lives we lead has emerged as a key factor in determining the amount of oral education in the home" said Mem Fox.

Perhaps not surprisingly one of the issues that was highlighted in the Newspoll study is that people who work full time don't do as much reading as those who work part time or don't work.

It may come as a surprise but income is not a factor in determining how important reading is. Eighty per cent of all parents, regardless of their income, agree it is essential for parents to encourage their children to read. However the kind of jobs people were employed in did make a difference. Interestingly parents from some blue collar households found more time to read to their children than their white collar equivalents. 22 per cent of those in blue collar households took time out to read more than once a day, compared to 14 per cent of white collar workers.

Gender also makes a difference, women spend more time reading to their children than men. Six in ten mothers read at least once a day to their child, compared with just 4 in ten dads.

Lake Grace main street will soon be the site of a permanent flock of merinos thanks to the On the Sheep's Back project. Project artist Rhys Tonkin visited Lake Grace last week to plan the final phase of the public art project with coordinators Tania Spencer and Michelle Slarke. While in town, Ms Tonkin worked with secondary students to design and paint the Art 2 Wear sets.

Welcome to Night Watch for the fortnight from midnight Friday 22nd April to midnight Friday 6th May. Remember Astronomy is looking up.

On Sunday there is a partial eclipse of the Moon from moonrise at 5:28pm and will be slightly red to around 8pm.

Our local star, the Sun, resides in the Constellation of Aries at magnitude -26.72.

The full Moon is on Sunday at 5:56pm at magnitude - 12.0 with partial eclipse. On Wednesday 27th the Moon will be 0.7 degrees north of the red star Antares (small finger at arms length). The Moon on Friday 29th will be at perigee (closest), at 5:50pm at 369,029kms distant. The last quarter Moon will be at 2:14pm on 1st May at magnitude -6.0.

Mercury low down in the morning sky, rises at 4:27am in Pisces. On the 6th May Mercury rises at 4:41am and about 3 degrees south of the Moon (two fingers at arms length).

Venus, in Aries sets around half hour after the SUN at magnitude -3.8

The red planet, Mars, rises in the morning night sky around 1am in Capricornus at magnitude +0.6. On Wednesday 27th April, Mars will have moved into Aquarius, where it will be 3 degrees north of the Moon on Monday 2nd May.

On Saturday, Jupiter, at magnitude -2.4, will be 0.6 degrees north of the Moon in Virgo and sets in the early morning western sky around 4:30am and is the brightest light in the night sky besides the Moon.

Saturn in Gemini sets at 10:37pm on Saturday and at 9:50pm on May 6th at magnitude 0.0.

The blue/green coloured gas planet Uranus, in Aquarius, rises at 2:24am on Saturday, at magnitude +5.8. On Tuesday 3rd May, Uranus will be 3 degrees north of the Moon (two fingers). Uranus rises at 1:36am on Friday 6th and can be seen by naked eye but better with binoculars.

The grey/green planet Neptune, rises at 12:39am in Capricornus at magnitude +7.9, and will be 5 degrees north of the Moon on 2^{nd} May (3 fingers at arms length). Binoculars needed. Neptune rises at 11:45pm on Friday 6^{th} .

Pluto at magnitude +13.8 in Serpens Caput rises at 8:55pm on Saturday and at 8:03pm on 6th May and a large telescope is needed and patience with a good knowledge of the night sky.

The Moon is in Virgo on 23rd, 24th and 25th. Libra on 26th. Scorpius on 27th. Ophiuchus on 28th. Sagittarius on 29th and 30th. Capricornus on 1st and 2nd May. Aquarius on 3rd and 4th and Pisces on 5th and 6th.

METEOR SHOWER: Eta Aquarids, may be seen on Thursday morning 5th May in Aquarius at around 60 meteors per hour between after 3am in the Eastern sky if they occur in our part of the sky.

For angular measurement > at arms length > small finger = 1 degree. Thumb = 2 degrees. Clenched fist without thumb = 10 degrees. Fully spread out hand finger to thumb = 20 degrees.

For telescopes this fortnight the giant red spot (storm) on Jupiter can be seen at 7:17pm on Saturday 30th, 9pm on Monday 2nd May and 6:30pm on Thursday 5th. The red spot is only in view for about an hour.

On Saturday 30th Jupiter's moon Europa reappears from eclipse at 7:04pm, IO transit face of planet at 7:45pm, and the shadow at 8:21pm and is visible for about an hour after start. On Tuesday 3rd May the moon Ganymede transits at 7:46pm until 10:25pm.

Comet 9p Tempel is in Virgo near the orange star Vindermix which is north of Jupiter at magnitude +9.8 and a telescope is needed. This comet is the one that on July 4th a 372kg impactor spacecraft will slam into it at 10.2kms per second and gouge out a crater and also have a telescope on board as well as a wide angle multiband camera and also a spectrometer.



As part of the National malleefowl population monitoring program, the Malleefowl Preservation Group will be coordinating two bush camping surveys over the coming months. These surveys will determine malleefowl population densities in the southern pastoral and Nullarbor coastline regions of Western Australia.

Biodiversity survey highlights threats from salinity

The State Government has released the findings of one of the largest and most comprehensive biological surveys of Western Australia's farming areas.

Releasing 'A biodiversity survey of the Western Australian agricultural zone' in Perth, Environment and Science Minister Judy Edwards said the survey results presented major advances in understanding biodiversity and a significant boon in the fight against salinisation.

"This survey marks a major milestone in the State's biological survey program that began in the early 1970s," Dr Edwards said.

"The systematic survey was undertaken by the Department of Conservation and Land Management (CALM) and the WA Museum, in collaboration with the University of WA and the University of Adelaide.

"It was part of the State Salinity Strategy and aimed to determine the threat of secondary salinisation to terrestrial and aquatic biodiversity as well as increase our understanding of the biological richness of this 250,000sg.km area."

The Minister said the survey was conducted over four years from 1997-2001 and involved sampling more than 1,000 terrestrial and wetland sites across the Wheatbelt by multidisciplinary teams of scientists.

"The results highlighted a number of important findings for biodiversity management and provided an enormous amount of new information about the area's ecosystems," she said.

"Before the survey began, only 11 species of the threatened flora occurring in the agricultural region were known to have at least one population at threat from salinity, and one species was considered likely to disappear without remedial action at a landscape scale.

"The survey revealed that in fact about 450 flowering plants and 400 spider, scorpion and aquatic invertebrate species were at risk of extinction from salinity.

"In addition to species extinctions, all remaining remnants of many valley-floor wetland, shrubland and woodland communities could disappear because of salinisation."

Dr Edwards said the survey also confirmed the importance of the region as a centre of species richness despite the level of threat posed by

salinity and the high degree of habital fragmentation.

"Twenty-five new invertebrate species and six new plants were found during the survey, and many more species are awaiting scientific description, including a new family of crustaceans," she said.

"Overall, 30 per cent of aquatic and 50 per cent of terrestrial invertebrate species found have not been formally described by science, indicating the significant knowledge gaps that remain about our biodiversity."

Dr Edwards said these significant findings would serve to better inform the community about biodiversity values in WA's agricultural zone and how they were being affected by salinity.

"Not only does the survey provide new knowledge, it has given us an indication of the urgency in better managing these areas against salinity and in protecting and enhancing WA's lifestyle and environment," she said.

"It will help guide other actions under the State Salinity Strategy including fostering the development of tree crops, establishing natural diversity catchments and in providing assistance and advice to private landholders."

The Minister said 'A biodiversity survey of the Western Australian agricultural zone' was funded by the State Government as part of the State Salinity Strategy, and was part of an ongoing program of regional surveys to document the State's biodiversity components and patterns and determine conservation status.

"The publication will be an invaluable tool for the entire natural resource management community and has been produced with an accompanying CD, so that the survey data can be made widely available," she said.

Dr Edwards acknowledged the work of CALM, the WA Museum, UWA and the University of Adelaide in undertaking the survey and also the support of the former State Salinity Council and the current Natural Resource Management Council.

'A biodiversity survey of the Western Australian agricultural zone' has been published as part of the records of the WA Museum, Supplement No. 67.

Choice of superannuation fund starts 1 July

Many employees will soon have the right to choose the superannuation fund into which their employer superannuation contributions are paid.

The 'choice of superannuation fund' initiative starts on 1 July 2005.

Employers will need to check whether they have employees who are eligible for super choice and give these employees the opportunity to choose a fund.

The Tax Office's Deputy Commissioner of Superannuation, Mark Jackson, said the choice of superannuation fund initiative is being supported by an extensive whole-of-government education campaign.

"The first step for employers is to determine who is eligible for choice of superannuation fund," Mr Jackson said.

Generally, employees will be eligible if their superannuation contributions are paid under a Federal award or their superannuation contributions are not covered by any award or industrial agreement.

Employees are generally *not eligible* if they receive superannuation under a state industrial award or agreement, an Australian workplace agreement or a certified agreement. In addition some public servants and some members of defined benefit funds are not eligible for choice of superannuation fund.

Employers then need to provide a *Standard choice form* to eligible employees by 28 July 2005.

"If an employee decides to choose their super fund, the employer has two months to direct superannuation guarantee contributions to that fund," Mr Jackson said.

A guide is being sent to all employers to help explain what they need to do. This 12-page booklet, *Choice of superannuation fund – guide for employers*, will be accompanied by copies of the *Standard choice form*. Employers can expect to receive the guide and form by mid to late April. A website, www.superchoice.gov.au, and information line, 13 28 64, are available to provide help and support.

Mr Jackson said the advertising component of the education campaign will begin shortly using television, radio and print media.

"The media campaign will focus on helping businesses and employees to understand what choice will mean for them, and what employers need to do to meet their obligations."




Graeme and his wife thoroughly enjoy living and working in Pingrup. They love how the hockey, netball and football all play at the same venue, creating a great family atmosphere.
