Angela Jackson has thrown her hat in the ring following her move to Lake Grace from Port Hedland earlier this year. Angela has two children currently enrolled at Lake Grace school - Dylan in Year 8 and Olivia in Year 6.

"I would like to become involved in something within the community and I have a vested interest with the school", said Angela. Angela moved to Lake Grace when husband. Chris. took on the role of CEO for the Shire of Lake Grace. Although not having been on a school council previously, but being involved with the P&C in the past, Angela believes her experience with schools in a number of rural regional communities. and including Narembeen, Mount Barker and Port Hedland can bring a fresh perspective to the council. Knowing the frustration that smaller schools may face when dealing with limited funds, Angela feels that her personal background in finance could be of assistance to the Council when making budgeting decisions.

Angela believes that the parents and community play an important part in the direction of the school. Having experienced positive roles that schools can play in small communities she feels that she could be of assistance in developing this outcome for Lake Grace District High School.

The School Council can have a maximum of 15 members (as is the case with Lake Grace) providing the majority is made up of parents and community members. Any recommendations put to council must be passed by a majority of those members present. Meetings are open to the public but only Council members are allowed to have a voice or vote.

Some functions of the school council are:

- To take part in establishing, and reviewing from time to time the school's objectives, priorities and general policy directions.
- To take part in the planning of financial

- arrangements necessary to fund those objectives, priorities and directions.
- To take part in evaluating the school's performance in achieving its objectives, priorities and general policy directions.
- To promote the school in the community.
- To take part in formulating codes of conduct for students at the school.

School Council President Helen McWhirter said "It is great to see the interest and that parents are taking an active role in the education of their children".

The elections will be run from 12th until 27th May. At this stage there will be opportunity to vote in person or via postal vote.

Counting of votes will be conducted by Principal Grant Draper and Council President Helen McWhirter.



LAKE GRACE RECYCLING GROUP

If you have been over to the industrial area to empty your recyclables recently, you will know that the Recycling Station has been relocated. The Shire of Lake Grace has moved the facility to Dewar Street (along side the railway line) which offers much more room and opportunities to expand the service. The Shire is investigating avenues for cardboard and paper recycling as this makes up the greatest portion of waste material going into our landfill. Lake Grace Recycling Group is still involved with the new, improved facility and encourages you to continue recycling.

LANDFILL is where most of our 'rubbish' goes. Landfill sites take up space that might otherwise be bushland or available for residential or open public space. Landfill creates problems with pollution, smells and vermin.

RUBBISH The average rate of rubbish disposal per person in Western Australia is 1.4 tonnes per year. In 1997, 3 million tonnes of solid waste went to landfill in WA. (Source: Waste Reduction and Recycling Policy, 1997)

In 2001, approximately 1100 tonnes of rubbish went to landfill at the Lake Grace tip site. The Shire estimated the collection and disposal' of this waste would cost rate-payers approximately \$44,985 in the next year. Recycling has significantly reduced the volume of rubbish and cut annual costs.

WHY RECYCLE? Each year in Australia we create more rubbish. Our population is growing, we consume more and we send yet more rubbish to landfill. Reducing waste conserves resources (eg, minerals, energy and forests), saves money and reduces impact on the environment.


Lake Grace Recycling Group was

established to address the lack of recycling facilities in Lake Grace. We are concerned with the enormous amount of re-useable and recyclable material that is dumped in our local tip.

WHAT can BE recycled?

- Aluminium cans and foil
- Steel cans
- Gable topped cartons—egjuice/ milk
- All plastic marked with a eg cool drink bottles







• Glass containers

DID YOU KNOW? The Shire of Lake Grace estimates that at least 61% of the household rubbish we throw out can be recycled. This does not include food scraps which can be composted by the householder.

Since October 2002, the Lake Grace community has collected 245 wool bales of material and 18 tonnes of glass for recycling, significantly reducing landfill. Well done!

From Farm Gate to Farm Jumper

Local shearing contractor and wool buyer Darren Spencer was one of 22 West Coast Wools clients, buyers and directors who toured wool mills in China last month, following the journey of Western Australia wool.

The group toured mills in Shanghai (where factory workers live on-site) and rural areas of eastern China including Sudewolle, the world's largest spinner which has up to 100,000 spindles operating at one time.

The mills varied in production levels and quality. At one of the first mills established in China, bales are still opened and wool re-classed to microns manually. In contrast, larger fully integrated mills such as Jinan Mingfeng Textiles Company, which imports 50,000 bales from Australia, have near new

top-making, spinning and knitting machinery allowing them to control the process from importing through to the production of garments.

One criticism of Australian wool, said Mr Spencer, was that the brand stain does not come out by scouring and has to be removed manually in the quality control process. "Don't brand your sheep unless you absolutely have to," he said.

China is the biggest buyer of Australia's wool, importing more than 50 percent of the national clip, and as the leading textiles manufacturer, returns some of that wool to Australia in the form of clothing.



Your digital certificate is your online signature - an electronic file that contains information that identifies you when using our online services. Your certificate ensures the security of your transactions and allows you to sign online documents like your activity statement.

When you register online for a digital certificate, you will need;

- > Your Australian business number (ABN)
- > Your tax file number
- > Legal name, and
- > An email address.

STEP 2


Once you've registered online, and to make sure nobody else can access your digital certificate, we will separately send you:

- > A confirmation digital certificate email
- > Your personal identification number, and
- > A CD-Rom called the *Online services set-up kit.* You should receive the 3 pieces of correspondence within 10 working days.

STEP 3

It will take about 20 minutes to install your digital certificate and you only need to do it once. If you have any problems getting started, you can ring our help-desk on the number provided in your *Online services set-up kit*.

APRIL COUNCIL MEETING

Items for consideration at last week's Council Meeting included:

Aquatic & Recreation Program - Following the success of this year's activities in Lake Grace and Newdegate, Council supports the programs and will make ongoing provision in the 2005/06 budget.

ALGA National Roads Congress - Crs Roberts & Taylor will attend the Australian Local Government Association's two day National Road Congress in Launceston, Tasmania, in July 2004.

Specified Area Rating - Council is reviewing its Specified Area Rating (SAR) Policy and looking into the application of rating in relation to the Lake King Hall Loan and the Newdegate Hall Reserve Fund.

Council agreed at last week's meeting that community consultation on the process should take place. Meetings will be held in each community with the opportunity for everyone in each town to have input and be able to comment on proposed changes to the SAR policy and to correct the application of rating in relation to the Lake King Hall Loan and the Newdegate Hall Reserve Fund.

WATCH THIS SPACE FOR A MEETING IN YOUR TOWN!

Bushfire Advisory Committee - Council received the minutes of the meeting held on 31 March 2005 and endorsed the signing of an Operational Agreement with FESA for the handover of control of bushfires at times such as the 2004 Kukerin Fire.

Lake Grace Medical Centre Lease -Council has agreed to the signing of a 21 year lease agreement with the WA Country

Health Service (Health Dept). The agreement sets out the area of the building that is used by the Health Service.

Shire Administration Centre Upgrade - Consideration will be given in the 2005/06 budget for both reserve and loan funds to be allocated for upgrade to the Shire Administration Centre.

The last renovations to the Shire administration buildings happened during 1979/80 and the offices etc are long overdue for upgrade. There is a lack of space and the public area is crowded and unfriendly plus there is a need for a disabled toilet facility.

When you think of dining in the Wheatbelt, images of a seared slow fed beef rump steak encrusted in double roasted dukkah seasoned with lake salt crust fragrantly accompanied by the delicate flavours of a Verdelho Viognier don't automatically spring to mind...but this is exactly the image Heartlands Country would like to entice you with.

Ms Newman described why this branding group was so important to the Wheatbelt. "My passion for Heartlands comes from my absolute belief that the future of our region depends on people diversifying and value adding for niche markets beyond our traditional broad acre commodities like grain and sheep".

The group's membership is certainly diverse. Since it's inception in 2001, the membership has grown to include Wheatbelt producers of olives, wine, yabbies, preserves, honey, dukkahs, gourmet beef, avocado and oils not to mention an extensive range of giftware items such as woolen doonas and underlays, soaps, cosmetic and therapeutic emu oil products.

Last week 'Heartlands' held their AGM at the Ibis Hotel, Perth to plan for the forthcoming year. Joining the Heartlands Board in 2005 is Marilyn Nicholas from 'Goonine Springs', Goomalling; Donald Cochrane from 'Wandoo Wines', Duranilin; Lia Eliades from 'Wooley World', Cunderdin; Pam Lannin from 'Sophisticake', Lake Grace and Ruth Young from 'Wyening Mission Farm', Calingiri. Wendy Newman from Dowerin retains her position as Chair while Suzanne Woods from Emdavale Farm Flour was reelected as Deputy Chair.

To coincide with the AGM, the group invited internationally acclaimed chef Bart Beek to

facilitate a workshop using the Heartlands Country products. Bart showed the members how to "present their products passionately", an essential skill for all Heartlander's whether at a trade show, pitching to a restaurateur or convincing a retail outlet to carry their product.

"People eat with their eyes, "explained Bart, "the Heartlands products I'm using here today are just fantastic. In fact, I will be taking many of these home with me to use in my commercial kitchen and studio in Victoria. The flavours, colour, tastes are all wonderful. I can't emphasise enough the importance of presentation. When you are presenting at a trade show, you have less than 7 seconds to get people to stop and take a step towards you. The skill you need as a presenter is to be able to seduce those people to stop."

And seduce he certainly did. 

Visualizing the Old Hospital

Do you remember the old maternity wing that was behind the Lake Grace Australian Inland Mission Hospital? The maternity wing, birthplace and workplace of many locals, was built in the 1930s to extend the capacity of the hospital and was joined to the main building by a covered walkway.


The Shire of Lake Grace needs your memories to draw up the floor plans of the former maternity wing, which was demolished in the 1990s. The plans will be used as reference to mark out the rooms of the maternity ward with bricks sunk into the lawn.

A Shire of Lake Grace project, Lake Grace Australian Inland Mission Hospital - The People and Its Story is developing the tourist potential of the Museum, making the site and its information more accessible to the public. Phase one of the project, officially launched by Governor John Sanderson in 2004,

included the production of a tourist brochure, interior signage and the penny pathway from Apex Park to the Museum.

The Shire has secured Lotterywest cultural interpretation funding for the second phase of the project which will see the creation of more signage and an audio work for the main rooms of the museum. Other features will draw attention to the former structure of the hospital — including the maternity wing, operating theatre and enclosed verandahs.



Waterwise Guide to Gardens

Mulching

Mulching is enormously beneficial for all plants. The mulch should be spread over the entire planted area to a minimum thickness of 50 mm. Organic mulches are preferred because they:

- · Break down over time and feed the plants.
- Improve the soil organic matter content as they break down.
- Reduce evaporation loss from the surface.
- Encourage earthworms and soil microbial activity.
- Restrict weed growth. Any weeds which do germinate are easy to remove.
- Prevent wind and water erosion.
- Protect the roots from daily temperature fluctuations.
- Improve the appearance of the garden area.

Mulching material

- Raw materials like woodchips, chipped tree waste or similar, whether bought-in or homemade, are ideal mulching materials. However, if the mulch is watered regularly you may need to add some extra nitrogen in the form of animal manures, blood and bone, etc, to prevent the natural breaking down process from drawing nitrogen away from the plants.
- Materials such as lucerne hay, pea straw, seaweed and compost can be used for mulch, but since they are more expensive and break down quicker, they are best used within the drip zone of plants.
- Lawn clippings do not make a good mulch, they are best composted. However, if mixed with a coarser material like chipped prunings or woodchips they can be used as a mulch.
- Old newspapers can be used under a mulch as a weed control layer, however, thick overlapping layers of newspapers may prevent water penetration.

Applying mulches

- For general garden use mulches should be spread at 50-75 mm thick.
- Always leave a breathing space of 50 mm around stems and trunks of plants.
- Organic mulches enriched with animal manures are enormously beneficial when applied thickly (to 30 cm) around the drip zone of fruit trees. They should be topped up as necessary during spring, summer and autumn to maintain a minimum thickness (after settling) of 15 cm.
- · Vegetable gardens should be mulched with

'softer' mulches such as compost, pea, hay or lucerne straw or seaweed.

- In garden areas mulches should be topped up as necessary; perhaps twice a year in both autumn and spring.
- Mulches should never be raked up, turned over, dug in or disturbed in any way. To do so will damage the fine feeder roots which plants develop in the zone between the mulch and the soil.

Changing an established garden

If your garden has grown like topsy with little bits all over the place you can change it round:

- Most of the high water use plants have shallow root systems and can be easily transplanted in winter into their respective groups.
- Hardy, low water and drought tolerant species cannot normally be moved because of their very deep root systems.
- The type, area and location of lawn in the garden can be reconsidered. If you choose to convert some areas of lawn to a lower water use treatment make sure that the replacement plants or ground treatments are more water efficient than grass. Check with your local member of the Nursery Industry Association.

Maintenance

- Do not force plants on with large amounts of strong fertilisers. These produce lush growth that has a high water transpiration rate and is more prone to insect and fungal attack.
- Slow release fertilisers, including animal manures, are the best type. They produce steady, healthy growth and minimal leaching of nutrients into the ground water.

Bedding plants

Plan your flower beds to be mass displays.

Do not place a few plants here or there in odd spaces all over the garden, but rather group your flowers together in a suitable area which can be watered independently of other areas of the garden.

Fruit and vegetables

These are generally high water use plants which need a sunny position. Site very tough shrubs on the exposed side to act as a windbreak and protect them. Slowing down the hot dry winds is a very important water saving feature. It will also prevent damage to the more delicate plants.

SCIENCE AND 梦宇的诗诗

QUICK CHARGE

A lithium-ion battery made by Toshiba, can be recharged in 1 minute for 80 per-cent power and for 3 minutes for full power. The first batteries will be for supply



plants and hospitals and later for mobile digital phones and other products. Included is a new type of electrolyte solution which, when the battery is recharging, allows large numbers of the metal ions to move rapidly from the positive to the negative electrode. There the lithium ions are absorbed by the nanoparticles without causing the electrode to deteriorate. The prototype is the size of a cellphone battery and weighs 16 grams. It has a capacity of 600 milliamp-hours and an energy density of 150 to 250 watt-hours.

OZZIE BIRDS DON'T LIKE IT HOT

Warmer seas and hotter land are having an impact on Australia's bird life, according to a report in EMU, vol 105 p, 1, The country warmed by 0.7°C between 1910 and 1999, with most occurring since the 1950's. Migratory, breeding and feeding habits of over 40 species of birds have changed. Birds that used to winter in the lowlands of south-west Queensland,

now spend the entire year in the mountains, where minimum temperatures have warmed by over half of a degree. With the drought in 2003 flocks of emus and cockatoos have moved towards the coasts, where some sought refuge on irrigated crops and golf courses.



OUR FAMILY TREE

On Wednesday 20th April, an ambitious project to use genetics to trace how humans colonised the globe by the National Geographic Society and IBM. The Genographic Project aims to collect DNA from hundreds of thousands of people around the world over the next five years, including indigenous peoples. Individuals who wish to contribute their DNA will be able to purchase DNA sampling kits for \$100. Proceeds from these sales will go to fund further research. By analysing the DNA, the researchers hope to trace past migrations and create a family tree for humankind. Data from the project will be made available to other researchers, and used to establish a "virtual museum" of human history.

TROUBLE IN DARWIN'S PARADISE

Attempts to protect the Galapagos Islands' marine life from the ravages of overfishing may get a lifeline when UN officials visit the archipelago to decide if it should be classified as "endangered". This would open the door to grants to help fix the problems. The islands that inspired Darwin's theory of evolution

already have World Heritage status. Now UNESCO hopes the threat of reclassification will shame the Ecuadorian government into taking pre-emptive action. But reclassification may face opposition as it could damage the tourism industry, which brings in 15 times more revenue than fishing. Over the last decade the islands fishing industry has successfully lobbied to raise fishing quotas and ease restrictions. Now the industry is pushing for long-line tuna fishing, which can snag turtles and sharks, potentially wreaking havoc on shark populations around the islands. Fishing boats even want permission to sell any shark fins caught in the fishing lines.

RIGS TO ECO-RICHES

In the 1990's, Greenpeace famously likened the dumping of old oil platforms in the deep ocean to throwing empty beer cans into the sea. But a report supports claims that disused oil platforms can become havens for marine life-



at least in the warm, shallow waters of the Gulf of Mexico, where 3600 rigs are in place off Louisiana alone. Corals rapidly colonise the rigs which then become home to myriad fish and other creatures as there are some tens of thousands of square kilometres of bare ocean floor.

RUNAWAY ICEBERG

The world's largest iceberg is on the move again, according to satellite pictures of Antarctica from the past two weeks. But it is too soon to say whether it will move clear of McMurdo Sound, where it has



been creating havoc for scientists and penguins alike. The drama started in 2000 when "super iceberg" B15A - surface area 3000 square kilometres - broke off from the Antarctic ice shelf with several others. Since then, it has been moving at 2 kilometres a day, changing direction several times.

POACHING CURBED

Anti-poaching measures in Tanzania's Serengeti National Park seem to be paying off. In the past 12 years the park has recorded a population explosion among its elephants and lions. Elephant numbers have more than doubled to 120,000.

FLU JUMP

The H5N1 bird flu virus that has killed at least 51 people in east Asia has now been found in pigs in Indonesia. This raises the fear that H5N1 in pigs might recombine with human-adapted viruses that also infect pigs, to form a hybrid capable of causing a human pandemic.






The ordinary meeting that followed the AGM covered the following;

Welcome to Night Watch for the fortnight from midnight Friday 6th May to midnight Friday 20th May.

Remember never look directly at the Sun without proper equipment and Astronomy is looking up.

Our local star, the Sun, resides in Aries for the start of the fortnight, then will move into Taurus on Sunday 15th and shine at magnitude -26.72.

The new Moon is on Sunday 8th at 4:35pm in Aries, and then will start to work its way through the night sky. On Saturday 14th, the Moon will be at <u>Apogee</u> in Gemini at 404,600kms from Earth at 9:50pm.

The 1st quarter Moon will be at 4:47pm in Cancer on Monday 16th at magnitude -6.0. The Moon is in Pisces on 7th, Aries on 8th and 9th, Taurus on 10th, 11th and 12th, Gemini on 13th and 14th, Cancer on 15th and 16th, Leo on 17th, 18th and 19th and Virgo on the 20th very close to Jupiter

Mercury, in Pisces, rises at 4:44am Saturday morning at magnitude +0.1. On Wednesday 11th Mercury will have moved into Aries, rising at 4:56am ,and on Sunday 15th in Cetus rising at 5:11am.Back in Aries on Monday 16th, Mercury rises at 5:15am at -0.7. On Friday 20th Mercury rises at 5:33am at a bright magnitude of -1.6.

Venus at magnitude -4.0 in Taurus, sets in the evening twilight at 5:55pm. On Thursday 19th Venus will be 6° off the orange/red star Aldebaran (three fingers at arms length), and on Friday sets at 6:01pm.

The red planet, Mars, rises on Saturday morning at 1:02am in Aquarius at magnitude +0.5. On Tuesday 17th, Mars will be 1.2° south of Uranus (about a small finger at arms length). Mars rises around the same time each morning.

Jupiter, high in the evening sky at magnitude –2.5, in Virgo sets around 3:57am on Friday morning and is close to the double star Gamma Virginus. On Friday 20th Jupiter will be 0.4° off the Moon and sets around 3:02am at magnitude -2.3.

The ringed planet, Saturn, at magnitude +0.1 and residing in Gemini, sets at 9:46pm on Saturday evening and at 9pm on Friday 20th. On Friday 13th Saturn will be 5° south of the Moon (two fingers).

The blue/green planet, Uranus, in Aquarius at magnitude +5.8, rises at 1:32am on Saturday morning and at 12:42am on Friday 20th.

The grey/green planet, Neptune, rises in Capricornus at 11:41pm at magnitude +7.9 on Saturday and at 10:50pm on Friday 20th. Binoculars or a telescope is needed.

Pluto, in Serpens Caput at magnitude +13.8, rises at 7:11pm and is in the sky all night and rises 4 minutes earlier each evening. A telescope of at least 20 centimetres (8 inch) or bigger is needed.

Meteors at a rate of 5 per hour can be seen in Sagittarius in the morning of Thursday 19th when it will be high in the eastern sky behind the Scorpion in the milky way (galaxy centre).

With telescopes, the great red spot on Jupiter can be seen at 8:13pm on Saturday night and 9:41pm on Monday night. It is only visible for about 1 hour.

On Saturday night Jupiter's moon IO transits the planet's disc starting at 9:40pm and the shadow at 10:25pm. Also Europa reappears from behind the disc at 9:48pm.

On Sunday IO is occulted by Jupiter and disappears at 6:40pm and reappears at 9:39pm.

On Monday evening IO will appear from transit at 6:18pm and the shadow will disappear at 7pm.

At around 7pm the head of Leo will be high in the northern sky in the form of a back to front question mark or hand sickle. The bright star in the head is called Regulas.
