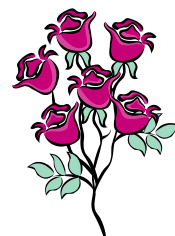

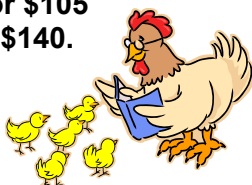

Over The Fence

'Over the Fence', an exhibition by local artists Tania Spencer and Kerrie Argent opened on Friday 13th April. 'Over the Garden Fence' is a metaphor for the house yard plants that escape from the garden and become uncontrollable pests in native bushland and farmland, choking out less vigorous endemic species and interfering with agriculture.

Although it was Black Friday, the mood was light as approximately 50 attended the opening. Kerrie and Tania had their work cut out explaining how they had created their many works of art.

"'Weeds made of wire" is a simple way to describe my work,' said Tania Spencer. 'I have used these rope-like knitted forms to show how strong and tough these plants are and how hard they are to eradicate, sort of like pieces of wire on the farm, you can find them everywhere if you are not careful with the cuttings!'

While being very sensuous in form, Tania wanted the sculptures to convey a sinister and menacing manner, reflecting the environmental problem they have become. Arum Lilies, Bridal Creeper and Morning Glory (Convolvulus) plants are all vigorous growing, they are attractive and perhaps this is one of the reasons they have become widespread. People desire them in their gardens, and they grow really well, too well. Then they need to be divided or dug out and wherever these cuttings are dumped they start growing .

'By using natural dyes and the light of our native Lake Grace eucalyptus canopy, I have depicted the patterns and dappled light with silks and photography', said Kerrie Argent. I want to celebrate the beauty of our unique landscape.

Kerrie has spent many hours wandering around the bushland, finding and working out the different varieties of the eucalyptus. Unless you closely observe the tree structure, bark, flower colour and most importantly the seed shape you can hardly tell the difference between many of the trees. From this she collected, cut and boiled the leaves for many hours (having to rescue them from her husband who thought they were good to light the bath heater with) then dyed the silk organza. They talk about witches of yesteryear, well Kerrie looked the part with her many cauldrons boiling away at the back door.

Skills Development for Volunteers!

Creative Volunteering – No Limits is a highly rated series of one-day training programs for people of all ages who are volunteers. Workshops were held in many large and small country towns last year and now return to Lake Grace on 11 May 2007.

"Volunteers from health, youth, arts, sports, environment, heritage, P&C's and many other networks have attended these workshops and the response has been outstanding. We have encouraged groups to send two or more people along, so that the skills learned can be passed back into the volunteering network," said Country Arts WA General Manager Andy Farrant.

Country Arts WA is managing the delivery of these one-day training programs across the State. It is part of a national program of volunteer training that is fully accredited.

"What's been a particularly pleasing outcome from the workshops that have been held already, is that those attending are finding that they are not alone in their volunteering role. Often it's the feeling of isolation that undermines volunteers and when you sit in a room of other volunteers, you feel part of something much bigger," said Mr Farrant.

Creative Volunteering is supported by the Australian Government's Regional Arts Fund. The cost of each day's training is just \$25 and this is heavily subsidised

Thank you to everyone who came for making it a really good week of horsing around.

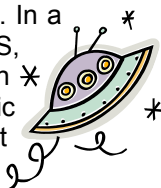

SCIENCE AND STUFF

FRENCH UFO FILES: The truth is online. In a world first, the French space agency, CNES, made its official UFO archives public on * March 22nd. The agency went public because people were concerned about secrecy and conspiracies. So far, the GEIPAN website (www.cnes-geipan.fr) contains just a quarter of more than 6000 eyewitness UFO reports sent to the unit by police over three decades. Such reports are followed up by police, scientists and the military experts. GEIPAN has debunked about 75% of them. Usually they are weather balloons, lightning flashes or debris from satellites or rockets. The rest are still unexplained.



ENZYME SPRAY HAS EARACHE IN IT'S SIGHTS: Every year, millions of children suffer painful earache caused by the bacterium *Streptococcus pneumoniae*. Tests on mice now suggest that a nasal spray containing viral enzymes called lysins might end this misery. *S. pneumoniae* bacteria live harmlessly in our noses until a respiratory virus comes along and disrupts the nasal membrane, allowing bacteria to migrate to the middle ear and start infections.

Bacteria-infecting virus called phages use lysins to destroy bacterial cell walls so that they can escape and infect other cells. Researchers infected mice with *S. pneumoniae* and then treated them with a lysin spray or a mock spray containing no enzyme. When the mice were then infected with a flu virus, none of those treated with lysin developed an ear infection, while eight out of ten of those given the mock spray did. Importantly, the lysin that targets *S. pneumoniae* does not damage the harmless "commensal" bacteria that protect the ear from other infections. (PloS pathogens, DOI:10.1371/journal.ppat.0030028).



NO SIGNS OF LIFE ... JUST AN OLD PLATE:

A hunt for signs of the earliest life on Earth has instead turned up the earliest evidence yet for plate tectonics. This pre-dates previous evidence by more than a billion years and will go some way to settling a debate about whether plate tectonics began early in Earth's history, or much later.

Until now, the earliest evidence which describes the motion of the plates that make up the Earth's crust, came from the discovery of 2.5-billion-year-old "ophiolites". These distinctive sequence of rocks from the ocean floor that end up on land and are regarded as a sign of plate tectonics. Harald Furnes of the University of Bergen in Norway and his colleagues were looking for signs of life in the Isua supracrustal belt, a 3.8-billion-year-old rock formation in south-western Greenland. Instead they found "sheeted dikes" the banded rocks that make up ophiolites, and rocks nearby resembling those beneath islands that sit above today's subduction zones-where one plate slides beneath another. This

suggests plate tectonics got going at least 3.8 billion years ago. (Science, vol 315, p 1704).

MAMMALS NOT SUCH LATE DEVELOPERS: The demise of the dinosaurs led to an evolutionary explosion of modern mammals-or so we thought. It now seems that most mammalian lineages were around well before the dinosaurs died out, perhaps being held in check by other mammals. From the fossil record alone, it looks as if the ancestors of most living mammals arose in a sudden burst of evolutionary divergence soon after the Cretaceous period ended 65 million years ago, filling ecological gaps left by the extinct dinosaurs.



To check this, Olaf Bininda-edmonds of the Technical University of Munich, Germany, and colleagues drew up an evolutionary "supertree" of 4510 of the 4554 living species of mammals and used fossils, DNA and statistical estimation to date the branching points over the past 150 million years.

The supertree shows that diversification did not in fact speed up at the end of the Cretaceous. Instead, the evolutionary branching of mammals was thickest about 93 million years ago, while dinosaurs were still in their prime. A second burst of diversification beginning about 50 million years ago may have resulted from the extinction of other, more primitive mammal groups, which may have suppressed the radiation of advanced mammals (Nature, vol 446, p 507).



UNSTEELY MAGNOLIAS: Over half of the World' magnolia species are close to extinction. Of the 245 wild species, 131 are at risk from over-harvesting and habitat degradation, according to a report released by Botanic Gardens Conservation International and Fauna and Flora International.

BEETLE'S BEAUTY LIES IN IMPERFECTION: The ancient Egyptians worshipped it and strove to duplicate its iridescent colours. Now physicists have laid bare the secret of the scarab beetle's unusually vibrant shell. *Gymnopleurus virens* beetles have shell that change from red in the centre to green around the edges or from green to blue. To understand why, scientists examined the shell and found that the shells are made of thousands of ultrathin layers, with each successive layer slightly twisted in relation to the one above (a corkscrew effect). The corkscrew structure causes the shell to reflect only that portion of light which has the same corkscrew orientation-known as circularly polarised light, and when the corkscrews match, you get a reflection of almost 100%. The shell has defects in which a layer can swing 90°, allowing the shell to reflect more than one wavelength of light and give its iridescence.

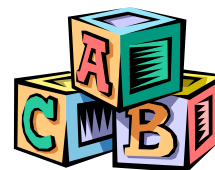

No Seatbelt = \$500 You have been warned!

As at 6th of April 2007 In line with the known increase in injury severity from not wearing an appropriate restraint the penalties for not wearing seatbelts increased to \$500.

Police will no longer be issuing cautions for no seatbelt.

Therefore it is pretty simple, wear a seatbelt or get a \$500 infringement.

Driver's Licence Testing

To ensure consistency in the testing of motor driver's licences across Western Australia and to provide a better frontline policing service, the WA Police and Department for Planning and Infrastructure (DPI) have agreed that the leading responsibility for testing in regional areas will now be transferred to the DPI .

As of 1 July 2008, DPI will take full responsibility for testing in regional areas (testing will no longer be conducted by Police).

As an interim measure, police officers will only test drivers if the officer holds the class of licence being applied for.

Currently this means that only Sgt Power can test for Heavy Vehicle (LR, MR, HR & HC) and Motorcycle (R & R-E) licences. Please note that if I am on leave or not available these classes will not be able to be tested for. Both Sgt Power and Senior Constable Watkins are able to test for car licences.

Also when attending the station for testing, please ensure that you bring identification with you.

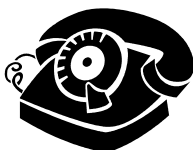

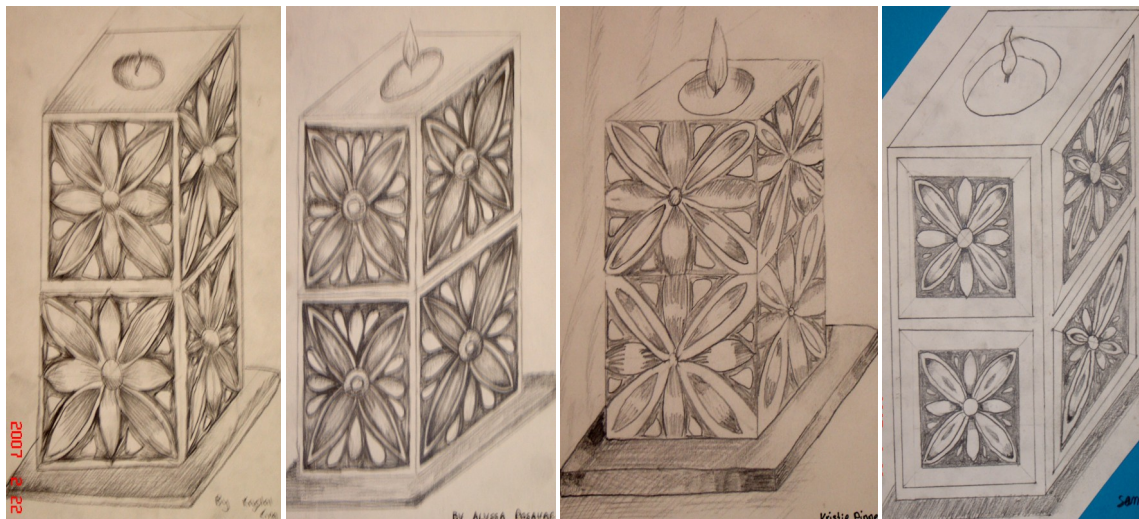

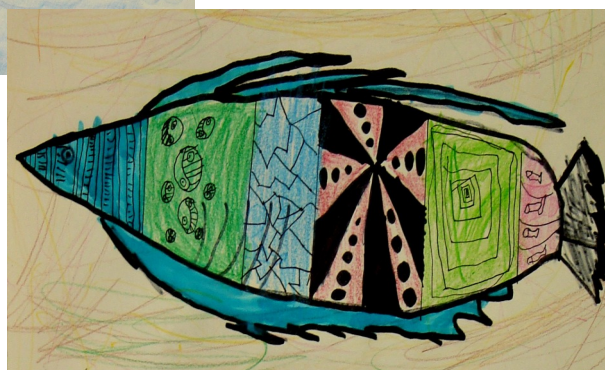

ANZAC Day 2007

In term one of this year, the year 9 and 10 students studied World War I in their Society and Environment course. Watching live film footage and hearing the letters and testimonies of those involved in military service, gave them a much greater understanding and appreciation of what the men and women who fought for us, went through. The students also studied a brief synopsis of World War II. They then had a class brainstorming session on what could be done to have a relevant meaningful commemoration for Anzac Day in Lake Grace. When asked what's the purpose of Anzac Day, the students responded : to show respect to, and give thanks to those who fought for us, and to have sensitivity that for some, some of the memories are tough.

Two teams were formed from the results of this discussion. One team of students worked on a powerpoint presentation, deciding what they wanted to communicate:

1. What Anzac stands for—meaning
2. What Anzac means to us, and why we should remember
3. Dates/year/locations, of the wars and the events that occurred
4. Live film footage of battle
5. Life after the war for the Australian soldiers
6. The second team created posters and approached the local business owners requesting permission to put the posters up on their premises.

On the 23rd April the year 9 and 10 students put all the chairs out in the Town Hall and practiced their media presentation. The following day students greeted community members involved in military service and accompanied them to their seats in the Town Hall.

The Lake Grace District High School cadets, with the whole school from Pre-Primary to Year 10, marched up to the Town Hall at 9:40am. The cadets lined the sides of the Hall and stood at attention until the School Captain welcomed everyone and the powerpoint presentation began.

At the conclusion of the presentation, the community

members and school students, led by the cadets marched back to the school.

Here a Prayer of Remembrance and the Anzac Requiem were read by members of the Student Council. A wreath was laid beneath the Australian flag pole; the last Post was played which was followed by one minute's silence. Reveille followed, and all joined in singing the National Anthem. After the poem, Flanders Field, was read by a year 8 student council, the year 9 and 10's distributed Anzac biscuits that they had made to all present.

Those community members involved in military service, or representing those involved in military service were then invited into the school staff room for morning tea.

Make Tracks2School Program

A new program and campaign to help increase the number of children who walk and ride to school was launched on Monday, the first day back at school, at Alinjarra Primary School by Planning and Infrastructure Minister Alannah MacTiernan MLA.

The make tracks2school program, which is a partnership project between the Department for Planning and Infrastructure, the Premier's Physical Activity Taskforce and the Heart Foundation, with support from the Department of Education and Training, will run in Term 2 from 7 May to 1 June.

The program was developed in response to the Child and Adolescent Physical Activity and Nutrition (CAPANS) 2003 Survey, which found that more than one quarter of Western Australian children and young people were overweight or obese.

The Heart Foundation will also launch an advertising campaign in partnership with WA Police to raise awareness among parents of the steps they can take to encourage their children to walk and cycle to school.

The six-week advertising campaign is funded by Healthway and stresses the important health, social and environmental benefits of walking and cycling for physical activity, while addressing the perceived barriers - personal safety and road safety.

The need for these programs has been further confirmed by new research from the Heart Foundation to be released tomorrow. The survey found that the majority of Perth parents believed that driving their children to school was easier than allowing them to walk or cycle, despite also agreeing that they did not live too far from school to walk or cycle and that there were enough safe walking paths along the way.

Assistant Police Commissioner John McRoberts will address parent concerns and outline steps parents can take to ensure their children are safe when walking and cycling to school. He will also emphasise the importance of the 40km an hour speed limit in school zones.

Regional WA Gets Smart

Sports Medicine Australia (WA Branch) launches **GET SMART**, an on-line injury prevention and management course via the internet.

Distance will no longer be a barrier for people interested in or involved in sport or physical activity to gain up to date information on injury prevention and management as well as a range of sports safety issues.

GET SMART (Sports Medicine Awareness and Response Training) is a non-accredited on-line course divided into six modules:

- ✱ Module 1 Warm Up and Cool Down
- ✱ Module 2 Approaches to Injury Prevention
- ✱ Module 3 Immediate Management of Injuries
- ✱ Module 4 Environmental Conditions
- ✱ Module 5 Infectious Diseases and Infection Control
- ✱ Module 6 Medical Conditions

Sports Trainer Rodney Thornton of Bruce Rock was

one of the first people to access the course on-line and he said "Its fantastic I can now sit in the comfort of my home and have the same opportunity as the city dwellers for information and education".

The course is suitable for people of all ages. It is estimated that each module will take approximately 15 minutes – 30 minutes to complete depending on your existing level of knowledge.

Never look at the Sun with the naked eye, binoculars or a telescope without a proper solar filter, preferably with one that fits over the skyward end as your eyes can be quickly damaged beyond repair.

Our local star the Sun remains in the constellation of Aries this fortnight at magnitude -26.72. This fortnight morning twilight begins around 5:15am and evening twilight ends around 6:50pm.

On Monday 30th at 7:46pm the Moon will be at Apogee (furthest), 406,209 kilometres from Earth at 93% in the constellation of Virgo. The full Moon will be at 5:59pm on Wednesday 2nd May still in Virgo at magnitude -12.0. On Saturday 5th in Scorpius, the Moon will be 0.5° (close) south of the supergiant red double star Antares (the double shines green). In Capricornus on Thursday 10th at 12:17pm the last quarter Moon shines at magnitude -6.0. The Moon this fortnight resides in Leo on Saturday 28th at 81%. Virgo on 29th at 88% on 30th at 93% on 1st May at 97% and 2nd at 99%. Libra on 3rd at 100% and 4th at 98%. Scorpius on 5th at 95%. Ophiuchus on 6th at 90%. Sagittarius on 7th at 84%, 8th at 75% and 9th at 66%. Capricornus on 10th at 56% and 11th at 45% illumination.

MERCURY at magnitude -1.2 in Aries rises at 6:08am and will be on the far side of the Sun at Superior Conjunction on Thursday 3rd May and will be in the evening twilight from there on.

VENUS at a bright magnitude of -4.1 in Taurus sets on Saturday at 7:48pm. On Wednesday 9th Venus will be in Gemini and on Friday 11th will set at 7:58pm in the south west.

The red planet **MARS** rises at 2:38am on Saturday morning in Aquarius at magnitude +1.0. On Thursday 10th Mars rises in Pisces at 2:34am and 2:33am on Friday 11th.

JUPITER the giant gas planet at magnitude -2.5 rises at 7:53pm in the constellation of Ophiuchus (the serpent carrier), along with its four moons that can be viewed IO, Europa, Ganymede and Callisto. On May 5th Jupiter

will be 0.5° (close), north of the Moon. Jupiter rises at 6:57pm on Friday 11th.

The ringed planet **SATURN** in the constellation of Leo sets 30 minutes after midnight on Saturday at +0.4 magnitude. Saturn sets at 11:36pm on Friday 11th, along with its five brighter moons Enceladus, Tethys, Dione, Rhea and Titan.

URANUS rises at 2:43am in Aquarius at magnitude +5.9 on Saturday morning and at 2:02am on 11th.

NEPTUNE rises in Capricornus at 12:43am Saturday at magnitude +7.9 and at 11:45pm on 11th. A pair of binoculars or small telescope will find them.

On Friday 9th Jupiter's great red spot can be viewed from 8:24pm for about one hour. It can also be viewed at 10pm on Friday 11th.

As the moons travel around Jupiter they travel across the face of the planet disc along with their shadow, they are also eclipsed as they travel behind. They are in different positions around the planet each night, for example they can be four in a line, two on each side, one on one side and 3 on the other; there are many other configurations.

On Tuesday 8th at 8:44pm IO's shadow starts its journey across the planet and the moon at 9:24pm. On Wednesday 9th, at 8:44pm, IO moves from behind the planet (looks like a pimple on the planet). At 9:31pm the moon Europa disappears behind the planet. On Friday 11th at 7:36pm Europa moves from in front of the planet. A telescope of any size can see these events as well as the coloured bands, a stronger telescope can see the individual storm clouds.

Please ring for information anytime for information. Call if you see any 'strange happenings', please take note of the direction that the object is traveling, constellation, time viewed and colours if possible.

During March a survey was conducted into the needs for childcare and outside school hours care in Lake Grace. We would like to thank everyone who completed the survey for their time and effort.

Thirty four families completed the survey, with about 50% of these not requiring childcare services. It is important to note that many of those who do not require childcare services do not have children within the target age range of 0 - 12.

The survey results showed that there are 21 families (consisting of 35 children) requiring childcare services in Lake Grace. Most of these families have both parents working, studying or looking for work.

Most of the parents requiring childcare indicated that they would need a service from 8.30am until 5.30pm (91%) however there is one family who requires childcare from 7am until 6pm. It is also important to note that only one of the respondents indicated that the current service of 9am – 3pm suited their family.

The average price families are prepared to pay for childcare varied between \$20 and \$50 for full-time care, and a reduced rate for after-school care.

As you can see from the table above, the type of care required in Lake Grace are relatively evenly required for both during school hours and after-school hours.

The type of care required. (More than one box could be ticked.)

It was also found that an average of eight children (aged 5–12) require after-school care five days a week, while an average of five children required full-time childcare (aged 0-5) also every day. School holiday care was required in Lake Grace for 14 children, 60% of these were over the age of 5.

Where to from here?

This survey has clearly identified a need for after-school care in the Lake Grace community for the 5 – 12 year old age group. It has also shown that

there is a need for extended childcare services above those currently in the community.

We would like to encourage the Lake Grace community to continue to discuss the issue of childcare and the important role it plays in business and community development.

Buloke Barley Trials Continuing

A decision on the status of the new Victorian barley variety, Buloke, is not expected until after September this year.

The Chairman of the Western Region Barley Council (WRBC) Steve Tilbrook said the promising new variety was still undergoing commercial malting and pilot brewing trials, and farmers should have no expectations at this stage.

Mr Tilbrook said Buloke's grain yield was very competitive against Stirling, Hamelin, Gairdner and Baudin. "In statewide variety evaluation trials conducted by the Department of Agriculture and Food over the four seasons of 2003 to 2006, it out-yielded Baudin and Gairdner by six per cent, and Hamelin and Stirling by ten per cent. It also has a better over-all disease resistance package than the other four varieties," Mr Tilbrook said. "There is understandably strong interest in Buloke. However, Barley Australia is still carrying out commercial acceptance trials, and there are many decisions yet to be made. There should be no expectation that Buloke will be accredited as a malting barley, and no expectation that it will be received as a malting barley in Western Australia," Mr Tilbrook said.

"Once trials are complete, the WRBC will review the results and their implications for WA," he said.

"It will then be up to member companies such as the Grain Pool, Joe White Maltings and Kirin Australia to determine if Buloke is commercially received in WA as a malting barley."

The Chairman of the Malting and Brewing Industry Barley Technical Committee, Mark Goldsmith, said that Buloke had so far only completed one year of commercial testing. "Whilst the results are encouraging, there are still brewing quality issues to be overcome," Dr Goldsmith said.

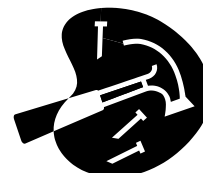
Joe White Maltings will run a small batch of Buloke grain through its plant at Forrestfield this year to obtain some local data on its malting performance in Western Australia. JWM maltster Mark Hambly said this did not mean that Buloke would be received by the company.

"The batch is part of a testing regime to assist with decisions on what varieties might suit the markets the company produces malt for, domestically and internationally in south-east Asia," Mr Hambly said.

For the 2007 season, the maximum grade that Buloke can be delivered into will be feed barley, unless production is contracted for further commercial evaluation.

Kikuyu Poisoning Suspected in Cattle Deaths

Kikuyu pasture poisoning is suspected in 40 confirmed cattle deaths on at least nine properties on Western Australia's south coast over the past two days.

Department of Agriculture and Food District Veterinary Officer in Albany Danny Roberts said laboratory tests were underway to confirm the cause of the livestock deaths. "The clinical signs seen and the history are consistent with kikuyu poisoning, so farmers should closely watch livestock grazing on kikuyu pasture," Dr Roberts said. "The poisoning outbreaks are west of Albany. All occurred within days of cattle being introduced to kikuyu pastures. One property has lost 17 animals," he said.

Dr Roberts said farmers should be extremely cautious when introducing livestock to lush growths of kikuyu pasture. "If stock are not removed from the pasture at the first signs of this disease, mortality rates can be very high," he said.

DAFWA's principal veterinary toxicologist Dr Jeremy Allen said kikuyu poisoning was rare. "Toxicity can be the result of rapid growth in drought stressed kikuyu pasture following rainfall, as has occurred along Western Australia's southern coast in the past week," he said.

"Severe outbreaks of kikuyu poisoning have involved the application of fertiliser to kikuyu pasture prior to rainfall." Cattle may become affected within 24 hours of grazing toxic pasture. "Sometimes a dead animal is the first sign of a problem," Dr Allen said.

"Affected animals drool excessively, are lethargic and stop eating. They often have a staggering high stepping gait. "They appear thirsty and will stand over water, but don't drink, and so become very dehydrated.

Dr Allen advised farmers grazing stock on kikuyu to be vigilant. "If signs of poisoning are noted, remove them immediately," he said.

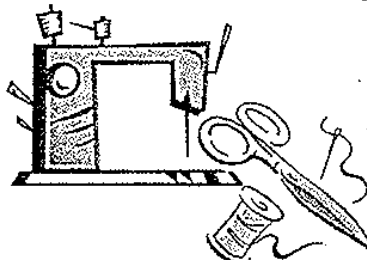
