Local Lad One of the Best



Lake Grace local, Mitchell Morton, joined Australia's best juniors on the road to AFL football when he competed in a three-test International Rules series against the Irish national youth team over the Easter period

The Australian team is represented by the Australian Institute of Sport's AFL Academy – a group of 30 players selected from the AFL Under 16 National Championships.

Coach Terry Wheeler said the series was an integral component of the program to develop the next crop of players into the AFL.

"The three-test series is part of a 12-month scholarship to prepare the players for AFL football. The 10 days of the tour were as close to the intensity and demands expected of current professional footballers as we could make it. We were representing Australia, which is a unique opportunity in our game and carries

a great degree of expectation in how we conduct ourselves and how we perform." Wheeler said.

The series came down to a nail biting finish last Thursday evening at the Fremantle oval. On Easter Thursday at the Gabba in Brisbane, Ireland after a brilliant opening term held on to beat an improving Australian team by 22 points but the Australian team rebounded to win the second test at the MCG in Melbourne on Easter Sunday by 3 points.

After a very sluggish first half in the Perth decider, Australia found itself 25 points down at half time but rallied magnificently in the third quarter to be just 7 points down at 3/4 time.

Wheeler said "At that stage there was nothing left for the coaching staff to do, it was down to the character of the Australian team to find something to finish the series off with a win."

Local squad member, Mitchell Morton had been an excellent player for Australia in the first two tests but his moment arrived at Fremantle. With seconds remaining in the game, and Australia down by two points, Morton won the loose ball 40 meters out from goal and under immense pressure kicked the ball 'over' the bar for 3 points to put

Australia in front for the first time in the match; but the siren had sounded. A nervous 5 minutes of consultation between the umpires and match referees concluded that the siren had sound a split second before Morton kicked the ball and that the 'over' be cancelled.

Wheeler could only praise his young charges, "What a finish and what an effort from Morton, he really gave us something through that second half. To be beaten by half a second is certainly disappointing but there is a lot to like about the young men who represented Australia today."

Later that evening Morton was announced the winner of the Ron Barassi Medal for the best Australian player throughout the series. Morton, who is in line to be the first player drafted to the West Coast Eagles under the father-son rule, now joins an impressive list of Barassi medallist who have gone on to play at the AFL level;

In Remembrance

William Oliver enlisted on 9th December 1916, completing less than 2 months training before setting sail on 'the adventure of a lifetime' on January 29th 1917. A private in the 19th reinforcement 28th battalion 7th brigade, William undertook more training upon arriving in England before being deployed to France.

My Dear Mother,

Just a few lines to let you know that I am still alive and in the best of health up to now. We are still on the ship. I am writing this during the trip ready for when we arrive in England, which should be on March 29th. We left Fremantle on January 29th. When we left the harbour we put out to sea for about a mile and then stopped till 8 o'clock at night. Then we pulled the anchor up and were under way. It was a sad day for some of the boys.

30th January - there was nothing doing, some of the boys were sick.

31st January - still nothing doing.

1st February - passed a mail boat at seven in the morning but have seen nothing else except the boys going up to feed the fish.

2nd February - sick myself and feeding the fishes so care about nothing.

3rd February - still sick, sent two boys to hospital.

4th February - still sick, but a little better, but still feeding the fishes and swearing.

5th February - am feeling better and have stopped feeding the fishes so that is something. There is nothing to do and nothing to see. It was like this till....

14th February - and we saw land, and if you had only seen us you would have thought the boat had a lot of mad men on board instead of Australian soldiers. It was about ten in the morning when we saw land and we did not get in to harbour till four in the afternoon. It was 5 o'clock before we got ashore and then we were marched up to the town and then we were dismissed till eleven that night when we had to fall in at the boat. That was our first day in Durban.

15th February - We had to stay on the boat till eleven o'clock then we went and had a look around the town. I did not like the buildings in Durban as well as in Australia.

16th February - Up very early that morning but we did not go ashore that day as we were leaving in the afternoon. The only thing the boys could do was watch the natives loading the boat with coal and it was very funny to watch them. The only thing I did was to eat five apples - I only had nine that day. It was four o'clock before we got underway for Cape Town.

17th February - Same old tale, nothing doing - some of the boys got sea sick again.

18th February - Passed a coal boat and at midnight we passed a mail boat so we were on the right track.

19th February - We had the general alarm that meant for us to get our life belts and get to our boats and we had to stand by for about an hour before we were dismissed and then at night our ship was all in darkness. This is the night that our boat was supposed to have been sunk off the coast of Africa, but as you can see we are still alive.

20th February - Saw land again and we arrive at Cape Town about four in the afternoon but we could not get into port till the next morning.

21st February - About nine when we went into harbour and then we marched up to the town and were dismissed till eleven that night. Through the day we visited some of the Government buildings and they are very fine buildings. At night I was invited out to tea by a lady of Cape Town and had a very good time. I was invited out again the next day.

22nd February - I was taken for a motor-drive up around the hill so I will try and tell you about my day in the hills. The first place we went to was the Lions Head and this is about a thousand feet above the town. Form there we went along to the Twelve Apostles and then down in to Camps Bay. We stopped there for about an hour and we had a swim and after that we were invited to afternoon tea. After that we went on the Sea Point and so completed a circle back to where we started from.

23rd February - Still in Cape Town visiting government buildings, I am sending you views of all the places that I went to see. Was invited out by a Mrs Patterson of Cape Town for the evening and we had a nice time and a really good tea.

24th February - Still in harbour. Invited out for the day by a Mrs Anderson and she took me for another drive. I cannot describe these views but you will see for yourself from the postcard.

26th February - Still in harbour but have no leave as we are leaving Cape Town this evening. Although we are glad to be getting on our way, for myself I am sorry to leave Cape Town as it will probably be a long time till I see it again. We are leaving Cape Town as a convoy. There are six troop ships, each of us carrying four 7 inch guns and the battle ship carrying six 6 inch guns and four sharp shooters; so the Germans would get

hell if they came with six miles of us.

27th February - At sea again and it is very hot as we are off the coast of Africa and making for Sierra Leone.

28th February - Saw a mail boat but we did not like the look of her at first so the crew was ordered to stand at their guns, ready for action. We were told to stand by ready in case something should happen. As this was the second scare we have had we now have to wear our life belts both day and night. We have now spent our first month on the old Miltiades and she is not a bad old boat.

1st March - There is nothing happening and so we try and make our own sport and we had to keep this up till the...

9th March - We saw land again. This port was Sierra Leone and we stopped there for two days but were unable to go ashore. We were very disappointed but the natives were allowed to come along side and sell us fruit. There were coconuts, pineapples and bananas. The bananas were very big, some of them were nearly two feet long.

11th March - We are on our way again so our next port of call will be our last one - Plymouth Docks and I will not be sorry to get there.

12th March - There is very little news - just sixteen days still we see the English coast.

22nd march - We have had one man die since we left. He died of fever, he was a married man and leaves a wife and six children waiting for him in England.

25th March - We are just two days from Plymouth. We passed an English convoy last night of five ships and they were going to German East Africa. But by the news that we have received this last day or two I don't think that we will see much fighting as I think that the war is just about at an end. The Germans are retreating every day now on the Western Front.

26th March - We are not far from land and I shan't be sorry to feel land under my feet again. We have just picked up our escort. There are five battle ships and they are each carrying 12 inch guns so the Germans can come as soon as they like and we will give them hell. They would have fifty guns to fight against.

Before I finish Mum I will tell you something of life on board ship. For breakfast we get steak, for dinner we get soup and roast beef and on Thursdays and Sundays we get plum duff. For tea we get butter, cheese and jam and when we are on guard duty we get coffee at nine. I have done five guard duties but this last fortnight I have been

mess orderly. We get a bob a week per man and we have sixteen in our mess so I get seven bob a week as there are two of us on the job. We have Tom O'Loughlan and Roy Williams from Dumbleyung and also the two Fullers from Kukerin but they are not with our unit now.

I hope that you are receiving all the letters and postcards that I have sent you and that you are receiving the allotment that I left to you, as if you are not I would be sorry, as I know you will need it. I am sorry that I did not leave you another shilling a day as I will not want it when I leave England. Have you been getting any letters from Alf¹ or Les²? Did you get a letter from a girl in Perth after I left? She promised she would drop you a line. Did you receive the photo from Blackboy Camp Studio? There were a few photos and one large enlargement of the three of us. There was fifteen shillings to be paid on them, I would have sent them but I did not have the money.

I suppose you will be thinking about the cropping soon, I hope you get a ten bag crop as I will want a tenner from you when I get home at Christmas time. It is very cold and raining now although the sea is very calm. We have had a really good trip, the weather has been so good that I have been wearing short pants ever since we left Fremantle. Did Bert Rose go back into Blackboy Camp? I did not see him before I left. I am going to finish telling you.....(damage/age/wear and tear has made the latter pages of the letter unreadable).

William survived but suffered ill health throughout the campaign due to the appalling conditions and exposure to mustard gas. Following Armistace Day on 11th November 1918, the arduous and long winded task of shipping the Australian soldiers home began. The sick and wounded were returned first, William disembarked on 12th February 1919 and was discharged on 29th March 1919, long after his predicted view of 'being home by Christmas'.

Alf and William both met their future brides while overseas, Les was engaged to an English girl at the time of his death. Annie Cottle (William's future wife) was a cook in the British Army stationed in France.

- 1. Alf survived WW1 and lived until 27th November 1954.
- 2. Les Oliver was 'grievously wounded with no hope given' at Passchendaele (Flanders) during an allied offensive against the Germans in October 1917. Shipped back to England he died on 5th November 1917, and was interred in the Brookwood Military Cemetery outside of London.

Welcome to Night Watch for the fortnight from midnight Friday 23rd April to midnight Friday 7th May.

On May 5th there is an eclipse of the moon, starting from 1.51am to 7.10am. Also in the early night sky still are the four

early night sky still are the four planets Venus, Mars, Saturn and Jupiter along with the moon.

Our local star, the sun, is in Aries all fortnight. The moon on Saturday rises at 10.47am and setting at 8.37pm, is at apogee (furthest) at 405,403kms distant in Gemini.

On Thursday 6th, the moon will be at its first quarter phase at 1.22am and rises at 1.51pm at 393,200kms distant.

The full moon is at 4.23am on May 5th in Libra at 360,100kms in the eclipse, rising at 6.52am and sets at 5.44pm.

On Thursday 6th, the moon is at perigee (closest), at 359,811kms in Ophiuchus and rises at 8.07am and sets at 6.30pm.

Mercury, in Aries, rises at 5.42am in the morning twilight Saturday morning, and at 4.48am on May 7th around 1.0 magnitude.

Venus, in Taurus, sets at 7.46pm on Saturday and sets 2 minutes earlier each night. On Sunday 2nd May, the star will be at its greatest brilliancy of –4.5. On the 5th, Venus will be at its furthest point at declination +27° 49".

Mars, also in Taurus, sets on Saturday at 8.17pm and sets 1 minute later each night, and is 2 degrees south of the moon on Saturday.

The giant gas planet Jupiter in the constellation of Leo, sets around 2.30am in the morning sky. On Friday 30th, Jupiter will be 4 degrees south of the moon and at –2.2 magnitude.

The ringed planet Saturn at magnitude +0.1 in Gemini, sets around 9.30pm, setting 4 minutes earlier each night. Saturn will be 5 degrees

south of the moon on Sunday.

Uranus, rises around 2am in Aquarius at magnitude 5.9

Neptune at magnitude 7.9 rises around 8.43pm at magnitude 13.8 and a large telescope is needed to see this.

There are three comets in the night sky, with Comet Neat (2001 g4) at magnitude +2.1 is in the southern constellation of Dorado (the Swordfish) and is starting to swing north moving towards Canis Major. Comet Linear (2002 t7) is in Pisces at magnitude +2.0 is also moving towards Canis Major through Cetus. Comet Linear (2003 k4) is in the constellation of Vulpecula (The Fox) at magnitude +9.7 and is moving towards Cygnus (The Swan) in the early morning end of the Milky Way.

The moon is in the evening sky all this fortnight.

Remember the transit of Venus across the Sun is on Tuesday June 8th from 1pm.

To find the constellation of Gemini, look where the moon is on Monday night as it will be near the two brightest stars of Pollux and Castor.

Did you know:

- 1. Approximately 19,000 Australians die every year from diseases caused by smoking.

Enrolling to Vote

A local government election is to be held for the Newdegate Ward of the Shire of Lake Grace on Thursday 17 June 2004. You may be eligible to be enrolled to vote at the election if you reside in or are an owner or occupier of rateable property in the Newdegate Ward.

Residents

You are automatically enrolled to vote if you are on the State Electoral Roll as at 5.00 pm, Wednesday 28 April 2004. If you are not already on the State Electoral Roll and meet the eligibility criteria, or if you have changed address recently, you must complete an enrolment form.

Enrolment Forms - Residents

Electoral Enrolment forms are available from the Shire of Lake Grace, all post offices, all Australian Electoral Commission offices or the Western Australian Electoral Commission. They must be completed and returned to any Divisional Returning Officer of the Australian Electoral Commission in Western Australia by 5.00 pm, Wednesday 28 April 2004.

Non-Resident Owners and Occupiers

If you enrolled after 16 March 2001 you do not need to re-enrol.

If you are a non-resident owner or occupier of rateable property in the Newdegate Ward of the Shire of Lake Grace and are on the State or Commonwealth electoral roll, you are eligible to enrol to vote but must submit an *Enrolment Eligibility Claim* to the local government, as enrolment is not automatic.

A non-resident owner who was on the last Newdegate Ward local government roll continues to retain that status as long as the rateable property to which the enrolment relates is owned. Occupiers do not have continuous enrolment and should contact the Shire of Lake Grace to confirm their enrolment status.

If you are not on the State or Commonwealth electoral roll and own or occupy rateable property in the Newdegate Ward of the Shire of Lake Grace, you may still be eligible to enrol to vote. Please contact the Shire of Lake Grace for details.

A body corporate that owns or occupies rateable property may nominate two people who are on either the State or Commonwealth electoral roll in respect of a residence outside the electorate.

Enrolment Forms – Non-Resident Owners and Occupiers

Enrolment Eligibility Claim forms can be obtained from the Shire of Lake Grace and must be lodged with the Chief Executive Officer by 5.00 pm, Wednesday 28 April 2004.

Sustainable Development

WHEATBELT Area Consultative Committee Executive Officer Lisa Shreeve has been chosen to attend the United Nations 12th Commission on Sustainable Development (CSD-12) in New York from April 19 to 30 as Australia's youth representative.

Ms Shreeve will be one of 20 Australian delegates to attend the conference, which will focus on water, sanitation, housing, construction, development co-operation, finance and planning, as well as the environment.

Around 4000 delegates from around the world are expected to attend CSD-12, working together to pave the way for effective policies to be implemented nation wide.

Wheatbelt ACC Chairman David White said sustainable development is critically important because many of the most important policy challenges facing the planet require a central focus on sustainability and development.

These include: long-term climate change; industrial policy; extreme poverty; public health and infectious disease in a global economy (e.g. SARS and AIDS); science, technology and education policy; global demographic change (ageing,

population growth in poor countries, urbanisation, global migration); gender and development; urban growth; the threat of massive species extinction; ecosystem functions (e.g. extreme water stress in the Middle East or the arsenic in the groundwater of South Asia).

"A key focus of CSD-12 will be on Agenda 21, the programme for further implementation of Agenda 21 and the Johannesburg Plan of Implementation for sustainable development which all local governments worldwide are working towards adopting," said Mr White.

"Lisa will be able to bring back some of these key learnings to the Wheatbelt to pass onto our 44 LGAs."

The Australian Government Department of Agriculture, Fishery and Forestry is sponsoring Ms Shreeve's attendance and participation at the conference.

Ms Shreeve will return via Canberra to present key points from the conference to the 56 ACCs around Australia at Old Parliament House on April 29.



Skeleton Weed Season 2003/04 (Lake Grace Shire) *It's not over yet!*

In the week leading into Easter one new infestation was reported, a very healthy plant was found at an existing infestation during GPS activities and two infested property owners reported vigorous rosette growth.

With the summer rains through the Skeleton weed areas of the Lake Grace Shire i.e. Mount Sheridan, Varley and Lake King this should come as no surprise. Infested property owners would be well advised to spend some time monitoring their sites. Time spent on surrounding paddocks could also prove to be a good investment.

Code 1 paddocks searched by contract – 4290 ha Code 1 paddocks searched by landholders – 1000 ha

Code 2 & 3 paddocks searched by landholders – 12980 ha

Total area searched under Department surveillance program – 5800 ha (2 new properties found).

Total area searched in the Lake Grace Shire – **24,070 ha.**

Thank you very much for the effort this season. I'm sure those people farming in the non-infested areas of the Shire will be encouraged to hear that those with Skeleton weed are working very hard to prevent the spread of the plant and to eradicate it from their properties.

As with most things, it's not all beer and skittles, and there are a few who could lift their game but, overall it's very encouraging. A gentle prod is usually met with an apology and the requirements adhered too shortly thereafter.

Keep looking, the seasons not over yet! And that means those of you in non-infested areas too!

Trade Directories Warning

Consumer Protection was contacted this week by a Local Member's office after they had received queries about advertising notices that began arriving in fax machines in and around the Mukinbudin district. It seems that a number of community groups, farmers and businesses had all received the same of approach.

Faxed advertising notices like this have come in waves over the years and the WA Department of Consumer and Employment Protection has issued repeated cautionary warnings. At a national level, Section 64 of The Federal Trade Practices Act specifically prohibits corporations from "asserting a right to payment" for the "making of an entry into a directory" when no such service was authorised.

Some commonly used tactics that small business operators need to keep an eye out for are:

INTERSTATE ORIGIN: these approaches almost always come from outside WA, as this will hinder any action launched by state government agencies due to jurisdictional limitations.

LOOKS OFFICIAL: the document itself will carry a degree of authority and look "official". They are

often formatted to look like a standard invoice or statement.

IT'S GOT MY NAME: credibility is added when some details of the target business are included. (Even though this information can easily be copied from a phone book.)

RUSH! RUSH!: a short response time is calculated to place the recipient under pressure to make a rushed decision.

WARNING! WARNING!! Any unsolicited approach of this nature, particularly from an unknown source originating from outside of WA, should always be treated with suspicion.





SCIENCE AND STOFF

Lifeless oceans: the worlds oceans contain 150 dead zones virtually devoid of life. Pollution is to blame, as excessive levels of nutrients such as nitrogen trigger blooms of algae that consume most of the oxygen, suffocating other species. The largest of the dead zones covers 70,000 square kilometers according to a report released by the United Nations Environment Programme.

Dry Quakes; the puzzle over what causes earthquakes deep beneath the earth's surface has ended and loss of water is to blame. High pressures and temperatures at depth prevent the brittle failures causing most quakes. At less



extreme depths, quakes can also be caused when the water is squeezed out of hydrated minerals, increasing the total volume and ramming up the pressure so that the rock cracks. Below this depth, the higher pressures compress the water so much that when it is squeezed out, the total volume of the rock drops. Under these conditions, the rock should flow without breaking. When samples of rock were squeezed, it was found that at pressures equivalent to between 70 and 400 kilometres down, faults formed as the water squeezed out, suggesting that dehydration is the culprit after all. (Nature, vol. 428, p.545)

Comet Hale-Bopp secret;

Comets contain antifreeze. It might sound unlikely but Hale-Bopp, which shone spectacularly in our skies in 1997, is about 0.25° ethylene glycol according to the Paris Observatory. It is



the most complex organic molecule ever identified in a comet. It is the third most abundant organic molecule in the comet after methanol and formaldehyde, though that's still too little to melt the comet's icy core even at it's closest approach to the sun. The discovery supports the theory that comets delivered organic molecules to earth, helping life get started. They will know more with Rosetta on a mission to visit a comet which left in March. (Astronomy and Astrophysics letters, in press)


Greenhouse Surge; Carbon dioxide has reached record levels in the atmosphere. Levels rose by about 3 parts per million over the past year—far faster than the 1.8 ppm annual average for the

past decade. This could be just a blip, but some scientists suspect increases in fossil burning in Asia, particularly China, could be to blame. (From Mauna Loa Observatory in Hawaii)

Close Encounter; Hot on the heels of Sedna, the most distant object ever discovered in our solar system, has come the passage of the closest. On the 18th March an asteroid about 30 metres across passed within 42,000 kilometres of earth, around one tenth of the distance to the moon.

Did you know? If a comb is passed through dry hair perhaps a million million electrons leave the hair and stick on the comb. Nevertheless, the comb is almost neutral. For every extra electron it has

acquired the comb has a million, million neutral atoms. It is fortunate for us that the object in our macroscopic



electrical attraction would draw the comb back so

violently that it would be a dangerous weapon.

If an apple is magnified to the size of the earth, then the atoms in the apple are approximately the size of the original apple.





Acting on the advice of Greek astronomer Sosigenes, the Julian Calendar of three 365-day years followed by one of 366 days was introduced in Rome by Julius Caesar in 46bc. As a result of changes to make the seasons correct, the year 46 had 446 days, making it the longest year on record.

Glass blowing was introduced in Syria around 50bc.

The Good Wife's Guide Housekeeping Monthly 13 May 1955
