Meteor Showers & the Magical Milky Way

Stargazers will be treated to a special display when the Eta-Aquarids Meteor Shower passes by. This shower comes from Halley's Comet which orbits the sun once every 76 years and is not due to return to Earth until 2061. However, it still treats us to two meteor showers per year with the second shower being the Orionids on display in October.

The eta-Aquarids Meteor Shower is active from 19th April to 28th May with the peak happening on 6th May. With no Moon to wash out the views, it will be perfect conditions. It's predicted that there will be up to 50 meteors per hour at the peak of activity. It's worth seeing this meteor shower in the week or so either side as there can be up to 30 meteors per hour in the off-peak times.

When to look: Best seen before sunrise.

Which direction to look: On the eastern horizon, below Jupiter and Saturn.

Another awesome sight to see in our spectacular dark night skies, is the band of the Milky Way, stretching right across the sky. From mid autumn to mid spring, we look towards the centre or core of our own galaxy and see a cloudy band of billions of stars that arcs from

the south east to the south west. Many people around the world are unable to witness this breathtaking view due to light pollution, however out in country WA, we can enjoy the experience of seeing the stunning Milky Way Galaxy in all its glory.

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George Battison 18/03/1931–13/03/2022

George was born the 18th March 1931 at the Lake Grace Inland Mission Hospital, now a very good Museum. George's mother was taken to Hospital a distance of 50 kilometres from their property in Pingaring, by horse and cart. 1931 was also when the Byass Family arrived in Pingaring to establish the first Pingaring Store. Arnold was then eight years old and can remember Mrs. Battison coming to the store to show off George.

Our families have been friends and neighbours for 91 years. The Byass Family are very grateful to George for his loyal friendship, care and kindness over all these years. George and Arnold were more than good mates, they had a very Special Friendship as they had a shared history from school days to retirement.

They discussed everything and shared lots of similar views and interest in farming, the weather, their Bible - The Elders Weekly, politics and sport. Conversations around our untidy tables were never dull. They shared unique senses of humour, off beat jokes and quick wits. The one thing they disagreed on was sheep, George loved his sheep and breeding good strong stock and fine wool. Arnold didn't. George loved his dogs, in fact he loved all animals.

Life was not easy for George as a child, he was the youngest of three children. Bob, who was eight years older and Olive seven years older. Both now deceased. Georges father was at the landing in Gallipoli 1915 - 1916. He was one of the first settlers in Pingaring in 1923.


The following is an extract written by George from the Pingaring History Book. "My father was seriously injured when a spring cart rolled over on him in 1928. Unfortunately, there was no doctor in Lake Grace at the time only two nursing sisters at the Inland Mission Hospital, who made him as comfortable as possible and placed him on a stretcher. He was sent through to Perth in the guards van on the train where he spent almost two years in Perth public hospital before returning to the farm, walking with the aid of a walking stick until his death in 1953."

Mrs. Battison left in 1935 when George was four years old. Mrs Battison took Olive with her and the boys stayed with Mr. Battison. Fortunately George did have contact with his mother during his life and he never blamed her for leaving. George said his mother was a very good cook and did housekeeping work.

When Mr. Battison was ploughing or working in the paddock he would mark out an area under some shade and George wasn't allowed to go out of the line. George said "I spent quite a lot of time like that." Bob being eight years older was picking rocks or mallee roots.

Mrs. Turner, Maggie Fisher's Mother, lived on the next

door farm, which was a couple of miles from Battisons. George and Maggie were the same age and very good



friends all of their lives. He was a regular visitor until Maggie started correspondence and Mrs Turner suggested he do them also. George said he wasn't too keen on that idea.

George started school at the age of eight when the school building was relocated to Pingaring from Burngup.

George said, "I enjoyed school and I was determined to make 8th Standard. Mrs Murray encouraged me to stay and I left school the year I turned 15." George continued his education all through his life with his inquisitive mind and interest in local and world affairs and his general knowledge. George was blessed to have a good sense of humour and a quick wit. A gift we all enjoyed.

I always enjoyed what George told me about meeting Marie. Marie lived in Claremont, sewing at the Mental Hospital. "This is not where we met. We actually met on a Ferris Wheel and started going around together." George and Marie were married on the 8th October, 1955 and were married almost 54 years when Marie died on the 13th. August, 2009. George and Marie had three sons Kenneth, Raymond (Dec) and Colin.

George and Marie treasured their family. Ken married Brenda. They worked in the wheatbelt and eventually settled in Albany. Sadly Brenda died of cancer in 2016 and Ken cared for Brenda so well at home with Brenda just going into Hospice at the end. I am so pleased Ken has found companionship with Trudy.

Colin and Nora were married in 1991, built a home and lived in Pingaring until 2004 when they moved to Albany. Colin and Nora have two children Luke and Kirsty both whom Marie and George adored. Luke and Amy now have a daughter Darcy and Kirsty is married to Matt. Fortunately for George all of his family now live in Albany and were regular visitors.

It was such a joy to see George's face recently in Hospice. When Michelle and I arrived Nora and Kirsty were leaving. Kirsty had made a slice for George and he was so proud of Kirsty and told us Kirsty had made it and how he was looking forward to eating it for his afternoon tea. As we were leaving Luke, Amy and Darcy arrived. What a joy to see the connection between George and Darcy who is just 6 months old. Darcy's little arms and legs were moving flat out as she focused her eyes onto George. "Hello my little Darling come and dribble all over

Poppy." It was one of those Special Moments you wish you could capture forever.

George and Marie were great community people and wonderful, caring and kind neighbours especially to their bachelor neighbours Luke Price and Bill Andrews. Thanks to Kath Garard who has has been able to confirm and remind me of George's district participations. Both Kath and George had a great ability to recall and retell facts.

George was a Life Member of the Pingaring Tennis and Golf Clubs. Over the years he was involved in every Pingaring organization. Hall, Shop and Christmas Tree Committee, Fire Officer, School Parents and Citizens and the Masonic Lodge.

George's stories contributed to the State Heritage Listing Committee. George was such a great asset with his excellent memory and funny stories. Laura Gray from the Heritage Committee in Perth said the Pingaring evenings were the best she ever attended throughout the State, although she was often unsure if the stories were all factual.

When George retired to the RAAFA Amity Village in Albany he continued being an involved, caring citizen in the Village. He often said he loved retirement and wished he had done it sooner for Marie's sake.

In the early days of the Village he was on lock up duty and took an active role in the Residents Committee being President at one stage.

George had a good relationship with our various Managers and at one stage, because there were empty units the Manager was encouraging people in their eighties and nineties to reside here. George thought we needed younger people. So they agreed to disagree. George suggested giving them a complimentary coffin.

The Manager was not amused. George loved Village Life. For him this included cards, Bingo, social events and happy hour and most importantly the people. We will all miss George's neighbourly concern and help, friendship and humour.

We especially think of Verna as George and Verna were both widowed and enjoyed a special companionship for some time.

George has left a permanent mark on this village right at the front door. Soon after he arrived here one evening he glued a 50 cent piece on the tiles at the front door of the Village. Next morning he watered his garden across the road and enjoyed peoples actions as they spotted the 50 cent piece (he chose the 50 cent piece because it showed up better on the tiles than a dollar) How people approached it. Most looked around to see if any one was looking, some gave it a kick, some almost fell over trying to pick it up, most walked away except a woman who tried failed but went home and returned with a chisel and hammer and removed it.

All this amused Georges sense of humour. Moral of the story, "Never under estimate the determination of a woman."

When he sneezed he would comment "and that is the mating call of the South African Skipping Beetle."

Nora told me George also gave legal advice. The first time she went to the Pingaring Golf Club a couple sat down at the table and George said "Who cut your hair it looks bloody awful, you should sue the hairdresser" She replied, I can't my husband cut it."

No doubt today there will be many stories told of George. A wonderful friend and neighbour, caring, kind man that he was to many. With a wicked and unique sense of humour whom we all loved.

George Battison was born on the 18th of March 1931 at Lake Grace Hospital. His parents names were Winnie and Robert (Bob) Battison. George had one brothers, Robert Junior Battison and one sister Olive Matilda Battison. George and his brother and sister are the three of his family still alive.

George attended Pingaring State School from the age of 8 years old. He had to ride a pushbike 2.5 miles (4kms) to school. Back when George went to school, terms were called standards. George completed 6 standards and then did 2 years correspondence. He had to complete one booklet of papers a week while doing correspondence. He was supervised by the local head teacher, who marked some of his work, but most of it was sent to Perth to be marked. Some of the subjects available to George during his whole schooling were History, Geography (which we call social studies), Arithmetic (which was call Maths), General Science, English and a language if they chose to learn one. He chose to learn French but felt it too complicated so he never continued. George achieved good grades at school and liked school.

George used to play jokes at school such as sticking compasses into peoples rear end and balancing piles of books on cupboard and other people would brush past them and knock them off and they would get into trouble. Also it was George's job to fill the ink pots and occasionally he would fill an ink well with glue and when the person dipped their pen into the well it would be filled with sticky glue. George says now that if he had the chance when he was young to further his education he would have. George finished school when he was 16 years old.

When he was a young boy there was no television so outdoor activities were frequent, except for listening to the radio. The serials were a common event every day from 7am to 8:30am. George used to make his pocket money by trapping rabbits and selling skins for 42 pence (approx. 30c). He used to shoot kangaroos and sell their

skins for 10 shillings (approx \$1). George said that 6 skins made a pound weight. He would sell the skins to Elders. At nighttime or during the day when nothing was going on card playing was also an enjoyable way to relax. George also used to enjoy riding his pushbike a lot too and began collecting old and foreign coins when he was young. George used to play a little bit of cricket when he was at school. He also played football and loved playing tennis at every opportunity he had and George still played the odd game of tennis. He also played golf. During the summer months when the lakes around Pingaring were full George and his family would go there swimming every Sunday. The lake was a social meeting place for the whole community and on the Sunday people would have a picnic there. Bill O'Neill, an elderly person of the Pingaring community, made a boat for all the children of Georges age to play around in.

George has lived in Western Australia all his life at Pingaring apart from two recent over seas holidays to New Zealand and Singapore. When he was a young boy, holidays away from his home at Pingaring were a real treat and something to look forward to. When George was a young boy he can only remember going on two holidays. One was when he was 9 years old, he went on a Boyscouts camp to Perth with two other boys of the community, Dan O'Neill and Neil Baker. George recalls that they got on a passenger train at Pingaring at 1:00pm and arrived at Perth at 7:30am, changing trains at Wagin and stopping at all the stations along the way to Perth to deliver groceries. That was George's first ever trip to Perth and he was absolutely amazed at the lights, the amount of traffic and people and the big boats. The biggest things to be seen around Pingaring were trucks but these boats were something else, said George.

The other holiday George had was when he was 12 years old. The war was in full swing and he went to stay with his mother at Perth in Nedlands. George used to wander down to the Swan River to watch the Catalinas (sea planes) landing with the American, Australian and New Zealand troops aboard them.

When George was young there were special foods that were rare or for special occasions. He said that chicken and beef and nice green vegetables were for special occasions. During the winter months all the family's vegetables were homegrown due to having plenty of water, but when the summer came, these vegetables were ordered from Perth. These were packed in cardboard boxes and on the train the day before it left and the train took a day to arrive. George said all the vegetables were dehydrated but nothing was wasted. The family had plenty of eggs and milk.

The first fridges to come out were Electrolux kerosene fridges. In 1946 George's family ordered one of those and in December 1948 they finally owned a fridge. George said it was a real delight because all the Christmas food was cold. George said that the 2-year waiting delay was due to a waiting list. George said that they used a Coolgardie safe for keeping their food cold before the fridge arrived. A Coolgardie safe was an old frame covered in wet hessian bags. The old safe was

placed where the breeze could blow through it. George explained that before the fridge arrived, if he wanted a cold beer, he had to put a couple of bottles in a hessian bag and tie some rope to the bag and place the bag in the dam for 3 days at the most before they were cold enough to drink.

Georges first jobs after he left school was stooking hay and cutting chaff. George used to get very, very, itchy doing this job and reckons that he would nearly tear himself to pieces when he got real itchy. He also worked in shearing sheds wherever he could get work and he would travel to work by his pushbike. It wasn't until 1948 when George bought a truck for himself. The truck was an Austin. In 1953 George bought himself his first car and it was a Holden. His travelling to work by pushbike then ceased and his new set of wheels was a well-earned luxury and necessity.

The wages George received weren't set wages and George recalls working for \$1 a day or for less or for up to \$1.50 a day, and compared to today's wages of \$103 a day, that was cheap work. George also drove tractors for people around the district. He drove a Fordson Major Kerosene tractors pulling a 7.5 feet plough (2.25m) and if George did 30 acres (12.15ha) a day he thought he was doing well. There were no lights on the tractors George drove, so he drove until he couldn't see where he was going. The size of the paddocks ripped up would have been approximately 100-150 acres (40.5-60.75ha) and back in those days they were large paddocks.

Most of George's work occurred outside of his dad's farm. Georges' dad bought a Fordson Major Kerosene tractor in 1948. Those tractors were hard to come by and to get a tractor you had to apply and put a good case forward to say that you really needed one. Georges' dad went onto a one year waiting list and received his tractor in 1948 and received the tractor 2 years after they came out.

George used to take his lunch with him when he drove tractors, and to warm up his tinned sausages and vegetables he used to put his food in an old sock and dunk it in the radiator while he was driving the tractor, or he would rest it on the manifold to heat it up.

The very first thing George owned and bought with his hard earned money was a 44. calibre rifle, which he still owns and uses today.

George finally took over his dads' farm in 1953 when his father died. George's life took a new turn when he met and married Hilda Marie Rose Cooper, commonly known as Marie. George met Marie in 1954 at a New Years Eve night party in Perth and he married her on October the 8th 1955. George was 24 years old and Marie 25 years old when they got married. George and Marie had a medium sized wedding. George and Marie decided to start a family of their own on the 18th of June 1956 when their first son Kenneth George Battison was born. There second son was surprisingly also born on the 18th of June 1960 and his name is Colin Leslie. Colin and his wife are having a child at present.

During the first few years of farming, George found the working life on his own farm bloody hard because he had small machinery and hard conditions. George's farm was covered in mallee roots and they had to be handpicked and removed or burnt. The mallee roots were picked before seeding and when the paddock was turned back more mallyee oots would surface and would have to be picked again. George says it was nothing to work a paddock up to 5 times. He also said that compared to today's prices, machinery was cheap but dear to them. All the work was done manually and there was no slacking off for anyone. Also George had to cart a lot of water because the dams were small and quite often they dried up before the end of summer and George had to cart water with a couple of 200 gallon (910litres) tanks. This water was carted from the local railway tanks and there was no limit to the water taken. The water was used for not just one dam but for many. George used to grow wheat, barley and oats on his farm. These crops were grown chemical free and were good crops but there was low acreage. In later years, bulldozer contractors came and enlarged George's dams which saved a bit of time carting water. George had to lump all his bags of super and wheat when he was young as there Headers had no cabs and had combs on them 10feet (3m) long. With his Al harvester if George harvested 150 bags of wheat a day he was doing well.

George found the living conditions of the early 50's extremely hard due to the lack of modern conveniences

and appliances.

Some of the major changes George had experienced and seen throughout his life are bigger and better machinery, bitumen roads, better C.B.H. facilities for bulk grain handling, communication systems, chemical farming, better homes to live in, and better mod-cons. George thinks that the best and most needed change he has seen is the S.E.C. bringing power to the district, because he never expected to see it happen. Also it eliminated power plants which were always giving him trouble when his wife and him had visitors for tea.

George felt that his biggest challenge in life was clearing a new land farm from bush and bringing it into full use, his biggest success was marrying his wife Marie.

George was pleased with what he has done in life and was pleased that his sons are going to take over his farm when he leaves it. George was happy that his sons are both happily married and that one of his sons and daughter-in-law are starting a family, because he feels that his and his families' lives have been worthwhile. Also George is happy that his sons are doing well for themselves and are happy. Another special highlight of Georges life is that when he first began farming he started off with 1000 acres (405ha) and now he cleared a farm from bush and he has 4700 (1903.5ha).

If George could relive his life he said he would take more risks and bought better machinery. Also he would invest money in different things such as shares. He also said that he would have bought more new land bush while it was available. George also would have liked to further his schooling, as he always liked school and achieved good grades.

George feels he has had a good life as he has had no serious illness and his family is health. In his later life he has not had to want for anything and neither has his family. George has been able to afford a decent holiday every year. George feels he had good friends and neighbors.

I have known George for a few years now and I believe he is a good man who has had good and bad times throughout his life. George is a well-respected member of the community who has had a colourful life.

Ten years ago, Hannah Catton's husband was brutally murdered in their home. The murderer was convicted. The case was closed.


But now a podcast called Conviction is investigating this horrific crime - and they have Hannah in their sights.

CRIME

Unfortunately, we have had more reports of payment redirection scams, the most recent resulted in the loss of several hundred thousand dollars. This type of scam has become increasing more common and anyone who pays bills or invoices online should be aware of them.

In a payment redirection scam, also known as business email compromise scams, scammers impersonate a business or its employees via email and request that money, which usually is owed to the legitimate business, is sent to a fraudulent account.

"Payment redirection scams impact businesses across many industries, including real estate, construction, law, recruitment, and universities," ACCC Deputy Chair Delia Rickard said.

Payment redirection scams can take several different forms. In some instances, scammers hack into a legitimate email account and pose as the business, by intercepting legitimate invoices and amending the bank details before releasing emails to the intended recipients.

In one instance, a victim lost \$16,500 in a single transaction after a scammer used a staff member's email address to send an invoice to a customer with 'updated bank details', redirecting the payment to the scammer's personal bank account.

Other times, payment redirection is done by spoofing, when scammers impersonate CEOs or other senior managers using a registered email address that is very similar to that of the genuine email address. The scammer will then request that staff transfer funds to them or make a payment to a third party on behalf of the business.

There has also been reports of scammers posing as staff members, where they request the employee's salary be paid into the scammer's bank account.

"An increasing number of reports are coming from sports and community clubs which reported more than \$55,000 in losses to payment redirection scams last year" Ms

Rickard said.

Scammers posed as the president or treasurer and requested staff to action payments for 'equipment' or other business needs, but the money went straight into the scammer's bank account.

Other businesses or individuals have also inadvertently paid a scammer as a result of a payment redirection scam.

It can be difficult to recover money lost to a payment redirection scam, so prevention is really important. Don't deviate from your organisation's payment procedure, even if the request you have received appears to come from legitimate source.

If you have received a request that creates a sense of urgency, don't rush. Take the time to consider and check whether an email is real, including by looking carefully at the sender's email address, before acting on instructions.

Whenever there is a request to change payment details or you are making a payment for the first time, always check with the organisation using stored contact details, rather than those in the requesting communication.

If you have been the victim of a scam, contact your bank as soon as possible and contact the platform on which you were scammed to inform them of the circumstances.



Anzac Day Address 2022

The men who served on the Gallipoli Peninsula created a legend, adding the word 'Anzac' to our vocabulary and creating the notion of the Anzac spirit. In 1916, the first anniversary of the landing was observed in Australia, New Zealand and England and by troops in Egypt.

The Anzac tradition—the ideals of courage, endurance and mateship that are still relevant today—was established on 25 April 1915 when the Australian and New Zealand Army Corps landed on the Gallipoli Peninsula.

The Anzacs were courageous and although the Gallipoli campaign failed in its military objectives, the Australian and New Zealand actions during the campaign left us all a powerful legacy.

ANZAC, an acronym for the **Australian and New Zealand Army Corps**, was used by the clerks of General Birdwood's staff at his headquarters in Shepheard's Hotel in Cairo, Egypt. The word ANZAC was approved by General Birdwood, the British commander of the Australian Imperial Force as the code for the Corps when the word was proposed by a Major CM Wagstaff.

Of the 330,000 men who served overseas in the First World War 60,000 perished and a further 155,000 were wounded. 38.7% of the male population aged 18 to 44 enlisted for service – very few families emerged from the war unscathed, a burden carried by Australian society for decades which still resonates generations on.

On 3 September 1939 Prime Minister Robert Gordon Menzies announced the beginning of Australia's involvement in the Second World War on every national and commercial radio station in Australia. Once again, the Anzac spirit prevailed with 990,900 men and women enlisting during the six years of the campaign.

This war wasn't always going to be on a distant horizon however with the front line coming to northern Australia. On 19 February 1942 Darwin was bombed, Japanese fighters and bombers attacked the port and shipping in the harbour twice during the day, killing 252 Allied

service personnel and civilians. On 3 March Broome was strafed. In succeeding months air attacks were made on many towns in northern Australia including Wyndham, Port Hedland and Derby in Western Australia, Darwin and Katherine in the Northern Territory, Townsville and Mossman in Queensland, and Horn Island in the Torres Strait. Despite popular fears these raids were not the precursor to an invasion but they did serve to interrupt the use of Darwin's port facilities. The raids also tied up anti aircraft defences and air force units that would have otherwise been sent to more forward areas.

The Japanese air raids on Darwin on 19 February involved, collectively, over 260 enemy aircraft. Subsequent raids in April, June, July and November 1942, and March 1943 were carried out with forces of 30 to 40 fighters and bombers. Between the large raids there were smaller operations by groups of under a dozen Japanese aircraft. Most of the raids occurred in daylight but there were some small scale night attacks.

The 64th, and last, air raid on Darwin occurred on 12 November 1943. In total there were 97 air attacks on northern Australia and enemy air reconnaissance over the region continued through much of 1944.

Following the end of the second world war Australia continued to send troops to overseas conflicts such as Korea, Vietnam, Malaya, Indonesia, Afghanistan and Iraq while also taking part in peace keeping missions.

In the past century we have seen so much change in the world with advances in medicine, travel, communication and robotics and yet we continue to witness the heartache and brutality of war. Sadly, in that time there has been no advancement in the reduction of greed or appetite for power by world leaders.

In 2022 we think of the people of Ukraine as their world is wrenched apart. In two months of conflict an estimated 2,500 civilians and 3,000 Ukraine troops have lost their lives. Although the aggressor, it can't be overlooked that Russia have lost an estimated 20,000 troops – men that surely would have preferred to be home with their families and living their lives.

More than 5 million people, more than half are children, have fled Ukraine in the last two months since the Russian-Ukraine conflict began: Europe's biggest refugee crisis since World War II which saw 7-11 million people displaced. About a quarter of Ukraine's population, more than 12 million people in total, have been forced to flee their homes. Homes destroyed, livelihoods destroyed, and families destroyed – not a legacy that Russia can be proud of.



Firewood Collection and Selling Restrictions

At this time of year, as the temperature drops, there is an increased demand for firewood. New regulations, however, could mean heavy fines for people who collect and sell native timber for firewood.

It is important that firewood cutting is done in a way that respects the environment and collection is done from the right locations and under the right regulations.

Collection of firewood is allowed from specially selected areas of state forest. It is not permitted to be collected from national parks, nature reserves or conservation reserves. This limits the places where people in the Wheatbelt can legally collect firewood as most reserves are off limits because they are nature reserves. The firewood collector is responsible to ensure they are collecting from the right place and to have obtained permission from the landowner in writing. Collectors are generally unaware that gathering firewood without permission may result in offences under various Commonwealth and State legislation.

What does this mean?

Native flora (including flowers, seeds, whole plants, timber and firewood) is protected in Western Australia. It is illegal to collect firewood from any reserves in the area including from roadsides. You cannot cut down any standing tree, either dead or alive, or cut or break off any part of a standing tree from bush reserves for firewood. You cannot remove fallen trees or branches.

No flora or wood can be removed from any Crown Land (including roadsides, water reserves and nature reserves) without permission from the land owner, this cannot be used for commercial purpose.

Owners or occupiers can take native timber from their own land (within restrictions) for personal use but not sell it. If they wish to sell the wood they are required to hold a licence which can be applied for through the Department of Biodiversity Conservation and Attractions. Written permission is required to take native timber from someone else's private land.

greatly impacts on native wildlife as it destroys natural habitat. Animals need hollow logs to live in and fallen tree trunks to hide under. The logs also help provide shade, moisture and shelter for plants and protection from grazing by animals like rabbits.

In Australia, about 290 animal species, not including insects and other tiny creatures, use tree hollows. Eucalypts take between 120 and 200 years to form hollows suitable for wildlife like birds and possums. That's a long time waiting for a home!

Decaying timber also provides food for insects, who increase soil activity and, in turn, become food for larger native mammals. Any timber, dead or alive, is also important for fungi – a food source for many animals. Removing fallen dead wood from woodlands increases the impact of wind on the soil, eroding and drying it out, killing soil organisms and plant cover. Felling timber damages and crushes other living plants.

How can you protect the bush?

Buying firewood from a non-licensed seller supports the impact illegal firewood collection has on remnant bush and the natural environment. Instead, buy your firewood from a licenced seller who sources their timber from sustainable supplies. The Forest Products Commission has a list of licensed firewood sellers.

If you are unsure if someone selling wood is licensed, contact the Department of Biodiversity Conservation and Attractions. You can then be confident that the firewood that you purchase has been obtained lawfully.

You are required to read the COVID Safety Plan before using the facility.

People, groups, clubs who hire public buildings are still required to:

- Complete the WA Government Safety Plan
- · Register users of the facility
- · Monitor entry and exits
- Disinfect surfaces, doors handles, table chairs, showers, toilets regularly.

At the end of the event the requirements are:

- · Return tables and chairs to designated storage area
- Put all rubbish into the outside sulo bins provided, including rubbish in toilets
- Ensure all stoves and lights are turned off
- · Report any damages incurred while hiring facility
- Facility to be left in the same condition as found upon arrival including the floors
- · All external doors are closed and locked;

This is most important as often doors are not locked when cleaners arrive.

Shire cleaners are responsible for the general cleaning of a facility, however they are not responsible for cleaning up and putting away tables and chairs after a function.

Caltrop

Following the recent rainfall the townsites have experienced an outbreak of caltrop.

What You Can Do: You can assist by spraying and/or removing any caltrop on your property or verge, please do not put into your rubbish bin as this will contaminate our waste facility and the neighbouring farm lands.

Disposing of Caltrop Plants

To dispose of any removed caltrop plants please: place them into a marked and sealed plastic bag and keep them until winter when they can be safely burnt or take them to the Shire Depot at Absolon Street Lake Grace, where there is a specially marked caltrop wheelie bin facility located just outside the main depot gate.

Newdegate: place them in one of the two blue bins specially marked *Caltrop* on Lot 12 May St (vacant block) Newdegate.



Aussie GRAIN4UKRAINE Fundraising Appeal Launched

Australian grain farmers are banding together to deliver humanitarian support for Ukrainian farmers and farming communities.

The Aussie Grain4Ukraine appeal has been launched today with a shout-out for Australian grain farmers to display Ukraine flags on their farm machinery during seeding.

We want the farmers of Ukraine to know they have support all around the world so Aussie farmers are also being urged to share images of their flags and machines on social media with the #AUSSIEGRAIN4UKRAINE hashtag.

To back the cause, Australian grain producers can donate grain delivered from this year's winter harvest via a dedicated Grower Delivery Card, in the National Grower Register system.

A farmer-led sub-committee of Grain Producers Australia (GPA) has been formed to drive the fundraising campaign and direct targeted humanitarian support, in response to Russia's invasion of Ukraine.

Sub-committee Spokesperson and South Australian grain farmer, James Stacey said the idea was seeded on social media, when grain producers and other industry members wanted to find ways of supporting their Ukrainian grain farming cousins, during a time of great need.

"Grain prices have gone up due to this conflict and we

want to contribute some of this upside to the greater good of humanity. We'll be donating some of the grain we deliver at harvest, to be sold for this cause. We want other Australian farmers to do the same. These funds will be allocated towards programs that will help Ukrainian farmers and their communities with long-term recovery efforts."

GPA Chief Executive Colin Bettles said the GPA subcommittee will steer and drive the fundraising initiative, to help raise awareness and deliver optimal support, at minimal cost.

"We are encouraging Australian grain farmers to fly the flag for Ukraine to show our support for Ukraine farmers and to provide ideas and suggestions, from anyone in the grains industry and across Australian agriculture, on where and how to target the best possible support.. The sub-committee will analyse these suggestions and determine the most appropriate programs. This approach will focus on directing funding towards long-term, future recovery efforts for Ukrainian farmers and their communities, to make a genuine difference, as they come out the other end of this conflict."

Sub-committee members also have experience and connections to Ukrainian agriculture, including as Nuffield Scholars. These contacts are also being harnessed to provide insights into the Ukrainian conflict, and help inform the sub-committee's decision-making, along with other expertise.

Sub-committee members and West Australian grain farmers, David Fulwood, Simon Wallwork and Brad Jones said they welcomed contributions from other grain farmers on how this humanitarian support can be directed through different aid programs.

"Many of us have close friends in Ukraine who grow wheat just like we do, but they are experiencing something right now that we here in Australia can't fully comprehend. This is our way of taking some positive action to help them out and let them know we care," Brad said.

"To demonstrate our support, it would be fantastic to see an army of Australian grain farmers putting their Ukrainian flags out and sharing this call to arms on social media. We can also back this effort by also donating a portion of this year's grain harvest to the cause," Simon said.

"We also welcome other grains industry leaders and members, especially bulk grain handlers and marketers, putting their hands up to contribute any way they can, to empower this effort. The aim is to give some hope and inspiration for Ukrainian people about the future," David

Market Analyst and sub-committee member, Andrew Whitelaw, urged others to get involved and contribute resources to support the cause of global humanity, via Australian grain production.

"When Aussie growers are planting seeds this year, they'll be doing so knowing they're doing more than just helping to feed the world. Every little bit we do now can help make a big difference to the lives of Ukrainian people in the long-term."


