Volunteers from Lake Grace's Fire Brigade set up camp with the Driver Reviver Van at the Railway Station rest area on the eve of Good Friday. With plenty of tea, coffee and biscuits to hand and the TV set to the Collingwood vs Geelong Football match, the fire brigade was ready for anything!

Opening at 6pm, those manning the van were willing drivers to turn in, stretch their legs and revive themselves with a cuppa! With the shutters coming down at 11pm, the Lake Grace Volunteer Fire and Rescue Service served refreshments to 26 motorists throughout the evening.

Fire and Rescue Service's Captain, Ray Bird, said that "he didn't mind how few or how many stopped for a break; but if by providing the Driver Reviver

service they helped prevent an accident or save a life, it was all worth it".

On Good Friday the Lake Grace Lions manned the caravan from 9am through to 5pm. Fifty nine motorists grasped the opportunity to take advantage of this service. Robyn Phillips of Katanning, was very quick to contact Roadwise to comment on the great service that was provided when she and travelling companions stopped at the Roadwise Van while they were enroute to the Goldfields.

Thank you and well done to all those who volunteered their time. Funds raised (\$167.25) from donations will be given to the Royal Flying Doctor Service.





What is ANZAC Day?

ANZAC Day – 25 April – is probably Australia's most important national occasion. It marks the anniversary of the first major military action fought by Australian and New Zealand forces during the First World War. ANZAC stands for Australian and New Zealand Army Corps. The soldiers in those forces quickly became known as ANZACs, and the pride they soon took in that name endures to this day.

Why is this day special to Australians?

When war broke out in 1914 Australia had been a federal commonwealth for only 14 years. The new national government was eager to establish its reputation among the nations of the world. In 1915 Australian and New Zealand soldiers formed part of the allied expedition that set out to capture the Gallipoli peninsula to open the way to the Black Sea for the allied navies. The plan was to capture Constantinople (now Istanbul), the capital of the Ottoman Empire and an ally of Germany. They landed at Gallipoli on 25 April, meeting fierce resistance from the Turkish defenders. What had been planned as a bold stroke to knock Turkey out of the war quickly became a stalemate, and the campaign dragged on for eight months. At the end of 1915 the allied forces were evacuated after both sides had suffered heavy casualties and endured great hardships. Over 8,000 Australian soldiers were killed. News of the landing at Gallipoli made a profound impact on Australians at home and 25 April quickly became the day on which Australians remembered the sacrifice of those who had died in war.

Although the Gallipoli campaign failed in its military objectives of capturing Constantinople and knocking Turkey out of the war, the Australian and New Zealand actions during the campaign bequeathed an intangible but powerful legacy. The creation of what became known as the "ANZAC legend" became an important part of the national identity of both nations. This shaped the ways they viewed both their past and future.

Early commemorations

The date, 25 April, was officially named ANZAC Day in 1916 and was marked by a wide variety of ceremonies and services in Australia, a march through London, and a sports day in the Australian camp in Egypt. In London over 2,000 Australian and New Zealand troops marched through the streets. A London newspaper headline dubbed them "The knights of Gallipoli". Marches were held all over Australia in 1916. Wounded soldiers from Gallipoli attended the Sydney march in convoys of cars, attended by nurses. For the remaining years of the war, ANZAC Day was used as an occasion for patriotic rallies and recruiting campaigns, and parades of serving members of the AIF were held in most cities.

During the 1920s ANZAC Day became established as a national day of commemoration for the 60,000 Australians who died during the war. The first year in which all states observed some form of public holiday together on ANZAC Day was 1927. By the mid-1930s all the rituals we today associate with the day – dawn vigils, marches, memorial services, reunions, two-up

games – were firmly established as part of ANZAC Day culture.

With the coming of the Second World War, ANZAC Day was used to also commemorate the lives of Australians lost in that war. In subsequent years the meaning of the day has been further broadened to include Australians killed in all the military operations in which Australia has been involved.

ANZAC Day was first commemorated at the Memorial in 1942 but, due to government orders preventing large public gatherings in case of Japanese air attack, it was a small affair and was neither a march nor a memorial service. ANZAC Day has been annually commemorated at the Memorial ever since.

What does it mean today?

Australians recognise 25 April as an occasion of national commemoration. Commemorative services are held at dawn – the time of the original landing – across the nation. Later in the day, ex-servicemen and women meet and join in marches through the major cities and many smaller centres. Commemorative ceremonies are held at war memorials around the country. It is a day when Australians reflect on the many different meanings of war.

Rockdale, Tiarri Share Prime SAMM Honours

Two southeastern Wheatbelt studs battled it out for top honours in the Prime SAMM arena, with each claiming one of the major championships.

One of the breed's most successful performers in recent years, "Rockdale Stud", Dumbleyung, exhibiting the champion ram while daughter stud "Tiarri", Lake Grace, won champion ewe honours.

In a show of consistency, which highlighted the depth of quality in both teams, each claimed a reserve award to the other in respective championships. Hayden and Mark Edwards' Rockdale ram then went on to win grand champion of the breed and later supreme interbreed exhibit.

The massive youngster with exceptional length and one of the smoothest, well-muscled body types, came from the milk tooth class, eclipsing nine other entries.

His maturity and sire presence at such a young age was not lost on judge Campbell Lawrie, "Lawral Park", Ungarra, South Australia.

"This is a real sire of the future," Mr Lawrie said.

"He has an exceptional loin, a strong siry head, great length and width with real leg on each corner stance and his natural bare breech is a bonus for the industry going forward.

"The champion ewe is also an excellent breed representative and showing great maturity for a youngster, but I don't think she offers quite as much punch to the industry as the ram.

"Put them together and I'm sure you'd get something pretty amazing."

The Rockdale champion is one of the first offspring by South African import sire 1202 and out of a Rockdale 0108 dam line.

Having shown the champion ram at last year's Woolorama, Tiarri principals Ross and Pauline Taylor and daughter Kelly-Anne Gooch moved into female territory this year. Their champion ewe, also from the milk tooth class, was sired by Gracefield 040646 and out of Kindelka 060306.

Mr Lawrie praised the maturity, femininity and degree of muscle, particularly through the twist, of the winning ewe.

Rockdales reserve champion ewe was from the same class having played bridesmaid all day to the champion. Her sire, Rockdale 06346, is son of South African based, Rockdale owned sire Hartman 165.

The Taylors have been breeding Prime SAMM's since 2004, having established their stud on a solid Rockdale base.

Their reserve champion ram, another youngster, was by Rockdale 050182 and out of a homebred Tiarri ewe.

Always on the most popular and industry relevant classes in the schedule, the milk tooth objective measurement class was won by the Squiers families' "Shirlee Downs Stud", Quairading, with a son of Shirlee Downs 64606.

The ram weighed 90kg, had highest EMD of 47 with 6mm fat and scored 93.1 points ahead of a Rockdale ram (ET brother to its reserve champion ewe) weighing 105kg with EMD of 44 and 6mm fat for 85.2 points. The third placed Tiarri ram weighed 86kg with 42 EMD, 7mm fat and finished with 83.3 points.

Rockdale completed a clean sweep of ram and ewe pairs awards, the group class, and the progeny class with a team sired by Rockdale 06346.

Tiarri finished second in the ram pair, the group class and progeny class while Shirlee Downs claimed second in the ewe pair.

With his client-based abattoir and restaurant-direct

supply chains, Campbell Lawrie, knows the value of quality breeding and presentation and it was something he praised WA breeders highly for.

"They always turn their sheep out superbly and the outstanding quality of sheep shown here today reflects the depth within their breeding programs," he said. "It made for some very tough decisions."

All Cisterns Go - Red Ribbon for Lake King Toilet Block

Travellers and locals can now make that important stop in Lake King with the construction of a new public toilet block on the main street. Lake King Progress Association president Colin Penny officially opened the Lake King Public Toilet Block on April 7 2009 and Mrs Sylvia Brandenburg, Lake King Progress Association, and Lake Grace Shire Councillors Jeanette de Landgraft and Dean Sinclair were on hand to cut the red ribbon.

The building, a Shire of Lake Grace project, was funded by a Department of Local Government & Regional Development grant (\$25,000) and the Shire of Lake Grace through a loan and general revenue (\$95,000).

The double clay brick construction features three separate toilets including a full disabled access with toilet and shower. Other features include concealed water efficient cisterns, energy saving automatic switch-off lighting and exhaust fans, wastewater treatment/recycling system and baby change facilities. The surrounding garden of native plants is fully reticulated with recycled water.

Due to a lack of available builders and financial constraints, Shire Maintenance and Works staff undertook the project with assistance from local tradespeople. This proved to be challenging but ultimately successful. Though the completion of the building was behind schedule, it is considered that the well-researched design and quality construction have been thoroughly worthwhile and will serve the community and travelling public for many years.

Dutch Courage is Rewarded

Lake Grace man Hendrik Doelman has received a medal for his work with the Dutch Navy and the Resistance in World War II, which ended more than 60 years ago.

And it was a surprise birthday present for the veteran – he turned 84 the day he was awarded the medal. Netherlands Defence Attache' in Australia Lieutenant Colonel Caro Lefevre presented Mr Doelman the Mobilisatie Oorlogskruis, or Mobilisation War Cross, on Saturday 11th April.

Receiving the medal was unexpected, Mr Doelman said. "But it's wonderful to be recognised," he admitted. Lt Col Lefevre, who had travelled from Canberra to bestow the honour, said the Dutch Government was proud to reward the men and women who had served their country during one of its most darkest periods.

German troops invaded the previously neutral Netherlands in 1940, overwhelming the nation after just 5 days, which included the infamous bombing of the port city of Rotterdam.

The destruction of the city, only 15km from Mr Doelman's hometown of Vlaardingen, made a deep impression on the then 15 year old. "So in those five years I hated the Germans – along with most of the Dutch. I hated them as much as anybody else," he said. Compounding this was the abduction and eventual death of his cousin from supposed malnutrition in a Nazi concentration camp at Belsen.

"My cousin and I were very close," Mr Doelman said. "I had watched the Germans ravage our country but now they were slaughtering my family," he said. Many Dutch people of that generation preferred not to dwell on the past or think about those things again, Lt Col Lefevre said.

Although not a bravery honour, he said it was still an important recognition of the contribution so many people made in the dark years of the war. Since his arrival in Australia in 2006, Lt Col Lefevre has awarded almost 80 medals in Australia and New Zealand.

"It's not very commonly issued in the Netherlands anymore," he said. "In Australia people don't realise they are still eligible and how to obtain it." For Mr Doelman, his decision to join the Dutch Resistance in 1944, aged 19, came when the tide of the war had turned and German forces had become even more vicious.

Among one of many desperate measures by the Nazis at this time was to place an embargo on all food exports to the western

Netherlands, including the cities of Utrecht, Amsterdam, Rotterdam and The Hague, just as winter was setting in. This caused the Dutch Famine of 1944, which saw adult rations dip to between 400-800 calories a day; less than a quarter of the recommended intake. "People were dying on the street," Mr Doelman said. "We were lucky we survived."

Joining the Resistance in May, Mr Doelman served as a de facto police officer, trying to enforce a state of law and order on an otherwise devastated society. He also guarded an island, peppered with landmines, which had been a German outpost.

"No-one was allowed there at all, only us, and I happened to be a pastry cook, so they made me cook for them," he said. "Wherever I've been I've been cooking. That was my job, to look after the stomach."

It was a job he continued with a new life in Katanning, where he moved after a naval posting to the former Dutch East Indies (now Indonesia), after a friend recommended he take a job in the town.

"We were lucky – I got a job, and I've never looked back," he said. "Australians were good to us, and we try to be good to them."

Welcome to Night Watch for the period from midnight Friday 24th April to midnight Friday 8th May, 2009 – International Year of Astronomy. Astronomy is looking up.

Our local star "**THE SUN**" in the constellation of Aries (The Ram), shines at magnitude -26.72 from 1.006 Astronomical Units or 150,000,000 km's (1AU = 149,597,870 km's), or 499.005 light-seconds or 92,955,800 miles. Light from the Sun takes 8.3 minutes to reach the Earth, so it has risen and sank before you actually see it.

Never view the Sun without proper aid as it will blind you beyond repair. The Sun rises in the east/north east and sets in the west/north west.

Morning twilight begins at 5:14am on Saturday 25th and evening twilight ends at 6:59pm. On Friday 1st May twilight begins at 5:17am and ends at 6:54pm. Morning twilight begins at 5:21am on Friday 8th May and evening twilight ends at 6:48pm.

The New **MOON** will occur at 11:15am on Saturday 25th April in the constellation of Pisces (the fishes) in the north/north west. On Monday 27th the 5% Moon in Taurus will be 1.9° north of Mercury low down in the west/north west horizon in the evening twilight. The 11% Moon on Tuesday 28th at 2pm will be 366,040 km's from Earth at Perigee (closest), high in the north. On Saturday 2nd May in Cancer the 1st quarter Moon will occur at 4:35am at magnitude -6.0. The 73% Moon on Monday 4th will be 6° (about 2.5 fingers at arms length), south of Saturn at 7pm in the north/north east.

MERCURY in the constellation of Aries sets in the west/north west on Saturday 25th at 6:30pm before the end of twilight. Mercury rises in Taurus on Sunday 26th at its Greatest Elongation East at 20°. On Monday 27th Mercury will be 1.9° south of the 5% Moon and is not very good viewing this time round.

VENUS the very bright planet at magnitude -4.7 in Pisces on Saturday 25th rises at 3:56am on the eastern horizon. On Saturday 2nd May, Venus rises at 3:40am at its Greatest Illumination -4.75. Venus on Friday 8th May rises at 3:31am in the east at magnitude -4.6.

MARS the red planet at magnitude +1.3, in the constellation of Pisces, rises just behind Venus at 4:01am on Saturday 25th in the east. On Sunday 3rd May, Mars at 3:59am, will rise in the constellation of Cetus (the Whale or Monster). Mars on Wednesday 6th May rises back in Pisces and remains there until June 2nd. Mars rises on Friday 8th May at 3:57am still behind Venus rising in the east.

JUPITER the giant gas planet at a bright -2.3 magnitude, in the constellation of Capricornus, rises at 1am on Saturday 25th, in the east/south east. On May 2nd, Jupiter rises at 12:37am. Jupiter on Friday 8th May, rises at 12:17am still in the east/south east now at magnitude -2.6.

SATURN the ringed planet shining in the evening night sky at magnitude +0.7 in the constellation of Leo, will be direct north at 9:30pm at 30° after rising at 3:21pm and sets on Sunday at 2:45am. On Saturday 2nd May, Saturn will be direct north at 8:50pm. Saturn

on May 4th will be 6 deg. north of the 73% Moon. On Friday 8th May, Saturn will be direct north at 8:15pm and sets in the west/north west.

URANUS the blue/green coloured planet at magnitude +5.9 in the constellation of Pisces rises at 3:30am on Saturday 25th on the eastern horizon just 26 minutes after Venus. On Friday 1st May, Uranus rises at 3:07am and at 2:41am on Friday 8th. A pair of binoculars is needed for viewing this gas planet.

NEPTUNE the grey/green coloured gas planet at magnitude +7.9 in the constellation Capricornus rises at 1:15am Saturday 25th in the south/east just 15 minutes behind Jupiter. On Friday May 1st, Neptune rises at 12:52am and at 12:25am Friday 8th. Any size telescope is good for finding this planet by using the small finderscope attached to the telescope.

METEORS may be viewed in the constellation of Aquarius which rises on the eastern horizon at 2:15am. The rate is at about 70 per hour if it happens in our part of the sky on Tuesday 5th May.

PLUTO the minor planet at magnitude +13.9 in the constellation of Sagittarius rises in the east/south east at 9:19pm and lies south west of M17 the Omega nebula and star cluster on Saturday 25th. Objects to find in the night sky from 7:30pm on Saturday; the constellation of Corvus the crow will be high in the north east and looks like a wrecked square and has four bright stars with two others close on two corners. With any telescope you will find the planetary nebula NGC 4361 and is called the ghost of Saturn and can be found 2/3rds of the way to the two closest stars in the middle. To the west of the nebula outside of the square you will find two galaxies that look like they are joined together, they are NGC 4038 and 4039 and are called the antennae merging galaxies. Looking to the north/north east of the two stars close together you will find the bright galaxy M104 the Mexican hat galaxy for obvious reasons.

In the south/east is the constellation CRUX, or as we know it, the Southern Cross or to astronomers the kite which is the smallest of all the 88 constellations. The brightest star is Acrux (alpha) which is a triple star system (telescope or binoculars), the second brightest on the crossbar is Mimosa (beta) which has a small red star just inside it (telescope). Just outside Mimosa is the Open star cluster NGC 4755 which is made up of different coloured stars and is called the Jewel Box cluster. Inside the cluster is three stars in a line called the traffic lights and also an A shape set of stars (binoculars or better a any sized telescope). Across from the orange star at the head of the cross and almost level with mimosa, there is a double star which one is blue and the other orange. Inside the cross is a lot of small stars in lines and swirls.

With the Moon working its way into the night sky this fortnight it is good binocular and telescope viewing. Viewing at my place is free of charge at any time and may be arranged at your place if you live out of town.

WAGG - Local Farmers Making a Difference

Fledgling grains group, WAGG, held their most recent meeting at the Lake Grace Telecentre on Friday 17th April. The meeting was well attended with members coming from as far as Tammin and Pingelly. Items discussed were, Multi Peril Crop Insurance, Competition at Ports, WAGG website, Grains Council of Australia, Grains Research & Development Commission (GRDC). With technology being what it is there was a phone hook up to the Chairman of the Grains Council of Australia, Murray Jones, allowing members to ask any questions they wished.

WA Grains Group (WAGG) developed out of frustration that the interests of grain growers were not being met by the traditional representation of the state's agricultural lobby groups. Key leaders of the Group include Lake Grace farmer Doug Clarke as Chairman, and other start up members Ray Marshall, Julie Newman, Robert Doney, Donald Wallace (vice Chair), Debby Clarke, Andy Duncan, David Kirby and Scott Uppill.

Doug Clarke feels that WA farmers are now getting their points of view heard at a national and state level. Mr. Clarke says that the new contestable wheat export marketing system that has been established includes many of the key points and structure that WAGG leaders have agitated for over the past two years. While WAGG acknowledges that any new system will reveal some unexpected challenges, they firmly believe that the group has been instrumental in developing a national wheat marketing model which will provide much improved possibilities for farm profits.

The group first met in April 2007. In two years they believe they've achieved a great deal on behalf of the many like minded grain growers who have offered encouragement and policy ideas along the way. Limited resources have been focused on getting an alternative view point into Canberra, the national and local media, speaking to as many local growers as they can and joining forces with other lobby groups where appropriate.

With a marked increase in Cooperative Bulk Handling costs last harvest, the West Australian Grain Growers Group has been in talks with a third party at the Albany Port to establish another option for shipping and transportation of grain. Talks have been positive and have included the possibilities of grain handling competition in other ports like Geraldton, Esperance and Port Adelaide.

The WAGG team is also working on the rail transport issue crucial to the future of grains transport in this state, the cost and role of the GRDC, and future Biofuel opportunities for grain growing communities in this state.

Our own Sarah Ward, a former Lake Grace child, was among those who received a "Child of Courage Award". At an early age Sarah was identified with a very rare genetic disability, Ataxia Telangiectasia or AT for short. Being genetic and degenerative, AT affects the Immune system and affects balance, though those affected have above average intelligence. There are only two children and a 36 year old adult with AT in Western Australia.

At the age of 5 years, Sarah now attends Pre School and is coping very well. She is a very happy child with a great sense of humour and is enjoying a good quality of life despite her circumstances. Sarah has a strong determination and is always "right up with the crowd", and shares in all the "rough and tumble" with her peers. She loves to swing from the monkey bars, and loves to play on her DS. Her Lions Award certificate spells out; "Special needs award 2009, for facing life's challenges with exceptional courage". Lions are to be commended for their Community involvement, and in particular for instigating this meritorious award.

What are Australia's Emergency Call Services numbers?

- **Triple Zero (000)** is Australia's primary Emergency Call Service number and should be used to access emergency assistance from all telephones (landline, mobile phones and payphones) in the first instance.
- **112** is the GSM standard Emergency Call Service number for use with GSM mobile phones, and offers special access features (see below). 112 can also be dialled from other mobile phones, but will only offer the same features that dialling Triple Zero (000) provides.
- **106** is the text-based Emergency Call Service for people who are deaf or have a hearing or speech impairment. This service operates using a TTY (teletypewriter) and does not accept voice calls or SMS messages.

Both 112 and 106 are secondary emergency call services numbers because they are for use only in relation to particular technologies.

Is calling the Emergency Call Service from my mobile phone reliable?

Mobile phones enable individuals to call the Emergency Call Service from most places in Australia. However, the nature of the mobile phone network means that in some circumstances these calls are not as reliable as calls from the fixed network.

Problems that may be experienced when making a call from a mobile phone to the Emergency Call Service include:

- losing coverage thus terminating the call;

- many people concurrently reporting an emergency, leading to network congestion;
- bad reception, making it difficult for the Emergency Call Service operators to understand the caller; and
- a remote location may result in limited or no network coverage being available; and **a lack of location information about the call.**

When calling from a mobile phone, does the emergency service operator know my location?

The operator will not be able to pinpoint your location. Mobile phone users should provide the operator with as much information about the location of the emergency situation, including the State or Territory and the town or suburb. This simple step will ensure that the emergency call is connected to the appropriate state or territory emergency service organisation.

Can I send a text message to Triple Zero (000)?

It is **not** possible to contact the Triple Zero (000) Emergency Call Service using the SMS text facility on your mobile phone.

How do I know whether I have a GSM or a 3G mobile phone service?

Check with your mobile phone service provider if you are not sure of the type of handset you have. Your provider can explain how to access the Emergency Call Services using your handset. It is important to understand that while 112 can be reached on both GSM

and 3G mobile phones, 112 will only provide additional features when dialled from GSM mobile phones.

How do I call the Emergency Call Service from a 3G mobile phone?

If you are using a 3G mobile phone, you should dial Triple Zero (000) in an emergency situation.

How do I call the Emergency Call Service from a GSM mobile phone?

If you are using a GSM mobile phone in Australia, you will be connected to police, fire or ambulance when you dial Triple Zero (000). As GSM is an international standard, the international emergency call number 112 will also connect you to the Emergency Call Service. 112 can be dialled:

- in any area covered by the GSM network - when you are out of your service provider's coverage area but are in another carrier's mobile phone network coverage area, your call will be carried on the other carrier's network;
- from anywhere overseas where there is GSM service coverage - the call will be automatically transferred to that country's emergency number; and
- without having to key in a Personal Identification Number (PIN) to unlock your keypad.

In many new GSM handsets, Triple Zero (000) is programmed into the firmware as an emergency number. In these handsets, Triple Zero (000) provides

the same features as 112, that is, the call will use any available GSM network to reach the Emergency Call Service, regardless of whose network you are accessing. For this reason Triple Zero (000) should be dialled first.

How do I know what areas have GSM coverage?

All GSM mobile phone service providers have coverage maps available from their point of sale locations, and upon request. All GSM carriers (Optus, Telstra and Vodafone) have good coverage in the major population centres, but in regional areas only one or two of these are likely to provide sufficient network coverage.

In these areas, if your GSM mobile phone service provider does not have network coverage for normal phone use, or to enable a Triple Zero (000) call to be made, you may be able to access 112 if another carrier has GSM network coverage in this area.

Can I use 112 for emergency calls from a fixed line phone at home?

No, dialing 112 will not connect you to the Emergency Call Service from a fixed line telephone service such as a standard home telephone or from a payphone.

Are calls to Triple Zero (000), 106 and 112 free?

All calls to the Emergency Call Services are free of charge.

CARBON SINK SUNK: It is another nail in the coffin of ocean fertilisation for cooling the planet. Early results from the latest field experiment suggest the technique will fail. "I think we are seeing the last gasps of ocean iron fertilisation as a carbon storage strategy," says Ken Caldeira of the Carnegie Institution at Stanford University in California. The controversial Indian-German LOHAFEX expedition fertilised 300 square kilometres of the Southern Atlantic with 6 tonnes of dissolved iron. Sure enough the iron triggered a bloom of phytoplankton. Dead bloom particles were then expected to sink to the ocean bed, dragging carbon along with them. Instead, the bloom attracted a swarm of hungry copepods. The tiny crustaceans graze on phytoplankton, which keeps the carbon in the food chain and prevents it from being stored in the ocean sink. The copepods were in turn eaten by larger crustaceans called amphipods, which serve as food for squid and fin whales. "It seems that if it is possible to fertilise enough ocean to make a difference to climate, we would need to turn vast ocean ecosystems into giant plankton farms," he says.

A BREATH TEST FOR LUNG CANCER?: A Puff of exhaled air could give an early warning of lung disease by morphing a liquid into gel. Tuberculosis, lung cancer and influenza all raise levels of nitric oxide (NO) in the breath. At present, sophisticated machinery is needed to test for NO. Now Anne McNeil, a chemist at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor, and her colleagues are developing a cheaper test. They have shown that NO oxidises a solution of the compound dihydropyridine, changing the shape of its molecules so that they stack together to form a solid gel – a change that can be seen with the naked eye. McNeil presented the results at the American Chemical Society meeting in March at Salt Lake City.




DNA SHAPE COULD BE CLUE TO FUNCTION: The twists and bumps on stretches of non-coding DNA could give clues to what they are there for. The DNA that codes for proteins make up only 2 per cent of the human genome, other functions, such as switching on genes, are embedded somewhere in the remaining 98 per cent. One way to home in on the functional areas is to scan for sequences that humans share with other mammals, suggesting they have been conserved for a reason. But Thomas Tullius of Boston University and his colleagues wondered whether different sequences might show up if they looked instead at the DNA's outward shape. DNA's complex chemistry means two similar sequences can produce very different outer shapes, while two different sequences can have similar shapes. The team used a computer program to predict the outer shape of a genome from its base pairs. When they compared the shape of the human genome with the genomes of 36 other mammals, 50 per cent more DNA appeared conserved than if they just took account of sequence (Science, DOI: 10.1126/science.1169050). Shape could indicate function because it helps determine whether proteins can bind to and activate a stretch of DNA, says Tullius.




SOGGY SPACE ROCKS AND LEFT-HANDED LIFE: Wet rocks hurtling around the solar system may have given life on Earth its addiction to left-handed building blocks. Almost all life on Earth uses left-handed amino acid molecules instead of their right-handed counterparts. In the 1990's, scientists found that meteorites contain up to 15 per cent more of the left-handed versions too. So space rocks bombarding the early Earth may have biased the planet's chemistry. A linked theory has it that polarised starlight can preferentially destroy right-handed amino acids on asteroids, though this alone cannot explain the strength of the bias on meteorites. Now Daniel Glavin and Jason Dworkin of NASA's Goddard Space Flight Centre in Greenbelt, Maryland, have shown that water amplifies the bias. They studied an amino acid called isovaline in six meteorites that showed ancient evidence of 1000 to 10,000 years' exposure to liquid water. The longer water persisted in the rock, the stronger its left-handed isovaline bias, the pair found (Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences DOI: 10.1073/pnas.0811618106).

FLOWER'S POWER TO TRAP MOSQUITOES: Mosquitoes are infamous for sucking blood, but mostly they prefer sucking nectar from flowers. Thomas Kollars at Georgia Southern University at Statesboro in the US is using flower power to trap mosquitoes, which spread malaria, dengue fever and infections. He has designed a flower-shaped plastic trap in blue, green, red and black – all colours Kollars says attract mosquitoes. In the middle of the disc is a pad soaked in sweet fluid laced with Bt, an insecticide that selectively kills mosquitoes. A fine screen keeps out other insects but allows the mosquitoes proboscis through. The discs have killed mosquitoes in lab tests and Kollars is now testing them in fields in Puerto Rico.



MUTATED GENE MAKES MICE MOONWALK: "MOONWALKING" mice may shed some light on the genetics of a debilitating neurological disorder. The mice, which move backwards when they try to walk forwards on a smooth surface, have a gene for a mutated protein that prompts neurons in the cerebellum, a brain area that controls movement and balance, to die off. The same neurons are destroyed in people with the disorder cerebella ataxia, which causes unsteadiness and loss of coordination. The moonwalking seems to occur because the mice place their feet wider apart when they walk, to keep their balance. The movements of people with cerebellar ataxia are similar, but with notable differences. "I don't think there are any human patients who walk backwards," says Esther Becker of the University of Oxford, who led the team. (Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences, DOI: 10.1073/pnas.0810599106). "people are being screened to see whether this mutation occurs in humans with cerebellar ataxia".

The Pope looks surprised, "Why so cheap?"



Over 1.34 Million WA Citizens to Have Their Say

The Western Australian Electoral Commission has announced that at the close of the electoral roll last Friday, 1,341,554 Western Australians were eligible to vote in the Daylight Saving referendum on 16 May. This is an increase of 11,155 electors from the State general election in September 2008, and an increase of 342,429 electors since the last referendum on Daylight Saving in 1992 when 999,125 electors were on the roll.

1,001,896 electors are based in the South, North or East Metropolitan regions and 339,658 electors are based in the Mining and Pastoral, Agricultural or South West regions of Western Australia.

Since the issue of the writ for the referendum on 9 April, there have been 14,184 changes to electoral roll details.

Young voters in the 18-19 age group total 36,981 or 2.76 per cent of the roll – 18,204 males and 18,777 females. The number of electors aged 18 to 34 and who are yet to have their say on Daylight Saving total 369,743 and make up 27.57 per cent of the roll. Significantly, since July 2008, 3,537 electors in this age bracket have enrolled to have their say in the electoral process.

Commenting on these statistics, WA Electoral

Commissioner Warwick Gately said: 'Obviously the Commission would very much like to see each and every one of the State's 1.34 million electors have their say on polling day, either by turning out on 16 May, or if for some reason they cannot attend a polling place then by voting early by post or in person.

'I would particularly urge those electors in the 25 to 29 age group to turn out on polling day, as at the State general election the turnout was a disappointing 78.63%. May I remind all electors that voting in the Daylight Saving referendum is compulsory,' he said.

Morton's Mail: A life of football

In my first 'Morton's Mail', I thought I'd give you a snapshot of my life growing up in Western Australia through to my time at Melbourne.

My story starts on January 18, 1990. I lived in a small town called Newdegate, about four hours south-east of Perth in the wheatbelt, where I went to pre-school and kindergarten.

When I was six our family moved to Lake Grace, which has a population of about 600. I grew up, completed my schooling and played my junior footy there, where former Geelong captain Mark Bairstow comes from.

Lake Grace is a proud town and it has supported my brothers Mitchell, Jarryd and me throughout our footy careers. We got an opportunity to return to Lake Grace last year during the AFL's community round, which was a great experience.

In year eight I went to a boarding school, Hale, in Perth. From year eight to 12, I played football for Hale and for the Claremont-Dalkeith Nuggets.

As a 15-year-old, I tried out for the state schoolboys' team and made that side. In retrospect, that's where it started for me in my football career. I represented Western Australia during a state carnival in Canberra

and more importantly got to understand the sacrifices that had to be made to make it in football.

After finishing year 10, I completed a big pre-season because I wanted to make the state under-16 squad. I knew, having seen Mitchell go through the same program and process, that if you had a good year in the under 16s it was possible to make the AIS/AFL Academy squad. That's when you're starting to get in the spotlight.

I really focused on my fitness and skills and went running three or four times each week around the lake. By this stage, Mum had moved up to Perth to help support Mitchell's career at West Coast, along with Jarryd and me. Dad was commuting from Lake Grace – about a three-and-a-half-hour drive from Perth. He would leave on Friday nights and return at 5am on Monday mornings so he supported us on the weekends.

Dad travelled up and back for a year and a half before he made the move to Perth in my final year at school. In year 11, I made the state under-16s and the AIS/AFL Academy squad. I knew football was the career path I wanted to take, although I still played tennis and cricket for fun and to remain competitive.

When I was in year 12, I played WAFL colts for Claremont and school football for Hale. I put in some good performances and was selected for the state under-18s. That was very important, as the AFL recruiting managers were watching your every move. I had a good carnival, winning the Larke Medal as the best division one player.

I really value and cherish that medal as it was the culmination of my hard work. I was living my dream, because as a kid I always wanted to play in the AFL. And as I got older, I was taking my football more seriously and getting a step closer.

During the season when I played for Western Australia in the under-18s I was 17 years old, and I knew it wasn't going to be easy playing against older and bigger bodies.

I made plenty of sacrifices with diet, going out and drinking. I had to be diligent with my schoolwork, particularly if things didn't work out with football and work or university became an option. And you have to remember that a knee or broken leg is all it takes for a football career to end.

Fast forward to 2009 and this year is all about backing up my first AFL season. I was happy with my 2008 efforts after being drafted by Melbourne at No.4 in the 2007 NAB AFL Draft. I wanted to play for pride and the respect of my teammates and coaches at Melbourne.

I did whatever it took to play to the best of my ability and at the end of the season I had 19 matches to my name – I don't think many people would've expected that.


I'm a man of integrity and a guy who likes to demonstrate actions, rather than words, so I look back on last year as a stepping stone. I'm looking to go one better this year and if I keep improving each season, then I'll have a good career.


