Pad To Slab in Five Days

After two weeks of relative inactivity on the new St John Ambulance Sub Centre Building site, it was all hands on deck last week as the building construction swung into gear.

Proset Concrete of Bunbury arrived on Monday 2nd May 2016 and got into setting out the building. String lines and pins were put in place marking out where the building would be positioned on the sand pad.

Getting the concrete company on site was important to the Trevenen Plumbing team of Joe Trevenen, Rohan Trevenen and Mitch Thornton, as they needed the set out, to get on with the plumbing prelay. The location of the pipes is crucial to the build, and it was crucial that all the prelay was perfect. Being on site allowed questions to be answered instantly and small problems to be solved in minutes which will help stop problems further on in the build.

The Proset boys (Matt Nash (Business Owner/ Operator), Lucas Radisich, Max Molloy) finished the setting out and then got on with digging of the substantial footings, as the footings and the slab would be poured as one.

With the Termite treatment booked for Tuesday, both teams were under the hammer to be finished in time.

Matt Cooper the Project Supervisor for AK Homes was on site Tuesday morning with the Concrete and Plumbing teams. Matt was overseeing the lead-up to

The WA Primary Health Alliance (WAPHA) were successful in their tender for the three Primary Health Networks (PHN) across Western Australia, Perth North, Perth South and Country WA PHN. WAPHA are now working to build a robust and responsive patient centred primary health care system through innovative and meaningful partnerships at the local and state wide level.

WAPHA and the Country WA PHN are aligned to the Australian Governments six health pillars: Mental Health, Aged Care, Aboriginal Health, Population Health (chronic disease), Digital Health and the Health Workforce. We will be planning and commissioning primary health services/programs to:

- Improve people's experience of care and their quality of life
- Improve the health of the population
- Improve cost effectiveness in the primary health care system
- Reduce the number of potentially preventable hospitalisations

- Increase immunisation rates
- Increase cancer screening
- Improve mental health treatment rates

Insurance Tips # 9

Every year you should receive a renewal invitation from your insurer. It is tempting to read the new amount due, sigh, pay the bill and put the document in a safe place. Often we don't spend the time to review the values placed on the items we've insured. Many items on your policy will adjust their values each year – for example, if your car is insured for market value, the premium will adjust to reflect that value each year. Similarly many policies automatically adjust the value of your house and contents to keep in line with current market values. Other values require some input from the insured.

The Cleggs have certainly appreciated the time Justin spends with them each year to review their policy. This year was a big one for changes to their policy, with a lot of machinery starting to lose value as it aged. The farm plan had machinery being replaced every 15 years and by the time the 15 years is near, the old equipment has lost much of its value. By putting realistic values on their machinery, the Cleggs have been able to better control their insurance costs.

The other major change the Cleggs have made this year, is to increase the value of contents insured at their Perth unit. With Clayton and Maddie now at university

they are living in the unit and have managed to fill it with their possessions, so the minimum amount of \$35,000 contents cover was inadequate and certainly wouldn't replace all the IT equipment in the unit. They have now insured the contents of the unit for \$80,000. As the Cleggs have accidental damage cover, their policy also covers replacement of goods lost or stolen while temporarily removed from the premises. This provides peace of mind for the family as phones, laptops and iPads are often in the car as Maddie & Clayton go to and from uni.

14/04/1947 - 20/04/2016

They say when parents look at their child they don't see the differences; they see the most precious and wonderful blessing of their lives. They see their child. For Joe this was what not only what Nanna and Poppa saw but also all those who knew him. Joe was Joe - and I can think of no better way of celebrating than to share with you some of our family's memories, especially those from the earlier years of Joe's life.

When I listen to our family talk about Joe's childhood in Lake Grace – the stories remind me of a children's book about a cheeky mischievous character, beloved by all.

These are 'The Adventures of a Boy Called Joe'.

Joe was a boy from a small country town
The town loved Joe and Joe loved the town
With his black dog Prince by his side he would roam
All around town and then back home

When Joe was 6 it was time to start school 'Keep an eye on him Ronnie Dewson' - was the rule But Joe's love for mischief and fun Had him thrown out of school faster than he could run

Down the main street Joe would go everyday With 3 or 4 morning tea stops on the way Burt Handley the butcher would give him a sausage or two

And say 'take them to Aunty Glads and she'll cook them for you'

With a smile on her face she cooked them gladly All the while muttering 'Bloody Burt Handley'

On his 10th Christmas Joe received his first bike 60 miles he rode that day on that bike Head down bum up he'd ride up the main street Cars weaving around him – their horns going beep

Down the Newdegate road out of town he would go How far would he ride, who would know Until someone found him to bring him back - with luck

Usually Mick Mason in the postal truck

One day when Jo was feeling like some fun He dressed like a bandito and carrying a toy gun Swaggered into the Co-op and to Wally Tucker said 'Stick-em up Wal – hands over your head' Now Wally played along and put his hands in the air But the new accountant in town got quite a scare He ran out the co-op shouting 'call the police quick' Joe thought that was a pretty good trick

One day Joe's dad got a call from the Hotel to say "He's climbed up the water tower and he's up a fair way"



20 metres up Joe waved to those down below Before climbing down and ending the show

One time Joe did not come home by night fall The whole town went searching – one and all Finally while riding down a small street lane Rodney found him stuck in a water tank – thank goodness for no rain.

Outside Jack Wilson's servo Joe would sit Banging a steel pole with a large wooden stick All day this would go on - such fun to be had All the while driving Jo Maddigan the Barber mad When Joe left the Barber would throw all the sticks away

But Joe would be back banging the very next day

Joe was a boy from a small country town
The town loved Joe and Joe loved the town
With his black dog Prince by his side he would roam
All around town and then back home

At 17 Joe left Lake Grace to move with the family to Bunbury. Life became a little quieter for Joe, but not without more Joe adventures. As a kid we have such wonderful memories of Joe - playing chasey, putting on

performances and trying to help Joe to talk. I can't count the number of times Justine would try and teach Joe how to say her name.. J J J Justine she would say and Joe would always answer J J Mustine. And Mustine she stayed. At Christmas Joe received enough batteries, textas, scribble pads, radios and watches to last most of us 4 or 5 lifetimes.

After Nanna passed away Joe entered a new phase of his life – as a housemate in an Active Foundation group home. It was here that Joe discovered his love of Coke, and there was nothing that he wouldn't do for one. If you didn't bring one on your visits Joe would, as Mum puts it, 'pack a poopy' until you promised to bring one next time. As well as a can of Coke Dad always had a collection of guitar strings in his pocket because every visit always involved repairing stings broken from Joe's enthusiastic playing.

His urge to roam would return on occasions. He even made the papers and local news after he ran away and went missing overnight. Joe was eventually found the next day - locked in the Bunbury Race Club.

Dad wonders if Joe will still try to run away in heaven or if being back with Poppa, Nanna and Prince will keep him in one place.

These are but a few of the more vivid memories many of you may have of him. I am sure there are many more. He was lucky to be surrounded by such loving family and friends. We would like to thank you for taking Joe into your hearts. May you hold onto and share these memories and may they bring a smile to your face as you remember our Joe and his many adventures.





New Perth Transport Service

A new transport service with a focus on passenger safety launched 80 cars into the Perth market last month with an on-demand service allowing passengers to book a ride using an app and agree to a predetermined fare.

The app called Shofer allows passengers:

- · their choice of a female or male driver
- low cost upfront agreed fares before they start their iourney
- agreed routes to maximize their time

The service also provides several safety features including:

- * security cameras in all vehicles
- * 24-hour monitoring hub
- * panic/alert button for passengers in all vehicles
- * in-vehicle breathalyser for drivers

I used the Shofer app twice last month for rides to and from the airport and was very impressed with it. The app itself was simple to navigate and provided me with a fixed rate so I knew the total cost of the ride before I booked it. Shofer guaranteed me no surcharge or price surging regardless of the date, time of day or traffic conditions and the price was surprisingly competitive.

Considering the excellent service I received I'm still astounded that the ride cost me the same as a regular taxi ride.

The Shofer logo of "On Time - Every Time" certainly proved true in my experiences. My cars arrived a couple of minutes early and the drivers waited patiently outside their vehicle, ready to assist. The cars were spotlessly clean, comfortable, odour-free and fresh. The drivers went out of their way to help my daughter and I by carrying our luggage, loading and unloading it for us, opening and closing our doors for us and even providing a snuggle rug for my daughter on a chilly night.

Both drivers had to pass an in-car breathalyser test before the car would start and even offered us complementary bottled water and mints throughout the journey.

Shofer has certainly made a statement in Perth, with it being the first Australian city to launch the Shofer service. The company expects to add another 150 hybrid Shofer vehicles to its Perth fleet in the coming months whilst rolling out in South Australia and the eastern states soon. Personally, I can't speak highly enough of them.

Enrol Now for the 2016 Federal Election

The federal election has been announced and Australians must act now to ensure they are enrolled by the deadline of 8pm on 23 May 2016.

Electoral Commissioner Tom Rogers said all Australian citizens aged 18 years and over are required by law to enrol and vote in the 2 July federal election.

"Enrolling and voting is compulsory. If you are not enrolled, you can't vote in the 2016 federal election," Mr Rogers said.

"You can enrol conveniently online at <u>aec.gov.au</u> on your computer, tablet or smartphone."

Mr Rogers also urged all Australians, especially those who have moved in the last three years, to immediately check that their details were up to date on the electoral roll.

"If you're not sure that you are correctly enrolled to vote, go to <u>aec.gov.au/check</u> or, if you need help, call us on 13 23 26."

"If you're on on the roll but moved since the last election, or changed your name, you need to update

your enrolment details online at aec.gov.au"

Australians unable to go online can pick up a paper enrolment form at any AEC office or Australia Post outlet, however, correctly completed applications must be returned to the AEC by the 8pm 23 May deadline. Seventeen year old Australians turning eighteen years of age on or before 2 July 2016 should also enrol and vote in the federal election.

Govt Decision on Backpacker Tax 'Unacceptable'

Media Release (WAFarmers)

WAFarmers has condemned the Federal Government for not changing the proposed backpacker tax following recommendations from key industry stakeholders.

In the Federal Budget, it was confirmed that the proposed tax of 32.5 per cent and the removal of the tax free threshold for backpackers would remain unchanged. This followed reports late last week that recommendations from key industry stakeholders would not be included in the proposal.

WAFarmers Chief Executive Officer Stephen Brown said the move was unacceptable, and would cause irreparable damage to the Australian economy. "We are thoroughly disappointed that the advocacy efforts of WAFarmers, the National Farmers Federation, other industry organisations and individual working holiday makers appear to have been in vain," Mr Brown said.

"Despite constructive and open discussion during a round-table workshop with Federal Ministers and Senators last month, during which the interests of WAFarmers and other Western Australian stakeholders were represented, it appears our recommendations have simply been ignored.

"This is an extremely disappointing result, and appears to be a way of the government taking the easiest way out of a highly contentious issue."

Mr Brown confirmed that the issue was far from over, and WAFarmers would continue to consult with industry to ensure a fair and sustainable model is developed.

"The number of working holiday makers is on the decline. The government's decision will only exacerbate this trend and reduce income and productivity for the agricultural and tourism industries, in particular," Mr Brown explained.

"While the onus is now on the government to deliver strong returns from this disappointing result, WAFarmers will continue to work alongside key industry stakeholders and advocate for the agricultural industry on this critical issue.

"Should the government realise they have made a mistake in progressing the original proposal without including key recommendations, we would welcome further discussion and engagement."

How One Woman's Obsession Made Mothers Day Last

Mother's Day has its rituals: children make Mom breakfast or buy a small present, adults send a card, and those who have lost their mothers try to just ignore it. But the holiday began very differently — it started as a way to help mothers work together, and it only transformed more from there.

The book Memorializing Motherhood: Anna Jarvis and the Struggle for Control of Mother's Day (written by Katharine Lane Antolini) shares the complete story of the woman who conceived and tirelessly promoted Mother's Day, and it also shows just how dramatically the holiday has changed since it began.

Before the 1850s, there were celebrations of mothers, including ancient rituals for goddesses like the Greek Rhea and the Roman Cybele. But we can safely say the American holiday had its beginnings in the 1850's. That's because it began with the mother of the woman who ultimately established Mother's Day.

In the 19th century, there were extremely high infant mortality rates in the area that's West Virginia today. Caused by everything from poor sanitation to contaminated milk, it was a problem that Anne Reeves Jarvis was all too familiar with: only four of her 13 children survived into adulthood.

In response, Jarvis started Mothers' Day Work Clubs. The groups sought to help mothers team up to put a dent in high infant mortality and combat other problems. Their motto reflected that vision: "Mothers Work — for Better Mothers, Better Homes, Better Children, Better Men and Women."

"It was mothers being proactive," Antolini says. "It was about motherhood in a larger sense and having a responsibility to the community at large. To [Jarvis], motherhood wasn't just contained, it was about a broader family."

That activism made a strong impression on one of Jarvis's daughters, Anna Jarvis. She said her mother once ended a Bible lesson with a prayer for someone to found a memorial mother's day, and Anna did just that. But in the process, she incorporated her own unique vision of what being a mother meant.

Anna Jarvis founded Mother's Day in 1908, when she was 44 (three years after her own mother had died). On May 10, 1908, 400 people congregated at Andrews Methodist Episcopal Church in Grafton, West Virginia, to celebrate the first Mother's Day.

The location hints at the holiday's religious and spiritual roots. Anna Jarvis believed Mother's Day should serve

as a solemn tribute to the living and deceased mothers of the world. Though there had been other contemporaneous celebrations of Mother's Day — one from 1873 even earned national attention — Jarvis's became the most famous.

She selected the second Sunday in May because it marked the anniversary of her mother's death and she wanted Mother's Day to always fall on the Sabbath. Her vision of motherhood stayed constant through the years for a couple of reasons.

"A lot of it is that Anna herself never marries or has children. She has no idea what motherhood means from the eye of the mother,"Antolini says. "It was very much seeing motherhood through the eyes of a child." Jarvis retreated from her mother's socially conscious vision for Mother's Day in favor of one that idolized the mother's individual role.

Anna's vision of Mother's Day was one in which children gave personal messages of appreciation to mothers, possibly bought a white carnation for them, and credited their mothers with a nearly sacred domestic role. "There is ONE DAY in the year we do not talk of POOR MOTHERS and ask charity for them," Jarvis once wrote.

As idealistic as Jarvis was, she was also a hustler when it came to promoting her "holy day." She reached out to powerful leaders, the floral industry, and others like

wealthy department store owner John Wanamaker. She even quit her job at Fidelity Mutual to start the Mother's Day International Association in 1912 (living off inheritance from her brother and father — Mother's Day itself didn't bring her much profit).

But that dedication didn't stop the holiday from growing into something she no longer recognized.

When Woodrow Wilson declared Mother's Day a national holiday in 1914, he was leaping onto a national bandwagon. Moments like that became symbolic of how the holiday had spiraled beyond Anna Jarvis's control. She always resented when he or anybody else took credit for the holiday.

But Jarvis's greatest contempt was directed at something many people still complain about today: Mother's Day's commercialization. Jarvis had once given florists Mother's Day placards to boost the holiday, but in the 1910s she wanted them stopped. Most famously, she endorsed boycotting florists and crashed a confectioner's convention in protest.

She was even irked by the work of charities. When American War Mothers used Mother's Day to try to raise funds, Jarvis protested and was arrested for disorderly conduct. She called those who raised money off Mother's Day "Christian pirates." When the Maternity Centre Association latched onto Mother's Day, Jarvis said they'd co-opted a day meant for "gratitude to the living, and reverent memories for the deceased."

Why did these Mother's Day changes upset Anna so much? She believed commercialism detracted from true sentiment, and charity made the mother into an object of pity. "She would have said, 'No mother is poor. She has the love of her children," Antolini says.

With that, Jarvis may have also seen social campaigns as a gradual devaluation of a mother's individual ability. "Health campaigns seemed to say that women have a proper capacity to love our children, but can't properly raise them," Antolini says. But even as Jarvis's vision continued to be pushed aside, she fought for it just as doggedly the rest of her life.

Does modern Mother's Day fit Jarvis's vision?

Jarvis died in a sanitarium in 1948, driven to poor health by her unrelenting mission to promote and protect the holiday she created.

Would she like the Mother's Day we have today, with its mix of political and commercial influences (with a particularly heavy dose of the latter)?

"I think she'd have mixed reactions," Antolini says. "The commercial stuff would still bother her. She would be thrilled that it's still being celebrated. That would certainly tickle her."


But that's not all. Antolini is quick to add that Jarvis probably wouldn't have dropped her obsession, so there's one other way she would have reacted to her holiday's enduring appeal: "She would have wanted credit for it."

the Termite treatment and it allowed us to meet in person for the first time as all of our conversation to that point was by phone, text and email.

The afternoon was spent getting down the black plastic membrane and putting the mesh in place in the trenches, and on the floor for the Structural Engineer inspection on Wednesday morning at 9am.

Wednesday came, and Dan Turner the Structural Engineer from Narrogin was on site to inspect the steelwork for the pad, but unfortunately Proset Concrete had to return to Bunbury for the day, making the inspection a little difficult. However with phone calls and emails we were able to get some minor issues noted for change. The Proset boys were back on site at 3.30pm to make the changes and had to be ready for the first load of concrete at 7.30am the next morning.

Our engineer is very specific, and the Proset team were required to add in extra steel where they have never done so before, and to run the mesh between the two pours i.e. the main building pour and the garage pour, again something new to them, and requiring some formwork adjustment. In the end we got the all clear to go ahead with the pour as the first concrete arrived.

Oborne Concrete supplied the "mud" for the job with Grant himself delivering the first load, and then he and his driver (Gary Lambert), kept 2 trucks turning around to pour 44m3 of concrete on the Thursday.

Proset had added a member to their team on their return to Bunbury bringing Kyle Prior back with them. Let's just say they were very glad they did, as the team only got to have lunch after 4pm and only got the finishing completed on the main floor pad as darkness set in good and proper.

Friday was another early day for the Proset team as the formwork had to be relocated to the garage side of the building , some final tying off of mesh needed to be completed, and the installation of chairs (the things that hold the mesh up off the plastic), had to be in place before the bell rang for round 2 at 7.30am on Friday 6th May.

Oborne Concrete was dead on time with the first truck putting the Proset boys under the pump to be ready. But ready they were for the first truck of the day. The garage took 25m3 of concrete to complete the job with the last pour going in at 11.36am.

It then took until 3pm for the Proset boys to get all of the floating and finishing completed, all boards down and washed, and all rubbish and bits picked up. The boys then headed back to Bunbury satisfied with their 69m3 pour.

It was so good to see teamwork and a sense of pride in work. Oborne Concrete driver, Gary Lambert made a little spill near the Sportsman's

club, and without any prompting he grabbed a shovel and a wheelbarrow and went and cleaned it up. Matt Nash of Proset Concrete also went the extra mile by making the set-in for the roller doors (stops the water coming in under the roller doors) in the garage even though it was not in the details to do so. Joe Trevenen was called into action when a steel plate that was set in the concrete was going to collide with a vent pipe in a wall. Joe was swiftly on site to make an adjustment to allow the extra steel column to be in place. So well done boys.

In another generous show of support for the project, Grant Oborne has donated all the concrete for the pad to the project. While Greg, Paula and Justin Carruthers have donated the sand for the concrete to the project. As the project is a set price contract with AK Homes Construction, both Oborne Concrete and the Carruthers family will make their donations in cash to the project. So if you see them, please thank them for their generous donations.

All donations to St John Ambulance WA Ltd over \$2 are tax deductible.

The steel framework of the building is slated to be going up as this Lakes Link goes to press. In the next fortnight we should see the building taking shape.

We encourage you to have a look at the development, but please remember it is a construction site and stay a healthy distance from the site unless invited onto the site by one of the construction team. This is your community project and we encourage you to be part of its progress.



Changes to the Associations Incorporation Act

For anyone involved with an incorporated organisation the following information may be useful to you. Keep in mind many of the groups in Lake Grace probably already comply with the changes so there won't be any need to panic. Groups have three years to make changes to their constitution (if needed), but will have to adopt any financial changes needed on the 1st July 2016.

The Associations Incorporation Act 2015 is anticipated to replace the current Associations Act as of 1 July 2016.

The new law will continue to provide a framework of regulation for not-for-profit organisations such as sport and recreation clubs, societies and community groups in Western Australia leaving the internal management of associations largely to the members. Associations will still be able to incorporate as a separate legal body and thereby limit the liability of its members for lawful activities.

The Department will be offering information and resources about the new law to incorporated associations throughout the transitional period.

Important: Please remember the current requirements of the *Associations Incorporation Act 1987* continue to apply until the new law commences on 1 July 2016.

Government's Regulatory Impact Assessment Requirements

In accordance with the Government's Regulatory Impact Assessment requirements, a copy of the Decision Regulatory Impact Assessment and Compliance Assessment Notice have been made available.

Key features of the new law

The new law will require associations to update their rules as well as introducing a number of changes regarding:

- financial reporting,
- governance,
- privacy,
- the rules and
- membership of incorporated associations

Financial Reporting

The new law will introduce a three—tiered system of financial reporting and accountability requirements based upon the associations revenue.

- Tier 1 associations (revenue of less than \$250,000) can elect to prepare basic financial statements with no independent review or audit.
- Tier 2 associations (revenue of \$250,000 \$1,000,000) must prepare financial reports that give a true and fair view of the financial position of the association in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards. Such reports must be reviewed by a member of a professional accounting body.
- Tier 3 associations (revenue of more than \$1,000,000) must prepare financial reports that give a true and fair view of the financial position of the association in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards. Such reports must be audited by a member of a professional accounting body holding a public practicing certificate.

Associations will still be required to provide their financial reports to members; however the reports will not be required to be provided to the Commissioner.

Changes to the Associations Incorporation Act (cont.)

Management

The new law will formalise the obligations of committee members, which already exist under other laws. These include:

- duty of care and diligence;
- duty to act in the best interests of the association and for a proper purpose; and
- duty not to misuse their position or information

Eligibility requirements are also set out which prohibit persons from sitting on the management committee where they:

- are an undischarged bankrupt or whose affairs are under insolvency law.
- been convicted with an offence involving fraud or dishonesty punishable on conviction by 3 months or more imprisonment; and
- have been convicted of an offence in connection with the promotion, formation of management of a body corporate, including duties under the new law.

Any person can request the Commissioner's approval to be appointed to the committee.

Privacy

The new law provides measures to better protect the privacy of association members. Access to the membership register continues to be restricted to association members but now the new law also limits how the information may be used. Further, a member may provide a post office box or email address for contact instead of a residential address.

Model Rules

Importantly all associations will be required to update their rules and either adopt the Model Rules, or adapt their own rules (provided that the rules comply with the new law). Incorporated associations will have three years from 1 July 2016 to ensure that either their rules comply with the new law or to adopt the new model rules.
