

• I have been receiving a great deal of comment recently on dogs being allowed to wander the streets, either with their owner and not on a leash or simply going solo. Personally I like dogs but I have no wish to own one, therefore I don't think I should have to clean up dog poo from my yard. I have watched irresponsible dog owners allow their dogs to poo on the verge outside my home without the owner cleaning up (I have windows). Nor should I have someone's dog adopt me when I'm out for a walk. These are minor irritations compared to the fear of being attacked. Your dog may be intimidating a jogger or walker. Having had one of my children attacked by a dog I am fully aware that somebody's much loved pet can turn on someone that they actually know quite well. By the same token there are plenty of responsible dog owners with their pets on leads and 'doggy doo' bag in hand. If you're not sure of your responsibilities as a dog owner, please read page 31.

• Working With Children checks. There seems to be some confusion as to what to do. Sarah Silvester, our Regional Officer from the Department of Sport and Recreation would be only too happy to have one of their experts come to Lake Grace and talk about the responsibilities facing those who may be coaching or working with children. The Department do not want anyone applying for these checks if they don't need to, they are in fact rejecting some who have applied prematurely. If you're coaching junior footy for example and your son plays in the team then you do not need to apply. Parents, step parents and grandparents are exempted if their child is involved in the sport/activity that they will also be involved in. If you're called in as an emergency relief

to coach, you're also in the clear. Volunteers are allowed to be involved up to five times per year without needing a WWC clearance.

- Local phone books are now available. They are \$5.50 each. If you were one of those organised people who got a copy when they were first at the Post Office, you may need a page replaced. If you have Newton-Owen repeated please come to the Telecentre and we will replace that page. There is only 4-6 copies that need fixing.

Save a Life Day 16th May 2007

On the 16th May, 62 students (Yrs 5-10) from Lake Grace District High School, will be learning the skills to save a life as they attempt to break the Guinness World Record for the largest CPR training session.

As part of St John Ambulance SAVE A LIFE DAY, of which SGIO is a major sponsor, the students will undertake a short First Aid course in an attempt to break the record which stands at 2308 participants. The Lake Grace students will join 3000 students from Perth and 2000 students from regional areas in the record attempt. Lake Grace students will take part in the attempt at the Lake Grace Shire Hall from 10am—12 pm on the 16th May.

Every student will learn CPR on the Mini Anne manikin, a component of the CPR123 kit which also includes a practice DVD and a basic life support book. Students will take this kit home on completion of the session and will be encouraged to teach CPR to at least two other family members or friends.

SAVE A LIFE DAY forms part of St John Ambulance's vision of having one member in every West Australian household First Aid trained by 2010.

The day will also see the launch of a new free interactive online First Aid Crash Course. This 20 minute course, located at www.stjohnambulance.com.au, teaches participants the basic skills to save a life by showing them how to recognize an unconscious person, place them in the recovery position, perform CPR and stop bleeding.

Approximately 75 per cent of cardiac arrests occur in peoples homes but only 25 per cent of cardiac arrest patients receive CPR prior to the arrival of emergency services.

St John Ambulance Medical Director, Dr Garry Wilkes, said that administering First Aid can mean the difference between life and death which is why it is important that people make learning lifesaving skills a priority.

"The first few minutes after an emergency situation are vital. In cases where the heart stops, the brain begins to die after three to five minutes so oxygenated blood flow to the brain is critical—this is achieved by doing the basic skill of CPR, " said Dr Wilkes.

"When CPR is performed promptly and effectively it can more than double a victims chance of survival. Over the past 10 years the number of bystanders or relatives performing CPR has increase from 16 per cent to 25 per cent, which is fantastic, but we want to see this increase even further."

"With the new simpler and easier CPR guidelines introduced last year and with first aid courses taking as little as half an hour to complete there are no excuses for not learning CPR." he said.

SGIO State Manager Garry Moore said the SGIO was

proud to be partnering the St John Ambulance SAVE & LIFE DAY as it represented a powerful example of business working with the community to help prople increase safety in the workplace, at home and on the road

"SAVE A LIFE DAY is such a great initiative, we see it as a large step in helping St John Ambulance towards their vision of having one member in every West Australian household First Aid trained by 2010," said Mr Moore.

Regional areas participating in SAVE A LIFE DAY include Albany, Bunbury, Busselton, Chittering/Gin Gin, Collie, Doonybrook, Geraldton, Kalgoolie, Karratha, Kununurra, Lake Grace, Laverton, Margaret River, Merredin, Mt Barker, Narrambeen, Northcliffre, North Midland, Pinjarra and Tom Price.

The public are encouraged to participate in SAVE A LIFE DAY by logging on to www.stjohnambulance.com.au and taking part in the online crash course anytime from 16 May onwards.

SAVE A LIFE DAY was launched in 2006 when St John Ambulance WA broke the Guinness World Record previously held by the American Heart Association. St John Ambulance in the largest provider of First Aid courses in Western Australia, training a record 82,785 West Australians in First Aid last year.

On Sunday 20th the planet Venus can be viewed in the daylight 1.7° south of the Moon which will be 11% illuminated in Gemini and will be due north at 3:45pm. Use binoculars or scope if unsighted then use naked eye.

Our local star the Sun will reside in Aries until Wednesday 10th when it will rise in Taurus at magnitude -26.72. This fortnight morning twilight begins at 5:21am and evening twilight ends around 6:44pm.

The Moon on Tuesday 15th at 10:56pm will be at Perigee (closest), 359,390 kilometres from Earth. The new Moon will occur at 3:17am on Thursday 17th. On Thursday 24th, The Moon will be at 1st quarter phase at 4:52am and will also be 0.7° (close), south of the blue star Regulas. The Moon this fortnight resides in Aquarius at 34% on12th, in Pisces on 13th at 23%, 14th at 14% and on 15th at 7%. Aries on 16th at 2% and 17th at 0%. Taurus on 18th at 1% and 19th at 5%, Gemini on 20th at 11% and 21st at 19%, Cancer on 22nd at 28% and 23rd at38%, Leo on 24th at 48% and 25th at 58%. This will help to identify the Constellations.

Mercury set at 5:51pm in Taurus, 30 minutes after sunset at -1.5 magnitude on Saturday. On Friday 18th Mercury will be 3° (thumb at arms length) south of the Moon. Mercury sets at 6:28pm on Friday 25th and be easily viewed as it sets 1 and quarter hours after sunset.

Venus at a bright -4.1 magnitude in the constellation of Gemini sets on Saturday evening at 7:59pm in the north/west. On Friday 25th Venus sets at 8:14pm.

Mars the red planet in the constellation of Pisces, rises at 2:33am on Saturday morning at magnitude +0.9. On Sunday Mars will be 3° south of the Moon. Mars on

Friday 25th in the constellation of Cetus (the whale or monster), will rise at 2:27am.

Jupiter the giant gas planet in the constellation of Ophiuchus (the serpent carrier), rises at 6:53pm at -2.5 magnitude on Saturday evening and at 5:56pm on Friday evening 25th.

Saturn the ringed planet in the constellation of Leo at magnitude +0.4 sets at 11:33pm on Saturday. On Wednesday 23rd, Saturn will be 0.8° (close) south of the Moon. Saturn sets at 10:45pm on Friday 25th.

Uranus the blue/green gas planet in the constellation of Aquarius rises at 1:51am on Saturday morning at magnitude +5.9 north of the Moon at 1.3°. On Friday 25th, Uranus rises at 1am.

Neptune the grey/green coloured gas planet in Capricornus rise at 11:45pm on Saturday evening at +7.9 magnitude. On Friday 25th Neptune rises at 10:54pm. A pair of binoculars or telescope is best to find Uranus and Neptune.

Meteors at 5 per hour in Sagittarius are visible on Saturday morning 19th.

On Saturday Saturn will be at 45° in the north in front of the upside down and back to front head of the lion in the shape of a hand sickle or question mark. At 7pm the bright blue star Regulas will be near the same place.

In the east the funny looking obscured square is the constellation of Corvus the crow which harbours the planetary nebula, the ghost of Saturn and the two merging Galaxies NGC 4038 and 4039 called the mice.

Enrolling to vote to Require proof of identity

From 16 April 2007, Australian citizens will need to prove their identity when enrolling to vote or update their enrolment, with a new federal enrolment procedure being introduced.

The divisional Returning Officer of O'Connor, Michaela Miller said that from 16th April, people would need to provide proof of their identity when enrolling for the first time, re-enrolling to get back on the roll or update their enrolment because they had moved.

"A new purple enrolment form will be available from 16th April in all Australia Post outlets and Australian Electoral Commission (AEC) offices, and a new on-line form on the AEC website at www.aec.gov.au." she said.

After 16 April the previous green forms, and forms downloaded from the website before 16 April, cannot be used for Federal enrolment".

Mrs Miller said there would be three ways to demonstrate your indentity when filling in the new purple form.

"Most Australians simply need to provide their

driver's licence number."

"Anyone that doesn't have a driver's licence, can show another identity document such as a medicare card or an Australian passport. They can also get an 'authorized person' to sign a declaration on the enrolment form," she said.

"Thirdly, anyone that doesn't have a drivers licence or an acceptable identity document can have two enrolled people, who have known them for at least a month, confirm their identity by signing their form."

More information on the new enrolment identity requirements is available in the AEC's website at www.aec.gov.au or by calling the AEC on 13 12 16

Mrs Miller reminded people that it was their responsibility to enroll to vote and to keep it up to date by completing a new enrolment form every time they move.

High Level of Interest in WA's Electoral Boundary Review

Community interest in the distribution of the State's electoral boundaries is high, with an increased number of submissions received by the Office of the Electoral Distribution Commissioners as the first stage of the process to redraw Western Australia's electoral boundaries.

A total of 33 written suggestions had been received when submissions closed at 5.00 pm on Friday 4 May, which is a significant increase on the last boundary distribution conducted in 2003.

Electoral Commissioner Warwick Gately said submissions had been received from political parties and local governments as well as other interested individuals and groups.

"The larger number of written suggestions received is an indication of the strong interest being shown in the distribution of the State's electoral boundaries," Mr Gately said.

"There have been eight submissions from political parties and members of parliament, 10 submissions from local government authorities and 15 submissions from community groups and individuals.

"All submissions will be considered by the Electoral Distribution Commissioners before the proposed new boundaries are published on 29 June."

Mr Gately said that the increased interest in the process could be attributed to the extensive change expected as a result of legislation passed in 2005 based on 'one vote, one value' principles.

"All written suggestions received have been placed on the boundaries web site at www.boundarieswa.com and can be viewed at the Office of the Electoral Distribution Commissioners at Level 11, 111 St Georges Terrace, Perth.

"Interested groups or individuals now have until 5.00 pm on Friday 18 May to lodge written comments on these initial suggestions."

Once all the written comments have been received, the Electoral Distribution Commissioners have a period of 42 days to consider all suggestions and comments before publishing the proposed boundaries on Friday 29 June. There is then a 30 day period for interested groups or individuals to lodge any objections to the proposals.

The Electoral Distribution Commissioners have a further 90 days to consider the objections and prepare the final boundaries. The new boundaries will be published on Monday 29 October and it is these boundaries that will be used at the next State general election.

SCIENCE AND STUFF

BIOFUEL'S DIRTY LITTLE SECRET:

As a cure for our addiction for oil, ethanol turns out to have some nasty side effects. Pollution from gasoline engines accounts for 10,000 deaths in the US each year, along with thousands of cases of respiratory disease and even cancer. The widely touted ethanol-based fuel E85 (15 per cent gasoline, 85 per cent

ethanol) could make matters worse. Mark Jacobson of Stanford University in California modelled emissions for cars expected to be on the road in 2020. The model assumed that carbon emissions would be 60 per cent less than 2002 levels, so overall deaths would be halved. However, an E85-fuelled fleet would cause 185 more pollution-related deaths per year than a petrol one across the US, most of them in Los Angeles.

The findings, to be published in Environmental Science and Technology, run counter to the idea that ethanol is a cleaner-burning fuel. While ethanol-burning cars will emit fewer carcinogens such as benzene and butadiene, they will spew out 20 times as much acetaldehyde as those using conventional fuel.

Acetaldehyde can react with sunlight to form ozone, one of the main constituents of smog, and so increase the risks to people's health. Without the predicted 60 per cent emissions cut it will be worse. "if we went on today's emissions, there could be two-and-a-half times more damage," Jacobson says. "there are so many people barking pretty loud about biofuels. They've been pushing these things before the science is done. Now the question is: will people listen?"

ANTI-CANCER PILL: Regular aspirin use may protect more than just your heart-it could also reduce your risk of getting cancer. Aditya Bardia and colleagues at the Mayo Clinic College of Medicine in Rochester Minnesota, analysed the cancer history of more than 22,000 post-menopausal women over 12 years.

Those who reported taking aspirin regularly at the start of the study were less likely to develop cancer and 13 per cent less likely to die from it during that time. The only lifestyle factor that influenced the results was smoking, which reduced the protective effect slightly of aspirin's anti-inflammatories, such as ibuprofen. The findings were presented at a meeting of the American Association for cancer Research in Los Angeles in April.

STOP-AND-GO LIGHT: In 1999 Lene Hau and her colleagues at Harvard University slowed light travelling at 300,000 kms per second down to 63 kms per hour. A few years later the team stopped a beam of light completely. This year Hau's team added another quantum trick: turning light into matter and then back to light again. The matter was a pair of ultracold atomic gases called Bose-Einstein condensates (BECs). In Hau's experiment a laser pulse struck one BEC and imparted its energy to the condensate. Thus imprinted,

the BEC's atoms formed a matter wave that travelled 160 microns before hitting the second BEC, which absorbed the atoms. Those atoms radiated a light pulse that was an exact duplicate of the original. Hau speculates that the technique described may someday be used in optical communications or ultraprecise navigation systems (Nature February 8th).

BIG, HEAVY AND LOOKS LIKE A FERN: At 8 metres long, it had to be hauled out of the ground with a hydraulic lift normally reserved for dinosaurs. But this fossil formed around 385 million years ago-long before dinosaurs even existed. It's a tree from the Gilboa fossil forest, New York. The site, which contains the oldest trees in the fossil record, is well known to palaeontologists. Until now they had only uncovered fossil tree stumps, leaving them guessing about the appearance of the tree tops.

Now they know. The trunk had large branches, with fronds similar to a modern-day tree fern. Although they were related to tree ferns, the fossil tree has been assigned to a group of plants known as cladoxylopsids. A forest of such trees would have provided a rich habitat for other organisms, as well as boosting ancient Earth's biodiversity, says team member Chris Berry. Fossils of millipede-like detritivores were found at the site.

Such forests may also account for the drop in atmospheric carbon dioxide levels seen in the fossil record around that time and the Earth's system. (Nature, vol 446, p 904).

THREATENED FROGS: Australia's frogs are under attack from a deadly fungal disease. Researchers from Griffith University in Queensland have recently completed a study of frogs from Cairns to Melbourne and say the deadly chytrid fungus is firmly established in frog populations throughout eastern Australia.

Jean-Marc Hero from Griffith's Endangered Frog Research Centre says if the disease spreads further, one-third of the world's 6,000 amphibian species could be threatened with extinction. "Frogs are probably the most threatened group of vertebrates on the planet at the moment," he said. "Hundreds of species worldwide have disappeared in the last 20 to 30 years and so as a biological indicator of the environment, we're very concerned." (From ABC Big Pond News May 1st 2007 at 2:30pm).

- Develop a flexible attitude when visiting your relative or friend. We all have high and low energy days and the person with dementia may be tired that day and the visit may not go as you had planned.
- Be kind to yourself. Visiting can sometimes be sad and difficult, and you may need nurturing – perhaps take a supportive friend with you, or plan a treat for yourself on the way home.

- Take something with you to engage the person: a magazine or the newspaper, to read out interesting articles or do the quiz together.
- Introduce yourself on arrival, for example, "Hello Mum, it's me Elizabeth, your daughter". This reduces the person's anxiety as you remind them of your name and connection to them - don't make the person guess.
- Tap into, and utilise the person's remaining strengths, their humour, long-term memories and the five senses, eg. take along seasonal flowers.

Responsible Dog Ownership

Dogs in Public Places

Many people are frightened or annoyed by dogs that are not leashed in public areas. At no time should your dog become a nuisance or impede other people's enjoyment.

Local governments may declare a dog "dangerous" if it attacks, shows a tendency to attack or repeatedly rushes, threatens or chases people or animals. Once your dog is declared dangerous, or if it is a restricted breed, you will have to put a muzzle on it at all times in a public place.

Roaming dogs

- Dogs that roam are potentially a public safety risk to motorists, pedestrians and other animals.
 Irresponsible owners will be liable for any injuries or damage caused by their dog.
- Dog attacks on adults are caused mostly by dogs roaming outside their owners' properties. Children who come into contact with roaming dogs at parks and other public places are more vulnerable to dog attacks.
- Keep your dog adequately confined on your property and follow the rules of responsible pet ownership to help prevent your dog attacking someone.
- Roaming dogs often approach and sometimes attack other dogs.

Everyone is entitled to walk in their neighbourhood without being harassed or attacked by uncontrolled and often quite frightening dogs.

Even if your dog is well behaved, it can be frightening to other people if it is roaming unattended.

Although you may think your dog is unlikely to attack a person, roaming dogs often approach and sometimes attack other dogs. Responsible pet owners and their dogs are often targets of these attacks.

\$10,000 fines for dog attacks

A dog attack is a very serious matter. If your dog attacks a person or another animal, you will be held responsible even if you are not there at the time.

You may have a defence if your dog is provoked, attacked or abused, or if someone enters your premises unlawfully, including a private residence or vehicle.

A dog attack includes a dog aggressively rushing at or attempting to attack a person or animal, as well as tearing clothing, biting or causing physical injury.

There are penalties of up to \$10,000 for a dog attack and/or 12 months' imprisonment for inciting a dog to attack.

Local governments may seek a court order for a dog to be destroyed if it has attacked and caused injury or damage.

The dog's owner is also liable for any injury or damage resulting from a dog attack. A person who has been attacked may take private legal action for any injury or damage.

Preventing dog attacks

To reduce the potential for dog attacks, dog owners should:

- Limit the risky genetics (select an appropriate breed).
- Understand the animal.
- Train the animal.
- Limit the risky circumstances (restrain the animal in potential attack situations).

When dogs need to be on a leash

In urban areas, your dog must always be on a leash in public, except at designated dog exercise areas. As the owner, you can be given an on-the-spot fine of \$100 for not having your dog on a leash or for allowing it to roam. If the matter goes to court, the penalty could be up to \$1000. Check with your local government for the location of dog exercise areas in your local area. Even in dog exercise areas, dog owners should still carry a leash at all times, and ensure the dog remains in reasonable proximity. If a local government declares your dog a "dangerous dog" or it is a restricted breed, then it must be kept on a leash in public places at all times even if it is in a dog exercise area.

Dog excreta

When exercising your dog in a public place, you should always clean up after it. Most local governments have local laws that require the person in charge of a dog in a public place to remove their dog's excreta and dispose of it. There are penalties for not doing so. Some local governments provide "plastic poo bags" and animal waste bins so that you can keep the environment clean for the enjoyment of others. Dog excreta in the garden should also be removed daily to reduce fly and health related problems.
