Wildflower Watch

It is the perfect time of year to see an amazing display of banksia growing along our roadsides. *Banksia sphaerocarpa* or Round Fruited Banksias are a standout from Kukerin to Lake Grace, and on to Newdegate. They are currently prolific around the Tarin Rock area and east of Lake Grace from the Rifle Range bush reserve to Beenong Road.

Banksia sphaerocarpa or Round Fruited Banksia is a large, rounded, sprawling shrub, growing to 2 metres tall and 2-3 metres in width. I recently saw some old plants that were at least 4 metres wide. This species has soft yellow ballshaped flowers that gradually mature through to gold then to reddish-brown. The flowers have a strong honey

perfume and grow directly on the branches. Their soft needle-like foliage is a bluish-green colour and surrounds the flowers.

The flowers are followed by the development of the seed pods - hard, knobby balls that usually stay on the plant, waiting for a fire before they open their cases to release seed.

Banksia sphaerocarpa is just one of the 36 species of banksia found in our Shire. Like all our beautiful wildflowers, they are to be left where they grow. Please enjoy their beauty but do not pick them.

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

Why are Hollow-Bearing Trees Important?

What are Hollow Bearing Trees (HBTs)?

Tree hollows are cavities formed in the trunk or branches of a living or dead tree. Hollows are found in older, mature trees.

They form as a result of wind breakage, lightning strikes, fire and/or from consumption and decay of internal wood by fungi and insects—primarily termites.

Where are they found?

Hollows are mostly found in old eucalypt trees, and are rare in many other native and introduced species such as wattle and pine.

- Small hollows can take 120-150 years to form. Their narrow entrances are suitable for small animals, such as the Eastern Pygmy Possum
- Medium hollows can take over 200 years to form. These are favoured by animals such as Leadbeater's Possums and Swift Parrots
- Large/deep hollows are only found in old and overmature trees (deteriorating, dying or dead). They're occupied by Glossy Black Cockatoos and other larger birds such as Masked Owls



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Large, old HBTs are generally more valuable to hollowusing animals than younger HBTs, although these are important as a future source of hollows. Very old mature trees like River Red Gums Gums, Jarrah and Marri Trees (two to three centuries in age) provide a dynamic supply of different-sized hollows that suit various species, supporting ecosystem diversity and abundance.

Who lives in them?

In Australia, 303 native wildlife species rely on hollows to nest, breed, shelter and feed. This includes 31% of native mammals and 15% of native birds. Each animal species has its own requirements in terms of hollow size, location (branch or trunk), tree species and surrounding vegetation, which affects how a hollow is used.

How do they help threatened species?

Many Australian native forest species rely on very specific hollow types to be able to breed and take shelter from native and introduced predators. These species are now threatened (or becoming so) because of a lack of appropriate hollows.

Threatened species or species of concern that rely on hollows to survive include:

- Swift Parrot (Critically Endangered, Tasmania—for breeding/nesting season)
- Leadbeater's Possum (Critically Endangered, Central Highlands, Victoria)
- Superb Parrot, Powerful Owl and Greater Glider (Vulnerable, Eastern and South-Eastern Australia)
- Carnaby's Cockatoo (Endangered, South-West Australia)
- Yellow-bellied/Fluffy Glider (Vulnerable, Queensland and NSW)
- Western Ringtail Possum (Critically Endangered, South West WA)

What are the other benefits of old trees?

Mature trees store more carbon and often provide more flowers, nectar, fruit and seeds than younger trees. They also provide more diverse habitats for insect populations on their trunks and around their roots. When HBTs collapse or shed limbs, they also provide hollow logs that serve as important shelter sites for wildlife.

So what's the problem?

The primary causes of HBTs disappearing from our landscape are:

• Deforestation: HBTs of all maturity levels are

bulldozed for urban development and agriculture, and those left behind frequently suffer from poor health ('dieback'), are blown over in storms, and have a shorter lifespan than in forested landscapes

- Logging: HBTs are felled and those retained can be burnt in high-intensity, post-logging fires or suffer dieback
- Firewood collection or pruning: This mostly happens to overmature trees, with the removal allegedly to reduce risk to surrounding human populations
- Other human-driven changes: Changed fire regimes in northern Australia lead to high intensity, late dry season burns that kill developing and current HBTs

The biggest issue outside of direct loss of HBTs is the loss of younger and developing trees that will soon develop hollows, leading to a future lack of hollows. All factors above lead to this loss of the next generation of HBTs, but this is especially an issue in logged forests where trees of 20-80 years of age are preferred by the logging industry.

This loss and lack of recruitment of new HBTs leads to either:

- a complete lack of hollows
- not enough of the right type of hollows to maintain a viable population of various species, or
- the hollows being in the wrong place (e.g. on infertile or rugged ridges) for the animals to also find food and water.

Why is this happening?

These trees are being lost because:

- State governments are legally enabling deforestation and logging, and subsidising logging, resulting in ongoing loss of HBTs
- The Federal Government is not enforcing national environment laws and recovery plans for threatened species, and has exempted logging from national environment laws under the Regional Forest Agreements in place in WA, NSW, Victoria and Tasmania
- There is no real protection for these trees and recovery plans (where they exist) can't be enforced to stop the threats above
- Political decision-making has ensured that destruction of HBTs is not listed as a 'key threatening process' under the Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999, leading to no Federal plan to end the activities killing them off

Why can't we just replace tree hollows with artificial nests?

Some success has been had, for some species, with replacing real hollows with artificial nesting boxes—but it's been very limited and has often failed totally. It's also very expensive as a solution, and is no justification for continuing to destroy natural HBTs.

What's the solution then?

The solution is to allow forests and bushland to become old. This requires an end to the destruction of current HBTs and restoration of forest and bushland to ensure a steady supply of future HBTs of varying ages and tree species. This should happen across the country, but priority should be given to critical habitat for threatened species, such as Victoria's eastern forests, South West WA, northern and eastern Tasmania and northern NSW/south-east Queensland.

The states won't take action on their own to end the destruction of HBTs in high conservation value (HCV) forests and bushland, so we need the Federal Government to show leadership through:

- Strong national laws that end destruction of old and high conservation value (HCV) trees, and forest management rules that protect all current and future HBTs and threatened species habitat in HCV forests
- An independent Environment Protection Authority to make sure environmental decisionmaking is independent, based on science and free from the influence of vested interests
- Development, resourcing and enforcement of a national plan to ensure a regular supply of HBTs in future (through a mix of protected areas and protection and restoration of HCV vegetation from native forest logging/deforestation)
- Support for Indigenous ranger and traditional fire management programs in northern Australia


Twenty years ago Charlie Deravin's mother went missing near the family beach shack - believed murdered; body never found. His father has lived under a cloud of suspicion ever since.

Public Health Measures to Ease

Thanks to the efforts of the WA community and based on the latest public health advice, public health and social measures will be eased to Level 1 to suit the current Omicron wave from 12.01am Thursday, March 31, 2022.

Masks

Mask wearing will continue to be required for people aged 8 years and above (and Year 3 and over in school), other than in the home.

Gatherings

- Indoor home gatherings limited to a total of 30 people, including household members.
- Outdoor home gatherings limited to a total of 200 people, with the 2sqm rule
- Private outdoor gatherings in public spaces limited to a total of 200 people.

Density and capacity limits

- 2sqm rule and a cap of 500 patrons, for two weeks only, for:
 - hospitality venues
 - nightclubs
 - convention centres or function centres.
- 2sqm rule for:
 - fitness venues
 - entertainment venues



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- galleries and museums
- places of worship
- hairdressers and beauty services
- Perth Crown Complex including the gaming floor.
- 75 per cent capacity for:
 - seated entertainment venues (forward facing), such as theatres and cinemas.
 - major stadia, such as Optus Stadium, RAC Arena, HBF Stadium (main area) and HBF Park.

Contact registration

- Checking in will only be required for higher-risk venues that require proof of vaccination.
- It will not be required at retail outlets and other lower-risk sites where only casual interaction is likely to occur.

Hospitals, residential aged and disability care facilities

- The limit of two visitors will remain per resident per day to residential aged and disability care facilities.
- There will also be no change concerning essential visitors allowed to hospitals, for:
 - compassionate reasons such as end of life
 - accompanying a child or patient with complex needs
 - birthing partner
 - carer of a person with a disability, chronic illness and frailty.

Events

- COVID Event Checklists required for events with more than 500 patrons and less than 1,000 patrons.
- COVID Event Plans required for large events with 1,000 patrons and above.
- 2sqm rule applies.

Community sport


- Indoor community sports as per venue requirement.
- Outdoor community sports are permitted with spectators.

Higher education and colleges

- Higher education remains open, with masks required indoors.
- Boarding schools remain open.

Critical worker, school and childcare settings

- These settings remain unchanged:
- Critical worker
 - School and childcare settings.



It has been a bit of a mixed bag the past fortnight, we had one person stabbed, it appeared worse than initially thought and thankfully no lasting damage to the victim.

We have assisted Kondinin with some Forensic enquires as they have been subjected to a spate of recent burglaries and enquires are still ongoing in regards to the assault incident at the Newdegate Hotel.

We have been contacted by a few parents asking what powers Police have in regards to dealing with certain juvenile behaviour.

We are guided by legislation which tells us that:

• A child cannot be held criminally responsible if they are under the age of 10 years old.

POLICE NEWS (Cont.)

• A child between the ages of 10 to 14 years old; Police must prove that the child understood that the act they were committing was the wrong thing to do, (proving they know right from wrong).

"Legislation contained in the Young Offenders Act 1994, gives police officers the discretionary power to use diversionary options when dealing with a young person who commits an offence. Instead of an arrest and subsequent court appearance, police officers can issue a formal written caution or refer the matter to a Juvenile Justice Team.

Where the matter is referred to a Juvenile Justice Team, the consultative process also includes a Department of Justice Juvenile Justice Team Coordinator and any other relevant persons. No criminal conviction is recorded against the young person if police use diversionary options.

This system gives young people the opportunity to come to the realisation that there are consequences to their behaviour and that they are responsible for their own actions".

What this means is that the Police will always look at diversionary options in the first instance, open dialogue between parties would be our first option, if you have any questions please come and see us.

TRAFFIC NEWS

In between dealing with stabbings and forensic tasks we have still managed to get out on the road conducting traffic patrols.

As the seasons start to change to hopefully some wetter weather it's a timely reminder to check your vehicle's road worthiness.

Tyres are a good place to start, they are the only contact patch your vehicle has with the road. Please ensure that you're not driving around on slicks, the legal requirement is 1.5mm depth of tread on your tyres.



Council sets aside time early in the meeting for "Public Question Time" to allow members of the public to ask questions relating to the Shire activities. The public is requested to present the questions prior to the meeting to allow the answers to be researched if necessary.

The viola is bigger than the violin with an average body length of between 15.5 and 16.5 inches for adults, compared to the violin which is between 13 and 14 inches. The viola has a deeper richer sound.

The cello is normally played from a seated position with the instrument held between the legs. The violin and viola in contrast, are held between the shoulder and the chin. They look alike, but the cello is much larger (around 4 feet long), and has thicker strings than either the violin or viola.



Looking after Ourselves in Busy Times

For farmers seeding and harvest are a couple of extremely busy times of the year. One of the most important things to consider looking after, during these times, is our most valuable resource - *us*.

Having to complete tasks by a set date imposes time pressure and this may make us take short cuts and if we take short cuts regarding our wellbeing it increases our risk factors dramatically. It is a time when relationships come under pressure, our physical health is ignored, and accidents can happen.

Research into truck crashes by the Truck Crash Research Centre based in South Australia has some thought-provoking outcomes. One of the research outcomes is that most truck accidents (more than 90%) happened on the outward-bound journey of the truck trip. We need to ask ourselves why is this? There are many reasons for this, but primarily it is a combination of being physically tired coming off the holiday break and/or mentally our headspace is not focused on the job at hand, we are not operating in the present.

What we blokes don't do well is consider the consequences of *risk taking* - it won't happen to me. Consequences are something we must live with, so in our seeding and harvest preparations we need to limit

our personal risk, and if what we're planning is an overstretch, reconsider the options.

In addition to the usual preparations perhaps we should follow the lead of other industries, such as mining and construction, where clear guidelines on safe parameters for work have been implemented.

Some things to reflect on when considering your wellbeing include::

- A well briefed work crew (often our partner and family). Keep those working with us briefed on daily activities, unfortunately with farming this doesn't happen as well as it could, which often leads to unnecessary disputes and increased tension and frustration;
- Fatigue management; limiting our working time to no more than 14 hours in a 24-hour period. Seeding might be over a relatively short period, but this work strategy should not be compromised. The only solution to fatigue is taking a break and sleeping. Getting off the tractor/machine and doing other jobs is not good enough, you need to sleep.
- Factor in regular breaks; this also reduces the impact of fatigue and increases our capacity to beat boredom, which can often lead to expensive mistakes and machine damage;
- Pre-start exercises; I would be surprised if any farmers begin a shift with some limbering up exercises. It is a known fact that this type of start to the day significantly reduces muscle injuries.
- Suitable dietary needs; how often are you eating and what are you snacking on? It is not just about good meals it is also about good snacks that are nutritious and correctly timed. A good meal is very beneficial at the beginning of a shift and a light meal at the end is beneficial in helping to promote good sleep.
- Adequate sleep; for most people this is about seven to eight hours in every 24-hour cycle. It is not possible to reduce this and still function properly. Remember this is *sleep* not just being in bed!

Seeding and harvest are hectic times of the year, a controlled and planned approach will pay dividends. Enjoy it, it is a great time.

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Summer is Over But the UV is Not

Cancer Council WA is cautioning adults in the Wheatbelt region not to be complacent with sun protection now that summer is over, with many regions in Western Australia still experiencing damaging UV levels of 3 and above.

It is important to understand that UV is different from heat, so not to base your sun protection choices on the temperature, even when it is cooler. For areas north of Perth, UV on winter days will on average exceed 3 at midday, so sun protection is needed year-round in these areas. For areas in Perth and south, the UV will be above 3 throughout autumn, but averaging maximums below 3 in June and July, when sun protection is not needed.

Skin cancers (including melanoma) are the most common cancers affecting both women and men in Western Australia. Data reveals that in 2019, almost 1600 people in WA were diagnosed with melanoma and 214 people died from skin cancer. In 2017, females in WA had a 1 in 30 chance of developing melanoma, while males had a 1 in 21 risk. In the Wheatbelt in 2019, 58 people were diagnosed with melanoma and 5 died from it.

We know people living in regional Western Australia have lower five-year relative melanoma survival, compared with people living in Perth, so we urge anyone in the Wheatbelt experiencing a skin cancer symptom to visit their doctor, clinic nurse or Aboriginal health worker.

Common symptoms of skin cancer include:

- A new spot or mole on your skin
- · A spot that is different from other spots on your skin
- Any crusty or non-healing sores
- Any spots, freckles or any moles changing in size (width), thickness (height), colour, or shape over a period of weeks to months.

It is important to know your skin and what is normal for you, particularly if you are over 40 years of age. If you notice any of these symptoms or any other unusual changes tell your doctor, clinic nurse or Aboriginal health worker. It doesn't mean you've got skin cancer – often they turn out to be something less serious. But it is important to get checked. If it is skin cancer, the earlier it is found, the greater the chance of successful treatment.

Community Reaps Grant Funding Benefit

This article was first published in 2021 and sadly no organization took up the opportunity to apply for funding, since then there has been a bumper season and the funds available have rocketed from \$20k to \$70k. Just here to remind you that there are local grant funds available.

In 2014 the Community Crop group purchased a 120ha block of land south east of Lake Grace off Willcocks road. Previous to this the Community Crop group was partly cropping the old Newdegate Research Station farm but the distance from Lake Grace meant this location was too far away to be feasible.

With a deposit being funded from the previous cropping group the land was purchased with a loan from the Lake Grace shire and paid it back over the last 6 years. Money left over from the previous cropping was also used to put our first crop in in 2014. In 2019 the Community Crop paid the last of the instalments for the loan however with finding an extra 50ha of lease land and with 2020 not being the finest season in the Lake Grace area we have not been able to start the community grants scheme until now.

The Community Crop group falls under the umbrella of the Lake Grace Development Association. An association which allows not for profit groups to operate without the extra complication of having to be incorporated, therefore minimizing the overall startup costs and time. The Development association currently has 18 similar groups under its banner.

The management of the cropping group has been from the chair Royce Taylor for the last seven years, with his trusty second in charge organiser John O'Neill and main agronomist/operations manager Grant O'Neill.

As we all know from farming in Lake Grace, we do have sluggish years, yet with the level of support and consistent donations of time and labour from our community we have been relatively shielded from the down sides of farming. All the machinery used to seed, harvest, truck, spray and spread have been donated. Many of the inputs of chemical, seed and fertiliser are subsidised with much of these costs falling back onto individual farms and businesses. These donations of machinery and inputs have been going on every year for the last seven years of this cropping program .Without any hesitation or acknowledgement, from this generosity alone we have got to where we are now.

The Community Crop community grants are now open. This year the total funding pool available is \$70,000 and the amount available each year will be dependent on the season. The grant applications form will be available from the Lake Grace CRC and we will get them back online on the Shire website as soon as possible.

The grant applications can be accessed on an ongoing basis but will be assessed every 4 months by a committee of 6 made up from the Development

Association, Community Cropping group and two more community members. They will be assessing all grants, and monies will be distributed to applications which best fit the community. This is just the first round, but the grant fund can be fully distributed in any round until the next crop comes in.

The grants are open for any community based project from small (under \$1,000) to large (\$5,000 plus). Even if you have a project coming up within the next few years but are not ready yet, a small message of expectations will also be appreciated to help the community crop grants committee plan for the future.

I can't emphasise enough that this grant fund is only possible due to the donations of time, machinery and money made to the Community Crop from the **Community of Lake Grace**.
