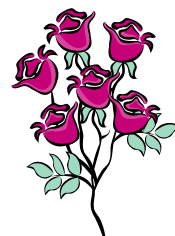

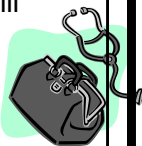

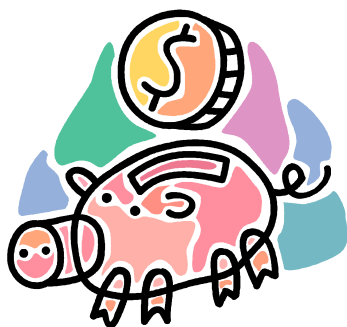

the museum. Other features will draw attention to the former structure of the hospital – including the former maternity wing, operating theatre and enclosed verandahs.

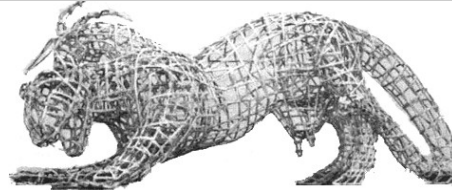

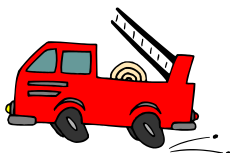

SUCCESSFUL FUNDING APPLICATIONS

VARLEY FIRE SHED

FESA has advised that the Shire has been allocated \$55,000 in its 2005/06 budget for the construction of a fire shed at Varley.



CAN WA CULTURAL PLANNING PROGRAM



The Shire has been successful in attracting funding for the development of a Cultural Plan for our communities. The program provides a 12 month partnership between CAN WA, Council and the community which will

advise and demonstrate how cultural planning and development can contribute to building stronger communities within the Shire.

COMMUNITY WATER SUPPLY PROGRAM

Local community groups working in partnership with the Shire have been successful in applying for funding through the Department of Environment's Community Water Supply Scheme to improve community water supplies at Magenta (south east of Newdegate) and Dunn Rock (south west of Lake King). The South East Newdegate and Lake Magenta Community Dams project has attracted \$88,000 and the Dunn Rock Community Dam project \$100,000.



A further application to repair the roof on the water tank at the Pallarup Nature Reserve (Lake King) is currently being prepared.

Following the 7th May Local Government Elections, a swearing-in ceremony was conducted with new Councillors Wally Newman of Newdegate and Dean Sinclair of Varley along with re-elected Councillors Royce Taylor, Ollie Farrelly and Ian Chamberlain.



Elections for President and Deputy President of Council were also held with both Darcy Roberts and Andrew Walker nominating for the positions and being re-elected as President and Deputy President.

Congratulations to all on their successful election.

At public question time, Council welcomed representatives from the Lake Grace Netball Club and Newdegate Townscape Committee to the meeting to discuss their concerns. Council encourages and welcomes the community to attend meetings when they are held in your town to take the opportunity to discuss local issues and concerns directly with Councillors.

Newdegate Junior Councillors Adam Gittos and Timothy Sholders also attended the meeting, giving them a first hand look at the sorts of issues that Council deals with.

How Many of these Questions do you Fall Down On?

When you're 60 or over, a fall can have shattering consequences on your mobility, independence and lifestyle. And, you may be surprised to learn that it happens to one in four people in this age group each year. Only a small proportion of falls are caused by tripping, slipping or 'not being careful', most are the result of health or lifestyle factors. Have you had a fall in the last year? ☐
Having previously fallen increases your chance of falling again.

Do you do less than 30 minutes of physical activity a day? ☐

Are you unsteady on your feet, do you find it difficult to get up from a chair or do you have trouble walking? ☐

Many falls are the result of muscle weakness and/or impaired balance

Are you taking three or more medicines? ☐

Are you taking sleeping tablets, tranquillisers or anti-depressants? ☐



Has it been more than 12 months since your GP reviewed your medicines? ☐
Some side effects and combinations of medicines can increase your risk of a fall.

Do you have diabetes, arthritis or Parkinson's Disease? ☐

Have you had a stroke or do you have problems with your heart or circulation? ☐

Has it been more than 12 months since your eyes were tested or your glasses checked? ☐

Do you experience dizziness, light headedness, unsteadiness, drowsiness, blurred or double vision or have difficulty thinking clearly? ☐

Many health conditions can increase your risk of falling.

If you answered "yes" to one or more of these questions you are at risk of falling.

The good news is that there are steps you can take now to reduce your risk. If you answered "no" to all of these questions, but are aged 60 or over, you should still take falls seriously and take action to stay mobile and independent.

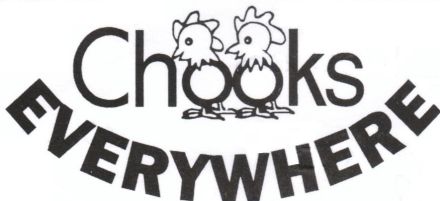

FROM THE ARCHIVES



CWA NOTES - *Among my souvenirs* by Mrs S Duckworth

The following are the minutes of two meetings held in 1975 and 1976 we would like to share with you. These meetings were pivotal in the organization of the senior citizen's luncheons and to establish a Senior Citizen's Recreation Centre.

Volunteer Helpers - Edie Trevenen, Betty Naisbitt, Margaret Matthews.

Minutes of Meeting held in CWA Centre November 18th 1975 at 8pm

A meeting of delegates from all the organizations in Lake Grace was chaired by Mrs Evans, President of the CWA.

Those present were:

Mesdames: Walker, Scotford, Warner, Franks, Evans Duckworth, Lannin, Kennedy, Doelman, Elliott and Warner (B)

Messrs: Beatty and Perry.

Represented by the Church of England. Methodist Church, Red Cross and Hospital Auxillary, Weight Watchers, Lions Club and Masonic Lodge and CWA and P & C.

Mrs Evans welcomed everyone and gave a brief explanation. The CWA had called the meeting to explain about the Project they were undertaking to establish a Senior Citizens' Recreation Centre and to serve a meal once a month with an hour or so of entertainment to follow. The CWA had put CWA submission to the AAP (Australian Assistance Plan) and had been allocated \$1,500 to use to set up the project which was for the benefit of all people of the district and we hoped others would be interested to help. Mrs Evans then asked the Secretary of the CWA Mrs Duckworth to read the submission and answer any questions about it.

The money was to be used to up grade facilities, such as gas stove, curtains, carpet, painting and games. Much of this was already in hand. Mr Beatty offered assistance from the Lions Club as they were interested in the Welfare of Senior Citizens.

Mrs Lannin, treasurer of CWA, gave a run down on how the money was being used.

Prices of meal was discussed. 75c or \$1.00. Decision to be made at next meeting.

Suggested we ask Apex Club for list of names they use for Senior Citizens Party. Mrs Kennedy offered to play the piano. Mrs Scotford also offered.

After some discussion it was decided to have another meeting on January 13th 1976 with an

inaugural luncheon sometime in February.

SCIENCE AND STUFF

EARLY DEATH

Some slightly unfortunate phrasing from the BBC's online health news: "parliament must debate whether terminally ill patients should be given the right to die as early as possible after the election," peers said.

VIOLATION

A Russian astrologer is trying to persuade a Moscow court to hear her suit, charging that when the NASA space agency's Deep impact mission fires a 370-kilogram copper probe at Comet Tempel 1 on July 4th it will destroy the icy body. This, she claims, will violate the natural balance of the universe and damage her "system of spiritual values". The Russian-based mosnews.com reports Marina Bai wants the court to order NASA to give the comet a miss, and pay her \$311 million-the entire cost of the deep impact mission-for "moral damages". Getting the money off NASA would be as much chance as the Deep Impact projectile destroying a comet 2 kilometres wide and 6 kilometres long.



CASH CRISIS FOR EARTH SCIENCE

With President Bush's sights set on a mission to Mars, Earth sciences have been forced to take a back seat where funds are concerned, so much so that the network of satellites monitoring the health of the planet is in disarray, the US National Research Council warned. With six recent NASA Earth observing missions being delayed, scaled back or cut altogether, scientists fear that there will be a serious paucity of information once today's satellites retire. "The planning for new missions should have probably have been started 5 to 10 years ago", they reported. They are particularly worried about satellites that, for instance, track the ozone layer or analyse changes in soil moisture that can proceed a famine. And if observation satellites are not replaced, weather and hurricane forecasting will be hit too. The NRC's final report on a 10-year research agenda for Earth observations from space is expected late in 2006.

SUGAR SUBSIDIES

The European Union's subsidised sugar exports are illegal. That's the ruling from the World Trade Organization, following two appeals and nearly two years since the case was originally brought by Brazil, Thailand and Australia. The WTO also confirmed an earlier ruling that US cotton subsidies are illegal.

ONE WEED TO KILL TWO

A weed extract that has already shown promise as a treatment for skin cancer might also help treat one kind of leukaemia. The weed is petty spurge (Euphorbia peplus), which has long been used to treat warts and corns. The extract is called, ingenol 3-angelate or pep005.

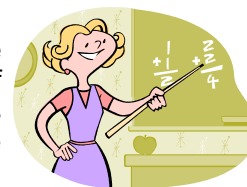


STONE KITCHEN

Thousands of mysterious stone objects found at a site in Nicaragua appear to be parts of a cooking tool previously unknown to archaeologists. Named raspaditas, or little scrapers, they are 1 to 2.5 centimetres long and shaped like elongated hot air balloons. By examining them under a scanning electron microscope they could see that only the wide ends were worn. This suggests they were mounted on wooden frames that have long since disintegrated. There were tiny plant fragments called phytoliths stuck to the raspaditas, suggesting they were used to grate vegetables such as maize and cassava. The 800 to 1200-year old site, at Santa Isabel is near Rivas. (UK archaeological conference).

TEACHING THE TEACHERS

A report commissioned by the Australian Council of Deans of Science says urgent action is needed to improve science teaching in Australia. Who's Teaching Science released in April, reveals "an alarming picture" of many senior chemistry and physics teachers without sufficient academic background to ply their craft. The study reinforced the concerns of an international conference on science teaching and research in Brisbane last November. The new report found that more than 40 per cent of senior school physics teachers had not completed a physics major at University, while one in four had not studied the subject beyond first-year. IN chemistry, 25 per cent of senior teachers had not studied the subject to third-year university level. The figure for biology was 14 per cent.



FIRST CARBON TAX

From 2007, New Zealanders will pay NZ\$15 for emitting a tonne of carbon dioxide or its equivalent in other gases. The World's first "true" carbon tax, which was announced on May 4th, won't have much impact on the country's greenhouse-gas emissions by itself. But environmentalists have heralded it as a step in the right direction.

GROW YOUR OWN FISH OIL

A plant has been genetically engineered to make a "fishy" fatty acid. Long-chain omega-3 fatty acids reduce the risk of heart disease and arthritis, and are essential for brain development. Fish are a great source, but people eat enough. CSIRO research scientists in Canberra have created thale cress (Arabidopsis thaliana) that produces the long-chain omega-3 DHA. They inserted genes for enzymes from marine algae. Other teams have created plants that make the omega-3 EPA. But the longer-chained DHA is particularly beneficial for brain development. (Functional Plant Biology).

Clear Guidelines Needed on Roo-Bars

Clear simple guidelines for roo-bars are needed to end the standoff between Government and rural drivers after many ute owners were slapped with unexpected yellow stickers for oversized or ill shaped bars.

WAFarmers president Trevor De Landgraff said practical guidelines for after market roo-bars need to be developed and communicated effectively.

"We've seen an outrageous situation develop here where the Department of Planning and Infrastructure and the Police Department are operating under two different sets of rules. There has been a serious lack of communication with the public on standards that were introduced five years ago," he said.

"You simply can't pounce on drivers that weren't informed of the changes to specifications and aren't offered an alternative or solution to fix the problem.

"The Government needs to draw a line in the sand, set a cut-off date of 2000 with no retrospectivity. Vehicles older than five years should be left alone and a subsidy given to enable modification to newer roo-bar bearing vehicles so they can meet the standards."

Changes to the standards on roo-bars were introduced in 2000 outlawing bars that tilted to far forward, had sharp or flat edges and protrude from the vehicles edges. The reason for the change in guidelines was the danger that certain roo-bars pose to pedestrians.

"What an absolutely absurd concept that is. And it is only a concept because there is no evidence or reports of pedestrians being injured by a roo-bar," said Mr De Landgraff.

"Countless lives have been saved and many severe injuries dodged by the presence of roo-bars. We need to remember that these bars have a real purpose and that's to preserve lives."

WAFarmers hopes it can put behind it the recent comments by parliamentarian Fran Logan on the purpose of roo-bars acting as phallic symbols and there being no need for them, specifically outside metropolitan pubs.

"It's a shame that a Government representative, with a close connection to agriculture, totally missed the point that roo-bars' primary role is to protect drivers in rural areas where real dangers exist like straying livestock and kangaroos," said Mr De Landgraff.

"It does seem that younger rural drivers are being unfairly targeted for expressing themselves. The streets are full of people expressing themselves with their choice of car or add-on accessories, few with safety in mind."

WAFarmers has had ongoing consultation with departmental staff and calls on the Minister to consult with rural groups prior to issuing the standards to ensure decent interpretation of the standards and effective communication can be achieved.

NIGHT WATCH



Welcome to Night Watch for the fortnight from midnight Friday 3rd June to midnight Friday 17th June. Remember astronomy is looking up and never look directly at the Sun.

Our local star, the Sun, resides in the Constellation of Taurus this fortnight at magnitude -26.72.

The new Moon is at 5:45am on Tuesday 7th. On Saturday 11th, the Moon will be at Apogee at 2pm, 405,506kms from Earth (furthest). The 1st quarter Moon is at 9:12am on Wednesday 15th. The Moon will be in Aries on 4th and 5th, Taurus on 6th, 7th and 8th, Gemini on 9th and 10th, Cancer on 11th and 12th, Leo, on 13th, 14th and 15th, Virgo on 16th and 17th.

On Saturday Mercury, in Taurus, will be at Perihelion, (nearest to the Sun), at 1.322 astronomical units (149,597,870kms), or 45.9 million kms and sets at 5:10pm. Mercury moves into Gemini on Sunday 12th setting at 5:48pm and on the 17th at 6:13pm, 29 minutes after sunset at magnitude -0.7.

The very bright planet, Venus, low down in the evening sky, sets at 6:16pm on Saturday at a very bright magnitude -4.0. On Sunday Venus will have moved into Gemini. Venus will be 4° south of the Moon on Wednesday 8th (two thumbs at arms length). On Tuesday 14th Venus will be at Perihelion (nearest to the Sun) at 1.590 astronomical units or about 214 million kms, and is on the far side of the Sun. On Friday 17th Venus sets at 6:37pm. Venus can be seen with binoculars in the daytime about 1 hand span, or a bit less, on the eastern side behind the Sun, but be very careful and shut out the Sun.

Mars, at magnitude +0.2 in Aquarius, rises at 12:46am on Saturday. On Thursday 9th Mars will have moved into Pisces, and on Friday 17th it will rise at 12:37am.

Jupiter, at magnitude -2.2 in Virgo and now moving higher in the evening sky, sets at 2:01am on Saturday.

On Thursday 16th, Jupiter will be very close to the Moon at 0.4° north and on 17th sets at 1:11am.

On Saturday, Saturn at magnitude +0.3 in Gemini, sets at 8:08pm. Saturn, on Friday 10th will be 5° south of the Moon and sets at 7:24pm on Friday 17th.

The blue/green coloured planet Uranus, at magnitude +5.7 in Aquarius, rises at 11:40pm on Saturday and at 10:49pm on Friday 17th.

The grey/green coloured planet Neptune, at magnitude +7.8 in Capricornus, rises on Saturday at 9:51pm and at 8:59pm on Friday 17th.

The very small planet, Pluto at magnitude +13.8 in Serpens Caput, is in the sky all night this fortnight.

On Tuesday 14th Pluto at opposition (far side of the Earth to the Sun) at 11pm and will be 29.957 Astronomical Units or 4,482,700,000kms from the Sun.

For people with telescopes comet 9p/Tempel 1 is north of Jupiter at about 3° (two fingers at arms length). Jupiter's red spot can be seen from 7:11pm to 8:11pm on Sunday, at 8:50pm to 9:50pm on Tuesday 7th, at 6:20pm to 7:20pm on Friday 10th, 7:59pm to 8:59pm on Sunday 12th and 9:38pm to 10:38pm on Tuesday 14th.

On Wednesday 8th, Jupiter's moons are fairly busy beavers. Io starts transit across the planets disc at 5:50pm. Ganymede's shadow starts transit at 6:35pm. Io's shadow starts transit at 7pm, Io's transit ends at 7:52pm. Ganymede's shadow ends transit at 8:52pm. Io's shadow ends transit at 9:01pm and at 9:12pm Europa appears from behind the planets disc. So at one time there will be two shadows on the disc of Jupiter.

If you want to see any of these through my telescope just give me a phone call.

Next fortnight the Winter solstice and shortest day is on the 21st, and on the 26th Mercury, Venus and Saturn can be seen close together in the evening sky as they set at 6:51pm, 6:53pm and at 6:54pm.

Medical Students visit the Wheatbelt

No two medical degrees are the same, and the new Notre Dame programme is proving to be no exception to the rule. Recognising the demand for a greater supply of doctors to rural communities, the School of Medicine at Notre Dame presented its first round of students to the unique and special demands of rural life with their April Rural Week experience in the Wheatbelt communities of Kellerberrin, Cunderdin, and Merredin. The first year cohort of 81 students were warmly received by the communities, who personally billeted students on their private properties, and provided real insight into what 'living in a rural community' means; the students visited the local hospital, attended expert tutorials provided by locals, helped in gaining vital statistics of the town for public health research teams, and took part in the community service. Here's what medical student Pallas O'Hara thought:

"The students in our course come from a diverse background, both in what we have studied previously and also our levels of experience in rural lifestyles. It was interesting to see how different people took on the task of learning about life on a farm, life in a small town, and the practice of farming itself. There was many a picture taken of landscapes, people, places and huge farming machinery, which we learned more often than not came with GPS! This is an amazing use of technology.

A personal highlight: on a visit to the school, I had the amazing opportunity to see the unique system that Kellerberrin has in practice, and was so impressed by what I saw. Coming from a university that has its own distinctive teaching style, I was very interested to see the response of the students, to see how they managed their roles. To see young children (in the 'Pre-to-three' class) so

enthusiastic about their school work and functioning so well in such an encouraging environment put me on a high for the rest of the afternoon!

Going home with our host families that afternoon was an experience in itself, driving along the stretch of road home in the dusk was a sight for sore city eyes. And all this was to be topped off by a welcoming family, beautiful dinners and long after dinner chats about life in the bush, and the special concerns of our rural community. As we spent more time in the homes of our host families we came to feel more and more at home, and big thanks again to my own host 'parents' for their fantastic welcome between the students and communities".

If the success of Rural Week was to be determined, then a tangible indicator would be the clear bonds formed.

Medical student Michelle Greene said, "The strength of the relationships formed shows the success of the week, the fact that I'm welcome to stay anytime and the strong family bonds which is what keeps the town together is one of the reasons I would come back and work with Kellerberrin community".

Medical School students and staff from The University of Notre Dame Australia thank the residents and Shires of Cunderdin, Kellerberrin and Merredin for their generosity and warmth as rural week hosts.

- contractors or consultants who believe that they could contribute to the ACC's project delivery process but do not wish to tender.

The ACC will draw on the register when projects are being negotiated during the formal tendering process and the information will be used to:

- identify locations where ACC project activities can be carried out;
- identify individuals or groups willing to participate in ACC projects; and
- identify individuals or groups with specific technical skills that could significantly contribute to successful project implementation.

Please note the Register will not lead to the funding of small scale local projects but will provide opportunities for involvement in the project delivery process.

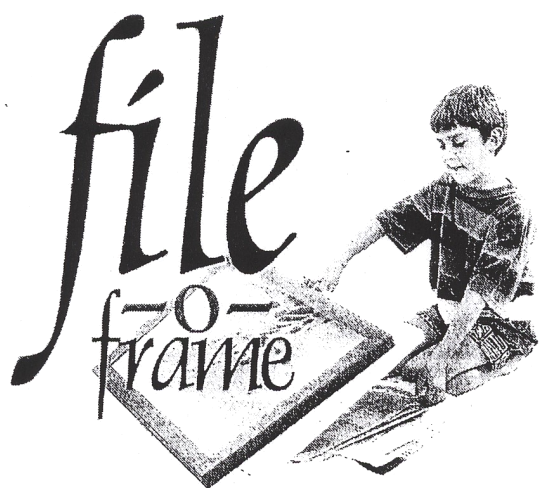

“There’s No Excuse. Belt up.”

This is the message the Road Safety Council is promoting through its Rural Restraints Campaign from 15th May to 2nd June 2005.

RoadWise, a program of The WA Local Government Association, has been promoting the message in the Wheatbelt South alongside The Office of Road Safety and the WA Country Football League.

RoadWise Regional Road Safety Officer, Nadine Hendry said, “Putting on a seatbelt takes no more than two seconds and has the potential to save your life. Unexpected things happen on the road which can lead to a crash, and if you are not wearing a seatbelt then the risk of serious injury or death increases dramatically”.

While seatbelt wearing rates are high in Western Australia, there is still room for improvement, particularly for 17 – 39 year old males in rural Western Australia. In order to combat this, the Office of Road Safety has worked with the WA

Football League and WA Country Football League to promote and encourage seatbelt usage through the football field in a season-long initiative. This includes the Belt-Up matches that were held over the weekend of the 28th and 29th of May, where arm bands were worn by players and a 30 second silence was held in remembrance of country lives lost on the road.

“It is such a simple thing that can make such a big difference in the event of a crash”, Ms Hendry said, “most crashes occur close to home so it is important to wear a seatbelt even on short trips”.

The Office of Road Safety and RoadWise would like to remind everyone to belt up, every trip, every time.

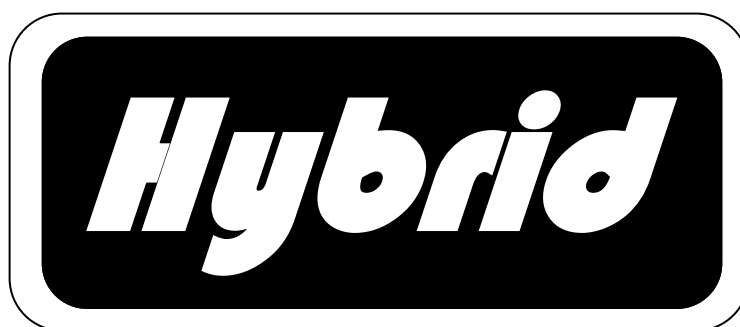

Community support behind the raising of funds towards a new ambulance has been fantastic. Approximately thirty tonnes of grain were donated to the grain drive amounting to some \$5,000 dollars of donations. Some people preferred to give cash donations and several large cash donations were made in lieu of grain donations. We are unable to identify the eight people who donated grain, however we do wish to extend our sincere gratitude to those people for their support.

To date, approximately \$10,000 has been raised towards the new ambulance. This leaves the significant challenge of raising another \$30,000 over the next two years to replace the current 1992 vehicle. The Sub Centre hopes by continuing to raise the profile of their work in the community that the community in turn will support their volunteer efforts.

Remember that the provision of the Ambulance Service is entirely reliant on community support. Local ambulance sub centres do not receive any State or Federal funding for the provision of this service.

The Lake Grace Sub Centre wishes to extend its sincere gratitude to those who have served this sub centre over the last 59 years. The personal dedication made by this small band of volunteers is impressive.

We wish to thank the Ambulance Officers for their service. Their role is one of the most confronting that any volunteer could ever accept. Your community trusts that your will to serve this community remains strong.

In 2006 the Lake Grace St John Ambulance Sub Centre will celebrate its 60th birthday.

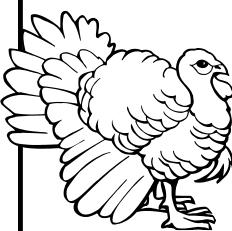

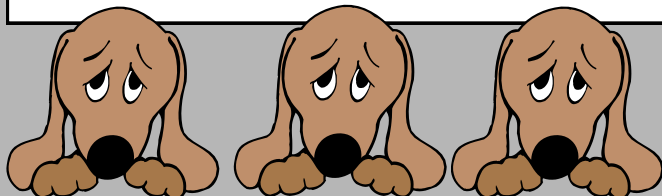
