A Story to Tell

Part of the Lake Grace Regional Artspace's programme is to partner with the Lake Grace Shire to be able to bring one or two 'Art on the Move' exhibitions to the community every year to give all Shire residents the chance to view contemporary exhibitions from artists around the state.

The Lake Grace Artspace is currently hosting Laurel Nannup's A Story to Tell exhibition which opened Thursday 14th May. Laurel is an accomplished printmaker, enjoying the processes which allow her to express her ideas in a graphic but succinct manger. The print making processes she has explored through this exhibition include photographic etching, etching, aquatint, screen printing, photographic screen printing, wood cut and hand coloured prints.

In *A Story to Tell*, Nyoongar artist Laurel Nannup tells her own story, through woodcuts, etchings and photographs. These works illustrate the artist's memories of place, particular events and people, all of which contribute to an overview of her life.

At the age of eight, the Native Welfare Department took Laurel, her sister and her cousin away from the Pinjarra region and their families to the Wandering Mission, where they lived and worked until they were old enough to work on farms in the area. The prints in Laurel's exhibition are a reflection of her life, both with her family and mission life; the stories are told with honesty and affectionate humour and build up a unique picture of the reality of life for many Indigenous people of Laurel Nannup's generation.

"As a young Nyoongar girl growing up in the bush, I learnt a lot from my parents and grandparents about the old ways. They taught me how to find water, how to track animals and how to find food to eat, when I was hungry. My family and I lived In the bush around the Pinjarra region, where Mum and Dad worked on farms, felling trees to make fence posts for the farmers. They also worked on dairy farms where they would milk the cows and stook hay for the cows' feed. From time to time we lived on the Pinjarra Reserve with my grandparents and other relatives until my sister, Cecelia, my cousin Madeline and I were taken away by the Native Welfare, I was just eight years old. We were sent to the Wandering Mission where I spent the next eight years of my life. I don't remember much about the

trip to the Mission, I just remember Mum bathing us and putting on new clothes on us, that's all I remember about that event."

Laurel is coming to Lake Grace for a welcoming event and talk to be held at 6:30pm on Monday 25th May. She will also be participating in school education talks on the 26th May. The exhibition is currently open seven days a week from 10am to 4pm provided they have the volunteers to staff the display and is supported by the West Australian Department of Culture and the Arts.



Saltbush Pioneer Enters Hall of Fame

A LANDCARE champion is the newest inductee to the Agricultural Hall of Fame.

Michael Lloyd is a renowned expert on salinity whose saltbush-based revegetation practices have led to major advances in land management across Australia.

He has been pivotal in changing the perception of saltland from "white cancer" to an economic and environmental asset.

When faced with 40 per cent of his wheat sheep property in the Lake

Grace region affected by salinity and waterlogging, Mr Lloyd established saltbush pastures and slowly revegetated 600 hectares of saltland on his property, Bundilla.

Mr Lloyd, along with his wife Margaret, established a long-term sustainable management system that increased production and benefited biodiversity.

His landcare practices equipped Bundilla to withstand drought more effectively than many neighbouring farms and to stabilise critical water resources.

The scale of investment in saltbush-based saltland pastures at Bundilla was unique in Australia and the farm became a case study for scientists with Mr Lloyd always open to sharing his insights.

"We noticed changes over about 10 or 15 years, bit by bit," he said.

"We were in denial really. Then when things started to get bad I knew I had to do something.

"I started looking at it and trying out different things.

"I knew I was going to have to change this farm around. I started planting saltbush and saw results after about five years."

Mr Lloyd became an activist for saltbush revegetation after a research paper was published in 1994 indicating that high levels of salt in saltbush meant that it was almost toxic to sheep.

That was contrary to his experience.

The research was based on feeding trials with saltbush where the sheep had no access to under-storey and it dramatically dampened interest in saltbush and saltland pastures for several years.

"It was a real concern to me that we may bail out of research funding because of the findings of a report that didn't tell the whole story," he said.

Mr Lloyd said the key to success of saltbush revegetation was in the growing saltbush and grass together.

"It is the combination of the two that makes the difference," he said.

In 1996, he met Clive Malcolm, the pioneer of saltbush agronomy, at a conference in Albany.

The two became friends and worked together for many years to raise the profile of saltland.

When the State Government released its Salinity Action Plan in 1996 without any reference to saltbush revegetation, Mr Lloyd got busy.

He hosted field days at Bundilla for six or seven years with 50 and 60 people visiting every year.

"I raised the profile of saltland," he said.

"I got a good reception at a State Landcare conference

and I spoke at national conferences."

Realising the importance of setting up a farmer-based group to lobby agencies, the Saltland Pastures Association was formed in 1997 with Mr Lloyd as its chair.

His 1996 paper Saltland Pastures - Saltland Profit helped spark renewed interest in saltbush.

Tenacious lobbying paid off with saltland agronomy research put on the policy agenda.

A further win came when the use of saline land and water was added to WA's Salinity Action Plan draft update in 1998 and then another victory when the goal of re-vegetating one million hectares of saline land over a decade was adopted in the WA Salinity Strategy in 2000.

Perhaps the sweetest victory of all was when the wool industry developed a program on resource management with \$8m of the \$20m funding set aside to deal with saltland.

In 2002, Michael Lloyd was awarded the prestigious McKell Medal for his work in natural resource management.

Royal Agricultural Society WA president Rob Wilson

said that Mr Lloyd's work changed landcare management on farms and had driven sustainability.

"As a member of the Agricultural Hall of Fame, Mr Lloyd is in the company of other great Western Australians whose determination and perseverance helped WA become an economic powerhouse, whose innovation led to breakthroughs and whose expertise defined an industry," Dr Wilson said.

Mr Lloyd is the 60th inductee to the Agricultural Hall of Fame established by the RAS in 1999.




Commemorating 100 Years of ANZAC

Each of the soldiers listed on the Lake Grace Honour Roll will be featured in the Lakes Link News, as close as possible to 100 years from their enlistment. It is now 100 years, 8 months and 1 week since Les Oliver signed up.

OLIVER – (NORMAN) LESLIE: Born at Melbourne, Victoria, he was the second son of Mr and Mrs WGR Oliver, and preferred to be called Leslie, which is the name that he then went by. He enlisted in the Australian Imperial Force at the age of 26 years on the 14th of September 1914 at Bunbury, being one of the first to enlist in the AIF. He gave next of kin as his mother, Martha Oliver of "Lyndhurst Farm," Lake Grace, and his occupation as Mill Hand. He was of fair complexion, 5 feet 6 inches tall (169cms.), and weighed 157 lbs. (71.3kgs.), with green eyes and light brown hair. His training was at Blackboy Hill, where he was assigned to G Corp 12th Battalion/3rd Infantry Brigade, his service number being 854 – (his service number was later changed to 6248, after convalescence, and reenlistment).

He embarked the HMAT Medic A7 on the 2nd of

November 1914, at Fremantle, which was one of the 38 ships in the First Convoy of Australian and New Zealand troops dispatched to the War Zone. On-route, they became very aware of the serious danger to them that was averted, when HMAS Sydney steamed away from the Convoy to do battle with the German raider Emden, which had been lurking close by in the waters off Direction Island. All eyes were on the Sydney as it disappeared over the horizon, as they were well aware of the imminent danger they faced. At 10.45 am a message arrived from the *Sydney*: "Am briskly engaging enemy," and at 11.10 am came the signal, "Emden beached and done for". The news quickly spread around the ships that the destroyer of more than a score of British Merchant ships had been smashed. The relief and pride that an Australian ship had done it was intense. Parades were interrupted; attention wandered - so General Bridges broke off work and gave the troops a half day holiday.

Approaching Egypt, there was some indecision as to where the troops would be landed, as the Salisbury Plain in England was already saturated with Canadian troops, in appalling wintery conditions. The decision was finally made to disembark at Alexandria, Egypt, on 3/12/1914 and travel by train to Cairo, from where a training camp was set up and they underwent a period of training in preparation for the Expeditionary Force.

On the 2nd of March 1915, Private Oliver embarked the British Military Transport, Devanha', to join the Mediterranean Expeditionary Force, and from Alexandria they proceeded to the Gallipoli Peninsula. There is no further record on his Medical File, until after six months service, on the 7th of September 1915, when he was admitted to hospital at Gallipoli, however, The Sunday Times records that, "he was one of the first to answer the call and who was at the famous landing in Gallipoli". He had been overcome by sickness, having succumbed to influenza, when his next movement was documented, and he had also received a serious injury. After being transferred through several Casualty Clearing Stations, he was brought to Alexandria. It was reported that he received an injury when a sand bag fell on him, and thereafter he passed blood, though it was never recognized that this incident may have contributed to his confinement! After further examinations, it was found he had a condition which warranted his return to Australia for treatment, and a probable operation. At Suez, he embarked the Karoola, and arrived back in Australia on 27/11/1915, where he received medical attention at Fremantle Hospital.

During his confinement, Leslie spent much of his time with his brother Alf at Wickepin, and during his time back in Australia, in jocular manner, family can relate how Private Oliver, (like older brothers often do), told his little brother Jack, that he had "gone AWOL", (absent without leave!) It is thought Jack may have believed him to the day he died!

Commemorating 100 Years of ANZAC (cont.)

Private Oliver recovered sufficiently that he was able to return to duty on active service, having also overcome the condition expected to require an operation, and had also recovered from meningitis which had afflicted him. Private Oliver re-enlisted at Wagin, then returned to England. The Australians having withdrawn from Gallipoli had now joined the campaign on the Western Front. December 1916, he was moved overseas to Etaples, France, where he was taken on strength, and rejoined his unit with the 16th Battalion. Private Oliver was promoted to Lance Corporal, with a further promotion to Corporal and another promotion came on the 14th of September, when he became Sergeant

On the 26th of September, Sergeant Oliver was wounded in action in a battle at Passchendaele, near Zonnebeke, Belgium, taking a gunshot wound in the shoulder and in the back. He was transferred to London and though the wound in the neck area had healed, he was left a paraplegic from the gunshot in the back. For his gallantry in that action, Sergeant Oliver was awarded a Military Medal. During his time in hospital, he was frequently visited by Mr JH Horn, the brother of Dolly, the girl Leslie was engaged to. His condition became weaker daily, and a Red Cross Visitor recorded in a note, "This case was hopeless from the first gunshot wound back - a paraplegia case - paralysed from the chest down. He died peacefully and without pain." Sergeant Oliver died in King George Military Hospital, London, of his wounds, at 9 am on November 5th. 1917. He was buried in the Consecrated Ground of the Brookwood Cemetery, Brookwood, Plot 11, Row B, Grave 22, in the Australian Military Section. The deceased soldier was accorded a full Military Funeral, the polished elm coffin being draped with an Australian Flag, with Firing Party, Bugler, and Pall Bearers supplied, and participating in the ritual. Mrs Horn, and son J Horn, were in the group present at his funeral. Sergeant Oliver was of the Roman Catholic faith.


In due course, Mrs Oliver received a letter dated 28/5/1918, informing her of her late son being awarded the Military Medal.

Sergeant Leslie Oliver's citation reads:
For the very gallant and able manner in which he carried out his duties during operations near ZONNEBEKE on the 26th September, 1917.
On reaching our objective, he proceeded out under our barrage, with a small section of snipers, to cover consolidation: and during this time, he accounted for an entire gun crew at close quarters with his rifle. He remained at the edge of our barrage, keeping the enemy's heads down until seriously wounded by a sniper, and while returning to our lines, assisted a wounded man to seek shelter.

During the whole operation, his leadership and example were such as to inspire the greatest confidence in all men in his vicinity.

He is strongly recommended for high distinction.

Sergeant Oliver was awarded the British War Medal, The Victory medal, and Military Medal, and the parents were issued a Memorial Plaque. Before the medals were released, Mr Oliver's name had to be given as the "closest blood relation" for "correctness"!



Although Martha was Leslie's mother and listed as his next of kin on his enlistment records the Australian Defence Force were insistent on finding a 'nearer blood relative'. Letter above.





and create opportunities for job and employment growth throughout regional WA.

"Royalties for Regions continues to deliver great benefits to regional WA despite the State entering a period of tight fiscal constraint. The program remains unchanged, ensuring mining royalties flow back to the hard-working regions in which they are generated," Mr Redman said.

"Since being introduced in 2008, Royalties for Regions has delivered more than \$6.1 billion to regional WA, funding more than 3600 projects that are changing regional communities for the better."

According to Mr Waldron, as part of the Royalties for Regions package, through the Growing Our South initiative, \$600 million will be utilised to revitalise the Great Southern, Wheatbelt, Peel and South West regions.

"Growing Our South is an excellent initiative that I strongly support. In 2014-15, millions of dollars were pumped into important Growing Our South projects including initiatives in Narrogin, Katanning, Boddington and surrounding areas and this will be the case again this financial year," Mr Waldron said.

He is also very pleased that Boddington Hospital will benefit from \$1.9 million through the SIHI Small Hospital and Nursing Posts Upgrades program for refurbishment works. Funding has also been allocated to ensure the provision of General Practitioner services to the Boddington region over the next four years.

"The funds for Boddington build on SIHI refurbishment works that are being implemented at the Gnowangerup, Kojonup, Lake Grace and Wagin Hospitals and at the Tambellup Health Centre," he said.

Mr Waldron is also excited about an \$18 million Royalties for Regions investment (over three years), which delivers on an election commitment for a Department of Parks and Wildlife Bunbury headquarters.

"Although this project does not fall in the electorate, people from the upper Great Southern will be advantaged and it is a major breakthrough for the regions as it's the first time a government has committed to decentralising a major agency to a regional area," he said.

"It makes sense to have these facilities south of Perth where more wildlife live, roam and can be protected. School groups and tourists will enjoy the boardwalks, lookouts, recreational activities, be able to see wildlife in their natural habitat, and the centre will also showcase WA's south and be utilised as a science hub."

A further breakdown of Royalties for Regions Budget

initiatives that locals will benefit from include:

- \$20 million (over four years) for prescribed burning to improve community safety in the South West, which is timely after the recent major fires that affected Hotham Valley

- \$85.2 million for the Social Housing Investment Package (starting 2016-17);
- \$11 million over two years for a Regional Tourism Marketing Campaign;

While we will always assist with native wildlife some calls are concerned with situations which the Wildcare Helpline is not able to assist with. This can lead to frustration and sometimes anger due to the caller being mis-informed that we can help.

Please be advised that the Wildcare Helpline provides a service for members of the public who find sick, injured or orphaned native wildlife only.

The WILDCARE Helpline CAN:

- offer advice on sick, injured, orphaned or displaced native wildlife;
- refer callers to a wider network of experts for assistance, including volunteer wildlife rehabilitators and reptile relocators.

The WILDCARE Helpline CANNOT:

attend rescues:

- Assist with stray or nuisance animals caused by domestic issues;
- assist with sick or injured non-native or domestic animals (including, but not limited to, dogs, cats, rabbits, horses, cows etc) - Contact the <u>RSPCA</u> instead - 1300 CRUELTY (1300 278 3589)
- Remove carcasses from private or shire/councilmanaged land;
- Assist with non-native or pest species for these, report to local Department of Agriculture offices https://www.agric.wa.gov.au/office-locations
