towards Junior Golf in our district. The money will be used to purchase new equipment for our Junior Golfers.







Enjoying Getting Offroad

Motor bikes are a way of getting away from it all and having a few hours of fun and freedom. Narrow tracks where cars can't go and the challenge of a good jump make it an appealing pastime. On Wednesday 12th May the Lake Grace Development Association hosted an Off Road Vehicle Workshop at the Lake Grace Telecentre with approximately 20 community members in attendance.

A collaborative workshop was held to identify the issues, effects and outcomes relating to Off Road Vehicle use. The meeting was facilitated by Shire staff and those in attendance broke off into three working groups to come up with feasible solutions for the bike riders and people in the community.

Speed and the manoeuvres carried out by some riders were identified as a concern for the safety of the riders and local residents. When using access paths some bikers need to be aware that their bikes make a lot of noise and they need to ride in a safer manner. Nurses who do nightshift (sleep during the day), residents with small children and people walking/running were identified as those who are most at risk from the adverse effects of bikes. If bikers reduce their speed, this will in turn reduce noise levels and ensure that residents are safer and are not disturbed by loud noises.

Workshop participants also identified that there is an age gap in the community regarding sport; some boys are too old for hockey and too young for the B grade football and therefore bikes are their entertainment and a form of sport.

A bike track was considered, though this would need to be erected on private property and there would have to be community ownership of the building and management of such a facility. The Shire is not able to provide such a facility as it would be open for litigation and even though other facilities have signs erected 'Ride at your own risk' this does not waiver the liability onto local Shires.

At the conclusion of the meeting it was decided to publish information from the workshop in the Lakes Link News and for a signage workshop to be held in the school holidays. The signs will be designed and made by local youth and will display 'go slow' messages for areas in town that have been identified as having the most bike traffic or most hazardous. ie. Clarke Avenue and the area around the hospital.

Thank you to all who participated in this workshop, to the Lake Grace Development Association and to Sean Fletcher and Nadene Owen from the Shire of Lake Grace for facilitating.

From the CEO's Desk

I was fortunate enough to be in Adelaide last week at the Local Government Manager's Association National Congress to review how communities recover after a disaster, look at what makes up a resilient community and how we can all make better use of our resources. I was also part of a working group regarding the following matters that will be responded to and taken to the Federal Government and Opposition in time for the 2010 Federal Election:

- Addressing workforce planning including tackling the skills shortage. For the Shire, this means supporting the new Australian Centre of Excellence for Local Government, developing attraction and retention strategies extending the working life of those considering retirement and developing Local Government as an employer brand;
- Financial management - committing to long term financial planning and thus getting away from the focus being on the annual budget. Also using debt management better, including taking out loans for as long as possible and treating this as an intergenerational strategy;
- Asset Management - Basic asset management plans or forward capital works plans regarding the Shire's buildings, roads, parks and gardens and other facilities must be in place by 31 December 2010. In hand with this, the Shire's elected members are now required to ensure that the Shire has integrated strategic planning in place and be aware that they are the stewards for the long term and not just for the life of an election cycle;
- Climate Change - This is still a key focus despite the politics at the moment. Climate Change Minister Penny Wong made it clear the Government is pressing ahead with climate change initiatives. These initiatives are expected to continue regardless of who is in power;
- Aged care, health and accommodation - 50% of babies born now will live to 100+. So we as a community across the Shire need to get on with promoting healthy lifestyles and keeping the aged in our communities - as this is what our aged people want.

Thank you to those in the Lake Grace community that attended the Off Road Vehicle Forum on 12th May 2010. There was a great turnout at the Lake Grace Telecentre and it was good to see different age groups at the workshop. A range of issues were explored including why the Shire cannot put a designated unmanned off road riding area in place due public liability issues. A number of solutions were also proposed including the need for more communication amongst ORV users, appropriate signage and a workshop.

In terms of the State Budget, the Country Local Government Fund has been restored. This is now worth \$435m over four years to local governments in the country areas. Also the Shire is going to receive library funding direct in future instead of just receiving book allocations. This approach is expected to bring more books into the Shire's library system.

SCIENCE AND STUFF

FIRST CANCER VACCINE: The latest weapon in the war on cancer is a patient's own cells. A prostate cancer vaccine that the US Food and Drug Administration rejected in 2007 has now won the regulators approval, making it the first cancer vaccine to do so. Provenge, made by Dendreon of Seattle, does not prevent or cure prostate cancer, which killed 27,000 men in the US last year and more than 10,000 in the UK in 2008. Rather, in its largest study yet, the therapy extended the lives of 512 people with aggressive prostate tumours by four months, compared with patients who did not receive it. Administering Provenge involves harvesting a patient's immune cells and exposing them to a protein produced by prostate tumours. These "primed" cells are then re-injected into the patient, where they attack tumours. Though modest, the latest result shows that harnessing the immune system is a viable way to fight cancer. Oncologist Philip Kantoff at the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute in Boston led the trial. He expects similar approaches to other cancers, such as melanoma, kidney cancer and lymphoma, to be approved in five to 10 years and that tweaks to Provenge will see it further extend people's lives.



RUN FAST, RUN DEEP: More than 3 kilometres down in part of the freezing Southern Ocean, water is flowing at more than 700 metres per hour, making this the fastest-moving deep ocean current ever found. The powerful current was discovered thanks to a 175-kilometre string of sensors on the eastern flank of the submerged Kerguelen plateau, some 3000 kilometres south-west of Australia (Nature Geoscience, DOI: 10.1038/ngeo842). With a flow of more than 8 million cubic metres per second, the current transports 40 times as much water as the Amazon. It is likely to be an important component of the global ocean "conveyor belt", which pushes water from the ocean surface to its greatest depths and back again, and has a direct influence on global temperatures. Deep ocean currents are now being monitored for signs of change. The measurements already suggest that deep Antarctic waters are warming and becoming less buoyant, perhaps because of climate change.

TREE FALL: The US lost more than 120,000 square kilometres of forest between 2000 and 2005, a greater percentage than any of the other seven most heavily forested nations on Earth: Canada, Russia, China, Brazil, Indonesia and the Democratic Republic of the Congo. Globally 3 per cent of the world's forest disappeared (Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences, DOI:10.1073/pnas.0912668107).



SEVEN DWARFS KILLED OFF MARINE LIFE: Seven small undersea "volcanoes" that once spewed asphalt into the Pacific Ocean have been mapped off the coast of California. They could be the cause of a prehistoric marine dead zone thought to exist in the area. David Valentine and colleagues at the University of California, Santa Barbara, surveyed the sea floor and discovered the mounds, the largest of which rises 20 metres above the seabed, made from tar. Some were still releasing methane. It is the first time that asphalt "volcanoes" have been identified in


the area. Valentine says they formed as sticky hydrocarbons seeped from the seabed around 40,000 years ago (Nature Geoscience, DOI: 10.1038/ngeo8-48). Methane would also have been released at a rate that greatly exceeds today's output, with devastating consequences for the local ecosystem. The gas would have attracted bacteria that metabolise methane and deplete oxygen. That fits with analysis of sea-floor sediments, which suggests that a dead zone of around 600 square kilometres formed here around 40,000 years ago.

WHAT TYPE OF KILLER WAS WILLY?

AND THERE WERE THREE: long held assumptions that all killer whales belong to the same species have been blown apart by a DNA analysis of 139 orcas, it reveals that there are at least three separate species. "These have all radiated from one another quite recently, from 150,000 to 700,000 years ago," says Phillip Morin of the Southwest Fisheries Science Center in La Jolla, California (Genome Research, DOI: 10.1101/gr.102954.109). The three new species differ in appearance, hunting habits and diet. Ross Sea killer whales from the Antarctic are about two-thirds the size of most orcas, eat only fish and have the smallest eye streak of all. Pack-ice killer whales also live in the Antarctic but have the largest eye patch and hunt seals. Both are greyer than the north/east Pacific transient killer whales living off Alaska, which feed on marine mammals, including dolphins. The fact that the species have such different diets could explain the difficulties some aquaria have had getting their captive orcas to eat fish, Morin says he has no idea which species Willy, of free Willy fame, belonged to.



TURBOCHARGED BONE REPAIR: Can't stand hobbling around in your cast? Perhaps there's a way out. Mice with broken legs seem to be healing three times faster than normal, thanks to a protein that makes stem cells divide. Jill Helms, Roel Nusse and colleagues at Stanford University in California drilled small holes into the shin bones of mice, then injected Wnt proteins, which prompt bone stem cells to divide. Three days later, bone growth was three times greater than in mice injected with a placebo (Science Translational Medicine, DOI: 10.1126/scitranslmed.3000231). This approach stimulates bone growth temporarily and so might be better than adding new stem cells, which can divide uncontrollably.



ELECTRIC MOON: Lunar craters contain hazardous electrical pockets. When the solar wind flows over a crater rim, more electrons pour down than heavier positively charged ions, creating a region of negative charge, finds a study in the Journal of Geophysical Research (DOI: 10.1029/2009je3464). Astronauts should avoid electrostatic discharges.



The \$290 million surplus under the 2010-11 State Budget announced by Premier and Treasurer Colin Barnett is an outstanding achievement during one of the most uncertain and challenging economic times in recent history.

Families and communities throughout the Agricultural Region are the major beneficiaries of the Barnett Budget with the \$290 million surplus permitting increased funding for State building regional infrastructure projects and record spending on regional health, schools, police communications and assistance for not for profit organisations.

The Agricultural Region will receive through the Budget over \$200 million in direct funding for numerous Liberal Party election commitments and projects; and will receive a significant portion of regional spending under the \$896 million Royalties for Regions which was legislated by the Barnett Liberal-led Government earlier this year, including:

- \$26 million to help attract and retain public sector workers in regional areas;
- \$79 million of ongoing funding for Housing for Workers (GROH)
- \$20.3 million over three years to expand the State's mobile phone coverage on the State's highways, including \$8 million in 2010-11 to expand mobile phone coverage to address black spots;
- \$102 million to the Country Local Government Fund with \$61 million to be allocated to individual country local governments and \$33 million to groups of country local governments to invest in significant infrastructure projects developed with the support of the Regional Development Commissions;
- \$23.5 million for Stage 2 of the Country Age Pension Fuel Card;
- \$1.6 million for the establishment of

Clontarf Academies in Katanning and Northam;

- \$12 million in funding for the Community Resource Centre Network.

Specific projects and programs funded under the Barnett Budget include:

Transport

- Over \$80 million in funding for necessary upgrades to road and rail infrastructure under the State Grain Freight Network, including \$7.93 million in upgrade works to Chester Pass, and \$13.5 million in re-sleepering of the Albany to Avon line;
- \$23 million for the on-going construction of Indian Ocean Drive Stage 2, a 55 kilometre section between Ocean Farms Estate and Cervantes
- \$450,000 for improvements at the Indian Ocean Drive intersection with Gingin Brook Road and Caraban Road;
- \$650,000 towards realigning the Collie-Lake King Road on the eastern approach to Darkan town site;
- \$28 million in funding over the next four years to improving regional aviation infrastructure through the Regional Airports Development Scheme;
- All new school buses ordered will be fitted with air-conditioning, auto transmission and specified accessories as standard and contractors paid to operate the air-conditioning regardless of the location of the bus route. Existing school buses with a remaining service life of at least 10 years, and which entered into service within the last five years will be retrofitted and the operation of air-conditioning paid for at a cost of \$10.9 million over the next four years;
- \$24 million in community grants for the Recreational Boating Facilities Scheme;

- \$2.7 million for final sealing and landscape works on Stage 2 of the Geraldton Southern Transport Corridor from North West Coastal Highway to Geraldton airport.
- Generalist Pathways program to support training of junior doctors in regional areas;
- \$9 million continued support for the Patient Assisted Travel Scheme;

Police and Emergency Services;

- \$8.7 million expansion of the Perth Metropolitan Radio Network (PMR north to Lancelin and east to Northam);
- \$80.3million over four years to upgrade communications systems for regional police and emergency services;
- Significant increases in funding for volunteer emergency service units to accelerate the replacement of overage bushfire brigade appliances, provide additional bushfire appliances and State emergency vehicles in high risk areas, the replacement of strategic regional assets, the provision of fit-for-purpose facilities and garaging for both services and the provision of a first response bushfire fighting capability for vulnerable remote communities (\$10 million in 2010-11 and a further \$30 million from 2011-14);
- Significant enhancement to local government's fire management capabilities through the extension of the Community Emergency Services Officers Program at a gross cost of \$2.9 million in 2010-11;
- \$800,000 to train regional Justices of the Peace.
- \$9.3 million in continued support for the Royal Flying Doctor Service;
- \$26 million over four years for St. John Ambulance country services;
- The establishment in the Wheatbelt of a respite care home for people living with disabilities.

Education

- \$100 million upgrade for regional schools including \$30 million for the redevelopment of Dongara District High School.
- \$52 million over four years for the establishment of Regional Residential College Upgrades - (\$2.5 million)
- \$28 million over four years for the Responsible Parenting Program – (\$2.8 million)
- Ongoing funding of \$1.9 million for the Boarding Away from Home Allowance;
- \$628,000 for the Better Beginnings - Early Literacy program;

Agriculture and Food

- \$9.05 million over four years (\$2.35 million in 2010-11) to develop and adopt genetically modified technology into WA farming systems including \$3 million towards infrastructure in Merredin and Katanning to evaluate the use of GM crops in varying climates;
- \$5.5 million in 2010-11 joint State and Federal funds towards a pilot program of drought reform measures in WA;
- \$4.8 million in 2010-11 for wild dog management and to upgrade the State Barrier Fence to wild dog standard;

Health and Disability Services

- Work will start on the \$9 million Upper Great Southern District (including Narrogin) redevelopment project;
- Work will start on the \$9 million Eastern Wheatbelt District (including Merredin) Stage 1 redevelopment project;
- \$8.5 million over three years for the Rural

Environment

- \$20 million across four years has been earmarked for roads and infrastructure in national parks and conservation reserves. The projects to be funded will be considered by State Cabinet after the release of the State Budget.
- \$20 million for the State's Natural Resource Management program to ensure WA has an environment in which resources are managed, developed and used sustainably; biological diversity is preserved and habitats protected

Water

- \$6.5 million to complete the upgrading of the \$24.7 million Geraldton Walkaway pump station and pipeline which brings water from bore fields to Geraldton.
- \$2.2 million will be spent replacing five kilometres of water main in Mullewa.

Energy

- Provision for the North Country Reinforcement - \$318.9 million (\$47.1 million in 2010-11)
- Funding has been provided to build Stage 1 of the North Country Reinforcement power transmission line. This section comprises a 200km 330kV line from Pinjar to Eneabba, and a 330kV terminal at Three Springs.

- This work will provide additional network capacity for the region, enabling projects such as Gindalbie's Karara mine and proposed new wind generation projects in the region.
- Construction is subject to regulatory and Government approvals.

Fisheries

- The 2010-11 Budget has flagged Government borrowing of \$11.9 million to pay for the surrender of various commercial fishing licenses under the provisions of the Fisheries Adjustment Scheme 1987, (The FAS Act) - with those borrowings repaid by industry over 10 years. The three Fisheries involved include the Shark Bay Scallop Fishery, Abrolhos Islands and Mid West Trawl Fishery (\$6.4 million in 2009-10 and \$3 million in 2010-11) and Exmouth Gulf Prawn Fishery (\$2.5 million in 2009-10).
- In addition, \$4 million over two years in capital works funding is earmarked to replace the ageing 23-metre-long Fisheries patrol vessel (PV) Walcott. The PV Walcott will perform a range of compliance, research and long-range management activities along the Mid-West coast.

Drought Reform Pilot for WA

Western Australia will join with the Federal Government to trial a new approach to drought assistance in a bid to build a more secure future for the agriculture industry.

WA Agriculture and Food Minister Terry Redman and Federal Agriculture Minister Tony Burke announced a pilot of reform measures aimed at preparing farm businesses and rural communities for the future challenges.

"WA farmers have not been well served by the Exceptional Circumstances arrangements in the past," Mr Redman said.

"I requested in June 2009 that a drought reform trial be conducted in Western Australia and have been working consistently since with Mr Burke. This is a step in the right direction as the national drought reform process continues.

"This is an opportunity for West Australian farmers to develop new skills and for farming communities to plan for their future.

"The crux of these measures is about preparation and building resilient businesses, instead of waiting for a crisis and reacting after the fact. We need to move to a mind-set of being proactive, rather than reactive when it comes to tough times in agriculture."

The pilot has three broad aims; to strengthen farm businesses, sustain farming families and build resilient rural communities.

It consists of seven major components:

- **Farm Planning:** assistance for farmers to undertake a program of training to enhance their skills in business planning
- **Building Farm Businesses:** grants of up to \$60,000 to help farmers better manage and prepare for future challenges
- **Farm Family Support:** income support to help families meet basic household needs
- **Stronger Rural Communities:** grants of up to \$300,000 for eligible local groups experiencing significant hardship due to an agricultural downturn to build the resilience of their rural community and assist them to manage future hardship
- **Farm Social Support:** a better co-ordinated social support network to meet mental health, counselling and social needs of farming families and rural communities
- **Farm Exit Support:** grants of up to \$170,000 to support farmers who decide to sell their farm, including retraining and relocation expenses
- **Beyond Farming:** a program for farmers who want to know more about opportunities that arise when they sell up or retire.
- WA Government will fund and administer the Farm Planning component of the trial and will administer the Building Farm Businesses component.

The pilot region has been selected based on previous recipients of Exceptional Circumstances (EC) and extends from Karratha to Esperance.

Mr Redman emphasised this was a genuine pilot starting on July 1, 2010 and ending June 30, 2011, although Building Farm Business grants will be spread over four years.

"I encourage farmers to get involved in the pilot and give feedback on the usefulness of its measures. This program will assist businesses and communities to respond and adapt to the tough financial times they are experiencing right now, as well as plan for the future," he said.

"This is part of the State Government's approach to ensuring that maintaining productivity and profitability is at the forefront of government policy, even during difficult times.

"Under the agreement the Western Australian Government will not be able to apply for an EC declaration during the period July 1st, 2010 to June 30th, 2011.

"It is a good time to pilot these new measures while no area of WA is drought-declared and farmers can use this opportunity to prepare for tough times that may arise in the future.

"The pilot is a chance for West Australian farmers and their families to access more generous support through training and grants, and social welfare safety net sooner, rather than waiting for the slow, bureaucratic EC application process.

"I am also pleased that the Federal Government listened to the WA Government's requests to allow for a more generous assets test for WA farmers as part of the pilot."

Welcome to Night Watch for the period from midnight Friday May 28th to midnight Friday June 11th 2010. Night Watch is a guide to where you can find and view objects in the day and night sky with the naked eye (NE), binoculars (Bin) or telescope (Tele). Astronomy is looking up.

Our Local star "THE SUN" shining at magnitude -26.72 from 152 million km's on Saturday May 29th and from 152.2 million km's on Friday June 11th in the Constellation of Taurus rising in the East/north/east and setting in the West/north/west on its journey back north. Never view the Sun with the naked eye or an optical instrument without a proper Solar Filter and read the instructions carefully if you must do so.

TWILIGHT on Saturday May 29th begins at 5:32am with evening twilight ending at 6:39pm. On Saturday June 5th morning twilight begins at 5:36am with evening twilight ending at 6:38pm. Morning twilight on Friday 11th begins at 5:38am and evening twilight ending at 6:38pm.

The 59% **MOON** in Aquarius at 1am on Friday June 4th will be at Apogee furthest from the Earth at 404,266 km's and 5° north of the planet Neptune at 2am in the East/north/east (NE, Bin or Tele). On Saturday June 5th the 49% last quarter Moon will occur at 6:05am in Aquarius (Ne, Bin or Tele). During the morning of Sunday June 6th the 40% Moon rises in Pisces at 12:41am along with Jupiter at 1:09am and Uranus at 1:10am and from then they will move closer together during the day until 7pm.(Ne, BIN or Tele). On Friday 11th in Taurus the 3% Moon will be 5° south of Mercury in the morning sky on the East/north/east horizon at 380,000 km's from Earth.

MERCURY: at magnitude +0.2 in the Constellation of Aries rises on Saturday May 29th at 4:56am on the East/north/east horizon and may be viewed at 5:30am (Bin or Tele). On Saturday June 5th Mercury rises at 5:11am at magnitude -0.3 in view at 5:34am. Mercury rises on Friday 11th at 5:31am and will be 5° of the 3% Moon and at 165 million km's from Earth.

VENUS: shining at a very bright magnitude of -4.0 in the Constellation of Gemini on Saturday May 29th is visible in the West/north/west at 6:30pm and sets at 7:27pm. On Saturday June 5th Venus sets at 7:36pm. Venus on Wednesday 9th will be 5° south of the bright star Pollux. On Friday 11th Venus is visible at end of twilight and is three-quarters lit and is good viewing through a telescope and has three different colours that change brightness.

MARS: the red planet shining at magnitude +0.9 in the Constellation of Leo on Saturday May 29th will be visible at 6:45pm in the North/north/west and will set at 11pm in the West/north/west (Ne, Bin or Tele). On Saturday June 5th Mars sets at 11pm. Mars on Sunday 6th will be very close to the bright star Regulas at 0.9 deg north (Bin or Tele). On Friday June 11th at 245 million km's from Earth. Mars sets at 10:42pm and is now just a red disc.

JUPITER: the giant gas planet shining at magnitude -2.3 in the Constellation of Pisces on Saturday May 29th rising at 1:35am on the East/north/east horizon, will be visible in the morning at twilight in the North/north/east (Ne, Bin or Tele). On Saturday June 5th Jupiter rises at 1:10pm. Jupiter on Sunday 5th will be 7° south of the

40% Moon and on Monday 7th Jupiter will be 0.5° south of Uranus at 2am and is a good time to find both planets (Bin or Tele). On Friday 11th Jupiter rises at 12:52am at 757 million km's from Earth with the four bright Moons.

SATURN: the ringed gas planet shines at magnitude +1.1 in the Constellation of Virgo on Saturday May 29th in the North/north/east at 7pm (Ne, Bin or Tele) sets at 1:30am on Sunday 30th. On Saturday June 5th Saturn will be in the night sky until after midnight as on Friday June 11th at 1.39 billion km's from Earth.

URANUS: the blue/green gas planet at magnitude +5.9 in Pisces rises on Saturday May 29th at 1:37am close to Jupiter all fortnight and is 3.03 billion km's from Earth (Bin or Tele).

NEPTUNE: the grey/green coloured gas planet at magnitude +7.9 in Aquarius on Saturday May 29th rises at 11:12pm on the East/north/east horizon. On Friday June 4th Neptune will be 5° south of the 59% Moon rising at 10:47pm. Neptune rises at 10:19pm on Friday 11th at 4.3 billion km's from Earth and a telescope is needed.

On Wednesday June 2nd at 8pm the smallest of the 88 Constellations "Cruz", the Southern Cross, will be direct south and high in the evening night sky and is followed by the two bright pointer stars Beta and Alpha Centauri. Surrounding the Cross are the stars of the Constellation of Centaurus the Centaur. Leo is now in the North/north/west with Corvus the Crow high in the north with Virgo higher to the north. The bright orange star Arcturus the brightest star in the Constellation of Bootes the Herdsman. To the east you will find the Constellation of Scorpius, the Scorpion with Libra the Scales in front. Between the head of Scorpius (4 bright stars in a row), and the two bright stars Beta and Alpha Centauri you will find the bright stars of the Constellation of Lupus the Wolf.

The stars rise 4 minutes earlier each night, and when outside you can notice the Earth turning with the stars in a different position each hour if you walk out from the house.

The **EMU** is now starting to appear in the night sky, and to find it all you have to do is follow the dark gas and dust lanes of the Milky Way from the Cross to Sagittarius. Start at the dark gas patch between the two stars Alpha and Beta Crucis and you will find the small beak near the bright blue star Alpha then in the head you will find a small star which is the eye. Then follow the gas lanes through the two trailing stars and this is the neck which goes through to the large patch of gas which is the body. The legs are in a running position, while the tail is in Sagittarius. If you need help I can talk you through it by phone outside.

Viewing through my 8 inch LX50 Schmidt telescope at my house is free of charge. Observations can be of the Sun during the day, the Moon day or night and at night the viewing of star clusters and nebula. I can also point out the Constellations and planets in view.

Keeping Safe, Everyone's Responsibility

At this time of year we are all waiting expectantly for the break of the season. This year we had a drier than average summer and given the lack of rain everyone is particularly anxious to get going. Diesel Fever is affecting everyone!

When we consider our safety and what affects us as safe operators do we ever consider the impact of anxiety, while we wait for rain, on our overall performance?

Everyone of us lives with stress, but if our stress gets too much and becomes distressful to us then we at least need to know, or remind ourselves, it will impact on our ability to function at our best. We need to be extra careful, if we feel distressed, in all aspects of our lives, particularly in our work environment.

Anxiety is one of the contributing factors that increases our stress levels and sometimes can be the sole cause of an individual reaching the point of distress in their experience. For example if you are expecting someone home at a certain time and they don't arrive your mind starts to imagine all sorts of things that may have happened. Depending on the person and how often they have been late in the past will also colour your anxiety over their behaviour.

If the person you are waiting for is always punctual you will be anxious very quickly but if they are habitually late say by one hour you will be pretty OK until you reach the time you could reasonably expect them to arrive. The interesting thing is to consider your reaction WHEN they do arrive to gauge how much distress they have caused you, and we will all have different reactions but ask yourself did it affect me, and it usually does. (A good strategy is not to over react until you get their story.)

If we can have distress and reaction over a small incident like someone being late isn't it reasonable to expect some sort of emotion and reaction when the season doesn't go how we expected?

This time of year can be for some the most distressing

period. If you are one of these people, realising what is distressing you can help, and be a help to those you live with in dealing with some behaviour that may be out of character. You should also be extra vigilant about your safety in the workplace as any distress can distract our concentration and lead to silly mistakes which can cause accidents.

Farming is a risky business at times, be aware of the things that increase risk, like anxiety, and we can all have a safer work place. Your safety is very much your business.

Over the last two years, many hours have gone into the restoration of the Lake Grace Cemetery made available through Lotterywest Flood Recovery funding. Development Officer Michelle Slarke and Senior Administration Officer Lee-Ann Trevenen have spent many hours working with other staff and the Cemetery Group members to bring this together. Thank you to Devon Stubberfield, Ollie Farrelly, Mary Naisbitt, Jeanette Trevenen and Allan Duckworth of the Cemetery Group.

The project is almost complete. Contractors Derek Stanton, Simon Trevenen and Grant Osborne have built various new structures—funeral chapel, gazebo and toilet. Our works crew has been busy this past week preparing the parking area for kerbing and making a worker's entrance at the lower end of the cemetery. Contractor Marcus Owen has installed granite grave markers for 105 previously unmarked graves. New plot markers will make identifying all graves easier. Still to come to compliment the now completed Funeral Chapel are 12 park benches for attendance at funeral services held at the cemetery.

Thank you to Kim and Michelle Slarke for the large rocks we will use as features in the planned memorial garden. Judy McDougall of Pingrup has given excellent assistance and advice in planning this garden particularly the plants which would be best suited to the location. Judy has been very generous with her time and information and we appreciate this very much. Simon Trevenen has also been a great support with planning the garden and will carry out the work required to form the garden beds and compressed gravel pathways. He has also recently replaced the blue metal in the Roman Catholic section with gravel. All in all the whole cemetery picture is starting to look very good indeed.

Conservation of Cultural Heritage Grant

The Shire of Lake Grace has received a Lotterywest grant for conservation works to the Hainsworth Building at Newdegate. The funds (\$21,380) will go towards building repairs, such as roof and gutters, and professional fees for a heritage consultant to advise and oversee the project.

The Hainsworth Building is listed on the State's Register of Heritage Places.

Charles Hainsworth, occupation bootmaker, purchased Lot 60 Mitchell Street in 1933 and Ted Freeland, a ships' carpenter, constructed the building on the site soon after. Charles Hainsworth designed the building as a General store, Tea Rooms ('The Grand Café') and residence. The kitchen, with the original Metters No. 3 Stove, large wooden table, enamel sink and meat safe, catered for the Tearooms as well as community functions. The cutlery designed for this Café, with the table, chairs, shop scales and cash book are displayed in the Museum, which is situated in the old Café area. The store provided essential supplies to the people of Newdegate, the Lakes Districts and surrounding areas from 1933 until 1972.

HOW MUCH IS YOUR MEMBERSHIP WORTH?

MTT Training at home



Session: LEGS AND ARMS EXTREME
Intensity level: High
Session goal: Cross training
Session time: 5 mins warm up, 35 mins program, 5 mins cool down and stretch = 45 minutes

Session concept; Session involves 35 x one minute rounds. Each round involves completing two exercises - POWER JUMPS (jumping for height and length if room allows) and 2 ARM BICEP CURLS (bicep curl both arms at the same time) using hand weights.

Alternative; A suitable lower impact alternative is a controlled squat using hand weights to add resistance as required.

Rounds; Start with 1 power jump, and then immediately complete 35 bicep curls. Each minute start again, but add one power jump and reduce the bicep curls by one. The time remaining after completing the round is recovery until the next minute starts.

Note; If you can not complete a round within the designated time frame rest for a round then continue. Note; Program time can be altered to suit training level. If you are beginning exercise start with 10 x one minute rounds.

If you have not participated in physical activity recently or have any health concerns or are taking medications that may be affected by exercise please see your doctor before participating in any physical exercise.

Good luck to all Lake Grace teams competing this weekend.


