

Place and Space

Contemporary artist, Helen Seiver, is showing her works at the Lake Grace Multi-Artspace; the first time the Lake Grace Artist's Group has had a solo exhibition by an out of town artist. There are 52 items, including paintings and sculptural installations inspired by a month Helen spent as an artist in residence at Goongarrie, which is an old mining town near Menzies.

Helen's work tells the story of the hardship endured by the miners and their families as they took part in what was often foreseen as a great adventure, the West Australian gold rush. Materials used are recycled and in many cases are items left behind by those moving on to seek their fortune at the newest mine site. Residing in Capel, the vibrancy of colour and starkness of the outback landscape is in direct contrast to the lushness of the southwest of WA. Some of her works also signify universal issues such as global warming and the challenges that all individuals face throughout life.

Opened by Shire CEO, Jim Fraser, 38 attended the exhibition opening on Saturday 10th May, with Helen being quite impressed by the warmth displayed by the local community and were thrilled that many of those attending did not class themselves as artists but were interested in what was happening. Ms Seiver also commented on the friendship and mutual support displayed within the Artist's Group.

The exhibition was facilitated when Helen was attending a workshop in Northam that members of Lake Grace's Artist's Group were also attending. Lake Grace Artist's Group then extended an invitation to Helen to exhibit her works at the Lake Grace Multi-Artspace. The profile of Lake Grace's Artist's Group continues to grow, with the facilities available impressing visiting artists; all a positive reflection on Lake Grace as a community.

Community Heritage Grants 2008 are Now Open

What are Community Heritage Grants?

The Community Heritage Grants (CHG) program aims to preserve and provide access to nationally significant, Australian cultural heritage material held by community groups across the country, by providing cash grants of up to \$15 000.

The program is funded by the Australian Government and managed by the National Library of Australia, with support provided by the Department of the Environment, Water, Heritage and the Arts; the National Archives of Australia; the National Film and Sound Archive and the National Museum of Australia.

Since 1994, when the program started, 591 projects across Australia have received almost \$2.5 million in funding.

This year funding is available for projects to improve the preservation of nationally significant, cultural heritage collections held by community groups across the country, and to provide preservation and collection management training that will improve the skills of staff and volunteers working with cultural heritage materials.

Who can apply?

Australian, not-for-profit, incorporated community organisations, whose collections are open to the public, including:

- Archives
- Art galleries
- Community groups

- Genealogical societies
- Historical societies
- Indigenous groups
- Migrant community groups
- Museums



INSOMNIA TIPS for better sleep

from videoconference presentation

- Only go to bed when you feel sleepy.
- Keep regular bed and rising time.
- Have a bedtime ritual. Have a bath or shower, brush your teeth then go to bed.
- Ensure your room is the right environment for sleep. Keep the right temperature, have fresh air, keep the room dark.
- Keep your bed for sleeping. Do not watch TV, eat or talk on the phone in bed.
- Avoid stimulants before bed. Coffee stays in your system for several hours. Don't eat a meal for two to three hours before bed. Alcohol and cigarettes will keep you awake.
- Exercise will help you to sleep better. It must be before the evening meal as the effects of exercise last up to six hours.
- Avoid taking Vitamin C and the B group vitamins after the evening meal as they stay in the system for 4 and 8 hours respectively and can keep you awake.
- Don't watch the news on TV for a month.
- Deal with issues causing you stress and let go of those you cannot change.
- Have a bath with Epsom salts before bed. Have a foot bath (using a plastic bucket) if you don't have a bath, again with Epsom salts.
- Restrict computer games in particular and using the computer in general before bed.
- Don't go to bed angry. If you do, this is guaranteed to give you insomnia

SCIENCE AND

MESOPOTAMIANS TURNED SYMBOLS INTO

LOGOS: Product branding first emerged in ancient Mesopotamia, the birthplace of cities and writing. So claims David Wengrow, an archaeologist at University College London, who says that bottle stops stamped with symbols some 5000 years ago are evidence of the first branded goods. Around 8000 years ago, village-dwelling Mesopotamians began making personalised stone seals, which they pressed into the caps and stoppers used to seal food and drink. Originally these goods would have been traded directly with neighbours and travellers. But when urbanisation began – a little over 5000 years ago – city residents increasingly had to deal with products of uncertain origin. Wengrow says the symbols in caps and stoppers came to play an important role in telling people about the quality and origins of products such as oils and wine. He has described how seals might have been used to ensure quality control, to give provenance for goods or to show that they conform to a standardised system. By looking at the symbol on a wine stopper, says Wengrow, consumers came to know whether or not to trust that bottle (Current Archaeology, vol 49, p 7). Many stoppers have been found in the ancient City of Uruk, now in Iraq, where some 20,000 people lived 5000 years ago.



ROGUE GENES NOW EASIER TO MAP: Now that the human genome has been mapped, the next challenge is to discover when and where genes are switched on, and what happens when things go wrong. Thanks to a new two-pronged technique, that task may just have got easier. Joseph Ecker and colleagues at the Salk Institute in La Jolla, California, have streamlined the process of cataloguing where methylation – which switches genes off – occurs in the genome. They began by modifying an existing gene-sequencing method so that methylation sites could be detected more quickly. This generates huge amounts of data, so the team also developed new software to analyse the results. Armed with these tools the team studied mutated versions of thale cress, *Arabidopsis thaliana*, to generate “methylation maps”. This allowed them to compare activity in the mutated genome with that in a regular plant (Cell, DOI: 10.1016/j.cell.2008.03.029). The team is now mapping methylation in the human genome, in the hope that this will eventually provide insights into genetically based diseases such as cancer and Huntington’s.

AZTECS GREW SUNFLOWERS LONG BEFORE THE SPANISH ARRIVED:

Farmers in ancient Mexico were not only clued up on cultivating maize, peppers and cotton – it seems they were the first to grow sunflowers too. “Conventional wisdom is that sunflowers were cultivated in eastern North America,” says David Lentz at the University of Cincinnati in Ohio. The crop was thought to have been introduced to



Mexico by the Spanish conquistadors in the 16th century. So, when Lentz discovered domesticated sunflower seeds in a 4100-year-old Mexican archaeological site in 2001, sceptics dismissed the find as an aberration.

Now Lentz’s team has unearthed further evidence that the sunflowers had an ancient cultural history in the area. If it had been introduced by the Spanish, Lentz argues it would be known across Mexico by a Spanish name for “sunflower”. Instead, his team found 11 of 14 indigenous Mexican groups each had a unique name for the plant. Lentz also found references to “sunflower” in the Florentine Codex, an account of Aztec culture written just before the Spanish conquest. It shows that the sunflower had symbolic links with Mexican religion and nobility. Rather than introduce sunflower farming as they imposed their authority on Mexico (Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences, DOI: 10.1073/pnas.0711760105).



KEY TO MALARIA: Malaria parasites kill a million people a year, by infecting their red blood cells and gobbling up the haemoglobin proteins that transport oxygen in the blood. But the “haem” portion of haemoglobin is toxic and, to avoid destruction, the plasmodium parasite turns it into a non-toxic crystal called haemozoin. Several existing malaria drugs work by binding to haem and stopping its transformation. However, understanding the process better could lead to the development of desperately needed new drugs for malaria. Now Dewal Jani and his colleagues at Virginia Tech in Blacksburg have identified the key enzyme used by the parasite-called HDP. Mass screening has also identified several chemicals that might inhibit HDP, which is conserved across all Plasmodium species they tested (PLoS Pathogens, DOI: 10.1371/journal.ppat.1000053).

Kindly Surgeon Excelled in Field

Dennis Clark Dyason
Born December 7, 1940
Died March 13, 2008

Dennis Dyason was born in Tonga in 1940. His father was a Seventh Day Adventist Pastor who had been posted to the Island a few years previously. The family moved with subsequent postings to Hobart, Adelaide, Brisbane and Newcastle, where Dr Dyason completed his schooling at Newcastle Boys High in 1957.

He began a degree in science at the University of New England in Armidale where he met his future wife, Kathryn. He transferred to Sydney University the following year to study medicine. Despite the demands of his medical training he represented the university in football. He and Kathryn were married in 1962 and he graduated in 1964.

Dr Dyason completed his residency and registrar years at the Royal Perth Hospital, followed by a year as a general practitioner, also in Perth. By the time of the next move the family had expanded to six, with the arrival of Karl, Anna, Sonja, and Katie.

The move was to Lake Grace, a small town 320km east of Perth, where Dr Dyason was the only GP within 160km radius. It was here that the couples last child Megan was born.

By 1971 Dr Dyason had decided to complete his surgical training, so he moved to Canberra and began as a surgical registrar at the Royal Canberra Hospital. He was elected to the Royal Australasian College of surgeons in 1975. He began practicing as a specialist in Northbourne Avenue and later moved to Dickson where he stayed for the next 21 years.

Dr Dyason held visiting medical officers posts at the Royal Canberra Woden Valley and John James Hospitals and with the expansion of Canberra, he also operated at Calvary and Queanbeyan Hospital.

Dr Dyason was a general surgeon in the days before sub-specialties. He could do almost any type of surgery and do it well. He was equally confident in carrying out procedures that involved thyroid, vascular, breast or abdominal surgery. This was to prove a great advantage to him in later years as a military surgeon, where he was able to tackle a very wide variety of surgical emergencies.

Dr Dyason was kind and considerate to his patients, hospital staff and colleagues. He had a well developed sense of social responsibility that saw him continue to work at the public hospitals and carry his share of on call work up until his retirement. He was unpretentious, good humoured and a larrikin.

Dr Dyason had a wide range of interests outside of medicine, much of it centred around Kathryn and their children. The family were inquisitive travelers in Australia and overseas. Notable trips include camel riding across the Strzelecki Desert, horse riding in Mongolia, and backpacking up the Prince Regent River

in northern Western Australia. Dr Dyason was a great athlete who excelled at all sports including tennis, swimming, skiing, rowing, and marathon running.

Horse and bike riding contributed to an alarming number of knee injuries which eventually resulted in a knee replacement. Golf was a lifelong pursuit for perfection which he never quite achieved and was the source of much frustration and enjoyment.


In his later years of practice Dr Dyason developed a strong affinity for the armed services, consulting at Russell Offices and operating at Duntroon Hospital. Dr Dyason joined the army as a specialist reservist and saw active service with deployments to Bougainville, East Timor and Malaysia with the rank of major. He continued this association with the army for a further 18 months after his retirement from consultative private practice in 2001.

Dr Dyason was planning to return to his birthplace Tonga to work as a surgeon for Australian Volunteers International when his chronic illness was diagnosed. As a result of this illness further trips overseas were curtailed.

He continued to work as a surgical assistant until shortly before his death simply to be in the environment that he enjoyed so much.

Dr Dyason is survived by his wife of 46 years, Kathryn , and their five children, Karl, Anna, Sonja, Katie and Megan, as well as 12 grandchildren.

Open House

At 2pm on the 14th May, the Shire house under construction in Bennett Street was open for public inspection. Council employees Mark Burbridge, Jim Fraser and Wayne Trawinski, along with representatives from the building supplier Fortress Homes, were available to answer any questions. A number of community members took advantage of the opportunity with a steady flow throughout the afternoon coming to look. The construction has generated much interest already and the open-house gave people an opportunity to discuss the building techniques and view the near finished product.

The 'kit home' construction system is a new and innovative approach to building which is both economical and extremely simple and fast to erect. Walls are made of a polystyrene insulation material (which looks and feels very similar to packaging foam) which is steel framed and sandwiched between wall cladding sheets. The materials provide exceptional insulation from heat and cold, as well as noise dampening between rooms.

Ceilings also employ a similar construction system, and are able to be walked on via the fold-away staircase in the passage. A high pitched roof gives the house extra storage space in the form of a loft.

Retrofitting the house at a later date with additional power points or similar is much more convenient than a brick or timber framed home – just access the top of the wall from the ceiling space, and melt a channel down the polystyrene for the new cabling.

The shire has decided to render the external walls and use a colorbond steel roof which leaves the building indistinguishable from more conventional building techniques.

Council hopes to be nearing completion of the residence in the next few months, at which point it intends to call for submissions for prospective tenants. As the house has been partly funded by a grant from the Country Housing Authority, Council intends to make

the property available to small business employing local tradespeople.

An identical residence will commence construction in Newdegate next week.







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Long Drive to the Drive In

It is 22 years this April since Hillcrest Drive-In, Lake Grace, closed down. It was established in 1965 by Mr and Mrs LF Thiel and sold to Lynn and Anne Parker in 1977. We were both very happy to have the opportunity to donate our projection equipment to the Museum of Motion Picture Technology. The following article was printed in the March 2008 issue of the Australian Museum of Motion Picture Technology newsletter.

L & A Parker

Following an invitation from previous Lake Grace residents and Drive-in owners Lynn and Anne Parker, now residing in Albany, a contingent from the Australian Museum of Motion Picture Technology embarked on the eight hour round trip to accept donation of significant items related to the old drive-in operations.

Thankfully the dry climate of the inland area had slowed deterioration of many of the larger items left in a shed. The last projectors to be used at the Drive-in (replacing the earlier Hahn Goertz machines, also donated to AMMPT), a pair of model G C&W heads, with single blade shutters and water cooled gates, had been carefully stored away from the elements in Lynn's home. The model G (circa 1966) was Australia's answer to the large American projectors being imported and fitted into drive-in installations requiring high light output. Unfortunately the model G was to be amongst the last in a proud line of film projectors by pioneer Australian manufacturer of projection equipment, Cummings and Wilson. Their extensive range of machines permitted many Aussie exhibitors to escape the clutches of the predominantly overseas dominated lines of cinema supplies.

The farm shed, on the site of the old drive-in yielded many other significant items discarded years ago when they were superseded by more modern equipment. Valve amplifiers, silent film spool boxes and projectors were among the many items retrieved and now safely stored away pending a restoration process. Work has now begun in preparing these items for eventual display.

Saturday night at the drive-in was always something to look forward to, the opportunity to see a movie, regardless of how interesting it seemed, was never missed. My biggest challenge was staying awake until the cartoon that was screened at half time, good cartoons too; Tom & Jerry, Wile Coyote, Bugs Bunny and poor old Daffy Duck. On shop day I always made a point of checking out the upcoming attractions on the Hillcrest advertising board that was beside what is now Rosies cafe, the desire to see the movie correlated perfectly with pressure exerted on Mum & Dad.

It was a family affair; Mum, Malcolm & I in the back; Dad, Grandma Oliver and Garry in the front. Garry was always rather smug about his seating position as Grandma always brought along a large bag of lollies to share. Malcolm sneaked into the front one time but Grandma passed the bag of lollies over to the back, I thought it was funny even if he didn't!

Everyone had their favourite parking position; there were lefties and righties and those that opted for in front of the kiosk. Therefore it was important to get there early so that you could claim your spot and get into the kiosk to purchase nibblies, drinks or even tea; the kitchen supplied a good range of take-away meals. Half time was never a good opportunity for going to the kiosk unless you were socializing as the crowd being served was massive.

Once parked you would quickly hang the wireless on the window to make sure it was in working order. It was also very important to remember to hang it back on its stand before driving off; on more than one occasion movies buffs drove off wrenching the speaker cord from the stand. In summer everyone wanted the speaker on their side but in winter the level of interest declined as no one wanted the cold draught that would be coming through the window. Once you were sure the wireless was working it was time to settle in and see who else had come out for the evening. Invariably there were some guilty of arriving late each week, creeping around until they found their spot, moving back and forward on the hump until it was just so; more often than not with their headlights still on. Instructions on how to turn the lights off were often proffered in a less than friendly fashion.

Of course when movie time was finished around midnight it was a race for the exit, some would have preempted the rush by sneaking out before the movie finished, which always seemed a little odd to me.

Rumour has it that the young lads would scoot through the bush from town when the R rated movies were showing so that they could get an education; it would have been a long scary walk home in the dark if the movie was classified because of violence rather than sex scenes.

It was the end of a very pleasant interlude when the drive-in closed. It is easier and more convenient to pop a DVD into the home theatre but I'd have to say Bambi was sadder on the big screen.

World Youth Day Cross is Coming to Lake Grace

On Monday, June 2nd, 2008, Lake Grace will be the safe haven for the World Youth Day Cross and Icon. Lake Grace and neighbouring towns will certainly be blessed by its presence and it will be a wonderful opportunity to put Lake Grace on the world map!

In August 2005, Pope Benedict XVI announced at the conclusion of the World Youth Day in Cologne that Sydney will host the next World Youth Day on July 15-20, 2008. This year's international youth festival in Sydney is expecting around 500,000 participants from all around the world.

The World Youth Day event began in 1985 when the late Pope John Paul II called on the youth of the world to gather in Rome for the first World Youth Day. Since then, every two to three years, the International World Youth Day has been celebrated in 'host countries' attracting hundreds of thousands of young people from all over the world.

History of the WYD Cross & Icon. The 3.8 metre high wooden cross was built and placed as a symbol of the Catholic faith, near the main altar in St Peter's Basilica in

Rome, Italy during the Holy Year of 1983. At the end of the year, Pope John Paul gave this cross as a symbol of Christ's love for humanity.

My dear young people, at the conclusion of the Holy Year, I entrust to you the sign of this Jubilee Year: the Cross of Christ! Carry it throughout the world as a symbol of Christ's love for humanity, and announce to everyone that only in the death and resurrection of Christ can we find salvation and redemption. (His Holiness Pope John Paul II, Rome, 22 April 1984.)

The Journey of the WYD Cross. Since 1984 the WYD Cross has made its way around the world, throughout Europe, behind the Iron Curtain, and to parts of the Americas, Asia, Africa and briefly to Australia, being present at each international celebration of World Youth Day along the way. In 1994 the Cross began in earnest what has since become a tradition: its year long journey around the dioceses of the host nation of each international World Youth Day, as a means of prayerful preparation for the big event.

Heralding these international celebrations of young people, the Cross is now best known as "the World Youth Day Cross". The media

"Impressive. And what sort of case was that?"

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

New Tool in Salinity Engineering

By combining basic rules of hydrology with local knowledge, an innovative new software application will go a long way to improving the management of salinity in the Avon River Basin and beyond.

"The software package will assist farmers, drainage contractors and catchment planners to design and evaluate deep drainage as an element of integrated catchment management planning. Our focus has been on finding practical ways to address salinity so farmers can maintain production without having unforeseen impacts on neighbouring property," said Robin Sanders, Project Advisor for the Australian Government.

Created through the Avon Catchment Council's (ACC) integrated salinity management project 'Yilgarn Engineering Design Plan', GIS software contractor Rokit Science developed the drainage planning components called 'CatchMan for Drainage Management'.

"The software is very flexible and powerful. Its simplicity allows anyone interested in landscape and salinity management to generate a logical and practical salinity management solution," said Peter Hudson, Managing Director of Rokit Science.

"CatchMan is a useful tool for farmers wanting to address salinity on their properties. By planning and evaluating the project before instigating on-ground

works farmers can save a lot of time, money and possible disappointment," said Don Woodcock, Project Coordinator.

This project is one of several managed by the ACC with funding assistance from the Australian and Western Australian governments that explore ways to design and assess the environmental impact of deep drainage schemes. Further additions to the software are planned for the future including surface water management and modelling the impact on groundwater of plant-based solutions to salinity.

For now however, land managers searching for ways to stop encroaching salinity have a new weapon in the form of CatchMan which may just provide the answers they've been looking for.

Hand-dyed Silk Works Head to Katanning

A collection of hand-dyed silk works, inspired by the Australian bush, will be on show at the Katanning Art Gallery next month as part of a solo exhibition by Lake Grace artist Kerrie Argent.

Canopy, which opens June 4th, is an exhibition of works made from reels of silk, silk organza and silk satin, hand-coloured using the dye from Eucalyptus trees on Kerrie's Lake Grace farm.

Individual pieces include an intricately-layered evening gown, floor-to-ceiling-length panels of lace and web-like silk embroideries, which were created over a period of 18 months at the artist's home-based studio.

Kerrie, who draws heavily on her surrounding environment for raw materials and inspiration for her artwork, said using Eucalyptus leaf dyes was an ecological alternative to commercial textile dyes and produced subtle, but vast variations in colour.

She said unlike some other natural dye sources, Eucalypts contained tannins, eliminating the need for harsh chemical mordants to fix the dye to the fabric.

"The Eucalyptus leaves are simply cut and boiled to extract the dye and then applied to the silk – a fibre which absorbs the colour beautifully – in a dye bath."

Many variants affect the dye colour that is extracted from the leaves, which Kerrie said made for a challenging, but rewarding colouring process.

"Anything from the season, variety of Eucalypt, age of the leaf or time of day it is picked can affect the dye colour," she said.

"This is in addition to any variants in the dyeing process, where things like how long the leaf matter is boiled or the fabric left in the dye bath also affect the outcome."

The body of silk works in *Canopy* will also be accompanied by photos, books and other sculptural pieces which continue Kerrie's interest in recyclable materials and the natural environment.

Canopy is Kerrie's first solo exhibition since graduating recently from Curtin University of Technology's Bachelor of Arts degree, which she studied from Lake Grace through Curtin's Centre for Regional Education.



The silk works by artist Kerrie Argent on show in Katanning next month include this evening dress "Forrest Beauty", hand-dyed and patterned using Eucalyptus leaves from the artist's own property.

An active community member, she's also been participating in, coordinating and facilitating numerous exhibitions and art initiatives in her local town and wider region for more than 10 years.

Canopy opens at the Katanning Gallery, on Austral Terrace, on June 4th at 6.30pm and will run until June 16th.

NIGHT WATCH



Welcome to Night Watch for the fortnight, from midnight Friday 23rd May to midnight Friday 6th June. Astronomy is looking up. Never view the Sun with the naked eye or through binoculars and telescopes without proper Solar Filters as your eyes can easily be damaged beyond repair. Binoculars and telescopes can easily shatter as well. The Full Moon may also hurt your eyes without filters.

Our local star the Sun resides in the constellation of Taurus all this fortnight and shine at magnitude of -26.72. Morning twilight starts at 5:28am on Saturday and at 5:34am on Friday 6th June. Evening twilight ends on Saturday at 6:38pm on Saturday and at 6:36pm on Friday 6th June.

ON Wednesday 28th May the last quarter **MOON** will be at 10:46am in Aquarius at 55% illumination. The Moon on Tuesday 3rd June at 9pm will be at Perigee (closest) at 357,257 kilometres from Earth with 2% illumination. On Wednesday 4th at 3:12am the New Moon will occur in Taurus.

MERCURY and **VENUS** are too low down to view.

MARS the red coloured planet in the constellation of Cancer at magnitude +1.5 sets at 9:52pm and is just south of the open star cluster M44 which is magnitude +3.1. On Friday 6th June Mars sets at 9:37pm. You will notice that Mars sets at only 1 minute earlier each night and the stars set 4 minutes earlier each night, so it appears to move backwards through the constellations as Earth catches up.

JUPITER the giant gas planet in the constellation of Sagittarius at a bright magnitude of -2.7 rises just 2° north of the Moon on Saturday at 8:31pm. On Friday 6th June at magnitude -2.7 Jupiter rises at 7:36pm. With its moons and storms Jupiter is great viewing through any sized telescope, information below.

SATURN the ringed gas planet in the constellation of Leo sets at 11:46pm at magnitude +0.7 is just east of the bright blue star Regulas on Saturday. On Friday 6th June Saturn sets at 10:58pm. Saturn will be just west of north at 6:30pm at around 30°.

URANUS the blue/green coloured gas planet in the constellation of Aquarius rises on Saturday at 1:20am shining at magnitude +5.8. On Thursday 29th, Uranus rises a 1:01am 4° south of the 44% Moon. Uranus rises

on Friday 6th June at 12:34am. Binoculars or telescope is needed.

NEPTUNE the grey/green coloured planet in the constellation of Capricornus rises on Saturday at 11:05pm and shines at magnitude +7.9. On Tuesday 27th Neptune will be 0.6° south of the Moon. Neptune rises at 10:14pm on Friday 6th June. A telescope is the best for this planet.

With the giant gas planet **JUPITER** now in the evening night sky you will be able even with a small telescope be able to see the four moons around the disc. IO, Europa, Ganymede and Callisto along with the giant red spot make interesting viewing. If you have a larger telescope (mine is a 8 inch (20cm) Meade LX50 Schmidt- Cassegrain), you can also view the white and blue/green coloured storm cloud bands. The Great Red Spot is a hurricane, but on an immense scale. From east to west it measures 24,780 kilometres, twice as big as Earth itself, and from north to south it is about 40,000 kilometres across and is -113° Celsius with winds to 650 kilometres per hour.

As the moons cross in front of the planet disc, the shadow may also be viewed. The moons will change positions around the planet with the four on one side or other, two on each side and three and one on the other. They disappear behind the planet disc and reappear on the other side. As they reappear, it looks as if the planet is growing a pimple. The Great red spot will be in view at 9:30pm on Saturday 31st May and at 8:34pm on Friday 6th June.

On a moonless night you may now view the EMU in the sky. The head of the EMU is the dark matter in the Southern Cross with the beak and a magnitude +6 blue star being the eye, the neck runs down along the milky way dark matter to the body in Scorpius and Sagittarius. The legs are a bit harder to see, but think of the EMU running and that is what it looks like. If you need help just ring and I will show you.

For any information on anything please phone day or night. Viewing at my home is free of charge night or day as a safe view of the Sun is available. If you view anything that is odd in the sky please call and I will try to explain what it is as I can take the phone outside if still in view.


The Morton brothers said they have happy memories of

After all of the fixtured events had finished, Cale and Mitch were asked to present the awards for hockey, netball and football.



The HID work lights we have been fitting are proving to be popular, as they offer an even bright spread of light not seen from conventional lighting set ups before. As mentioned last issue they are available in two sizes, four inch square or six inch square. They are also available with two different lens designs to give a narrow flood pattern or a wide spread flood pattern.
